Why Communities Trade Goods. Churchill films. (16mm, color, 10 minutes) (2-6)

Through this film, children can go for a trip in the cab of a large truck. On the way, they discover some of the reasons communities exchange goods. They see how the land changes from place to place, and how different kinds of land can produce different things. A mountain forest town produces lumber; a community in a flat valley produces food crops. To obtain the many things we use each day, communities must trade or "exchange" goods. (2-6)

Why People Have Special Jobs: The Man Who Made Spinning Tops.

Learning Corporation of America. (16mm film, color, 7 min.)

This humorous film introduces the basic economic concept of specialization of labor. A man who lives in a primitive village makes a spinning top for his son. The other fathers want him to make tops for their children too, but the man does not have time because he must also fish and hunt to feed his family. When one of the fathers volunteers to supply the toymaker with fish in return for a gop, the other villagers realize that each man has a special job he can do best. The idea of specialization of labor is born. The film concludes by showing examples of specialized jobs today. (k-3)

Why We Have Taxes: The Town That Had No Policeman. Learning Corporation of America. (16mm film, color, 7 min.) (k-3)

A baffling problem arises in a little community. A thief has stolen the farmer's tomatoes, the clothesmaker's new suit, the housebuilder's wheelbarrow, and the shoemaker's sandals. Clearly a policeman is needed. But how will the policeman earn a living, since he has no goods of his own to sell? The clothesmaker thinks of a perfect solution: if everyone gives a little bit of money, the total amount will be enough to pay the policeman to work for the whole community. The simple idea of taxation to accomplish a common goal is born. The film concludes with examples of modern services provided by taxes. (k-3)

Why We Have Laws: Shiver, Gobble and Snore. Learning Corporation of America. (16mm film, color, 7 min.)

Using a humorous trio of characters, this film shows why rules are necessary, and goes on to develop the concept of laws. Because of the silly rules made by the kind of their land, Shiver is always cold, Gobble hungry, and Snore Gleepy. But when they escape to a place without rules, they find it impossible to live peacefully. So they make up a fair and sensible set of rules that satisfies them all. The film ends with a look at some important laws of today, pointing out how the people themselves have helped to make them. (k-3) (Selected for use at the 1970 White House Conference on Children.)
