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#### ABSTRACT

The skills are listed for each grade in appropriate categories (such as reading skills, written communication, oral communications, and language skills), with the expected level of competency (mastery, competency, or acquaintance) provided for each skill. STATEMENT.

Ianguage arts teachers and programs are in constant search for ways of organizing and presenting materials to students and developing basic skills so that students will be interested in and perceive the value of such activities and experiences.

During the 1974-1975 school year, the New Hampshire Supervisory School Union 58 EXPERIMENTAL SCHOOLS project has developed a grades 1-12 communications skills list. The purpose of this curriculum guide is to provide both classroom teachers and the overall educational system with the basis of a continuous, integrated and sequential program that is comprehensive (multi-grades) in both construct and purpose.

There are basic communications skills that each and every student must master in order that he or she can successfully function within our economic, political and social system(s). It is vitally important to the individual that he or she be able to speak properly and correctly in a given situation, write and read and to generally communicate feelings and thoughts - if that person is to interact with other people both on the job and at play.

Since the earliest times, one of MAN's basic drives has been to master the ability to communicate - to relate personal experiences and feelings both to and with others. Cave walls are evidence of early man's desire to share;




to relate one's inner-most feelings, with other human beings.

Although our techniques of communications have become more intricate and elaborate and although humans have the capability to communicate with others both on earth and out into space, the fact still remains that face-to-face contact; the one-on-one exchange of ideas, is basic to man's quest for understanding and respect.

Humans are made to create, to conquer and to share both success and failure with other humans. This is the process upon which the history of the human animal is founded. Through the ages, the development of the human race has been dependent upon man's ability to reason, to solve problems and to share knowledge with others.

This process of communications involves both a sender and a receiver. It is important to this exchange process that both the sender and the receiver possess basic communications skills and abilities. For without basic skills and abilities, the message will be totally lost or dramatically distorted in the transmission process and in the static which separates human from human.







## Communications Process.

The process of communicating a feeling or an idea from one human or a group of humans to another or other humans involves many variables; some of which are controlled by both the sender and the receiver, some controlled only by the sender or receiver and others which are beyond the control of either the sender or the receiver.

- sender: the individual or individuals sending a
  message to another or others.
- static: that interference (e.g., noise, light, physical handicapps such as loss of hearing or sight) within a mode of transmission (e.g., gas, solid or liquid) which may distort or destroy the message and its meaning being sent to the receiver; the transmission target.
- receiver: the target of the message being sent by
  the originator of the communications the sender.



decoding: the process whereby the receiver takes
the sensory message that has been
transmitted through some mode and
rearranges it into a form (e.g., hand
sign, language, numbers) that is most
easily understood by himself or herself.

response: once the sender's sensory message has been received and decoded, the stimulus; the sent message, will elicit a response within the receiver. This response can take many forms depending upon the meaning of the sent message as received - after being transmitted through static and internalized by the receiver (e.g., a hand sign or gesture, a hand shake, a facial expression or a punch in the nose).

The purpose of the grades 1-12 communications skills lists is to provide a basic multi-grade structure within which students can learn and internalize basic communications skills.
