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ABSTRACT

Prepared to assist those responsible for library programs serving American Indian people, this funding guide identifies potential funding sources for these programs. Four documents consulted to develop the list of program and grants are: (1) "U.S. Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance"; (2) "Federal Governmental Health, Education, and Welfare Programs of Assistance to American Indians Residing on Federal Reservations"; (3) "Foundation Directory"; and (4) "Foundation Grants Index". The 30 programs and 6 foundations listed are of three basic types: (1) those which libraries apply to separately, (2) those where libraries are included as part of a larger institution, and (3) those where libraries can apply either way. Information given for each program includes: program title, its popular name, the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance number, total appropriations for program and total for Indian library purposes, nature and purpose of program, who can apply and how to apply, address for obtaining further information, printed information available, authorizing legislation, and administering agency. Information given for each foundation includes: foundation name, Foundation Index number, purpose, financial information, and sample grants given. (NQ)

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INTRODUCTION

This funding guide has been prepared to assist those responsible for library programs serving Indian people. Its purpose is to identify potential funding sources for these programs. It is hoped that by using this guide, librarians and others responsible for Indian library services will be able to obtain funds necessary to develop meaningful programs which meet local information needs.


Several months of effort went into the preparation of this guide. Four documents were consulted to develop an initial list of program and grants: 1) U.S. Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance; 2) Federal Governments of Health, Education, and Welfare Programs of Assistance to American Indians Residing on Federal Reservations; 3) Foundation Directory; and 4) Foundation Grants Index. The agency responsible for each program was contacted usually by personal visits for information about the program. A draft based on the information gathered on each program was prepared and returned to the appropriate agency for comment. On its return, the information was included in this guide.

As a first edition, there will undoubtedly be errors. We encourage both agencies and individuals to inform us so that corrections can be made in future editions to be published.


Each program is described using ten basic elements. The "program title" is the formal name of the program as stated in the U.S. Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance. If it has

a popular name, this is also indicated. For more information, the reader is given the Catalog number. Funding in general and funds specifically identified as spent on Indian library and information services are shown in the following two elements. Basic information on the intent of the program and its basic functions are shown under "Nature and Purpose of Program." Eligibility is indicated under "Who Can Apply." If further information is required, the address is available in the next section. Authorizing legislation and the administering agency is indicated in the last two elements.

Acknowledgments are due to all of the agencies listed in this document. Their assistance has allowed this document to be developed. Mrs. Rebecca Cawley deserves primary credit for compiling the work. Credit must also be given to the American Library Association, Library Services to the Disadvantaged Committee, the American Indian Library Service Subcommittee, who originally identified the need for such a guide.

FOUNDATIONS

Foundations fund projects on an individual basis. Usually they are most interested in those proposals which are unique and will serve to answer a basic question or provide a model program. Their interest in supporting a regular program is minimal. Funds are limited to support only a few of the many proposals they receive.

These conditions make it difficult, though not impossible, to obtain projects for libraries. If you apply as a library, remember that your proposal should describe a broad need and your method for meeting it. If your library is part of a larger institution, you should see that funds for library services and resources are included in all appropriate proposals.

It is still difficult to determine foundation interest in any program. In the following pages are listed a few foundations who have indicated an interest in the past in funding both Indian and library programs. They should not be seen as all that is available. A WORD ON GRANTSMANSHIP

Grantsmanship is an applied art. In order to be successful, program needs must be identified and described. The availability of funds for each program must also be researched. The art is in combining these elements in a proposal which will be funded.

To identify and define needs it is first necessary to evaluate your present services. It is also necessary to have an accurate assessment of information needs of the people you serve. By comparing present services and needs an accurate idea of needs will be apparent.

Check this guide and others to see which programs exist to meet your needs. Pick the ones which most closely meet your needs. As deadlines and regulations for individual programs are announced in the Federal Register, write and submit your proposals.

The programs in this guide are of three basic types: 1) those which libraries apply to separately (ie., Title II or L.S.C.A.); 2) those which libraries are included as part of a larger institution (ie., J.O.M. or Impact Aid); and 3) those where libraries can apply either way (ie., Title IV and Right To Read). Every librarian should take the initiative to see that libraries are included in all three types of programs.
