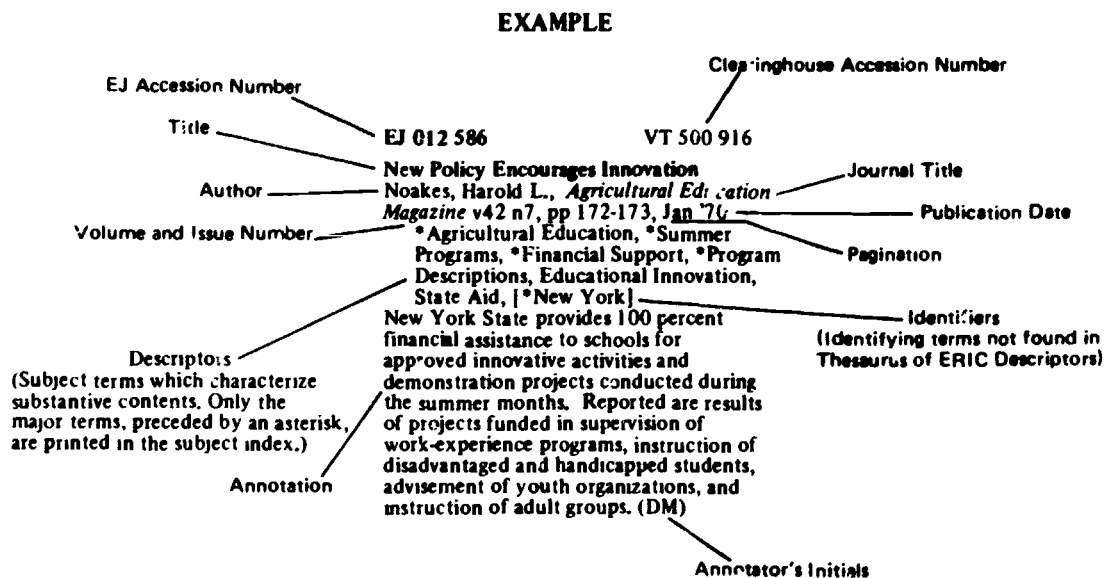

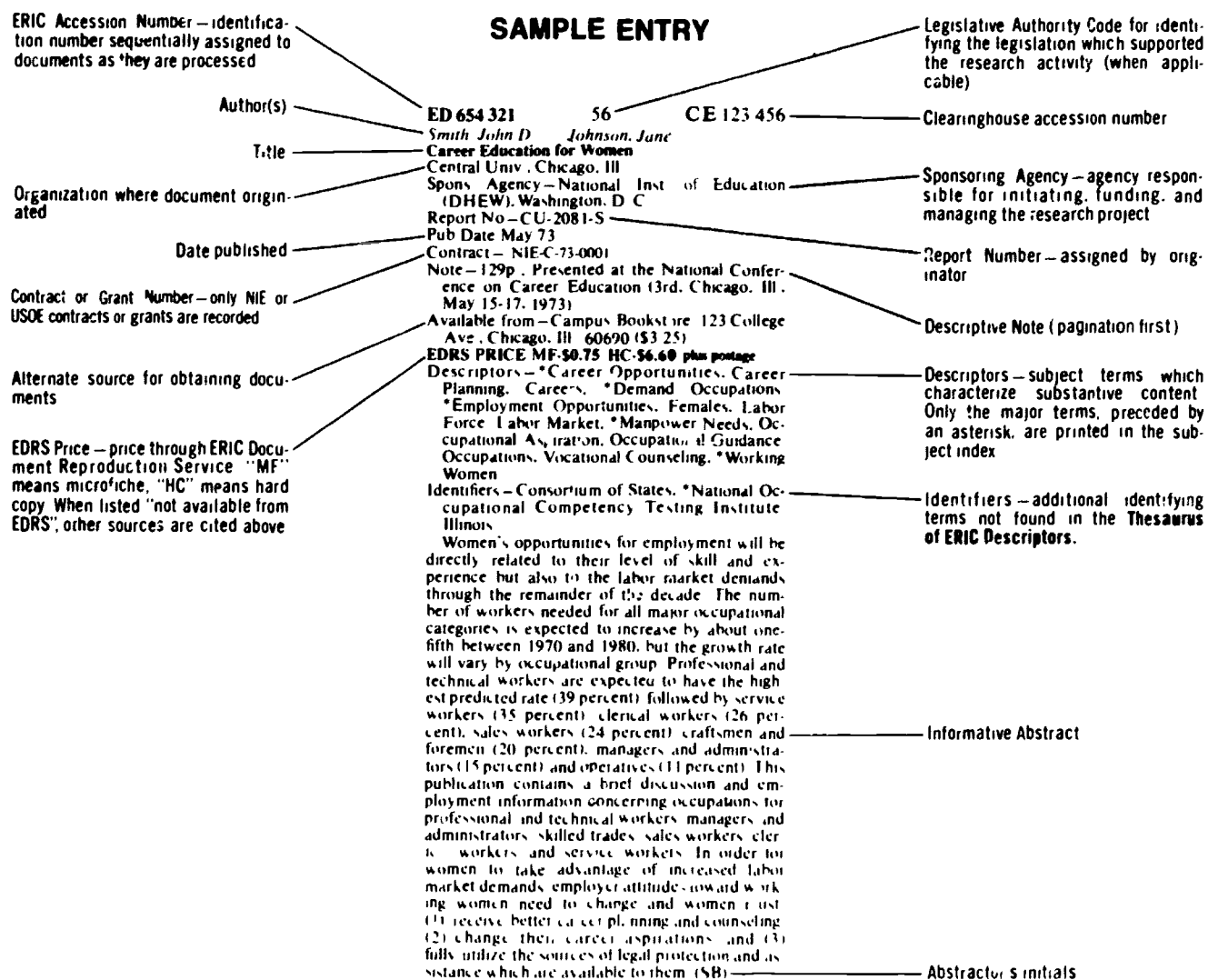

An informal survey, conducted by the Colorado State Library, revealed few real efforts to serve the Spanish-surnamed beyond the minimal provision of Spanish language materials. To improve this situation, Colorado State College held a federally supported institute in June, 1969. Eight teams of participants were selected for the program, a team consisting of five members of one community: a trained professional librarian, a Spanish-surnamed library aide, a Spanish community leader, and two others of their choice. The goals of the institute were to increase librarians' understanding of the culture and needs of the Spanish-surnamed, through lectures and discussion with the participating community leaders, and to translate these needs into effective use of library materials. Each team developed such a plan for the library of their own community. Major efforts at evaluating the institute were concerned with the anonymous reports submitted on the last day by the participants. Most felt that the institute was successful in promoting understanding of cultural problems and differences. Verbatim copies of these reports are presented, as are the eight team plans for improved library service to the Spanish-surnamed. (SL)

A survey of rural areas in California, Oregon, Washington State, Idaho, and south Texas, this study investigated the lack and need of library and other information services for migrants and seasonal farmworkers. Research concentrated on community and library based information services. The overall recommendation of the document was that Survival Information Centers (SICs) be established in all major rural communities with larger farmworker populations. To effectively meet community needs, these centers must be independent of growers, and must be guided by the farmworkers themselves. The document also presented the migrants' perspective of existing libraries and their need for usually unavailable immediate and frequently bilingual information. An investigation of libraries' perspectives of services they offer revealed that services directed specifically toward migrants is almost nonexistent. Generally, information needs are filled by the crew boss, work contractor, or union. General library priorities for establishing SICs are given, along with a model. Evaluation criteria for SICs listed the primary goal as that of developing an awareness and a concurrently increasing demand for information within the community. (RM)

The purpose of this study was the examination of the Albuquerque Model Cities Library Materials and Cultural Centers and of their impact upon the community they serve. This was not a traditional cost/benefit study although it contains many of the aspects of such an analysis. The area served by the Centers is an area of relatively poor persons of primarily Spanish and/or Mexican descent with a few Blacks, American Indians and "Anglos." The study was conducted in the following manner. First, personal interview surveys were made of a sample of residents of the poor area (MNA) and of residents of a similar area without special library services, and of a middle-income area of Albuquerque. Results of these three sets of surveys were then compared to discover differences in attitudes of persons in the areas relating to their library services. Some nine months later, a similar survey was conducted again in the MNA to determine if differences had arisen over time. A much smaller survey was conducted on the library premises. Throughout the entire period of the study, the operations of the library and Cultural Centers were examined and costs for various functions were allocated. Volume II contains the appendix. The efforts of local school districts in meeting the educational requirements of children of migrant workers are summed up in the Idaho Migrant Education Evaluation Report for fiscal year 1972. In this volume, an attempt is made to show what services libraries are now providing for (1) the economically deprived, (2) the physically handicapped, (3) the mentally handicapped, (4) those suffering from racial discrimination, (5) those confined in prisons or other types of institutions, (6) the elderly, (7) neglected youth, and (8) those with a language barrier (including illiteracy). The special problems in working with each of the eight groups are stated. A brief description and summary of some of the various library programs now under way in the United States is given, along with a review of the psychological approach and techniques being used by these libraries. Needs for further programs are suggested. This volume is intended mainly as a source book for project and program ideas for libraries now engaged in working with the disadvantaged or planning to do so.
