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ABSTRACT

This document provides a proposed list of programs and their requirements for Bachelor and Master of Education degrees at the University of Alaska. The programs are intended to develop graduates who possess a crosscultural perspective and sensitivity in their approach to education, with particular emphasis on the multicultural environment of Alaska. The proposed programs possess three characteristics essential to their design and implementation: a) education is defined in broad cultural terms, encompassing educational needs and issues in addition to certification requirements; b) the academic orientation is interdisciplinary, drawing heavily on anthropology, linguistics, sociology, psychology, and English; education is viewed as an applied field in which the methods and perspectives of various academic disciplines are brought to bear on the analysis of complex sociocultural issues; and c) the programs rely heavily on actual field experiences. Only through direct and prolonged immersion in alternative settings can the students, native or nonnative, acquire an internalized crosscultural perspective which will allow them to transcend their own ethnocentrism. 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The following programs are proposed as optional variations on the existing Bachelor and Master of Education degrees. The programs are intended to develop graduates who possess a cross-cultural perspective and sensitivity in their approach to education, with a particular emphasis on the multi-cultural environment of Alaska.

The proposed cross-cultural programs possess three distinguishing characteristics that are essential to the design and implementation of such programs:

1. Education is defined in broad cultural terms, thus encompassing educational needs and issues in addition to those involving the public school or teacher certification, as indicated by the human resource development program option. Schooling is placed in a cross-cultural perspective and teaching practices are assessed as they relate to the cultural patterns of the community. In addition, educational needs such as those related to the implementation of the Native Land Claims Settlement can be addressed in the same comprehensive cross-cultural framework.
2. The academic orientation of the proposed programs is interdisciplinary. The content of the programs draws heavily from the disciplines of anthropology, linguistics, sociology, psychology and english. Education is viewed as an applied field in which the methods and perspectives of various academic disciplines are brought to bear on the analysis of complex socio-cultural issues. Faculty for the proposed programs are currently available through the Cross-Cultural Education Development Program, the Alaska Native Language Center, the Center for Northern Educational Research, and the respective academic departments.
3. The proposed cross-cultural education programs rely heavily on actual field experience. The cross-cultural perspective and sensitivity envisioned as an outgrowth of these programs can be accomplished only through intensive and extensive involvement in a real-life field environment. Only through direct, and prolonged immersion in alternative settings can the students, native or non-native, acquire an internalized cross-cultural perspective which allows them to effectively transcend their own ethnocentrism.

## Proposed Graduate Programs (M. Ed) in Cross-Cultural Education

The following programs are proposed as optional areas of specialization within the existing Master of Education degree. The programs are intended to accomplish the same general purposes and possess the same distinguishing characteristics as the undergraduate programs, but with a greater breadth and depth of cross-cultural understanding. The graduate programs also add a thesis or project requirement in which the students must demonstrate the ability to conduct independent research related to some aspect of cross-cultural education. The graduate programs are not intended to lead to a certificate, except for the administration/supervision option, which may lead to an Alaska administrative certificate.

### Prerequisites:

The following are prerequisites to entrance in the graduate programs in cross-cultural education:

1. Acceptance by selection panel
2. Alaska Teaching Certificate required as appropriate

### Degree Requirements

Following are minimum requirements for the graduate programs in cross-cultural education:

1. Minimum of 36 semester hours must be completed in the program
2. Minimum of 18 semester hours must be completed at the 600 level
3. Minimum of 18 semester hours must be completed in a field setting under supervision of the field staff
4. Minimum of 6 semester hours must be completed on campus
5. The following courses are required of all graduate students:

6. Students who wish to obtain an administrative certificate along with the M.Ed. in cross-cultural education must fulfill the following additional requirements, as designated by the Alaska State Dept. of Education:

7. In addition to the above requirements, students must complete sufficient additional courses to obtain the skills and proficiencies appropriate to their degree emphasis. A particular program of coursework will be developed by each student in cooperation with the adviser and graduate committee, the latter having final authority in determining the program, within the context of general university requirements. Although each program will be designed to meet the individual student's needs, the following guidelines are offered for three general areas of emphasis.
