ABSTRACT

The Wisconsin Division for Library Services is responsible for the administration of federal programs for school and public libraries and for the supervision, improvement, and coordination of public, school, academic, and special libraries. The division's report presents both narrative and statistical descriptions of the status of all types of libraries in the state. The services and resources of the state library network are described. There are directories of libraries both by type and by county, and information on regional and public library systems, library and media organizations, and library education. (LS)

CHAPTER 1 WISCONSIN LIBRARY NETWORK Division for Library Services

The Division for Library Services, which is a major division in the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, is responsible for supervision, improvement and coordination of public, school, college and special libraries. It also administers federal ESEA Title II programs for school libraries and the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) for public libraries.

Two major improvements for local Wisconsin library services were authorized by the 1971-73 budget:

- a. The commencement of state aids for public library systems.
- b. The opening of a major library resource to all Wisconsin readers.

In addition to budget actions, the biennium brought further developments:

- c. A policy that every student in the state, K-12, should have the services of a centralized Instructional Materials Center (IMC) provided as a part of a basic educational program.
- d. Revision of the state's library law (Ch. 43, Wisconsin Statutes) included statutory means for Wisconsin's libraries to plan for an eventual statewide network of library resources able to be summoned by an individual reader through a network of library delivery systems.
- e. Negotiations began with the Department of Health and Social Services to establish planning and development programs in that department for library services in all state institutions.

The purpose of state aids for public library systems is to bring public library services to residents currently without such service, and to strengthen existing services by working through municipal public libraries within each system. Four systems were approved for payment of aids in 1973. A total of \$818,000 was paid, in accordance with a population/area/library expenditure formula, to an 8-county system in northwest Wisconsin, a 9-county system in north central Wisconsin, a 4-county system in west central Wisconsin, and to the Milwaukee County library system.

In the Milwaukee and LaCrosse (West-Central) systems, participating libraries are expanding their collections of books, periodicals and audiovisual materials through "charge account" ability at the system center. For the other two systems, direct money payments from the system center provide for improvement of materials collections. In addition, all four systems are using aid money to reinforce such activities as bookmobile services, reference services, interlibrary loan, and reciprocal borrowing privileges.

For many years, a "hard core" of almost a quarter million Wisconsin citizens had no legal access to a public library. Library service to them, by statute, was provided as one of the functions of the State Reference and Loan Library. However, this library, at Madison, was geographically remote. Services to the unserved can now begin to stand at system center or sub-center libraries closer to the patron.

By contract with the Library Division, the Milwaukee Public Library is now making its materials and services available statewide upon proper request. The 2 1/4 million-volume collection of the Milwaukee Library, along with full staff services, enabled the Reference and Loan Library to fill approximately 66.7% of its requests for service from other libraries throughout the state. Without the Milwaukee contract, the average would have declined to at least 50% before 1973. The state budget for 1973-75 includes money for a similar contract between the Library Division and the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus libraries through Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service (WILS).

Increasing emphasis on student responsibility for learning and the use by teachers of a variety of materials in teaching have provided major impetus for the development of centralized instructional materials centers (IMC's) in public schools. Another important stimulus has been the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title II which since 1965 has provided over \$12 million to purchase print and audiovisual materials for public and nonpublic schools in the state. This, plus the instructional materials and audiovisual equipment provided schools since 1958 through the National Defense Education Act, Title III, has been instrumental in demonstrating the contribution of good library/media programs to learning. The Department of Public Instruction has advocated that every student in the state, K-12, should have the services of a centralized IMC provided as part of a basic educational pagram.

Wisconsin school library collections are approaching a level of adequacy, but most are inadequate in the area of audiovisual materials. Improvements are needed in staff, facilities and student access to materials and equipment for listening and viewing. To achieve this progress, it is essential that schools plan for needed program improvements and that they tie into resources which exist outside the school.

The public library system legislation will tie together statewide resources. School personnel must become knowledgeable of this program and determine where the schools fit in the 'network' picture.

There are approximately 337 public libraries, 79 academic, 300 special and more than 2,500 public and nonpublic school libraries in Wisconsin. A formal program of interlibrary cooperation began in 1967, funded under Title III of the federal LSCA. The ultimate goal is a framework of

cooperation so that all the resources and librarian competencies of these libraries will be accessible to all the state's citizens through their local library.

Recognizable progress in the biennium was early planning meetings among the directors of many of these libraries, establishment of interloan councils, and continuing development of operative interlibrary service organizations. Two such groups now exist—the Northeast Wisconsin Intertype Librarie. Inc., and the Madison Area Library Council. Products so far are area bibliographic compilations and library directories for staff use. A new intertype group in the Milwaukee area, Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee, was organized in 1973.

The Division for Library Services is advised by two statewide councils. The Council on Public Library Certifi-

cates and Standards advises the Division on the development of standards for public libraries and for certification of public librarians.

The Council on Library Development advises the State Superintendent with regard to the general policies and activities of the state's programs for library development and interlibrary coordination. It serves as the advisory committee required under the federal LSCA to review long-range plans for library service. Membership on the Council includes persons broadly representative of public, academic, school and special libraries and library users. The council appointed a Task Force on Library Education and Manpower early in 1974 to implement its objectives of evaluating library personnel requirements in Wisconsin and making recommendations of library education programs.

WISCONSIN LIBRARY NETWORK Major State Level Resources

Bureau for Reference and Loan Services

1973 was a critical year for the Bureau for Reference and Loan Services of the Division for Library Services. Though its financial support from state government was better than it had been in many years, the impoundment and threatened curtailment of Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) funds had a dampening effect on program activity. Since federal funds are used primarily for personnel, all aspects of library operation faced serious cutting.

Nevertheless, some significant program development was possible. Services to state institutions continued to receive special emphasis. Reader-guidance programs for inmates were extensively revised and increased efforts made to coordinate services with the institution librarians.

The new fiscal year brought a new aspect to the traditional relationship between the Division for Library Services and the University of Wisconsin—Madison campus libraries. By contract with the University, the Division became a participant in the Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service (WILS), an interloan network serving the major academic libraries of the state.

The WILS contract and the similar contract with Milwaukee Public Library provided formal assurance that library patrons throughout Wisconsin have access to the major library resources of the state. Contract arrangement with Manitewoc County Library extended Mailbox Library Service to any individual in the state who did not have local or county library facilities available.

The 8-year project to reclassify the library collection was completed at the end of 1972, providing adequate opportunity in 1973 to reorganize the Technical Services unit and revise work methods. Bibliographic information and indexing in cartridged microfilms was adopted and refinements made in the use of the magnetic tape typewriter.

Among new materials available from the library were U-Matic videocassettes, a new collection of sound tape cassettes, and a collection of sample UNIPAC materials for use by schools throughout the country.

Motion picture film maintenance service was incorporated as a regular library activity of the Wisconsin Film Library Circuit collection was among the first to be serviced.

A project to produce a comprehensive bibliography of Wisconsin authors was begun in mid-year, and should be completed by 1975.

More than 16,06J Wisconsin public documents were packaged and distributed to 54 document depository libraries during the year, and plans were developed to restructure the whole document depository system.

The Department of Public Instruction Professional Library added several major resources to its collection in 1973, including a monthly subscription to the education section of NewsBank (a national newsclipping service on microfiche) and six Center for Humanities sound-slide sets. It started a collection of education cassettes.

State (Law) Library

The State (Law) Library was established by the congressional act of 1836 which created the Wisconsin territory. The purpose of the library was to supply books for the Supreme Court and the Legislature. Originally the Library also contained miscellaneous and nonlegal material, but since about 1866 its holdings have been limited to legal material.

The Library is administered by a board of trustees which is composed of the justices of the Supreme Court and the Attorney General. The board establishes all policies and appoints the librarian and other personnel.

The Library functions strictly as a reference library and does not circulate books. The legal research facilities which it provides are available to the Supreme Court, other courts, the Legislature, state departments, members of the Bar and the public.

The holdings of the State (Law) Library, comprising 130,000-135,000 volumes, consist of:

- a. Court reports, digests and statutory material. The coverage is fairly complete for almost all common law jurisdictions of the world. Considerable holdings of administrative rules and regulations are available also.
- b. Legal and bar periodicals-850 titles, of which 475 are current.
- c. Legal treatises and encyclopedias.
- d. Appeal papers.

The Library is staffed by the State (Law) Librarian, Marcia Koslov; the Deputy Librarian, Dennis Austin; a cataloger; an administrative assistant and a part-time law student. William Knudson, the State (Law) Librarian since 1969, retired in March, 1974.

The budget for the State (Law) Library for 1974-75 is \$106,000.

Legislative Reference Bureau

In 1901 the Legislature authorized the Wisconsin Free Library Commission to "maintain in the state capitol, for the use and information of the legislature, the several state departments, and such other citizens as may desire to consult the same, a working library, as complete as may be, of the several public documents of this and other states; and to purchase for said library standard works of use and references." This authorization represented the first organized effort to provide a state legislature with trained help. As a pioneer, it has served as the primary model for the establishment of similar agencies in other states.

Although it is still primarily a legislative service agency, the statutes direct the Legislative Reference Bureau to also serve state departments, students of government and citizens generally. Thus, the Bureau provides a great variety of information on all aspects of state and local government to everyone who needs such assistance. The Bureau's facilities are available on a factual, nonpartisan basis.

In the years following the Legislative Reference Bureau's inception, its duties became more extensive. The Legislative Reference Bureau is a reference and research organization and a bill drafting organization. Its services include responding to questions on legislation and other aspects of government, preparing information reports on governmental problems, publishing the biennial Wisconsin Blue Book, and drafting or processing all measures introduced in the Wisconsin Legislature. In 1972-73 the Legislative Reference Bureau had 6,000 bill drafting requests and over



15,000 reference requests. The budget for the current biennium for the Bureau is over \$1,000,000.

The Legislative Reference Bureau has a staff of 30 permanent, 2 project and 3.25 sessional positions. It is organized into 3 sections: the reference and research staff (comprised of research analysts and librarians), the bill drafting staff (legislative at orneys), and the administrative staff which provides the clerical and "housekeeping" services for the other 2 groups.

The Legislative Reference Bureau's circulating collection contains material with an emphasis on state and local government, but it also includes a broad range of subjects in the social sciences which have a direct bearing upon the operation of state and local government. Since currency is a basic consideration, it contains a preponderance of ephemeral materials.

The Legislative Reference Bureau has a vast clipping collection of over 1,000,000 clippings to which 20,000 items were added in 1972-73. Extracted from newspapers and periodicals, these clippings provide current and precise information that is usually not yet available from other sources.

The Wisconsin Free Library Commission was the governing body of the Legislative Reference Library until August 1, 1963. At this time the Legislative Reference Library was transferred to the legislative branch of the government as the Legislative Reference Bureau.

The present chief of the Legislative Reference Bureau is H. Rupert Theobald. Patricia Robbins is Director of Reference and Library. Mina Ellingson is editor of "Subject and Author Index to Legislative Journals of the Wisconsin Legislature."

Wisconsin Regional Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped

In 1961 state legislation enabled the establishment of a Wisconsin Regional Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped in the Milwaukee Public Library, under a contract administered by the Department of Public Welfare (now the Department of Health and Social Services). The Regional Library was established as an extension of the Library of Congress, Division for the Blind and Physically Handicapped.

In 1970, responsibility for the contract with the Milwaukee Public Library to administer the Regional Library was transferred to the Division for Library Services.

The Regional Library receives talking books and machines, cassettes and cassette machines, and braille machines from

the Library of Congress. The state contract provides funds for staff and operating costs. The Milwaukee Public Library houses and administers the Regional Library and provides its large-print book collection for circulation. It is important to note that the reading materials supplied by the Library of Congress do not adequately fill the needs of readers. Specialized and local interest materials must be supplied from state or donated funds.

Wisconsin has approximately 44,200 individuals who, because of temporary or permanent visual or physical disabilities, are unable to read ordinary print comfortably, and thus require and are eligible for the Regional Library's specialized library materials.

Services and resources of the Regional Library have steadily expanded. In the last 5 years the library has shown an average yearly increase in readers of 13 percent.

The 1973 Annual Report of the Regional Library reveals that there are 6,272 readers registered for services in the following categories:

Some readers are users of more than one form of material and are counted twice. The actual number of persons registered, therefore, is about 5,000. The service of the Regional Library is extended also to 516 agencies, as follows:

The Library of Congress, Division for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, multiplies each institution by 10 to determine total readership. In this calculation, the total readership of the Regional Library would be 11,432. The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Health and Social Services, provides information on potential eligible readers to the Regional Library, and helps to inform those eligible readers of available services. Several public libraries have developed noteworthy service programs, usually in cooperation with the Regional Library. Numerous agencies, volunteers and volunteer groups have made valuable contributions.

In 1973 a study of the individuals served by the Regional Library was designed and carried out by the Division for Library Services. Characteristics of the users that were



studied were: age, sex, education, location, and type of disability. (For a report on this study, see *Wisconsin Library Bulletin*, Sept./Oct. 1973.)

A second major library resource for the blind and physically handicapped in Wisconsin is the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped in Janesville, which serves not only its resident student population but also many eligible users throughout the state with school-related materials. The school is administered by the Division for Handicapped Children, Department of Public Instruction. The school receives one copy of each appropriate talking and braille book through the Regional Library from the Library of Congress. A Professional Services Center has been established at the school with these functions:

- a. York with Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped teachers in preparation of materials: videotape, audiotape, compressed speech, games and other aids, print (Bruning copier), laminating, and braille.
- b. Provisions of a retrieval system of materials for local public school systems.
- c. Provision of an inventory to clarify what materials are available and where they are located.

Centers for visually handicapped students are being established at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, and contemplated at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay.

The Volunteer Services Center, located in the Milwaukee Public Library, is the only centralized transcription agency for blind and partially-sighted individuals in Wisconsin. It began in October, 1965 with 11 volunteers; today, over 250 men and women volunteer their time to help in its programs. They transcribe materials in three media: braille, enlarged type and tape records. Materials vary from cookbooks to the Greek classics to children's "picture" books (with cats and mittens the child can feel). The books are not only transcribed, but illustrated and bound at the Center. These services are available to any eligible person in the state. The Center operates entirely on donated services and funds.

In 1973 the Division for Library Services evaluated the programs of service to the handicapped of the Madison Public Library and Dane County Library Service. Personalized service is extended to 86 homebound persons through the efforts of library staff and volunteers. A Low Vision Reading Center is established in Madison Public Library, and volunteer braillists use space provided in the Monroe Branch Library. Three hundred forty-three

Madison residents and 110 Dane County residents are registered with the Regional Library. Work with 109 community organizations and agencies was documented, as well as service contacts with 11 nursing homes, 9 senior citizen groups and 2 hospitals. Evaluations of service to handicapped persons are contemplated for several other public libraries in 1974.

The State Historical Society of Wisconsin

The Library Division is one of the 8 major divisions of the State Historical Society. It is responsible for organizing and making available the volumes and pamphlets which constitute the historical collection. Charles Shetler is the Chief Librarian.

In 1973 the Library staff continued with its reclassification project. By recataloging the collection from an outmoded 4-digit Cutter system to the modern Library of Congress system, the Library is making its system compatible with modern technological advances for computer control and information retrieval.

In addition to acquiring and processing new materials in the areas of American and Canadian history, state and local history, and genealogy, this was a landmark year in the conversion to microtalm of important parts of the retrospective collections for preservation and for making these materials more widely available. The library added 32,398 items to the collections, including:

6,233 bound volumes

2,688 pamphlets

3,555 government documents

7,365 rolls of microfilm

12,557 units of sheet microtext

It has a total of 3,574 periodical titles and over 300,000 volumes. The newspaper staff attempts to get copies of all Wisconsin newspapers currently published and to film those titles which are not available commercially on film. It also receives 26 U.S. national papers on film. This collection was strengthened during the year by the purchase of the Louisville Courier-Journal microfilm for the year 1915-40 which completed film holdings of this title. The Library continued to acquire about 100 titles of Negro and Indian newspapers. Holdings of U.S. city directories on microform were brought down to 1881, and during the year holdings of federal census population schedules on microfilm were completed for all states east of the Mississippi through 1870.

Several microfilm projects were completed. All of the Library's volumes of pulp paper stock Wisconsin newspapers have been filmed, and work is continuing on the filming of the Wisconsin volumes on rag paper. Another



disintegrating research tool, the 55 volumes of Wisconsin necrology, housed in scrapbooks on poor paper, were microfilmed for preservation. These volumes, covering the period 1846-1955, contain manuscript notes and letters in the early years and newspaper clippings in the later years covering obituary notices of Wisconsin citizens who have contributed in some significant way to the history of the state. All of our 19th-century Wisconsin county histories and atlases were microfilmed by a commerical company, thus preserving the text of this important body of materials and making the volumes available in a block to other institutions. Finally, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints made the library a depository for the index on microfilm to the several million reels of microfilmed genealogical sources that have been collected at Salt Lake City, Utah.

The Library contributed to two bibliographies that are being compiled for publication on a national basis. Entries for holdings on Methodism were supplied to the Drew University Methodist bibliography project, and the holdings in Wisconsin of printed national newspaper indexes, along with the location of locally prepared unpublished indexes and clipping files in existence in newspaper offices, libraries, and historical societies were surveyed.

in fall of 1973 the Library had 28 employees in FTE. Of these, 7 held less than a bachelor's degree, 10 held a bachelor's degree, 10 held a master's degree in library science, and 1 employee held a fifth-year or higher degree in a field other than library science.

The Cooperative Children's Book Center

The Cooperative Children's Book Center, which is located at Helen C. White Hall on the University of Wisconsin—Madison campus, is a project of two state agencies: The Department of Public Instruction and the University of Wisconsin. The Division for Library Services of the Department of Public Instruction and the Library School and the School of Education of the University of Wisconsin all participate in the policy making, promotion, use and support of the Center. The Center started in 1963. It has only a few counterparts in the country.

Broadly stated, the main objective of the Center is to provide a non-circulating children's book center where individuals and groups may examine, read and evaluate children's and young people's books. (The Center defines children's books generally as those c^c interest to individuals under 14 years of age.)

The Center develops bibliographies upon request and produces a checklist cai d "Materials for Distribution," which is revised regularly and sent upon request. The

Center publishes the CCBC Circular several times a year. This contains news about the Center and the world of children's literature. The Circular has a mailing list of approximately 1,800 public libraries and branches, elementary and junior high school librarians, children's book editors, and publishers' library promotion personnel. The Center schedules the use of the traveling exhibits of children's books at Reference and Loan Library for the libraries of the state. Requests can be sent to the Center.

Six collections of books are available:

- a. CURRENT-trade and reference titles of the last 18 months
- b. BASIC -- a core collection of significant titles
- c. EXHIBITS-such as Newbery, Caldecott, and Lewis Carroll Awards
- d. HISTORICAL—a collection of 19th and early 20th century titles that is being assembled from gifts and special purchases
- e. BIBLIOGRAPHICAL-aids in book selection and evaluation
- f. CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT-recommended titles

Approximately 15,500 volumes are owned by the Center. In addition to providing the above book collections, the Center also provides a sampling of audiovisual materials of particular significance in children's literature.

A survey of walk-in use of CCBC from January 29-February 10, 1973 revealed that 550 persons made use of the Center. Although the preponderance of patrons was from the University community, there was also a variety of general adult patrons, including a children's author, browsers, nurses, and collectors of historical books as well as teachers and school and public librarians.

In 1973 the Center was visited by many groups including: University of Wisconsin Library School classes; two classes of intern teachers which examined materials on North American Indians; teaching of reading classes; children's literature class from Edgewood College; students from the Library Technical Assistant Program at Gateway Technical Institute; school librarians from Wauwatosa and Racine; publishers' representatives; and a publisher from Taiwan who was interested in the current output of children's trade books.

In addition to the Center's publication, the Circular, there were articles on the Center in Channel DLS, the MALC



Informer. Library School Jottings and the Wisconsin Library Bulletin ("Happy Birthday to the CCBC", May/June, 1973).

In 1973 a slide-sound presentation on the Center was completed.

The Center is staffed by Mary Carr, librarian, a stenographer and several part-time project assistants (usually students of the University of Wisconsin School of Education or Library School).

The budget for the Center for 1972-73 from Division for Library Services, University of Wisconsin Library School and University of Wisconsin School of Education was \$35,362, of which \$33,062 was to be spent for salaries and \$2,300 for materials, services and capital outlay.

The Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction

The Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction of the University of Wisconsin-Extension maintains one of the largest film libraries in the country. It currently has 7,800 films on a wide variety of subjects.

The Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction films are available to every Wisconsin film user, except where admission charges are made. Schools, organizations, industries and individuals use the films. Where booking openings permit, films are sent to bordering states. Films produced by the University of Wisconsin-Extension will be sent anywhere. The Bureau of Audic-Visual Instruction films are listed in Catalog of Education 16MM Motion Pictures 1972 and its January 1974 supplement.

In addition to having a film rental library, the Bureau offers a variety of other services. On the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus it provides graphic arts services, consultant services, projection equipment and operators, tape duplication equipment and other audio-visual services. The Bureau faculty are available for extension teaching of credit classes in the use of educational communication media. And, the Bureau personnel are available to schools and other groups throughout the state for demonstrations and instruction in the selection, utilization and evaluation of educational and munication media of all types (i.e., for noncredit extension workshops and institutes).

The Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction is located at 1327 University Avenue, Madison. Dr. Hal Riehle is the new director of BAVI. He replaced Dr. Frederick White who retired in 1973 after a number of years with BAVI.

Milwaukee Public Library

The Milwaukee Public Library is the state's largest public library. It has a collection of over 2.2 million volumes and had an operating budget of over 6.5 million dollars in 1973.

The Milwaukee Public Library had a staff of 413 persons in FTE in 1972. Of these employees, 24% held a master's degree in library science, 1% held a master's degree or higher in a field other than library science, 13% held a bachelor's degree and 62% held less than a bachelor's degree. Of the 1,722 total employees in the 337 public libraries in the state in 1972, Milwaukee Public Library employed 24%. Milwaukee Public Library also employed 33% of the public librarians in the state with a 5th-year degree in library science.

The Milwaukee Public Library has 12 branches, 4 book-mobiles and 2 mobile vans. It is now the headquarters for the Milwaukee County Federated Library System. Seven libraries participate in the System.

In 1973 the Milwaukee Public Library loaned 3,557,199 items directly to library patrons. It loaned 5,025 items to libraries in the System and 8,269 items to libraries not in the System. It borrowed 346 items from other libraries.

University of Wisconsin-Madison Libraries

The University of Wisconsin-Madison Memorial Library is the state's largest academic library. It has over 2.6 million volumes in its collection and had an operating budget of over 4.6 million dollars in 1972-73.

The University of Wisconsin-Madison Memorial Library had a staff of 289.5 in FTE in fall 1973. Of these employees, 36% held a master's degree in library science, 5% held a 5th-year or higher degree in a field other than library science, 20% held a bachelor's degree, and 39% held less than a bachelor's degree.

Enrollment on the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus for 1973 included 25,180 undergraduate students and 10,751 graduate students.

There are over 60 libraries and information centers on the University of Wisconsin—Madison campus. These range from large resource libraries such as the Medical Library, the Engineering Library, the Art Library and the Agricultural and Life Science Library to smaller specialized libraries such as the Map and Air Photo Library which has worldwide coverage of topographic, thematic and general maps and aerial photographs.



Division For Library Services/Milwaukee Public Library Contract

The Division for Library Services began contracting with the Milwaukee Public Library, the state's largest public library, in 1967. The purpose of the contract between the Division for Library Services and the Milwaukee Public Library is to augment the ability of the Division's Reference and Loan Library to serve the needs of its statewide clientele.

Milwaukee Public Library received \$75,000 from the Division for Library Services in 1972-73 to provide statewide access to Milwaukee Public Library services and resources. In 1973 the Reference and Loan Library submitted 13,639 interloan requests to the Milwaukee Public Library.

Division for Library Services/University of Wisconsin-Madison Contract

The Division for Library Services has an interloan contract with the University of Wisconsin-Madison Memorial Library. This contract, similar to the Milwaukee interloan contract, is to expand and complement the service capability of the Division's Reference and Loan Library.

The contracts with the Milwaukee Public Library and the University of Wisconsin-Madison permit the Reference and Loan Library to tap the resources of the two largest libraries in the state for requests that come to reference and loan from the libraries in the state.

In September 1973 Reference and Loan received more than 5,000 requests for service. It was able to handle 3,500 of these requests from its own collection and staff at Darbo Drive. The Milwaukee Public Library received 900 of the requests. The remaining 600 were received by the University of Wisconsin-Madison library. In 1973 Reference and Loan Library submitted 7,531 interloan requests to the University of Wisconsin-Madison library.

The contract for services is not directly with the University of Wisconsin-Madison. The University of Wisconsin-Madison library system makes its library services and resources available by means of Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service (WILS). WILS is the designated agent for the University of Wisconsin-Madison for interloan activity. It was established by the Council of Wisconsin Librarians (COWL).

The budget for the 1973.75 biennium provides \$125,000 for the WILS/Division for Library Services contract.

Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service

The Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service (WILS) was established at the University of Wisconsin—Madison Memorial Library in the fall of 1972 by the Council of Wisconsin Librarians, Inc. (COWL) through a contract with the University of Wisconsin—Madison to provide access to Madison campus library collections and share resources among Wisconsin's public and private academic institutions of higher education. WILS was located on the Madison campus in recognition of the unique and extensive library resources available and, as such, is engaged in loan of books and photocopy of periodical articles from Madison campus libraries, including the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

The WILS office has been funded since its inception by the 46 participating academic libraries which have contributed a percentage of their annual library book budgets with some modification based on the use of the service.

A Division for Library Services request for state funding of a resource contract with the University of Wisconsin-Madison for service through WILS for the 1973-75 biennium for \$125,000 has been accepted. These funds provide base support to the WILS operation, which has undertaken direct responsibility for backing services to the clientele served by the Peference and Loan Library from material available in the University of Wisconsin-Madison Campus Library System. With service to the academic libraries and the clientele served by Reference and Loan Library, WILS is providing a viable service to the majority of the citizens in Wisconsin.

The purpose of WILS is to provide maximum and equitable multiple use of Wisconsin library resources with a minimum of effort and without conflict of interest. In times of cost escalation, insatiable user demands, uncertain funding, and the literature/information explosion, cooperative use and planning are essential in order to make judicious use of available funding and library resources. A program such as WILS helps in this by supplementing local resources and enabling libraries to provide the necessary service to meet the needs of faculty, students and citizens of the state of Wisconsin which they could not offer independently.

The service provided by WILS includes expanded and expedited interlibrary loan. Patrons who have information needs that cannot be met by their own library are assisted by having their requests transmitted via TWX (teletype) or mail to the WILS office. Program personnel search, locate and retrieve the material from any of 17 libraries on the Madison campus, charge out or photocopy the material in



the host library, and return it to the WILS office where it is prepared for mailing, usually within 48 hours of the receipt of the request.

WILS has initiated an interface with MINITEX (Minnesota Interlibrary Teletype Exchange) which provides access to major additional resources for all members of both networks. WILS has a pilot project underway with the Medical-Dental Library of the Medical College of Wisconsin to provide materials on a reciprocal basis. Access to the National Medical Library Network is in the planning stages.


During the 1972-73 fiscal year (7 months of operation), WILS processed 18,237 requests with a 78% success rate. During 1973-74, the level of processed requests will exceed 45,000, while at the same time the "fill" rate has reached 82%. The majority of WILS requests from the academic libraries (72%) are for photocopy of journal articles. Public Library statistics reveal a reverse ratio with loan of books totaling 70%.

Less than 2% of the books loaned through WILS have been recalled for Madison campus patrons. Over 300,000 photo-duplication exposures have been made since WILS began operation.

WILS started out with 6 employees—2 full-time and 4 student assistants. It now has a staff of 17-3 full-time staff members and 14 student assistants. Of the student assistants, 12 work 20 or more hours a week and 2 students work 10-15 hours per week.

Cooperative Library Information Program

The Cooperative Library Information Program (CLIP) was started by the Division for Library Services in April, 1970, as a project under Title III of the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA). It grev out of the recognition of the importance of public communication for Wisconsin libraries of all types—public, school, academic and special—and the belief that the exchange and development of good public relations ideas and materials would benefit and assist all libraries. The program was initiated with a part-time director, Marian S. Edsall, with the assistance of an advisory committee composed of librarians representing all types of libraries and from various areas of the state.

The following activities have been part of the CLIP program during the 1970-74 period:

- a. A bimonthly newsletter, *Tips from CLIP*. This publication serves as a medium of exchange of information, ideas and materials, and currently is sent free to all Wisconsin libraries and to friends, trustees and others requesting it, as well as out of state for a small fee. Circulation: 3,500.
- b. Production of promotional materials. Those materials which can be produced more economically in large quantities have been made available for local use, including: posters, bookmarks, brochures, bumper stickers, counter cards, book list covers, plastic book bags, etc.
- c. Statewide Children's Summer Reading Program. An annual theme, related materials, and a program manual have been developed for purchase at cost by all Wisconsin libraries wishing to participate.
- d. Workshops. CLIP has sponsored or participated in numerous workshops.
- e. Statewide media coverage. Television and radio spots, promoting libraries and library use, have been distributed, taped radio programs made available, and newspaper releases sent out.
- f. Circulating library exhibits. Three circulating exhibits have been made available to libraries for display.
- g. Assistance to other agencies. CLIP has assisted with National Library Week promotion and other Wisconsin Library Association sponsored activities; served as a resource to UW EX and others for conferences, ETN programs and classes; consultation by mail, phone, or in-person has been available on a very limited basis.



- h. Cooperation and exchange with regional and state library agencies outside Wisconsin. The state program has been enriched and augmented through contact with many others outside Wisconsin.
- i. Miscellaneous. Statewide library contests have been conducted, a library logo developed for general use, packets of sample materials prepared for circulation.

The Cooperative Library Information Program has generated a greater awareness of the need for good public relations on the part of all libraries and the importance of promotion and publicity as part of a library's total service program by offering advice and practical suggestions for such activities and providing some tools to aid librarians at the local and state levels.

Educational Television and Radio and Cable Television

Wisconsin agnaled the expansion of its educational television system into a statewide network in September 1972 with the activation of WPNE, Channel 38, Green Bay. WPNE joined WMVS, Milwaukee, and WHA, Madison, in the effort to bring instruction and enrichment to pupils and adults throughout the state.

Autumn of 1973 saw two additional television towers rising near LaCrosse and Menomonie with one area, north central Wisconsin, remaining to be served. Dissension over the use of a transmitting antenna on Rib Mountain, Wausau, still awaits a decision by the Federal Communications system. Meanwhile, airtime is purchased from a commercial television station to bring more than half of the network's programming to that area.

The state's pioneer radio network continues to program daily to schools and homes as it has done since 1919. Currently the television network offers more than 50 courses to public and private school pupils and university students, while radio waves carry an additional 20.

The unique organizational pattern for telecommunications management finds the direction of the Educational Communications Board augmented by six Regional Broadcast Instruction Councils. Each is based in a Cooperative Education Service Agency located near a transmitter, and each has representation from all sectors of education, including the Department of Public Instruction.

This pattern provides local/regional input into program selection and evaluation, the fostering of good utilization practices, and the distribution of supportive materials. "Friends of Broadcasting" groups of adults operate in the various areas to help with the determination of night-time broadcasting to homes. For the first time, summer school

students this year will experience a partial diet of airborne learning experiences.

Cable television continues to attract Wisconsin educators as it demonstrates means of positive signal reception and possibilities for local interconnects and regional networking. In a statewide survey, 41 school districts reported having connections to local cable systems, but only a few are used systematically for instructional purposes. A task force in Trempealeau County is exploring possibilities of county-wide networking, and another network scheme for the Fox Valley has been examined. The Wisconsin Legislature has not yet taken action on its Bill 635 which would regulate CATV in the state.

Looking ahead, a Department of Public Instruction booklet Airlift for Learning suggests possible future developments: "Down the road could come slow-scan video images delivered via radio, new ventures in multi-track transmission, after-hours telecasts recorded and stored automatically by school equipment, and data delivered to schools."

Northeast Wisconsin Intertype Libraries

Northeast Wisconsin Intertype Libraries (NEWIL) was started in 1967 at the urging of the directors of Brown County Library, and the University of Wisconsin—Green Bay, St. Norbert College and Lawrence University libraries.

Its present membership includes libraries in 7 counties in northeast Wisconsin: Brown, Door, Kewaunee, Manitowoc, Marinette, Oconto and Outagamie. Types of libraries cooperating in NEWIL are: 2-year and 4-year public and private colleges and universities, a vocational school, public and private high schools, and public libraries.

Loan of materials is a major reason for the existence of NEWIL. To facilitate cooperation NEWIL published in 1968 a Union List of Periodical Holdings. This list, updated and printed in January of each year since 1968, affords each member library a quick identification of periodical holdings of the entire group. Copies of articles from periodicals are sent free of charge among NEWIL libraries; books and audiovisual materials are also loaned at no charge to patrons.

A second major cooperative effort of the NEWIL organization culminated in September 1971 in a 450-page *Instructional Media Catalog* (IMCAT). This is a listing of the audiovisual materials (slides, films, tapes, records, etc.) located in the NEWIL libraries and their media centers. A first supplement to the IMCAT was published in January 1973. It provided an additional listing of audiovisual materials in 500 pages.



According to the NEWIL annual report, 1972-73 was a year of "continuing projects already undertaken and of decision making as to which of these NEWIL can continue in the face of static or reduced library budgets and the termination of initial Federal funding." A careful reassessment of constituency and geographical boundaries and priorities was made. No new projects involving extensive financial commitments were undertaken.

The report shows that NEWIL was active in several areas in 1972-73:

- a. Prompted by a censorship attempt in a member library, NEWIL drafted a resolution on censorship and appointed a censorship committee. Generally, the committee is limited to fact finding, reporting to the NEWIL Board, and offering advice and information to any librarian requesting it.
- b. Many transfers were effected by the Materials Exchange Committee of material useful to a member institution that has little or no value to its original owner. Other facilities are shared without actually transferring material: the University of Wisconsin—Green Bay makes its microfilm copy of the University of Wisconsin—Madison catalog available to all members; area facilities, such as those for serving the blind, have been made known to all librarians through NEWIL contacts.
- c. The continuation of the Union List of Periodicals is assured for the foreseeable future by its being combined with the University of Wisconsin—Green Bay periodicals list and by having the work done at the University of Wisconsin—Green Bay at rates well below those of a commercial service. Future funding of the IMCAT supplement is not as secure.
- d. A major problem that was not solved was how to move materials between members quickly and economically. A Communications Committee currently is working on this problem.
- e. NEWIL members spent a great deal of time planning arrangements for the Wisconsin Library Association Annual Conference held in Green Bay in October 1973. This was the first WLA Conference to be sponsored by an intertype library group.
- f. NEWIL sponsored a day-long conference for area library supportive staff who rarely attend NEWIL meetings.
- g. NEWIL designated University of Wisconsin-Green Bay as a repository for NEWIL archives, protested federal cuts in library funding to the Wisconsin Congressional

delegation, and became a member of the Association of Cooperative Library Organizations.

Ruth Ann Voelz, Librarian, Northeast Wisconsin Technical Institute, is the current president of NEWIL.

The Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee

The Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee, Inc. (LCOMM) is an intertype library organization in 4 neighboring counties in southeastern Wisconsin: Milwaukee, Washington, Waukesha and Ozaukee. Its constitution and bylaws were adopted on January 17, 1973, after a year of organizational meetings. Its basic purpose is to stimulate and facilitate the most effective use of metropolitan Milwaukee library and information center resource and services.

LCOMM published a bimonthly newsletter, LCOMM News. The first issue came out in October, 1973. This publication contains information about LCOMM activities and the activities of local libraries and librarians.

LCOMM is supported by membership dues, which comprise a major part of its financial support. A sliding scale for dues was adopted based on the combined budget of participating libraries for personnel and materials. LCOMM received a small Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) Title II grant in 1973 to help organize.

LCOMM has an executive board which is elected by the regular members. The executive board manages the affairs of LCOMM and is composed of 17 representatives.

The possibility of including in LCOMM the libraries in counties outside the standard metropolitan statistical area (Milwaukee, Waukesha, Washington and Ozaukee), but within the Southeastern District (which includes also Racine, Kenosha and Walworth counties) was considered. But the problems of organizing what would amount to about half the libraries in the state seemed to dictate that a smaller beginning would be easier to accomplish. Libraries in the larger area were notified of the planned organization and they will be invited to participate when this seems feasible.

The first major project to be undertaken by LCOMM will be a directory which will include information on all the libraries in the area.

Richard Crane, Menomonee Falls Public Library, is the current president of LCOMM.



Madison Area Library Council

The Madison Area Library Council (MALC) was formed early in 1970 as a direct result of a survey of library cooperation for the Madison area by Dr. Charles A. Bunge of the University of Wisconsin Library School. The study, financed by Title III of the Library Services and Construction Act, was initiated at the request of a School-Library. Cooperation Committee of the Madison Public Schools and Public Library.

The major objectives of MALC are:

- a. To promote the most effective use of existing information resources.
- b. To improve these resources and services.
- c. To initiate new programs to meet changing needs.

Membership in MALC is open to any Dane County library or information center. Its current 90 members include the County's major libraries, as well as many of the area's important smaller institutions. Public, academic, school, and a variety of special libraries are members of MALC.

The elected Board of Directors, composed of chief administrators of 14 member libraries, is responsible for overall policy decisions. All types of libraries are represented on the Board, and the responsibility of Board membership is rotated among all members.

MALC is financed through membership dues (scaled to the size of the library or system), and the sale of publications. It has in the past received several grants from the LSCA Title III.

MALC is responsible for a number of publications. It publishes a monthly newsletter, the MALC Informer, to inform members about MALC activities and those of local libraries. It published a Newspapers Currently Received in Major Dane County Collections. In 1972 it published a Directory of Staff Members of Libraries and Information Centers in Dane County to aid communications efforts. In 1973 a revised edition of Directory of Libraries and Information Sources in Dane County came out. This publication provides detailed descriptions of the area's many and varied information resources. MALC also published a Union List of Periodicals in 1973 and a revised edition of Campus Collections at the University of Wisconsin-Madison was published in cooperation with the University of Wisconsin Memorial Library.

In 1973:

- a. MALC sponsored orientation tours of local libraries for members and several libraries were visited. MALC also sponsored a tour of a book bindery.
- b. The MALC Cable Committee was active. Both the Madison cable ordinance and state legislation reflect the work of this committee.
- c. MALC co-sponsored with the University of Wisconsin— Extension a week-long cable production seminar for area librarians. MALC also organized a workshop on automation and an evening of discussion on intellectual freedom.
- d. MALC's Library School Practice Work Committee structured a program in which 23 University of Wisconsin Library School students worked in member libraries.

Sue Center, librarian of the Criminal Justice Reference and Information Center on the University of Wisconsin—Madison campus, is the current president of MALC.

Wisconsin Information Retrieval for Education

The Educational Resource Information Center (ERIC) has reports, speeches, proceedings and other "fugitive" materials in education and education-related fields. Wisconsin Information Retrieval for Education (WIRE) is a computerized retrieval program designed to search the computer readable data base of ERIC.

The WIRE program operates in the Department of Public Instruction and has been in operation about 18 months. The program is staffed by one professional person, Roy Tally, and one clerical employee.

The primary clientele of WIRE is the Department of Public Instruction staff; elementary and secondary school districts; Cooperative Education Service Agencies in Wisconsin; public, special and academic libraries. Clients are offered individualized search services on the ERIC files of Research in Education, Current Index to Journals in Education and the vocational education abstracts created by the ERIC Clearinghouse on Vocational and Technical Education.

WIRE operates on a system of partial cost recovery. Clients outside the Department of Public Instruction staff are required to pay \$10 per search. Total usage so far is over 800 requests, roughly half of which have been paid service searches.

Computer searches of ERIC files are made possible through arrangements with the University of Wisconsin-Madison Academic Computing Center.



Information Services Division

The Information Services Division was established by the University Industry Research Program in 1965 to serve the information needs of business and industry. It was established in recognition of the fact that:

- a. The University of Wisconsin has vast collections of technical information in its libraries and information centers.
- b. Wisconsin businesses and industries need access to information and technical expertise.
- c. The Information Services Division can tap the University's resources on behalf of the business and industry community.

Recently reorganized and now under the auspices of the College of Engineering and the Sea Grant program as well as the University Industry Research Program, the Information Services Division is not intended to replace company libraries nor to compete with private information services. By drawing upon the University's scientific and technical libraries, information centers and academic expertise, the Information Services Division can provide supplemental and in-depth information which may not be locally available to business and industrial personnel.

The Information Services Division will accept an occasional ready reference or referral question from a public library if the question is routed through the Division for Library Services, Reference and Loan Library.

Professional staff is available Monday through Friday to provide advice on on-campus use of University libraries and information centers; photocopies; information on patents; research, reference and referral services; literature searches (manual and computer); library planning consultation; and, interlibrary loans. The fee schedule varies according to the service.

The Information Services Division is located at 1513 University Ave., Engineering Library, University of Wisconsin, Madison. Fran Wood is the Assistant Director.

Medical Library Network

In the health science library field effort is being made to provide a highly developed and readily usable network of information sources for Wisconsin health care team members who are increasingly in need of up-to-date and highly specialized information. Two statewide coordinators are headquartered at the Middleton Medical Library on the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus to promote this effort. They are supported by a federal grant.

The network design is that of a pyramid in which the local hospital or clinic library is backed up by a stronger area collection, then major state resource libraries, a 6-state network, and ultimately the National Library of Medicine if the user's needs go beyond even the resources of regional biomedical information centers. A concern is to arrange an effective interface of the state network with regional and national networks.

The state coordinators are involved in identifying and filling subject and geographical gaps in the network within the state. One approach they are using is the formation of consortia in which a group of libraries, organized on either a subject or geographical basis, shares the cost of improved services and/or materials. One effect of this is to encourage horizontal cooperation at the basic level of service, rather than channeling all requests for help to overloaded area resource centers.

The coordinators emphasize that they are attempting to provide only ideas and assistance in organizing, while encouraging state users and librarians to take responsibility for the rest of the planning process and finding necessary financing for improved service. A recently formed committee of state leaders in the health care professions has been charged with advising the library community of the needs of health science personnel. State health science librarians are currently organizing formally to facilitate their involvement.

Another important part of the coordinator's work is alerting potential users of these services to the great variety and depth of resources available to them. The ultimate success of the project depends on the ready availability and use of these information resources whenever and wherever they are needed.

Special Fducation Instructional Materials Centers

In recent years, as a result of great interest in the problems of special education, and also as a result of federal funds, a number of Special Education Instructional Materials Centers (SEIMC) have been established in the state. These centers are operated by Cooperative Educational Service Agencies, of which there are 19 in the state. The centers provide a variety of print and non-print materials useful in working with students who are handicapped or retarded. The centers work closely with public school teachers and children.

The centers now operating in Wisconsin are at: Merrill, Gillett, Elmwood, Chippewa Falls, Oshkosh, Onalaska, Portage, Fennimore and Janesville. An existing SEIMC in Madison is scheduled to close in September 1974. Two new SEIMC's are scheduled to open in 1974, at Cumberland and Stevens Point.



Wisconsin Information Service

Since 1969 a federal grant administered by the Wisconsin Division on Aging, Department of Health and Social Services, has been used to develop and refine a method of providing a program of information and referral services. This program has two goals:

- a. To increase the accessibility of human services to people in need.
- b. To investigate the utility of data that are made available through information and referral centers to planners of human services.

The Division on Aging, through the staff of the Information and Referral Project, is currently operating a network of 13 information and referral centers throughout the state. The centers are located in public and private agency settings. The following cities have centers:

Each of these centers serves one or more counties, although there are some areas of Wisconsin that are not covered by the project. The network itself is known as the Wisconsin Information Service (WIS).

Wisconsin Instant Information System for Students and Counselors

The Wisconsin Instant Information System for Students and Counselors (WISC) program is designed to provide occupational information for use by secondary school students and counselors in a systematic and flexible format. Using electronic data processing and microfilm systems in an aperture card, WISC describes over 250 occupations which do not require a college degree for job entry. In addition, the system describes over 70 public and private schools in Wisconsin which offer training beyond high school for many of the occupations described.

The program is funded by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title III, and the Vocational Education Act.

The card deck, an index, and updated materials are supplied at no cost to schools and other governmental agencies. These will be made available to public libraries free upon request.

As of September 1972, a completely new deck of cards was provided to more than 350 schools and other agency users.

Tools for Sharing Resources

The libraries in Wisconsin, cooperating formally and informally to provide better service for library patrons, have shown a willingness to share resources. They have worked through a variety of channels to produce tools for sharing resources: union lists of serials, periodicals, audiovisual materials and, in one instance, master's theses.

The 9 former state universities in Wisconsin have been producing an annual computerized union list of periodicals for a number of years. The libraries rotate the editing and print-out of each revised edition. Copies are distributed to the 9 participating libraries (Eau Claire, LaCrosse, Oshkosh, Platteville, River Falls, Stevens Point, Stout, Superior and Whitewater) and to the Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service (WILS) office. Another cooperative effort of the former state universities is Master's Theses and Seminar Papers—Former Wisconsin State Universities; 1935-1972.

A catalog which came out in 1973 is *University of Wisconsin System Video Tape Catalog*. It contains the holdings of all former state university system libraries that wished to participate.

As mentioned in another section of this Service Record, Northeast Wisconsin Intertype Libraries (NEWIL) and Madison Area Library Council (MALC), two regional intertype library organizations in Wisconsin, have produced union lists. NEWIL published in 1973 a computer-produced NEWIL. Union List of Serials. NEWIL also compiled an Instructional Media Catalog of nonprint materials. A supplement to the latter came out in December 1972. MALC has published the following union lists and directories: Newspapers Currently Received in Major Dane County Collections, Directory of Library and Information Sources in Dane County, Union List of Periodicals, and, in cooperation with the University of Wisconsin-Madison Memorial Library, published Campus Collections at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

The Wisconsin Union List of Biomedical Serials, which



came out in 1973, offers the medical and biomedical holdings of the 54 participating libraries and partial coverage of other holdings.

In 1974 a University of Wisconsin Union List of Serials (including Memorial Library, its 8 branches, Engineering Library and Sceenbock Memorial Library) will be published.

The University of Wisconsin-Madison Memorial Library has a microfilm record of its holdings as listed in its card catalog as of January 1, 1969. The WILS interloan office at the Memorial Library has a copy of this catalog as does MINITEX in Minnesota and Reference and Loan Library.

The Middleton Medical Library of the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus and the Medical-Dental Library of the Medical College of Wisconsin serve all the residents of Wisconsin. There are 2 data base terminals available from these libraries, MEDLINE and COMPFILE. Together they include the entire contents of *Index Medicus* from 1970 to the present. MEDLINE is MEDLARS on-line, Medical Literature Analysis and Referral System. Anyone may request a search. There is a charge for the search. Persons also may purchase the Selected Dissemination of Information (SDI) monthly profile which allows the user to keep current with that which *Index Medicus* is indexing each month in his field.

In 1973 the National Agricultural Library announced a grant to the Steenbock Memorial Library on the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus to investigate bibliographic coverage of the impact on the environment of forestry and forestry products. Extensive use is to be made of on-line

bibliographic data bases, including the National Agricultural Library's CAIN on-line.

As was mentioned previously in this Service Record, The Wisconsin Information Retrieval for Education (WIRE) program operates in the Department of Public Instruction. It is a computerized retrieval system designed to search the data base of ERIC.

At the University of Wisconsin-Madison, College of Engineering there are 4 computer-readable bibliographic data base terminals. The College of Engineering offers walk-in, telephone and mail search facilities for these data bases to all Wisconsin residents. The charge per search for each is \$25.

The Water Resources Scientific Information Center is located in the Engineering Library. Its data base consists of all records published in Selected Water Resources Abstracts, a publication of the U.S. Department of Interior, Office of Water Resources Research. It covers approximately 1967 to date.

In the field of Chemistry there is the Chemical Abstracts Condensates (CAC). CAC's data base on computer begins with 1970. It has over one million records in storage.

The Engineering Index data base dates back to 1970 and has bibliographic material from approximately 200,000 records pertaining to all engineering fields from over 3,500 sources of engineering literature.

The National Technical Institute Information Service data base contains over 115,000 records and dates back to 1970.



CHAPTER 2 LIBRARY AND MEDIA ORGANIZATIONS

CHAPTER 3 LIBRARY EDUCATION

Graduate Programs

There are three graduate library education programs in Wisconsin. These are at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Milwaukee and Oshkosh.

Oshkosh, in addition to having a graduate program, also offers an undergraduate minor and major in library science. Madison offers an undergraduate minor, a master's program, a specialist program and a doctoral program. Milwaukee offers an undergraduate minor and a master's program.

The graduate program at Milwaukee is designed principally to meet the requirements of special libraries and information centers. The needs of the Milwaukee metropolitan area are addressed by special emphasis upon late hour classes for part-time students and outreach programs of in-service training. The school plans to expand considerably its internship program and outreach activities. Special program highlights in 1973-74 were a workshop, Library Orientation: Reaching Out to People, held in the summer of 1973, and a seminar, Progress in Urban Librarianship and the Determination of Community Information Needs held in February 1974. In addition, a workshop, Update: Keeping Abreast of Current Library Developments will be held this summer (1974), and a one-day conference on information services to business and industry will be held in September 1974.

The goals of the University of Wisconsin-Madison Library School are to prepare graduates to serve as librarians, teachers of librarianship, and investigators of library problems; to enlarge the body of knowledge of librarianship; and, to provide service to libraries, practicing librarians and other agencies. The University of Wisconsin-Madison Library School makes available a wide range of continuing education experiences, from credit courses, to institutes and workshops, to lecturers and participation in conference programming.

The objectives of the graduate program of the Department of Library Science of the University of Wisconsin—Oshkosh are as follows:

a. To prepare professional librarians of high caliber by offering 1) a basic core curriculum involving theory

concepts, techniques, and procedures essential to adequate performance in any type of library, and 2) specialized courses to equip candidates for particular types of libraries (college, university, public, school or special) and for a particular type of work in a given library (information retrieval, reading guidance, bibliography, materials selection, technical processing or administration).

b. To inspire some master's candidates with the need for progress in librarianship to the extent that they will continue their studies in pursuit of the doctorate and/or produce research.

In the past year, the Library Science Department at Oshkosh had a grant for two graduate fellowships from the Office of Education. Through the grant, the program has been enriched by a Colloquium in Current Issues in Librarianship, a series of 14 lectures by practicing librarians on outreach programs in public libraries, e.g., services to the blind and physically handicapped, the homebound, senior citizens, inner-city residents, prisoners, Spanish-Americans, and North American Indians.

In September of each year, the Library Science Department at Oshkosh sponsors a conference for librarians of the state. In September, 1973, the theme was "Current Media and the Library." Featured speakers were: John Tebbel, professor of journalism, New York University; John N. Berry III, editor of *Library Journal*; and Robert Asleson, President, University Microfilms.

The Library Science Department at Oshkosh sponsored two field trips during the academic year: one to Oak Park-River Forest High School Media Center and one to the libraries of the University of Chicago and of Northwestern University, Chicago.

The University of Wisconsin Extension, Department of Communication Arts, offers some graduate credit courses in cooperation with the Madison and Milwaukee Schools, in addition to offering many noncredit courses to the librarians in the state.

The Oshkosh, Madison and Milwaukee Library Schools provided the following statistics on the placement of 1972-73 graduates with the master's degree:

Library Technical Assistant Programs

Two schools offer 2-year programs to prepare library technical assistants. These are Alverno, which also offers a library science minor, and Gateway Technical Institute. The Library Technical Assistant Program at Gateway is designed to train persons for para-professional positions in all types of libraries: public, school, college and university, business and industry, government, and other special.

A high school graduate or equivalent may enroll in the Library Technical Assistant Program. It is a 2-year program, and the person completing it is awarded an Associate of Applied Science degree. The program provides a background of general education courses and specialized courses in library fundamentals.

The Library Technical Assistants are trained to work under the supervision of professional librarians in many library departments: circulation, reference, technical processing. They also work with library services and materials such as: publicity and exhibits, audiovisual materials and equipment, library use of data processing, and services to children.

In 1972-73, 20 students graduated from the program. Fifteen students were enrolled in the program in 1973-74. Courses are taught by I full-time and 1 part-time faculty member.

The Continuing Education Scene in Wisconsin

The Division for Library Services is charged by statute with the planning and improvement of public and school library services. Also by law the agency is named as being responsible for the coordination of statewide library planning, related research, conducting in-service training and programs of recruiting of librarians for public and school libraries and public library systems, and for coordinating interlibrary cooperation among all types of libraries in the

state. The charge calls for heavy involvement in continuing education activities on all library fronts in order to bring better library services to the people of the state.

Wisconsin's long-range program for library services development states: "... continuing efforts must be made to make educational opportunities more available and more meaningful. An audit of manpower needs, covering all types of libraries, will be an essential first step. Wisconsin's unique program of using its Educational Telephone Network for librarian education must continue, and appropriate use must be made of the increasing availability of educational and cable television."

In January of 1974 the first step in long-range planning for Wisconsin library personnel needs was taken. The Council on Library Development (COLD) met to plan how best to consider its responsibility for evaluating library personnel requirements and to make recommendations concerning personnel accreditation, library education and training programs including those for continuing education. In order to carry out this responsibility the Council set up a Task Force on Library Manpower and Education.

As stated previously, Wisconsin offers a great deal of formal

Workshops for Federal Depository Libraries; DLS and the State Historical Society of Wisconsin

The above examples illustrate the sort of short-term educational opportunities available to staffs of school, public and special libraries. The time span makes it possible for many people to participate from libraries that are more often than not short staffed. At the same time Wisconsin holds 1- and 2-week seminars and institutes with regularity and some examples of these should be mentioned.

In 1972, Wisconsin held one of the first statewide institutes on libraries and cable television. It was a 3-day program planned cooperatively by the Madison Area Library Council, the Division for Library Services and University Extension, Department of Communication Arts. The "faculty" included experts in the background, the potential and the production aspects of cable television. Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) funds were used to defray the costs of speakers and materials. Also in 1972,

litrary education. University of Wisconsin-Madison offers the doctorate program. Three campuses offer graduate library programs-Madison, Milwaukee and Oshkosh. There are 16 universities and colleges offering undergraduate minors and Gateway Technical Institute and Alverno College have 2-year library technical assistant programs to train library/media assistants for work in all types of libraries. University of Wisconsin Extension, Department of Communication Arts, offers some graduate credit courses in cooperation with the Madison and Milwaukee schools. When feasible the Division has paid the tuition for practicing librarians to enroll in a course of special importance to them. Until fiscal 1973 the Division has offered a limited number of scholarships for the master's program at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. The factor of uncertain federal funding and the strictures of the job market have resulted in a temporary halt to this educational assistance with the thought the approach should be rethought and redirected.

In addition to the formal classes many of the schools offer excellent and varied institutes, workshops and seminars. The Division may be involved in several ways: planning help, participation, and financial assistance in some form. Following are examples from the 1973-74 offerings:

An intensive concentration on the knowledge and skills needed for meaningful community planning using the simulation game *Microville II*

A 2-day institute featuring 13 speakers including presentations by Frederick Kilgour, Director of the Ohio College Library Center and Joseph Becker of the National Commission on Libraries and Information Science

A 1-day workshop to discuss problems and to promote cooperation between depositories for better statewide service.

the University of Wisconsin-Madison Library School and University Extension presented a 1-week conference *Media in Library Social Action* and a 2-week workshop on planning rural library service. Both drew participants from many states, and the Division offered stipends to Wisconsin public librarians who wished to attend.

Since 1969 a new communication concept has been put to work to bring learning opportunities to library personnel all over the state in a situation almost as easily accessible as the nearest shopping center. This is Educational Telephone Network (ETN). Very simply, through use of open-air telephone lines a giant "party line" is set up which allows all participants to hear and be heard. Also via telephone guest speakers from across the country are brought in to talk to the audience and to answer questions. The network has outlets located in county courthouses, University of



Wisconsin campuses, libraries and hospitals in more than 100 Wisconsin communities.

In 1973-74 the following in-service/continuing Educational opportunities were offered over ETN:

Basic Library Management Series

A course designed for non-professional heads, and staff members if desired, of small public libraries in the state, and required for certification by the Division for Library Services.

Continuing Education for Public Librarians Series

Designed to offer in-service training opportunities to meet the needs of staff members in public libraries of all sizes. Some of the topics discussed in 1973-74: Service to Aging, Service to Jails, and Children's Librarians Work with Adults Too!

Library Trustees Series

Offered at the request of the Wisconsin Library Trustees Association, this series aimed at assisting trustees in seeing universal problems and in fulfilling their community responsibilities.

Church/Synagogue Librarians Workshops

Four sessions that addressed the particular concerns of those-often volunteers-involved in setting up and operating these libraries.

School/Media Series

Focus varies annually. This year six sessions concentrated on grades K-8 with specific concerns on reading programs, children's literature, planning evaluation.

Basic Library Management for Health Science Librarians Thirteen 2-hour sessions offering assistance to those persons responsible for library service in medical settings.

Contemporary Novels and Librarians

A 5-session course for librarians, people who belong to book discussion groups, and individuals over the state who enjoy looking at the present scene through fiction. Variable schedule.

Wisconsin Systems—in the sense of being certified by the Division and receiving state aids—are fledglings. The first four began operations in the calendar /ear 1973; an additional four were certified in 1974. This is not to say that system development has not been in the making since 1956. Many of the eight certified systems are the outgrowth of use of LSA and LSCA funds to begin areawide operations. (Milwaukee Public Library has had service contracts with municipalities throughout Milwaukee County for "system services" since 1915!)

In the last few years all systems (big S or little s) have incorporated into their services, under the guidance of the headquarters or resource library, an ongoing program for in-service and continuing education activities. Most have system-wide meetings on a monthly or bimonthly basis. Many use the ETN morning programs in continuing education as a focus for a follow-up session; others plan independent workshop sessions that treat with problems of greater concern or interest to their member libraries. Many systems are encouraging the staff of small libraries within their area to enroll in the A50 courses. Other systems have evolved training programs aimed at alleviating known weaknesses endemic to the system. As systems (big S, little s) have time to assess needs for personnel development it is expected that more tailor-made educational opportunities will develop to work hand in glove with basic needs common to all areas of the state.

As far as the future is concerned, much depends on the findings and conclusions of the Council on Library Development's Manpower and Education Task Force. Maybe the whole present programming for continuing education could be dumped. Perhaps it could be adapted to other emphases; perhaps it will remain status quo and be shored up with more use of sophisticated delivery systems and other emerging technological advancements tethered to bring better educational opportunities to staff.

For the future the Division for Library Services is exploring the possibility of working out a meaningful internship program aimed at the master's degree candidate with interest in a specialty needed by Wisconsin libraries. Dependent on funding from whatever sources, the Division is considering the merits of inviting certain program and supervisory staff from certified systems to spend time observing system operations in other states if arrangements can be made for such visits.

It is to be hoped, and worked for, that the future will bring about a stronger commitment to continuing education on the part of governing bodies and library administration. In Wisconsin, school librarians with a bachelor's degree are required to earn 6 credits within a 5-year cycle; those librarians holding master's degrees are given salary increments based on participation in continuing education programs. Many public librarians have difficulty arranging for released time to attend classes, seminars or institutes. Few public libraries have an incentive program for encouraging staff to continue formal or informal education. It is testimony to the interest and dedication of public librarians over the state that so many do make individual sacrifices of personal time and money to participate in the various programs offered. Perhaps one of the most important outgrowths of the Council on Library Development's Task Force on Manpower and Education will be to give continuing education a high priority within the various institutions!



LIBRARY EDUCATION

Task Force on Library Manpower and Education

The Wisconsin Council on Library Development appointed a Task Force on Library Education and Manpower early in 1974 to implement one of its objectives which is to evaluate library personnel requirements in Wisconsin and to make recommendations on library education programs.

The Task Force will function through a Steering Committee and 3 working groups, 1 on library manpower requirements, 1 on certification requirements for library personnel and 1 on library education. Persons serving on the Task Force are broadly representative of the library community in Wisconsin.

The tentative objectives established for the Task Force are:

- a. To determine library personnel requirements in Wisconsin for the decade 1975-85 including numbers and levels of positions and the professional knowledge and technical skills needed for providing the changing patterns of library service.
- b. To determine the library education resources in aggree programs and continuing education programs as they relate to Wisconsin.
- c. To develop recommendations concerning library education programs in Wisconsin in relation to personnel needs.
- d. To develop recommendations concerning continuing education programs for Wisconsin library personnel.
- e. To consider and develop recommendations on certification requirements for library personnel.
- f. To develop a model for continuous updating of information about personnel needs, library education and certification. The objectives for the 3 working groups were established by the steering committee.

The working group on library manpower requirements will be responsible for:

a. Designing a study for determining the library personnel requirements in Wisconsin for the decade 1975-85 including numbers and levels of positions and the professional knowledge and technical skills needed for providing the changing patterns of library service.

- b. Making recommendations for carrying out the study.
- c. Evaluating the results of the study and their implications for library education and manpower.
- d. Making recommendations concerning library manpower needs.
- e. Developing a model for continuous study of library manpower needs.

The working group on library education will be responsible for:

- a. Identifying existing library education resources.
- b. Evaluating the manpower study in terms of present library education resources.
- c. Making recommendations concerning library education in Wisconsin.
- d. Developing a model for continuous review of library education resources.

The working group on certification requirements for library personnel will be responsible for:

- a. Studying library position classifications, noting in particular the ALA policy statement on library education and manpower.
- b. Studying existing certification requirements for all types of library personnel.
- c. Coordinating the results of certification studies now being conducted by various groups.
- d. Making recommendations concerning certification requirements for Wisconsin library personnel.
- e. Developing a model for continuous review of certification requirements for library personnel.

The Task Force is to complete its work and submit its recommendations to the Council on Library Development by June 1975. Muriel Fuller, University of Wisconsin-Extension, Department of Communication Arts, is chairman of the Task Force.

Eighty-five percent of the total students enrolled in 1970-71 and 86% of the total students enrolled in 1972-73 were enrolled in public institutions. Significant increases in enrollment were seen between 1971 and 1973 on the University of Wisconsin 2-year campuses (+ 30%), and in the VTAE districts (+ 39%). Private liberal arts colleges showed a slight decrease (- 3%) in enrollment between 1971 and 1973. The other private institutions showed slight increases. The University of Wisconsin 4-year campuses showed a slight decrease in enrollment (less than 1%).

Library Collection

In 1973 Wisconsin's academic libraries owned a total of 8,616,418 volumes. This is an increase of 10% over 1971, 646,629 volumes were added in 1971 compared to 602,096 added in 1973, a decrease of 6%.

The total volumes owned by University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1973 accounted for 31% of the total volumes owned by academic libraries. The University of 'Yisconsin 4-year campuses combined owned over half (64%) of the total volumes owned by all academic libraries.

Library Operating Expenditures

In 1972-73 academic libraries reported spending \$19,126,030 for salaries, books, periodicals, audiovisual materials, binding and all other operating expenditures. This compares to \$15,686,054 spent by academic libraries in 1970-71 and \$16,290,513 spent in 1971-72. Eighty-two percent of the total amount spent in 1973 was spent by public institutions.

Of the total amount spent in 1972-73, 49% was spent for salaries, 34% was spent for books and other print materials including materials in microform, and 17% went for all other operating expenditures.

The per student expenditures by academic libraries was \$86 for 1972-73 based on a comparison of total enrollment and total library operating expenditures.

Library Personnel

Academic libraries employed a total of 894 full-time employees and 1,356 employees in full-time equivalents in October 1972.* Of these 1,356 employees (in FTE) 26% were male and 74% were female. Eighty-one percent were employed in public institutions and 19% in private institutions. The distribution of male and female employees varied only slightly by type of institution with private institutions having a slightly higher percentage of male employees than public institutions (28% compared to 25%).

The distribution of employees by degree level for public and private institutions was very similar to the combined distribution, with both types of institutions having about the same percentage of distribution of employees by degree level.

Generally, the males employed in academic libraries tended to have more formal education than the females. This is shown by the fact that of the 677 employees with less than a bachelor's degree, 81% were female and 19% were male.

Of the 354 employees with a fifth year degree in library science 62% were female and 38% were male. Likewise, 41% of the total males employed by academic libraries have a fifth year degree in library science while 23% of the total females employed have a fifth year degree in library science.

PUBLIC LIBRARY SERVICES Public Libraries—State Summary

The extent to which Wisconsin libraries have developed cooperative programs is reflected in sections 1 and 11 of the statistical summary. In 1973, 1,583,859 persons, residing in 21 counties, had legal access to the services provided by four public library systems. ("Public Library Systems" are established and operate under Wisconsin statutes, Chapter 43—Library Laws of Wisconsin and receive financial aid form the state.) These residents, 35 percent of Wisconsin's population, were served by 75 libraries.

An additional 365,038 residents, living in 13 counties, were offered library services by three multicounty cooperative public library services programs. ("Cooperative public library services programs" are county or multicounty library service programs operated under procedures defined and financed locally.) Cooperation among the 60 libraries in these three services brought library service to another 8 percent of the population Eighteen counties, providing service to 1,287,524 residents, (28 percent of the state's population), offered county-wide cooperative public library services programs from 75 libraries. Finally, 127 individual libraries provided services to 970,542 residents (22 percent of the population).

Unfortunately, in 1973 there were 326,577 residents in Wisconsin (7 percent of the population) who did not have legal access to public library services or materials. Hopefully, the development of public library systems will play an important role in enabling Wisconsin to reach its goal of providing library services and materials to all its residents.

Sections III, IV and V of the statistical summary show state totals for public libraries, professional employees, materials collections, and loan activity. The number of professional public librarians (in full-time equivalents) increased from 304 in 1972 to 345 in 1973. Part of this increase is probably due to new or expanded library facilities and the impact of state aid funds to public library systems. Direct loans from libraries at 23,525,729 decreased slightly from last year, but are still above the average for the previous three years of 23,188,807. The decrease in direct loans could be due to several factors, including the following: decreased use of public libraries by children as school resources have improved; increased use of reference and information sources by young adults and adults, not reflected in circulation figures; growth of photocopying as a substitute for materials circulation; and increased use by groups and individuals of audiovisual materials inside public libraries, again not shown in circulation figures. All categories of library materials collections, except for titles added, increased over last year's levels. For the first time, total volumes held by public libraries was above 10,000,000 volumes.

Section VI describes public library operating income. Local and county appropriations were the major sources of library income in Wisconsin providing 88.7 percent (79.1 percent from localities and 9.6 percent from counties) of all income. State aid to public library systems accounted for 3.5 percent of all income, federal grants provided .9 percent, contract income provided 2.8 percent, and endowments, gifts and other income provided the remaining 4.1 percent. Total income from all sources at \$23,181,708 was 8.5 percent greater than last year. All categories of income showed increases over last year except for federal grants.

Section VII presents public library operating expenditures. The total operating expenditures of public libraries were \$22,545,510, representing an increase of 9.7 percent over 1972. Expenditures for salaries, wages and employee benefits, which account for 68.5 percent of all expenditures, were \$1,107,732 or 7.7 percent higher than the 1972 expenditures for these items. Presumably, inflation accounts for a large part of this increase. Expenditures for library materials increased 11.3 percent over 1972. Undoubtedly a major reason for this increase was higher prices for books, periodicals and audio-visual materials. Contract expenditures showed a slight increase (1 percent) over last year, while the all other expenditures category increased 21.5 percent. It is quite clear that libraries have not escaped the impact of inflation and the public library operating expenditures are likely to continue to rise.

Sections VIII and 1X present three categories of library expenditures that show marked decreases from last year. Capital expenditures at \$1,990,454 showed a 48 percent decrease in comparison with 1972. Funds available from the federal Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) also showed a noticeable decrease from 1972. LSCA, Title 1, funds for library services programs. decreased from \$471,648 in 1972 to \$175,667 in 1973. LSCA, Title II, funds for library construction, decreased from \$319,000 in 1972 to \$74,000 in 1973.

In summary, in 1973 93 percent of Wisconsin's residents had legal access to public libraries. Approximately 326,500 did not have library services available to them. The number of professional librarians employed in Wisconsin increased noticeably and public library collections grew in size. All categories of library income except for federal grants showed increases. Library operating expenditures increased 9.7 percent over 1972 expenditures. The public library system concept be one a reality when four systems began operations in 1973.



PUBLIC LIBRARY SYSTEMS

In December of 1971 a new library law of Wisconsin was enacted providing state aid for public library systems.

The intent of the new law was to modernize the structure of public library service in line with governmental trends in the state and library trends throughout the country. Even though there were over 330 public libraries in Wisconsin, some 275,000 residents had no legal access to library service. Many of those who did have access had relatively limited service at the local library. Through cooperation and coordination among libraries of different sizes the public can receive a variety and depth of essential library materials and services.

The major emphasis of the law relates to public library systems. In the context of the law, a system is defined as a group of libraries organized to share services and materials to meet the full needs of all the people within a defined area. Cooperative programs, based on this philosophy, have been operating in Wisconsin for over fifty years, and many of them have been called "systems" regardless of how they are organized. However, to be certified as an approved system, it must be organized according to Chapter 43 of the state statutes.

The county is used as the basic unit of the library system in order to avoid a special purpose taxing district. At the same time, it was recognized that the population base must be large enough to provide good library service at a reasonable cost. Therefore, the law stipulates that a system must contain a population of at least 80,000 people (85,000 after 1981), which in many areas of the state will necessitate counties joining together to form approved library systems. In addition, each system must allow in its organizational structure for additional counties to join.

To establish a system, the county board o supervisors would appoint a library planning committee consisting of local citizens to study the library needs of the county. This planning committee would meet with similar committees in adjacent counties to determine the feasibility of establishing a multicounty system; or the committee would meet with the board of an already approved system to investigate the possibilities of joining that system. Upon determining the best method for the county, the committee would file a report of its findings and its recommendations to the County Board of Supervisors, and to the Division for Library Services, Department of Public Instruction. If the Division approves the plan, then the county board would act on the recommendations. Upon approval by the county board, those communities which maintain a public library would decide if they want to participate in the system or exempt the municipality from the system service.

Each system is governed by a board of trustees appointed by the county board(s). In a multicounty system the number of trustees from each county would be in proportion to its population, with each county having at least one representative. In no case, though, can a system have more than twenty trustees. Members are appointed for a three year term, with one-third being reappointed or replaced each year.

The system board, as a legal body, is responsible for establishing system policies and ensuring means to provide for equal service to all residents of the area. It is accountable for the proper expenditure of the monies appropriated for the system. One of the most important duties of the board is to file its annual plan describing the program for library services to be carried out the subsequent year and for the use of the state aid it will receive.

System services are financed by appropriations from the counties participating in the system and by state aid. The formula for determining the amount of state aid is comprised of three parts:

- 1. \$.50 per person in the system area.
- 2. \$6 per square mile in a single county system; \$9 per square mile in a two-county system; \$12 per square mile in a three-county system; \$15 per square mile in a four-county system; and \$18 per square mile in a system with five or more counties.
- 3. 7 percent of the total operating expenditures for all public library services in the system from local and county sources in the preceding year.

If the total state appropriation is lower that the amount to which each system is entitled, the Division for Library Services will pro-rate the funds among all the systems.

The Division for Library Services certified four systems the first year (January 1-December 31, 1973). These were as follows:

- 1. LaCrosse Area Library System, consisted of Juneau, LaCrosse, and Monroe counties. The system served 133,000 persons, included 11 public libraries, and received \$58,370 in state aid for 1973 operations.
- 2. Northwest Wisconsin Library System, consisted of Ashland, Bayfield, Burnett, Douglas. Iron, Sawyer, Vilas and Washburn counties. The system served 123,000 persons, included 22 public libraries, and received \$109,073 in state aid for 1973 operations.
- 3. Wisconsin Valley Library Service consisted of Clark, Forest, Langlade, Lincoln, Marathon, Oneida, Portage, Taylor and Wood counties. This system served 347,000 persons, included 35 public libraries,



- and received \$197,735 in state aid for 1973 operations.
- 4. Milwaukee County Federated Library System served most of Milwaukee County (except the cities of Cudahy, Oak Creek and South Milwaukee). This system served 980,606 persons, included seven public libraries, and received \$452,822 in state aid for 1973 operations.

Because the state appropriation was not sufficient for full formula funding the first year, it was necessary to pro-rate at 47.5 percent of the formula. State aid payments to library systems totaled \$818,000 for 1973.

During 1973 over 30 planning committees were continuing to study the library needs of their counties. Nine of these counties were able to complete their work and to have the plans approved by the Division for Library Services and their respective county boards. Thus for the 1974 calendar year, eight certified systems received aid. In addition to the four systems listed above, the following four systems were approved:

- 1. Southwest Wisconsin Library System, consists of Crawford, Grant, Iowa, Lafayette and Richland counties. This system serves 119,000 persons and includes 27 public libraries.
- 2. Fond du Lac County Federated Library System, serves all the residents of the county, plus all the residents of the city of Waupun which is located in both Fond du Lac and Dodge counties. The 92,000 residents are served by seven public libraries.
- 3. Manitowoc County Library System, serves 83,000 persons with three public libraries.
- 4. Rock County Federated Library System, serves 133,000 persons with seven public libraries.

In addition, Trempealeau County joined the LaCrosse Area Library System, increasing the population of that system to 157,000 and the number of public libraries to 20.

Planning committees are continuing to meet and make plans to improve library service for their residents. Several of the certified systems are expected to be enlarged since neighboring counties want to join.

LACROSSE AREA LIBRARY SYSTEM

The formulation of the LaCrosse Area Library System was the result of several years of regional cooperation to provide adequate library services to the residents of west central Wisconsin, Begun in November, 1965, as a federallyfunded demonstration project designed to meet a growing demand for strengthened services from public libraries, this regional cooperative group succeeded in improving library resources available to library users as well as in implementing programs to provide library services to previously unserved persons. In 1972, the LaCrosse Area Library System, made up of the counties of Juneau, LaCrosse and Monroe, received provisional certification from the Division for Library Services to begin operations in 1973, Establishment as a state recognized system brought with it the promise of state aid funds to assist in the development of system services and resources. Contractual agreements already existing among member counties, as well as some federal aid, provided additional funds for library system operations. The LaCrosse Public Library became the system's headquarters library and on January 1, 1973, system operations began.

System services to participating member libraries included the administration of the system functions by the administrative librarian and system board of trustees. System assistance to improve member library operations included workshops, staff meetings with personnel of member libraries, and guidance in administrative details at the local level to any librarian or board member who expressed a desire for such service. In-service training institutes were held regularly for library staff and board members.

Reference ser; ice was made available to all member libraries that requested it, as well as to all individual patrons who were residents of member counties. A "system borrower card", which allows free library service to patrons in any library in the system service area, became available in early 1973. The system borrower card increased the availability of library materials to the individual user. The card represented progress over the library-to-library concept where individuals could make requests for materials only through a library. Interlibrary loan orders for materials not available at the headquarters library or any library in the

system area were sent by teletype on a daily basis from the LaCrosse Public Library to Reference and Loan Library in Madison.

In order to enrich local library book collections, book grants were provided to all system members. Book selection assistance was provided by an examination of the head-quarters collection, book selection tools provided to each member library, and workshop assistance in selecting books on the basis of individual member library community needs. Central purchasing at the headquarters library for all member library orders under this book grant program allowed discount consideration.

A variety of other services was offered by the LaCrosse Area Library System. Public information releases to all media, materials such as signs and posters for individual library use, and press releases were provided by the headquarters library to member libraries. The system also assisted in summer reading programs and National Library Week and Children's Book Week aids. Communication between member libraries and the headquarters was provided by telephone credit cards distributed to each member library. Bookmobile service was available to all member counties by contract.

Future service plans include the entry of Trempealeau County into system membership in 1974. Extended services will include an all-system film service by a Film-by-Mail arrangement from a central collection to be housed at the LaCrosse Public Library. Each member library will receive its own 16 mm sound projector, screen and limited basic collection of children's films. A cassette grant program, administered like the established book grant program, will give each library a program of cassettes for local use. Books-by-mail, intended to reach all who cannot conveniently visit a public library in person, will be started during 1974 within the system. Services such as talking books for the physically and visually handicapped, shut-in services. and services to institutions and jails will be expanded. Assistance in planning adequate use of library space in local libraries will be provided. A central pool of materials, and central storage of little-used but necessary materials, as well as provisions for delivery between the headquarters and member libraries, will be developed.

MILWAUKEE COUNTY FEDERATED LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Milwaukee County Federated Library System, offering library services to 980,000 persons, is the most populous of all Wisconsin systems. System members include the public libraries in Brown Deer, Greendale, Shorewood, Wauwatosa, West Allis, Whitefish Bay, and Milwaukee. Milwaukee Public Library acts as the headquarters and resource library. System activities for the first year of operation included:

- 1. Implementing the system plan for 1973.
- 2. Fitting federated system activities into existing library and governmental structures of the county, city of Milwaukee, and the member suburban communities, and
- 3. Planning activities for 1974 system operation.

The elements of the first year's system plan included direct grants to member libraries to be expended for library purposes and the establishment of a system fund budget for the acquisition and processing of library materials for the federated system to be selected and housed in the member libraries. The direct grants to member libraries were intended to meet particular local needs and desires. Since many library services were already available to system member libraries under an existing suburban contract, the concentration for this first year was on purchasing materials, especially non-print materials. Or anizing for, purchasing

and processing of system materials became the responsibility of the headquarters library. Hiring and training staff, developing a processing manual for non-print materials, coordinating processing methods and selecting materials with member libraries were important system activities.

System member participation was implemented by the System Boa.'d's creation of the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC). This committee consisted of the system's member library directors. Meetings of this group with the headquarters library staff provided a means for coordinating the selection of system materials and for considering other matters that affected system member libraries. The TAC also developed recommendations for consideration by the full system board on subjects dealing with 1973 and 1974 plans.

System funds for 1974 operations will be used to increase the speed and efficiency of providing services... it materials directly to the library user. This will be accomplished through the implementation of an electronic circulation control system, an increase in the frequency of deliveries between member libraries, and increased communications between system member libraries and the headquarters library. In addition, system funds will be allocated to each participating community library board for individual library development activities and for non-print materials acquisition. Future plans under discussion include the development of a system library card.

NORTHWEST WISCONSIN LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Northwest Wisconsin Library System consists of the counties of Ashland, Bayfield, Burnett, Douglas, Iron, Sawyer, Vilas and Washburn, with Vaughn Public Library (Ashland County) acting as headquarters library for the system. In the first year of operation the Superior Public Library (Douglas County) became the system resource library, under a contract with the system board. This contract enabled the Superior Public Library to hire additional staff, purchase more materials, and give all system residents free walk-in service. Arrangements were developed between the Superior Public Library and the Vaughn Public Library to ensure rapid inter-loan service. coordinated material buying, staff coordination and communication. Funding for system operations was provided by county contractual agreements, federal grants and state aid.

The Northwest Wisconsin Library System service area has a history of regional multi-county cooperation and, therefore, in 1973, many of the services provided were a continuation and expansion of previous services. These services included: bookmobile stops in the communities and neighborhoods of each of the member libraries; bookmobile stops at each of the member libraries for the local librarians to obtain additional books for circulation from their libraries; inter-library loan and reference and referral services for public libraries as well as residents directly; consultive services to local public libraries as requested; book grants to local public libraries for purchase

of additional reference titles; and walk-in service at the Vaughn Public Library.

Participating libraries explored the feasibility of a system borrower's card which would enable all residents of the member counties to use any public library. This included determining the mechanics of issuing the cards, recovering overdue materials, usage of all the libraries by seasonal residents (i.e. tourists), returning materials to the correct library, and related problems. Development of a workable system borrower's card will continue in 1974.

Other activities undertaken by the system in 1973 included administrative services, advisory services (workshops, staff meetings with personnel of member libraries and in-service training), and planning services. Reference and referral services were provided by the headquarters library as were bulk loans and rotating collections. Joint publicity and public relations activities were also undertaken.

Planning for system services in 1974 centered upon the consideration of new and expanded areas of service. Ideas for expanded services to Indians, nursing homes, and retirement villages in the system area were explored. The establishment of an Audio-Visual Resource Center at the Superior Public Library received the attention of the system director and Superior librarians. It was decided that a union catalog of Wisconsin materials held by the libraries within the system should be initiated by the system headquarters. Continued operation of present system activities was planned for 1974.

WISCONSIN VALLEY LIBRARY SERVICE

The Wisconsin Valley Library Service began in 1961 as a multicounty cooperative library program to provide reference and interloan service to residents of this central Wisconsin region. On January 1, 1973, this service became one of the first four certified public libraries systems in Wisconsin. Member counties are Clark, Forest, Langlade, Lincoln, Marathon, Oneida, Portage, Taylor and Wood. Largest of the public library systems at 9,908 square miles, this system is headquartered at the Wausau Public Library.

System level organization was the first order of business in 1973. In January the system board organized, adopted a constitution and by-laws, elected officers, and approved the provisional service plan, a budget for 1973, and an agreement with the Marathon County Public Library as headquarters and resource library.

A priority activity in 1973, after completing system organization, was assistance to counties and local libraries in establishing organization and procedures for extension of local library services to all residents, for coordinated planning to improve local services, and for intra-county agreements to provide services. System staff provided model plans and agreements and advisory assistance as plans were discussed, modified and adopted in each county. Aid grants, from the system to member libraries, were provided for implementation of individual county plans.

During 1973, all residents of the 9-county area achieved legal access to public library services. Wood, Langlade, Oneida and Marathon counties established special outreach or homebound services. Wood, Marathon and Langlade purchased book vans to help meet these special service needs. Books-by-mail service was established and is successfully operating in Oneida and Portage counties. Continued improvement and extension of the system-wide rotating large-print book collection was accomplished during the year, Bulk book loans of the Wilson Standard Catalog Series were made, but individual libraries were encouraged to purchase these essential selection tools. A film catalog listing over 600 16 mm film titles was compiled and distributed to all system libraries. A union list of periodicals and a survey of holdings by system libraries of reference and referral tools were updated. All summer reading program materials for area libraries were ordered and distributed through the Wisconsin Valley Library Service Headquarters.

Since an increasing effort was being made by the staff to utilize more of the system's own resources, the need for better communications became evident. System-wide communications were improved with the installation of an OUT-WATS telephone line at the headquarters library in late December. An evaluation of this communication link will be made in 1974.

The headquarters processed 27,289 reference and referral requests during the year. Of these, 18,280 were completed at the headquarters, 6,207 were referred to the State Reference and Loan Library, and the balance were referred to other sources, including libraries within the system.

An intertype library working agreement with the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point was established, and an increase in interloans is anticipated during 1974. The Executive Committee of Wisconsin Valley Library Service appointed an intertype library advisory committee to act as a clearing house for cooperative library development in the system area.

In order to keep nearly 300 librarians and library trustees informed of sy tem-wide activities and developments, a system newsletter is mailed each month. The newsletter lists materials available free from the headquarters library. Over 300 showcard-type library signs were produced to aid local libraries in exhibiting their materials more adequately.

The headquarters library encouraged system libraries to participate in Educational Telephone Network (ETN) training sessions by sponsoring free registration for any interested library staff members. The libraries took advantage of this program to train personnel. Eight system-wide workshops were planned with the assistance of an advisory committee, and conducted by the staff.

A special series of in-service training sessions, planned specifically to meet the needs of small libraries, was begun in Clark County, and will continue through 1974. This program will be expanded to Taylor and Forest counties in 1974.

The system staff provided advisory assistance to all 34 member libraries on such administrative matters as board organization, personnel description and classification, budgeting and reporting procedures, equipment selection and purchase, and personnel policies. Thirty-seven individual field visits were made, and system staff had 142 meetings with personnel of individual member libraries, advising and assisting on a wide range of library problems.

The value of public library service is measured at the point of contact with the user—i.e., at the local library. In the Wisconsin Valley Library Service area there are wide variations in quality and quantity of service at that point of contact. Very basic improvements in terms of collections and staff capabilities are necessary before a minimum level of local service can be achieved and maintained. This minimum level of service is the necessary foundation for building strong cooperative system services.



Much planning and advisory activity in 1973 was concerned with the organization and procedures necessary to give all residents of each county legal access to public library services, and to provide a planning and operational base for continued improvement of services. Reference, general loan and referral activities were increased, and an in-service training program was expanded. Areas have been identified which will require concentrated assistance to improve local level services.



CHAPTER 7 SCHOOL LIBRARY SERVICES

El mentary and Secondary Education Act, Title II

During the 1973 fiscal year Wisconsin received \$2,305,000 from the federal government in Elementary Secondary Education Act (ESEA) Title I! funds. These funds, less administrative costs, were distributed to school districts to purchase school library resources, textbooks and other printed and published instructional materials.

The distribution was made in two categories: basic grants and special project grants. Seventy-five percent of these funds were assigned to all the schools in the state under the basic grants category, based on a formula that took into consideration enrollment, relative need and local effort.

The remaining 25% was distributed (quite late because of impoundment) in the form of special project grant awards. Of the 350 proposals, 162 received grant awards.

The special project grant awards ranged in size from \$20,000 to \$750. Public schools, private schools, CESA districts, correctional institutions and hospitals were the recipients.

The most common basis for awarding special project grants was the birth of a new centralized library in a school that had previously had only small classroom libraries. Other projects that received grants had proposed:

- a. Developing a regional collection of costly audiovisual materials.
- b. Developing a collection that would meet a specific need or stimulate a successful teaching/learning program.
- c. Providing specialized learning materials needed by disadvantaged or handicapped children.

School Libraries-Statistics

Since 1965, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruc-

tion has conducted four surveys to aid in determining the status of library/media programs and resources in Wisconsin schools. Reports of three earlier surveys in public schools and of one in nonpublic schools have been discussed in the Wisconsin Library Bulletin (September-October 1967, pp. 283-288; November-December 1969, pp. 448-454, 460; May-June 1970, pp. 150-155, nonpublic schools; September-October 1972, pp. 259-262). Data from the most recent survey, completed in January 1973, together with reports from previous surveys, were used as the basis of this report, which attempts to indicate changes and trends in public school media programs during the past 8 years. This report is a summary of public school facilities. A more detailed report for both the public and nonpublic sectors is available from the ESEA Title II office in Madison.

The most recent survey takes on a more significant function since the State Legislature in approving this year's budget spelled out minimum standards which the schools of Wisconsin must maintain in order to receive aid. Among those minimum standards is one calling for adequate library materials and services for all schools. The most recent Planning for School Library/Media Programs Instrument will be used to help school districts assess their needs for library/media development.

A major goal of the Division for Library Services and the ESEA Title II program has been to aid in the development of a centralized library/media center in every school in Wisconsin. Therefore, one of the areas of the surveys looked at with great interest is that which indicates trends in centralization of media resources. The trend over the past 8 years has been clearly toward centralization. However, even with the trend increasing, there still remain in Wisconsin 500-plus schools without centralized libraries, the greatest number being on the elementary level.

A very encouraging statistic identified from the library/ media survey has been that expenditures continue to increase for instructional materials. This can be seen from the table below.

As can be seen from these figures, local effort, at least on a statewide basis, is increasing. School district expenditures for instructional materials doubled between 1965-66 and 1971-72.

While it is true that there is an increasing awareness for the need for more instructional materials one of the major causes for this increase has been the regulations of the ESEA Title II program. In order to be eligible for participation in the ESEA Title II program, schools must insure that "... the funds made available under Title II of the Act for any fiscal year will be so used as to supplement and, to the extent practical, increase the level of state,

local, and private school funds that would in the absence of such funds be made available for school library resources, textbooks, and other printed and published instructional m iterials, and in no case supplant such state, local and private school funds."

As indicated in the next table, while the largest growth area has been that of audiovisual materials, it appears that most schools now consider themselves as having established a basic collection and are again investing fairly equally in all categories of instructional materials. Also, the rate of investment is steadily declining, reflective perhaps of tighter money in the educational sphere.

The increases in expenditures for instructional materials must be looked at in the light of the inflationary period in which they have occurred. Thus, in the 2-year period which percentages in the last column above represent, the cost of books rose by 44% and the cost of periodicals by 29%. Increases in dollar amounts, therefore, did not come near keeping pace with inflationary rises in the category of books and just matched price increases for periodicals.

Suggested state standards for a minimum level of expenditure do take account of inflationary trends. Thus, each time the Department of Public Instruction library survey was conducted the minimum standards were raised, and an ever-increasing number of schools failed to meet minimum expenditure levels. Expenditures for books are illustrative:

In the 1965-66 survey schools were asked to evaluate themselves in terms of how well they were supporting their library programs. This subjectivity may account for the higher figures for that year than for ensuing years when school expenditures were compared with an outside criterion—state minimum standards.

It is to be noted from the preceding table that only in the last 3 years has the number of schools meeting standard expenditure levels for books risen. And still, the percentages of schools involved are very small. This is even more apparent if total per pupil expenditures (all categories of

materials) are examined, for in fiscal year 1971-72, the percentages of schools meeting overall expenditure standards were as follows:

The paucity of Wisconsin public schools which devote what are considered to be adequate financial resources to instructional materials is evident by looking at a state-level summary of per pupil expenditures:

Current state standards for school media programs suggest that \$7 per pupil be spent for books and \$7 per pupil for audiovisual materials. Actual expenditures lag considerably behind that amount.

No matter how much attention is focused on multimedia approaches, books will always be a critical component of an effective library. Thus, all surveys in the past have attempted to measure the adequacy of book collections.

For the years 1965-71 the state standards suggested a book collection of 6,000 volumes or 10 volumes per student, whichever is larger. In 1972 the standard was raised to 8,000 volumes or 12 volumes per student. In spite of the rise in standards, more and more public school book collections are approaching the recommended level. This may relate also to the leveling off or decline of school enrollment numbers.

Periodicals, too, play an important part in supplementing the instructional program. State recommended minimum levels for periodicals have remained constant and schools

have recently made quite a push toward reaching these standards.

Data for 1965-66 and 1969-70 refer only to schools with centralized libraries. Data for 1972-73 are estimates of subscription numbers for all public schools. Thus, in 1973 the percentages of schools reaching state standards for periodical collections were as follows:

Senior high schools:	45%
Junior high schools:	37%
Elementary schools:	20%

These data indicate that while some schools have outstanding periodical collections, the vast majority still have inadequate resources for student and teacher use.

Schools have been placing increasing emphasis upon the acquisition of adequate audiovisual materials for their media programs. Wisconsin's public schools have, in fact, been steadily increasing the proportion of their media budget spent on audiovisual materials—from 16% in 1965-66 to 36% in 1971-72. Further evidence of the above is taken from an analysis of the Common School Fund by districts. During the 1971-72 school year districts used 80% of the Common School Fund for print materials and 20% for audiovisual materials. This is significant since until this past year the law permitted only the purchase of books with the Common School Fund money.

SCHOOL LIBRARY SERVICES

This report paints a less flattering picture of Wisconsin public school media programs than have the previous survey reports. This is true in part because the 1972-73 data refer to all the public schools, centralized or not, while previous data related only to schools with centralized media facilities. In addition, several of the media components were discussed in this report in terms of an outside criterion while some of the comparable figures from previous surveys represented schools' self-evaluation of their status.

Two points can be reemphasized. One is that despite state-level encouragement of centralized media programs and despite developments which have been made in this direction, there still remain in Wisconsin over 500 public school buildings without the services of central library services, the bulk of these being on the elementary level.

The other point of emphasis is that while school district expenditures for instructional materials have been increasing steadily, especially in the area of audiovisual materials, the rate of increase is declining. And this is in the midst of an inflationary spiral which has caused price increases nearly matching the dollar amount increases being made by Wisconsin's schools. The suggested state standard for minimum level of expenditure does take inflation into consideration. And each survey has shown a decreasing number of schools meeting this standard. For 1971-72 only 12% of Wisconsin's public schools reached the recommended level of expenditure for instructional materials.

In the fall of 1972 Wisconsin libraries participated in a demonstration survey sponsored by the National Center for Educational Statistics of the U.S. Office of Education.

Responses to this survey, Library General Information Survey, LIBGIS 1972/73, were received from 83% of Wisconsin's 441 school districts.

The library employee figures as reported on this survey form for fall 1972 showed that the 365 reporting school districts employed a total of 1,489 paid library employees (including library aides, librarians, media specialists, etc.) in full-time equivalents. Of this total 93% were female and 7% were male.

A breakdown of paid library employees by degree level showed the following:

Of those employees with less than a bachelor's degree 99% were female; with a bachelor's degree 92% were female; with a fifth-year degree in library science 83% were female; with a fifth-year degree in a field other than library science 82% were female.

Figures from the DPI School District Fall Report, 1973 show that in the fall of 1973 there were 1,202 certified librarians working in Wisconsin's 437 school districts.
