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ABSTRACT

This annotated film bibliography is a compilation of film listings suitable for early childhood education teacher training, parent education, and for viewing by children. The list has been gathered from a variety of sources including the National Association for the Education of Young Children's conference film showings for the past several years, recent Head Start film lists, the 1970 White House Conference on Children's film listings, and various film distributors' advertisements. Section 1, the Subject Index, delineates major Child Development and Early Childhood Education categories and lists films in each category. Section 2, the Annotated Film List, includes alphabetical annotations of the films. Section 3, the Film Sources, lists the film distributors of each film mentioned. (Author/CS)

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ANNOTATED FILM BIBLIOGRAPHY

Child Development and Early Childhood Education

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INTRODUCTION

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This annotated film bibliography is a compilation of film listings from a variety of sources including the National Association for the Education of Young Children's conference film showings for the past several years, recent Head Start film lists, the 1970 White House Conference on Children's film listings, and various film distributor's advertisements.

Included in this bibliography are a variety of films suitable for teacher training, parent education, and for viewing by children. It is divided into three sections. Section I, the Subject Index, delineates major Child Development and Early Childhood Education categories and lists films in each category. Section II, the Annotated Film List, includes alphabetical annotations of the films. Section III, the Film Sources, covers the film distributors of each film listed.

ABBEY'S FIRST TWO YEARS

This film, which concentrates on the first two years of a developing child, shows the interaction between mother and child, the acquired skills of the child on a monthly and bi-monthly basis, and the interaction of the child with other children. It is a retrospective view, beginning at age two, and working backward to the first days of life. The film is an excellent study of healthy development, with very specific insights into language, and the growth of emotional and intellectual concepts.

ACCESS TO LEARNING

Documents the efforts of four elementary school teachers in the Columbus, Ohio public schools to provide their students with opportunities to strengthen their powers of thought. The program is based on the belief that the teacher who consistently provides the child with opportunities to develop skill in thinking provides him with access to learning.

He is given psychiatric help at a children's hospital and with play therapy is able to face school. It is recommended to use to show that experiences in infancy affect a child's emotional development and how these fears can be handled.

THE AGGRESSIVE CHILD: A PRESCHOOL BEHAVIOR PROBLEM (1965)

(The Disordered Mind, Troubled Children Series) Presents a case study involving an intelligent six-year-old who is in constant trouble at home and at school because of fighting. Includes statement from child's mother, the Nursery School director and teacher, head of children's psychiatry at the Montreal Children's Hospital, and effects of his antisocial behavior.

AIDES MAKE THE DIFFERENCE (late 1960's)

Anansi, a spider with human qualities is a folk hero of the Ashanti people of Ghana. In this adventure Anansi faces great trouble. He is saved only by the singular talents of his six sons. Anansi then faces the problem of choosing one of the six sons to reward, the prize being the moon itself.

AND SOW TOMORROW

Board of Education for City of Toronto

Shows something of the Toronto Board of Education program for the education of the young. The classrooms are considered "growth environments". The child learns the dynamics of interaction with his environment and the meaning of interaction with other people in it.

ANSWERING THE CHILD'S WHY (1951)

Contrasts various parental attitudes toward children's questions and shows the effects on a child's personality of interest and concern about his questions or a negative, rejecting attitude on part of parents. Demonstrates typical reactions to children's questions about death, birth, illness; the policeman on the corner.

ARE YOU AFRAID OF THE DARK?

AT YOUR FINGERTIPS - BOXES

Boxes are used in the supermarket in a great many ways. At home these boxes and cartons become playthings--cars, animals, villages, playhouses and tunnels.

AT YOUR FINGERTIPS - FLOATS

AUTISM'S LONELY CHILD

Dr. Frank Hewett, UCLA, uses conditioning techniques to teach autistic children to talk and identify objects for the first time. Dr. Hewett tries to transfer the techniques to parents to help them get successful responses.

AUTUMN COMES TO THE CITY

Music and natural sounds accompanying the camera's pictures of fall season. Signs of Autumn in the film present a natural science lesson as living things undergo changes for winter. This film has no narration.

BABY RABBIT

This is a story about a family and their pet rabbits that are kept on the rooftop of their central city apartment building. Rabbits and people need food, rest and homes--they live and grow.

BAGGAGE (1969)

A parable on the mental burdens of a young Japanese girl. She carries her "baggage", an allegorical piece of luggage representing the burden of conscience and man's struggle to free himself from psychological and emotional restrictions. A memorable blend of music, drama, dance, photography and architecture--without narration. Discussion catalyst.

BALLAD OF CROWFOOT (1970)

This graphic history of the Canadian West reflects the traditions, attitudes and problems of the Indian.

BEACH INTERVIEW

B/W, 27 minutes

CMC - Center for Mass Communication, Columbia University Press

Two boys at Wediko become upset and demand to leave camp. They discuss their problem with the head counselor who becomes the focus for their anger. In the course of this "life space interview", the boys, who are normally able to express their emotions only through action, succeed in verbalizing their resentment and discussing alternative ways of dealing with it.

A BEAR FAMILY (1970)

Traces the life of a mother bear and her two cubs from the time of their birth until they follow her out of the den for the first time.

BEING ME

A creative dance class for nine girls, aged 8 to 13, conducted by Hilda Mullin at the Pasadena Art Museum. The girls' spontaneous movements, evolved in a series of explorations, reveal the total physical, mental and emotional involvement of the dancers. Each child follows her own body rhythm, not one that is superimposed or prescribed.

BEGINNING SCHOOL

These two films taken in actual classrooms in the same school show the different way two teachers handle the beginning of school with young children.

BEHAVIOR MODIFICATION IN THE CLASSROOM

This film shows teachers and educational specialists using operant conditioning in three different classroom situations--early, intermediate and older primary school levels. The action is completely unrehearsed.

BEST OF SESAME STREET REVISITED

Selections from the best of the "Sesame Street" programs. Included are several sequences on counting and an introduction to basic geometric shapes.

THE BIKE

BING BANG BOOM

A novel approach to the teaching of music to children, filmed in a Toronto classroom. Composer-conductor R. Murray Schafer has seventh grade music students listen to the sounds around them and within them. From such exercises, the children develop an awareness of rhythm and musical phrasing and then go on to try their own composition.

BIRDS

7 minutes

This is a visual comment on the absurdity of discrimination. Six birds, three white and three black, choose to fight over six grains of food rather than divide them equally.

BLACK HISTORY, LOST, STOLEN OR STRAYED

BLOCKS - A MATERIAL FOR CREATIVE PLAY

"Blocks..." is an unrehearsed film that captures children using blocks to gain mastery over their ideas while giving imaginative play a quality of reality. Children ranging from five to eleven years are seen demonstrating how different stages of block building parallel different stages of growth. For the teacher's special interest, the children are seen using hollow and floor blocks, playhouse and table blocks as tools for recreating and widening their experience.

The open doors of the classroom, the overflow from the classroom environment, the use of the whole school--spell out the disappearance of the traditional classroom. A new structure and a new mode of teacher, function are being born, incorporated inventively into old schools, such as Gordonbrock (an old school in a racially mixed neighborhood in London) translated whole into the new schools. The aim is to nurture the ways of learning that are original with and natural to the child, maintaining and continuing these ways, stimulating and restimulating them.
