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ABSTRACT

Volume Four of this selected annotated bibliography is composed of the most recently discovered materials, pertaining to blacks, Latinos, Native Americans, multi-ethnicity and racism. Like the three previous annotated bibliographies, it is considered to reflect only that material which is held to be most representative and most relevant in terms of the involvement and contributions that Third World people have made in the development of the United States and the climate of the times during which such involvement and contributions occurred. The contents of the bibliography are organized into nine sections, focusing respectively on the following topics: racism materials, black printed material; black audio-visual materials; Latino printed material, Latino periodicals, Latino films, native American printed material, native American films, and native American records. Information provided on each item covered in the first eight sections includes where to obtain the item, the suggested usage of the item, and a brief description of the item. The last section lists three films which issue catalogues of native American music: Everest Records, Indian Records, and Canyon Records.

Detroit, Michigan is the site for the surveys analysed in this study. It does not deal exclusively with black people or white people. The focus is on changing currents of public opinion in Detroit and the policy implications of these developing attitudes.

Both comical and tragic, Ceremonies is a brilliant representation of one element of Black life.

An anthology, comprised of the stories, poems and essays of the most eloquent Black writers, which serves as a record of Black humanity - its complexity, diversity and essential individuality. Good for use as a general literary text or as a supplement.

Emery, Lynne F. Black Dance in the United States from 1619 to 1970. National Press Books, Palo Alto, California, 1972.

A comprehensive study of the dance forms of Black people. It traces the origin and describes the social meaning of many forms of dance from the slave trade to the present. An excellent bibliography is included.

Foner, Philip S., editor. The Voice of Black America: Major Speeches by Negroes in the U.S., 1791-1971. Simon & Schuster, New York, 1972.

Includes many previously unpublished speeches.

Survey of the continent with emphasis on the contemporary situation.

Fox, Lorene, editor. East African Childhood. Oxford University Press, New York, 1967.

Three readable biographies detail traditional child-rearing practices.

Fuller, Hoyt. Journey to Africa. Third World Press.

A personal recall covering 1959 to 1970 of European cultural oppression and the rise of Pan Afrikanism in Guinea, Senegal and Algeria.

Frazier, E. Franklin. The Negro Church in America. Schocken, New York, 1964.

Frazier presents an analysis of the historical origin of the Negro church and an account of its present status. He also points out the role that the church plays in the Negro community.

University of Chicago Press, Chicago, Illinois, 1966.

Although this study was originally done in the 1930's, it is a classic and relevant study of the Negro family. Frazier presents his data from the point of view that social conditions have shaped the characteristics of the Negro family.

Fredrickson, George. The Black Image in the White Mind: The Debate on Afro-American Character and Destiny, 1817-1914.
Harper & Row, New York, 1971.

A study of the development of intellectualized racist theory and ideology.

Gibson, Donald B., editor. Modern Black Poets: A Collection of Critical Essays. Prentice-Hall, Englewood Cliffs, New Jersey, 1973.

Discusses Black poets from the early twenties to the current revolutionary poets. Contains a good bibliography on individual poets as well as Black poetry in general.

Giovanni, Nikki. Ego-Tripping and Other Poems for Young People. Lawrence Hill and Co., New York, 1973.

Inspiring poetry and pictures that should capture the imagination and feeling of children of all ages.

Gordone, Charles. No Place to be Somebody. The Bobbs-Merrill Co., Inc., Indianapolis; New York.

A vibrant and lusty comedy-drama which is set in a bar in the West Village of New York owned by a Black man named, Johnny Williams. The raffish characters are of various colors and walks of life. The play confronts the Black man and himself, the white man and himself and then places those selves face to face with each other. The play is a social commentary which transcends the cliches of racial relations. Contains some strong language.

Haley, Alex. (as told to) The Autobiography of Malcolm X. Grove Press, New York.

Relates Malcolm X's early life, prison experience, conversion to Islam, work with the Black Muslims, pilgrimage to Mecca and the years of uncertainty afterwards.

Hansberry, Lorraine. The Movement: Documentary of a Struggle for Equality. Simon and Schuster.

Excellent book for its depiction of the oppression of Blacks.

Suggested Use: Secondary

Harris, Middleton, Furman, Roger, Levitt, Morris and Smith, Ernest, editors. The Black Book. Random House, New York.

A microcosm of the history of Blacks from slave ships to dream books, from the Gold Dust Twins to Bessie Smith, from lynching to cakewalking, from the past to the present. It is a center point, a pivot post around which Black life revolved and revolves.

Hayden, Robert, Burrows, David and Lapidés, Frederick, editors. Afro-American Literature: An Introduction. Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, Inc.

A generous sampling of literary work by 20th century Black authors. The anthology is composed of short stories, poems, plays and essays which deal with the struggles and experiences of Black Americans. The selections are arranged by genre and represent a view indicating range and variety. A brief introduction is provided for each genre.

Heady, Eleanor B. When the Stones Were Soft. Funk and Wagnalls, New York, 1968.

A series of folktales that could be used alone or in comparison with the myths of other cultures.

An effort to correct the misconceptions about the weakness and instability of the Black family which have dominated sociology. Hill examines the positive aspects of the Black family--its strengths and its survival in a hostile environment.

Hirst, Terry. Mumo at the Coast. Oxford University Press, Nairobi, 1969.

Another story of Mumo which is a novel approach to geography.

Johnston, Rhoda Omosumlola. Iyabo of Nigeria. Alpha Iota Chapter of Pi Lambda Theta, Claremont, California, 1973.

Iyabo is born, grows up and marries deeply rooted in Nigeria's Yoruba culture.

Jones, LeRoi, Dutchman and The Slave. William Morrow and Company, New York.

Dutchman: In the stark style of Imamu Amiri Baraká (formerly LeRoi Jones), a sensitive and thought-provoking portrayal of human life unfolds. The play consists mainly of the interaction of a striving young Black male and a destructive white female. Each character is symbolic of elements within his or her race, thus their interaction and its ultimate result are also symbolic. Teachers are advised that much of the language is quite strong, but does not detract from the overall effectiveness of the play.

The result is an imaginative exploration of Southern Black types, from the simplest sharecropper struggling unconsciously in a world he does not understand, to men and women aware of their fate and approaching it through political conviction.

Alford, Harold J. The Proud Peoples. David McKay Company, Inc. New York, 1972.

A restatement of the history of the proud peoples of Hispanic heritage in the United States, dramatizing the chronology, the contributions, the difficult status, the desperate needs and the dynamic potential of Spanish-speaking peoples across the nation. Includes an appendix containing personal vignettes of 60 people representing the various Spanish-speaking cultural groups in the United States.

Allen, Steve. The Ground Is Our Table. Doubleday Publishers, New York, 1966.

What goes on in the life of a migrant? Steve Allen, comic, actor, composer and now writer, answers this question and many more relative to the Mexican-American migrant in the United States. Although the book has a 1966 publication date on it, little has changed in the daily struggle to survive for migrants.

print as the author threads myth, legend, witchcraft and suspense into this novel rich with lore from the land of enchantment - New Mexico. Those readers interested in bringing interesting aspects of the Mexican and Mexican-American culture into the classroom should make Bless Me Ultima required reading.

Angel, Frank. Program Content to Meet the Educational Needs of Mexican Americans. New Mexico State University, Las Cruces, March, 1968 (ERIC).

This document was prepared as a presentation which was delivered for the National Conference on Educational Opportunities for Mexican Americans held in Austin, Texas. The paper describes some crucial areas of the educational process of children which should be developed to meet the special needs of Chicano youngsters. These areas include: (1) language; (2) cognitive development; (3) effective development; (4) intergroup relations; (5) occupational educational programs.

Arellano, Estevan, editor. Entre Verde Y Seco. La Academia de la Nueva Raza, Dixon, New Mexico (P.O. Box 31), 1972.

Short stories and fables are the emphasis of this text. New Mexican Spanish is used to convey the cultural and linguistic beauty of New Mexican "dichos" and "cuentos." A handy glossary at the end of the book gives the reader standard Spanish equivalent to the words used.

Barker, George. Pachuco, An American-Spanish Argot and Its Social Functions In Tucson, Arizona. University of Arizona Press, Tucson, Arizona, 1970.

A reprint of an earlier study conducted in 1950 about the social phenomenon known as Pachucismo. Not many in-depth studies exist which delve into the language and lifestyle of the Pachuco cult which reached its height in the late 1940's.

Suggested Use: Professional Growth, Sociology, Psychology, English, Linguistics

Baty, Roger M. Re-educating Teachers For Cultural Awareness: Preparation For Educating Mexican American Children in Northern California. Praeger Publishers, New York, 1972.

An action-research study to determine the effect of exposure to cultural, social and economic diversity on selected attitudes of elementary school teachers. Baty takes a fresh look at the public educational institution, focusing not on the usual objects of research, "the culturally disadvantaged" students, but rather on their "culturally disadvantaged" teachers. He sees the classroom as a place for supporting cultural diversity.

Blawis, Patricia Bell. Tijerina and the Land Grants: Mexican Americans In Struggle For Their Heritage. International Press, New York, 1971.

The author depicts the struggle of Tijerina and his followers for the land in New Mexico--claimed by the United States. A strong pro-Tijerina argument is presented in this particular book. An excellent resource to examine in search of comparative history from a Chicano perspective.

Boatright, Moody, editor. Mexican Border Ballads and Other Lore. Southern Methodist University Press, Austin, Texas, 1962.

The socio-political times of people are often reflected in their music. Mexican music is no exception. In this publication, the author has collected ballads which are generally considered to be the Mexican classics in the border towns of Texas and Mexico. The songs are translated into English which make the lyrics much like historical prose.

Bolognese, Don. A New Day. Delacorte Press, New York, 1970.

This trade book is a modern-day description of the Nativity. In this case the characters are Jose and Maria, migrant farm workers who are traveling south and fail to find a place to spend the night. As in the original story, Maria is with child. Instead of having her baby in a barn, Maria's baby is born in a gas station. The illustrations are especially representative of the Southwest.

Suggested Use: Elementary (Early Elementary) Drama

Bonham, Frank. Viva Chicano. Dell Publishing, New York, 1970.

The setting for this story takes place in East Los Angeles, California. Although the readability for this book appears to be a high-interest type of story, scrutiny should be given to the inaccuracies in the language of the barrio. A second look should also be given to the type of stereotypes which the story tends to perpetuate. The book is not an especially well-documented account of reality; however, it could be a valuable vehicle to use in the classroom as a critical analysis of life in the barrio.

Burma, John, editor. Mexican Americans in the U.S.; A Reader. Schenkman Publishers, Cambridge, 1970.

Forty-one essays on characteristics, prejudice, education, economics, family and religion, social and political behavior, health, class and status, acculturation and assimilation, Spanish Americans and Puerto Ricans. Includes essays which perpetuate the myths Latinos are trying to dispel. Again, an example of literature which can be used as an analysis of the real life in the Chicano environment.

Professional Growth

Cabeza de Baca, Fabiola. We Feed Them Cactus. University of New Mexico Press. Albuquerque, New Mexico, 1954.

An autobiography of a Chicano which details the life of the Mexican American at the turn of the century. The caste

system of society is observed through the eyes of a woman with specific attention given to the upper crust and their attitudes of and behavior toward "la clase baja."

Suggested Use: Secondary (High School), Social Studies, Sociology

Cabrera, Ysidro Arturo. A Study of American and Mexican American Culture Values and Their Significance in Education. University of Colorado, 1963.

The purpose of Cabrera's study was to synthesize data on American and Mexican American cultural values in order to better understand the nature of conflicting differences which affect education and to provide background information that can be used as a basis for planning curriculum for Mexican Americans. The author concludes that there is a critical need of teachers with a sound understanding of American and Mexican culture values and intensive training for teaching English as a foreign language.

Emerging Faces: The Mexican Americans.
Wm. C. Brown Company, Dubuque, Iowa, 1971.

The author speaks as a Mexican American on selected issues important in the lives of Chicanos, such as the treatment of Chicanos in literature, education, health care, housing, politics, religion, and cultural identity.

Candelaria, Nick. Spanish Culture in Proverbs. Bishop Publishing Co., Portales, New Mexico.

There are one hundred ninety-eight entries which reflect the Spanish ideology in proverb fashion. Each entry is written in Spanish with an English translation, or explanation should one be required.

Casavantes takes an opposing view than the one presented by Oscar Lewis "culture of poverty" premise. The author in this case separates Chicano characteristics from low social class characteristics in what he describes as a belief systems cube.

Cox, William. Chicano Cruz. Bantam Press, New York, 1972.

A poorly developed story reflecting the life of Chicano youth. Chicano Cruz should be banned from the bookshelf because it is not only unrealistic in its approach to describing Chicano living styles but it also does much to reinforce negative stereotypes. Teachers could perhaps utilize this book as a lesson in inquiry but under no circumstances should the book be utilized in the classroom without careful evaluation.

Cisne, Jaime. Bronze On Blue. Trucha Publications, Lubbock, Texas, 1972.

"Contains myriad reflections of the young poet who has traveled the winds across time and space tracing his steps with the lacework of his pen. Cisne's poetry covers various themes giving insights into the meanings of things. A bilingual

edition suitable for the classroom or to be read in the evening with the waning moon."

Christian, Florence R. Coyotes: An Animal Story of the Southwest. Educational Consortium of America.

As with other study prints offered by the Educational Consortium of America, this series of photographs are well presented in Spanish and English. The teacher has the use of guide questions to direct questions and general inquiry to students being presented the material.

Cordasco, Francesco and Bucchioni, Eugene, editors. The Puerto Rican Experience: A Sociological Source Book. Rowman and Littlefield Publishers, New Jersey, 1973.

"In the final analysis, the Puerto Rican mainland experience is still evolving and no past experiences of other groups furnish models adequate to its comprehension; in many ways it remains unique." (P. xviii)

The many topics covered in this book have been said before in the authors' previous work: The Puerto Rican Community and Its Children On the Mainland, Scarecrow Press, 1972. It may behoove the beginning reader to select the second book written by the authors, however, since it appears they have attempted to condense and edit out the most objectionable parts of their initial effort.

"Island and silver, butterflies of glass . . . un bato en las esquinas (a dude in the corners), purple shirts and dreams . . . A cosmic vagabond am I . . . a derelict in

space." Editions are available in Spanish, English or a bilingual version.

Delgado, Abelardo. The Chicano Movement: Some Not Too Objective Observations. Prepared by Colorado Migrant Council, 1971.

Delgado looks at the goals, methods, strategy, weak points and strong points of the Chicano movement. His aim is to provoke thought, not to merely describe. Subjects dealt with include the movement and politics, education, cultural revolution and economics.

Duran, Livie Isauro and Bernard, H. Russell, editors. Introduction to Chicano Studies: A Reader. Macmillan Company, New York, 1973.

Duran and Bernard base their selection of readings on these premises:

1. that Chicano culture is real
2. that Anglo society doesn't have a "Chicano problem," rather, Chicanos have problems caused by Anglo society
3. that self-determination is both the most rapid and only satisfactory solution to the Chicano's problems

The reader's selections are divided into three main sections: readings dealing with the past, the present and the future.

Fishman, Joshua A. and Ma, Roxana. Bilingualism in the Barrio. Indiana University Press, Bloomington, Indiana, 1971.

The body of this book is divided into three sections containing sociological, psychological and linguistic studies. Several papers are appended in a theoretical addendum. The authors' bias toward a sociolinguistic model and its verification is evident throughout, although this does not appear to prevent the use of methods from different disciplines to research bilingualism from a Puerto Rican perspective. In fact, the book points to the need for further interdisciplinary study of bilingualism.

Fitzpatrick, Joseph P. Puerto Rican Americans. Prentice Hall, New Jersey, 1971.

A socio-historical review of the Puerto Rican community and the many factors involved in migration patterns of people from the island to the mainland. The many focuses of the book include: the family, community and race, and the institutional aspects of education, welfare, mental illness and drug abuse and religion. One of the major weaknesses of the book is the fashion in which assimilation is interpreted by the author as being the route all Puerto Ricans are following in New York. Aside from the author's bias, included in various sections of the book dealing with assimilation, this work may be beneficial to those seeking sociological information regarding the New York Puerto Rican.

Galarza, Ernesto. Aquí Y Alla En California. Educational Consortium of America.

A Spanish reader on geographical points in California. Illustrated with the author's photographs. The author's format could be replicated by the innovative teacher to develop a bilingual reader of the general vicinity of the school, city or country. A glossary of equivalent English and Spanish words and phrases are included in Aquí Y Alla En California.

_____. Historia Verdadera De Una Gota De Miel. Educational Consortium of America.

A science lesson on how bees produce honey and how we get it from the bees. Some knowledge of Spanish is required. Glossary of equivalent English and Spanish words and phrases included.

_____. La Historia Verdadera De Una Botella De Leche. Educational Consortium of America.

A photo-story of how milk is processed. The entire text is in Spanish; however, an English glossary is included to explain the terms and phrases used in the text. This book is an excellent supplement to use in the classroom with children learning Spanish As A Second Language.

_____. Zoo Fun. Educational Consortium of America.

A vivid description of forty-eight zoo animals with vivid color photos. Included is a comprehensive listing and illustrations of the world's great zoological gardens. For teachers interested in a bilingual version of the same text, it is recommended they use Zoo Risa.

Haddox, John. Los Chicanos: An Awakening People. Texas Western Press, El Paso, Texas, 1970.

Author looks at the history of injustice, and humiliation and contemporary insult and abuse suffered by Chicanos in the United States. Presents some possible positive developments in Southwestern society in general and the Mexican-American community in particular. Deals with issues such as de-education and acculturation; identity; Mexican American values; and positive bilingual education.

Hood, Flora. One Luminaria for Antonio. Putnam Press, Berkeley, California, 1966.

A charmingly told story of a Chicano child and his stubborn efforts to get a luminaria. The illustrations add to the story.

Hudson, Wilson M., editor. The Healer of Los Olmos and Other Mexican Lore. Southern Methodist University Press, Dallas, 1951.

"Remedios," healing remedies which have been traditionally passed on from generation to generation have been part of the Mexican culture and are the main focus of this publication. Folk beliefs as they relate to healers and remedies are also dealt with by the author.

Inland Library System. Chicano: A Selected Bibliography. Inland Library System, San Bernardino and Riverside Counties, California, 1971.

A selected and partially annotated bibliography of English and Spanish language materials by and about Chicanos. Its focus is mainly on the contemporary interests and concerns of the Mexican-American community. Books are listed for adults, young adults and children by general subjects such as philosophy, religion, social science, literature, art, history and fiction. Also included are relevant periodicals, United States and California government publications, newspapers.

The book has two main sections, one containing information on printed materials and the other containing information on visual materials. Also contains four appendices, providing information on a selected number of periodicals, associations and organizations and notable Mexican American personalities.

Keating, Charlotte. Building Bridges of Understanding Between Cultures. Palo Verde Publishing Company, Inc., Tucson, Arizona, 1971.

Author lists, with a brief annotation, those books which she feels can give a child or teenager a growing understanding not only of himself but of the paradox of a free society - "that valuing the individuality of others increases the worth of his own, that the more one respects cultural diversity the more one discovers how much people have in common." She includes sections on Black Americans, Indians and Eskimos, Spanish-speaking Americans, Asian Americans, Nationality groups and Religious minorities, selections with Multi-Ethnic Representation, Books for Bilingual/ Bicultural Children, and books on Africa, Asia, and the Carribean. Each of the twelve sections is divided into three parts, one containing materials for pre-school and primary levels, one for upper-elementary levels and one for junior-high and high-school levels.

The author's purpose is to show the true, combative reality of his people and their determination to continue the culture, language and traditions of Mexico.

Included in the twenty-one subject headings are: bibliographies and reference works, economy, education, folklore and traditions, history, juvenile literature and religion and philosophy.

This film not only shows the delicate sensitivity of a Mexican boy but the camera work reveals some very unusual scenes of animals and wildlife.

The final report provides the basis of this book. The areas of Economic Development, Education, Health, Tribal Governments and the BIA are discussed.

Useful collection of Ojibwa literature and AroI history.

An anthology of American Indian verse and song. The author has broken the songs into the various geographic cultures (i.e. Woodland, Plains, Southwest, Northwest Coast and Far North). In the introduction, the author tries to explain the differences in Indian verse and those of the European culture.

DeLoria, Vine, Jr. God Is Red. Grossett & Dunlap.

Religious crisis in contemporary life is analyzed. The author feels that christianity has failed in theory and practice. Could possibly be one of Mr. DeLoria's finest works. He also holds a Doctor of Divinity degree.

_____. Of Utmost Good Faith. Bantam, 1972.

The author deals with arts, treaties and judicial decisions which have decided the fate of many tribes. Some of the issues covered are changing concept of Tribe, Citizenship and Civil Rights and Indian Claims.

Fuchs, Estelle and Havighurst, Robert. To Live on This Earth. Doubleday, 1972.

This book is an outgrowth of the national study of American Indian education completed in 1971. Many Indian viewpoints toward education are explained.

Georgakas, Dan. The Broken Hoop. Doubleday & Company, New York, 1973.

A short history, and by no means complete, of Indians from Atlantic Coast to the plains. Briefly touches the Northeast, Southeast and the plains.

Gordon, Suzanne. Black Mesa: The Angel of Death. John Day Company, New York.

A careful investigation in text and pictures of the conflict between the Hopi and profiteering power companies. An in-depth look at the Hopi belief about the Black Mesa.

Gridley, Marion. Indian Tribes of America. Hubbard Press, 1973.

Describes the major tribes in the Northeast, Southeast, Plains, Southwest and Northwest Coast and their distinctive ways of life.

A short compact history of the American Indian and white contact. There are many generalizations which may make it a weak text but if reader is looking for a cursory text, this book will suffice.

Moquin, Wayne and Van Doren, C. Great Documents in American History.

This book is a survey of Indian life and history in the words of Indians from many tribes.

Oswalt, Wendell. This Land Was Theirs. Wiley, 1966.

A purely cognitive look at tribes in terms of their environment, clothing, foods and dwellings. He does not attempt to look at the socio-cultural aspects of the tribes.

Ortiz, Alfonso. The Tewa World. University of Chicago Press, 1973.

The author attempts to relate the Tewa (Pueblo) people's view toward society and cultural belief.

Suggested Use: High School, College

Spencer, Robert, Jennings, Jesse et al. The Native Americans. Harper Row, 1965.

The traditional textbook approach, beginning with archeological data and then leading into the social anthropologist viewpoint of native people. A cold and purely objective look at a people.

Underhill, Ruth. Red Man's America. University of Chicago Press, 1971.

The author attempts to cover the highlights of Indian history. She mentions many of the contributions that the Indian has given to America.

Vogel, Virgil. This Was Country Was Ours. Harper & Row, 1972.

A documentary history of the American Indian from the pre-Columbian period to the present day. The author also raises many issues that the Indian is sensitive to.

Washburn, Wilcomb. The Indian and The White Man. Doubleday, 1964.

A collection of documents which are by design trying to tell the story of early Indian-White relationships and allow the reader to better understand the influences of each on the other.

The evolution of the Indian's present legal status. Careful explanation in laymen's terms is given. An excellent reference for teachers.

Film concentrates on three tribes; Muskogee Creek, Rosebud Sioux, and the Nisqually. Indians speak out on the various problems in maintaining their identity (i.e. ceremonies, treaty rights).

The End of the Trail - The American Plains Indian. 53 Min., B/W. McGraw-Hill, 1967.

This film surveys the last century of Indian-White relations in the plains. Content is not romanticized but is presented in a truthful manner. Be careful not to let viewers feel that Indians no longer exist.

The Exiles. 73 Min., B/W. Contemporary Films.

The film is dated as far as clothes and music but the experiences portrayed are very real today. The film exposes the life of a group of Indians living in Los Angeles, California. Even though the film is good for showing the experiences of Indians, it should be noted, as the narrator does, that it does not represent the life of all Indians who come to the city.

Hopi Kochinas. 10 Min., Color. ACI Productions.

Hopi religion is treated in a reverent manner; stressing the retention of the Hopi culture. Good source of information.

Suggested Use: Junior High, High School

Hopi Way. 23 Min., Color. Films Incorporated.

Film explores "modern" Hopi life as they attempt to live in a traditional way with a minimum of modern influences. Mentions some of the political problems which affect the Hopis.

Ten Thousand Beads for Navaho Sam. 25 Min., Color. Eccentric Circle, 1971.

Story of a Navaho man who has come to the city of Chicago to live and work. Depicts many of the problems which Indian people face when entering a different world of values.

Tuktu and His Eskimo Dogs. 14 Min., Color. National Film Board of Canada, 1969.

Story of an Eskimo boy and how his family used dogs for hunting and travel during the winter and summer.

Part of a series about an Eskimo boy and his family. This film tells the story of how a Kayak is constructed.
