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
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ABSTRACT

Serving as an introduction to Federal assistance and as a locator of specific rural development programs, this directory is divided into the 5 following general categories: (1) Jobs, Business, Industry; (2) Community Facilities; (3) Community Functions and Services; (4) Housing; (5) Planning and Coordination. Each of these categories is divided into chapters which are devoted to specific rural community improvement functions for which there are related or matching Federal assistance programs. Chapters are intended to parallel "spheres of interest" at the local level. Each chapter includes the government-wide approach to a particular local problem, bringing the resources of several different departments and agencies together under one chapter heading. Each of some 600 entries include a program title and summary, eligibility requirements, and name and/or address of information contacts. (JC)

PREFACE

No catalog of Federal aid programs is so well prepared for use in rural development as this, former Assistant Secretary of Agriculture John A. Baker's Guide to Federal Programs for Rural Development.

The first edition of the Guide was prepared by Mr. Baker in 1970 for copyrighted publication by the Independent Bankers. Association of America. Recognizing the value of the Guide, the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry, under the chairmanship of Senator Herman E. Talmadge, sponsored its updating and revision. Printing of the second edition was authorized by concurrent resolution of the Senate and House of Representatives in December 1971. The Guide was still in demand in 1973, even though much of its content was outdated and the supply exhausted.

In early summer of 1973, the National

Area Development Institute, an independent nonprofit organization supported largely by the Ford Foundation, was asked by the Rural Development Service to assist in the design and planning of the agency's first National Rural Development Leaders School. Mr. Baker updated and revised the third edition of the Guide for use in that and subsequent sessions of the school.

Demand for the Guide continued, and the Rural Development Service, with permission from the Independent Bankers Association, decided to publish this fourth edition. Mr. Baker graciously agreed to do the necessary revising and updating as a public service, an offer which was gratefully accepted.

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INTRODUCTION

This fourth edition of the Guide to Federal Programs for Rural Development has been prepared as a reference handbook for local leaders in rural communities across the land. It is dedicated to the future of economic opportunity and the quality of life in rural America.

Development means profitable business, culture, environment, expanding job opportunities, greater capital investment, higher personal incomes, modern community facilities and a full range of public services—in short, a high quality of life. In rural areas, the goal is to develop sustained economic growth, while maintaining the unique charactor and style of town and country living.

Rural development depends on National and State commitment; but there is no magic formula to guarantee development for the individual community, except the inspiration of local leadership and the determination of local citizens to develop their own area.

Private business and public agencies share the responsibility and the opportunity to create and promote this type of development. Success depends on the vision to set attainable goals, the resolution to work toward planned objectives, and a high degree of cooperation for community improvement among all the diverse elements within, a given area.

Many aspects of local development are related to similar efforts in neighboring communities, and to broader development programs within a larger area. District planning and development agencies, councils of government, or similar organizations have been created to provide coordination and mutual assistance for both the planning and the action programs of participating jurisdictions.

Local development programs also are highly dependent upon State government for legislative authority, technical assistance, and financial aid. Throughout this handbook, reference is made to State (or Stateauthorized) programs which are financed to some degree by the Federal Government through formula or project grants.

In addition to local and State development programs, many Federal departments and agencies offer some type of financial or technical aid to localities outside the highly urbanized sections of the country. Many of these programs are specifically designed to meet rural needs, but most are general domestic assistance programs for which both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan communities are eligible. To tap these resources and bring proportional benefits to less-densely populated areas requires broad knowledge of the Federal programs as well as special alertness and effort in making applications.

To make this Guide useful as an introduction to Federal assistance and as a "locator" of specific programs, we have departed from the usual organizational structure of Government catalogs and manuals except for listings in the appendixes. There are five general categories covered: Part I: Jobs, Business, Industry; Part II: Community Facilities; Part III: Community Functions and Services; Part IV: Housing; Part V: Planning and Coordination.

Each chapter in each part of this handbook is devoted to a specific rural community improvement function for which there are related or matching Federal assistance programs. The chapters are intended to parallel "spheres of interest" at the local level. Each chapter includes the governmentwide approach to a particular local problem. This type of organization brings the resources of several different departments, and agencies together under one chapter heading. All programs with similar objectives will be found side-by-side, regardless of how they are separated organizationally at the Federal level for administrative or budget purposes.

Individual programs are described in summary form, and arranged alphabetically



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under chapter headings. Cross references are used to help avoid repetition.

The numbers in parentheses beside each item heading refer to sections of the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (cited below), which will provide more detailed information than is contained here.

Program literature is available for the user of this *Guide* who desires more detailed information about any particular program. Technical regulations and procedures governing Federal programs are too complex and too voluminous to be included in this handbook. These materials are available from the *Information Contacts* given for each program.

It should be noted that funds for the operation of Federal programs must be authorized by legislation and appropriated annually by the Congress. For many of the programs, the full expenditure of appropriated funds is left to the discretion of the Executive Branch. Within the legislative guidelines, the Executive Branch also determines the priority emphasis to be placed on different programs of local assistance, the degree of "outreach" to rural areas, and the effectiveness of the delivery systems.

We sincerely hope that the functional approach of this *Guide* will help to clarify the role of the Federal Government in rural-development, and that this handbook will be of precised assistance in building better communities for tomorrow.



There is no statutory dollar limitation, and the maximum term is 30 years. SBA share of guaranteed loans may not exceed 90 percent. Proceeds cannot be used for working capital (except for special purposes); for speculation; to pay off creditors or principals; or to encourage monopoly.

An area

manager is responsible for all employment service activities in the designated area, and tie-ins with job banks are being initiated.

The Smaller Communities) Program consists of mobile employment service teams sent by the State employment services to provide rural areas with manpower and supportive services. To attract new industry to an area, the mobile team compiles and publishes a comprehensive manpower resource report on each area served, profiling its available and potential skills, detailed information on the area's economy, and its institutional components. The Hitchhike Program is a method of overlaying manpower programs on existing compatible institutions successfully functioning in rural areas.

Cooperative Extension Service county offices, community colleges, farmer groups, and State and local welfare agencies are examples of facilities with potential delivery capability. State employment security agency subcontracts with the delivery agency (such as the State Cooperative Extension Service) to provide a broad spectrum of manpower services to residents of remote rural areas.

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MORTGAGE INSURANCE— LAND DEVELOPMENT AND NEW COMMUNITIES (14.125)

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CRIME INSURANCE (14.003)



Assignment of foster grandparents to children with special needs may occur in residential and nonresidential facilities including day care or preschool establishments and to children living in their own homes. Funds are not available for construction.

Foster grandparents must be 60 or older; have an annual net income at or below poverty guidelines; be interested in working with children, and be physically, mentally, and emotionally capable of serving the selected children on a one-to-one basis.

Provision of specialized services; advisory services and counseling; technical assistance materials; on-site consultation; and training for students serving as part-time volunteers through local, independent college volunteer programs, and for newly emerging, high school-sponsored student volunteer programs.

Any college or high school desiring to create a new student volunteer program, or improve an existing program, may apply for free technical assistance materials and consultant services. Provides full-time volunteers at the request of community groups to provide service not exceeding 2 years, but for not less than 1 year, except as the Director determines, in clearly defined jobs which lead to mobilization of the community's resources. The volunteers live on allowances at the level of, and among, the people they serve. Many volunteers—such as lawyers, health personnel teachers, architects, businessmen and craftsmen—contribute specific skills, and all volunteers work to improve the community's ability to solve its own problems.

Eligibility

Nonprofit organization, public or private. The project in which they propose to use the volunteers must be poverty related. Persons who are assisted by VISTA volunteer activities must be low income and VISTA activities must directly benefit the poor. There is usually not a direct beneficiary eligibility test since, in some cases, volunteers may work with community groups which, while basically low income, may include individuals not poor by government definition. An agency applying as a sponsor must be a bonafide public or private agency concerned with the human, social, and environmental problems related to poverty. Its acceptability may be established by its nonprofit tax status or by its official position as a public agency.



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APPALACHIAN HOUSING FUND (23.005)

Appalachian Regional Commission

Assistance Available

Direct loans to stimulate the construction of low- and moderate-income housing in growth areas of the Appalachian Region. Used for costs of planning projects and obtaining mortgage insurance. Included may be preliminary surveys of market needs, preliminary site engineering and architectural fees, site options, FHA and FNMA fees, construction loan fees and discounts. Use restrictions are low- and moderate-income mortgage insurance as provided by sections 221, 235, and 236 of the National Housing Act.

Nonprofit, limited dividend, cooperative, or public corporation or bodies for low- and moderate-income' individuals or families.

CONDOMINIUM HOUSING (14.112, 14.133)

Housing Production and Mortgage Credit, HUD

Assistance Available

Mortgage insurance for the purchase of individual family units in multifamily housing projects. FHA-insured mortgages may also be used by sponsors to finance the construction or rehabilitation of housing projects in which they intend to sell individual units on a condominium basis. A project must contain at least four dwelling units, and the structure in a project may be detached, semidetached, row, walkup, or elevator in type. In condominium ownership, a person owns separately one or more single dwelling units in a multiunit project and has an undivided interest with the owners of the other units in common areas and facilities serving the project.

For mortgage on individual units—any qualified person. For mortgages on project—any qualified sponsor.

These insured loans may be used by a cooperative to finance construction of a 'project, acquisition and rehabilitation of a project, improvement or repair of a project already owned, or construction of individual family dwellings that will be bought by individual members with separate insured mortgages. Mortgage insurance also is available to private groups for the construction or rehabilitation of projects to be sold to nonprofit corporations.

INSURED SUPPLEMENTAL LOANS ON MULTIFAMILY HOUSING PROJECTS (14.145, 14.151)

MAJOR HOME IMPROVEMENTS (LOAN INSURANCE) (14.108)

PROPERTY IMPROVEMENTS (LOAN INSURANCE) (14.142)

The loan term may not exceed 7 years and 32 days. No down-payment is required, and in most cases the borrower's signature serves as security. There need be no cosigner. Property improvement loans made by a private lending institution participating in this program are insured in bulk by the Federal Housing Administration.

Person who owns the property to be improved, is buying it under contract, or holds it under a lease good for 6 months beyond the date the loan will mature. Borrower must have sufficient income to make the regular payments on the loan.

PURCHASE OF FEE SIMPLE TITLE (MORTGAGE INSURANCE) (14.130)

Applicants must have sufficient present and prospective income to meet loan repayment terms and have a satisfactory credit record. In addition, the eligible veteran must have





Unallowable costs include contingency reserves; entertainment; foreign travel; honorariums; library support; property taxes; construction or purchase of buildings or land; and subgrants. Equipment costing in excess of \$2,000 requires prior approval of the Health Services Administration. For the consumer training, continuing education, and studies and demonstrations projects, equipment may not be purchased except under unusual circumstances and only with prior written approval. In addition, travel to and from a continuing education project is not allowed for the people being trained.



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Appendix VIII: Programs Requiring an Environmental Impact Statement

Specific programs listed in the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance have been determined to have a significant effect on the environment and require an environmental assessment or an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) under Section 102(2)(C) of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (Public Law 90-190; 42 U.S.C. 4332(2)(C)), and Executive Order 11514 (34 FR 4247) of March 4, 1970. (Significant effects include actions that may have with beneficial and detrimental effects.)

In the early stages of project application, and in all cases prior to agency decisions concerning major action, the applicant should be advised by the Federal agency from which assistance is being sought that he will be required to submit environmental impact information (to be submitted under agency guidelines) in connection with the proposed project for an environmental assessment (to be made by the Federal agency), or an Environmental Impact Statement (to be supplied by the Federal agency) concerning the proposed project.
