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ABSTRACT

The year 1973 was a turning point in the field of mental health education. All across the country, new programs were started to educate the public about mental health. Providing personal and technical assistance to local program directors and volunteers became a new role for NIMH. To that end, this updated listing of materials available to local programs was prepared. It includes only publishers of mental health pamphlets and other materials designed for use by the lay public and groups involved in education work with the lay public. Materials covered in the guide include pamphlets, leaflets, reports, periodicals, bibliographies, work kits, play scripts, discussion guides, films, radio programs, and posters. The guide is not intended to be exhaustive. (Author/PC)

A prime facility for diffusing knowledge to the public, the Extension Service works directly with local communities through offices located in nearly every county in the United States. Its staff of administrative and technical people assists State specialists and works with many other groups and agencies. State university specialists are professionally trained in agriculture, home economics, youth work, and related fields.

The universities also cooperate with local county governments to employ extension agents. Through these "professors in the field," the research findings of the universities, the Department of Agriculture, and other sources are conveyed to the public. Home economics work related to better family living and 4-H and other youth programs with boys and girls are among the activities designed to serve such groups as low-income families, the elderly, youth, young families, and others with special educational needs.

One of the most notable examples of this kind of service is a cooperative relationship which the Center has developed with the River Region Mental Health Services, a consortium of four community mental health centers serving the Louisville, Kentucky, metropolitan area.
