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**ABSTRACT**

The handbook provides college students and graduates with summary information about military service opportunities. All officer and enlisted personnel programs are described, along with entrance qualifications and active duty obligations. Officer programs fall into four categories: (1) training programs for undergraduates, which include military academics and ROTC programs in various branches of the armed service, (2) training programs for college graduates, available to individuals with no military training; (3) programs for students enrolled in medical, chaplaincy, or legal fields; and (4) direct appointment programs for graduates in the above professional fields, limited to persons fully qualified in their professions who can enter military service and perform their duties with a minimum amount of military training. Reserve enlisted programs require short periods of active duty for training and a six-year obligation for reserve training. Programs of the U. S. Public Health Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration are also described. Educational opportunities, pay scales, and supplemental benefits for military personnel are explained according to the person's military rank. Each program listing specifies program title, entry qualifications, program description, and active duty obligation. (SD)

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# PATHWAYS TO MILITARY SERVICE FOR COLLEGE MEN AND WOMEN

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## INTRODUCTION

This handbook is designed to provide college students and college graduates with summary information about opportunities in military service available to them.

Many thousands of college-trained persons, men and women, enter military service each year for full careers, primarily as commissioned officers. The Armed Forces have continuing requirements for persons trained in many of the professions found in civilian life. Among them are engineers, physicians, dentists, lawyers, ministers as well as those trained in many other disciplines ranging from the physical sciences to business administration. The Armed Forces also require large numbers of college-educated men for training in specialized military occupations in their combat arms and in allied activities such as military intelligence.

A military career provides an opportunity for service to one's country, for exercise of leadership and responsibility, and for individual accomplishment frequently not found in civil life. The material rewards are considerable, including attractive compensation, housing allowances, commissary and post exchange privileges, medical care, hospitalization, further educational opportunities and, eventually, liberal retirement benefits.

The programs presented in this handbook cover opportunities to serve as an officer or in the enlisted ranks. They are designed to meet the specialized needs of the Services as well as to provide a broad range of opportunities for the person who is considering the military as a career and/or who has a legal obligation to serve his country. Officer programs fall into four main categories:

### 1. Officer training programs for undergraduates.

These include the Academies, ROTC programs and other reserve officer training programs for undergraduates. The Service Academies provide four years of government-financed undergraduate study leading to a Bachelor of Science degree. The ROTC programs include both scholarship, and non-scholarship programs at civilian institutions; a limited amount of military subject matter is a part of the regular academic program. Some military training during the summer months is also required. Other reserve officer candidate training programs involve no military subject matter in the academic program but may require some military training during the summer months.

### 2. Officer training program, for college graduates.

These programs are available to individuals who had no military training as undergraduates. In all of these, the individual must undergo a prescribed number of weeks of officer candidate training as an enlisted man prior to commissioning.

### 3. Program, for student, in certain professional schools.

These programs are designed to meet specific requirements of the Armed Forces. They are limited to the medical and allied specialties, chaplaincy, or legal fields. In most medical and allied health programs the participant benefits from the fact that he is on active duty, in a pay status, while he is taking his professional training; in a few programs, the tuition and fees are also paid by the government. Participants in the chaplaincy and legal programs, as well as in a few medical programs, are not in an active duty status during the academic term but may enter active duty during the summer months, with full pay and allowances for military training in their specialties. Thus, all of these programs have financial benefits of varying degree.

*4. Direct appointment programs for graduates in certain professional fields.*

Most of these programs are concentrated in the medical and other health fields or the ministerial or legal professions. Entries into these programs are limited to persons who are fully qualified in their professions and who can enter military service and perform their duties with a minimum amount of military training. The chief advantage in these programs is that the participant knows in advance that he will serve only in his professional capacity and the experience gained thereby will be valuable to him when he returns to civil life.

For most programs, physical standards for officers are relatively high. Programs for which physical standards are more flexible are in the professional and scientific fields, which predetermine the nature and, to some extent, the environment of the officers' military duties. The physical standards for flying duty exceed the standards for nonflying duty in many respects. For example, distant visual acuity, uncorrected, must be 20/20 in each eye.

Regular enlistment programs afford some advantages to college men who cannot meet physical standards for officer programs or do not choose to serve as officers. While these programs do not necessarily require college training, many of the special options that are available do require a high degree of intelligence and skill. Persons with some college education and, indeed, those with bachelor's degrees are good candidates for noncommissioned officer assignments, many of which require leadership qualities. Enlistees also have opportunities to apply for officer candidate programs.

Reserve enlisted programs requiring short periods of active duty for training are the least disruptive to civilian careers. After the active duty, for training period reservists must participate in reserve training for the balance of their 6-year obligation and they are subject to call to active duty in the event of war or national emergency or when otherwise authorized by law during their obligated term of service. Because of the short active duty period, these programs are sought by many college students and graduates. The opportunities for college men are, however, somewhat limited by the relatively small size of the programs and the priorities which have been established. A reserve program involving 2 years of active service and 4 years of reserve training is also available in the Navy.

Programs of the U.S. Public Health Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration are also described in this handbook.

## ACADEMIES

The Service Academies (Military Academy, Naval Academy, Air Force Academy, and Coast Guard Academy) are fully-accredited, degree-granting institutions whose mission is to prepare young men for careers as military officers. All tuition, room and board, and medical expenses are paid by the Federal Government. In addition, students receive adequate pay and allowances to cover their uniforms, textbooks, equipment, laundry, and incidentals.

The Merchant Marine Academy is also a fully-accredited, degree-granting institution whose mission is to prepare men for careers in the American Merchant Marine. All tuition, room and board, and medical care are paid by the Federal Government. In addition, students receive an allowance for prescribed uniforms and textbooks except while serving aboard ship during the second year, when they receive specified monthly pay. *Qualifications*  
Men only. Completion of specified secondary school courses. Obtain prescribed scores on College Entrance Examination Board or American College Testing tests. Nomination by U.S. Senators or Congressmen or other legally-designated authorities. Never married. Meet rigid physical standards. At least 17 but less than 22 years of age as of July 1 of the year of admission.

*Description of program*  
Selected candidates are appointed U.S. Army or U.S. Air Force cadets or U.S. Navy midshipmen and receive 4 years of college level education, plus military training during the summer months, and upon successful completion, are granted Bachelor of Science degrees. Upon graduation, they are commissioned as second lieutenants or ensigns. Freshman enrollment between 1,300-1,400 for each Academy.

Obligated to serve at least 5 years after commissioning.

*Qualifications*

Men only. Completion of specified secondary courses. Selection through nationwide competition using the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board. Never Married. Meet rigid physical standards. (No Congressional appointments or geographical quotas.) At least 17 but less than 22 years of age as of July 1 of the year of appointment.

**U.S. Merchant Marine Academy.**

Men only. Never married. Satisfactory completion of high school education with specified credits in selected subjects. Obtain prescribed scores on College Entrance Examination Board tests. Meet rigid physical standards. Nomination by a U.S. Senator, Member of Congress or other legally-designated authorities. At least 17 but less than 22 years of age on July 1 of the year of admission. Waiver may be granted for every month of service up to age 24.

*Description of program*

Selected candidates are appointed U.S. Coast Guard cadets and receive one-half of the basic monthly pay of an ensign. They receive 4 years of college-level education, plus military training during the summer months, and upon successful completion are granted Bachelor of Science degrees. Upon graduation, they are commissioned as ensigns. Freshman enrollment approximately 380 annually.

*Active duty obligation*

Obligated to serve at least 5 years after commissioning.

Successful candidates for appointment as cadets at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy are also midshipmen, U.S. Naval Reserve during their 4 years of enrollment. The 4-year course includes 1 year, which is the second year of the course, at sea aboard U.S. merchant vessels. The students graduate as third mates or third assistant engineers prepared for a seafaring career in the merchant marine. They are granted bachelor of science degrees and are also commissioned as ensigns, USNR.

Graduates have a moral obligation to sail in the Merchant Marine for not less than 3 consecutive years after graduation. As reservists, graduates must perform satisfactorily for 6 years, which includes sailing on their licenses in accordance with their obligation to the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy and meeting Navy requirements for training duty and correspondence courses.

## RESERVE OFFICER TRAINING CORPS (ROTC)

The Army, Navy, and Air Force conduct ROTC programs on many college and university campuses. Some colleges sponsor ROTC programs of more than one military department. Students from institutions which do not have an ROTC unit may enroll in a neighboring institution's ROTC program upon approval of the ROTC faculty, head and with the concurrence of the institutions. Persons attending undergraduate institutions offering the 4-year program may be commissioned upon graduation if they participated in 4 years of ROTC training. This is the most common procedure.

The 2-year program is generally intended to make ROTC training available to undergraduates transferring from junior colleges or individuals that previously attended 4-year colleges which do not offer ROTC training. However, the 2-year program is also available to limited numbers of graduate students who did not have the opportunity to participate in ROTC training during their undergraduate years. All enrollees in the 2-year program must successfully complete summer training of not less than 6 weeks duration as a preliminary requirement for admission to the 2-year course.

Each of the military departments offers both scholarship and non-scholarship ROTC programs. Four-year scholarships are offered by each of the departments. The Army and the Navy also offer 1-, 2-, and 3-year scholarships, while the Air Force offers 2- and 3-year scholarships. All scholarships pay tuition, required fees, textbooks, and laboratory expenses, plus a subsistence allowance of \$100 for each month (40 months maximum) the student is enrolled academically. Two and four-year nonscholarship students receive a monthly subsistence allowance of \$100 during their Junior and Senior years (20 months maximum).

### ARMY

For both the 2-year and 4-year programs, participants must complete courses leading to a baccalaureate or higher degree in any field of study and must complete specified military science courses during each year as part of their academic curriculum, and go to a 6-week summer camp. Applicants for the 2-year program must successfully complete a 6-week summer camp prior to entering the program.

Priorities for the 2-year program have been established under which preferential consideration is given to undergraduate upper-classmen and graduate students who previously did not have the opportunity to take ROTC training.

Upon graduation, commissions may be tendered in the regular Army or the Army Reserve. Participants in the scholarship program are required to serve on active duty for 4 years. Participants in the nonscholarship program receiving commissions in the Regular Army are required to serve on active duty for 3 years; those commissioned in the Army Reserve are required to serve on active duty for 2 years, or on active duty training for 3 to 6 months, as ordered. Delays in reporting for active duty may be granted to persons who desire to complete full-time graduate study.

Students, during their final year of ROTC training, may volunteer for flight instruction as part of their extracurricular activities. Those who are accepted receive 35 hours of ground instruction and 36½ hours of flight instruction in addition to their regular ROTC training. Upon commissioning and after completion of Army aviation training, they are required to serve on active duty for 3 consecutive years. Medical fitness standards for aviation

training are higher than for nonaviation programs, including distant visual acuity, uncorrected, of 20/20 in each eye.

Application for 4-year scholarships will be submitted to the appropriate ROTC Region Headquarters. Applications must be submitted between 1 September and 31 December. Applications for 1-, 2-, 3-year scholarships should be made to the Professors of Military Science of the colleges in which the ROTC members are enrolled. All scholarships are granted on a competitive basis. It is expected that approximately 1,000 new 4-year scholarships and 1,200 new 1-, 2-, or 3-year scholarships will be awarded each academic year.

Applicants for scholarships must be at least 17 years of age by 1 October of the year of enrollment as scholarship cadets and be under the age of 25 on 30 June of the calendar year in which they will become eligible for commissioning. Nonscholarship students must be at least 17 years of age for enrollment in the advanced course and be under 28 years of age at time of commissioning. The programs are open to men and women who meet prescribed physical standards.

#### NAVY/MARINE CORPS

**Navy-Marine College Scholarship Program:** About 1,800 new scholarships are awarded each year. This program covers a period of up to 4 years and pays tuition, cost of textbooks, other fees of an instructional nature, and subsistence allowance of \$100 per month. Applications must be made prior to 1 November. Applicants must take either the Scholastic Aptitude Test or American College Test. Those qualifying by test score are

given a physical examination and interviewed by a board of officers. Final selections are made by a national selection committee in Washington, D.C. Each State and territory of the United States, including the District of Columbia is assigned a proportionate share of principal and alternate candidates for the College Scholarship Program.

Applicants must take the responsibility of applying for admission to a college or university of their choice from those sponsoring Navy ROTC units.

Upon commencement of the freshman year, selectees are appointed Midshipmen of the Naval Reserve. Participants in this program must complete courses leading to the baccalaureate degree, Navy specified university courses, and naval science courses as well as three summer training periods. Upon graduation, participants in the scholarship program are tendered commissions in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and are required to serve on active duty for 4 years.

Male applicants must be at least 17 but less than 21 years of age on June 30 of the year in which they desire to enter the program, except those contemplating a college course which takes 5 years to complete must be under 20 years of age on 30 June. Female applicants must be 18 by 1 September of the year in which they desire to enter the program.

**Navy-Marine College Program.** The College Program provides the opportunity for young men and women to qualify for an appointment in the Reserve components of the Navy or Marine Corps. Naval science requirements are similar to those of the College Scholarship Program, although only one summer training period is required. Participating students receive uniforms, naval textbooks, and, during their junior and senior years, \$100 per month (20 months maximum). Graduates normally serve 3 years on active duty after commissioning. Standards of enrollment are basically identical to those for the College Scholarship Program.

Physical standards in the area of visual acuity are not as stringent. Information concerning both programs may be obtained by writing the Commander, Navy Recruiting Command, Department of the Navy, Washington, D.C. 20370, or from Professors of Naval Science at institutions having Navy ROTC units.

#### AIR FORCE

For both the 2-year and 4-year Air Force ROTC programs, participants must complete courses leading to a baccalaureate or higher degree in any field of study, and must complete specified Air Force ROTC courses as part of their academic curriculum. The 4-year participant is required to attend a 4-week summer field training encampment, normally between his sophomore and junior years. The 2-year applicant must successfully complete a 6-week field training encampment during the summer prior to entering the program. Cadets who are pilot qualified attend a flight instruction program during their final year. It consists of a ground school and flight instruction which may lead to a private pilot's license.

Upon graduation, a commission in the Air Force Reserve is tendered. Entry on active duty often may be delayed to complete graduate work. Those who accept a Reserve commission in a flying category incur a 5-year active duty commitment upon completion of flight training. Those who are commissioned in a nonflying capacity serve on active duty for a minimum of 4 years.

Beginning in September 1970, women were permitted to enroll in both the 4-year and 2-year programs, when allowed by the host college or university.

College scholarships, for 2 to 4 years, are available to selected students. Applications for 4-year scholarships, available to pilot and navigator candidates only, will be submitted to AFROTC/SIDS, Maxwell AFB, AL 36112. Applications must be postmarked no later than 31 December of the senior year in high school. The applicant must take either the American College Test or the Scholastic Aptitude Test no later than the December test cycle of the same year. The 4-year scholarship applicant must be physically and mentally qualified for flying and agree to enter flying training after commissioning. It is the responsibility of the applicant to obtain admission to an institution which hosts the 4-year AFROTC program.

Scholarships for 3 years are also available to pilot and navigator candidates. Scholarships for 2 years are available to both men and women cadets in certain technical academic specialties, and to men in flying and missile categories. Applications for these scholarships are accepted and processed by the Professor of Aerospace Studies at institutions which host the Air Force ROTC program. All scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis.

Applicants for scholarships must be at least 17 years of age at the time of enrollment as scholarship cadets and under age 25 on 30 June of the year they will be commissioned. Nonscholarship students must be at least 17 by the time they enter the last 2 years of the program and under 26½ if they will enter flying training, or under 30 if nonflying, at the time of commissioning.

## OTHER RESERVE OFFICER TRAINING PROGRAMS FOR UNDERGRADUATES

These programs provide for enlistment into a military service while individuals are still undergraduates. They require participation in summer military training, in a pay status. Upon graduation, participants are commissioned and, in all except one program, enter on extended active duty. Several programs which do not fall into this category but which are available to undergraduates, as well as college graduates, are listed in the section, "Officer Training Programs for College Graduates".

Army National Guard special commission plan

Men only. Enlistment in the National Guard during second semester of sophomore year in a college which does not have an ROTC unit. At least 20 but not over 28 years of age at time of commissioning.

Participants must attend armory training during second semester of sophomore year. Participate in basic training at an Army training center for 8 weeks at end of sophomore year. Attend armory training during junior year. Enter State National Guard officer candidate school at end

of junior year, commence drawing sergeant's pay and attend 15 days of field training. Attend weekend training with OCS during senior year. Attend 15 days of field training at end of senior year in June. Graduate from OCS and be commissioned as a second lieutenant, Army National Guard.

*Active duty obligation*  
6 months additional active duty for each year, or portion thereof, in which a candidate receives financial assistance (for example, a candidate who receives 3 years of financial assistance and is commissioned as a ground officer will have an active duty obligation of 2½ years plus 18 months, for a total of 4 years after commissioning).

*Description of program*

Enlist in Marine Corps Reserve, attend 8 weeks training in grade E-5 prior to commissioning. Commissioned upon graduation from college.

*Active duty obligation*

2½ years active duty.

**Marine Corps Woman Officer Candidate program (subsidized).**

Must be an undergraduate member of the Woman Officer Candidate program, who has successfully completed the Woman Officer Candidate course (summer session).

Following successful completion of the 8-week Woman Officer Candidate course (summer session), apply to the Commandant of the Marine Corps for financial assistance. Upon selection, candidates receive \$100 per month during the academic year (Sept. through May) providing they maintain satisfactory status in the Woman Officer Candidate program.

2½ years active duty plus 6 months additional active duty for each year, or portion thereof, during which a candidate receives financial assistance.

## OFFICER TRAINING PROGRAMS FOR COLLEGE GRADUATES

All of these programs except two require at least a baccalaureate degree as a prerequisite for entrance. One program requires at least 2 years of college and the other requires a high school education only. In all of them, the participants serve in an enlisted status while they are undergoing officer training. Upon completion of training, officer candidates are commissioned; those completing the Army Warrant Officer Flight Training program are appointed warrant officers.

Most of these programs are highly competitive at the present time. Persons are advised to apply for these programs in their senior year of college in order that the processing of their applications, which normally requires several months time, can be initiated, and possibly completed, before graduation. In view of the

*large number of candidates for these programs at the present time, the Services have become more selective in choosing from among those who are found qualified.*

Further information on any programs of the Army (except Army National Guard) Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force may be obtained from the respective recruiting offices of these services located in most large and medium-size cities throughout the country (consult local telephone directory listings under "United States Government"). Information on Coast Guard programs may be obtained from Commandant (PTP-2), U.S. Coast Guard, Washington, D.C. 20591 and on Army National Guard programs from National Guard armories.

**Note.**—The Army in March 1973 temporarily suspended the college option enlistment program for OCS. Suspension of this option is expected to continue for the foreseeable future. The Officer Candidate School which is open for in-service applicants only was reduced from 23 to 14 weeks with attendance at the branch officer basic course occurring immediately after graduation from OCS.

Enlist as officer candidate and receive pay and allowances of grade E-5 upon commencement of OCS training, which is of 18 weeks duration. Upon completion of OCS training, participants are commissioned as ensign, USNR.

**Active duty obligation**  
Training period plus 3 years after commissioning.

Following completion of the basic school, officers are ordered to return to their OMCR unit and are released from active duty. Officers commissioned in this program agree to attend all scheduled drill and annual training duty periods during the 6 years of their obligated commissioned service.

## PROGRAMS FOR STUDENTS IN MEDICAL AND ALLIED HEALTH FIELDS

These programs are designed to provide qualified medical, dental, and other health specialists. All of them provide for enlistment or appointment while participants, both men and women, are still in training for their professions. In most of the programs, the participants are in an active duty status while completing their training; in a few, tuition and other educational costs are also paid by the military service or the special training is given at a military installation. Thus considerable financial advantage accrues to the individual participant.

### *Military service program*

#### **Armed Forces Health Scholarship Program, Army, Navy and Air Force**

Men or women; U.S. citizen; be eligible for Reserve appointment. Enrolled in or accepted for admission as students of medicine, osteopathy, dentistry, veterinary medicine, podiatry, optometry or clinical psychology (at Ph. D. level), in schools located in United States or Puerto Rico accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency or association which is recognized by the U.S. Commissioner of Education.

Four years' suitable professional experience for lieutenant; 9 years' suitable professional experience for lieutenant commander. Age limits vary with grade of commission tendered.

Commissioned as Lieutenant or lieutenant commander, USNR.

3 years upon completion of officer indoctrination and basic civil engineer course.

**Military service and program**  
**Coast Guard direct commission program for Maritime Academy graduates.**

**Qualifications**  
 Men and women. Possess baccalaureate degree from State or Federal Maritime Academy, received not more than 2 years prior to application. Application may be initiated during senior year. Hold third mate or third assistant engineer license or higher. Attain qualifying score on officer qualification test. Age 21 to 26 inclusive.

**Navy Merchant Marine.**

**Description of program**  
 Commissioned as ensign in Coast Guard Reserve. Generally initial assignment is in the mission area of merchant marine inspection and maritime safety.

**Qualifications**  
 Men only. Possess a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited institution. Must hold license as mate, assistant engineer, or purser; pursers must have served a minimum of 2 years under a certificate of registry. At least 19 but not more than 41 years of age at time of commissioning.

**Description of program**  
 Students at State maritime academies attend naval science courses and must be recommended for commission by the head of the Naval Science Department and the school superintendent prior to appointment. Graduates of institutions other than the State maritime academies are not required to have previous naval science training. Normally appointed ensign USNR inactive (active duty may be requested) in unrestricted line. Purers receive Supply Corps commission. Appointment to higher grade depends on age and length of Merchant Marine service.

**Active duty obligation**  
 3 years from date of commissioning.

**Four options:**  
 Must sail on Coast Guard license for  
 (1) 6 months each year for 3 consecutive years after commissioning,  
 or

*Military service and program*

Air National Guard direct appointments, other than pilots and navigators.

*Qualifications*

Men or women. Same qualifications with respect to education and/or experience as for appointments in the regular forces. Minimum age 18 (men) 21 (women). Nurses may be appointed as second lieutenants at age 20.

Air National Guard direct appointment of pilots and navigators.

Men only. Two years of college (minimum of 60 semester hours or 90 quarter hours). Must enter training before age 27½.

*Description of program*

Commissioned in any category to fill a vacancy in the Air National Guard of a State, the District of Columbia, or the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

*Active duty obligation*

No active duty requirement. Must participate in reserve training and be available for active duty in a war or emergency.

Must attend the ANG Academy of Military Science for 6 weeks to obtain commission. After commissioning, they are required to take flying training on active duty for about 18 months.

No active duty after flying training. Complete their 6-year obligation in reserve drills and summer training.

## **REGULAR ENLISTMENT PROGRAMS**

A variety of regular enlistment programs are available. Active duty terms range from 2 to 6 years, although not all services offer the complete range. (Also see statement under enlisted reserve programs.) Enlistment options as to training and assignment are available in some of the services. All of the services except the Coast Guard offer delays from entering active duty for up to 180 days after enlistment. This provides young men with the opportunity to arrange their personal affairs in a manner convenient to them before they leave civil life. Qualified enlisted men may be considered for officer candidate schools if they so desire. Programs are also available for women.

General information on these programs is shown on the following pages. More specific information on individual programs may be obtained from the local recruiting offices of the respective services. They are listed in telephone directories.

### **ARMY**

Enlistments in the Regular Army are accepted for periods of 2 to 6 years. Several enlistment options, other than the Regular Army option, are offered to persons who can meet the prerequisites for qualification and enlist for 3 or more years.

The Army Service School enlistment option guarantees in writing attendance at specific Army school courses selected by men and women who otherwise qualify. Selections may be made from more than 300 courses offered which include courses in electronics, precision maintenance, electrical or mechanical maintenance, general technical, clerical and medical skills, among others.

Several enlistment options offer applicants not only a choice

of training in a skill, but also a choice of unit or geographical location with a guaranteed period of stabilization with the unit or in the area.

Other guaranteed options include airborne training, and of special appeal for college men and women, US Army Security Agency and Strategic Communications Command enlistment options, and language school enlistment option.

Programs are also available to provide a higher enlistment grade for applicants with previous para-military experience, and provisions for accelerated promotion for individuals possessing a civilian-acquired skill required by the Army.

### **NAVY**

Within Navy's regular 4- to 6-year enlistment programs are several special programs such as the Nuclear Field program and the Advanced Electronics Field program. Enlistments into these programs provide for entry into class "A" (apprentice) schools for special training. The Nuclear Field program includes training in both nuclear submarines and the nuclear surface ships programs. The Electronic Field program leads to ratings such as data systems technician, electronics technician, missile technician, aviation electronics technician, and aviation fire control technician.

Navy offers a high school graduate training program which guarantees assignment to a class "A" school level in one of the following categories in which they enlist: Airmen, hospitalman, and seaman. The guarantee provides that enlistees will be assigned to one of the schools or courses applicable to the category in which

they enlist; it does not guarantee assignment to a specific school or course of instruction.

Vocational school graduates may be enlisted with the guarantees of a "striker" designation (apprentice) in one of six skill areas.

Applicants who have completed a 1-year course in addition to high school may be enlisted in pay grade E-2. Those who have completed a 2-year course, in addition to high school, may be enlisted in grade E-3. (Normal entry pay grade is E-1.)

Navy also has a special enlistment program for graduates of junior colleges, community colleges, or technical institutes. The instructional program of such institutions must be 2 academic years in length or the equivalent. Graduates of such institutions may be enlisted in advance pay grade E-3. Enlistment in advance pay grade E-2 is offered to individuals who have completed 1 year. Persons with these educational qualifications are accepted for guaranteed training among numerous fields in the seaman, nuclear, airman, electronics, and hospital categories.

#### MARINE CORPS

##### *Male applicants*

The Marine Corps currently offers enlistments of 2, 3 or 4 years. Qualified applicants who enlist for a period of 1/2 years may be assured assignment to the aviation school program, the musicians assignment program, or to one of four different ground groupings of occupational specialties in the ground enlistment program: Group I—Combat Arms; Group II—Administrative Specialist; Group III—Technical Specialist; and Group IV—Electronics and Communications.

The applicant may be enlisted and delay his departure 180 days before going on active duty. Time in the delay program counts toward longevity for pay purposes and completion of the 6-year military obligation.

The length of enlistment in the Air Force (4 or 6 years) is determined by the option which the applicant qualifies for and selects. More guarantees and inducements are available to applicants enlisting for the longer period. The Air Force enlists persons for 4 years in its regular program. Based on aptitude scores, enlists are assigned for training in a career field within one of four broad areas—electronics, general, administrative, or mechanical. Within quotas prescribed by HQ USAF, applicants may also enlist for 4 years in a guaranteed Air Force specialty. In addition, qualified applicants may enlist for 6 years with a guarantee of extended technical training and other incentives.

#### Coast Guard

Regular enlistments are made for 4 years. Classification tests administered at time of application enable specific school guarantees to be made prior to enlistment for qualified individuals. Delayed enlistment option enables applicant to adjust time of entry on active duty. Graduates of specialized vocational training programs in electronics, aviation maintenance and the maritime arts can receive immediate promotion up to pay grade E-5 upon satisfactory completion of basic training if found qualified at the time of enlistment.

#### *Female applicants*

The Marine Corps offers 2-, 3-, or 4-year initial enlistments. All special enlistment programs offered to men are available to women with the exception of the combat arms group mentioned under *Male Applicants*.

In addition, the Marine Corps offers a choice of area of duty assignment for a number of women who enlist for 3 or 4 years.

#### AIR FORCE

The length of enlistment in the Air Force (4 or 6 years) is determined by the option which the applicant qualifies for and selects. More guarantees and inducements are available to applicants enlisting for the longer period. The Air Force enlists persons for 4 years in its regular program. Based on aptitude scores, enlists are assigned for training in a career field within one of four broad areas—electronics, general, administrative, or mechanical. Within

#### **REGULAR ENLISTMENT PROGRAMS FOR WOMEN**

The Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force offer regular enlistment programs for women. In each service, the applicant must have a high school diploma (general educational development test equivalent is accepted in some services). Terms of initial

enlistment for nonprior service applicants are: Army, 2 to 6 years; Navy, 3, 4, or 6 years; Marine Corps, 2 to 4 years, and Air Force, 4 or 6 years. Several of the special enlistment programs offered by Army (see Regular Enlistment Programs—Army) are available to women.

## RESERVE ENLISTMENT PROGRAMS (For Individuals Without Prior Service)

Two types of enlisted reserve programs are available: (1) Those requiring short periods of active duty for training, followed by participation in reserve training for the remainder of the 6-year total obligation imposed by law, and (2) those requiring 2 years of active duty (excludes Air Force Reserve). Additional information may be obtained from the following local sources which are listed in telephone directories under the heading "United States Government":

- Army National Guard—Army National Guard Units.
- Army Reserve—U.S. Army Reserve Units.
- Naval Reserve—U.S. Naval Reserve Training Centers or Naval Air Reserve Training Units.
- Air Force Reserve—U.S. Air Force Reserve Units.
- Air National Guard—Air National Guard Units.
- Marine Corps Reserve—Organized Marine Corps Reserve Units.
- Coast Guard Reserve—U.S. Coast Guard Recruiting Offices.

### *Active duty for training programs*

The Reserve components listed above conduct enlisted reserve programs which require at least 4 months of active duty for training, with the remainder of a total 6-year obligation to be served in the Ready Reserve. Applications are accepted only to meet unit vacancies. Thus, opportunities are limited and vary

with time. Persons desiring to enlist in these programs must ascertain whether unit openings exist in their locale at the time they desire to enlist.

The military departments are required to actively recruit qualified individuals of all races, creeds, and ethnic groups so that all reserve units generally reflect the character of the population in the unit's recruiting area. The reserve forces actively recruit qualified women for their enlisted programs.

Upon completion of the active duty for training, reservists return home and are required to attend prescribed drills and training—usually one drill per week (or one weekend per month) and 2 weeks of summer training. Qualified Reservists are entitled to receive a quarters allowance while undergoing their initial active duty for training.

The Army and Air National Guard also have enlistment programs for women.

### *Active duty programs*

Only the Navy conducts an enlisted reserve program requiring 2 years of active duty, with the remainder of a 6-year obligation to be served in the Ready Reserve. Qualified applicants are enlisted in order of their dates of application. The planned active duty date must be within 180 days of the date of enlistment.

## PROGRAMS OF THE U.S. PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE

Since its origin in 1798, the U.S. Public Health Service has been making increasingly important contributions to the Nation's health. Today, it is a vital force in advancing research in the health sciences, in developing public health programs, and in providing therapeutic and preventive services. The Service's Commissioned Corps, established in 1873, provides the professional leadership necessary to the success of these diversified activities. The health professional who qualifies for appointment in the Commissioned Corps of the Public Health Service will find that the scope of its programs offers unbounded opportunity for professional growth and achievement. He will become one of the select professionals who perpetuate the traditions of the oldest and yet the most modern health service of the U.S. Government. He will be in continuous association with leaders of his own profession and with leaders of other health sciences.

The Military Selective Service Act provides opportunities for a young man to discharge his obligation to his country by serving

### *S5 program*

Commissioned officer student training and extern program (COSTEP), Commissioned Corps, U.S. Public Health Service, undergraduate program.

Men or women. Students must have completed a minimum of 2 years of a baccalaureate program in dietetics-nutrition, engineering, nursing, pharmacology, therapy, or sanitary science, or have completed a minimum of 1 year of study in medical, dental or veterinary school and expect to return to college after assignment.

as an officer in the Commissioned Corps of the U.S. Public Health Service. The Selective Service Act provides that service of 24 months in the Commissioned Corps satisfies the requirement for service imposed by the law.

In addition to the specific qualifications for the individual programs listed below, applicants must be citizens of the United States, must be at least 21 years of age but not more than 44 years of age (except for the Commissioned Officer Student Training and Extern programs, where candidates must be at least 18 years of age) and must meet prescribed Public Health Service physical standards.

*Active duty obligations*

No mandatory period of service is required for participation in program. However, upon completion of academic qualifications, an officer may request consideration for extended active duty assignment. Two years of extended active duty with the Commissioned Corps satisfies the requirement for service imposed by the Military Selective Service Act.

### *Description of program*

A limited number of students are commissioned in the Reserve Corps and called to active duty with full pay and allowances in the grade of junior assistant (equivalent to Navy ensign) for training during "free periods" of the academic year. Assignments are made for not less than 31 nor more than 120 days in any 12-month period. Commission is inactivated after assignment.

*Qualifications*

*Description of program*  
Successful candidates are commissioned in the Reserve Corps and according to their interests; and training may serve with the Public Health Service in a clinical, administrative, or research capacity. They receive the same pay and allowances as their military counterparts. The major professional categories of the Commissioned Corps include medicine, dentistry, nursing, health services, pharmacy, engineering, physical and biological sciences, sanitation, therapy, dietetics, and veterinary medicine.

*Active duty obligation*  
2 years of active duty with the Commissioned Corps satisfies the requirement for service imposed by the Military Selective Service Act.

Commissioned officer residency deferment program (CORD), U.S. Public Health Service.

Men only. Graduate of an approved medical school who are liable for 2 years of service under the Military Selective Service Act. Not over 32 years of age at time of entry on active duty.

Physicians selected for the CORD program are deferred from induction under the Military Selective Service Act for residency training in specialties required by the Public Health Service. They are appointed as commissioned officers in the inactive component of the Reserve Corps of the Public Health Service and while in residency training receive no pay or allowances from the service. The stipend normally paid by the hospitals to residents can be received

Upon completion of residency training, obligated to serve on active duty with the Public Health Service for 2 years, thereby satisfying the requirement for service imposed by the Military Selective Service Act.

## THE COMMISSIONED CORPS OF THE NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC ADMINISTRATION

NOAA, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration of the U.S. Department of Commerce, is a leader in the national effort to improve man's comprehension and uses of the physical environment and its oceanic life. Through its major organizational elements—the National Ocean Survey, National Weather Service, National Marine Fisheries Service, National Environmental Satellite Service, Environmental Research Laboratories, and Environmental Data Service—NOAA carries out its broad programs of service and research. NOAA officers are trained for positions of leadership and command in the operation of ships and aircraft; in the conduct of field projects on land, on and under the sea,

and in the air; in the management of NOAA observational and support facilities; as members or leaders of research efforts; and in the management of various organizational elements throughout NOAA. The Military Selective Service Act of 1947 provides an opportunity for a young man to discharge his obligation to his country by serving in the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. A minimum of 24 months of service satisfies the requirement for service imposed by the law. Additional information can be obtained from the Chief, Commissioned Personnel Division (CC1), National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, Rockville, Maryland 20852.

## **EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES**

The military services have established a wide range of educational programs which are available to active duty personnel. They include programs to which military personnel are given full-time active duty assignments in student status as part of their career development, and programs which military personnel pursue on their own volition during off-duty hours. A brief overview of selected programs of interest to college men and women in military service follows.

### **ON-DUTY PROGRAMS**

#### **ARMY**

The Army operates its own service schools which provide career schooling for officers. Such schooling begins in the branch basic course which is given to each newly commissioned officer prior to his first duty assignment. This is followed by the branch advanced course to which officers are assigned as soon as practicable after being promoted to the grade of captain. Completion of this level of schooling by all officers is a goal of the Army. Career military schooling above this level is a selective process.

Officers who have completed 8 years but not more than 16 years of active commissioned service are eligible for selection to attend either the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College or the Armed Forces Staff College (a joint service college). The former prepares selected officers for duty as commanders and as principal staff officers at various Army echelons. The latter provides graduate level staff schooling for service in all echelons of joint and combined commands.

The senior service college is the next level of military education for Army officers. This includes the Army War College, the National War College, the Industrial College of the Armed Forces,

the Naval War College, the Air War College and several others. Officers are selected for these assignments by a selection board on the basis of the best qualified among eligible officers who have completed 15 but not more than 23 years of commissioned service. To provide essential professional and technical training which is not available in service schools, Army assigns officers and career enlisted men to colleges and universities, industrial plants, hospitals or other suitable institutions. The program offers 1 or 2 calendar years of academic training. Many officers obtain their graduate degrees under this program. Training is based on requirements in the engineering, physical and social sciences; management and administration, the professions and language and area subjects. All educational costs are paid by the Army.

The Army also offers the degree completion program under which personnel who can complete a baccalaureate or advanced degree within 1 calendar year may be authorized to attend school for the purpose of such degree completion. The student bears the cost of tuition, fees, books and other educational costs.

#### **NAVY**

The Naval War College is the highest professional educational institution operated by the Navy. It prepares officers for high command and staff duties. It has two resident schools. Commanders and lieutenant commanders with 10 to 15 years of commissioned service who are currently best qualified for promotion are selected to attend the School of Command and Staff. Officers in the grades of captain and commander with 16 to 23 years of commissioned service who are currently best qualified for promotion are sent to the School of Naval Warfare. All courses are of 10 months' duration.

The Navy also assigns officers to the Armed Forces Staff College, the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, and other joint schools.

The Naval Postgraduate School at Monterey, Calif., is a regionally accredited institution authorized to grant designated bachelor's, master's, professional engineering, and the doctorate degrees. It conducts programs in engineering, scientific, and management education ranging from 1 to 3 years in length. It also offers postgraduate programs in approximately 50 civilian educational institutions. Most of the courses at civilian institutions are 1 to 2 years in duration, leading to the master's degree, although some extend for 3 years and lead to the doctorate. The range of curricula offered is considerably greater than at the Naval Post-graduate School.

Another program offered at the Naval Postgraduate School is the BS/BA degree program under which officers who have completed at least 45 semester hours of acceptable credit and have earned a "C" average in all previous college courses complete their requirements for the bachelor's degree. A somewhat similar program is conducted at civilian institutions under which officers who have completed 3 or more years of college work are assigned to attend school on a full time basis to complete work for the bachelor's degree provided it can be completed within 1 year. The student bears cost of tuition, fees, etc.

A program has also been established to provide 4 years of college education to selected enlisted personnel in systems engineering and general scientific and engineering fields at 22 colleges and universities. Upon graduation, participants are commissioned in the Regular Navy.

#### AIR FORCE

Professional education in the Air Force is provided primarily by the Air University and the Air Force Institute of Technology.

The Air Force also assigns officers to the various joint service colleges.

The Air University operates the Squadron Officer School, the Air Command and Staff College and the Air War College. Consistent with the needs of the Air Force, the best qualified officers will be selected to attend these schools. The following general criteria indicate the required experience level. The Squadron Officer School is open to lieutenants and captains having 2 to 7 years of service, no age limit; the Air Command and Staff College is open to majors or major selectees not having over 15 years of service, no age limit; the Air War College is open to lieutenant colonels, lieutenant colonel selectees, colonels, and colonel selectees not having over 21 years of service, no age limit.

The Air Force Institute of Technology provides training in scientific, engineering, managerial, foreign language, medical, and other fields. The Institute's operations are conducted either in resident programs offered at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio, or at civilian institutions. Resident programs consist of schools of engineering and logistics management. The Institute is accredited to grant baccalaureate and graduate degrees. Programs in civilian universities are offered in engineering, biological, and physical sciences, management, and medical fields. In addition to these courses, which normally run from 9 to 30 months, the Air Force uses civilian institutions for a variety of short courses of less than 20 weeks' duration. Air Force officers are also assigned to hospitals and to industrial establishments for on-the-job training. Selected enlisted Air Force personnel who have a minimum of 30 semester hours of transferable credit may be assigned to civilian colleges or universities to obtain further undergraduate education leading to a degree. Upon completion of their college work, participants are sent to officer training school after which they are commissioned.

Through the Air Force's "Operation Bootstrap" program, officers and enlisted personnel may be assigned to educational institutions on permissive temporary duty basis for a maximum of 12 months for the purpose of qualifying for a baccalaureate or graduate degree or for the purpose of improving job efficiency or study in areas of concern and value to the Air Force. The student bears the cost of tuition, fees, etc., but receives his normal pay.

#### MARINE CORPS

Professional education for Marine Corps officers is conducted at the Command and Staff College, the Marine Corps Supply Schools, and the Marine Corps Engineer School. Officers are also sent to the joint service colleges.

The Marine Corps also offers a program under which officers through the grade of lieutenant colonel who can complete their bachelor's degree requirements in not more than 18 months are ordered to college or active duty for the purpose of completing such requirements. The student bears the cost of tuition, fees, etc.

#### COAST GUARD

Professional education for Coast Guard officers is conducted at the Naval War College, Naval Postgraduate School, Air War College, Industrial College of the Armed Forces, and other joint schools. In addition, postgraduate programs are offered in approximately 35 civilian educational institutions. Programs are available in both the sciences and humanities and usually lead to a master's degree. All educational costs associated with these courses of instruction are paid by the Coast Guard. Attendance at these courses obligates the participant for additional active duty.

#### JOINT SERVICE COLLEGES

The Department of Defense operates three colleges for students from the four military services. The National War College is for highly selected senior military officers and civilian career officials. Its emphasis is primarily on politico-military matters. The Industrial College of the Armed Forces offers programs of study in economic and industrial matters related to national security to selected military and civilian personnel. The Armed Forces Staff College provides advanced professional education which prepares officers for all echelons of joint and combined commands.

#### OFF-DUTY PROGRAMS

Each of the military services, as well as the Office of the Secretary of Defense, offers extensive off-duty education programs for the purpose of improving effectiveness in assignments, increasing capability for greater responsibility or attaining a higher level of education in preparation for future careers. These programs range from undergraduate to graduate school levels. They consist primarily of academic courses which the student may pursue by himself, as a member of a group with a qualified instructor in a classroom, or by correspondence. Group study classes are arranged on the military installation with locally procured instructors or may be in a program conducted by local educational institutions.

The U.S. Armed Forces Institute (USAIFI) has long been a major contributor to the voluntary off-duty programs in several ways. First, USAIFI is a testing facility and provides tests of the College Level Examination Program (CLEP) for service person-

nel. Secondly, they provide course materials for group study classes as well as for independent study. In addition to the many correspondence courses which have been developed and are administered by USAFI, USAFI also acts as a focal point for over 6,000 courses which are available from 47 colleges and universities who participate in the USAFI program.

One of the most recent developments in off-duty education is the Servicemen's Opportunity College (SOC). As it stands now, the SOC concept embraces over 100 community and junior colleges that recognize the need to aid servicemen and women in quest of educational goals. Basically, a member college offers courses on or near military installations; however, the uniqueness of the concept is that the SOC has agreed to: (1) have an admission policy that is related to the life conditions of the serviceman or woman; (2) eliminate seemingly artificial barriers such as residency requirements, which hinder educational progress of the service person; and (3) provide special services and programs to meet the special needs of the serviceman. Each college has agreed to ten separate criteria to accomplish these goals with a resultant easing of the former bars to service education such as credit transfer policies. The SOC concept is now being expanded to four-year institutions. The student may take advantage of the DOD Tuition Assistance Program or of the G.I. Bill Educational Assistance Program to defray a significant portion of the costs.

The DOD Tuition Assistance Program is for men and women on active duty who desire to pursue an educational program during their off-duty time. Under this program the military departments agree to pay 75% of the tuition costs of an approved program.

#### G.I. BILL EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE

Opportunities for further education for persons with military service are also provided by the G.I. Bill. These benefits are administered by the Veterans Administration.

Veterans who served on active duty for more than 180 days, any part of which occurred after January 31, 1955, and who were released under conditions other than dishonorable, or who were released from active duty after January 31, 1955, for a service-connected disability, are eligible for benefits under the law. Reservists whose military service consisted entirely of active duty for training are not eligible. Servicemen on active duty who have completed at least 180 days of service are also eligible for benefits.

Under law, veterans without dependents will receive \$220 a month while undertaking full-time courses, at educational institutions, \$165 for three-quarter time courses, and \$110 for half-time courses. With one dependent, the rates are increased to \$261, \$196, and \$131, respectively; with two dependents, \$298, \$224, and \$149. For full-time courses, veterans are entitled to \$18 additionally for each dependent in excess of two; three-quarter time courses, \$14 additionally; half-time courses, \$9. When a veteran undertakes a full-time program of education consisting of institutional courses supplemented by training in a business or industrial establishment, the allowances are \$177, no dependent; \$208, one dependent; \$236, two dependents, with \$14 additionally for each dependent in excess of two.

A maximum of 36 months of schooling is allowed, computed on the basis of 1½ months educational assistance for each month or fraction thereof of active duty service. Educational institutions may include any institution at the secondary school level or above.

## COMPENSATION FOR MILITARY PERSONNEL

Compensation received by military personnel on active duty is comprised of elements from three major categories, as follows:

(1) Regular Military Compensation (RMC), (2) special pays, (3) supplemental benefits. The foundation of the compensation system is RMC which consists of four elements—basic pay, quarters and subsistence (either in-kind or as cash allowances), and the tax advantage which accrues to the individual because quarters and subsistence allowances are nontaxable. This foundation is supplemented by various special pays and benefits. Each of these, as applicable to the individual concerned, should be considered in any comparison of military and civilian compensation. Pertinent information on the three elements of military compensation follows:

### REGULAR MILITARY COMPENSATION

**Basic Pay.**—See table 1 (Military Monthly Basic Pay Rates).  
**Quarters Allowances.**—Quarters allowances are paid to married officers and enlisted men to provide quarters for their families. When government housing accommodations are not available, unmarried officers and enlisted men receive quarters allowances. Those currently effective are as follows:

Below is the basic pay effective Jan. 1, 1973. Where a figure is not shown for a given number of completed years of service-for-pay, the amount to the left applies.

The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs and the military heads of each Service receive \$3000 a month. The senior enlisted man of the Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marine Corps and Navy each gets \$1355.40 regardless of length of service.

**Subsistence Allowance.**—A subsistence allowance of \$47.88 monthly is paid to officers regardless of their pay grade or dependency status. All officers, no matter where they are stationed, pay their own food bills. The current subsistence allowance for enlisted personnel is \$1.65 per day.

**Other Allowances.**—Among the more important allowances, in addition to quarters and subsistence, are transportation allowances and travel of dependents for expenses incurred in moving to new duty stations, family separation allowances, clothing allowances, dislocation allowances and cost of living allowances in overseas areas.

#### SPECIAL PAYS

Some of the more important special pays are:

**Hazardous-duty (incentive) pay** is given to persons performing duties which involve dangers not encountered in other jobs. Aviation and submarine crewmen receive incentive pay based on their grade and length of service.

This varies from \$100 to \$245 per month for officers, and from \$50 to \$105 for enlisted members. For all other types of hazardous duty, officers receive \$110 per month and enlisted personnel \$55.

**Hostile fire pay** in the amount of \$65 is authorized during any month in which a member is subject to hostile fire, except in time of war declared by Congress.

Proficiency pay may be awarded to enlisted members in one of the following fashions:

**Shortage Specialty (Proficiency Pay).**—If he is a career member, is qualified and serving in a designated military specialty, and fulfills the individual eligibility criteria specified by DoD and his respective Service, he may receive Shortage Specialty (Proficiency Pay). This type of proficiency pay is paid to personnel in high training cost military specialties which are critically short of careerists due to inadequate retention. The monthly rates are P-3 (\$150),

P-3 (\$100), P-2 (\$75), and P-1 (\$50) depending on the severity of the career shortage.

**Special Duty Assignment (Proficiency Pay).**—If he is qualified and serving in a designated special duty assignment and fulfills the individual eligibility criteria specified by DoD and his respective Service, he may receive Special Duty Assignment (Proficiency Pay). This type of proficiency pay is paid to individuals in special duty assignments which are critical to the mission of the Service and for which the number of volunteers are inadequate. The

monthly rates are: P-1 (\$50) and P-1 (\$30) depending on the severity of the volunteer manning situation.

*Superior Performance (Proficiency Pay).*—If he is in a military speciality not designated for receipt of another type of proficiency pay and fulfills the individual eligibility criteria specified by DoD and his respective Service, he is eligible to compete for Superior Performance (Proficiency Pay). This type of proficiency pay is paid at the monthly rate of P-1 (\$30) to enlisted members who have been designated as superior performers.

Reenlistment bonuses are paid to enlisted members who re-enlist within a specified time following their discharge from active service. The amount of the regular reenlistment bonus is based on the basic pay of the reenlistee and the number of years of reenlistment. The combined total of regular reenlistment bonuses which may be received during a 20-year military career is limited to \$2,000. Members reenlisting for the first time, who have been designated as having a critical military skill, may receive an additional special incentive, the variable reenlistment bonus. The reenlistment incentive is paid in addition to the regular reenlistment bonus in an amount varying from one to four times the regular bonus. The degree of need within a particular military skill determines the amount of the variable reenlistment bonus. The maximum amount that can be paid, by combination of the regular reenlistment bonus and the variable reenlistment bonus, is a total of \$10,000.

*Separance pay* is authorized for officers involuntarily separated

from the service prior to reaching retirement eligibility. For example, for a Reserve officer with at least 5 years of continuous active duty this sum is computed on 2 months' basic pay of his grade for each year of service ending with 12 years. However, the maximum cannot exceed 2 years' pay or \$15,000, whichever is lesser.

#### SUPPLEMENTAL BENEFITS

*Retirement pay.*—The laws under which personnel may meet requirements for retirement are numerous but generally speaking there are three types of retirement for military personnel: Length of service (completion of 20 or more years of Federal service), physical disability, and, in the case of officers only, age. See table 3 for examples of length of service monthly retirement pay.

*Disability Benefit.*—When a serviceman suffers physical disability, he may be discharged, or, if eligible, retire and receive financial compensation—usually in the form of monthly payments—either from his service or from the Veterans' Administration. In either case, the degree of disability—as determined by disability evaluation boards—governs the amount of compensation.

*Survivors' Benefits.*—A serviceman is assured under Federal legislation that his dependents—wife, children, and financially dependent parents—will be provided financial means if he dies while on active duty or following a discharge as a result of a disability.

**Note**—These figures are based on the assumption that the years of service for pay purposes are the same as the years of active service.

*Leave.*—Servicemen, regardless of rank or length of service, earn 30 days of paid leave each year. Leave does not have to be taken each year; up to 60 days may be accumulated.

*Commissaries and Exchanges.*—Military personnel on active duty may purchase food, household, and personal items at commissary stores and post exchanges. Many of the items are priced substantially below civilian store prices.

*Dependent Schooling.*—Dependent children are eligible to

attend schools operated by the Armed Forces at overseas locations. If no such schools are available, the Armed Forces bear a considerable portion of the expense of sending dependent children to locally-operated schools.

*Medical and Dental Care.*—Medical and dental care is provided for active duty personnel. It is also authorized for dependents at military or civilian hospitals, under certain conditions.
