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#### ABSTRACT

The books selected for this bibliography were measured against commonly accepted literary standards. Fiction was considered in terms of important themes: substantial plots, effective style, valid management of time and place settings, and believable characters whose personalities hold significance for children from preschoolers to 14-year-olds. Nonfiction was selected for its accuracy, its style, and the pertinency of its subject matter to the age level addressed, to objectively identified reading interests of children, and to curriculum relationships. The contents include: "Introduction"; "Awards and Their Symbols"; "Using the Bibliography"; "Picture and picture Story Books," which looks at ABC books, books with no or few words, fiction and folklore, and nonfiction: "Reading in Its Early Stages," which presents fiction and folklore and nonfiction: "For Middle and Older Children," which lists fiction, folklore, and nonfiction books: "Poetry and Verse," which lists anthologies and single writers: "Religion"; and "Story and Miscellany Collections," which is divided into the categories of general, seasons and holidays, reference books, directory of publishers, index of titles, and index of authors. In addition, four recurrent themes of fiction are shown by symbols to aid in quick reference. (WR)



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

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#### INTRODUCTION

Some 40,000 children's books are currently in print, with 1,834 new titles published in 1973. Obviously, this ACEI Bibliography has required the exercise of a high degree of selectivity, for all the best books could not possibly be listed — to our regret. Experienced workers with children's literature will undoubtedly miss some personal favorites, and may wonder at the inclusion of some titles. Objective criteria were certainly our guidelines, but any human committee makes some subjective judgments.

Compilers' choices have been measured against commonly accepted literary standards. Fiction was considered in terms of important themes; substantial plots; effective style; valid management of time and place settings; and believable characters whose personalities hold significance for children, from pre-schoolers to fourteen-year-olds. Nonfiction has been chosen for its accuracy; its style; the pertinency of its subject matter to the age-level addressed; to objectively identified reading interests of children; and curriculum relationships. For both fiction and nonfiction, the quality of illustration, format, general graphic presentation, and photography have influenced our choices.

Students in the field who are concerned with more detailed analysis will find full discussion of criteria for book selection in CHILDREN AND BOOKS by May Hill Arbuthnot and Zena Sutherland (Scott, Foresman; rev. ed. 1972) and in THE UNRELUCTANT YEARS by Lillian Smith (American Library Association, 1953; Viking/Compass paperback, 1967).

While most of the titles included here have also been recommended in comprehensive book selection tools and standard journals reviewing children's books, we emphasize that the Bibliography of Books for Children is not a list drawn in sterile fashion from other compilations. The eleven persons who have served part-time or full term on the 1971-1974 Children's Book Review Committee include six elementary/secondary school teachers, two school administrators, four school librarians, four public librarians, two college professors, ten parents, and two grandparents. Such arithmetic is possible only when one person lives more than one role, and our Bibliography is the richer for this variety of views about children's experience with books.

The older books listed here have been read, analyzed, read to children, laughed (and maybe wept) over, admired, and in some cases loved for years, by the compilers. The 1974 titles are so new that the committee read galleys and unbound sheets, making room on an already full list for those choice ones we felt you should wait no longer to learn about.

We hope the Bibliography will be useful to teachers, families, librarians, and group leaders. We believe every book here could bring help to some child. We have listed books that make sheer excitement out of transmitting knowledge, and books to give children important involvement with literature. Some are books to lighten burdens: a book can show a deprived child his heritage, a lonely child can find a family in a book, and a book can offer the future to a child imprisoned in today. You will find books to bring joyous encounters: books that teem with the graphic beauty of telling lines and glowing color, books pounding with the pulse of adventure, books with the kindling spark of fantasy to challenge children who are ready. You are the links between.

#### AWARDS AND THEIR SYMBOLS

More than one hundred awards honor children's books in the United States. Moreover, other countries have similar awards, and one jury bestows medals on an international basis. A comprehensive, definitive listing can be found in CHILDREN'S BOOKS: AWARDS AND PRIZES, compiled by Christine Stawicki (New York: Children'; Book Council, 3rd ed., 1973, 163 pp., \$2.95).

The ACEI Bibliography mentions only ten awards, all administered by national or international associations concerned solely with books and libraries. One is given by the International Board on Books for Young People In the United States, four are given or administered by the Children's Services Division of the American Library Association, and one by the National Book Committee. The remaining four awards included here are those of the British Library Association, the Australian Children's Book Council, and the Canadian Library Association.

Some awards honer an author or artist for the total body of work. In the Bibliography, symbols for these awards appear immediately following the author's name. Other awards, honoring individual books, are indicated by symbols following age level suggested for each book. Awards are given annually except as noted.

Within the general categories books are organized in broad subject areas (Fantasy and Magic, Other Times and Places, etc.). Obviously a book of fantasy can also be an animal story, while a story laid in England can also be about sports and family life. Therefore in addition to annotations that mention subject aspects beyond the general categories in which books are found, four recurrent themes of fiction are shown by symbols to aid in quick reference; they will be found following the suggested age level for each book.

AMBASSADOR WORLD ATLAS. Hammond, 1971, \$16.95.

Has all the features of CITATION plus an index containing over 100,000 place names.

GOODE'S WORLD ATLAS. Rand McNally, 1974. Fourteenth edition. \$9.95 hardcover, \$5.95 paperback.

Excellent physical and political maps included. New features include pronouncing index, 7,000 new entries, special metropolitan areas index, environmental maps.

RAND MCNALLY ILLUSTRATED WORLD ATLAS. Rand, McNally, 1973, \$2.95.

This compact, soft-cover handbook may serve as companion to WORLD ALMANAC. Explains in graphic form what WORLD ALMANAC gives in statistical form. The first section "This Planet Earth in Space and Time" is especially well done in clear, colorful graphics.

### BIOGRAPHY

FAMOUS AUTHOR-ILLUSTRATORS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE. 11. with photographs. Dodd, Mead, 1973. \$3.95.

Written for children to read themselves, the selections are children's favorites, highly popular and outstanding. Three are classics — Edward Lear, Kate Greenaway, and Beatrix Potter. Most are contemporary, still living and writing. Part of the Famous Biographies for Young People series. Describes personalities, lifestyles, art media, aims and achievements. New and useful!

AN INDEX TO YOUNG READERS' COLLECTIVE BIOGRAPHIES: ELEMENTARY AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL LEVEL. Bowker, 1970, \$12.75.

Section one contains an alphabetical listing of biographies; section two is a subject listing. Indexes of subject headings and books by title are included. This volume provides a good reference lesson for children, offering practice in library skills, how to use an index, and preparation for using The Reader's Guide.

THIRD BOOK OF JUNIOR AUTHORS. W11--n, 1972. \$10.50.

Continues the work of THE JUNIOR BOOK OF AUTHORS, 1951, and MORE JUNIOR AUTHORS, 1963. Articles are written by authors and illustrators themselves, with personally signed photographs. Sound selection of 255 entries made based on careful reviews. Index includes entries in first two companion volumes. Library should have all three if size of collection and budget allow.

### DICTIONARIES

AMERICAN HERITAGE SCHOOL DICTIONARY, American Heritage Pub. and Houghton, 1972, \$4.50. (Grades 3-9.)

Has interesting introductory sections on how the dictionary was put together and how to use it. The pronunciation guide is exceptionally lucid. Down the center of each page is a yellow panel with pictures (unfortunately, not always useful), extended definitions or short discussions of the words.

THE CHARLIE BROWN DICTIONARY. Based on the RAINBOW DICTIONARY. World Publishing; Times Mirror, 1973. \$6,95.

New in both illustration and definitions, but vocabulary remains same as in THE RAINBOW DICTIONARY. All the "Peanuts" characters are aboard. The 2.400 entries based on popular usage have pictures illustrating meaning, simple explanations, use of words in sentence with additional facts given to clarify meaning such as a synonymous word, or the use of the word with its antonym. Youngsters will enjoy using this dictionary.

WEBSTER'S INTERMEDIATE DICTIONARY: A NEW SCHOOL DICTIONARY.
American Book Co., 1972, \$6.50.

Based on citation files used for WEBSTER'S THIRD NEW INTERNATIONAL DICTIONARY and WEBSTER'S SEVENTH COLLEGIATE DICTIONARY. Contains 58,000 entries including new words such as dashiki, skyjacker, ecosystem; and conversion tables for the metric system. Two-color format used in illustrations and pronunciation guide in blue on each page enhance the format.

XEROX INTERMEDIATE DICTIONARY. Grosset and Dunlap and Xerox. 1972. \$7.95. Also published as GINN'S INTERMEDIATE DICTIONARY.

The Xerox dictionary has readable introductory articles, with an especially effective explanation of the parts of an entry in the dictionary. The lack of word derivations is not corrected by the inclusion of a general article on Latin and Greek roots,

however well written. But entries are up-to-date and include regionalisms, always fun to come upon while browsing.

#### **ENCYCLOPEDIAS**

BRITANNICA JUNIOR ENCYCLOPAEDIA. 15 vols. Encyclopaedia Britannica, 1973. \$149.90; schools and libraries. \$109.50; 2 or more sets to schools and libraries. \$99.50 each.

Emphasis on easy to read, brief, and simple articles, arranged alphabetically, with cross references, and geared to elementary school curriculum for grades 3 through 8. Volume 1, Comprehensive Ready Reference Index, contains brief, current entries.

COMPTON'S ENCYCLOPEDIA AND FACT-INDEX. 22 vols. F. E. Compton Co., 1973. \$195-\$215; schools and libraries, \$144; 2 or more sets \$129,50 each.

Designed for home and school use to fit the interests and needs of children and young people through high-school age. Arrangement is alphabetical by broad topics with a quick reference fact index at the end of each volume; reference outlines for guided study and extensive current bibliographies.

MERIT STUDENTS ENCYCLOPEDIA. 20 vols. Crowell-Collier. 1973. \$224.50; \$165 for schools and libraries; additional discounts for 2 or more sets.

Curriculum orientation, broad coverage, signed articles, prolific references, student guides, and bibliographies: a valuable resource for upper grades and high school students. The readable text, comprehensive map program, fine paper quality, excellent photographic reproductions, good color, and artfully done transparency overlays enhance the work. Recommended for grades 5 up.

NEW BOOK OF KNOWLEDGE: THE CHIL-DREN'S ENCYCLOPEDIA. 20 vols. Grolier Inc., 1973. \$199.50. Also available in Spanish as EL NUEVO TESORO DE LA JUVENTUD — THE NEW BOOK OF KNOWLEDGE. 20 vols. Grolier, Inc. \$199.50.

An entirely new alphabetically arranged encyclopedia designed for school use. Articles are curriculumi-oriented, written and signed by specialists and checked for interest and comprehension of elementary-grade children; excellent print and outstanding format profuse with colorful illustrations. Separate subject area teacher's guides are available.

WORLD BOOK ENCYCLOPEDIA. 22 vols. Field Enterprises, 1973. \$215.95 and up; \$144 for schools and libraries.

An authoritative general encyclopedia designed to meet reference needs and interests of children and young people. Arrangement is alphabetical, word-by-word, by small subject. Many names, and diagrams accompanying articles are

helpful; statistics and information are up-to-date. Volume 22 is Research Guide/Index.

YOUNG STUDENTS ENCYCLOPEDIA, 1973. 2 editions — Funk and Wagnalls. Inc. 20 vols. \$37.80; and MY WEEKLY READER EDITION, 15 vols. \$75. Xerox Family Books. (10 percent more colored photographs and more extensive index in latter edition).

Child-sized volumes simplify the project of beginning research for third, fourth, and fifth grade readers. Subjects are geared to curriculum of third through sixth grade. Illustrated with photographs, mostly in color. Index.

### MCGRAW DISCOVERING ART SERIES:

Michael Batterberry. TWENTIETH CENTURY ART. McGraw, 1969. \$9.95, \$4.95 paperback.

An up-to-date approach with more life than most reference books of similar content. Type size is suitable for children, pictures are well reproduced and large enough to appreciate details. A useful elementary school reference suitable for ages 10 and up. Also available in this series are the following:

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PRIMITIVE ART, 1973. Ages 7 and up. SEVENTEENTH AND EIGHTEENTH CENTURY ART, 1969. Ages 10 and up.

THE OXFORD JUNIOR COMPANION TO MUSIC. Oxford, 1954, \$10.95.

Contains brief but accurate articles on composers, musicians, musical instruments, musical terms, and other topics. Includes illustrations, portraits, and facsimiles of musical scores, leaning toward the British. Preliminary section has tables of notation and a listing of the miniature examples of "Music the Reader Likes to Play" in the book. Useful for musicians ages 8 to 16.

Useful charts, tables, and lists in colored center insertion make for quick search.

### LITERATURE

CHILDCRAFT: THE HOW AND WHY LIBRARY, 15 vols. Field Enterprises, 1973. Price varies (\$153.40; \$75 school price).

Designed for use by and with preschool and primary children; large print, profuse colorful illustrations of great variety and high quality. Content, arranged by subject, is factual. Four volumes, new to the set, were previously issued as annuals: Children Everywhere, About Animals, About Me, and Look Again. This set is primarily for browsing and reading aloud, stimulating interests, stirring imaginations, and providing enriching experiences.

Iona and Peter Opic, eds. THE OXFORD BOOK OF CHILDREN'S VERSE. Oxford University Press, 1973, \$10.00

Chronologically arranged verses written for children, spanning 500 years from Chaucer to Ogden. Authors and sources are given in Appendix. A useful reference for teachers, rather than for children but teacher might use contents with children.

### RECREATION

N. Jennison. ed. THE CONCISE ENCYCLO-PEDIA OF SPORTS. Illustrated with photographs and drawings. Watts, 1970. \$6.95.

Fifty sports are presented with history, rules, tips on playing, and illustrative material. Good companion volume to THE JUNIOR ILLUSTRATED ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SPORTS reviewed below.

Bessie Jones and Bess Lomax Hawes. STEP-IT DOWN: GAMES, PLAYS, SONGS AND STORIES FROM TILE AFRO-AMERICAN HERITAGE. Harper, 1972, \$10.00.

Annotations, notes to scholars, selected bibliographies and discography add to value of this collection for parents and teachers. Recommendation not limited to inner-city uses.

Herbert Kamm. ed. THE JUNIOR ILLUS-TRATED ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SPORTS. Willard Mullin, illus. Bobbs-Merrill, 1970. \$6.95.

Full coverage of 13 sports: history, great names in sport, and all-time records included. Good companion volume to THE CONCISE ENCY-CLOPEDIA OF SPORTS mentioned above.

# SCIENCE

DISCOVERING NATURAL SCIENCE. AN INTRODUCTORY DICTIONARY. Encyclopaedia Britannica, 1972, \$14.45.

This volume, containing over 1,000 entries on plants, animals, and earth science, is designed for early elementary grades with simple language, narrative style, large type, and colorful illustrations.

Roland C. Clement. HAMMOND NATURE ATLAS OF AMERICA: MAMMALS, FISHES, ROCKS & MINERALS, TREES, WILD-FLOWERS, BIRDS, INSECTS, REPTILES & AMPHIBIANS. Hammond, 1973, \$17.95.

Profusely and extravagantly illustrated, the photography is superb, the print and paper quality superior. Maps are simple but colorful, contemporary but clear.

THE ILLUSTRATED ENCYCLOPEDIA OF THE ANIMAL KINGDOM. 20 vols. Grolier, 1972, \$99.50.

Offers one whole volume (v. 20) on endangered species, information not available in other encyclopedias examined. Some sections, such as the one on Mammals and Reptiles, have helpful geographical map inserts locating species on projection and information on natural habitat.

SCIENCE YEAR: THE WORLD BOOK SCIENCE ANNUAL 1974, Field, 1973, \$5,95.

Provides "Special Reports," an in-depth treatment of timely scientific topics; "Science File," briefer articles on recent advances alphabetically arranged by subject matter; and a section on "Men and Women of Science." A Special Feature on "How Dogs Communicate" includes an insert of two stereo records on the sounds that canids make — a novel feature which may present maintenance problems.

# SOCIAL SCIENCE

Lavinia Dobler. NATIONAL HOLIDAYS AROUND THE WORLD. II. and designed by Vivian Browne. Fleet, 1968. \$6.50.

Arranged chronologically by month of year then by country. Gives dates on which various nations won their independence, location of each, title of national anthenis, description of flags explaining meaning of colors and symbols. Brief statement is made about struggle for independence of each nation and its important leaders.

Robert B. Konikow. DISCOVER HISTORIC AMERICA. Rand. MeNally. 1973. \$8.95.

Sub-title: New, complete directory to America's most precious landmarks — historic sites, battle-fields, homes, museums, shrines in all 50 states. Latest Rand McNally Road Maps are included. Arranged by section of country, states within sections. The illustrations, in color, reproduce early paintings, drawings, and photographs. Maps are indexed. An attractive, colorful volume with brief text.



William Lerner. POCKET DATA BOOK, U. S. A. 1971. U. S. Government Printing Office, 1971. \$1.75.

Handily condensed data from the Statistical Abstract of the United States. Summary Section. are given in graphic form. Statistical data such as population, vital statistics, area and climate, government, elections, manufacturers, money, transportation, communications and foreign commerce are included. Convenient, small size and reasonable price plus wealth of information add

up to recommendation for purchase.

Robert J. Myers. CELEBRATIONS: THE COM-PLETE BOOK OF AMERICAN HOLIDAYS. II.

by Bill Greer. Doubleday, 1972. \$8.95.

Widely observed holidays are treated fully: how and why these special days originated, their history, and past and present observances. Complete chapters are devoted to 45 holidays; 14 more have summary information including many local events.

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
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
