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ABSTRACT

This module provides the participant with an overview of life and living conditions in Puerto Rico so that a teacher he may better understand the lives of Puerto Rican children in mainland schools. Upon completion of this module, the participant will be able to (a) list major cultural forces in the lives of Puerto Ricans on the island and (b) describe both urban and rural lifestyles on the island. The student completes a preassessment test, chooses tasks from a list of alternatives, and concludes the module with a postassessment test. (A 22-item bibliography is included.) (PB)



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
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The Puerto Rican in Puerto Rico



RATIONALE

This module provides the participant with an overview of life and living conditions in Puerto Rico. It is believed that a knowledge of the major cultural forces at work in Puerto Rico is necessary for the teacher to better understand the lives of Puerto Rican children in mainland schools.

OBJECTIVES

Given a series of learning alternatives on the Puerto Rican in Puerto Rico, the participant will be able to:

- -list the major cultural forces in the lives of Puerto Ricans on the Island
- -describe both urban and rural life styles on the Island
