ABSTRACT

The study investigated the extent to which coordinating councils for vocational education are fulfilling the requirements of the Florida State Board of Education Regulation 6A-6.67, which mandates that "a coordinating council for vocational education, adult general education, and community instructional services shall be established in each community college district." A coordinating council practices checklist was sent to all district superintendents and district directors of vocational education of the Florida school districts and all community college presidents and community college deans/directors. Of 179 checklists, 109 usable checklists were returned and followed up with personal interviews. Minutes of the past three years from each of 20 coordinating councils were analyzed on an effectiveness scale to determine how well individual councils performed the State requirements. Responses on the checklist were correlated with the ranking of councils on an effectiveness scale. Distribution on the effectiveness scale indicated that 19 of 20 coordinating councils had complied only minimally with the State regulations. Others appeared not to be functioning at all since only 20 of the possible 28 councils responded with minutes of meetings. More than half of the document consists of statistical tables, a copy of the checklist, and supplementary information in the appendixes. (EA)

Dear Mr. Beaumont:

This document is submitted as a report concerning the extent to which coordinating councils for vocational education are fulfilling their intended responsibilities as set forth in State Board of Education Regulation 6A-6.67. It further identifies the factors which contribute to the effectiveness of these councils in fulfilling their designated purposes.

The findings of this study indicate that there are various levels of involvement on the part of the coordinating councils across the State of Florida. A few are deeply involved and have been effective in their activities; the fact that nineteen of the twenty councils that provided minutes to the investigator had a rating of 5.5 or lower on the effectiveness scale indicates that others have complied only minimally with the State Regulations; others appear not to be functioning at all since only twenty of the possible twenty-eight councils provided the investigator with minutes of meetings. This report points out the fact that many of the councils which are functioning need to develop the quality of their operation if they are going to fulfill the requirements of the State Board of Education Regulation 6A-6.67.

The staff and I consider it a professional honor and pleasur, to have been selected to conduct this study for the Florida State Advisory Council on Vocational and Technical Education.

Description and Significance of the Problem

A new regulation, which has the effect of law, came into effect in the State of Florida on August 18, 1971, with regard to Coordinating Councils for Vocational Education. This regulation, which was amended September 5, 1974, mandates that, "a coordinating council for vocational education, adult general education, and community instructional services shall be established in each community college district" (State Board of Education Regulation 6A-6.67).

The State Board of Education Regulations delineate the composition and responsibilities of these councils in the following words:

"The council shall develop recommendations to the respective school boards and to the community college board of trustees and where appropriate may make recommendations to the commissioner of education and to the appropriate division directors of the department of education.

The responsibilities of the council shall be to review the total vocational education, adult general education, and community instructional services programs being offered in the district, to make such recommendations as are necessary, to encourage the development of needed offerings or changes in existing offerings and to avoid unwarranted duplications."

Since these councils are relatively new in time, and since this kind of council is unique to the State of Florida, existing literature adds little to the understanding of these councils except in a general way.

This project is designed to answer the following two questions:

(1) To what extent are these coordinating councils fulfilling their intended responsibilities? and, (2) What factors contribute to the effectiveness of these councils in fulfilling their designated purposes?

The significance of this research is seen in its determination of the existence of relationships between effective councils and council practices and in its implications for future direction for coordinating councils in the State of Florida.



Procedure

After an analysis of council minutes and personal interviews with coordinating council members, the investigator prepared a list of practices that supposedly contribute to effective coordinating council functioning.

The above practices and suggestions were formulated into a checklist (Appendix D). After being field tested by personal interviews, the checklist was put in final form and sent to the following people: (1) all sixty-seven district superintendents of the Florida school districts, (2) fifty-four district directors of vocational education (chief vocational education officers) of the Florida school districts, (3) all twenty-nine community college presidents, and (4) twenty-nine community college deans/directors. Of the 179 checklists mailed out, the investigators received 109 useable returns (Table 1 in Appendix D provides the results of this railing). Follow-up interviews were conducted to determine the validity of the checklist.

The third means, along with the checklist and personal interview, of accomplishing the goals of this project was the analysis of coordinating council minutes from the past three years. Minutes were requested from all of the possible twenty-eight coordinating councils in the State. Twenty councils responded by sending the minutes that they had available.

The minutes from each of the twenty councils were analyzed with respect to how well, the individual council performed the requirements stated in the State Board of Regulations (6A-6.67). The State Board of Regulations defines the functions of the councils in the following terms:

⁽b) Review and recommend agreements between boards, to provide coordinated and articulated vocational education, adult general education, and community instructional services programs to meet the educational needs of all residents in all communities in the district.



[&]quot;(a) Review and recommend adjustments of existing programs, activities, and services - including counseling that will better meet the assigned responsibilities of each district.

- (c) Review and make recommendations concerning long-range (6 years) objectives for the school district and the community college district and make such recommendations as needed so that each plan provides for coordinated and articulated programs without unnecessary duplication.
- (d) Review data in support of proposed programs, recommend to the appropriate board approval or disapproval of the program, and, if necessary, recommend the assignment of responsibility to the appropriate district in accordance with specific local cooperative agreements and policies of the state board.
- (c) Review such other aspects of the programs and make such recommendations as are necessary to provide an efficient, well coordinated and community vocational education, adult general education, and community instructional services programs."

Using these five basic areas as his criteria, the investigator ranked each council, on the basis of its minutes, as to how well it was performing the State requirements. The results of this ranking provided an effectiveness scale with which responses from the checklist were correlated. Inter-rater reliability was checked on the effectiveness scale and found to be .91. This degree of correlation indicates a strong agreement between raters concerning the effectiveness of the councils based on the above five criteria. The ranking of councils on the effectiveness scale was rerformed by two raters: (1) an administrator of education and Associate Professor of Educational Leadership, University of South Florida, and (2) a doctoral student in Urban Educational Research, University of South Florida. The principal investigator was not involved in the ranking of the councils. An explanation of the ranking procedure is given in Ampendix A, Table 3. Ampendix A, Table 1, provides a fremency relyaon giving the ranking of the councils on the effectiveness scale. The highest possible score on the effectiveness scale was 10, the lowest 0.

As indicated above, the responses on the checklist were correlated with the effectiveness scale. This provided an indication of how individual practices were related to the effectiveness scale. The results of the roint-biserial correlations of the individual practices with the effectiveness scale, along with the ranking of the practices according to their correlated values, are



After classifying the councils according to the effectiveness scale, the investigator grouped the individual practices according to the following four categories: (1) Practices rerformed by both the majority of the councils in the upper twenty-five percent effectiveness rating and the majority of the councils in the lower twehtw-five percent effectiveness rating of the twenty councils; (2) Practices performed by neither the majority of the councils in the upper twenty-five percent effectiveness rating nor the majority of the councils in the lover twenty-five recent effectiveness rating; (3) Practices performed by the majority of the councils in the lawer twenty-five percent effectiveness rating, but not performed by the majority of the councils in the upper twenty-five rescent effectiveness rating; and, (4) Practices performed by the majority of those councils in the upper twenty-five vercent effectiveness rating, but not performed by the rajority of the councils in the lower twenty-five rement effectiveness rating. Appendix B contains a listing of the first three categories. The listing of the fourth category is located in the section concerning findings and conclusions.

Appendix C contains an analysis of each practice according to the responses to each item. This analysis includes: (1) the total number and percent who "practiced" the item, (2) the total number and percent who indicated "should practice", (3) the combined total number and percent of the above two categories, (4) the total number and percent who marked "not practiced", and, (5) the total number and percent of no responses on each item.



Findings and Conclusions

As mentioned earlier, this section includes a listing of those practices performed by the majority of the councils in the upper twenty-five percent effectiveness rating, but not by the majority of the councils in the lower twenty-five percent of the effectiveness rating scale:

- 4c. Minutes of coordinating council meetings are distributed to other personnel in districts affected by council actions.
- 4d. Minutes of coordinating council rectings are distributed to Department of Education personnel.
 - 5. Coordinating council meeting calendars are set a year in advance.
- 12. Community school personnel regularly attend or are members of the coordinating council.
- 13. The district superintendent and community college president regularly attend council meetings.
- 17. Labor market studies and/or projections are conducted under the auspices of the council.
- 20. The council has, during the past topice months, recommended the addition to or modification of existing educational programs in the districts.
- 22. Local guidelines have been developed to delineate the responsible lities of school district and college district in educational program development.
- 23. The council is engaged in developing a long-range plan (5-6 years) for the development of vocational, technical, and adult education in the districts.
- 24. Council committees, composed of mosition countermarts in school and college districts, meet regularly.



- 27. The council has prepared recommendations on shared useage of college and school district buildings, equipment and personnel.
- 28. The council reviews the State Funding Guide application of school and college districts.
- 32. The council has reviewed placement and follow-up data on all school and college district programs.
- 33. The council recommends cooperative staff development programs for college and school districts.
- 35. The college and school districts have ratified an articulation/coordination agreement.

Even a cursory look indicates the close relationship between the above listing and the position of the items by ranks on Table 2 in Appendix A. Nost of the practices in the above listing are those which correlated highly with the effectiveness scale.

It is also instructive to consider the category "practice/should practice" in the tables in Appendix C. This grouping indicates, from the respondents' point of view, those practices which are nost important to the functioning of a council. The first ten of these, given in rank order, follow below:

- 14. The school district director of vocational education and the college decn/director of vocational/occupational/career education regularly attend council rectings.
- 4a. Minutes of coordinating council meetings are distributed within two weeks of each meeting.
 - 6. Council agenda items are submitted by both college and school district personnel.
 - An agenda is prepared and distributed to members one day or more prior to conducting coordinating council meetings.



- 7. Implementation of council recommendations is usually carried out by college or school administrative personnel.
- 4b. Minutes of coordinating council meetings are distributed to all council members.
- 21. The council has, during the past twelve months, recommended the avoidance of unwarranted duplication in specific educational programs.
- 22. Local quidelines have been developed to delineate the resconsibilities of school district and college district in educational program development.
- 20. The council has, during the past twelve months, recommended the addition to or modification of existing educational programs in the districts.
- 26. The council has prepared recommendations on articulation between school and college programs.

Using the above category (practice/should praction) one can see those items which are least important to the respondents. The bottom five of this category are reported below:

- 34. The council conducts needs assessment regarding programs for handicapped and disadvanced persons.
- 32. The council has reviewed placement and follow-up data on all school and college district programs.
- 23. The council is engaged in developing a long-range plan(5-6 years) for the development of vocational, technical and adult education in the districts.
- 17. Labor market studies and/or projections are conducted under the ampices of the council.
- 11. Regional or area Department of Education coordinators regularly attend coordinating council rectings.

Another finding of importance is the distribution of councils on the effectiveness scale. The frequency polygon of Table 1, Appendix A shows the distribution to be birodal with an arithmetic mean of 3.725. As a measure of central tendency, the mode is the score in a set of scores that occurs most frequently. The distribution under consideration is birodal - that is it has two scores that occur most frequently. Four councils earned a score of 2.5 and four councils earned a score of 5.5. Together, these two scores account for eight of the twenty councils. The significance of this distribution becomes evident when one considers the arithmetic mean. Fifty percent of the scores fell below and fifty percent fell above 3.725. That is more significant is the fact that nineteen of the twenty councils had a rating of 5.5 or less. The above findings seem to indicate that most of the coordinating councils have not fulfilled the functions mandated by State Board of Education Regulation 6A-6.67.

The investigator also attempted to ascertain the actual membership of the councils as they presently exist. The checklist in Appendix D includes an item to determine the position titles of the voting members of the coordinating councils. A frequency distribution of reported membership is presented in Appendix D. Table 2. Sixty-eight of 109 respondents indicated that a district superintendent was a voting member of the council. Sixty-five of 109 respondents indicated that a president of a community college was a voting member of the council. The most frequently appearing position on the councils is that of district director of vocational education - 79 of 109 responses included this title. Forty-six of 109 respondents indicated that a community college dean or director of vocational education was a voting member of the council. None of the above four groups had a reported rescentage of over 72.5. Since the State Board of Education Regulation 6A-6.67 mandates that "the numbership of this council shall include the superintendent and director

of vocational education and adult general education of each school district in the community college area and the president and deans or directors of vocational education and community instructional services of the community college", there is a substantial variation between reported voting perbership and that which is required by regulation.



Recommendations

- Minutes of coordinating council meetings should be distributed to other personnel in districts affected by council actions.
- 2. Minutes of coordinating council meetings should be distributed to Department of Education personnel.
- Coordinating council meeting calendars should be set a year in advance in order to better assure attendance of key personnel.
- 4. The district superintendent and community college oresident should regularly attend council meetings.
- 5. Labor market studies and/or projections should be prenared under the auspices of the council.
- The council should prepare recommendations on shared useane of college and school district buildings, equipment and personnel.
- The council should review the State Funding Guide application of school and college districts.
- 8. The council should review placement and follow-up data on all school and college district programs.
- 9. The council should recommend cooperative staff development programs for college and school districts.
- 10. Since the State Poard of Education Regulations mandate the creation and operation of vocational and adult education coordinating councils, all school and college districts should activate or reactivate coordinating councils.
- 11. Since the planning of staff development is listed as a priority item by coordinating councils, universities having this capability in vocational education should be invited to become members.




- 12. Since there seems to be a need for more systematic attention to planning meetings of the coordinating councils and for providing necessary follow-up, some provision should be made for staff resources. The staff personnel could come from school or college district, or the university if it is a member of the coordinating council.
- 13. There exists a broad range of qualitative differences among councils.

 The Department of Education should provide technical assistance to those councils needing and wishing assistance. If vocational education coordinating councils are to take an expanded role in the shared planning of the vocational education programs of the future, an increased commitment of time and personnel must be made by member districts.

IN THE LOWER TWENTY-FIVE PERCENT EFFECTIVENESS RATING OF THE TWENTY
COUNCILS:

- An agenda is prepared and distributed to members one day or more prior to conducting coordinating council meetings.
- Coordinating council meetings are held four or more times during each twelve-month period.
- 3. The coordinating council chairmersonship rotates regularly between school district and the college district personnel.
- 4a. Minutes of coordinating council meetings are distributed within two weeks of each meeting.
- 4b. Minutes of coordinating council meetings are distributed to all council members.
- Council agenda items are submitted by both college and school district personnel.
- 7. Implementation of council recommendations is usually carried out by college or school administrative personnel.
- 8. Council recommendations are usually referred to school board or board of trustees for final decision.
- 10. The coordinating council deliberates on matters other than vocational, technical and adult education, e.g., early admission, dual enrollment, computer utilization.
- 14. The school district director of vocational education and the college dean/director of vocational/occupational/career education requilarly attend council meetings.



- 16. Any <u>new vocational</u> or adult education program to be offered by school or college district must be submitted to the coordinating council for reaction.
- 19. The council regularly reviews the total vocational, technical, adult and community services educational program in the school and college districts.
- 21. The council has, during the past twelve months, recommended the avoidance of unwarrented duplication in specific educational programs.
- 25. The location of council meetings rotates among school district and college district buildings.
- 26. The council has prepared recommendations on articulation between school and college programs.
- 29. There exists in the council a spirit of harmonv, cooperation and good will among the members.

The above list gives some indication of those practices which are presently being performed by the majority of the councils. A reading of the practices in this list shows that these are the practices one would expect to find in an organized group. They are of a common nature and do not differentiate between effective and non-effective councils.

- 36. The coordinating council has approved a statement of rules of conduct, e.g., constitution, by-laws.

- 15. Lay people serve as members of the coordinating council.
