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ABSTRACT

This catalog was developed as a means of communicating innovative and imaginative programs and practices among the 28 community colleges in the state of Florida. Each institution submitted information on programs and practices which they have successfully used and which they feel might serve as a pattern for other institutions. Types of innovative programs and practices were broken down according to five categories: instruction, public service, academic support, student support, and institutional support. Each entry consists of a title, a brief description, and a contact person, college and phone number. Well over 200 entries are included in the catalog. Detailed information on an entry may be obtained from the contact person for that entry. Institutional addresses are appended. (Author/NHM)

**Description:** Older Persons Using Skills (OPUS) is designed: to provide meaningful learning activities for older citizens which will foster greater degrees of independent living; to provide older citizens, as instructors in this program, the opportunity to earn additional income and to share with their peers the knowledge, expertise and experience gained over a long lifetime; to provide for the older person, in his role as a student, instructor or advisory board member, a chance to be an active participant in the educative process and community life.

Title: Telephone High School Completion for the Severely Handicapped

Description: Adult Education at FJC, North Campus, encompasses a unique Telephone Education Program for Severely Handicapped Adults. Begun in September, 1973, the program consists of four part-time instructors providing approximately 80 teaching hours per week to the sixty students currently enrolled. Instruction is individualized so that the adult students can progress at their own rates of learning. The instructional program leads to a High School Credit or Equivalency Diploma or other instruction, including junior college credit. The program is conducted primarily by telephone with the instructors making home visits when necessary. The students are adults who are confined to home, bedridden or in a wheelchair and in need of educational help. A job awareness service is offered to the handicapped students with the placement of these students in jobs the ultimate goal of the project.

Title: JET Center - A Cooperative Effort of the Community, School Board and Community College

Description: As a result of the urgent need for skilled craftsmen in the metals trades, the JET (Job Entry Training) Center was established through cooperative efforts of the community, Duval County School Board (D.C.S.B.) and Florida Junior College at Jacksonville (F.J.C.). The JET Center opened July 17, 1974 and consists of 60 welding stations, 20 sheet metal stations, 20 steel fabrication stations, and 20 machine shop stations. The Community (Blue Ribbon Advisory Committee, Chamber of Commerce, Legislators and Others) assisted with an occupational needs survey; supported local Legislative Delegation in obtaining funds; and assisted in recruiting students, securing instructors, soliciting donations of supplies and equipment, and other support needed. The D.C.S.B. received \$500,000 made available from the State Vocational Improvement Funds; has purchased demountable buildings and placed them on F.J.C. Downtown Campus site; has leased buildings to F.J.C. for three years or until the new Downtown Campus is completed; and will later move buildings to other locations for use in D.C.S.B. vocational programs. F.J.C. has ordered and installed equipment purchased with \$276,000 Vocational Education Act funds made available by State Department of Education; has leased buildings from D.C.S.B.; and is operating JET Center training programs, with 10% of spaces in each class reserved for D.C.S.B. high school students.

Title: Life Lab

Description: An interdisciplinary program at Miami-Dade Community College - Downtown in which students can contact to do self-directed studies rather than take regular classroom courses. It is similar to the national University Without Walls Program, but is not a formal or institutional member of UWW.

Title: Learning Support Center

Description: The Learning Support Center is an integral part of the Intercurricular Studies Division (I-Division). We require that it adhere to all of the assumptions of regular instructional modules and be cost-effective. The LSC has 5 basic goals. (1) It facilitates the completion of current curriculum objectives for students in the I-Division and in other divisions. (2) The LSC facilitates the completion of academic and personal goals for I-Division students and other students. (3) The LSC facilitates similar goals for groups in the community not attending campus classes. (4) The LSC should enhance the self-image of all students it serves. (5) The LSC should help the student create positive values towards education, self development, and develop confidence in his ability to learn. A traditional lab often has a very negative atmosphere since it is quickly designated as the area for "dummies." In the LSC, where much is offered for students at the other academic extreme, the center is simply identified as a place in which a student can develop his skills anywhere along the continuum. No stigma is attached to the center.

Title: Intercurricular Studies Division

Description: The mission of the I-Division is to provide a cost effective general education program for a heterogeneous population of freshmen students. The division believes the purpose of general education is to help students develop those skills, resources, and attributes necessary for them to function effectively in a Pluralistic Society. Five assumptions about the educational environment form the basis for program decision making. The curriculum must be, (1) interdisciplinary, (2) pragmatic, (3) result-oriented, (4) for a heterogeneous student population (race, sex, and ability), and (5) humane. After three years of operation, these assumptions have not changed. The I-Division is made up of three organizational units called modules, and another unit called the Learning Support Center (LSC). Each module has four instructors, representing four different disciplines, and a module coordinator. The module is designed to accommodate 200 students. The modules implement an objective based curriculum with emphasis on experiential learning in the cognitive and affective domains. The LSC provides learning support to the three modules and other divisions on the campus. The I-Division faculty serve on subsystem committees that provide program support in the following areas: instruction, research, management, student services, and institutional support. Each subsystem committee establishes a set of objectives to be accomplished during the year, and coordinates the accomplishment of those objectives.

Title: Central Florida College Television Consortium

Description: VCC has assisted in the development of a consortium of nine community colleges known as the Central Florida College Television Consortium. The purpose of the consortium is to facilitate the offering of college courses via television in the areas represented by the member colleges. The first activity of the Consortium was to coordinate the presentation of the series Man and Environment. The program produced an initial enrollment of approximately 2,000 students. The series was carried by an affiliate of the National Broadcasting Company, Orange Cablevision System and Channels 3 and 24, public television. It is hoped that other programs such as this can be developed through the combined efforts of community colleges interested in providing students alternatives to traditional education. At present the consortium is broadening its interest and activities to include radio.

As a result of the success of the Central Florida Television Consortium a state-wide television consortium has been established which provides the opportunity for each of the 28 community colleges to use television and radio as delivery systems within their district.

Title: Valencia Community College's Extension Centers

Description: VCC has established thirty (30) extension centers providing credit transfer courses, non-credit continuing education courses and community services. Many of the centers are located in the area's high schools offering an early admissions program for high school students who wish to take college level courses for credit while completing their high school program. Other centers are located at Walt Disney World, a local shopping center mall, the Newman Club, a church, a planetarium, hospitals, fire stations and VCC's Downtown center. Title: Open Campus

Description: VCC has established from its ongoing Community Service operations a comprehensive community service program given the status of a campus. The Open Campus is open in admissions as well as geographically and pedagogically. Instead of a formal campus, the Open Campus will use various community spaces borrowed or leased throughout the Central Florida area to perform various community services. These spaces will form learning pavilions scattered throughout the community with a central headquarters in the heart of the community. Title: Instructional

Description: ID 100 - Life Experiences is a 12 credit hour (2 credits per area) course taught by a team of six instructors representing their disciplinary areas. The purpose is to explore and inter-relate concepts using ideas and methodologies for six disciplines: English, humanities, mathematics, science, sociology and behavioral science. This interdisciplinary experience is designed to help beginning students learn to synthesize the basic disciplines. The number of students involved can range from 50 to an upper limit of 100.

Title: Individual Directed Study Courses

Description: Students may register for several individual directed study courses at any time during the various school terms. The original concept was to provide opportunity to those who were inadvertently short 1-3 hours for graduation to earn the credit within the term prior to graduation. The program was so successful that it was opened to any students who wished to pursue the available courses without regard to their time of graduation. The general education credit courses available are introduction to Research Material I, II and III. The institutional credit courses available are History of Technology I and II, and Enterprise in Southeastern Florida I.

**Title:** PREP Program (Pre-Discharge Remedial Education Program)

**Description:** A pre-discharge program conducted at Eglin and Hurlburt AFB to prepare service men for re-entry into labor market or educational programs upon release from active duty. Instruction is accomplished via learning laboratory strategy using combination of individual progression, tutorial assistance, and the most modern audio-visual equipment and programs. Program is totally operational with backlog of candidates for admission. Diagnostic pre-post testing is performed on each individual so instruction may be taught to each ones needs. High school credit courses, remedial programs in reading, English, and math through college prep are offered.

**Title:** Adult Migrant and Seasonal Farm Worker Program

**Description:** The Adult Migrant Education and Seasonal Farmworker Program is designed to provide feasible assistance to former farm workers who desire to qualify for jobs of upward mobility. The objectives of this program are (1) to develop employable skills through training programs and/or on-the-job-training experiences, (2) to develop academic and skill achievement levels for job entry, (3) to develop employment opportunity for participants, (4) to place participants in jobs with opportunity for advancement, (5) to aid in locating better housing, and (6) to assist in solving transportation problems. With the assistance of a Federal grant, students are paid a small stipend while they are engaged in training. For 1973-74, the participants' average length of training was three months. The average annual income before training was \$2,025 and the average annual income immediately following training was \$4,680.

**Title:** Home Industries (Okaloosa-Walton Junior College, Chautaugua Neighborhood Center)

**Description:** The primary purpose of this program is to train the students to manufacture items in the home which can then be marketed to either tourist outlets or other retail establishments. The students are taught to construct items which require a minimum expenditure for equipment and supplies and a maximum expenditure of time. Some of the areas covered are woodworking, leathercraft, jewelry making, weaving, knitting, sewing, etc. One of the problems in the rural areas is under-employment, unemployment, and the limited income of retired people. It is felt that through this program some of the residents can raise their standard of living, continue to stay active, participate in some good work therapy, and also increase the social contacts which many are lacking.

**Title:** Home Services (Okaloosa-Walton Junior College - Chautauqua Neighborhood Center)

**Description:** This program includes instruction in basic child care, home sewing, home cooking and money management. The great majority of the people taught in these classes are from disadvantaged backgrounds so the courses are begun on a very basic level. Also, the class sessions must have application to the students' home environment. As a result of the program, the students are able to make their own clothes, cook more nutritious meals, more adequately care for their children. **Title:** Tutorial Program

**Description:** The tutorial program, which is an extension of the classroom and individual study, is one of the means by which the college honors its commitment to provide quality education for its students. Students who need extra-class

instruction in a particular academic area are tutored by students who have demonstrated superiority and competence in the subject area concerned. The benefits are two-fold: (1) the student who needs help is given the opportunity to attend scheduled tutorial sessions whereby he may be able to correct his deficiencies through concentrated effort; and (2) the superior student becomes, through the tutoring he provides, more articulate and acquires more depth in the subject area in which he is already proficient. In order to ensure maximum student motivation, participation in the tutorials is voluntary for both tutors and tutorial students. A student meets with his tutor for one period two days each week under faculty supervision. The program, because it is voluntary, provides maximum opportunity for a student to realize his academic potentialities.

Title: Telephone Technology Training

Description: This program was conceived and is supported under the sponsorship of the Florida Telephone Association for the development and training of in-service and pre-service personnel. Classes are available in both vocational - (non-credit) and technical (credit) areas. Vocational courses range from developing skills in cable splicing to the latest theory of computer switching systems. In-service personnel are paid regular salaries while in training with most classes running 40 hours per week and lasting from one to eight weeks in length. The represented companies provide or assist in the acquisition of needed support equipment and materials which has allowed for a minimal cost for student fees.

Title: Women Interested in Further Education (W.I.F.E.)

Description: Women Interested in Further Education is a six-week, non-credit course designed to provide an atmosphere in which women can become aware of their interests, abilities, and values; explore the socialization process that has shaped their lives; and evolve plans for the future based on a deeper understanding of self and a more realistic

appraisal of the educational/vocational opportunities in the community. Essentially W.I.F.E. is a small group experience involving a counselor/facilitator and 15-25 women. Meeting once a week for three hours, the course utilizes small group discussion techniques, films, guest speakers, tests, (STRONG, EDWARDS, POI), lectures, and role playing to meet the objectives outlined above. Each woman also spends several hours in one-to-one sessions with a counselor during the course of the program.

Title: Programs for Senior Citizens

Description: Seminole Junior College has assisted the senior citizens of its community by establishing a center that provides senior citizens with several services. Title: A Video Tape Production and Playback System

Description: To help meet the needs of the SPJC - Clearwater Campus for a video tape production and playback system, the library installed a simple closed circuit TV system. The system utilizes four video tape decks via an amplify R.F. signal channels 2,4,6, and 7 to playback various pre-recorded tapes to 16 monitors. To produce video tapes a "mobile" production unit was developed. It

Consists of two video cameras and a cart designed to hold a video tape deck, a special effects generator, and sound controls. The "mobile" production unit facilitates on-the-spot tape productions by teachers and students. The total system represents a most economical means of providing a video learning system.

Description: Open College takes college-credit education into the homes of the students of Miami-Dade Community College, using television, radio and independent study. Students are required to come to campus only for exams, though optional on-campus activities are scheduled. The schedule for Open College courses varies each term. Faculty members consult with students by phone or by appointment. Feedback is available to students through faculty consultation, utilization of an open-circuit radio question and answer program, or through use of a computerized instructional management system that evaluates student performance and provides individualized learning prescriptions.

**Title:** Man and Environment

**Description:** In consortium with several community colleges in Central Florida, the Pasco-Hernando Community College has brought higher education into the living rooms of some 240 Pasco and Hernando county residents via the medium of television. The environmental course is designed to acquaint citizens with the fundamental aspects of ecology in terms of increasing their individual awareness. As evidenced by extensive evaluation, the general consensus of participating students and faculty is that the television instructional program is meeting its objectives and that it is providing students with an opportunity congruent with the Carnegie Commission's recommendation of "less time, more options." It is, therefore, the considered opinion of P-HCC officials that exposure of environmental imperatives by television has not only enhanced student values, but also has provided an increased public awareness by utilization of an intellectual, stimulating, and innovative approach.

Title: Open-Door Policy and Mini-Mesters

Description: Broward Community College has an open-door policy of accepting any student with a high school diploma or equivalency. Remedial courses in the basics, such as Mathematics, English, Science, and Reading, are offered to any students who need to develop certain areas of low achievement. The College offers evening and week-end courses as well as the regular day classes to accommodate persons with various life styles and work schedules. Mini-mesters are scheduled within terms so that students may take any combination of fall term courses or mini-mester courses. Title: Recruitment in Citrus and Levy Counties

Description: Recruit part-time students in Citrus and Levy Counties who would take college credit courses at night if they were offered in their communities. Courses were scheduled in Chiefland, Bronson and Williston, and to a lesser extent in Crystal River and Inverness. In most cases, we listed a minimum of fifteen students enrolled in the course, which meant that an interested student would have to recruit fourteen other persons. This was no small task, but when this number of students were recruited and did, indeed, register, CFCC agreed to pay the tuition of the person doing the recruiting as a kind of reimbursement for work done on behalf of the college. It appears from the first year of this program that we have hit upon a method of recruiting that is extremely practical and apparently successful. CFCC will monitor this program in future years to see if the concept is acceptable to further enlargement and expansion.

**Title:** Program of Instruction at Florida Correctional Institute

**Description:** CFCC established a program of credit and non-credit instruction at Florida Correctional Institute at Lowell several years ago. This consists of adult basic education courses leading to high school completion equivalency, non-credit vocational courses taught by full- and part-time instructors at FCI and in the vocational education facilities at CFCC, and credit instruction taught by part-time instructors (and in some cases full-time instructors) in the classrooms at FCI. The college provides the instruction and the Board of Trustees of CFCC waived all tuition payments for the offenders incarcerated at FCI. Therefore, we have to have a relatively stable student population in the classes in sufficient numbers to justify assigning an instructor to this program. The prison officials have tried to schedule classes averaging about 25 students per section. The classes meet on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday nights. FCI buys the textbooks from the CJCC Bookstore and these become the property of the institution. They then loan the textbooks to the inmate for the length of the courses and then collect them for issuance to another inmate when another section of the course is scheduled. With the success of both the non-credit (vocational) program and the credit (college Parallel) program at FCI there seems to be a need for this program to be continued indefinitely, and no plans exist for eliminating or modifying the program at this time.

**Title:** Maximized Achievement Program (Project A.R.I.E.S.)

**Description:** Project A.R.I.E.S. (Applied Research in the Education Sciences) attempts to present a program based in sound educational practices: matching individual student learning styles with suitable instructional strategies. To that end, A.R.I.E.S. uses as its base the cognitive style map as developed by Dr. Joseph Hill of Oakland Community College in Detroit. Sufficient disciplines have been included so that the student can complete his general education requirements for the first year within the project. To insure student mastery of concepts and to accommodate varying cognitive styles, each discipline within the project has developed several instructional strategies. The lecture/discussion forms a common base. From this point the student may either use individualized instructional modules, audio-cassette tapes, and video tapes, or seminar sessions, peer tutoring, and group discussion to master a particular concept. Every opportunity is made to accommodate each student's unique learning style.

Title: Weekend College at HCC

Description: The Weekend College program of HCC began during the Fall of 1970 at the Dale Mabry Campus. Since that time, the program has grown to the point that in Winter, 1974, over 300 different students participated in the program. Weekend College is an especially designed sequence of credit courses which enables the Weekend College Student to complete the associate degree requirements in approximately 2 1/2 years during the evening. It expands educational opportunity by providing a program of higher education for those who: (1) Work Monday through Friday; (2) Have small children; (3) Work or live too far away to commute daily; (4) Have irregular or shift work schedules; (5) Would rather attend a series of classes in one day than two or three days per week. By offering an annual schedule of classes, the student is able to plan his class load on an annual rather than a term basis.

and judge (often by voice or hand vote) what answers, other than instructor's, that will be accepted. If a question is adjudged "vague" or otherwise unacceptable, it is discarded and not considered in over-all grade. This practice gives students a direct hand in evaluation of examinations.

**Title:** Team-Tutorial Program

**Description:** The Futures Quality Management Laboratory uses a combination of team instruction, research, and case analysis, with freedom-of-choice for a final project. A folder with printed instructions is issued during the first class period. Each student prepares a case study, critiques of films and guest lectures, an abstract of one book, and a final project which can be a research report, an original videotape with group participation, a demonstration, or a guest speaker who agrees in advance to let students critique his presentation. Deadlines are assigned to provide for turning original case studies into scripts for videotape with retakes as necessary. The student sets his own pace and receives a grade when all work is completed. He may start a course at any time and individual instruction can be provided for a class of one. This program is effective for a wide range of quality capability and industrial management classes. It could be used in other areas where AV backup and research are available.

**Title:** A six-weeks summer school program for disadvantaged and accelerated junior and senior high school students

**Title:** A faculty-Centered Outreach Program Attempting to Reach the Disadvantaged.

**Description:** This effort began when a local OEO official was invited to visit with the math faculty to discuss means of reaching the disadvantaged youth of this area. From this discussion developed the idea of a core program of learning activities designed primarily to give the student self confidence, an awareness of his own potential, and a desire to continue to improve. We hope to enlist the cooperation of some of the college faculty, as well as local citizens who have a sincere interest in helping to make the effort meaningful. From the initial groups who will be invited and encouraged to attend by local counselors, teachers and business people, we hope to find those who will be interested in taking courses that will be developed around their special interests and recognizable deficiencies. We realize that the possible great diversity of abilities and backgrounds will make it necessary to approach the problems from many levels and in many social, as well as education areas. To be able to do what we have in mind will require learning and teaching devices that appeal to the various senses. We hope to develop a learning laboratory equipped with slide and film projectors, tape players, perhaps electronic storage and recall systems and stocked with films and tapes prepared primarily for use with the students we hope to be working with. We have been encouraged to continue our planning and have been led to believe that Federal Agencies will be willing to fund the project. At present, we believe the present math lab area will provide the necessary space for it.

**Title:** Logos Model of the Nursing Process

**Description:** Three years ago the faculty embarked on a course of action to try to develop their own models for developing problem-solving and decision-making skills. Basic to developing problems skills was the philosophical acceptance of nursing as a process. Acceptance of this brought with it the need to define the process. Over a period of three years, the faculty worked on arriving at consensus on what the steps consisted of. After agreement upon these steps the whole process was operationalized into a narrative model for use with students. This was later converted into a LOGOS model after the chairman had been exposed to the Systems

training work conference at the college. The faculty has enthusiastically endorsed this model and sees the LOGOS model as a possibility for developing many other problem solving learning experiences.

**Title:** Revising Written Composition by Use of the Tape Recorder

**Description:** Revising written composition by tape recorder is a useful method. In a laboratory, students record and play back revised rough drafts. Enlisting the ear to aid the eye emphasizes and directs students' natural capabilities. Classroom instruction includes listening exercises stressing unity-disunity and coherence-incoherence. Students learn to detect incompleteness, digression, irrelevance, gaps in thought, contrasting choppiness and smoothness. The tape recorder provides opportunity for discovery and response. Recognizing their weaknesses, students can then improve their papers. Repeated surveys show the majority of students crediting the tape recorder with improving their objectivity and critical judgment, involving them in their writing, giving them responsibility for improvement, and making them feel more independent, self-reliant and confident.

**Title:** Bilingual College Program

**Description:** The Downtown Campus Bilingual College Program was started in the Fall of 1972. This program makes available a wide range of college courses with bilingual instruction for those students who recognize the importance of bilingualism in Dade County. With the influx of Cubans and other Latins into the Miami area within the last ten years, there has been a tremendous change in all aspects of community life. About one-third (more than 350,000), of the present population of Dade County and over fifty-two percent of the actual population of Miami is of Spanish-speaking descent. Because of this fact and the cultural impact these people have had on Miami, the Dade County Board of Commissioners passed an ordinance in early 1973 declaring Dade a bilingual and bicultural county. The implications of this action are significant especially in the area of jobs and education. The Bilingual College Program is not intended to be a remedial language program. On the contrary, one of the requirements of the program is that students be or become proficient in both English and Spanish. One of the main goals of the program is to allow students to improve their bilingual ability at the same time they master the subject matter of their choice. This is accomplished by offering credit courses with bilingual instructors thus enabling the student to select texts, readings, tapes and to write their exams and to make oral and written reports in the language of their choice. One important goal of the program is to produce bilingual and bicultural students who can communicate orally and in writing in both English and Spanish with proficiency commensurate with their experiential and educational level, age, and interests and who can interact with equal effectiveness with members of both cultures. The age factor is an important aspect especially with the adult student in the over-30 age group. This particular group generally experiences difficulty with the English language in varying degrees and in many instances this has become an unbreakable barrier in their effort to further their education. By

providing course content in Spanish the program has made education viable to a large number of people. This has been especially true in skills and occupational areas. The curriculum content in Spanish, which parallels regular curriculum content in English, is an essential component of the Bilingual College Program. The curriculum content in Spanish provides instruction which contributes to the educational process of both Spanish language origin and English language origin students. For the Spanish language origin student, this component develops further native language skills; develop insights into his own culture; provides a means of preserving his academic standing in relation to the regular English curriculum while learning English as a second language. For the English language origin student who has been involved in Spanish as a second language instruction, this component includes the development of his skills in the second language and the development of his insights into the second culture. Curriculum content in Spanish refers to instruction in Spanish dealing with the regular curriculum content which is normally taught in English at Miami-Dade Community College. Music, art, social studies, mathematics, science, physical education, or any other aspect of the regular curriculum in English. Participating students are to be given full credit for any subject area taken in Spanish.

**Description:** For the past two years, PJC's Adult High School has offered high school credit courses in Americanism vs. Communism and American Government via TV. Thirty half-hour lessons were taped by the College TV station, WSRE. The teacher prepared a fifty-page student guide to parallel the thirty TV programs with reading assignments, objectives, study hints, charts, and so forth. The students may enroll for home TV viewing or, as most do, view the programs in a normal classroom situation. The AV course follows state regulations but also includes relevant parts of sixty films and over 900 stills. **Title:** Introduction to Sociology - An Individual Program

**Description:** This program consists of a series of five modules (each module is composed of three units) each of which is complete in itself. Reading tapes, to force concentration, as well as explanatory tapes are available for each of the modules. The student may work at his own speed individually, or in small groups. Alternate forms of tests covering the material in the modules permit retesting if the student is not satisfied with the original grade. Each unit has a built-in glossary for interpretation of sociological terminology. The basic materials in each module is underscored so that the slower students will not be frustrated by the higher level materials that are included as a challenge for the most advanced students.

Title: Florida Institute of Criminal Justice Program

Description: The Florida Institute of Criminal Justice was established five years ago by a member of the law enforcement faculty at Central Florida Community College. The FICJ is a non-profit institute operating as a separate budget item under the umbrella of CFCC, utilizing our staff and facilities for its existence. The FICJ sponsors short courses, workshops, seminars in the area of law enforcement as opposed to the standard type of three-credit hour course that would extend over a seventeen-week term. It was recognized that many law enforcement persons involved in continuing and upgrading their professional education could not find time for a three-credit course in the evening or afternoons, over a seventeen-week term, but could attend a short, concentrated, two or three-day workshop in a particular area. This, of course, is one of the basic ideas behind the whole continuing education program. That in-service persons would have their education



upgraded and renewed, refreshed and continued has long been an established fact. The FICJ is nothing more than an organization set up to accomplish this fact for the law enforcement persons within CFCC's service area. The FICJ has been successful in attracting top-flight persons with, in some cases, national reputations. The FBI, the Federal Bureau of Dangerous Drugs and Narcotics and the various Florida state law enforcement agencies have been most cooperative in sending persons to serve on our faculty and staff for the short institute, seminar and workshop type of courses scheduled by the FICJ. It has been determined that for the past several years the institute has been self-supporting, and in several cases has even shown a slight profit, which can be used to support other law enforcement activities at Central Florida Community College.

**Title:** Basic Education Program

**Description:** Nine years ago we had a guided Study Program that offered institutional credit, which prepared students in remedial instruction for entrance into the standard program. After a number of attempts at varied formats, this program was modified to the basic education concept which we now employ. Under this new concept, a student is enrolled in a course and is given as long as is necessary to complete the objectives of the course. This may be one term, two terms and in some cases, three terms. In addition, the students are given special tutoring help and other special student services by a group of persons on the Basic Education Department team. As a result, the drop-out rate has lowered significantly and students are encouraged in the knowledge that what they are doing is, in fact, college level work and they are working toward college credits in much the same way as students in the "standard" sections at CFCC. This also helps in the normal frustration problems encountered by students needing remedial help. Disadvantages to the program include the lengthened time necessary for students to complete the program, which must be considered realistically by students who are ill-prepared to do college level work and also the lack of any special funding for the program. If the program were labeled "compensatory" or "remedial" it might well be that it would qualify for additional funding, but by not labeling these courses as either, the institution is removed from any special funding consideration.

**Title:** Independent Study Beginning Algebra through Second Term Calculus and Relevant Liberal Arts Mathematics

**Description:** Self paced, programmed mathematics covering algebra through some calculus. A continuum from no knowledge of algebra through elementary algebra, college algebra, trigonometry, differential and integral calculus. Philosophical and practical emphasis on relevant mathematics. Title: Placement and Re-Placement in Mathematics

Description: Students are initially placed in mathematics courses by counselors who have the students' records, including high school transcripts, Florida 12th grade test scores, or S.A.T. or S.C.A.T. scores, as well as our own placement criteria to go by. Inevitably, an appreciable percentage of students find that they are in a course that is too easy or too difficult for them. For several years we have found it possible, and advisable, to permit the student to drop to a lower course or in a few instances try a higher course. He may drop back at almost any time if he can find a class appropriate to his needs. We have reduced failures to a very low percentage. Only the latter course appears on the student's records.

Title: FORTRAN Programming for Technicians

Description: This course is designed to take students who have been rather thoroughly educated in an Engineering Technology, to give them a solid basic understanding of computer operations, and then to develop their ability to apply their new competence to the specialized problems of their chosen fields. The principle instructor handles the class as a group until after mid-term. The students then spend the remainder of the term in separate groups under a

**Title:** Introductory Algebra

**Description:** This course is a self-instructional course designed for students deficient in the mathematical skills prerequisite to a successful experience in elementary algebra. The instructor is available at all times to answer questions. Classroom attendance is required. A student may start at any point in the course by taking pretests and scoring them for himself. If he does not make a perfect score, the text directs him to the necessary explanations. After completing a chapter, a posttest is taken and scored by the student. If he is satisfied that he knows the material, he may ask the instructor for a parallel test on the chapter. The instructor scores this test immediately and discusses any mistakes made with the student. If the student misses any problems, he is given another test covering those examples he missed, if only a few, or a completely new test if he made a low score. In every case, a student must understand how to do all examples on the tests before he is allowed to advance to the next chapter. The student progresses at his own rate and may take 2 semesters to complete the course.

**Title:** Mathematics for Elementary Teachers

**Description:** This is an individualized course - allowing the student to study in the pattern and at the pace most conducive to his learning efficiency. Seventeen units are covered in a two-semester course, and a test on each unit is given as each student completes that unit. The tests are graded immediately by the instructor and any mistakes are discussed with the student. A grade of 90% or better is required before the student may advance to the next unit. A low score may be improved by taking another parallel test. The beauty of this course lies in the fact that the alert, progressive student is not held back because of the slow learner. He may discuss any

phase of the course with the instructor at any time. Most students attain a high degree of competence. Others may extend completion of the course to another semester. Classroom attendance is required.

**Title:** Individualized Manpower Training Program

**Description:** Indian River Community College was selected as one of the pilot demonstration sites of the federally funded Individualized Manpower Training Centers. In the IMT Center, individualized instruction is provided in remedial mathematics, language skills, reading, employability behavior and complementary skills to disadvantaged and/or handicapped persons from Indian River, Martin, Okeechobee and St. Lucie Counties. Within the total curriculum, the individualized programs aim toward preparing enrollees to reach their occupational goals. Instructional activities are designed and prescribed to enable the enrollees to acquire specific educational and employability skills. The basic design of the program enables the enrollees to participate in these activities concurrently with their occupation or occupational training courses. When the enrollees are admitted to the IMT Center, their academic strengths and weaknesses are identified by various tests. After diagnosing the test results, an individualized program of study is prescribed, concentrating on the elimination of the academic deficiencies of each enrollee.

**Title:** Physics Laboratories, Physics with Calculus. Introduction of principles of experimental data analysis using individual programmed calculators.

**Description:** The student learns to use a small programmed calculator (basically, a scientific miniature computer) to analyse experimental data to determine the type of relationships which exist between variables in the basic laws of physics. The student learns to use statistics to evaluate the reliability of his data and to assign a bracket (mean value + maximum error) within which the true value for the variable lies with a mathematical certainty of 95% - - 99%, etc.

**Title:** Wastewater Plant Operator, Associate in Planned Certificate Program

**Description:** Wastewater Treatment Plant Operators Program (Program #99) provides the student with the necessary knowledge and skills to qualify for immediate employment as a Wastewater Plant Operator. The program consists of study in mathematics, biology, chemistry, English, and report writing, safety, design, equipment, laboratory and plant operation. In addition, the student will receive on-the-job training at a local treatment plant. During the program the student will take the Florida State Department of Pollution Control Domestic Wastewater Facilities Operator Certification Examination if qualifications are met. The program is also designed to upgrade the skills of presently employed treatment plant operators. Women, as well as men, may enter the program. The total program consists of 17 credits of classroom instruction which may be completed in two consecutive terms, and on-the-job training at a local treatment plant. Enrollment in this program is approved by the Department of Engineering. Stipends and financial assistance is given to those enrolled in this program through the Environmental Protection Agency when available. A Planned Certificate is awarded upon successfully completing all 17 one-credit courses. The credits may be applied towards an Associate of Science Degree in Civil Engineering Technology or in Environmental Control Technology. There are no entry qualifications.

**Title:** Instructional Management - Biology, Individual Option Studies (BIOS)

**Description:** Created and supervised by one Program Manager, and carried out with student volunteers, student assistants, and a new instructional category, laboratory technician, who functions on a paraprofessional level, the course consists of a small core of basic skills and concepts with options for the student to select areas of significance and interest to him. He then explores these areas through a variety of methodologies, e.g., audiotapes, laboratory exercises, open ended laboratory investigations including field work, library research, and utilization of community resources. Students are encouraged to develop additional skills and creativity by student production of tapes, photography, etc. In essence, through active participation, instead of passive recipients, "the method" becomes the message. Thus, one faculty member handles the biology program for the campus.

**Title:** Directed Studies for Science Majors

**Description:** One of the problems that science majors encounter at NFJC is scheduling all of the science courses they wish to take. In trying to satisfy the heavy load of general education requirements in the other disciplines, the science major finds he is unable to schedule one or more science courses that he would like to have. To alleviate this problem, the instructors in the science department have volunteered to offer capable students individual directed studies in the courses they are unable to work into their schedule. These courses are over and above the normal teaching load of the instructors, and for the most part are offered in the short semesters during the summer.

**Title:** Nursing Learning Lab

**Description:** All of the functional skills of nursing, along with selected conceptual and humanistic skills are taught in this self pacing, learning laboratory. A variety of media is utilized including television. TV is used primarily for evaluation of skills with taping of student performance followed immediately by instructor guided critique. The laboratory is under the direction of a full-time nursing faculty member. Each program developed for the laboratory is accompanied by a comprehensive Learning Experience Guide which steers the student through that particular learning. The Guide includes a pretest objectives, suggested alternative routes for reaching the objectives, a posttest and activities, i.e., practicing of skills, where appropriate. Each skill is evaluated by the laboratory instructor before the student may perform this skill with patients. This laboratory contributes materially to the student's entering practice as a competent, confident, beginning practitioner.

**Title:** Modified Audio-Tutorial Approach Involving Three (3) Distinct Science Lab Courses in a Lab having Nineteen (19) Stations.

**Description:** Laboratory Physical Science, Laboratory Biological Science and the Basic Science for Nursing Laboratory phase are offered. Students receive one semester hour credit for three clock hours work. Manuals written by Manatee Junior College staff are available from the Bookstore. Lab open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Students may take weekly quiz when ready, prior to Friday of the respective week. Change over for following week Thursday afternoon. New work week starts Friday. Individual conferences arranged. Lab is supervised by faculty member, aided by student lab assistants. Student reports to lab, registers by presenting file card to lab assistant, receives tray of materials, reports to assigned fully equipped booth with other materials, including demonstrations, available on a special table, and may leave at any time by checking out at lab assistant's desk. Student refiles his own card. He may return as often as needed. Student is required to write mid-term and final exam. All lab work is correlated with lecture courses. Lecture course may be taken independently of lab, but lab must have had lecture course as pre-requisite or taken collaterally.

**Title:** Humanities of The Sea

**Description:** Always conscious of the special instructional needs of its community, Indian River Community College has responded once again by developing a program in an area which has yet to be seriously considered. Still in its early stages, IRCC's Humanities of the Sea curriculum places a non-technical emphasis on concepts and questions involving the use of a major resource--the ocean. Particularly timely for Florida and the Indian River area, the Humanities of the Sea program investigates a wide range of ideas ranging from the difficulties involved in coastal zone planning to long-term considerations on recreational use of the ocean. IRCC's Humanities of the Sea program had an initial enrollment of over two hundred students and featured such nationally prominent speakers as Dr. Robert Abel, Mr. George Lowe, and Mr. Jack Carmichael. The course dealt with a wide range of topics represented by: "The Oceanic Heritage of the United States--the Hidden Dimension of History;" "The Overlooked Meaning of Salt Water Literature;" "Oceanic Organizations--Impact on the Development of Plans, Programs and Policies pertaining to the Sea;" "Oceanic Recreation--Wave of the Future;" "The World Ocean in International Affairs;" "Recreating

an American Maritime Mentality;" and "Exploring the Oceanic Frontier." The Humanities of the Sea program had its initial implementation at the University of Virginia in cooperation with the Oceanic Educational Foundation. It has undergone considerable development at Indian River Community College and is now being complemented and expanded by new studies in technical oceanographic subjects including marine biology. It is foreseen that the Humanities of the Sea program will become a necessary ingredient in the educational programs of those interested in pursuing careers in conservation, development of natural resources, as well as in general business careers focused in the coastal regions of Florida.

**Title:** SUCCES (Students Under Constant Challenge for Educational Success)

**Description:** The Succes Program is a counselor-centered, interdisciplinary program utilizing a vertical-team approach involving behavioral sciences, natural sciences, language arts and mathematics which uses various modes of instructional devices, such as modular block scheduling, individualized study, small group dynamics, laboratory facilities, etc.

The philosophic basis for the program is a synthesis of the works of Karl Rogers, B. F. Skinner, Harold Grant and John E. Roueche.

This program is designed primarily for the high-risk student and structured so that the student can complete his basic general education requirements for the first year.

Upon completion of the SUCCES Program, the student should evidence a healthy self-concept; he should have selected and begun participation in a realistic vocational and/or academic area.

Title: Cooperative Advancement Program

Description: This program is designed to assist adult migrant and seasonal farm workers in acquiring an education in all areas offered by the College curriculum. Given an individualized, job related educational curriculum, the program provides instruction sufficient to enable trainees to qualify for occupational training, on the job training, entry into community or four-year colleges, referral or direct job placement or entry-level jobs following remedial education. Trainees may need preparation in English as a second language, a high school diploma, knowledge of consumer education, citizenship, family skills, health and safety education, nutrition, use of finances or other assistance toward upward mobility. The program is designed to provide these services plus counseling and supportive services in order that the adult and seasonal farm worker can improve his situation on his job, to move to other jobs or develop a career. The program is designed to offer financial assistance to a head of household during the period of time he is in school. The student should remain in the program until qualified in his chosen field whether it be a diploma, degree, licensing or other requirements for certification of competency in their chosen careers.

Title: Waiver of Fees for Non-Credit Program

Description: Several years ago Central Florida Community College was confronted with a relatively stable adult education program which had leveled off at about 1,000 registrations. It was felt that nothing short of very drastic measures could increase this as the Adult and Continuing Education Administrator had tried without success any number of novel and innovative courses and programs. Courses were scheduled at odd and unusual hours, in out-of-the-way as well as convenient places, and the enrollment resisted all efforts of the college to increase it. As a last resort, the college administration approached its Board of Trustees with the idea that all fees for Adult and Continuing Education (non-credit) courses should be waived except in those areas where substantial materials of a consumable nature are used. The Board of Trustees, as a one year experiment, agreed to go along with the recommendation of the president that no fees be charged for the program. This was widely publicized and at the next registration the CFCC Adult and Continuing Education program was swamped with an enrollment double what it had been the previous term. It became apparent that large number of retirees and persons of modest circumstances sincerely wanted to improve themselves through the educational process, but felt that the existing fee structure prohibited them from doing so. The waiving of the fee structure had a great effect upon the people in our area and enrollments have continued to grow and double and grow again. CFCC's Adult and Continuing Education program now totals around 6,000 enrollments and appears that the upward spiral will continue indefinitely. There is no question that part of this is due to the increase in population in Marion County areas as Ocala becomes a medium-sized community from its relatively small status prior to 1970. However, CFCC administration likes to think that part of the increased enrollment was due to the elimination of any fees. The Board of Trustees, a year after its experimental program was introduced, agreed to continue the waiver of fees for non-credit courses on an indefinite basis. This move was received enthusiastically by the people of Marion County, who continue to increase the enrollment totals in our non-credit program.

Title: The "Now" Woman Program

Description: The Director of our Adult and Continuing Education Division responded to a number of requests from housewives in the community who felt that their continuing education was being neglected, while their husbands improved, worked their way up the job ladder, and became more successful and well-known in the community. The result of this concern was the development of the "Now" Woman Program. This program enrolls a number of housewives from the Ocala area whose husbands tend to be professional leaders in the community. These ladies keep up-to-date with current politics, the arts, and even review some of their past heritage and traditions in evening sessions at the college. These are not persons actively seeking a degree, but they are awarded Continuing Education Units for their participation in the "Now" Woman Program. While the program was originally set up for what was hoped would be about 25 participants, the numbers have been running closer to 40 or 50 this year. The program has received good publicity in the local press and participants in the program are enthusiastic about the quality of instruction they are receiving. CFCC sees this as part of its role in the continuing education not only of professional and semi-professional wage-earners, but in the continuing education of their spouses. While a "Now" Men Program was suggested, there are no plans at the moment for implementation of such a program as it seems that the demand for this would be relatively limited. However, the "Now" Woman Program has met with widespread enthusiastic support and cooperation.

**Title:** Associate in Science Degree Program in Corrections

**Description:** Palm Beach Junior College can provide basic education to the field of Corrections. Education of personnel is the most effective way of improving correctional services. When 75 to 85 percent of the budget of a correctional institution or agency goes into its personnel, then improvement of the personnel must be the most appropriate approach to improvement of the program. The majority of personnel, currently engaged in detention, prison work and corrections are at the educational levels where they can be served effectively by Palm Beach Junior College. Protection of society is foremost. Generally, corrections begin to function as soon as the system for the administration of justice gives society legal control over the life or liberty of an offender who has, in essence, forfeited his freedom by a criminal offense. Corrections is concerned with the rehabilitations of the behavior of individuals who damaged society or themselves through acts that are so much in violation of the social norms and expectations that they are in violation of the law. Corrections is society's attempt to correct or control criminal behavior. Palm Beach Junior College can assist in the correctional field by increasing the effectiveness of semiprofessional personnel in all areas and by providing pre-service and in-service education in the field of corrections.

**Title:** Buehler Planetarium of Broward Community College Programs

**Description:** Buehler Planetarium opened in 1965 and has been serving the public since its inception. It consists of two separate chambers: (1) a 40-foot chamber which provides 100 seats for college classes and public shows; (2) a 20-foot chamber exclusively used for instructing local school children. During the past year, it served approximately 25,000 elementary and high school children and about 20,000 adults. Title: District-Wide Campus (College without Walls)

Description: The Pasco-Hernando Community College was founded in 1972. Immediately the District Board of Trustees passed a resolution adopting a district-wide campus philosophy as follows: "We visualize a district-wide campus with every corner of the district being served as courses are taken wherever they are needed." To implement this philosophy of the Board, the College opened three offices simultaneously, one in each of the major population centers. These offices began to organize a college program, utilizing various Community facilities - - schools, bank conference rooms, and community centers - - anywhere classes could be held. The Pasco-Hernando College district is a large rural district of over 1600 square miles, with major population centers located in three areas of the district. Each area office was organized into a modified house plan with a dean or director in charge of each area, and the necessary supporting and instructional staff was attached to each area to fulfill the educational needs of that community. These area offices have grown into college centers in two short years. It is anticipated that as each center grows, the minimum permanent facilities will be built for support and specialized activities such as learning resources, administrative offices, and specialized laboratory facilities. It is intended that many classes will continue to be held in various community facilities. This procedure is expected to produce a college that will be 300% stronger in enrollment and service to its entire district, while costing only one-third more than a traditional setting.

Title: Distribution of Continuing Education classes at off-campus centers to provide instruction that serves more people within the service.

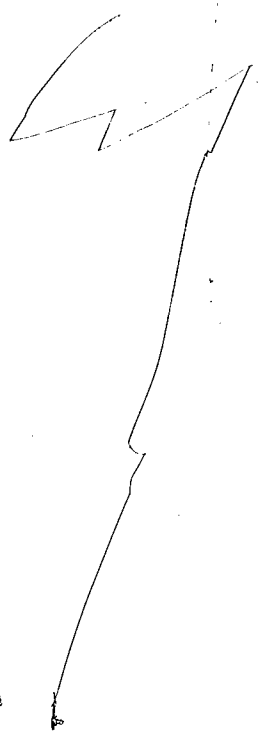

Title: Earth Day Teach-In

Description: CFCC, along with most insitutes of higher education in the United States, recognized the interest that developed in the late 1960's in "teach-ins." It was felt that a teach-in aimed at encouraging students' awareness of our environmental problems and the need for ecological activity to reduce pollution was necessary. Consequently, CFCC established a day in April in which students were encouraged to attend an all-day session of speeches, films, reports, forums and action groups in an attempt to create interest in work on an effort toward a reduction of pollution. The planning for this day was done jointly by the Director of the Natural Science Division and Chairman of the Social Sciences Department. These two gentlemen work well together and a second, third and fourth Earth Day were also held at CFCC. The local press, radio and other media were notified of the participants at the event and an attempt was made to get full media coverage. This was sucessful in many cases because of the high quality of the visiting speakers who were attracted to the insititution. In subsequent years, it has become necessary to place some money in a budget to provide honoraria for visiting speakers, but in many cases these speakers donated their honoraria to various ecology groups. Students received an interesting, and non-traditional educational experience. Numbers of area high school students came to the event by bus, and also became familiar with the campus and some of our programs, so the teach-in fulfilled some recruiting functions. Also, many interested citizens from the community came to the event on our campus. The event has been large enough to overflow the auditorium and in recent years it has been held in the college gymnasium, which has a larger seating capacity. They received enough recognition to become a permanent part of the college calendar, and is looked forward to each year.

They are instructed by the counseling staff and are able to assist students in academic planning, articulation with the university system, career information, recruitment of new students. They also serve as liaison between the counseling staff and students in need of the services of a professional counselor.

**Title:** Career Information Center

**Description:** Highly visible, just inside the main entrance of the library, the Career Information Center is in the midst of the student traffic flow. Title: QUEST - small group, self-exploration, for 16-17 year-old high school students

Description: QUEST is a one-semester small group experience involving a counselor/facilitator and 10-16 adult high school students. Focusing on the student as a unique individual, QUEST emphasizes self-discovery and growth through personal exploration, clarification and evaluation of alternatives, life style planning and short-term goal setting. Throughout the course, the student studies himself as a social, emotional and physical being, and uses this new consciousness of self to make more effective choices enabling him to live the life he chooses to live. Meeting once a week for one-and-one-half-hours, the course uses small group discussion techniques, films, tests, role playing, and games to meet the objectives outlined above.

**Title:** Early Registration of Evening Students

**Title:** Filing System for Inactive Students Permanent Records

**Description:** On registering for the first time each student is assigned a permanent student number, in sequence. On becoming inactive, each student's permanent record is filed numerically. A student locator card showing only the name and number is filed alphabetically. Unless the inactive student subsequently re-enrolls, the PR file remains in place and does not require shifting in file cabinets. Microfilms are also filed in numerical sequence and the locator card filed alphabetically is used to determine



location. Red tabs on active P.R. files are used to distinguish them from inactive for personnel using either active or inactive P.R. files.

Title: Florida Junior College at Jacksonville On-Line Student Registration System

Description: The Student Registration System (SRS) permits students to register for classes at any one of three campus sites, by utilizing video display terminals for data entry. The registration procedure is conducted simultaneously at the three locations. From any one of the registration sites, students can register for classes held on one or more of the three campuses and/or at any one of the many part-time centers located throughout the district. The system checks for time conflicts and produces a numbered fee statement that also lists the courses for which the student has registered. The fee calculation routine accommodates the entry through the terminal of financial aid awards and reflects the amount in the printed statements. Two of the sites are processed in remote mode via telephone lines and the additional site is in local mode. Hardware configuration is as follows:

Title: Student Scheduling System

Description: Miami-Dade is currently installing a comprehensive student records system consisting of five basic subsystems: (1) Admissions, (2) Maintenance of Student Personal Data, (3) Maintenance of the College Catalog and Master Class Schedule, (4) Drop/add and Late Registration, and (5) Student Scheduling by Course and Major Time Block. The Student

Scheduling System is a combination projection and student scheduling package. This allows student course requests to be collected for any future term in order to generate reports that are used to modify the master schedule before students are actually scheduled. The ability to delay the fixing of the master course schedule until the last possible moment gives the college time to react to changing student demand patterns. Since courses are requested only by course abbreviation and number (not by specific section), classes may be added, cancelled or shifted to reduce the number of conflicts that are built into the master schedule. Once the master schedule is fixed, the course requests are used by the scheduler to assign each student into class sections within the time constraints specified by the student. The scheduler supports alternate course requests, alternate time requests, time exclusion capability, cross campus registration with allowances for travel time, and flexible time block patterns. The scheduling algorithm is designed to select the most compact time schedule for the student in keeping with the needs of a heavily scheduled community college.

**Title:** Health Fair

**Description:**

Two years ago Central Florida Community College established a half-time position as "Health Coordinator." This position will be filled by a person who has a background in girls' physical education, as well as first aid, biology and physiology. The second half of the position was "Director of Student Activities." This person, as part of her responsibility for health care on the CFCC campus, established first aid centers in each building, arranged for emergency medical care procedures and a form of preventive health care, set up, established and coordinated the first two "Health Fairs" ever held at CFCC. The Health Fair in 1972 ran for several days and consisted of blood testing and typing, blood pressure test, the opportunity to donate blood, drug awareness counseling, venereal disease information dissemination, tobacco information and testing or Sycle Cell Anemia. Publicity over the local radio stations and newspapers was extensive and large numbers of students found time during the several days of the fair to go through the battery of tests. In a number of cases referrals were made to local physicians because of unsuspected health conditions existing in students. The 1973 health fair was even more heavily publicized, was longer and served more students. It is apparent that a health fair will, in the future, be an annual event on the CFCC campus as we continue to explore ways to let students know about their bodies and how they may or may not have been neglecting and/or abusing them.

**Title:** Campus Coalition Government

**Description:** Something new in student government was formed at Indian River Community College last fall with the formation of the Campus Coalition Government. Most people have heard of a "coalition," but still have a few doubts in their mind about just what it does mean. By Webster's definition, coalition means a temporary alliance of distinct parties or persons for a joint action or more simply, a combining of people, such as students for a short period of time... the fall and spring semesters of junior college; the purpose being to guide the students into various activities on campus through clubs, organizations, sports teams, etc., which represent all segments of the student body. In that Indian River Community College is a "commuter college," it was necessary that the government reflect the varied social, career and age interests of students comprising the student body.

The Campus Coalition Government is a form of student government that evolved from the traditional Student Government Association, which has been on junior and senior college campuses for sometime. At the junior college level particularly, there was an obvious lack of participation by the majority of the student body and it was felt that a new form of student government should be instituted to better involve and serve ALL students. Upon investigation into the needs of the students, it was found that there was a lack of communication between students and organizations, so in order to incorporate all of the activities on campus into the student government, the C.C.G. constitution was prepared (by a group of interested students, with a little advice from advisors), publicized and voted upon by the student body in the fall of 1973. It was approved unanimously and put into effect

immediately. Essentially, the C.C.G. as opposed to the standard S.G.A. puts the power and the decision-making in the hands of the students themselves.

The C.C.G. is composed of representatives of active organizations, athletic teams, clubs and interest groups on campus, as well as representatives elected at large from the Sophomore and Freshman Classes and the four counties that the school serves. We use the words "active organizations," due to the fact that if the representatives of the various teams and clubs do not attend or participate in the C.C.G. meetings, they may not receive any funds from student activity fees, as these are administered by the C.C.G. More about this later.

The actual duties of the C.C.G. include:

- (1) To promote, coordinate and support campus-wide activities.
- (2) To recommend students for the college standing committees and special committees.
- (3) To consider applications for new clubs and organizations requesting college approval.
- (4) To recommend allocation of the Campus Coalition monies so that the spread covers on-campus activities and community activities to a widely representative degree.
- (5) To establish a campus activity calendar.
- (6) To serve as official representative of Indian River Community College at Student Government Association conventions.
- (7) To refer student inquiries to the proper channels for investigation.

Title: Black Culture Week

Description: For a number of years Central Florida Community College has been sponsoring through its ASU (Afro Student Union) a Black Culture Week. This week occurs in the time early in February surrounding the birthday of Abraham Lincoln. It is a nationally recognized time for observance of Black Culture on many campuses and in many communities. The CFCC observance of this program includes five auditorium programs sponsored by the ASU. It is extremely difficult to measure the effectiveness of something as subjective as this, but we at CFCC like to think that the Black Culture Week is a successful and exemplary practice.

**Title:** Property Accounting System

**Description:** The college provides a means of classifying and maintaining property inventory as required by State Law (Chapter 274). Property items are accumulated by Fund Numbers 1,2,3, and 7 from Capital Accounts, and are coded by 2-digit codes that designate the type and class. The computerized printout includes date of acquisition, warrant and voucher numbers, decal number, location, precise description, manufacturer's serial and model number, fund and life expectancy to be used for budget purposes. Monthly computer printouts provide update of items in inventory, deletions or surveyer items, trade-ins, and newly acquired property. A reconciliation with the Accounting Department is completed on a monthly basis, and this reconciliation is based on the Monthly Trial Balances and the data submitted by the Property Accounting Section.. Cost Centers are established in accordance with PPBS.

**Title:** Bank Stuffers and Billboards

**Description:** During August all banks in the county were contacted personally by the Director of Community Relations about mailing a registration stuffer in their checking account

In addition, posters were placed in bank lobbies during the month. Many inquiries and calls resulted from this mailing. The driving public is now well aware of VCC by the use of these free billboards.

Title: Position Accounting System

Description: The Position Accounting System is an integrated system of Budget, Payroll, and Personnel. The system accounts for each individual full-time employee for proper budget appropriation, expenditures and compliance with established pay schedules. It also provides the automatic input for payroll and documents for the individuals' personnel file. This system calculates available surplus funds on a current basis that results from terminations and from budgeted vacant positions. Salary budget projections and other management information reports are generated from this system.

Title: Academic Accounting System

Description: In order to provide greater flexibility in organization for learning, it was necessary to develop a system which would provide information at all levels concerning the economic impact of program decisions. The Academic Accounting System was developed in order to effect a marriage of economic and academic planning at the faculty level with the constraints and parameters well understood. It is a planning system which allows gaming of different instructional organizational plans with the capacity to accommodate a department's particular constraints. The results of this projection are then stated in terms of expected mean credits produced for each full-time professional staff member. Within this framework, the department may utilize staff and organize the instructional

delivery system using the point system to get a plan that the members of the department feel will produce the best results. Most important, the persons making the program decisions know the economic impact of those decisions and the limitations within which they may work.

The system is being revised currently to add consideration of variable staffing and the amortization of development costs over more than one year in order to provide further flexibility in planning.

**Title:** Management Systems Development

**Description:** Miami-Dade Community College is using or is engaged in the development of ADVANCED MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS, among them the following:

- (1) Planning/Programming/Budgeting/Systems (PPBS)
- (2) Cost Analysis (in which the direct and indirect cost of every course is computed on an annualized basis)
- (3) Faculty Product Reports (in which the ratio of student credits to FTE faculty is computed for each department on a term-by-term basis)
- (4) Policy Manuals (which reflect verbatim policy statements made by the District Board of Trustees and other policy decisions at the state and national levels)
- (5) Procedure Manuals (which are implementing instructions for policies)
- (6) Decision-Making Guidelines
- (7) Long Range Planning Manuals (which provide to all managers a standardized data base of facts and projections)
- (8) Advanced simulation models (which will enable M-DCC administrators to game the results of various economic-related decisions for several years in the future)

**Title:** Planning and Managing the Construction of Physical Facilities

**Description:** Based upon Florida State Board of Education Regulations for the Operation of Junior Colleges and Florida Junior College at Jacksonville Operating Procedures, a model was designed to illustrate the interaction of activities to plan and manage the construction of physical facilities. The model is presented in the form of a Program Evaluation and Review Technique (PERT) network diagram which identifies 164 major events to initiate and complete a physical facility expansion project. The model, based upon research, identified the time frame required to complete each event for a theoretical project. Techniques and procedures are identified to plan a facility, select an architect, and bid and administer the construction of the project.

**Title:** Meeting of Civic Organizations on Campus

**Title:** Office of Staff and Organization Development, North Campus

**Description:** Integration and Coordination: They help improve communication between various units of the college so that an integrated program of training sessions, workshops, conferences, and seminars relates to the goals of the total organization. Requests for these training activities are coordinated through the office.

Operation: OSOD conducts a variety of conferences and seminars, which might explore the philosophy and values of the college or develop skills in specifying teaching goals, strategies, and evaluation methods.

Information: OSOD maintains an information center so that all members of the college can have access to research any ideas from within and outside the institution.

Training: The office helps faculty members design learning experiences for other staff. By reviewing all approved faculty travel leaves, it can encourage a faculty member who has attended a conference of interest to other staff to share this information with them in a workshop or seminar.

Assistance: On request, OSOD helps any unit of the college-- departments, divisions, or administrative offices-- establish priorities, set goals and objectives, and develop role definitions. It has worked with division directors and department chairmen in developing faculty evaluation techniques. It has analyzed college committee assignments and procedures and offered training to committee members in agenda-setting, report-writing, and decision-making. It has helped administrative units develop into teams - groups of people who recognize their members' special talents for problem-solving and decision-making. It works in crisis intervention and in prevention by sponsoring human relations training on a group or individual basis.

**Title:** Faculty Involvement in SPD Planning

**Description:** While some institutions arbitrarily decide the expenditures of Staff and Program Development Funds, CFCC has involved the faculty in making recommendations for SPD plans. The vehicle for this involvement is the Faculty Congress and its Executive Committee or Senate. This group of representative faculty members (elected by the entire faculty) evaluates the SPD programs and makes suggestions each year for new directions for SPD expenditures. This procedure has been going on for three years now and it seems to have several important advantages:

- (a) Faculty members tend to request SPD support when they have been directly involved in suggesting budget planning.
- (b) There is a greater understanding of what SPD is, what it is meant to do and what, in fact, it does as the faculty become more involved.
- (c) Administrators are sometimes surprised, and, generally delighted with some of the new ideas that come from the faculty as a result of these proposals.

CFCC feels it has a strong SPD program because of the faculty involvement in the planning for the program and the faculty at CFCC gets quarterly reports of the status of the SPD account, which describe how the money is spent and how it is planned to spend it, so that faculty members feel involved and show a concern over the SPD funds.
