II. PROSPECTUS:

A. Rationale:

VI. ACTIVITIES:

A. General Instructions:

These activities provide an opportunity for you to consider decisions that you have made and to generate alternatives. If you do not invest yourself, you will get little from the activities. Whether these activities have meaning or whether they are just another task depends on you.

If you have questions, if you have concerns, or if a particular task seems to be difficult for you, please contact the instructor.

Remember to complete the module as honestly as possible so that you can gain the maximum benefit from the suggested activities.

B. Specific Activities:

- 8.2 Choose a videotape which you have made to bring to the seminar.
- 8.3 Attend the seminar and participate in the activities.
 - a. Teacher Situations:

As a teacher you may find yourself in situations similar to these. Suggest several alternatives for each situation. Remember that there is rarely a correct answer; instead there are many possible solutions.

- 1. You are a member of a faculty committee.

 The committee has made a decision with which you do not agree. You feel you should do what you believe is right, but you also feel you should support the committee.
- You wish to change your students in a direction you believe is right, but they object.
- 3. You are doing your best as a teacher, but you have a few students who openly criticize you.
- 4. You wish to be democratic; however, if you do not tell the class what to do, they are unable to direct themselves.
- 5. You are part of a team. You wish to use democratic methods; the other teacher thinks it is more important to achieve specific results by other means.
- b. Teaching Decisions:

The instructor will choose a group member's videotape to be viewed for ten minutes. While



viewing this tape make a list of decisions that this person made while teaching. After viewing the tape discuss the decisions that he made and generate alternatives for each decision.

After discussion of the first tape, the instructor will choose another tape to be viewed. Repeat the same procedure. Do this until several tapes have been viewed.

c. Summary:

After the viewing of the tapes, the instructor will ask you to summarize what you received from this seminar.
