ABSTRACT

Demographic and socioeconomic characteristics of populations resident in the 200 larger school districts in the State of Washington are delineated in this second in a series of three reports. This report is designed to furnish detailed demographic aspects of such data for the State educational programs. To implement this objective, tabular demographic and socioeconomic data from the 1970 U.S. Census have been portrayed for each of Washington's 200 largest school districts, as well as for the State as a whole. Particular emphasis has been placed on needs assessment data required by the Urban, Racial, and Rural Disadvantaged Programs of the Office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The demographic and socioeconomic profiles are also designed to be of value in administering other categorical aid programs, as well as a wide variety of educational and curricular programs. The majority of the document is comprised of tabular data and charts. (Author/AH)

To Those Involved in Washington Education:

Population Profiles, Vol. 2, is the second in a series of three analyses of the demographic and socio-economic characteristics relevant to Washington State school districts. This series is unique within the United States in terms of the details offered to school administrators, teachers and other citizens who are attempting to use limited resources to solve major education problems.

In planning special education programs for children with special kinds of problems, it is particularly important that their needs be identified as clearly as possible. This publication, when used in conjunction with Vol. 1 of Population Profiles (and with soon to be issued Vol. 3), is intended to offer this kind of help in strengthening educational programs, not only for disadvantaged children, but for all youngsters in Washington schools.

The Population Profiles series describes the marked differences that exist between school district populations in terms of ethnic and racial background, cultural and linguistic heritages, age groupings, household structures, educational levels, parental occupations, as well as their degree of affluence. This research data also provides a basis for comparison with national norms.

Even though Population Profiles was intended initially as one of several steps to insure that Urban, Rural, Racial and Disadvantaged funds were used in the most effective manner possible, it also should prove useful in strengthening needs assessment for other programs at both the local and state level. It should help program planners identify the educational disadvantages that result from economic, ethnic and geographic isolation.

Population Profiles is just one part of the overall process used by the Grants Management Section to strengthen program accountability. But it is a vital part of the foundation upon which that process rests.

INDICES OF SCHOOL DISTRICT DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIOECONOMIC DATA  
TABLE AND MAPS

The tabular indices on pages vi to xv are arranged to facilitate finding pertinent tabular or map references. The columns titled "Proportion of Census Tract or CCD Population Residing within School District Boundaries" are designed to show the constituent census tracts or county census divisions in each school district for map location purposes. Counties with census tracts are denoted by a "T" in the previous column (census tracts are identified by three digit numbers, e.g., Pierce County census tracts 720 and 721.01 are in the Clover Park School District). Counties with census county divisions are denoted by a "D" (census county divisions are identified by two digit numbers or by the CCD names, e.g., Grays Harbor census county divisions 12 and Aberdeen are in the Aberdeen School District). Where more than half the population of a given census tract or CCD were in a specific school district, the census tract or CCD was listed in the 50.00% and over column. Other constituent school district subareas are listed in the 5.00% to 49.99% column. Subareas with less than 5.00% of the census tract or CCD population but with more than 50 persons in the school district attendance area are also so listed.

The Battle Ground School District is in ISD 112. Its demographic characteristics are portrayed on page 132 in Table ISD 112 A-1. Its socioeconomic characteristics are outlined on page 133 in Table ISD 112 A-2. Over half of Clark County census tracts 404 (76%), 407 (53%), and 408 (64%) were in the Battle Ground School District. In addition census tracts 401 (49%), 402 (24%) and 405.01 (33%) also contributed population (percent shown parenthetically) to the Battle Ground School District. The census tract locations are depicted in Figure 15 on page 129.

Introductory Background

This report, which delineates the demographic and socioeconomic characteristics of the populations resident in the 200 larger school districts, is the second of a trilogy. The first, published in November 1972, details demographic and socioeconomic data from the 1970 U.S. Census for each of

Washington's 49 legislative districts. The prime objective of that study was to identify and describe the subareas of each legislative district where the population characteristics were such as to indicate distinct adverse cultural, environmental, economic, or familial circumstances resulting in an above average concentration of "disadvantaged students." The two reports should be used in conjunction. In utilizing the two reports it should be borne in mind that the first, the legislative district characteristics report, deleted transient military population, whereas the second, the larger school district characteristics report, included all the populace. The third report in the trilogy, to be published in August 1973, will detail the population characteristics profiles of each of the remaining 114 smaller school districts.

## CENSUS DEFINITIONS

The majority of census categorizations used herein are self-explanatory. Definitions of those categories most frequently evoking questions are given in the following paragraphs:

Persons of Spanish Language - These comprise persons of Spanish mother tongue and all other persons in families in which the head or wife reported Spanish as his or her mother tongue. This is a heritage, not a racial category. Nearly all persons of Spanish language are classified as white by the Bureau of the Census. Of the 70,734 persons of Spanish language in Washington in 1970, eighty-one (81) percent (57,358) were listed by the census as of Spanish origin. The ancestral heritage of the overwhelming majority of these were undoubtedly Mexican. Many of the knowledgeable individuals who work closely with the State's Mexican-American populace are of the opinion there was a degree of undercounting of "Persons of Spanish Language" particularly those in lower socioeconomic areas. Representatives of other minorities have voiced similar concerns regarding undercounting of their particular group.

No data on the Spanish surname category were detailed for the State of Washington. The Spanish surname category was reported by the 1970 U.S. Census only for the five southwestern states of Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas. Persons with Spanish surnames in these states were identified by means of a compiled list of over 8,000 patronymics.

Other - Other used in conjunction with Blacks and Indians as the residual non-whites includes, Eskimos, Filipinos, Japanese, Polynesians, etc.

Foreign Stock - The category "Foreign Stock" includes the foreign-born population and the native population of foreign or mixed (one foreign-born



parent) parentage. Persons of foreign stock, thus, comprise all first and second generation Americans. Third and subsequent generations in the United States are described as "Native of native parentage."

Mother Tongue - Mother tongue was the language spoken in the person's home when he was a child.

Age - Age is based on the age of the person in completed years on April first of the census year.

Medians and Means - The median age is that age which divides the age distribution into two equal parts, one half being older than the median age and the other half younger. Similar definitions are applicable to housing values and family income. The mean (or average) housing value was obtained by dividing the aggregate total housing value by the total number of houses.

Living in Group Quarters - All living arrangements other than in households are classified by the Bureau of the Census as Group Quarters. Group Quarters includes correctional institutions, nursing and convalescent homes, rooming and boarding houses, ships, communes, dormitories, convents, mental hospitals, military barracks, fraternity houses, etc.

Household Head - Two types of household head are distinguished, the head of a family and a primary individual. A family head is a person living with one or more persons related by blood, marriage or adoption. A primary individual is a household head living alone or with non-relatives only.

Value - Value of an owner-occupied home is the respondent's estimate of the sale value of the house and lot.

Family Income - The 1969 incomes of all family members 14 years old and over are summed and treated as a single amount.

Poverty Level - The poverty level threshold has a range of income cut-off adjusted by such factors as family size, sex and age of the family head, number of children under 18 years old, and farm and non-farm residence. In 1969 the poverty thresholds ranged from \$1,487 for a single female 65 years old and living on a farm to \$6,116 for a non-farm family of seven with a male head. In 1969 the average poverty level threshold for a non-farm family of four headed by a male was \$3,745. Poverty level thresholds are computed on a national basis only and are revised annually to allow for changes in the cost of living.

Employment Status - Most of the employment status data in the 1970 Census reports related to persons 16 years old and over. In 1960, 1950, and 1940 employment status data were presented for persons 14 years old and over. The change was made to achieve conformity with the official measurement of the labor force as revised in January 1967.

Labor Force - All persons 16 years old and over are classified dichotomously as either "Not in the Labor Force" or "In the Labor Force." The Labor Force includes all persons in the Civilian Labor Force plus members of the Armed Forces on active duty. The Civilian Labor Force consists of persons classified as Employed or Unemployed (looking for and/or hopeful of employment). The Employed Civilian Labor Force is grossly categorized as White Collar Workers, Blue Collar Workers, Service Workers, and Farm Workers. There are major subcategories within these categories. The subcategories in turn may be further classified in considerable detail; thus, certain workers in the Craftsmen category portion of Blue Collar Workers are classed as Mechanics, who in turn are subclassified as Automobile Mechanics, or Mechanics except Automobile.

Census Tracts and Census County Divisions - The basic units for census data statistical tabulations are census tracts and census county divisions.

Census tracts are small areas into which large cities and adjacent suburban areas have been divided for statistical purposes. Tract boundaries were established cooperatively by local committee and the Bureau of the Census, and were generally designed to be relatively uniform with respect to population characteristics, economic status, and living conditions. Tract boundaries were established with the intention of being maintained over a long time so that comparisons may be made from census to census.

Census county divisions (CCD's) represent areas which have been delineated by the Census Bureau with the cooperation of the State's Governor and cognizant officials. CCD's have relatively permanent boundaries, which generally follow physical features or the limits of incorporated places. In 1950 the State of Washington pioneered in the establishment of CCD's for use in the census. By 1970 twenty other states had followed Washington's lead. All counties in Washington have CCD's. Seven counties (Benton, Clark, Franklin, King, Pierce, Snohomish and Spokane) additionally are subdivided by census tracts. In all states, except Washington, CCD's have names. In Washington most of the divisions are numbered rather than named. Thus, Adams County has ten numbered divisions; Asotin has one named and two numbered divisions; Chelan County has nine named divisions; and Yakima County has 37 numbered and five named divisions. The five major incorporated cities of Yakima County are the named divisions: Selah, Sunnyside, Toppanish, Wapato, and Yakima.

Census tracts and CCD's are further subdivided into enumeration districts, block groups and, in some cases, blocks. Most socioeconomic data are available only at the census tract or CCD level.

Census tract and CCD data are gathered by other agencies than the Bureau of the Census, e.g., case worker report summaries of the juvenile court frequently are tabulated by census tract, as are crime reports of police departments.

## 1970 CENSUS OF POPULATION AND HOUSING

The results of the April 1970 Census of Population and Housing have been and are still being issued by the U.S. Bureau of the Census in the form of printed reports and computer tapes. In developing the data for the tabulations in this report, recourse was taken to approximately a dozen published reports detailing census data for Washington. In addition, similar Washington census publications for previous censal years were studied to evaluate trends, and 1960 and 1970 census reports from other states were likewise studied to note similarities or differences. Pertinent census tape tabulation printouts were obtained or programmed.

There are several thousand census items available, ranging from the number of persons in an individual census tract who are over 18 to the number of clothes dryers which are gas heated in a given community. It was believed that optimum arrangement called for not more than 28 items shown as an entity in a single tabulation. Demographic (usually based on 100% data) and socioeconomic (usually based on sample data) items for a given school district were shown as separate, but facing, tabulations. Available census items were studied, tested, restudied, and retested before final acceptance. The relative value of the census items in arriving at needs assessment, educational, and curricular decisions was the prime criterion for acceptance.

## TABULAR DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIOECONOMIC CATEGORIES

The following paragraphs briefly describe the import and highlights of the demographic and socioeconomic categories selected for incorporation in this report. Details of the import of data items from specific areas will be discussed as deemed warranted.

### Sex and Ethnic Data

Relative sex ratios are obviously of import in birth ratio data and are of distinct significance in labor force categorizations.

Ethnic and minority (non-whites plus persons of Spanish language) percentages are reported for each school district.

### Age Group Distribution

The relative number of under fives are of importance in forecasting future school enrollment trends. This facet is discussed more fully under a separate section on population pyramids. Persons 5 to 17 years of age are nearly all in school, and school enrollment is highly correlated with this group. Persons 18 years and over form the voting population, which varies in individual school districts from 56% of the population to over 80%. The statistics on 18 to 24 year olds are markedly affected by the presence of a college or military installation in the area. Persons 25 to 44, in the main, comprise the parents of school age students. Persons 45 to 64, in general, are workers whose children are in or have finished high school. Persons 65 years and over are basically retired.

### Family and Household Data

The percentage of persons in group quarters is abnormally high in college areas, military installation areas, and penal and other institutional

areas. The percent of primary individuals is highest in urban areas and lowest in suburban "bedroom" areas. The percent of families with children under 18 is generally lowest in urban areas and highest in suburban "bedroom" areas. The percent of children in families with females heads is usually highest in urban areas. Renter-occupied household percentages are highest in urban areas and lowest in suburban "bedroom" areas. Rental and housing values, in the main, are a function of socioeconomic status.

#### Schooling and Educational Level Data

Adult schooling status is, in general, an excellent indicator of socioeconomic status as measured by housing value, income and occupational category status. The percent of males 16 to 21 enrolled in school is an indicator of continuing post-secondary education. The percent of males 16 to 21 not enrolled in school, and who are not high school graduates, is an indicator of high school dropouts. Care in using these indicators is necessary since an atypical number of young males can deflate or inflate the percentages. This is particularly evident in college or military installation areas.

#### Income and Poverty Level Data

Income level data are obviously highly correlated with socioeconomic status. It should be borne in mind that in college areas (particularly those with a high proportion of graduate students), such as the Pullman School District, there will be a high level of college graduates but not necessarily a high level of income. Income levels in urban areas are not strictly comparable to income levels in rural agriculturally oriented areas. Poverty level data indicated that a significant proportion of the poverty level families were headed by females with children under 18.



### Employed Labor Force

The percent of females in the labor force generally varies from 30% or less in the rural areas to over 45% in the older urban areas. The percent of persons in professional and managerial vocations is highly correlated with other socioeconomic indicators.

### Percentages

In each district tabulation there are two columns labelled "Base of Percent" and "Percent of Base." These columns were incorporated to denote the bases from which percentages were computed. Letter symbolization used was mnemonic: A for adults, E for employed, T for total population, T 18- for total population under 18 years, H for households, etc. The percentage of primary family type households was based on the number of households "H." The percentage of primary families with children under 18 years of age was based on the number of primary families "F." The percentage of high school graduates was based on the number of adults, 25 years of age and over "A."

## SCHOOL DISTRICT GEOGRAPHIC REFERENCE FILE AND CENSUS DATA TREATMENT

A School District Geographic Reference File and a School District/First Count Summary data project was developed by the Census Bureau, under the sponsorship of and in cooperation with the Office of Education, to provide 1970 decennial census data corresponding to school district boundaries. The school districts included in this project, for the State of Washington, were, in theory, all of those with 1970 enrollments of more than 300 students. A School District Geographic Reference File was developed for each county of each state identifying fractional or entire enumeration districts or block groups within each school district. This data was stored in a summary census tape. For the Washington State data the tape printout of the geographic reference file only (percent of each enumeration district in each school district) involved 167 pages of 37 lines each. These data were aggregated by school district to census tracts and CCD's for the appropriate county, and the resultant percentage of each tract or CCD in each county was computed. Checks of the data printouts against school district boundary maps were made. Tape errors of omission and commission were found and appropriately corrected.

Several school districts with sizeable enrollments were not included in the data summary, e.g., Coupeville School District (Island County) with over 600 students enrolled. Detail boundary maps of the affected school districts were obtained and discussions held with cognizant county planners. The school district's percentage of population in each enumeration district was estimated as closely as possible using population density maps (or even aerial surveys, if available). A sizeable number of school districts in the 300 to 400 student enrollment range were not included in the summary tape data.

In other cases school districts with quite small enrollments were included in the tape summary data printouts, e.g., Anderson Island School District in Pierce County with 42 students. It was, therefore, decided to limit the scope of this report to school districts with over 400 students enrolled. There were 195 such school districts. There were five non-high school or non-kindergarten school districts with enrollments between 300 and 400. These school districts were also included in this first phase of the school district profiles. There currently are 314 school districts in Washington State. This report covers 200 of them.

The geographic bases (in terms of population percentages of enumeration districts) of the remaining 114 smaller school districts have been or are in process of being determined from pertinent school maps and census maps, with the cooperation of cognizant county planners. These data will be used in developing profiles of the smaller districts.

In the course of the checking process, other tape errors were found. In several instances the printouts showed duplication of territory, and the cumulative percentages of population assigned to school districts in a given enumeration district totalled as high as 150%. These cases were resolved with the assistance of pertinent maps and cognizant county planners. In other cases the territory indicated by the computer printout was at variance with the actual school district boundaries. These, also, were resolved. The personnel of the Intermediate School Districts were most helpful as were county planners, engineers, assessors and voting registrars.

Computer printouts of socioeconomic and demographic data for each census tract and CCD in the State were obtained and the data processed, e.g., occupational categories were combined to obtain desired breakdowns.

In many instances school district boundaries cut across census tracts or CCD's. As many as five school districts might have territory within a single census tract. Census tract counts ranged from eight in Franklin County to 252 in King County. County census divisions ranged from two in Garfield County to 44 in Yakima County.

Proportional allocation of demographic and socioeconomic data in forms of population percentages were made for each school district and its component whole or fractional tracts or CCD's. The aggregated data for each item represented the demographic or socioeconomic data for the school district as a whole. In the interests of ease of comparability, applicable percentages and medians were computed for the demographic and socioeconomic data. Median values were computed on the basis of data intervals shown in the tabular presentations and may vary slightly from published medians derived from different intervals.

Published population statistics for Chelan County, King County (about fifty census tracts), Pierce County, Thurston County, and Yakima County were subsequently revised by the Bureau of the Census. The latest available Bureau of the Census revisions for total population were utilized in developing this report.

Published demographic and socioeconomic data in some instances were based on earlier reported different populations. Thus, published data for King County Census Tract 300 in Legislative District 30 were based on a population of 7,333; later Census Bureau revisions changed the total population to 10,027, resulting in correction factor of 1.3674. Appropriate corrections were made in demographic and socioeconomic data items for this tract and also for other tracts on CCD's showing changes between published populations and revised populations.

In addition to corrections in data dictated by incorporating Bureau of the Census revisions, a limited number of corrections were made of illogical or inconsistent data. Nearly all of these involved sampling data. Appropriate logical techniques and rationale were utilized to determine the most probable valid data and indicated corrections were made. The census data were basically believed to be representative. Data discrepancies, in general, were few and far between, and corrective actions were taken in the interests of accuracy of the demographic and socioeconomic profiles of the affected areas.

One of the major problems encountered involved the fractional enumeration district population allocations to school districts. The Census Bureau made population allocations on a strictly geographic area basis without reference to population density variations within enumeration districts. Terrain and land use characteristics of Washington State dictate a very high degree of population density variations within even limited geographic areas, particularly in rural regions. In so far as possible the data presented herein have been modified to reflect population density characteristics of the fractional portions of enumeration districts in the larger school districts. Painstaking detailed population distribution determinations for the smaller school districts will undoubtedly result in minor changes in the population profiles of a few of the contiguous larger school districts. The slightly changed profiles of these districts will be detailed in the forthcoming Population Profiles III.

1970 DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIOECONOMIC PROFILES OF THE POPULATIONS  
OF WASHINGTON STATE SCHOOL DISTRICTS WITH OVER 400 STUDENTS

The tabular demographic and socioeconomic data for the 200 largest school districts in Washington State are primarily arranged by the Intermediate School Districts in which they are located. The 25 school districts in ISD 101, which includes Ferry, Lincoln, Pend Orielle, Spokane, Stevens, and Whitman counties, are presented in six sets of tables. The first set of tables summarizes the data for the ISD (101), then the data for the largest school district in the ISD (Spokane) followed by other school districts in alphabetical order (Central Valley, Cheney and Chewelah). Four or five school districts are reported on each subsequent set of tables. Each set is presented in two facing parts, Part 1, "Demographic Data Profiles" and Part 2, "Socioeconomic Data Profiles." Tabular data for the other eleven Intermediate School Districts are similarly arranged. Intermediate School District Summaries are arranged and summarized in geographically contiguous groups of three.

Table ISD-B summarizes and details demographic and socioeconomic profiles of the three eastern Washington ISD's: ISD 101, ISD 104 and ISD 123. Figure 1 shows the location of these three ISD's and also the boundaries of the nine other ISD's. Figures 2 and 3 are census tract maps of Spokane and its environs. Figures 4 and 5 are census county division maps of northeast and southeast Washington.

Demographic and socioeconomic profile data for ISD 101 and its constituent school districts are shown following the data summary for eastern Washington as are data for ISD 104 and ISD 123 and their constituent school districts.

Table ISD-C summarizes and details demographic and socioeconomic profiles of the three central and northwestern ISD's: ISD 105, ISD 108 and ISD 167. Figure 6 is a census county division map of northwest Washington.

Table ISD-D summarizes and details the demographic and socioeconomic profiles of the three ISD's in metropolitan western Washington: ISD 109 (Snohomish County), ISD 110 (King County), and ISD 111 (Pierce County). Figure 7 is a census tract map of northern Snohomish County and the eastern areas of King and Snohomish Counties. Figure 8 is a census tract map of southwestern Snohomish County and the north central portion of King County. Figure 9 is a census tract map of Everett and vicinity in Snohomish County. Figure 10 is a census tract map of the southwestern half of King County. Figure 11 is a census tract map of Seattle. Figure 12 is a map of the Pierce County census tracts peripheral to Tacoma. Figure 13 is a census tract map of Tacoma and its environs.

Table ISD-E summarizes and details the demographic and socioeconomic profiles of the three ISD's in southwestern and coastal Washington: ISD 112, ISD 113, and ISD 114. Figure 14 is a census county division map of southwestern Washington. Figure 15 is a census tract map of Vancouver and Clark County.

Table ISD-A is a 200 school district summary of the demographic and socioeconomic data for the State of Washington. Comparative summaries of the four ISD groups of three are also shown. Table 1 shows the population of each county in each ISD. It will be noted that the 200 districts of over 400 students account for 97.5% of the State's population. The remaining 114 school districts (those with less than 400 students) account for 2.2% of the total public school students and 2.5% of the State's population.



A brief writeup of the salient features of each Intermediate School District will be presented in the following subsections of this report. Table 2 depicts the relative 1970 demographic and socio-economic criteria rankings of selected characteristics of Washington Intermediate School Districts and their constituent individual school districts. This tabulation has been designed to assist in evaluating criteria characteristic values. The range between the highest five percent of school districts, the range of the middle ninety percent, and the range for the lowest five percent are shown as are the statewide summary averages for the 200 school districts included. Thus, the school district with the lowest percentage of children under five years old was Leavenworth with 5.3% and the highest was Federal Way with 11.8%. Ninety percent of the school districts were in the 6.1% to 10.8% range and the statewide average for 1970 was 8.3% (which contrasts with 11.2% in 1960). Selective out-migration of younger parents and drastically decreased statewide birth rates have probably reduced this 1970 figure to approximately 7% of under five year olds in the 1973 population.

Noteworthy characteristics of constituent school districts of each ISD will be briefly discussed. Supplementary tables presenting specific demographic aspects of the State of Washington are discussed in other sections of this report. Relevant national data are also portrayed and discussed.

EASTERN WASHINGTON  
INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL DISTRICTS 101, 104, AND 123

Intermediate School District 101

The Spokane School District accounted for slightly over half the population of ISD 101, and its urban nature affected the overall statistics for ISD 101. The balance of Spokane County is in ISD 101 as are Ferry, Lincoln, Pend Oreille, Stevens and Whitman Counties.

ISD 101 had relatively low percentages of minorities. The median age was in the middle range of the ISD's, and median ages ranged from 22.3 years in Pullman to 40.4 years in Davenport. Pullman with its 49.0% of persons in the 18 to 24 age group is distinctly atypical, as is Cheney. The Pullman School District also had the lowest percentage (19.8%) of under eighteens in the State. Spokane was among the 5% of school districts with the highest percentages of under eighteens in families with female heads and so were Yakima, Seattle, Tacoma and Olympia. ISD 101 ranked second in the State in percent of high school graduates, however, its income level did not keep correlative pace and was somewhat lower than the State average. Median family incomes in ISD 101 ranged from \$6,324 in the Mary Walker School District to \$11,032 in the Mead School District. ISD 101 ranked fourth in poverty level status of the 12 ISD's. Three school districts Kettle Falls, Mary Walker, and Newport, had more than 20% of their under eighteens in poverty level families. ISD 101 ranked third in professional and managerial employees, twelfth in craftsmen and sixth in farmers and farm workers.

ISD 101 ranked first in percent of employed females. In this connection it is of interest to note that the percent of females in the employed labor force were highest in those school district attendance areas where there

were colleges, military installations, sanitarium, or urban concentrations. Most of the higher concentrations of employed females were in the following school districts: Medical Lake (55.5%), Pullman (42.5%), Cheney (42.4%), Ellensburg (41.2%), College Place (43.9%), Clover Park (44.8%), Steilacoom (41.9%), Oak Harbor (48.3%), Olympia (40.8%), Spokane (40.1%), and Seattle (42.2%).

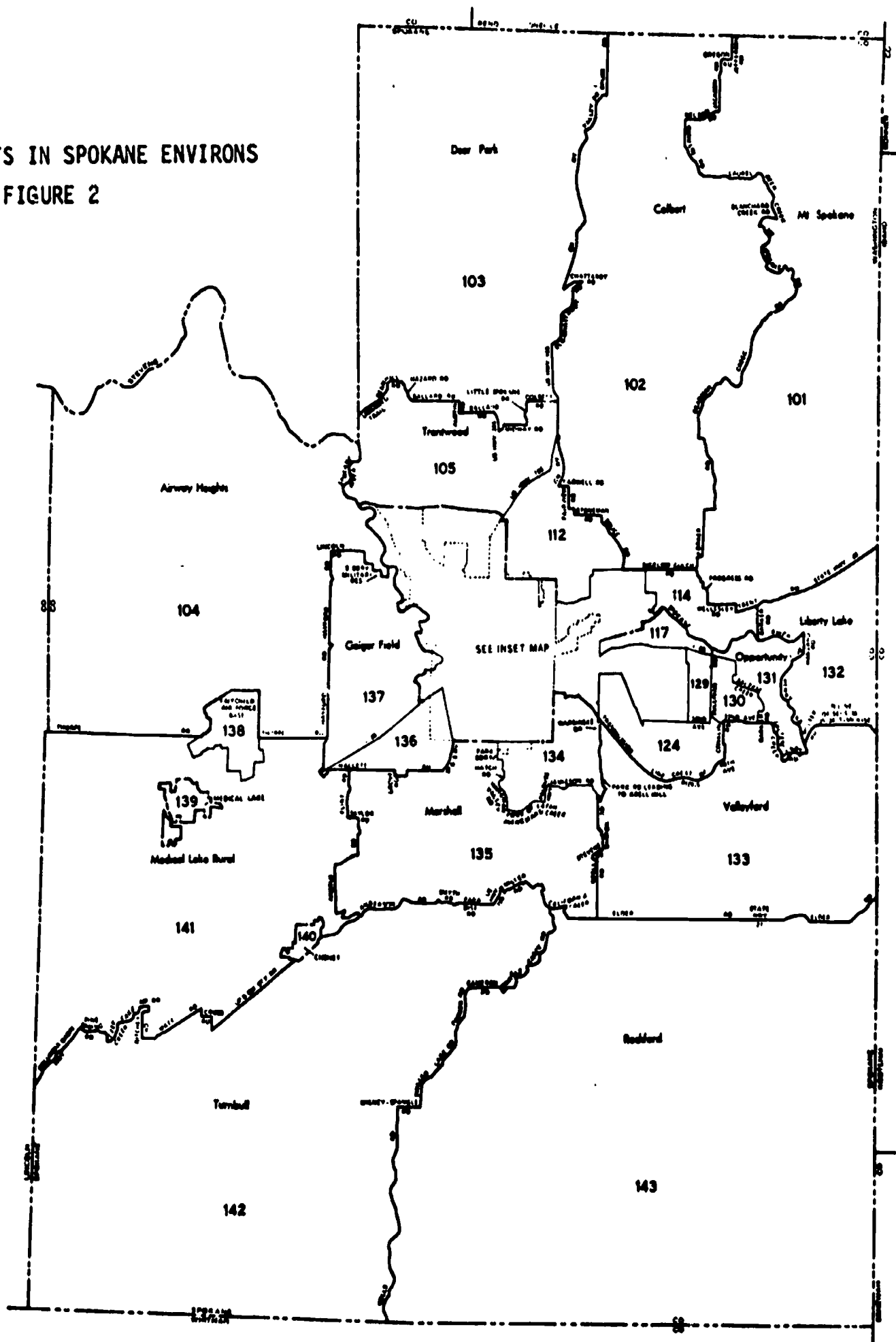
#### Intermediate School District 104

This was the smallest ISD in total population and is located primarily in Grant and Adams Counties. The Moses Lake School District accounted for 36.8% of the population of ISD 104. ISD 104 had the highest minority percentage of any ISD, primarily due to its high percentage of persons of Spanish language. It had the highest percentage of children under eighteen and the second lowest median age. The Royal School District had the highest percent of children under eighteen (46.7%) and the lowest median age in the State (20.6 years). ISD 104 had the lowest percentage of owner occupied housing and the lowest average housing value. The Moses Lake and Ephrata School Districts both had a relatively high percent of children in families headed by a female. Royal had the highest percent of family households in the State. ISD 104 ranked eighth in percent of high school graduates and ranked tenth in income level. Median family incomes in ISD 104 ranged from \$7,345 in the Soap Lake School District to \$10,071 in the Grand Coulee Dam School District. It shared with ISD 105 first and second ranking in the poverty level indices. Four school districts, Moses Lake, Quincy, Royal and Soap Lake, had more than 20% of their under eighteens in poverty level families. ISD 104 ranked first in percentage of farmers and farm workers.

### Intermediate School District 123

This ISD embraces southeastern Washington and includes Asotin, Benton, Columbia, Franklin, Garfield and Walla Walla Counties. The Richland School District accounted for 21.0% of the student population of ISD 123 and 18.6% of the total population, the Kennewick School District for 20.8% of the students and 18.4% of the total population, and the Walla Walla School District accounted for 17.2% of the students and 20.1% of the total population. It ranked third in percentage of persons of Spanish language and eighth in percentage of non-whites, approximately 60% of whom are Black. Nearly half the Blacks in ISD 123 reside in census tract 201 in the Pasco School District. It ranked fifth in median age with median ages ranging from 22.1 years in the North Franklin School District to 37.1 years in the Dayton School District. ISD 123 ranked third in education level and fourth in income level among the 12 ISD's. The Richland School District with 77.8% of high school graduates ranked fifth in educational level of all the State's school districts and was in the top 5% of school districts in terms of family income level. Median family incomes ranged from \$8,112 in the Pomeroy School District to \$11,574 in the Richland School District. ISD 123 ranked seventh in percent of poverty level families and had a somewhat higher index than the State average of poverty level indicators. The Dayton School District had 29.2% of its under eighteens in poverty level families. ISD 123 ranked second in percent of persons in professional and managerial pursuits, eleventh in percent of craftsmen, and fourth in percent of farmers and farm workers.

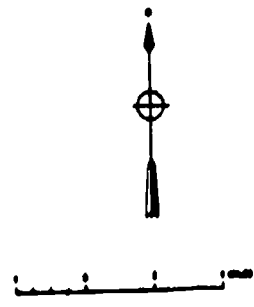

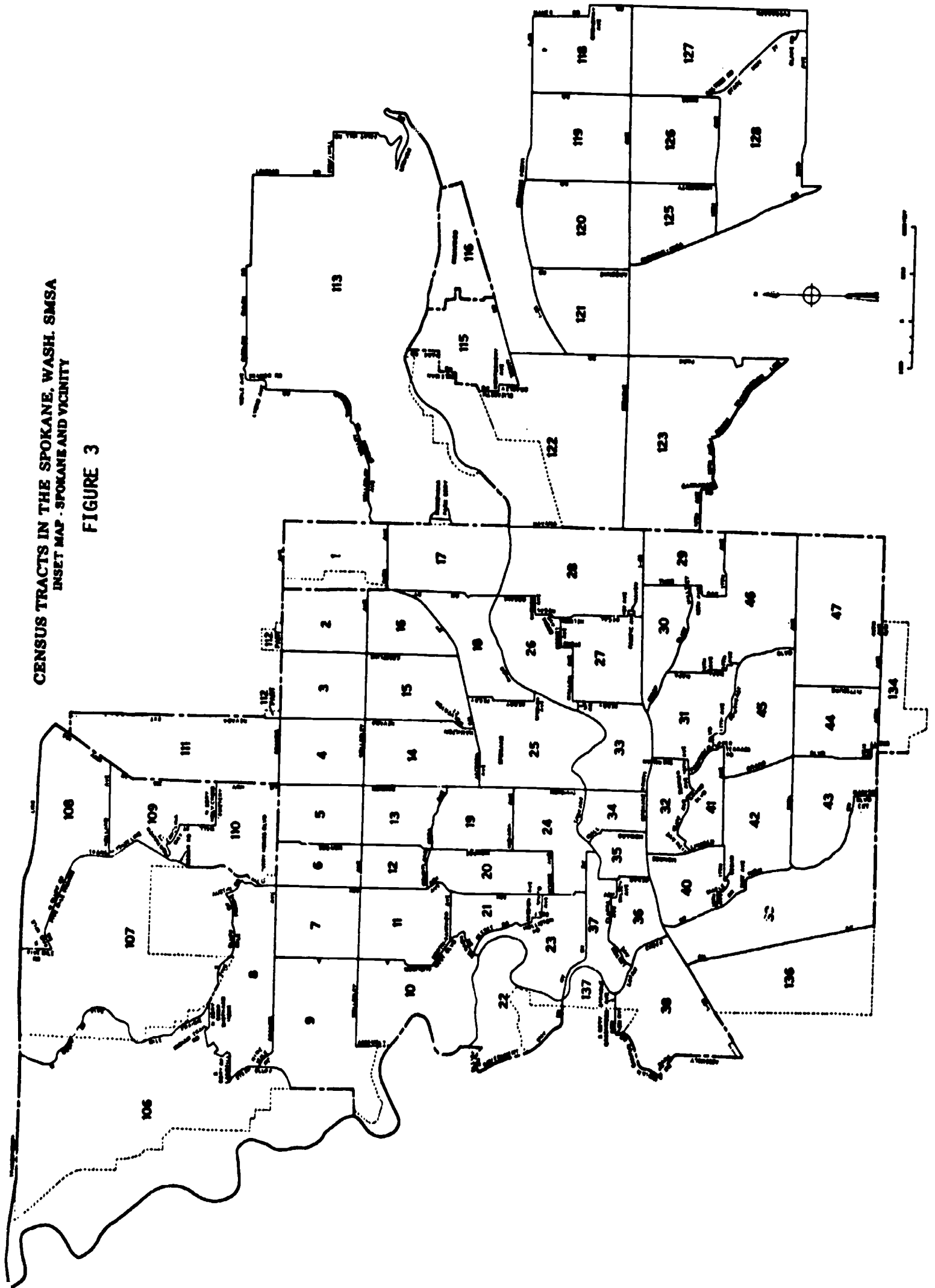

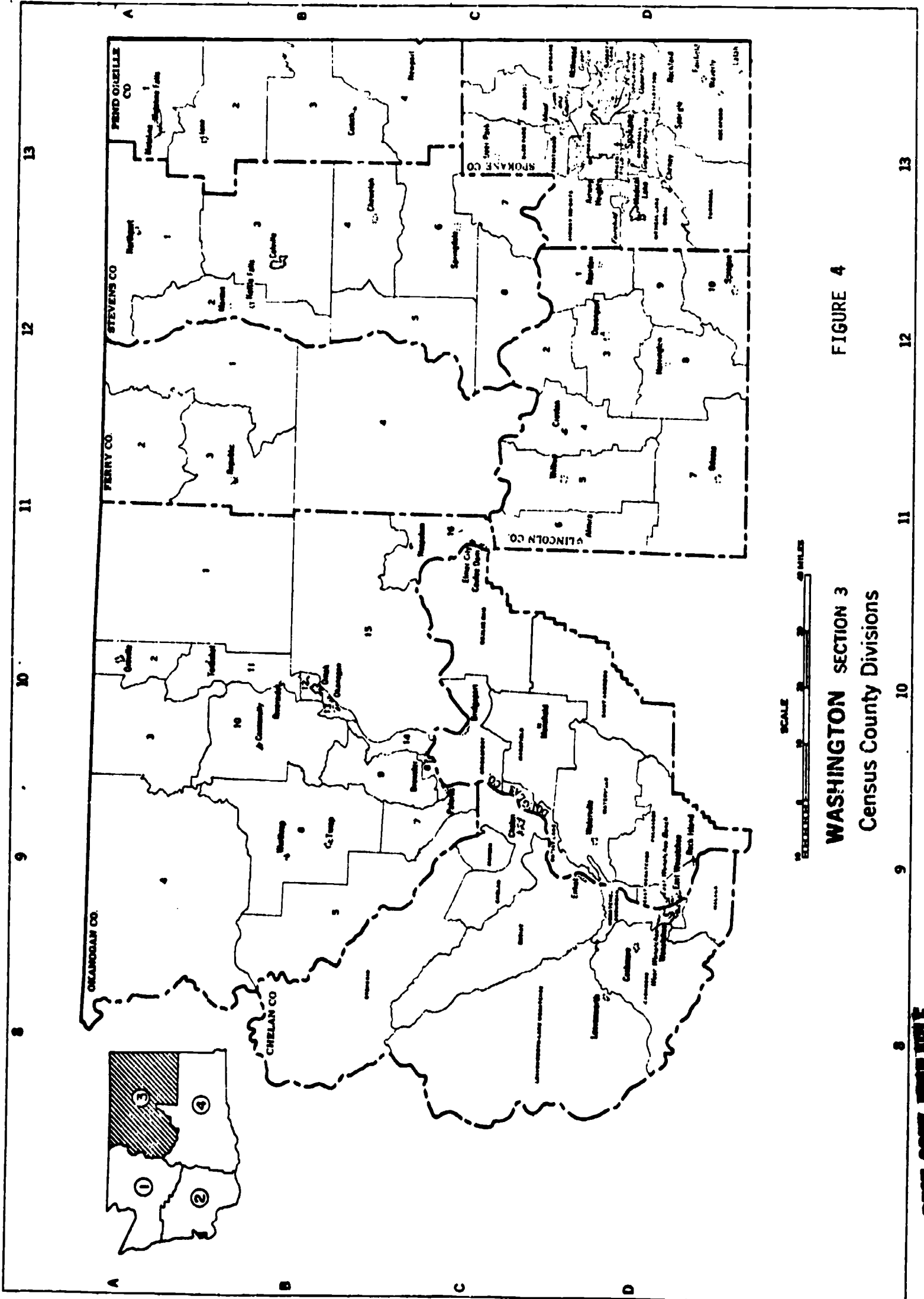
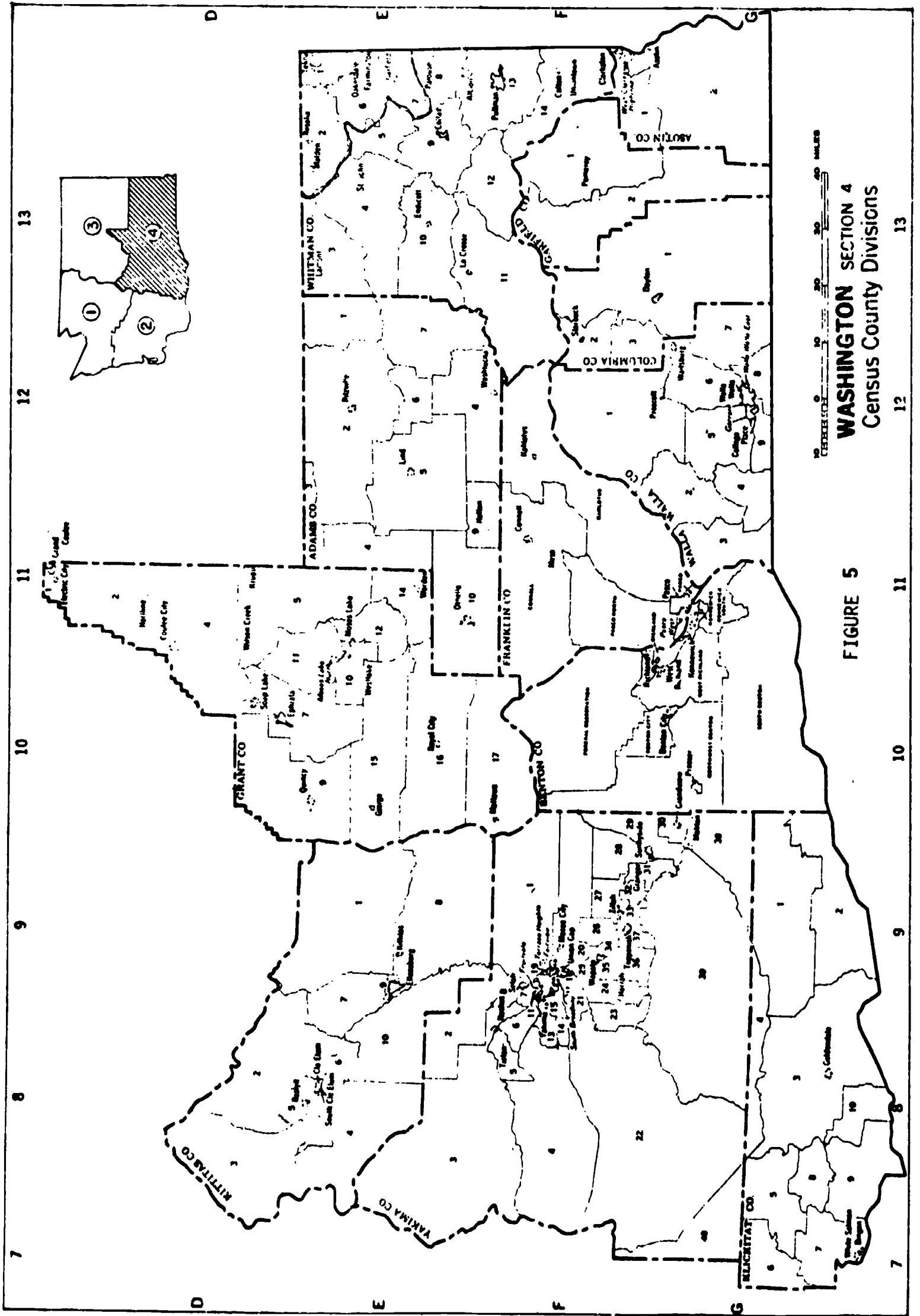

CENTRAL AND NORTHWESTERN WASHINGTON  
INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL DISTRICTS 105, 108, AND 167

Intermediate School District 105

Yakima County accounts for the bulk of the ISD 105 population. ISD 105 also includes Kittitas County and approximately half of Klickitat County. The Yakima School District contained 31.8% of ISD 105's population. ISD 105 ranked second in percent of persons of Spanish language and third in percent of non-whites. Over half the non-whites are Indians, and ISD 105 ranked first in the State in percent of Indians. Mabton with 35.2% and Granger with 33.9% led the State's school districts in percent of persons of Spanish language. The Mount Adams School District with 27.3% of Indians had the highest non-white population in the State. The median age of the population of ISD 105 (27.8 years) was nearly the same as that of the State as a whole. Median ages in ISD 105 ranged from Mabton's 21.8 years to Cle Elum-Roslyn's 37.6 years. The Yakima School District with 15.2% had the highest percentage in the State of children under eighteen in families headed by females. Union Gap with 14.9% ranked second. Mabton had the lowest average owner occupied housing value in the State, \$7,630. ISD 105 with 51.5% of adult high school graduates ranked twelfth (the lowest ISD). However, 51.5% is comparable to the overall United States percentage of 52.3%. Union Gap School District with 33.7% high school graduates and 1.5% of college graduates ranked lowest in the State. Mabton with 36.8% of high school graduates ranked second lowest. ISD 105 ranked twelfth in family income level and shared with ISD 104 the highest poverty level indices. Median family income in ISD 105 ranged from \$6,169 (the lowest in the State) in the Mabton School District to \$10,380 in the West Valley (Yakima) School District. Ten school districts, Grandview, Granger, Kittitas, Mabton, Mount Adams, Moxee,



Sunnyside, Toppenish, Union Gap and Zillah had more than 20% of their under eighteens in poverty level families. Granger with 47.2% was the highest in the State. ISD 105 ranked second in percent of farmers and farm workers and eleventh in percent of professional and managerial workers.

#### Intermediate School District 108

San Juan, Skagit and Whatcom Counties and the northern two-thirds of Island County make up ISD 108. ISD 108 ranked sixth in both percent of minority and non-white populations. The Bellingham School District accounted for 30.1% of ISD 108's population. Approximately 60% of the non-white population were Indians. ISD 108 ranked fourth in Indian percentage. La Conner School District with 6.1% persons of Spanish language and 9.1% Indians had the highest percentage minority population in ISD 108. The median age of the population of ISD 108 (27.8 years) was essentially the same as that of the State as a whole. Median ages of school district populations in ISD 108 ranged from Oak Harbor's 22.3 years (affected by Ault Field's military population) to Coupeville's 35.8 years. The percentage of 18 to 24 year olds was also a-typically high in the Bellingham School District (Western Washington State University is the major causal factor). ISD 108 ranked fifth in the average value of owner occupied housing.

ISD 108 ranked fifth in percent of high school graduates and fourth in college graduates. It ranked eighth in income level. The income level was adversely affected by the appreciably higher than normal percent of over 65 year old retirees in this ISD. This factor also affected the poverty level indices where ISD 108 ranked sixth. Median family incomes ranged from \$7,990 in the Concrete School District to \$10,910 in the

La Conner School District. The Concrete School District had 22.6% of under eighteens in poverty level families. ISD 108 ranked fourth in professional and managerial workers and fifth in farmers and farm workers.

#### Intermediate School District 167

This was the second smallest ISD in population and includes Chelan, Douglas and Okanogan Counties. The Wenatchee School District accounted for 35.6% of the population of ISD 167 and the Eastmont School District for 16.3%. ISD 167 had the lowest percentage of persons of Spanish language (0.6%) and ranked ninth in percentage of non-whites. Over 80% of the non-whites were Indians, and ISD 167 ranked second in the State in this category. Omak with 8.6% and Oroville with 6.2% were the school districts with the highest Indian percentages. ISD 167 had the highest median age, 31.1 years. Median ages of school district populations ranged from Eastmont's 27.3 years to Chelan's 36.1 years. Leavenworth School District had the lowest percentage in the State of under five year olds. ISD 167 ranked eleventh in percent of high school graduates and eleventh in median family income. Median family incomes ranged from \$6,955 in the Manson School District to \$9,880 in the Eastmont School District. ISD 167 ranked third in poverty level indices, which are inversely correlated with income level. The Manson School District had 23.4% of the under eighteens in poverty level families. ISD 167 ranked tenth in professional and managerial workers and third in farmers and farm workers. Manson with 49.4% of farmers and farm workers was the highest.

Intermediate School District 109

Snohomish County accounts for 97% of ISD 109. The southern third of Island County accounts for the balance. The Edmonds School District accounted for 36.2% of the population of ISD 109, and the Everett School District for 23.7%. ISD 109 ranked eleventh in percentage of non-whites. Slightly less than half the non-white population were Indians. Marysville with 2.9% of Indians had the highest minority percentage (2.9%). ISD 109 had a relatively low median age (26.6 years) and ranked tenth. Median ages ranged from 24.1 years in the Edmonds School District to 41.5 years in the South Whidbey School District.

The average value of owner occupied housing of both the South Whidbey (\$25,461) and Edmonds (\$25,053) School District were in the top 5% bracket. ISD 109 ranked fourth in percent of high school graduates, who ranged from 48.9% in the Darrington School District to 72.0% in the Edmonds School District. ISD 109 ranked second in median family income. Median family incomes ranged from \$7,602 in the Darrington School District to \$12,045 in the Edmonds School District. Poverty level indices for ISD 109 ranked eleventh. The Darrington School District had 21.3% of under eighteens in poverty level families. ISD 109 ranked twelfth in percent of employed females and third in percent of craftsmen with Mukilteo highest at 42.4%.

Intermediate School District 110

ISD 110 includes 99.9% of King County, the Bainbridge Island School District from Kitsap County, and that portion of Snohomish County that is in the Northshore School District of King County. ISD 110 is by far the largest ISD in the State and included over one-third of the State's

population. The Seattle School District accounted for 45.4% of the ISD 110 population and the Highline School District for 9.5%.

ISD 110 ranked first in the State in percent of non-whites. The non-whites in ISD 110 represented more than 70% of the non-whites in the State. Nearly half (42.4%) of the non-whites in the State live in Seattle. Seattle's white population in 1970 was 87.4%, which is nearly the same as the 87.5% of whites in the total United States. The Black percentage for Seattle was 7.1%, which contrasts with 11.1% nationally. Other races in Seattle were 5.5%; nationally they were 1.4%. Table 3 compares the 1960 and 1970 ethnic populations of the State of Washington and Seattle.

It will be noted that in 1970 over two-thirds of the Chinese in Washington lived in Seattle in contrast to less than one-eighth of the Indians. More than half the Blacks of Washington State were residents of Seattle. Nearly one-third (30.6%) of the civilian Blacks in Washington lived in eight census tracts comprising a three square mile area in Seattle's Central Region. (Washington State had a total 1970 land area of 56,570 square miles.) The foregoing statistic dramatically illustrates the influence of housing patterns on ethnic concentration. Two contrasting items of interest are applicable. In 1970 there were more young Blacks enrolled in Seattle's Garfield High School than there were Blacks of all ages in the entire State of Vermont. On the other side of the coin, Seattle's 7.1% of Black population was almost exactly one-tenth of Washington, D. C.'s, 71.1% of Blacks. The 1960 to 1970 increase in Black population and decrease in White population in Seattle were consonant with national trends. Seattle ranked twenty-second in the total population in the United States, twenty-fourth in Black population in the twenty-five most populous cities, and fifth in "other non-white" population.

Seattle's 7.1% Blacks was the highest of any school district in the State (exclusive of Du Pont, which was overwhelmingly dominated by the military population of Fort Lewis, which was 11.4% Black--the national percentage). The Auburn and Snoqualmie Valley School Districts with 1.7% had the highest percentages of Indians. The Bainbridge Island School District had the highest percent of other races (5.5%). The Mercer Island School District had the highest percent of persons of Spanish language (2.7%) in ISD 110. This is the most affluent school district in the State, and the socioeconomic data for the persons of Spanish language on Mercer Island indicated they have the same degree of affluence as the Island population.

ISD 110 ranked fourth in median age (28.8 years). Median ages ranged from 22.8 years in the Federal Way School District to 33.6 years in the Seattle School District. Federal Way had the State's highest percentage of under fives (11.8); this value contrasted with Seattle's 6.5%. Seattle School District's 14.5% of under eighteens in families headed by females was the third highest in the State. ISD 110 ranked twelfth in percentage of family households. Seattle with 64.7% was the lowest in the State. Federal Way with 90.9% was one of the highest. ISD 110 ranked eleventh in percent of owner occupied homes. The South Central School District was lowest with 52.7% but was closely followed by the Seattle School District with 54.4%. The Tahoma School District had the highest percentage, 83.5. ISD 110 ranked first in average value of owner occupied homes (\$24,625). Values of owner occupied houses ranged from \$16,166 in the Lower Snoqualmie School District to \$41,485 in the Mercer Island School District. The Bellevue School District ranked second with a \$33,620 value.

ISD 110 ranked first in both percentages of adult high school and college graduates. High school graduate percentages ranged from 54.9% in the Enumclaw School District to 92.1% in the Mercer Island School District. College graduate percentages ranged from 7.4% in the Enumclaw School District to 44.4% in the Mercer Island School District. In view of the high correlations between percent of high school graduates and other socioeconomic indicators, it was deemed of interest and value to list the State's top 20 (10% of the 200 largest) school districts in rank order of their percentage of high school graduates. These are Mercer Island, 92.1%; Bellevue, 88.7%; Pullman, 85.6%; Bainbridge Island, 82.4%; Richland, 77.8%; Lake Washington, 76.9%; University Place, 76.1%; Oak Harbor, 75.8%; Shoreline, 75.3%; Federal Way, 74.2% Cheney, 73.8%; Issaquah, 73.3%; Northshore, 72.8%; Clover Park, 72.4%; Edmonds, 72.0%; North Thurston, 71.9%; Coupeville, 71.7%; Mead, 71.5%; Steilacoom, 71.4%; and Vashon Island, 69.9%

In a subsequent section it is shown that Bellevue stood first in the percentage of adult high school graduates among United States cities of 50,000 or over. Mercer Island placed in the top 1% nationally of cities over 10,000 in adult educational level.

ISD 110 ranked first in median family incomes. Median family incomes ranged from \$10,557 in the Enumclaw School District to \$18,136 in the Mercer Island School District. The Bellevue School District with \$15,824 ranked second. A word of caution regarding incomes is in order. Metropolitan western Washington is highly urbanized and incomes in this area are not strictly comparable to incomes in other sections of the State, particularly rural agriculturally oriented communities.

ISD 110 ranked twelfth in all poverty level indices. Percentages of under eighteens in poverty level families ranged from Mercer Island's 1.4% (lowest in the State) to Lower Snoqualmie's 11.5%. Seattle with 9.8% ranked second highest and was the only other ISD 110 school district above the State average of 9.6%.

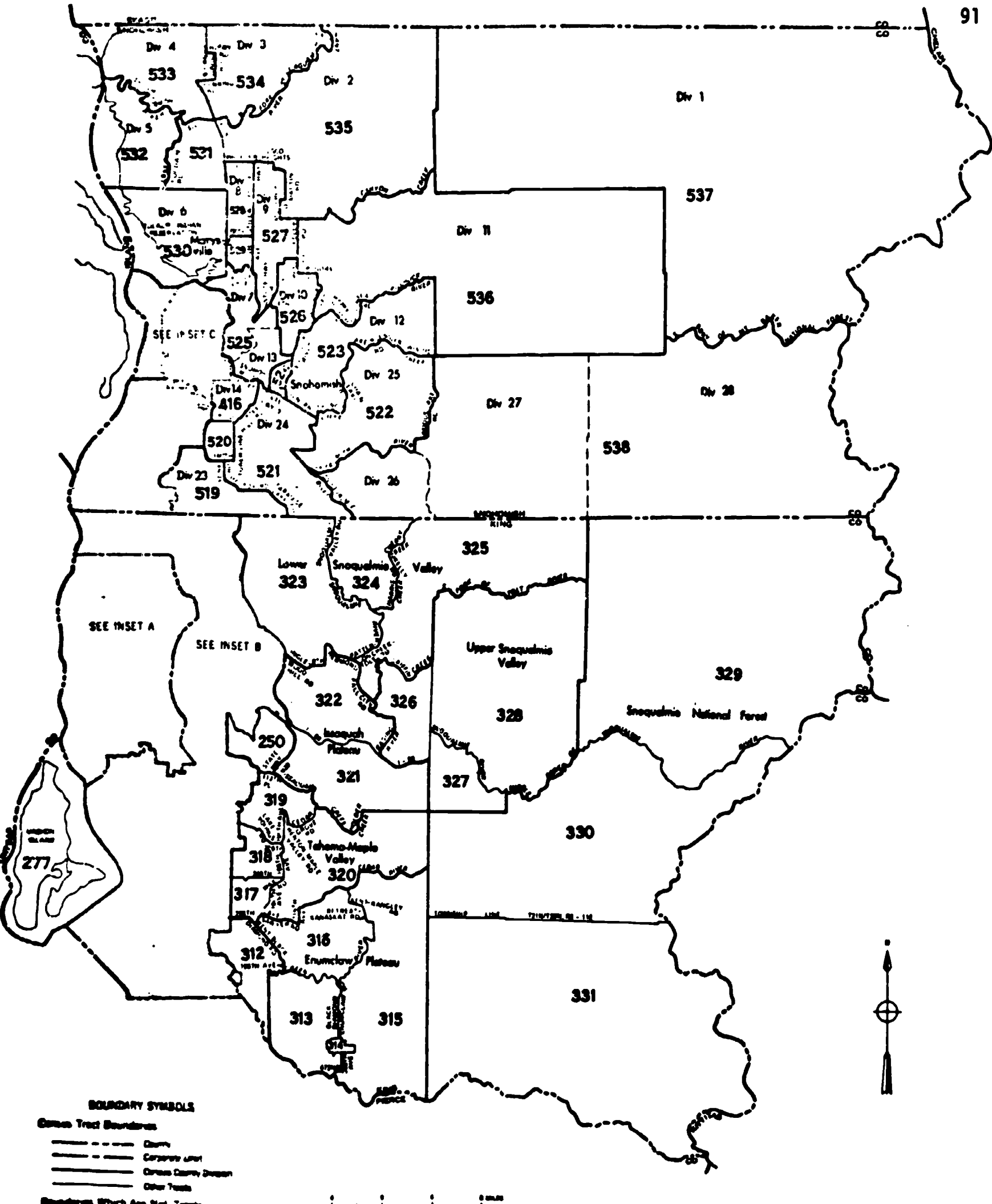
ISD 110 ranked second in percentage of employed females. Seattle with 42.2% was in the top 5% of school districts. ISD 110 led the State in percentages of the labor force employed in professional and managerial pursuits. Percentages ranged from 17.6% in the Snoqualmie Valley School District to 55.4% in the Mercer Island School District (highest in the State). ISD 110 ranked tenth in percent (24.9) of craftsmen and operatives, with the Tacoma School District in the ISD lead with 40.6%. ISD 110 ranked twelfth in percentage of farmers and farm workers.

#### Intermediate School District 111

This ISD has the second largest population and school enrollment. Over 99.9% of the ISD 111 population is in Pierce County. The Tacoma School District accounted for 40.7% of the population of ISD 111 and the Clover Park School District for 19.5%. ISD 111 had the second highest percentage of non-whites and the fourth highest percentage of persons of Spanish language. The ethnic and age-sex distribution percentages of ISD 111, and particularly the Clover Park and Du Pont School Districts, are skewed by the relatively large military populations in Fort Lewis and at the McChord Air Force Base. The Du Pont School District statistics are overwhelmingly dominated by military population characteristics, and since present indications are that the 1973-74 Du Pont School District will not include any portions of the military reservations, the highly atypical Du Pont School District characteristics are not being reported as such in this discussion. They are, however, included in the overall ISD 111 summary.

The Clover Park School District with 10.6% of non-whites (6.7% of Blacks) and the Tacoma School District with 8.6% of non-whites (6.3% of Blacks) had the highest non-white percentages in ISD 111. If the military population of the Fort Lewis area were not included, the Black population of the Clover Park School District would drop from 5,330 to 1,653. ISD 111 had the lowest median age (24.8 years) of any ISD. Median ages ranged from 22.4 years in the Clover Park School District to 33.0 years in the Peninsula School District. The Tacoma School District with 14.2% of children under eighteen in families headed by females ranked third in the State after Yakima and Seattle. Owner occupied household percentages ranged from 41.0% in Clover Park to 83.5% in Dieringer. University Place was 83.4%. Average value of owner occupied housing ranged from \$13,530 in the White River School District to \$27,035 in the Peninsula School District.

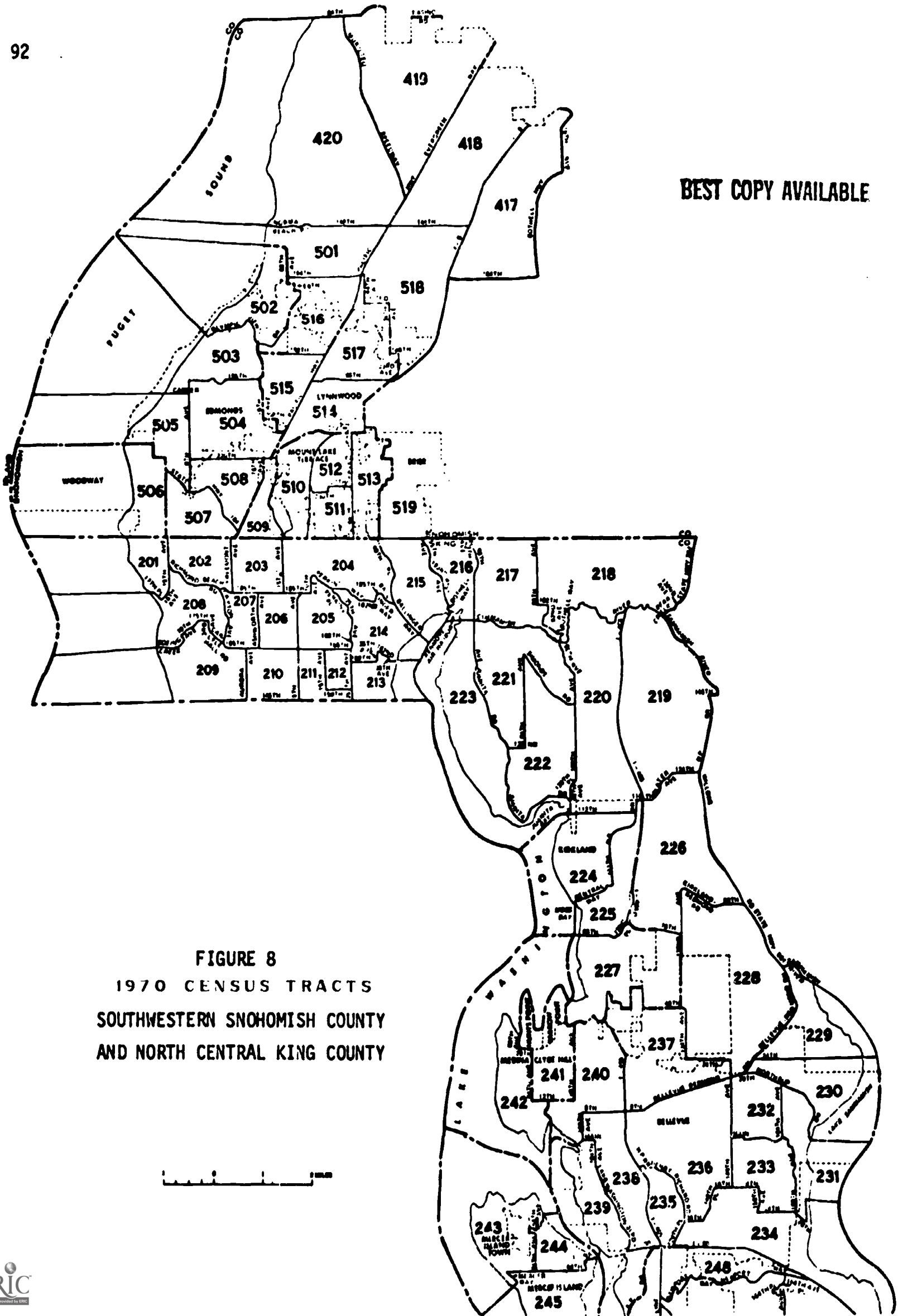
ISD 111 ranked sixth in percent of high school graduates and fifth in percent of college graduates. The percentage of high school graduates ranged from 45.9% in the White River School District to 76.1% in the University Place School District. ISD 111 ranked sixth in median family income level. Median family incomes ranged from \$8,899 in the Clover Park School District to \$12,682 in the University Place School District. ISD 111 averaged sixth in poverty level indices. The percentage of under eighteens in poverty level families ranged from 4.3% in the University Place School District to 14.1% in the Bethel School District. ISD 111 ranked third in percentage of employed females. Steilacoom School District was highest with 41.7%. ISD 111 ranked fifth in percentage of professional and managerial workers and fourth in the percentage of craftsmen and operatives. Dieringer School District at 43.5% had the highest percentage in the craftsmen and operatives category. ISD 111 ranked ninth in percentage (1.4%) of farm workers. The Orting School District was the only school district with a substantial proportion of farmers and farm workers (13.2%).

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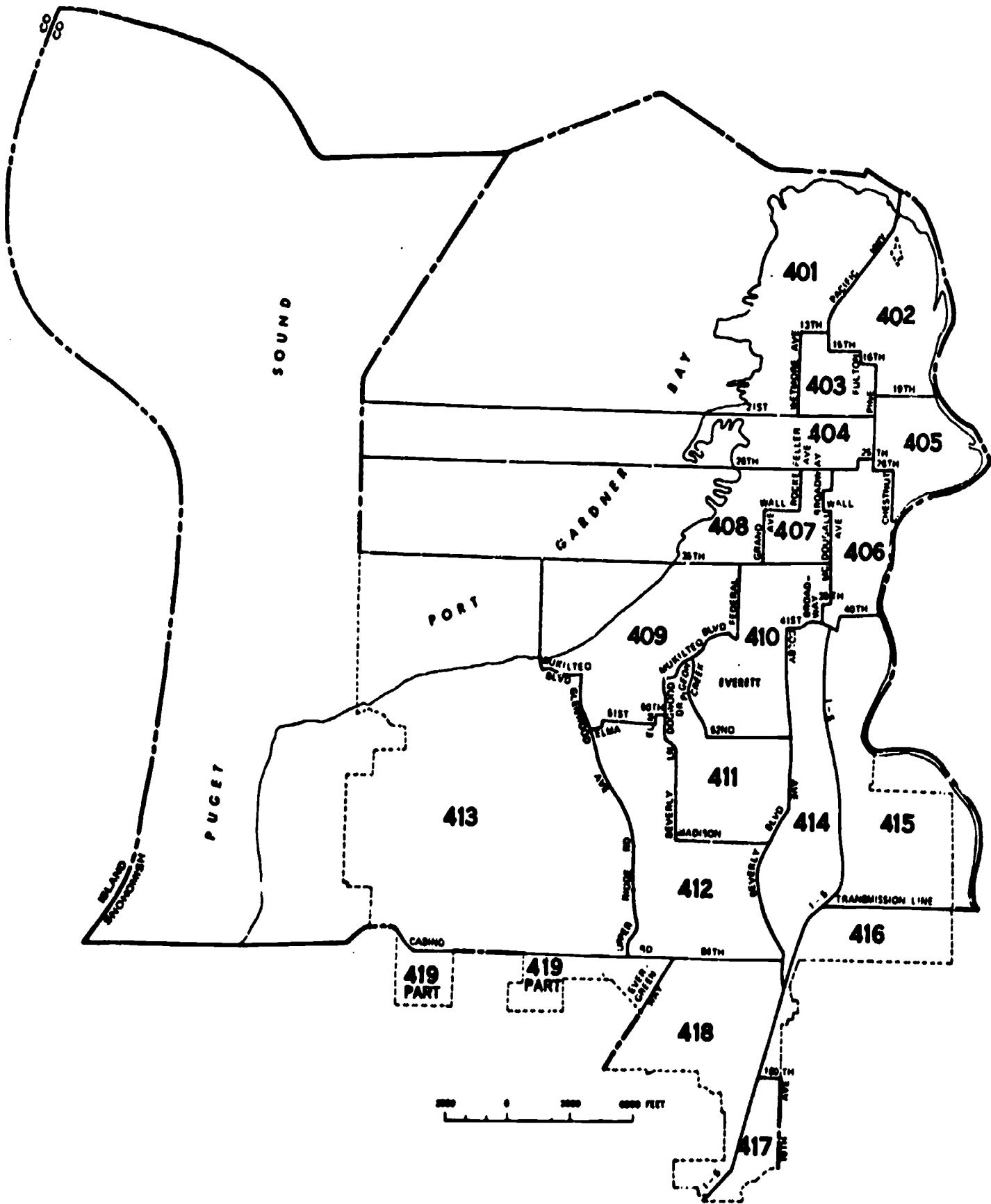

 AND NORTH CENTRAL KING COUNTY



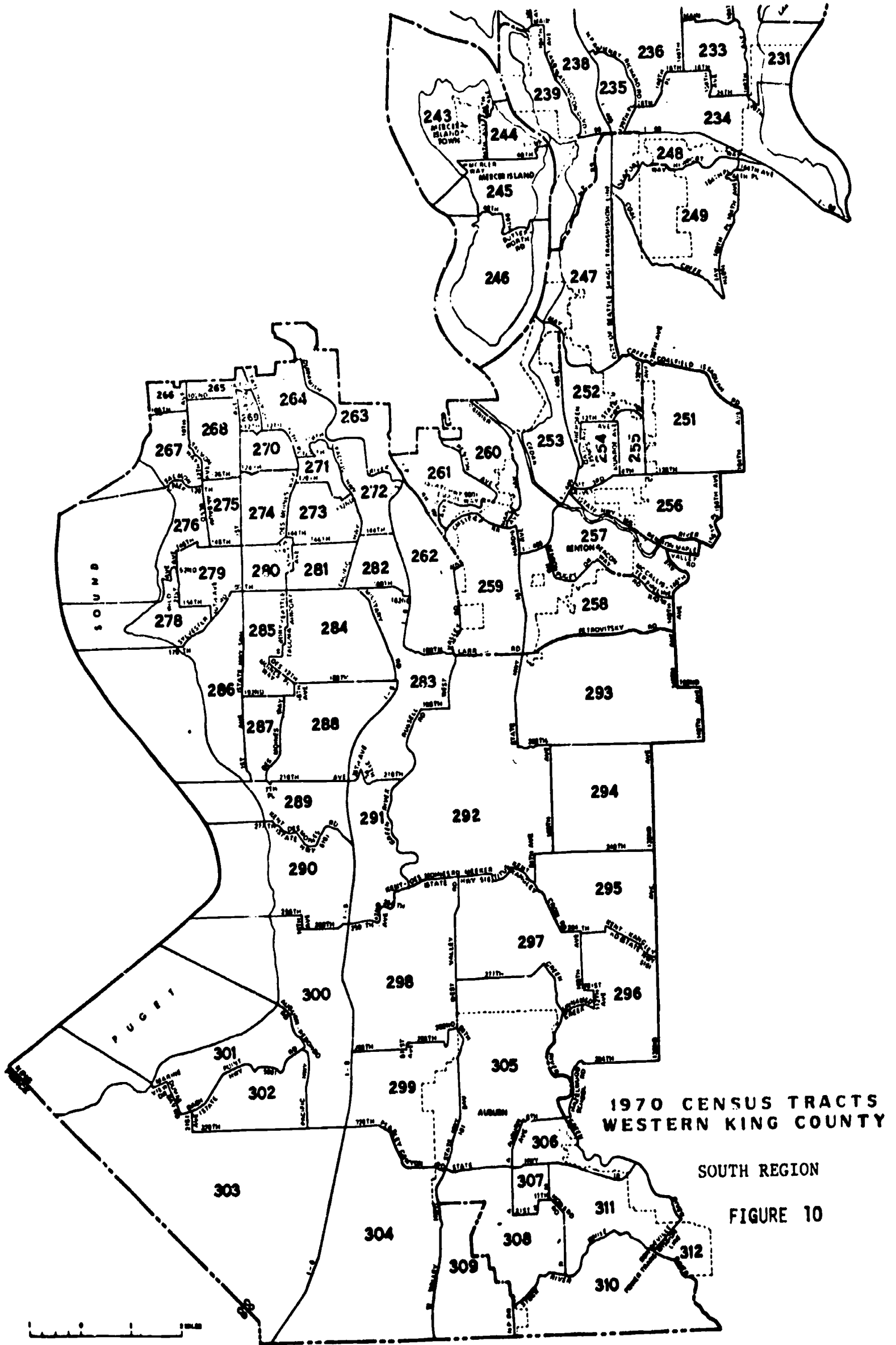


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INSET C - EVERETT AND VICINITY

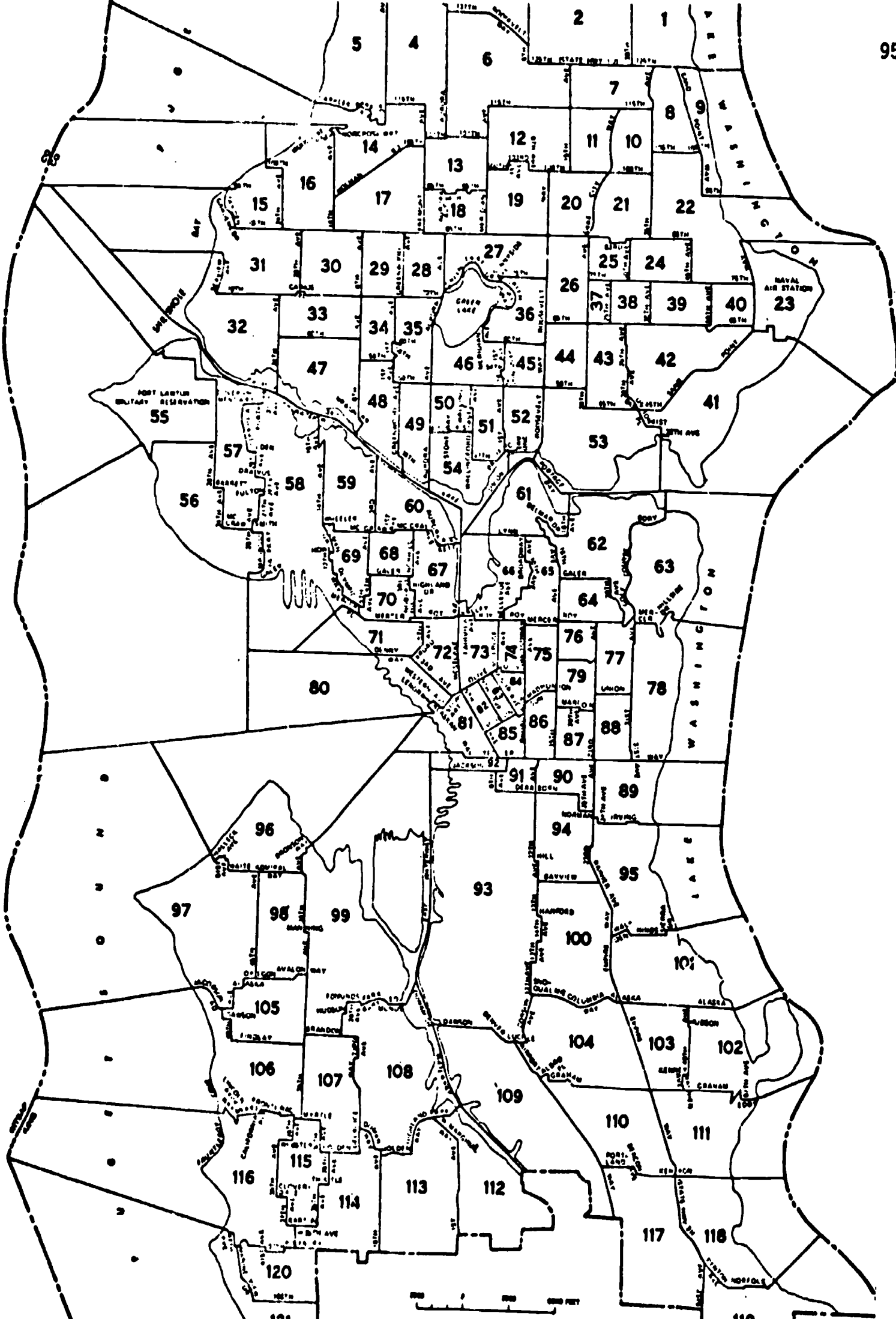
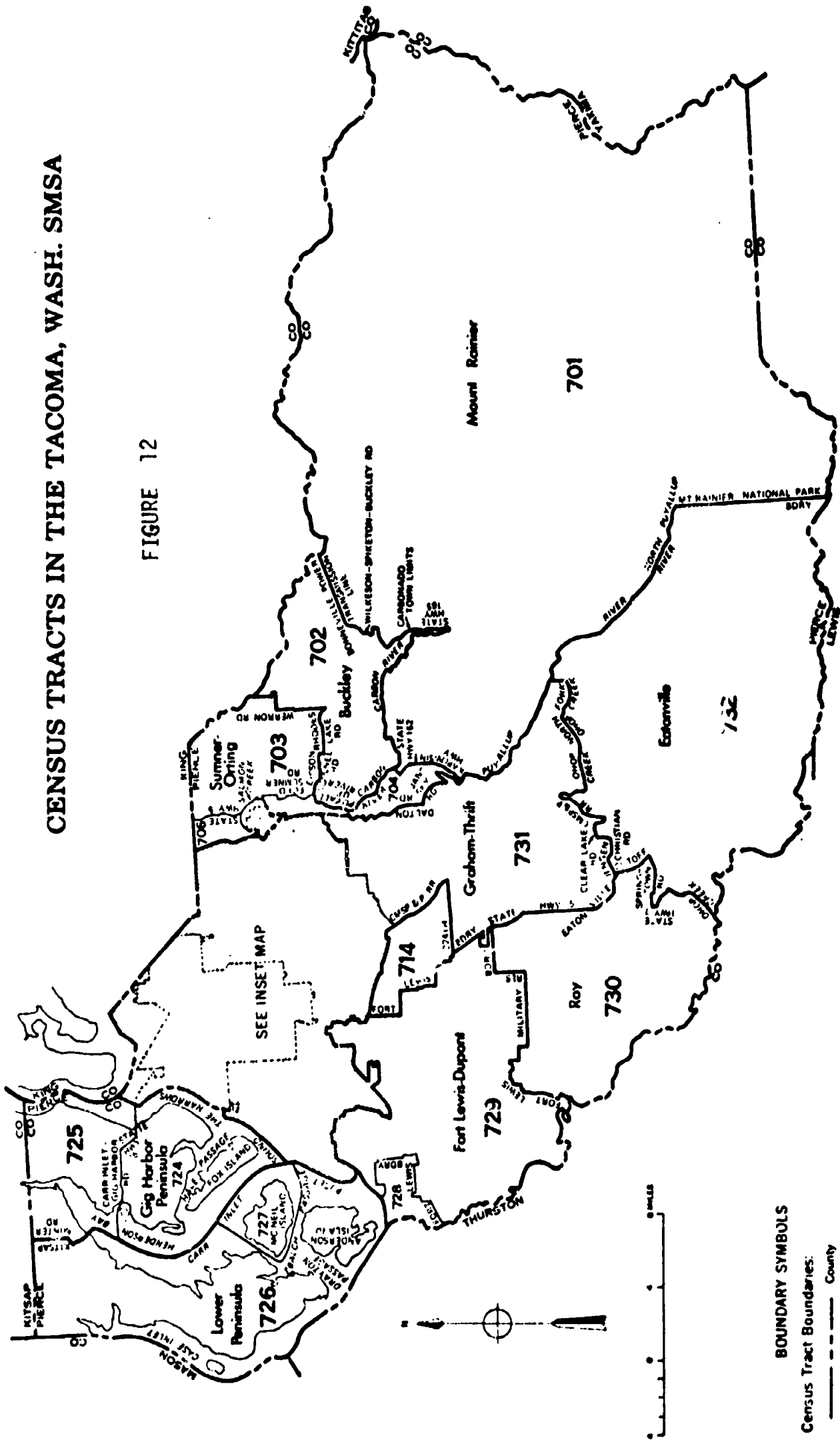

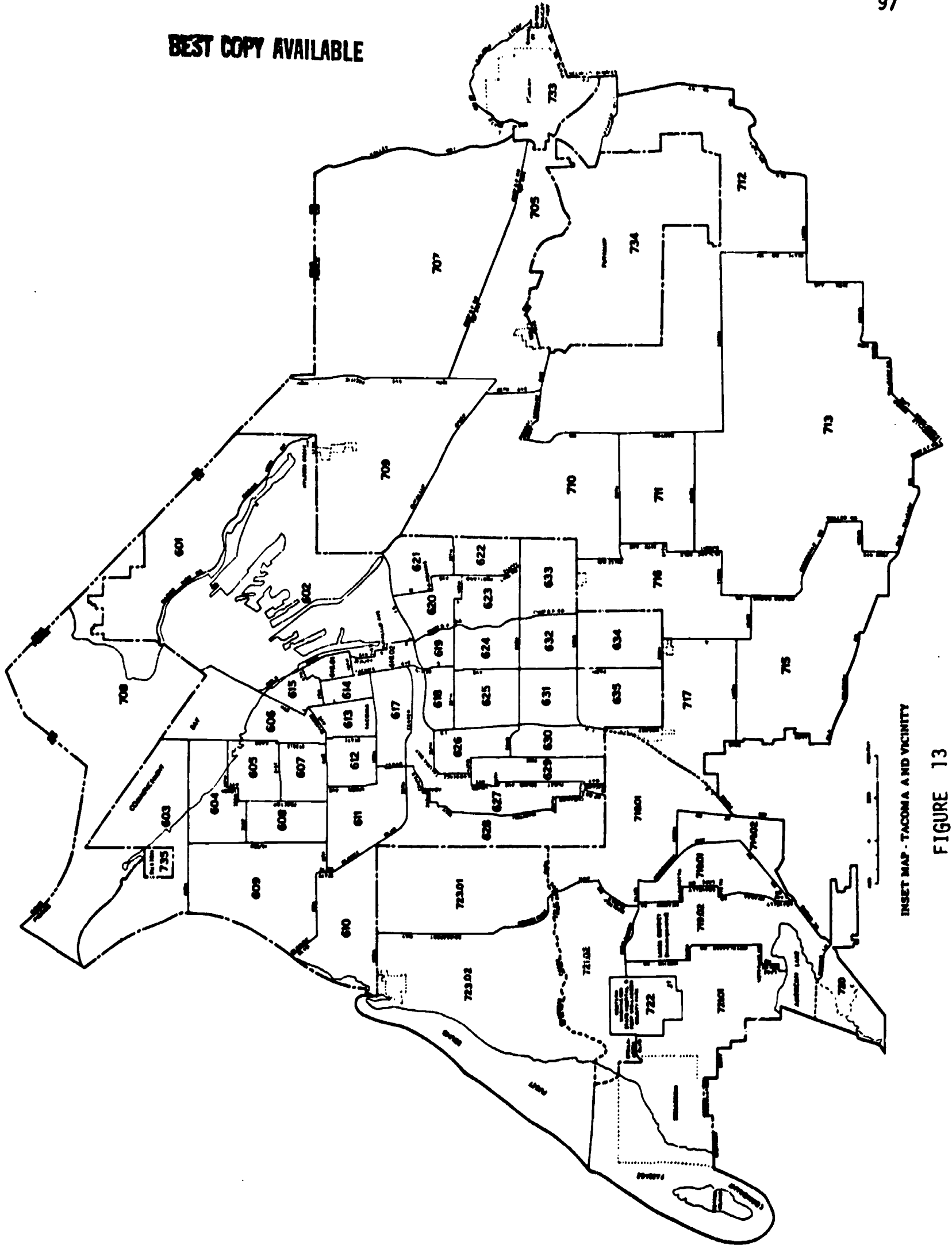

Intermediate School District 112

ISD 112 includes Clark, Cowlitz, Skamania and Wahkiakum Counties. It also includes substantial portions of Klickitat and Pacific Counties. The Vancouver School District accounted for 33.5% of the population of ISD 112 and the Longview School District for 16.8%. ISD 112 ranked twelfth (lowest) in both percentage of non-whites and percentage of minorities. Minority percentages ranged from 0.9% in the Wahkiakum School District to 4.4% in the Naselle - Grays River School District. ISD 112 ranked sixth in median age at 28.2 years. Median ages ranged from 24.6 years in the Evergreen School District to 44.2 in the Ocean Beach School District (the oldest in the State). Owner occupied households ranged from 64.4% in the Vancouver School District to 83.1% in the Hockinson School District. ISD 112 ranked sixth in average value of owner occupied housing, which ranged from \$11,470 in the Battleground School District to \$19,592 in the Ridgefield School District.

ISD 112 ranked ninth in percent of high school graduates, who ranged from 47.1% in the White Salmon School District to 62.4% in the Evergreen School District. ISD 112 ranked fifth in median family income. Median family incomes ranged from \$7,441 in the Ocean Beach School District to \$10,619 in the Evergreen School District and \$10,621 in the Toutle Lake School District. Poverty level indices for ISD 112 ranked tenth. The percent of under eighteens in poverty level families ranged from 3.8% in the Kalama School District to 18.3% in the Wahkiakum School District. ISD 112 ranked twelfth in the percent of the labor force employed in professional and managerial pursuits. ISD 112 ranked first in percent of

craftsmen and operatives, who ranged from 24.6% in the Naselle - Grays River School District to 47.7% in the Castle Rock School District (the highest in the State). ISD 112 had six of the top ten school districts with the highest percent of craftsmen and operatives. These were Castle Rock, 47.7%; Washougal, 47.5%; Camas, 46.8%; Hockinson, 45.0%; Toutle Lake, 44.1%; and Kalama, 42.6%. ISD 112 ranked eighth in percent of farmers and farm workers with the White Salmon School District in the ISD lead with 11.5%

### Intermediate School District 113

ISD 113 includes Grays Harbor, Lewis, and Thurston Counties. It also includes substantial portions of Mason and Pacific Counties. The Olympia School District accounted for 15.7% of the population of ISD 113, the North Thurston School District for 11.5% and the Aberdeen School District for 11.3%. ISD 113 had the greatest number of school districts (27) in the largest 200. ISD 113 ranked eleventh (second lowest) in percentage of minority population. Minority population percentages ranged from the 0.7% of the Chehalis School District to the 10.8% of the Hood Canal School District, which had an 8.2% Indian population. ISD 113 ranked second highest in median age at 30.1 years. Median ages ranged from 24.9 years in the Rochester School District to 37.0 years in the Ocosta School District. The Olympia School District with 11.4% of under eighteens in families with female heads ranked in the top ten school districts. ISD 113 ranked second in the percent of owner occupied households, which ranged from 58.8% in the North Beach School District, to 84.7% in the Rochester School District. ISD 113 ranked seventh in the average value of owner occupied homes, which ranged from \$10,937 in the Toledo School District to \$23,158 in the North Thurston School District.

ISD 113 ranked tenth in percentage of high school graduates, who ranged from 45.0% in the Mossy Rock School District to 71.9% in the North Thurston School District. The Olympia School District was second with 69.3%. ISD 113 ranked seventh in percent of college graduates, who ranged from 2.7% in the Willapa Valley School District to 16.4% in the Olympia School District. The North Thurston School District was second with 14.7%. ISD 113 ranked seventh in median family incomes. The lowest median family incomes were in the Morton (\$7,953) and Mossy Rock (\$8,112) School Districts. Five school districts had median family incomes in excess of \$10,000: Cosmopolis, \$11,167; Olympia, \$11,021; North Thurston, \$10,967; Tumwater, \$10,184; and Montesano, \$10,156. ISD 113 ranked seventh in percentage of under eighteens in poverty level families, who ranged from 4.4% in the White Pass School District to 17.4% in the Yelm School District. ISD 113 ranked seventh in percentage of employed females with the Olympia School District at 40.8% being highest. ISD 113 ranked sixth in percentage of professional and managerial employees, who ranged from 11.3% in the Willapa Valley School District to 31.3% in the North Thurston School District. The Olympia School District was a close second at 30.5%. ISD 113 ranked fifth in percentage of craftsmen and operatives who ranged from 19.6% in the Olympia School District to 41.3% in the Toledo School District. The Winlock School District was a close second at 40.9%. ISD 113 ranked seventh in percent of farmers and farm workers. The Onalaska School District with 12.7% of farmers and farm workers was highest and the Rochester School District with 10.3% was second.

#### Intermediate School District 114

ISD 114 includes Clallam and Jefferson Counties, all of Kitsap County except for the Bainbridge Island area, and a portion of Mason County. The

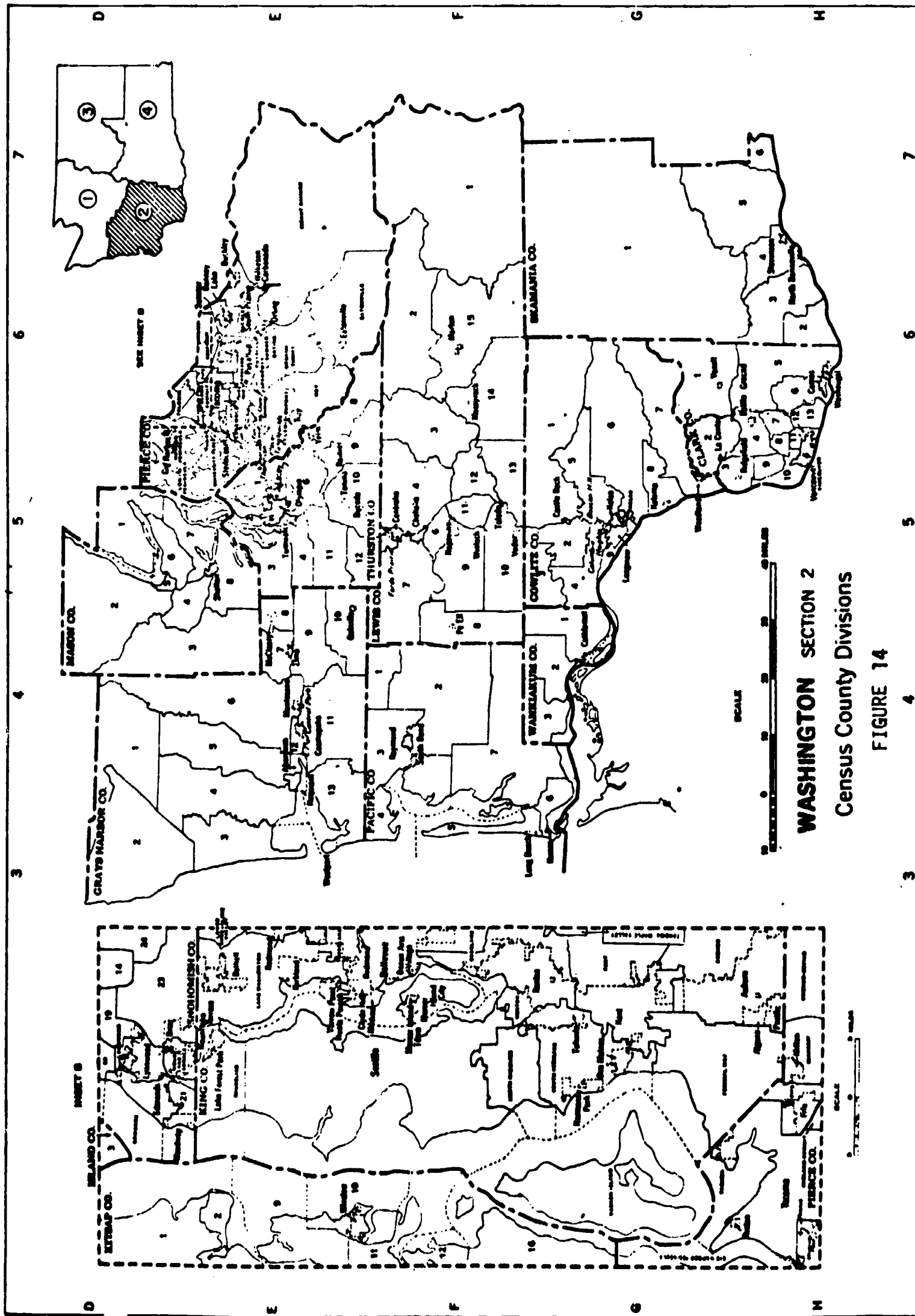
Bremerton School District accounted for 31.6% of the population of ISD 114 and the South Kitsap School District for 16.3%. The Bremerton School District and to some extent the ISD 114 characteristics were skewed by the over 4,100 transient military personnel included in Kitsap County 1970 census data. ISD 114 ranked sixth in percentage of minorities which ranged from 1.5% in the Chimacum School District to 25.9% in the Cape Flattery School District, which had a 23.5% Indian population. The Quillayute Valley School District also had a sizeable Indian population of 8.0%. ISD 114 ranked third in median age. Median ages ranged from 24.3 years in the Cape Flattery School District to 43.3 years in the Sequim School District (second oldest in the State). The Bremerton School District with 11.8% of under eighteens in families with female heads ranked in the top ten school districts.

ISD 114 ranked fifth in percent of owner occupied households, which ranged from 55.6% in the Bremerton School District to 80.1% in the Cape Flattery School District. ISD 114 ranked fourth in average value of owner occupied housing, which ranged from \$12,543 in the Cape Flattery School District to \$23,788 in the North Mason School District. The Central Kitsap School District was a close second at \$23,705.

ISD 114 ranked seventh in percent of high school graduates, who ranged from 50.2% in the Quillayute Valley School District to 66.7% in the Central Kitsap School District. ISD 114 ranked third in median family incomes at \$10,037 (ISD 123 was fourth at \$10,025 and ISD 112 was fifth at \$10,006). Median family incomes in ISD 114 ranged from \$7,787 in Sequim School District (which had a relatively high retired population) to \$10,890 in the Central Kitsap School District. The North Kitsap School District was second at \$10,471. ISD 114 ranked ninth in percent of poverty level families, who ranged from 5.8% in the Central Kitsap School District to 10.1% in the



Sequim School District. ISD 114 ranked eighth in percent of professional and managerial employees. ISD 114 ranked second in percent of craftsmen and operatives, who ranged from 27.4% in the Sequim School District to 41.9% in the South Kitsap School District. The North Mason School District at 41.3% and the Quillayute Valley School District at 40.2% also ranked high in percentage of craftsmen. ISD 114 ranked eleventh (next to last) in percent of farmers and farm workers. The Sequim School District with 9.1% was ISD 114's highest.



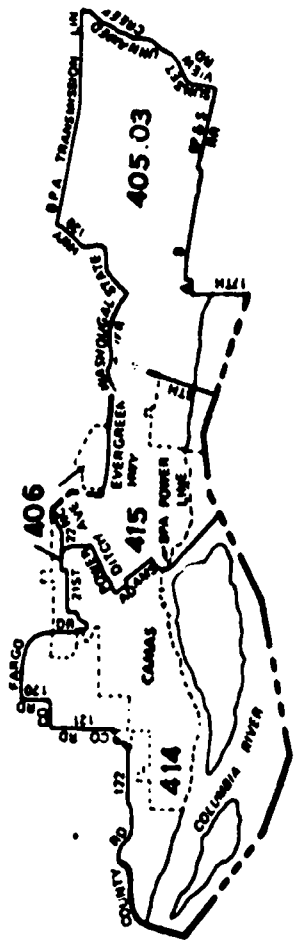

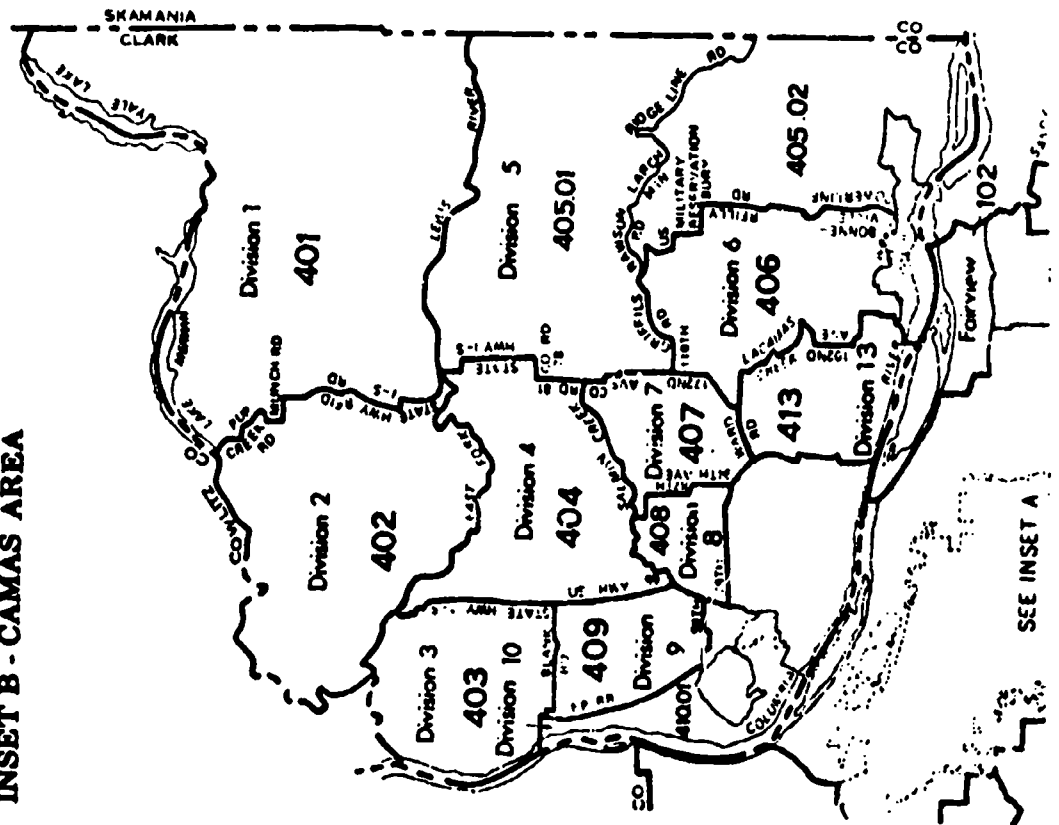

 CITY OF VANCOUVER AND CLARK COUNTY**

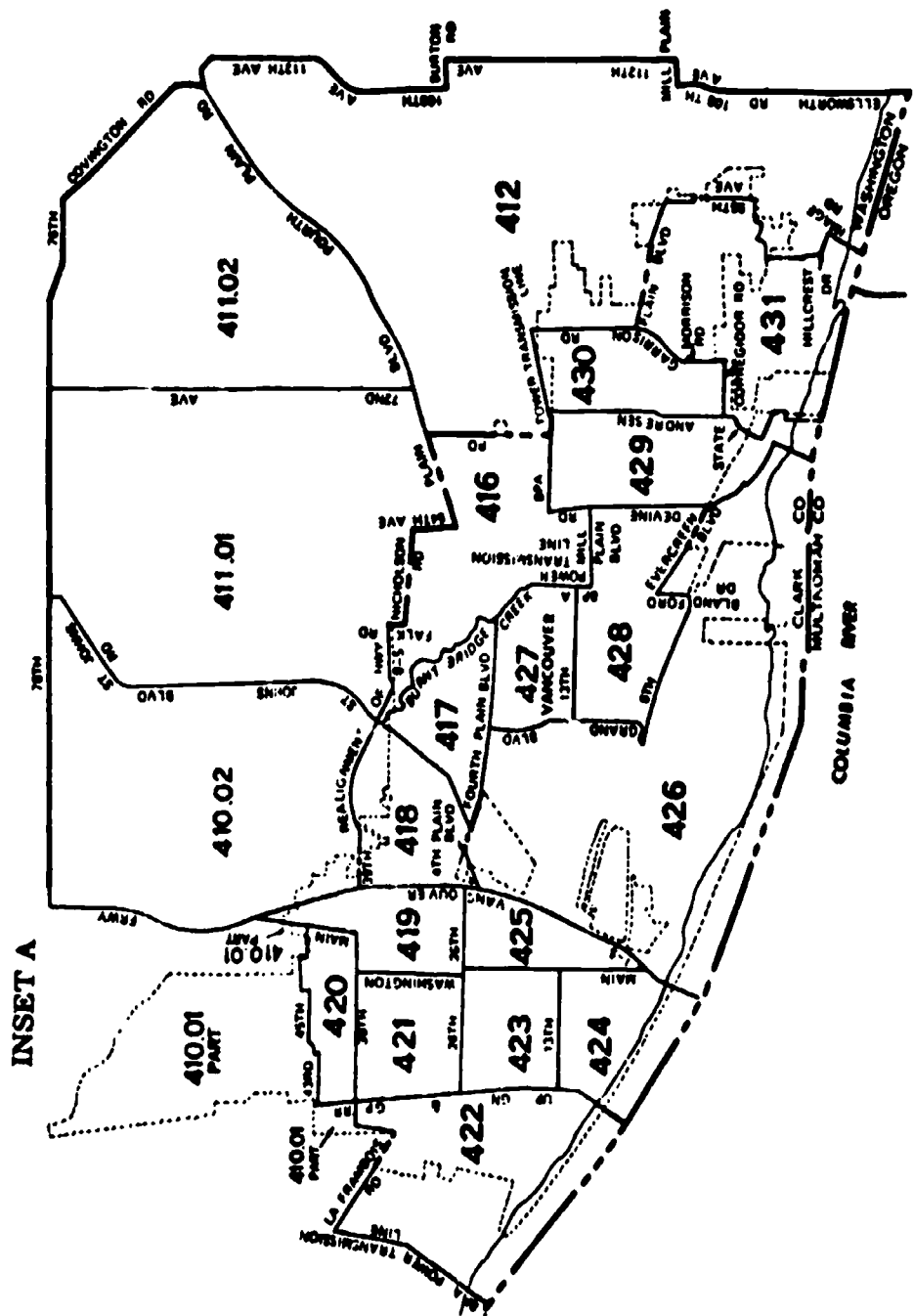
**FIGURE 15**

## EFFECT OF FORT LEWIS ON DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIOECONOMIC PROFILES OF CLOVER PARK AND DU PONT SCHOOL DISTRICTS

In the population pyramids section of this report, the distinctly a-typical sex-age ratios of the 44,673 population in the Fort Lewis--McChord Air Force Base area are noted and graphically portrayed. Over 40% (32,142) of the 79,832 population of the Clover Park School District lived within the Fort Lewis area. Table 4 shows the effect of the Fort Lewis population on the Clover Park School District. The predominantly male Fort Lewis area with an ethnic population more closely resembling that of the United States than Pierce County suburbia, distinctly affects both the sex and ethnic ratios of the Clover Park School District. There are, for all practical purposes, no home owners in the Fort Lewis area. The military personnel high school graduate percentage is akin to that of Clover Park. The data for males 16 to 21 not enrolled in school is drastically affected by the military population. Income and poverty level data are somewhat affected. Military personnel are excluded from the employed civilian labor force, hence the labor force category distribution is only slightly affected.

It is understood that the Du Pont School District will, in the fall of 1973, not include any portion of the Fort Lewis--McChord Air Force Base area. The resultant population profile of the Du Pont School District is also presented in Table 4. Since the Fort Lewis--McChord Air Force Base area accounted for more than 90% of the Du Pont School District 1970 population, the 1973 population profile will be drastically different.

In April 1973 the Twisp School District and the Winthrop School District (both located in northwestern Okanogan County) were consolidated to form the Methow Valley School District--Okanogan County No. 350. The population profile of the combined school district is presented in Table 4.

COMPARISON OF DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIOECONOMIC PROFILES

Wide variations in ethnicity, age groupings, household structure, educational status, affluence, and occupational characteristics were noted for various sub-areas of Washington State. Marked demographic and socioeconomic differences were also found within individual school district locales. Table 5 details and compares the salient demographic and socioeconomic features of selected sub-areas.

There are striking contrasts in age groupings, household characteristics, educational levels, income and poverty level data, and occupational characteristics between the high and low socioeconomic areas. The Latin phrase "Res Ipsa Loquitur" - the facts speak for themselves - is definitely applicable.

## INTERCORRELATIONS BETWEEN SELECTED SOCIOECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS OF THE ONE HUNDRED LARGEST SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN WASHINGTON STATE

A coefficient of correlation,  $r$ , is a single number that tells to what extent two characteristics are related, to what extent variations in one characteristic are reflected in variations in the other. The algebraic sign of a coefficient of correlation denotes the direction of the relationship, which may be direct (positive) or inverse (negative). The unit of the coefficient,  $r$ , is an index number depicting the closeness of the relationship. An  $r$  of  $-0.652$  portrays as close a relationship as an  $r$  of  $+0.652$ . Correlation studies are highly important in evaluating causal relationships.

It was noted that certain socioeconomic characteristics of the populations of the various school districts in Washington show similar relationship trends. Intercorrelations between these socioeconomic characteristics were, therefore, determined for the 100 largest school districts in Washington State. These 100 districts accounted for 3,017,032 (88.4%) of the State's population.

The resultant computed coefficients of correlation are displayed in the correlation coefficient matrix of Table 5. All of the correlation coefficients were relatively high and all were highly statistically significant. Educational level of the adult populace, as measured by the percent of high school graduates is, in general, an excellent indicator of the other listed socioeconomic attributes.

COMPARISON OF DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIOECONOMIC PROFILES  
OF WASHINGTON STATE, THE UNITED STATES,  
THE WESTERN REGION OF THE UNITED STATES,  
AND THE STATE OF OREGON

Table 7 compares the ethnic composition, age group distribution, household characteristics, educational levels, income and poverty level data, and occupational characteristics of Washington State with those of the United States, the Western Region of the United States and the State of Oregon.

Washington's non-white population in 1970 was 4.6%, which was approximately one-third of the United States 12.5%. The Black percentage of Washington was 2.1% compared to 11.1% nationally. Other races were 2.5% in Washington; nationally they were 1.4%. With 2.1% of persons of Spanish language, Washington had less than half the national percentage of 4.6 and only one-sixth the Western Region percentage of 12.6. Ethnic percentages in Oregon were slightly less than those in Washington.

Age group distributions were essentially similar in all the areas.

Household characteristics were essentially similar in all four areas. Washington had the highest percentage of owner occupied homes. The median value of owner occupied homes in Washington (\$18,500) was somewhat less than the median value of homes in the Western Region (\$20,500), but higher than the United States as a whole (\$17,000). In this report, for ease in statistical processing of aggregated area summaries, housing values for school districts were reported as average values rather than median values. Average housing values were in general, about 11% higher than median values. For Washington State the median owner occupied house and lot value was \$18,500; the average owner occupied house and lot value was \$20,700.



The educational level of Washington is slightly higher than that of the Western Region and distinctly higher than that of the United States as a whole.

The median family income in Washington (\$10,407) was slightly higher than that of the Western Region (\$10,229) and appreciably higher than those of the United States (\$9,590) and Oregon (\$9,489). Poverty level data, in general, were comparable to the income data (bearing in mind that the correlative relationship is inverse).

Occupational breakdowns for the four areas were essentially similar. Oregon has a somewhat higher farm labor force than Washington. The first report of this series "Population Profiles of Washington State Legislative Districts" discusses in somewhat more detail the differences and similarities of the occupational category distributions of the United States and Washington. A brief discussion of salient trend factors in the occupational category distributions of Washington State from 1940 through 1970 is also included in the earlier report.

During the past decade, the United States and Washington State have shown similar demographic trends. In the first part of this trilogy of reports "Population Profiles of Washington State Legislative Districts" it was noted that the census data for 1970 is frozen in time, while populations and their characteristics change with time. The ten year changes in selected characteristics of the populations of Washington State, Seattle, and King County Suburbia (King County ex Seattle) are tabulated and briefly discussed in the earlier report.

The marked 1960 and 1970 drop in the number of young children under five years of age and its serious portent of decreased elementary and secondary school enrollments in the 1970 and 1980 decade, are emphasized. This facet is also alluded to in this report's section on population pyramids.

COMPARISON BY STATE OF THE EDUCATIONAL STATUS  
OF THE ADULT POPULATION OF THE UNITED STATES

In a previous section correlative studies indicated that the educational level of the adult populace was an excellent indicator of its socioeconomic attributes. It was, therefore, deemed of interest and value to tabulate the ranked educational level of each state in the United States. Table 8 is a comparative tabulation of such rankings. It will be noted that Washington ranks fifth highest in percent of high school graduates. Utah ranks first in percent of adult high school graduates, and Alaska ranks second. Colorado ranks first in percent of college graduates, Alaska ranks second, and Washington is in ninth place.

WITH THE HIGHEST ADULT EDUCATIONAL LEVELS

The Bellevue and the Mercer Island School Districts have adult populations with the highest educational level in the State. Bellevue is also the fourth city in size in the State. The Bellevue School District consists of the City of Bellevue (61,000) and its environs (18,000). The high educational level of the adult population of the Bellevue School District (88.7% high school graduates) was the impetus for determining the educational level ranking of the population of the City of Bellevue among the 404 United States cities of over 50,000 population. Pertinent census data from each of the fifty states were surveyed and the 25 cities with the highest educational levels were listed. Selected pertinent demographic and socio-economic characteristics of each city were also tabulated. The results of these researches are presented in Table 9.

It will be noted that on the basis of the percentage of high school graduates, Bellevue ranked first among the 404 United States cities of over 50,000 population. It will also be noted that the eleven university areas had the lowest percentage of employed males 16 years and over. Bethesda, Maryland, has a higher percentage of college graduates than Bellevue, as do three of the university areas. Bethesda, Arlington Heights, and Skokie have higher median family incomes. Berkeley had 32.3% non-whites and Newton, Brookline Town, and Skokie had over 40% of persons of foreign stock (first and second generation Americans). This facet was further researched in the section on country of origin.

## COUNTRY OF ORIGIN AND MOTHER TONGUE OF WASHINGTON STATE POPULATION

From a background information, curricula development, and cultural heritage standpoint, a knowledge of the national origins and mother tongues of the population of the State of Washington is both interesting and valuable.

Table 10 details nativity and mother tongue data for the State of Washington. Over two-thirds of Washington's first and second generation Americans are of European origin with the Scandanavian countries in the lead, followed by Germany and Austria, and the United Kingdom and Ireland in third place. As would be expected from Canada's common boundary with Washington, the Canadian component is the largest from any single country.

Mother tongue data for the State of Washington shows German in the lead, with Norwegian second, Spanish third, Swedish fourth and French fifth.

Nativity and mother tongue data for Skokie, Illinois, and Newton, Massachusetts, are also presented. Comparable data for Brookline Town, Massachusetts, were also researched and found to be essentially similar in pattern to that of Skokie. The mother tongue data for Skokie and Newton coupled with the high educational levels of these two cities, reflect the deep Judaic cultural reverence for learning. The appreciable Italian component in Newton is noteworthy.

POPULATION PYRAMIDS OF WASHINGTON STATE  
AND SELECTED SCHOOL DISTRICTS AND AREAS

Population pyramids are graphical portrayals of the detailed age-sex structure of the population of a given area. Population pyramids normally depict five year age and sex summaries with the separate sex-age groups arranged in ascending order with the female population shown on the right and the males depicted on the left. Population pyramids are a useful and interesting demographic tool. They, among other facets, pictorially illustrate the effects of past birth rates. Other phenomena are also depicted by the population pyramids. Illustrative applications are detailed in the population pyramids of Figures 16, 17, 18 and 19.

Figure 16 depicts the 1960 and 1970 population pyramids of Washington State. The 1970 graphs show the successive five year decreases in births during the 1960's. The 1960 graphs show the successive increases in births during the late 1940's and throughout the 1950's. The 25 to 29 year age group in 1960, which became the 35 to 39 year age group in 1970, is illustrative of the low birth rates of the depression era of the 1930's. The two bulges in the 1970 population pyramid reflect the higher birth rates of the 1950's and the 1920's. The higher initial male birth rates and the greater female longevity are also portrayed in the graph.

A military installation or university community usually markedly affects age-sex distributions as well as other demographic and socioeconomic data. Figure 17 portrays the 1970 population pyramid for 44,673 persons living in the Fort Lewis--McChord Air Force Base area. This Pierce County military installation markedly affects the demographic characteristics of the Clover Park, Du Pont, and Bethel School Districts. The overwhelming preponderance of males in the 20 to 24 year age group will be noted as will



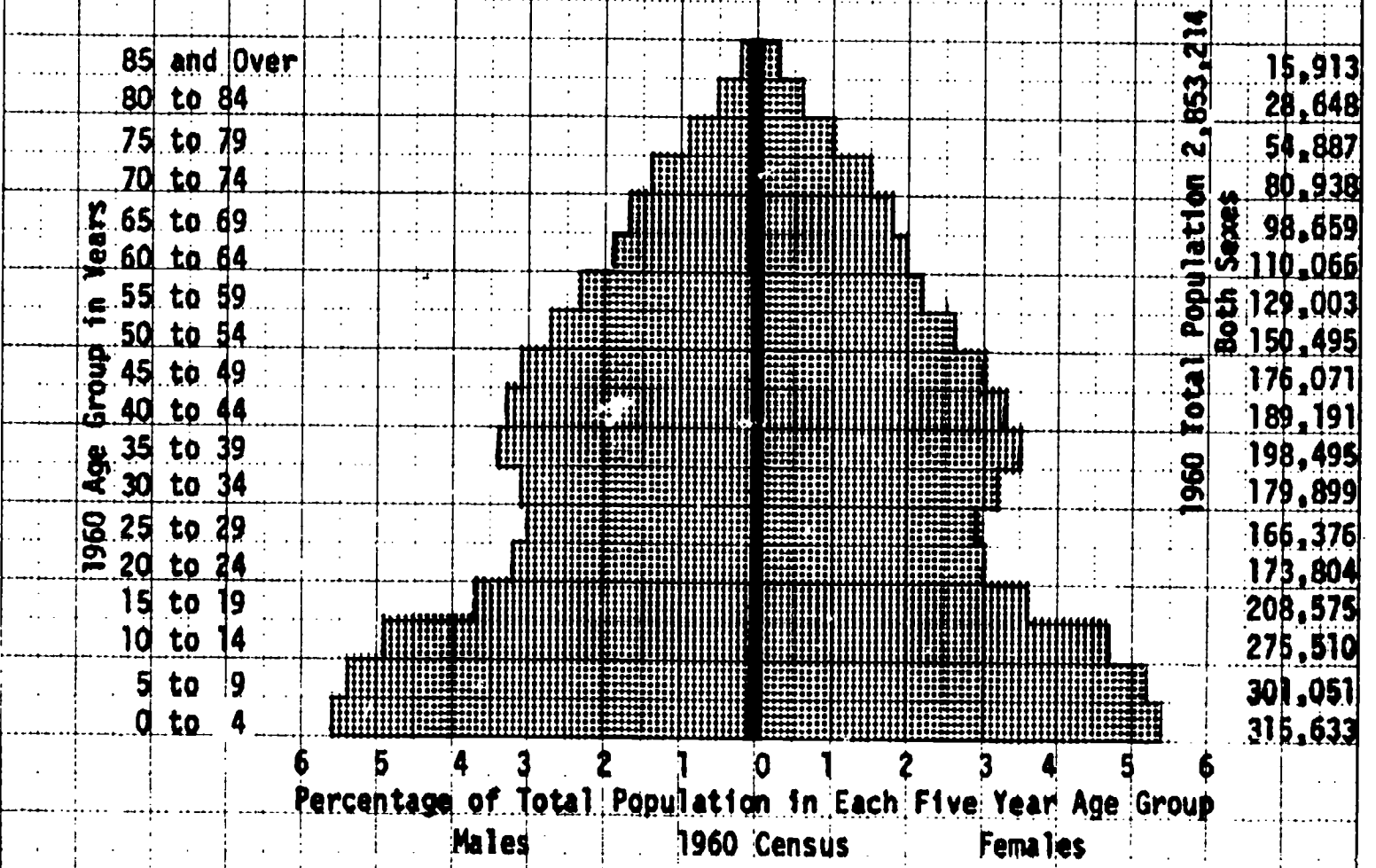
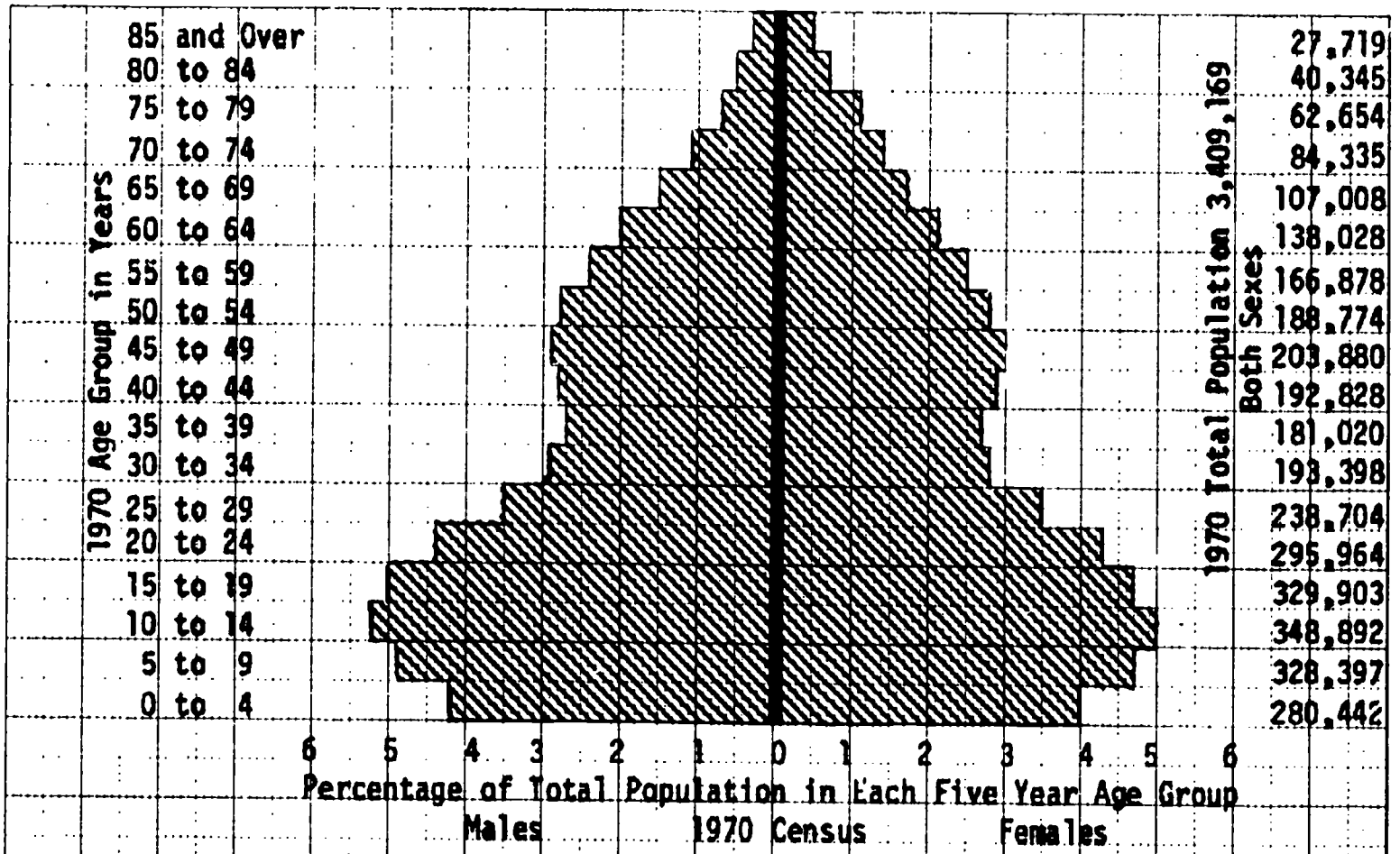

the sizeable number of males in the 15 to 19 year age group. (Most of these were 18 and 19 years old.) The almost complete lack of persons over 60 years of age will also be noted. Table 4 previously detailed the demographic and socioeconomic effects of the Fort Lewis area on the Clover Park School District.

Figure 17 also depicts the 1970 population pyramid for the Pullman School District. It has previously been noted that 49.0% of the Pullman School District population is in the 18 to 24 year old age category. The population pyramid reflects this data. There were, in general, reasonably comparable percentages of males and females. The higher proportion of male graduate students skews the data for the persons in their twenties. The atypical (for 1970) greater number of under fives is in reality typical of college communities with their higher proportion of younger couples.

Figure 18 depicts the 1960 and 1970 population pyramids for the City of Seattle. Approximately 99.7% of the Seattle School District population resides in the City of Seattle. The pyramid reflects the reduced birth rates of the 1960's and the burgeoning birth rates of the late 1940's and the 1950's. The dual bulge in the 1970 pyramid is primarily due to the higher birth rates of the 1920's and the 1950's. The marked bulge of the 18 to 24 year old cohort can at least in part be ascribed to two factors--a large increase in college enrollment in the Seattle area, and changing life styles resulting in many young adults from suburbia forsaking the family hearth for urban apartment dwelling. The reverse flow of people in their thirties to suburbia is also evident.

Figure 19 portrays the 1960 and 1970 population pyramids of the Mercer Island School District. The distinct differences in the under 20 year old population distribution in the 1960's and 1970's will be noted as

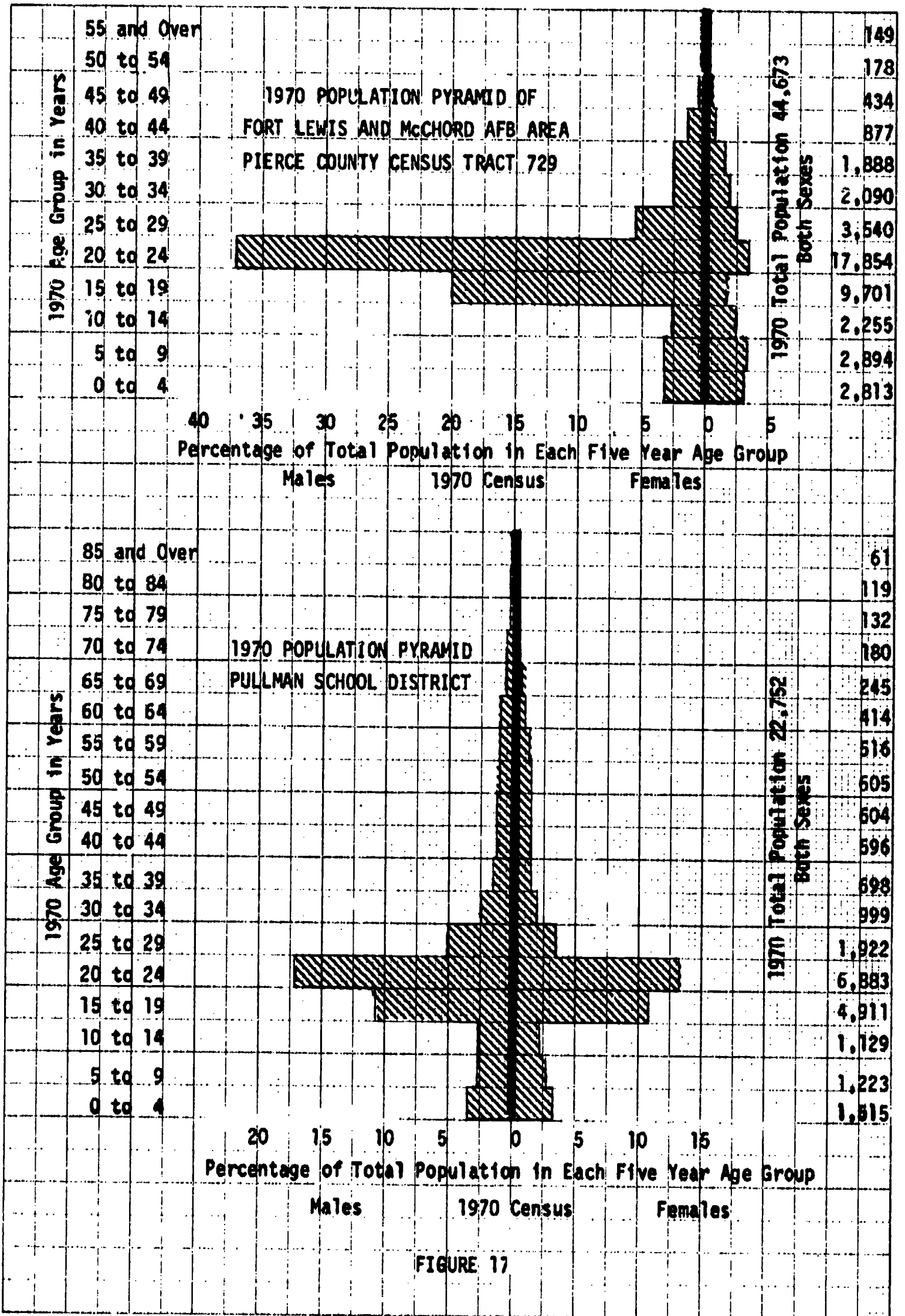

will the pronounced dual bulge in 1970. The 20 to 24 year old group is in essence the complement of the Seattle group and graphically depicts the absence of young adults. Military service, college enrollments, and urban apartment dwelling all are factors. The high 1960 under five group presaged a striking increase in Mercer Island school enrollment (public and private) from 3,203 in 1960 to 5,996 in 1970. The converse inverted population pyramid in 1970 presages a distinct decrease in Mercer Island school enrollment during the 1970's. In 1972 births to mothers resident on Mercer Island were approximately half the number of annual births in mid-1960's--this in spite of a 75% increase in Mercer Island total population from 1960 to 1972.

For those interested in exploring the subject of population pyramids further, the excellent November 1972 monograph "Population Pyramids" prepared by the Washington State Office of Program Planning and Fiscal Management, is highly recommended. Population pyramids for 1950, 1960 and 1970 of all 39 Washington counties are depicted.



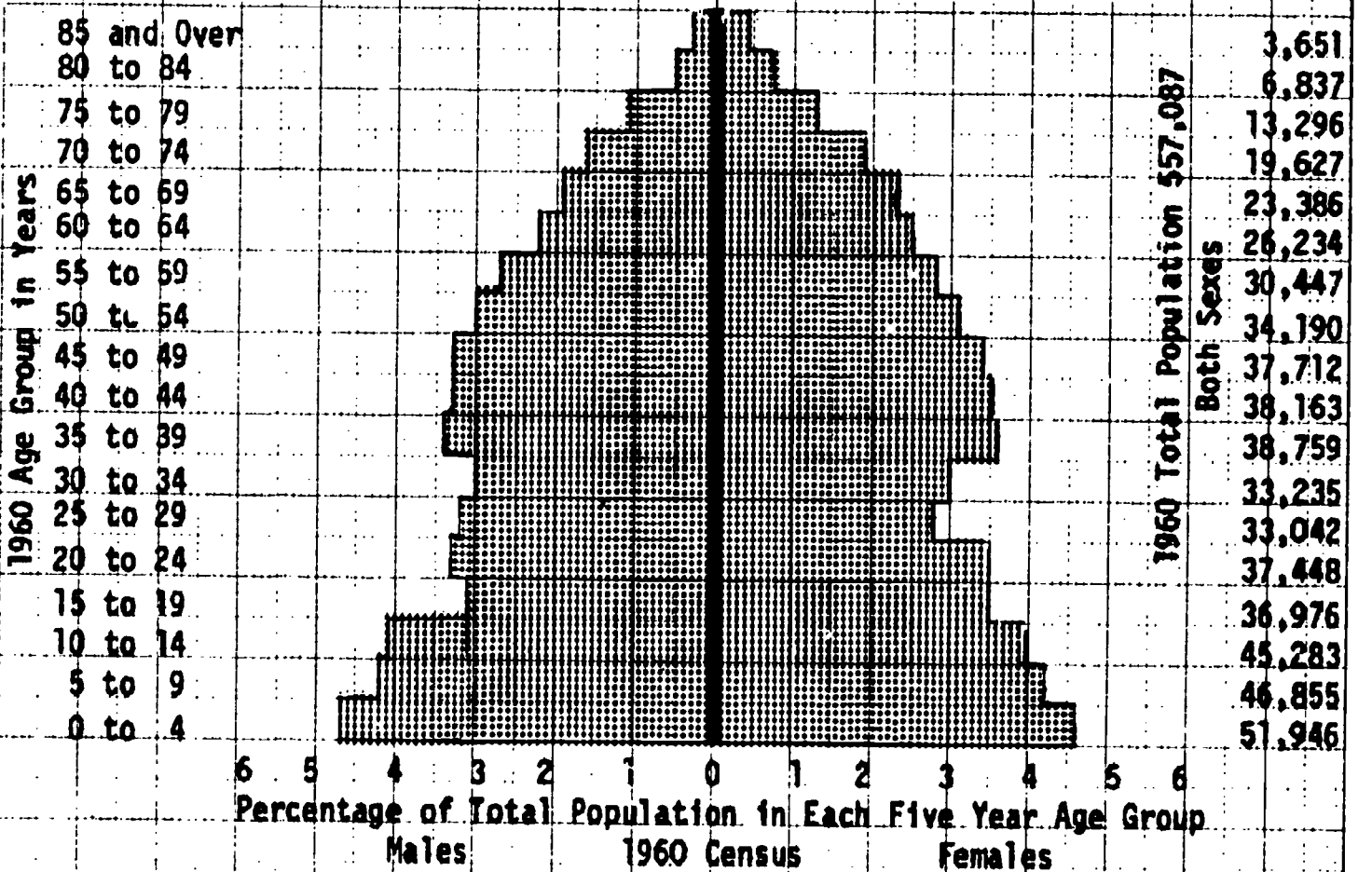
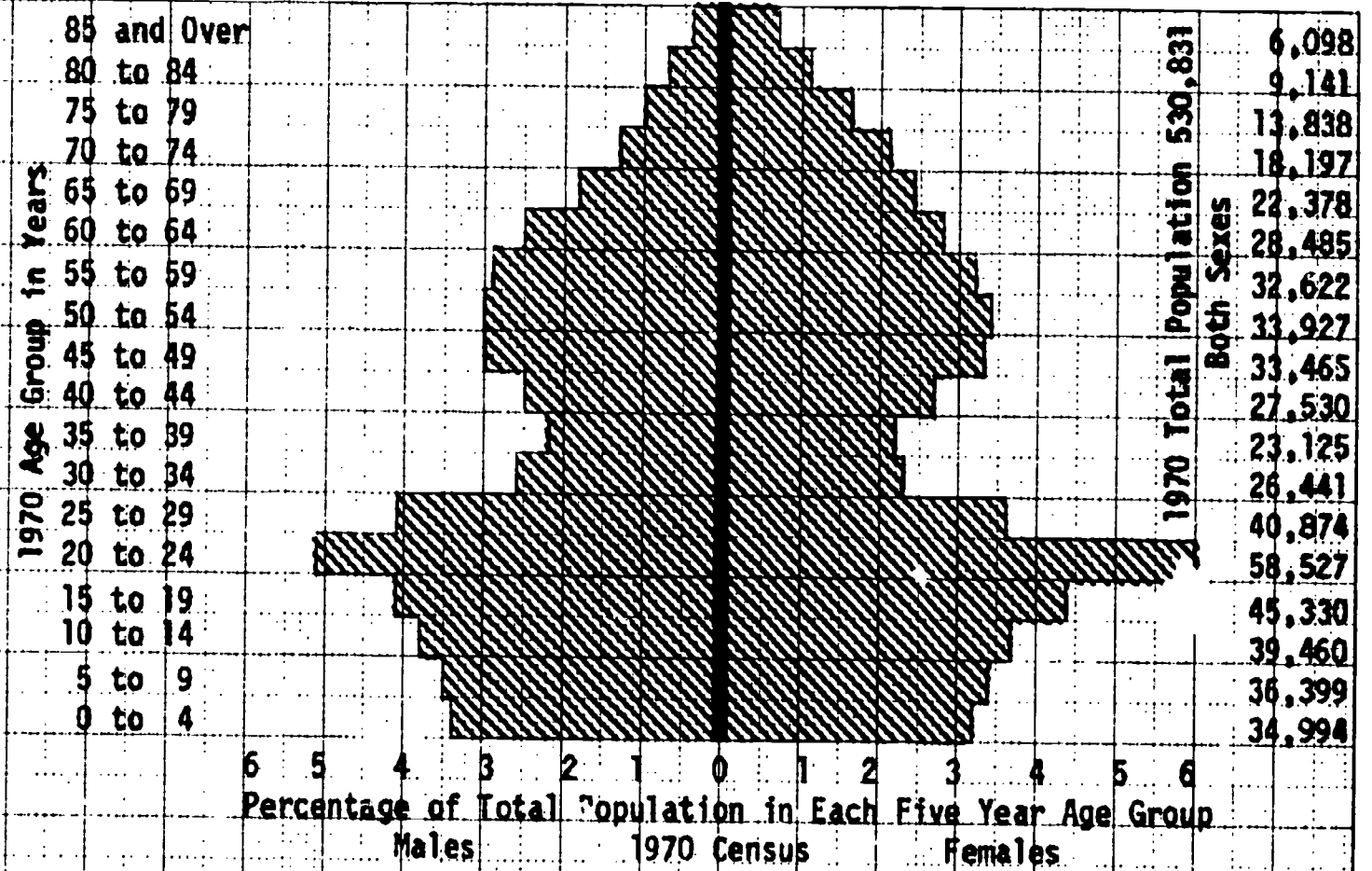

1960 AND 1970



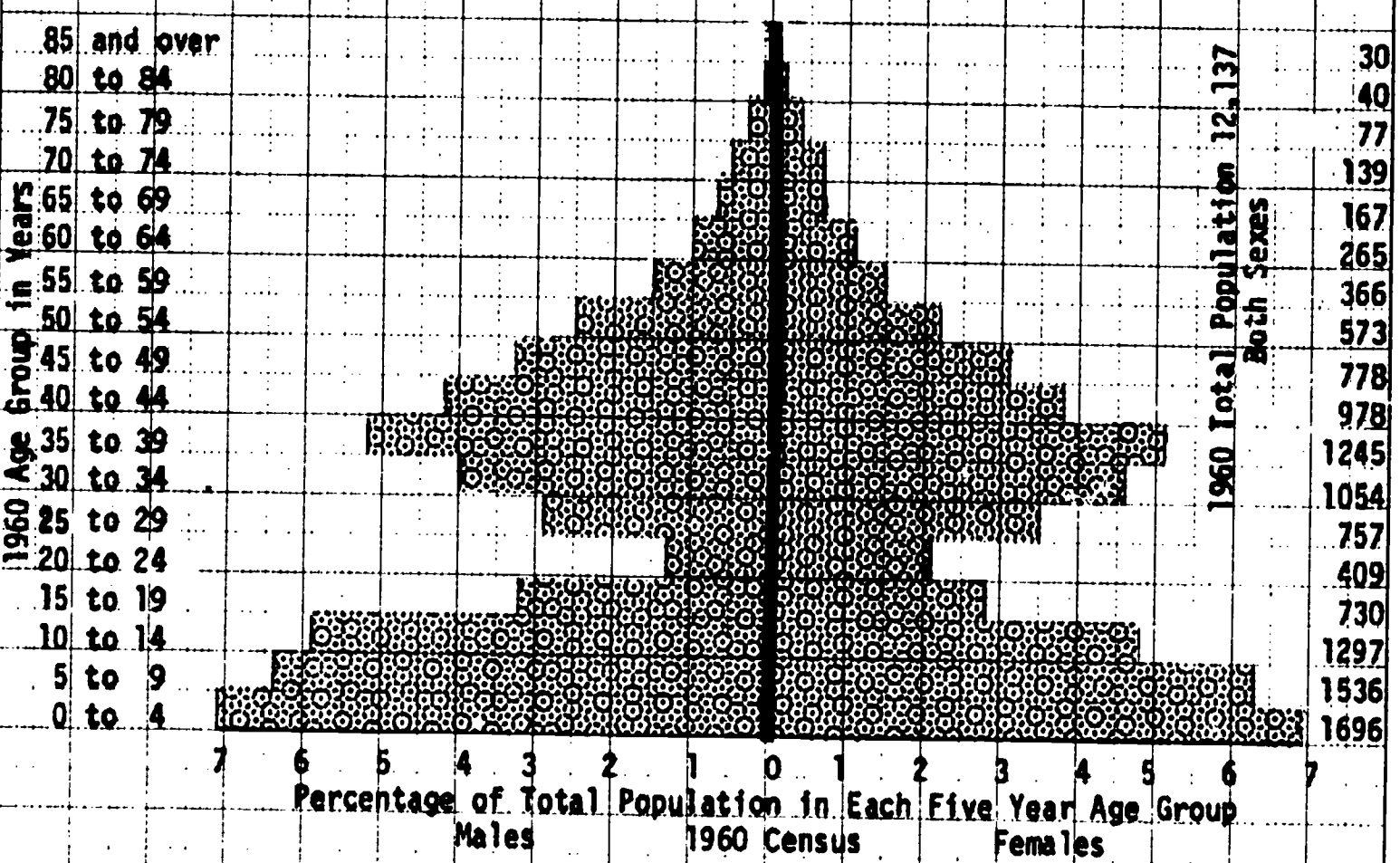
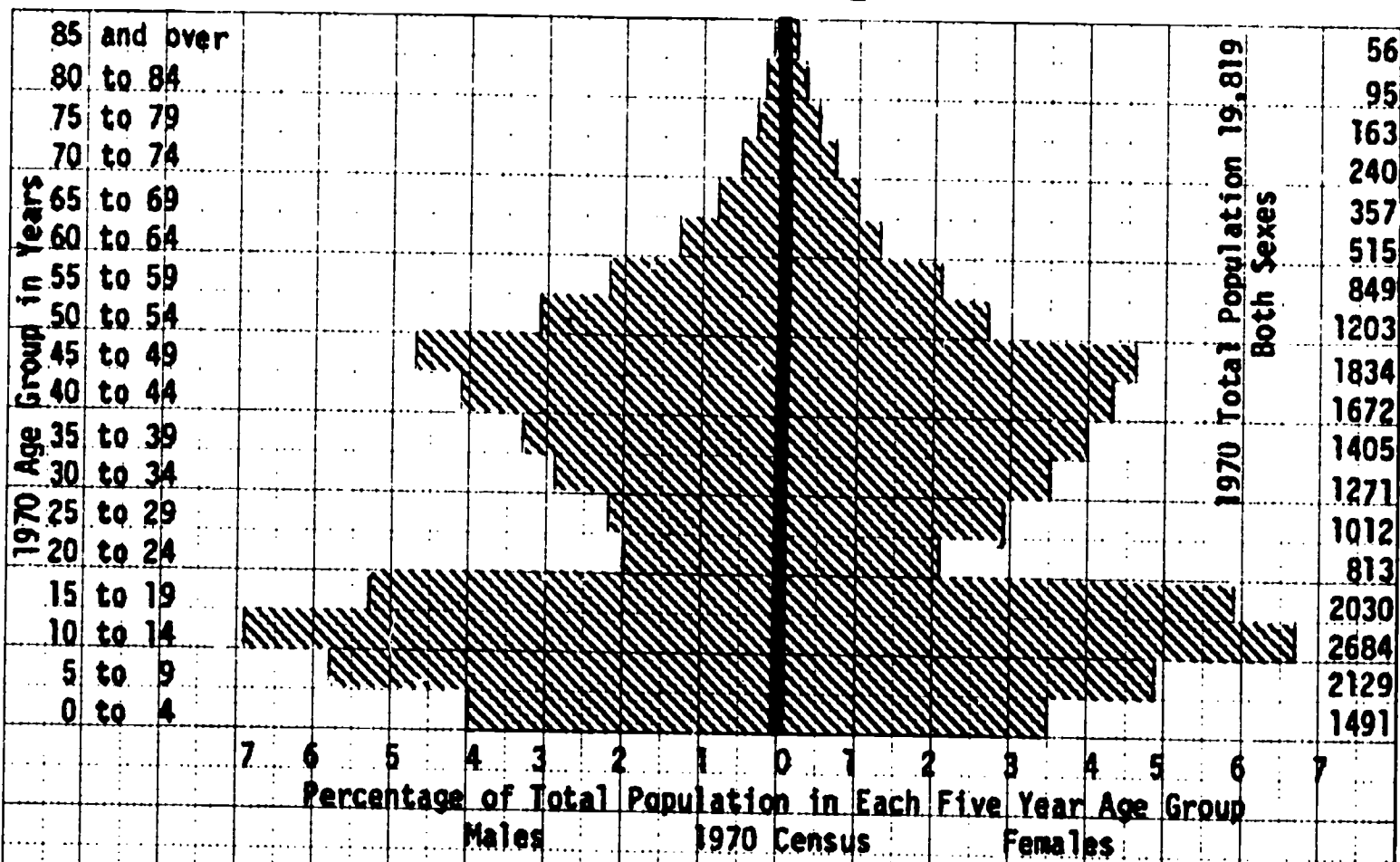
