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ABSTRACT

This program, included in "Effective Reading Programs...", serves an unselected cross section of more than 700 seventh- and eighth-grade students from suburban middle-income families. The program aims to make students proficient in the areas of word attack skills, including phonetic and structural analysis, comprehension skills, work-study skills, and oral reading. The program utilizes the diagnosis of individual differences and careful consideration of these differences as the basis for building a sound developmental reading program. Other major objectives of the program include making every student feel important and successful, making reading as exciting and enjoyable as possible, and meeting each student's needs in both scholastic and social settings through individualization. The remedial reading teacher works in conjunction with the general reading program, thus minimizing the stigma often attached to such classes. The program provides a wide variety of books at students' independent reading levels, but below their instructional levels, and students are allowed class time for recreational reading. The encouragement of parents to become involved in the home reading program constitutes a key feature of the program. (WR)

This program is defined as Developmental Reading and is taught in conjunction with the Remedial and Speed Reading Programs.

- I. When a student comes into the reading department, he is given a battery of tests. The first week of school we begin with the Monroe test. It is a timed 7 minute test and tests for comprehension. This test gives a quick method of finding a starting place for each student's continued testing. Caution should be used in considering this test as the only method of placing a student on his instructional level since this is a timed test, the student may read well, but slowly. For those students who place below 5.0 we give the Gate-MacGinitie, for those students who place below 5.0 we give the R.E.A.D. test of comprehension skills.

Students whose tests thus far indicate severe reading problems are then given the Slosson Word list for diagnostic purposes. All students are given the Lorge Thorndike non-verbal I.Q. test. This is used as an indicator of learning potential and/or learning disabilities.

Before school starts the IOWA scores are recorded for each student in reading, this test is given again at the end of 7th and 8th grade and the scores are used as pre-post evaluation of the program.

The Monroe test is given again at the end of the first quarter.

The Gates and R.E.A.D. are given 3 times a year. Form D-1 or E-1 of the Gates at the beginning and end of the school year and form D-2 or E-2 at mid-year.

The R.E.A.D. test also has 2 forms and is given in the same procedure as the Gates.

This type of evaluation gives the students, parents and teachers constant progress reports.

- II. Class setting; An attempt is made to keep each class load between 20-25 students with remedial reading being the exception with 12 students per hour. One section of a four section pod is used for remedial reading. This has eliminated much of the stigma usually attached to these students and the typical remedial reading program.

IV. Packets (teacher made materials)

Each month a **packet** is made which contains information related to the science, health and history classes of the seventh grade students. These packets contain skill materials; word master devices such as puzzles, word finds and vocabulary related materials. They also vary in readability to meet the students needs and assure success.

Job applications and job information is also gathered and used as a motivator.

V. Games (reinforcers)

1. Motor Cross Word game
2. Scrabble
3. Bingo (teacher made related to any phonetic or structural skill being taught)
4. Concentration (teacher made to correlate with the theme and vocabulary being taught for month)
5. Mini-course - Several times a year we offer mini-courses to all students in the reading program who have a average grade of B in reading. These mini-courses are related to the monthly theme i.e. October - mysteries for monthly theme and Spook Alley for mini-course. April - Sports and a 3 day softball tournament between classes for a mini-course.

VI. Home Reading

Students are required to read at home each evening for a length of time which they and their parents agree upon. They are then given a grade on the basis of the time they read. They may read anything they chose but are encouraged to read homework from other classes.

600 minutes per month = A

400 minutes per month = B

200 minutes per month = C

Students are supplied with a sheet of coupons that they and their parents sign, time read is recorded also and then they are returned to school daily or weekly.

VII. Leisure Reading

Each class period is started with 10 minutes of silent reading. This time is increased as the students reading skills and reading interests develop. An attempt is made to provide 5 paperback books per student enrolled in this program. These books vary in readability and interest. Books are displayed about the room to illustrate the theme for the month. Students may read whatever they chose during this time.

VIII. Creative Writing

Each month students write and illustrate a short story. These stories are graded on A or F basis. These stories are then circulated among other classes for leisure reading.

IX. Grading

Each student receives a folder and monthly is given an illustrated grade sheet. He/she is responsible for keeping this grade sheet current. At the end of each month the student is given a grade on that sheet. It is taken home and returned with a parents signature. This provides constant feedback for student and parent.

Packets, students grade sheets, vocabulary and bulletin boards in each room are carried through with a common theme.

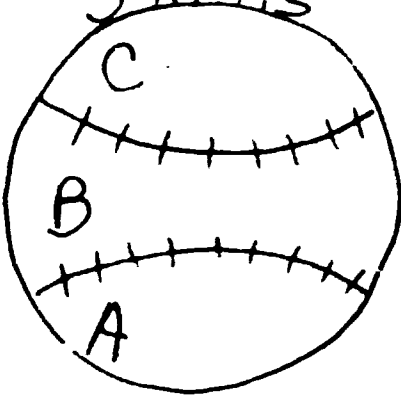
