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ABSTRACT

Washington colleges and universities report 80 external program options, 52 of which entail cooperative efforts among institutions, agencies, or organizations. A total of 66 cities and towns in Washington are directly served through external offerings. This inventory lists each of these program options, including those at private institutions. Information provided for each program includes: termination of program, normal time for student completion, location of the program, when the program is offered, special admission requirements, mode and level of instruction, credits available for the program, full-time equivalent faculty on-site; other support personnel on-site, enrollment for 1973-74, median age of the students for 1973-74, and sources of funding. EXTERNAL EDUCATION PROGRAM
OPTIONS AVAILABLE IN WASHINGTON

In February of 1974 the Washington State Senate adopted Senate Floor Resolution 1974-218 (SFR 218) directing the Council on Higher Education to review external options and report back on options available in Washington and a statewide approach to new offerings in this field. The Council was further directed to give specific attention, in developing a statewide approach to new offerings, to opportunities for cooperative efforts. A copy of the resolution is included as attachment A.

The Council on Higher Education, at its January 22 meeting, approved the following report as:

"a preliminary report to the legislature on the procedure the Council will use to coordinate external options. The Council recognizes that the present inventory is incomplete and will be further developed, completed, and transmitted in the near future."

INTRODUCTION AND DEFINITION OF EXTERNAL PROGRAMS

In response to Senate Floor Resolution 218, and in keeping with statutory directives to the Council on Higher Education to (1) identify the most effective division of responsibility among institutions in meeting defined needs, and specifically to (2) study and make recommendations concerning adult education, continuing education, and public service programs, the Council has prepared this report on external education offerings in Washington.

An external option was defined, both for purposes of surveying offerings and for establishing a statewide approach to new offerings, as a series of educational experiences possessing all of the following four characteristics.

1. meets the needs of persons who are unable or unwilling to spend extensive time on campus;
2. most learning occurs in locations geographically external to the major portion of the campus facilities,
3. designed to meet one or more of the following objectives: degree, license, diploma, certification, or attainment of specified program goals;
4. integrated program of generally twelve credit hours or more.

The term "external options" includes programs leading to

associate, baccalaureate, and graduate degrees, as well as packages of courses designed to meet certification standards, specified job skill levels, etc. These programs may be funded from user fees, grants, contracts, or institutional general funds.

In addition to the directive to report back to the legislature on a description of external options and a statewide approach to new options, SFR 218 also directed the Council to review all existing correspondence and extension programs, as well as newly developed external courses, offerings, and programs for appropriateness to the role of each respective institution and to minimize duplication. The Council staff is in the process of reviewing such options concurrent with its efforts in developing and refining institutional roles and missions (see the following section on "Statewide Approach to Coordination of External Programs" for an explanation of the review process).

STATEWIDE APPROACH TO COORDINATION OF
EXTERNAL PROGRAMS

Every effort should be made to provide postsecondary educational opportunities to persons unable to spend sufficient time on campus to complete a program offered wholly or largely on campus. However, to guard against duplication of curricula or facilities in a given location and to ensure effective use of available resources, it is necessary that (1) a coordinated and cooperative approach be adopted to the utilization of available teaching and support resources; (2) sufficient long term demand exists to warrant the external program; (3) the program is supported in accordance with general operating budget guidelines; and (4) the new program relates to the institution's role and mission. Accordingly, the Council on Higher Education has asked all institutions to keep it informed of any changes in patterns of external options.

In the event that a new external degree is proposed by any public institution, it will receive full and formal review by the Council in accordance with statutory directive. If, however, the external option is an outgrowth of already existing campus-based degree or certificate programs, the review process will not be as extensive as that undertaken for new degree programs. Council review of such options will take the form of alerting other institutions to the new development and eliciting their reactions, and commenting

to the institution offering the program. Careful analysis will be made of the potential for cooperative efforts through the sharing of facilities or curricula, or through the augmenting of already existing programs.

In keeping with recommendations of the Council's "Select Commission on Non-Traditional Study," all efforts to establish external options equal in quality to those offered on-campus will be encouraged. Particular attention should be given to the full integration of such options with on-campus programs so that credit is transferable between the two delivery modes.

The reporting form to be used by the offering institution to inform the Council of a new external option is shown as attachment B. Since the purpose of coordinating external program offerings is to encourage the development of new options, while at the same time to conserve scarce resources, detailed information will be collected only on those programs which have potential for state funding. Other external programs will be monitored, but no detailed information regarding resource implications will be required. This should give the Council and other involved parties a comprehensive view of all external options while ensuring manageable reporting requirements for the offering

institutions. The reporting form is still in its initial stages and will be refined as more experience is gained in coordinating external program developments.

Many of the problems associated with coordination of external offerings can be cured by the establishment of a clearing-house function within the Council for external program information. Accordingly, the Council will issue an updated inventory of external offerings at least once yearly depending upon the volume of reports received on new external program offerings.

INVENTORY OF EXTERNAL OPTIONS FOR 1973-74

The institutions were asked to describe each of their external offerings using the four criteria listed in the first section of this report. The criteria were purposefully left flexible to encourage the use of local judgment in reporting only those series of related courses or experiences which the institution had designed to be part of a unified program, and to exclude those programs which do not serve new populations but merely provide off-campus experience to regularly enrolled campus-based students. This definitional flexibility, however, requires a certain subjectivity when deciding whether or not to define a given program as external. Thus a few programs which lie on the periphery of the four criteria may be excluded from the inventory even though they fit the rubric of external options. As such programs come to light they will be added to the inventory.

To date, the colleges and universities report 80 external program options, 52 of which entail cooperative efforts among institutions, agencies or organizations. A total of 66 cities and towns in Washington are directly served through external offerings. Although several regions of the state are sparsely served, all Washington residents appear to have access to some form of postsecondary education.

Included in the inventory are external programs offered by private institutions. The private institutions were asked to respond to the survey on a voluntary basis to assist the Council in more fully describing available options, to provide a more complete inventory of external options available to Washington citizens, and to aid all institutions in developing new programs.

SENATE FLOOR RESOLUTION 1974-218

By Senators Gordon Sandison, George Scott and Dan Marsh

WHEREAS, Many of the state's residents do not have access to postsecondary education because of geographical location, handicaps, and economic or social disadvantage; and

WHEREAS, Alternative methods of providing opportunities for postsecondary education to persons unable to attend classes on a traditional campus have been explored by a special commission appointed by the Council on Higher Education; and

WHEREAS, Several of the state's institutions of higher education are exploring optional offerings external to the campus; and

WHEREAS, Coordination of such programs is essential to conserve scarce resources;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Council on Higher Education conduct a thorough review of all existing extension and correspondence programs to determine whether they are appropriate to the role of each respective institution and to minimize duplication; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Council on Higher Education review newly developed external courses, offerings, and programs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Council on Higher Education prepare guidelines and procedures for the adoption of such programs, giving specific attention to cooperative approaches among the institutions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Council on Higher Education submit a report to the Legislature by January, 1975, describing external options and a statewide approach to new offerings in this field.

- (a) Two months prior to the beginning date of a program that is less than 12 quarter credit hours (or the equivalent) in length, or
- (b) Six months prior to the beginning date of a program that is more than 12 quarter credit hours (or the equivalent) in length.

This reporting procedure will allow the Council adequate time to review the program, solicit comments from other institutions and reply to the report.

Institutions will be asked to update on an annual basis information on all external programs. The Council will distribute annually a listing of programs to aid institutions in updating.
