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ABSTRACT

The statistics are based on a household survey, collected annually, and are related to one year's earnings experience of family heads and unrelated individuals. Data show that after-tax earnings for the 30 million persons surveyed rose in 1973 by 5.8 percent but fell 0.4 percent after adjustment for consumer price increases (real after-tax earnings). Variations depended on sex and type of family head. Real after-tax earnings for husbands heading four-person families rose 1.6 percent, but for women who headed families real after-tax earnings dropped nearly 4 percent. Tables display (1) gross median earnings, 1963, 1972 and 1973, (2) after-tax median earnings, 1963, 1972, and 1973, (3) real after-tax median earnings, 1963, 1972, and 1973, (4) gross median earnings, 1963-1973, (5) after-tax median earnings, 1963-1973, and (6) real after-tax median earnings, 1963-1973 (1967 dollars). All tables refer to household heads who are nonsupervisory production workers (clerical, sales, blue-collar, and service excluding private household work) and to family type and size. (MDW)



Annual Earnings of Household Heads in Production Jobs, 1973

A new study by the Bureau of Labor Statistics confirms the fact that inflation sharply eroded the increases in earnings for many Americans in 1973. The study, based on household interviews, covers the 30 million household heads employed in production and nonsupervisory jobs in the private nonfarm economy. After-tax earnings for these workers rose by 5.8 percent, but their real after-tax earnings (after adjustment for consumer price increases) fell by 0.4 percent. The extent of the erosion in earnings varied, however, by the sex and type of family head. For example, for husbands who headed 4-person families, real after-tax earnings in 1973 rose by 1.6 percent, but for women who headed families real after-tax earnings were down by nearly 4 percent.

Annual after-tax earnings statistics, derived for this study from the Current Population Survey, differ from the monthly spendable earnings statistics published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The annual data are based on a household survey, are collected once a year, and relate to one year's earnings experience of family heads and unrelated individuals. Spendable earnings data, by contrast, are based on a survey of establishments, are collected monthly, and relate to the average weekly earnings of all production or nonsupervisory workers reduced by the tax rates applicable to a worker who earned the average and had three dependents or to a worker who earned the average and had no dependents.

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Before adjustment for price changes, the gross median annual earnings for most household heads rose strongly during the year, reflecting the advances in workers' wage rates. For husbands (wife present), other male family heads (wife absent), and unrelated individuals, the 1973 gross earnings increases, in fact, exceeded the annual average rates of increase for the 1963 to 1972 period. (See table 1.) The increase in earnings among women who were family heads, however, was lower than the long-run trend.

Increases in gross earnings of production or nonsupervisory workers did not entirely carry over to after-tax earnings. (See table 2.) Nevertheless, after deductions for Federal income and social security taxes, but before adjustment for price changes, after-tax median earnings rose 8.1 percent for husbands (from \$7,700 to \$8,400), 5.6 percent for unrelated individuals (from \$4,200 to \$4,400), 4.9 percent for other male family heads (from \$6,500 to \$6,800), and 2.3 percent for women family heads (from \$3,700 to \$3,800).

With consumer prices (as measured by the Consumer Price Index) rising by 6.2 percent from 1972 to 1973, the gain in real after-tax earnings for the 21 million husbands who worked as production or nonsupervisory workers in 1973, was only 1.7 percent. For the 6.1 million unrelated individuals and 600,000 other male family heads, on the other hand, real after-tax earnings dropped by 1 percent. However, among the 2.5 million women who headed families, earnings were down by nearly 4 percent.

Gross, after-tax, and real after-tax earnings are presented in tables 4, 5, and 6, respectively, for each year during the 1963 to 1973 period. These data indicate that although there has been a general uptrend in real after-tax earnings in this period, it has not occurred at a steady rate. Real after-tax earnings for all family heads and unrelated individuals rose strongly from 1963 to 1965, leveled off in the 1965-69 period, dropped sharply in 1970, began to rise again between 1970 and 1972, and then fell slightly in 1973. Additional 1973 earnings information for household heads employed in production and nonsupervisory jobs, as well as a discussion of long-term trends, will be presented in a Monthly Labor Review article now in preparation.

The median earnings statistics presented in this summary relate to household heads employed in clerical, sales, blue-collar, and service (excluding private household work) jobs in the private nonfarm sector of the economy. This combination of occupations is used to represent "production or nonsupervisory workers." The gross earnings statistics for these workers were collected in the March 1974 Current Population Survey. After-tax and real after-tax earnings estimates were developed by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.



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Annual earnings data for the 1963-72 period was discussed in the April 1974 Monthly Labor Review article, "Measuring Annual Earnings of Household Heads in Production Jobs," by Robert L. Stein and Paul M. Ryscavage.

NOTE: The tax liability is calculated under the assumption that the household head was the sole earner in the household and that wage and salary earnings was the only source of income. In deriving the Federal income tax liability, it was assumed that husbands filed joint returns, other male family heads and female family heads filed as heads of household, and unrelated individuals filed as single individuals. A further simplifying assumption was that the standard deduction was taken. The specific number of exemptions was determined by family size and it was further assumed that all members of the head's family were claimed as tax exemptions. The Social Security deduction is based on a flat percentage tax rate of earnings up to a taxable maximum.


