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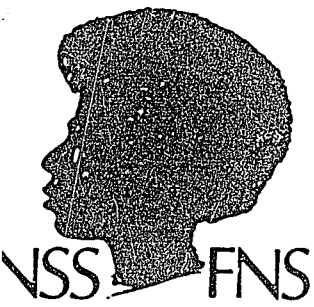

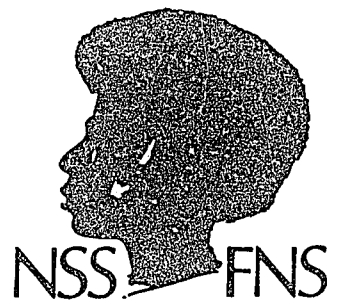
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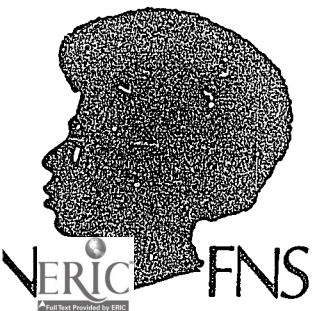

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INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this report is to present descriptive data collected in the Fall of 1971 and 1972 on two national samples of high school seniors from minority backgrounds. These data were collected by the National Scholarship Service and Fund for Negro Students (NSSFNS) as part of a program designed to provide counseling and guidance services to minority youth, and to establish a national longitudinal data resource for research purposes. This report is intended to provide persons concerned about our nation's minority youth with objective information about the high school classes of 1972 and 1973.

Future research reports in this series are planned which will include analytical studies of relationships among data collected from the 170,000 minority youth in NSSFNS' Minority Talent Registry. The information provided by these youth, together with followup data to be gathered in subsequent years, will be used to evaluate changes in the student's educational and vocational plans, their patterns of post-secondary activities and accomplishments, and changes in attitudes and behavior during those formative years at the transitional stage between secondary school and continuing education or the world of work.

THE NSSFNS STUDENT APPLICATION FORM

The NSSFNS Student Application Form was designed to serve three functions: first, to obtain data needed to fit student characteristics with the characteristics of over 3,000 post-secondary institutions in order to help counsel the student with regard to educational opportunities and sources of financial aid; second, to obtain standard descriptive data for baseline purposes; and third, to obtain initial information to be utilized in a longitudinal research program designed to answer substantive and policy questions. Thus, the form includes items designed to provide information about student background characteristics, high school experiences and achievements, future goals, aspirations, and attitudes.

A copy of the Student Application Form completed by these youth appears in Appendix A, along with a portion of the Student Manual which is used by the student to complete the application. Several items from the Form have been recoded prior to presenta-

tion in this report. The original item alternatives and the arbitrary coding scheme used to report the data for region, parents' occupation, extra-curricular activities, probable major field, and career choice appear in Appendix B.

THE COHORTS OF 1971 AND 1972

The 1971 cohort includes 41,620 Black youth who were attending high schools throughout the country. These students participated in the NSSFNS Advisory and Referral Service through the cooperation of guidance counselors from approximately 7,000 high schools.

A grant from the Office of Education in 1972 expanded the range of students counseled by NSSFNS. The NSSFNS National Demonstration Upward Bound Project assists Upward Bound and Talent Search Project Directors throughout the country in gaining access to post-secondary educational opportunities for their students. Consequently, the 1972 cohort includes members of minority groups other than Black. Approximately three percent of the 1972 cohort are from minority backgrounds other than Black.

THE REPORT

On the following pages, we present a national profile of minority youth. The data tables are organized into five sections, each section consisting of eight pages. The five sections display the data by sex, gross family income, head of household, region of residence, and number of dependents in the family. Each table shows the item stem and the percentage of students in each cohort that responded to the listed alternatives. Statistical tests of significance are not included in this report as our major purpose in presenting these data is to make them available without regard to arbitrary distinctions of statistical import.

The number of students shown at the top of each report page are the N counts for the categories. Actual N counts for each item will vary somewhat because of nonresponse or invalid data. The data tables are presented such that the responses from the 1971 cohort appear next to the responses from the 1972 cohort. For example, the first page of data printout shows that 60.2 percent of the 1971 cohort are females, and 61.0 percent of the 1972 cohort are females.

Because the information provided in this report is extensive, we urge the reader to review both the data and the questionnaire itself together with the instructions to the student provided in the Student Manual in Appendix A. We recognize that descriptive data are subject to a wide variety of interpretations. Nevertheless, in providing these data, it is our hope that the results will aid the many individuals and organizations striving to comprehend and work with our nation's minority youth.

EXPLANATION OF DEGREES

(See question 17 on page 3 of Application.)

Technical Certificate

A technical certificate is generally awarded after successful completion of one or two years of study at a trade or technical institute or junior college.

Associate Degree (A.A., A.S., etc.)

The Associate degree is usually awarded after successful completion of two years at a junior college.

Bachelor's Degree (B.A., B.S., etc.)

The Bachelor's degree (Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, etc.) is usually awarded after successful completion of four years at a college or the undergraduate division of a university.

Master's Degree (M.A., M.S., etc.)

The Master's degree (Master of Arts, Master of Science, etc.) is usually awarded after the successful completion of one or two years of study in the graduate division of a university. Students are usually admitted to a Master's degree program only after the successful completion of four years of college or undergraduate school.

Doctorate (Ph.D., Ed.D.)

The Doctorate (Doctor of Philosophy or Doctor of Education) is usually awarded after the successful completion of at least three years of study beyond the Bachelor's degree, including any course work applied toward the Master's degree, and one year of research for the dissertation. Periods of full-time attendance are often expected for the Ph.D. and less commonly for the "professional" doctorate such as the Ed.D.

M.D., D.D.S., or D.V.M.

The M.D. degree (Doctor of Medicine) is usually awarded after the successful completion of four years of medical school. Students desiring to become physicians (or "doctors") are admitted to medical school only after receiving the Bachelor's degree.

The D.D.S. (Doctor of Dental Surgery) is usually awarded after successful completion of three years of dental school. Students desiring to become dental surgeons (or "dentists") are admitted to dental school after successful completion of two to four years of college.

The D.V.M. (Doctor of Veterinary Medicine) is awarded after successful completion of four years of veterinary school. Students desiring to become doctors of veterinary medicine are usually admitted to veterinary school after completion of two to four years of college.

J.D.

The J.D. Degree (Doctor of Jurisprudence) is awarded after successful completion of three years of law school. Students must hold a B.A. or B.S. in order to be admitted to law school.

B.D.

The B.D. (Bachelor of Divinity) may be awarded after successful completion of a course of study leading to the ministry or priesthood. Students desiring to become clergymen or receive the B.D. degree are advised to consult clergymen of the appropriate religion regarding academic preparation.

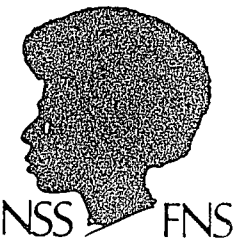
