ABSTRACT

This document contains a State-by-State directory of 464 alternative public schools. Each listing in the directory contains the school name, address, grade levels, and enrollment. For purposes of this directory, an alternative public school has been defined as any school within a community that (1) provides alternative learning experiences to the conventional school programs and (2) is available by choice to every family at no extra cost. The publication also defines several types of alternative schools, examines the rapid increase in alternative public schools in the United States, and gives summary statistics on the types and sizes of these schools. Directory of Optional Alternative Public Schools

Since the National Consortium for options in Public Education was first formed, an effort has been underway to identify optional alternative public schools in operation in the United States and in other parts of the world. At first this was a rather informal effort involving little more than keeping files on alternative schools that came to our attention through correspondence, through contacts at alternative school conferences, and through random mention in various publications. As interest in public school alternatives began to increase, our files were supplemented with a number of state and regional directories, and a few directories that provided "selected samples" of the kinds of options being developed in the public schools.

By September, 1972, a fairly systematic effort was underway not only to identify alternative schools, but also to verify the fact that they were in fact public school options. Using a make-shift staff of volunteer workers, and hampered by a lack of external funds, a national directory slowly began to take shape. A master file of listings of alternative schools was developed, and requests for information on alternative schools were sent out to all parts of the country. Once a contact person and a mailing address were obtained, a survey questionnaire was mailed to verify whether the listing was a public school alternative.

Problems: While the above procedure appears quite simple, the task of obtaining an accurate listing proved extremely difficult due to three reasons:

- 1. The Band-Wagon Effect: In developing an accurate listing of alternative public schools we had to contend with what we came to call the "Band-Wagon" effect, for "faddish" educators began to use the term alternative to describe anything and everything that they happened to be doing. One state directory even included "Operation Doghouse, a program whereby students planned, built and sold doghouses." Such inclusions helped to alert the surveyors that things that were called alternatives were often not what they hoped to appear.
- 2. Rapid Growth: The rapid and continuing growth of alternative public school likewise renders any directory almost immediately out of date. Twice the NCOPE Directory was postponed because an influx of information on new schools arrived before we could go to press. Thus Changing Schools will continue to report supplements to the NCOPE Directory.
- 3. Confusion Over Definition: Lacking a clear, precise definition of what is and what isn't an alternative school, many regional and state listings included schools and programs that were clearly not alternative schools. Earlier lists included vocational schools, work-study programs and, a wide assortment of "innovative" programs that were very worthwhile but did not offer students freedom of educational choice.

Directory Definition: An alternative public school has been defined in the NCOPE Directory as any school within a community that provides



alternative learning experiences to the conventional school programs and that is available by choice to every family within its community at no extra cost. Since alternative public schools usually develop as responses to particular educational needs within their communities, there is no single model or group of models that would encompass their diverse nature. However, the majority of alternative public schools fit into the following types or into combinations of these types.

Open Schools* - with learning activities individualized and organized around interest centers within the classroom or building. While the concept of open education is not new, there has been a revival of interest in it beginning with the development of informal infant schools in Great Britain following World War II.

Schools Without Walls* - with learning activities throughout the community and with much interaction between school and community. Philadelphia's Parkway Program, which opened in 1969, was the first and probably most well nown of these.

Learning Centers - with a concentration of learning resources in one location available to all of the students in the community. This would include magnet schools, educational parks, career education centers, vocational and technical high schools, etc.

Continuation Schools - with provisions for students whose education in the conventional schools has been (or might be) interrupted. This would include drop-out centers, re-entry programs, pregnancy-maternity centers, evening and adult high schools, street academies, etc.

Multi-Cultural Schools - with emphasis on cultural pluralism and ethnic and racial awareness and usually serving a multi-cultural student body. Bilingual schools with optional enrollment would be included here.

<u>Free Schools</u> - with emphasis on greater freedom for students and teachers. This is usually applied to non-public alternative schools, but a few are available by choice within public school systems.

Schools-Within-Schools - with a small number of students and teachers involved by choice in a different kind of learning program. This would include mini-schools and satellite schools. A satellite school is a school at another location which maintains administrative ties to the parent school. The schools-within-schools would usually belong to one or more of the six types above.




^{*}Both of these terms (open schools and schools with walls) are also used for architectual concepts in school building. We do not so use them here. The terms refer to concepts for organizing learning activities that may be used in a diverse array of physical facilities.

Not all alternative public schools would fall into these types. We have identified optional alternative public schools where all learning activities are based on behavior modification (Grand Rapids, Michigan) and others that are non-graded continuous-progress schools (Minneapolis, Minnesota). In addition to the above, many alternative public schools operate as voluntary integration models within their communities.

Directory Listings: Of the 600 plus schools NCOPE has identified during the past two years as somehow claiming to be an alternative public school, only 464 have been included in this listing. The 464 alternative schools are found in 35 different states and five countries, but 75% of the schools are found in eight states, with the alternatives in California, Washington, and New York totalling over 40%.

The Directory has attempted to include for each listing the name of the school, the school address, type of school, grade levels, and number of students. As you will note, time restraints and lack of resources have forced us to go to press with a large number of incomplete listings. One of the most serious shortcomings is the lack of zip codes. Nonetheless, the information that is included is as reliable as possible, and an attempt has been made to verify each listing. In cases where there is some doubt, we have chosen to omit the questioned listing.

Directory Omissions:

A word should be added about the schools that are not included in the Directory. Only public school alternatives have been listed. A large number of special function schools have not been included in the Directory because they serve students who are assigned or referred without freedom of choice. Many of these schools are for students who have been labeled delinquent or disruptive. While such schools may be desirable in some communities, they should not be confused -- regardless of what they are called, with optional alternative public schools. Other school districts have developed policies of open enrollment, so that students in a community may choose to attend any school regardless of geographic proximity. (An example of this is East



Lansing, Michigan, where a policy of open enrollment has been instituted at the elementary level.) Such open enrollment schools have also been omitted due to space limitations. When a community has several optional alternative public schools available, the conventional school, of course, becomes one of the options, but for the purposes of the NCOPE Directory such conventional school options have not been included.


Survey of Alternative Schools: Of the 464 alternative public schools listed in the Directory, a survey questionnaire was returned by 276 schools. Of the schools polled 79% were secondary, 19% were elementary, and 2% were K-12. The most dramatic insight gained in the survey was the steady growth in the number of alternative public schools since the mid-60's.


The Growth of Alternative Public Schools

The survey found a fairly equal distribution of types of alternative public schools. Open Schools, Schools-Without-Walls, Learning Centers and Continuation Centers each totalling approximately 20% of the schools surveyed. Multi-Cultural Schools, Free Schools, and School-Within-Schools combined for another 20%.






The size of the schools surveyed ranged from less than 50 students to over 1,000 with most schools having between 50 and 150. (See following diagram.)

The survey and Directory both help to verify the existence of a new trend in American education. The list of 464 schools is certainly a modest appraisal of the number of alternative schools in operation in the fall of 1973. Due to our limitations, no comprehensive search of public education was undertaken, rather we relied entirely on identifying schools that came to our attention. One might also suppose a large number of new schools are opening their doors this fall, and there are hundreds of other groups now planning and developing new alternative public schools.

Some predict there are over 1,000 alternative public schools now in operation, but only continued effort on our part — and on yours will verify this estimate.

A Mandate For Alternatives

".... I see unity through diversity.
