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ABSTRACT

This report is a summary of the findings from 102 foreign students who answer anonymously a mail questionnaire concerning their attitudes on such matters as dormitory living conditions, community life, finances, and related matters about their education at Western Michigan University. Findings suggest: (1) About two-thirds of these students either came directly from their homelands or were in this country only a short time prior to enrollment. (2) Slightly over 50 percent are self-supporting while the rest are financed by scholarships or are partially self-supporting. (3) Most students plan to return to their countries for employment after graduation. (4) Almost half of these students feel that their expenses were higher than anticipated. (5) Most students feel no discrimination or only a few isolated instances of it. (6) A few students still experience difficulty with the English language. (7) About half of these students live on campus; however, about 30 percent feel that dormitory living conditions are not as desirable as they expected. (8) Most students find social and recreational activities at WMU appealing; however, many feel that these activities do not fit their budgets. Additional findings and statistical data are presented. Summary of Findings

1. The total sample consists of 102 respondents ranging in age from less than 20 years to over 35 years.
2. About two-thirds of these students either came directly from their homelands or were in this country only a short while before enrolling at Western.
3. Slightly over 50 percent are self-supporting while the rest are financed by scholarships or are partially self-supporting.
4. Most students plan to return to their countries for employment after graduation.
5. Almost all students feel that their relations with the Foreign Student Affairs Office are usually satisfactory or at least somewhat satisfactory.
6. Almost half of these students feel that their expenses were higher than anticipated.
7. Most students feel no discrimination or only a few isolated instances while here at Western.
8. A few students still experience difficulty with the English language.
9. About half of these students live on campus; however, about 30 percent feel that dormitory living conditions are not as desirable as they expected.
10. Most students find social and recreational activities at WMU appealing; however, many feel that these activities do not fit their budgets.

11. The WMU health and medical facilities do not seem to completely fill the needs of these foreign students.
12. About half of these students have not joined student organizations.
13. Most foreign students seem to have rather fair to good interpersonal relationships with other students and seem to get along fairly well in the community.

Introduction

Periodic evaluation is necessary if an institution is to develop meaningful programs. This report is a summary of the findings from 102 foreign students who answered anonymously a mail questionnaire concerning their attitudes on such matters as dormitory living conditions, community life, finances, and related matters about their education here at Western Michigan University.

The questionnaire consisted of two parts. Part I included 29 multiple choice questions and Part II consisted of 13 short questions which required completion by the respondents.¹ The survey was completed in the Fall of 1972.

Sample Description

The total sample consisted of 102 respondents, 73 males, 27 females and 2 who did not give their sex. The majority (77) of the respondents were married. Their age ranges and classifications are listed below.

The remainder of this report describes the highlights of Tables 1 - 31 which are found on pages 8 through 23.

Residence and Academic Status
When Admitted to WMU
 (Tables 1 and 2)

Slightly over one-half of the foreign students were admitted to Western Michigan University while they were still living in their homelands. Another 14.7 percent were admitted after they were in the United States for a short while. In short, 66.6 percent of these students either came from their homelands directly or were in this country only a short while before enrolling here. Forty-four percent were students who transferred from other educational institutions.

Financial Support and Employment
after Graduation
 (Tables 3 and 4)

Slightly over 50 percent of these students stated that they were self-supporting while 23.4 percent were being financed by scholarships either from their own countries or the United States. Almost one-fifth were receiving partial assistance.

Most of these students (72.5%) plan to return to their own countries for employment, while 23.4 percent plan to remain in the United States or emigrate to another country.

Relationships with WMU Departments
and Instructional Staff
(Tables 5, 6, 7, and 8)

Most foreign students (82.3%) feel that their relationships are usually satisfactory with the Foreign Student Affairs Office. Another 16.6 percent feel that their relationships with this office are only somewhat satisfactory. Note that only one student feels that his experiences with the Foreign Student Affairs Office were usually unsatisfactory.

Relationships with the Counseling Services show that only 41.1 percent of foreign students feel that they have usually satisfactory experiences while 10.7 percent feel that they have usually unsatisfactory experiences. Experiences with academic advising are rated quite similarly to counseling experiences. About two-thirds of these students pointed out that their instructors were available most of the time to help them. A few stated that some instructors were seldom available when needed.

Anticipated Expenses
(Table 9)

Almost one-half of the foreign students found that their expenses were higher than anticipated. Only three students (2.9%) found that their expenses were less than anticipated. Possibly more informational work should be done in this area so that these students are better prepared to meet their financial responsibilities while studying here at WMU.

Discrimination While at WMU
(Table 10)

Students were asked how they felt about discrimination. Forty-five percent felt that they encountered no discrimination at WMU or in the community as a whole, while 46 percent experienced only a few isolated instances. Six students (5.8%) experienced frequent discrimination.

Problems with English Language
and Written Materials
(Tables 11 and 12)

To most of these students English is a second language. Difficulty with the language can directly affect their learning ability. Note that 41.1 percent feel that they experienced some difficulty but that these difficulties have diminished considerably. However, six students (5.8%) still are experiencing difficulties. It is also interesting to note that 9.8 percent feel that textbooks and workbooks are generally dull and confusing. Most students, on the other hand, feel that the written materials related to their coursework are stimulating and clear or adequate and understandable.

Housing Conditions
(Tables 13, 14 and 15)

Table 13 shows that 47.9 percent of these students live on campus either in dormitories or married housing, while the remainder live in some type of off-campus housing. Slightly over 30 percent feel that dormitory living conditions are less desirable than they expected while almost 12 percent feel that they are more desirable than expected. Campus married housing was rated better than dormitories or off-campus housing.

Transportation
(Table 17)

Table 17 shows that over one-third of the foreign students who responded drive their own cars while about one-half walk to school or take the bus.

Social and Recreational
Facilities
(Table 18)

Most students (75.4%) find that social and recreational facilities here at WMU are appealing; however, 50 percent feel that many of these activities do not fit their budgets. Another one-fifth (19.6%) feel that activities at WMU are not appealing to them nor do they fit their budgets.

Medical Facilities
(Table 19)

The WMU Health and Medical facilities do not completely fulfill the needs of foreign students according to Table 19. Only 29.4 percent feel that their needs are met while a like number do not feel that their medical and health needs are met at all. The remainder feel that their needs are partially met only. This appears to be another area, like expenses, where Western might improve its services to foreign students.

University Book Store
(Table 20)

A few students (13.7%) prefer to shop off campus almost exclusively while most students feel that the book store serves their needs entirely or in part.

Interpersonal and Group
Relationships

(Tables 21, 22, 23, 24 and 25)

Slightly over one-half of the foreign students (53.9%) indicated that campus student organizations do not appeal to them and that they have not joined any. Of the remainder who responded, 28.6 percent have joined one student organization and 13.7 percent have joined two or more organizations.

Foreign student attitudes (Table 22) concerning how people in the Kalamazoo community feel about them are equally divided. Forty-six percent feel that community people are cordial and understanding while an equal number feel that they are only superficially cordial. A small number (5.8%) feel that community people are indifferent and aloof.

Table 23 shows that almost one-third of these foreign students feel that their fellow students demonstrate a keen interest in them and have been helpful in their adjustment here at Western. Another 57.8 percent feel that most students will help if asked. Only 9.8 percent indicated that fellow students are indifferent and aloof to their overtures for friendship.

Over 70 percent have majors or minors in which there are quite a few to several of their friends and acquaintances (Table 24).

Most of these students indicated that they have been a guest in an American home. Table 25 shows that more than one-half have visited several times or frequently. Another 37.2 percent have visited at least once or twice in American homes.

Reasons for Choosing WMU,
Curricula Choice
(Tables 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 and 31)

Part II of the questionnaire covers country of origin, reasons for choosing Western Michigan University, curriculum choice and related matters.

Table 26 lists the home countries of the respondents, including the number from each nation. Table 27 shows the reasons given for enrolling at Western. Table 28 lists the reasons given for choosing their curricula. Table 29 is a tabulation of these curricula, majors and minors, arranged by Colleges. It is interesting to note that 72 percent of the students are still enrolled in their original curricular choice. Of these, 81 percent had been at Western two years and 91 percent expected to graduate from Western, earning one or more degrees covering a range of eleven different degrees (see Table 30).

Over 70 percent of the respondents felt that they received adequate information to enable them to prepare to come to Western in response to question 11. Over 18 percent of the respondents did not answer this question.

In responding to questions 12 and 13 of Part II, 67 of the students indicated they would still choose Western Michigan University primarily for the reasons of favorable intellectual, social or environmental atmospheres. Of the 23 who responded negatively concerning selecting Western again if the opportunity to choose were possible, nearly all gave academic atmosphere or higher expenses than anticipated as their reasons for a negative decision (see Table 31).
