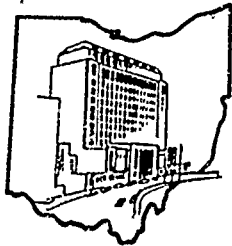

Nearly half (46.4%) of the unfilled requests resulted because the title was not owned.
