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ABSTRACT

This research brief lists and indexes materials on State education legislation and activity by subject and State. The information was obtained from answers to questionnaires sent to State education agencies, legislative service agencies, teacher organizations, and school board associations. Other information was obtained from materials sent during the year to the Education Commission of the States. The publication is organized to include the broad areas of State education -- accountability, State and local organization and policy, and items dealing with all education personnel from the chief State school officer to the classroom aide. INTRODUCTION

The Education Commission of the States' fourth collection of information on state education legislation and activity was expanded considerably this year with a new approach to the annual "Survey of the States." By employing the hundreds of newsletters and bulletins received in the Research and Information Services Department for Legislative Review, a weekly to monthly newsletter covering state education activity, information on legislation was extracted and filed for quick reference by subject and state.

This procedure provided ECS staff with immediate access to up-to-date legislative information, which is now made available much more promptly than in the past to state constituents who request it.

Toward the end of 1973, when most state legislatures had adjourned, state education agencies, legislative service agencies, teacher organizations and school board associations were sent a questionnaire along with a listing of the information collected by ECS during the year from their respective states. They were asked to correct or supplement the advance collection and to add to it other items which were important to their state's education program.

More than 4,600 items, triple last year's effort, were collected in this manner. This research brief on GENERAL GOVERNANCE AND ADMINISTRATION is the first of a series of four which list and index items by subject and state. With the aim of providing quick delivery of the information to state readers, editing has been kept to a minimum -- most items appear in virtually the same form in which they were received. Because of rising printing costs and budget limitations, vetoed, failed and carryover legislation are not listed in this year's series. This kind of information is available, however, on request to the ECS Research and Information Services Department.

GENERAL GOVERNANCE AND ADMINISTRATION has been organized to include the broad areas of state education -- accountability, state and local organization and policy, and items dealing with all education personnel from the chief state school officer to the classroom aide. Governance and administration of specific areas, i.e., curriculum, special programs, school finance, etc., will be found in one or more of the succeeding briefs: CURRICULUM, INSTRUCTION AND SPECIAL PROGRAMS; SCHOOLS, STUDENTS AND SERVICES; or SCHOOL FINANCE (which covers all finance items collected and in some cases, duplicates information in other briefs).

HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

With the exception of the school finance area, no item appears more than once in this series, although many of them quite logically could be included in several categories. For location of all items dealing with a specific topic, a detailed index is provided in the back of each book. For example, if the reader is seeking information on the education and training of teachers, he should first consult this book's subsection PERSONNEL Education and Training (see table

of contents). Then he should turn to the index in the back of the book to check other page references to the key words: personnel, teachers, education and training. Items in the other three briefs may contain these key words as well, although not as a major classification. Most items deal with elementary-secondary education; those related either wholly or partially to postsecondary education and community colleges are so labeled.

HOW TO IDENTIFY ITEMS

Each item in this book is identified in the left-hand column by state, bill and/or statute number (identical bills are listed together where practical) or a descriptor: ACTIVITY, PROJECT, STUDY. Standard post office abbreviations are used for states; a listing is on the inside back cover. While most state legislatures operate in a similar fashion, there are individual differences in the ways in which bills are labeled and handled. Common abbreviations used to identify bills, resolutions and constitutional amendments are explained below.

Bill Identification:

- A - Assembly (same as House). Examples: AB: Assembly Bill; AR: Assembly Resolution.
- H - House (same as Assembly). Examples: HB: House Bill; HR: House Resolution.
- S - Senate. Examples: SB: Senate Bill; SR: Senate Resolution.

Note: Some states use only a single letter to identify bills, i.e., A, H, or S.

- L - Legislative. Used in Nebraska only, which has a unicameral system. Examples: LB: Legislative Bill; LR: Legislative Resolution.
- LD - Legal Document. A bill identification term used in Maine.
- F - File. In some states, used instead of Bill.
- C - Committee or Concurrent. Examples: HCSSB would mean House Committee Substitute for Senate Bill; SCR would mean Senate Concurrent Resolution.
- CA - Constitutional Amendment. Once adopted, measure usually must be referred to voters for final approval.
- J - Joint. Example: HJR: House Joint Resolution.
- Am - Amended.
- S or Sub. - Substitute.

PA - Public Act.

Sec. - Section.

Ch. - Chapter.

RSA - Revised Statutes Annotated.

HOW TO GET MORE INFORMATION

The information in this book is not intended to be more than a guide for the reader to use in exploring his particular areas of interest. Most of the legislative items can be checked out with the appropriate state education agency or legislative service agency; ECS has copies of only a few of the bills listed. The bulk of the activities, projects and studies contain within their descriptive texts the name and address of a resource person to contact for further information. State education and legislative service agencies are listed in the appendix.

HOW THE READER CAN HELP ECS

Collecting, compiling and publishing this series of briefs on state education legislation and activity is a costly and time-consuming procedure for ECS staff. Is ECS dealing with the kind of information the reader needs and wants? Is it in usable form? Could the collection, compilation and dissemination be improved? The reader's comments on the questionnaire form in the back of the book would be valuable contributions toward the improvement of our information service.

A WORD OF THANKS

We hope the reader will find this book and its companion volumes both easy-to-use and informative. It is our most complete and comprehensive effort to date in our continuing and unique program of keeping state constituents informed quickly and accurately on current education activity. It is the first time we have been able to list reports from every state in the union; at least one organization in each state has provided answers for one or more books, on our "Survey of the States" questionnaire which is reproduced in the appendix. In many states, two or more of the organizations surveyed were able to collaborate on their answers. It is this kind of cooperative effort, both with ECS requests for information and among agencies, which has enabled ECS to handle and disseminate the information in these books.

Our thanks go to the many individuals who have patiently and thoughtfully provided each item, either by placing us on an important mailing list or through much-appreciated personal effort.

ENACTED. DE PROJECT:

The Delaware Education Accountability System (DEAS) is a comprehensive planning model for improving education in Delaware. This plan was developed by the Planning, Research and Evaluation Division of the Delaware Department of Public Instruction under a federal grant, Title IV, Section 402, of P.L. 90-247. Although the Planning, Research and Evaluation Division is responsible for coordinating the implementation of the various subsystems of the DEAS model, the operation of DEAS is a total department enterprise in cooperation with local school districts. MN PROJECT:

Accountability -- community evaluation of school programs. Evaluation of school programs has traditionally been done by educators. Project is developing a new approach involving community persons directly in the process. This community evaluation is conducted in addition to, and not necessarily in agreement with, more formal evaluations provided by the district's research and evaluation department. A steering committee solicited membership for an evaluation committee at large from various community organizations. Membership is voluntary and persons are encouraged to participate as individuals rather than as representatives of an organization. An evaluation coordinator was hired to serve as a liaison between the schools and the committee for the duration of the project. Two topics were selected for evaluation -- pupil progress reporting and the utilization of teachers' skills. The committee, divided into two study groups, meets weekly to discuss and evaluate aspects of the topics. At the conclusion of the project, recommendations will be made to the board of education. Project seeks to provide greater public accountability for educational programs by involving the consumer in the evaluation process. Accountability for educators to students in St. Elizabeth public schools. Over half the involved faculty and administration voluntarily signed performance contracts. The next year's salary will be determined by year-end student achievement on the Stanford. The average class achievement for the three years will be compared with the national norms to determine the amount of pay increase or decrease that each individual teacher chose. Mutual Action Plan. The Mutual Action Plan (MAF) for New Mexico is ranked as one of the top priorities of the state department of education. Now in its second year, the program originally was designated as Project DID and is designed as a field assistance project. Two of the main goals are to provide local education agencies with assigned state department of education liaison persons and to provide direct assistance to local education agencies in the interpretation and use of assessment data to effect program improvement. Basically, MAP remains in a developmental stage. As originally organized, the project made use of available subject matter specialists who retained their original assignments, as well as assuming MAP assignments. Beginning July 1, 1973, however, the state department of education was reorganized to accommodate full time MAP assignments. The program now has a staff of 13 professionals working full time, with additional staff to be added as of January 1974.

Special training programs in evaluation and assessment group processes and systematic approaches to educational problem solving were conducted for staff this past summer, and the MAP model was further refined to eliminate personality and other similar variables as keys to the program's effectiveness. Personnel in the MAP unit will coordinate closely with professions in the Technical Assistance Unit to more adequately represent their assigned districts in areas such as bilingual-multicultural education, early childhood education, career education and the like. Objective-based evaluation. A highly ambitious program developed the state department of education in New Mexico, the objective-based evaluation program is a component of the state's total evaluation and assessment effort. Begun three years ago, the program has two major goals, the first being to encourage local education agencies to recognize and rank local objectives in the basic skill areas of science, math, social studies, communication skills and career education. The second goal is to assess educational programs across the state and provide information about group performance in the essential skill areas in a cost and time efficient manner. The two major goals are being achieved through the following activities: (1) by developing objective referenced tests within the state department of education for those objectives of state and local concern; (2) by subsequent administration of these measures at grades 6, 9 and 12 in all public schools; and (3) by reporting the information derived from these tests to interested audiences such as students, teachers, parents, local administrators and curriculum experts, community leaders, legislators and others. In addition, the information is used by the state department of education to revise the measures and to modify administration of the measures.

In the first year of the program, committees in one-third of New Mexico's school districts wrote objectives. Committees (which continue in effect in all school districts at present) were composed of students, teachers, parents, local education agency administrators, community representatives and others, with all members holding equal voting powers. Objectives were written in terms of what the committees felt were valid considering local needs, and the objectives were ranked in order of priority as determined by the same committees. During the second year, tests were constructed based upon objectives as delineated by the local committees, and these tests were administered in two-thirds (59) of the districts. During the third year (1972-73), measures were administered at grade 12 in all 88 districts and sampled at grades 6 and 9. During the current 1973-74 school year, the state department of education plans to administer the tests to all 5th, 9th and 12th graders in the state. NY STUDY:

Barriers to postsecondary education. In 1968, a longitudinal research study was initiated to determine what factors prevent students from continuing their education beyond the high school level and to identify those factors acting as the most severe barriers encountered by students. Entitled A Longitudinal Study of the Barriers Affecting the Pursuit of Higher Education by New York State High School Seniors, the study was structured in three phases. In Phase I (1968), a survey of high school seniors across the state was conducted; 6 months later, in Phase II a mail survey of the graduates was conducted. (The results of each of these phases were reported in separate publications -- August 1969 and July 1970.) When Phase III was conducted two years later, telephone interviews were used to survey the graduates. Several of the districts have progressed into the area of building a program structure around the needs and goals expressed by the community. All districts plan to change their accounting and budgeting process to accommodate the new program structure.

These districts are using the draft edition of the Revised Illinois Financial Accounting Manual. Following the completion of the development of a program structure and implementation of program accounting and budgeting system, these districts will have the necessary components of an educationally effective and fiscally efficient management system. Senate Bill 1157 was enacted during 1973 and included \$850,000 for the funding of grants for fiscal year 1974. Continuation grants were awarded to each of the fiscal year 1973 districts with the exception of New Athens, Niles and Oregon. While attempts have been made to improve the quality of the educational environment in desegregated schools, the increase in dropout and expulsion rates, teacher absences, pupil absences, incidents of violence and academic failure strongly indicate that the attitudes of staff toward students, staff toward staff and student towards student has deteriorated to a critical state. There is strong evidence to suggest that acquisition of basic relating skills can free teachers and students from the inhibitions which prevent an open and honest approach to the people problems in schools. Utilizing consultants skilled in media program development and familiar with the IPR program model, the Department of Equal Educational Opportunity has developed a staff training program to be implemented in requesting school districts. The training program will consist of six units, utilizing existing multi-media programs and incorporating new ones. Unit 1 will discuss the logical effects of communication responses and provide the trainee with exercises to incorporate the elements of communication into trainee-client/trainee-peer encounters; Unit 2 provides specific stimulus material to help trainees become more sensitive to client concerns by specific stimulus material to help trainees become more sensitive to client concerns by looking at different kinds of interpersonal situations to better know the kinds of stresses which are most difficult to deal with; Unit 3 enables the trainee to look closely at his own behavior by means of stimulated recall using video tape (IPR). Subsequently, in this unit, the trainee will then be better able to recognize, talk about and overcome what were identified as areas of stress and difficulty; Unit 4 teaches the inquirer role to enable trainees to supervise each other in Interpersonal Process Recall (IPR) sessions or to conduct such sessions with others; Unit 5 enables trainees to participate in real situations of client communications and obtain direct feedback through the use of video tape recording and playback; Unit 6 teaches how to use the process not only to understand the life style of the client, but how to change his relationship with the trainee, to help to understand the client and to help him understand himself. The commissioner of education shall serve as secretary of the commission, which shall develop and create criteria, rules and regulations for the certification of public school teachers and interns, to be submitted to the state board of education for approval. From time to time the commission shall revise or supplement the criteria for certification of public school teachers and interns subject to approval by the board. Subject to criteria, rules and regulations approved by the state board of education, the commission shall also grant certificates to interns and to candidates for original certificates and receive recommendations from local committees as established by the commission for the renewal of teaching certificates, to grant life certificates to those who qualify according to requirements and to suspend or revoke certificates. With regard to vocational education teachers, the commission shall adopt and maintain as its criteria the state plan for vocational education.
