The following bibliography attempts to bring together references from the behavioral sciences which focus on the Vietnam veteran experience. Of special importance are manuscripts which deal with (a) the development and maintenance of intimate relationships during and after military service, (b) the relationship between combat experience and interpersonal competence, and (c) the relationship between the American family system and interpersonal violence. The primary purpose of this bibliography is to stimulate and facilitate research in the area of interpersonal adjustment and family life among Vietnam veterans toward greater understanding of and solutions to the adjustment problems among veterans.
