ABSTRACT

The books listed in this annotated bibliography have been selected to assist teachers, librarians, and other interested persons in choosing books for reluctant readers. The books present a wide range of high interest material which is not always at a low reading level. Books are listed in three categories: picture books, intended mostly for use with primary grade children; fiction--adventure and mystery, animal stories, fantasy and science fiction, sports stories, miscellaneous fiction, and story collections; and nonfiction--biography, haunted houses, monsters and UFO's, hobbies and crafts, the world of entertainment, Indians of North America, science, sports, wild animals and pets, wings and wheels, and the world at war. Annotations for each entry include bibliographic data, a brief description, print size, vocabulary range, and reading and interest levels. (JM)

General Introduction

This bibliography has been prepared in order to assist librarians, teachers, and other interested persons in selecting print materials in book form for reluctant readers. By "reluctant readers" is meant those students who, because of lack of interest, lack of reading ability, or a combination of both, do not enjoy reading as a leisure activity.

Because the needs of these readers are as varied as their abilities, this bibliography attempts to present a wide range of material of high interest, but not necessarily always at a low reading level. Some of the books listed here are quite challenging with respect to the degree of difficulty of the vocabulary used in them, but it is to be hoped that the contents are of such a high degree of interest that the reader will be encouraged to continue reading.

It must be emphasized that the present bibliography is not definitive and that it merely attempts to indicate titles which may prove successful with reluctant readers. Opportunities for disagreement with the choice of titles in this list, and for substitution of more appropriate titles are unlimited.

All the books cited herein have been personally examined by the author of this bibliography, and all the titles in this list are known to exist in at least one of two places, viz. the Manitoba Department of Education Library, Room 206, 1181 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg, and the Winnipeg Public Library, 380 William Avenue, Winnipeg.

Some explanation of the format of the bibliography may be in order.

~~There are three large divisions - picture books, intended mostly for use with students in the primary grades, fiction, and non-fiction. In the fiction and non-fiction divisions, there are further subdivisions, e.g.~~

in the case of fiction, Adventure and Mystery, Animal Stories, Fantasy and Science Fiction, etc. Subdivisions with the heading, "Miscellaneous", include titles which simply do not fit easily into any one category. Within their respective subdivisions, annotations are arranged alphabetically by the surname of the author.

The format of the annotations is as follows. Author, title, place of publication, publisher, date of publication are first given, followed by a brief comment on, or description of, the contents of the book. The next parts may require more explanation. A very general comment on the size of print has been made because reluctant readers are often deterred by small print: The presence of illustrations has been noted as a source of appeal to the reader. Comments on the degree of difficulty of vocabulary are to be taken as approximations only, not as exact or scientifically verifiable statements. In categorizing vocabulary as easy, fairly easy, or moderately easy, an attempt has been made to indicate three ascending degrees of difficulty. The emphasis on "easy" is to avoid unnecessary discouragement of reluctant readers. Where the vocabulary does present any unusual difficulties, this is indicated by means of a longer comment in the annotation. The average sentence length is based on random samples of selections from the works in question. Reading levels have been based, in some cases, on application of the Dale-Chall Readability Formula, in others, on a statement of reading level in the book in question, and in still others, on an estimate made by the author of this bibliography. Interest levels are estimates only. In neither reading nor interest levels need the statements be interpreted too stringently. Because of individual differences among readers, the levels can serve only as guidelines. Finally, it will be noted that not all the foregoing elements appear in every annotation. It was not considered necessary to include them all in every case.

Introduction to Fiction Section

(See also General Introduction to the complete bibliography.)

The titles in this division represent a selection of fictional materials which can be used with students from the elementary to the senior grades. The works listed vary considerably in the degree of difficulty that the authors' vocabulary or style present to the reader, but a genuine attempt has been made to select materials in which young readers are likely to be interested. For example, the bizarre and beautiful style of Ray Bradbury's Something Wicked This Way Comes may prove too challenging for some readers, but the appeal of the supernatural elements in the story may well hold the attention of others.

For the most part, titles have not been selected from series designated for the use of reluctant readers, but from general fiction collections. Librarians, teachers, and other persons who are interested in obtaining information about special series should contact the Department of Education Library, Room 206, 1181 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg.

Allan, Mabel Esther, Ship of Danger. New York, Abelard Schuman, 1974. 153p.

Eighteen year old Nella Pollant is delighted to accompany her father on his ship's Easter cruise but the trip proves more unsettling than she or anyone else anticipated.

Ambler, Eric. The Levanter. New York, Atheneum, 1972. 307p.

A good action and espionage novel. Michael Howell who runs a small fleet of cargo vessels in the Eastern Mediterranean is forced by a Palestinian guerrilla organization to serve as an accomplice in the planning and execution of a major strike against Israel.

Amerman, Lockhart. Cape Cod Casket. New York, Harcourt, Brace and World, 1964. 192p.

Jonathan Flower, son of secret agent Major Flower, takes a summer job as a tutor to two children, and finds himself plunged into a mystery which reaches a climax when one of the children disappears.

Amerman, Lockhart. The Sly One. New York, Harcourt, Brace and World, 1966. 160p.

Jonathan Flower and his father pursue an international criminal who is posing as a gypsy king.

Anderson, Mary. Matilda Investigates. New York, Atheneum, 1973. 166p.

Eleven year old Mattie decides that she is going to become the first great woman detective, and has many amusing and unexpected adventures in investigating a mystery.

Annixter, Jane and Paul. The Great White. New York, Holiday House, 1966. 158p.

A young Eskimo boy hunts a great polar bear which is believed to have supernatural powers.

Annixter, Jane and Paul. Wagon Scout. New York, Holiday House, 1965. 204p.

Average sentence length: 15 words.
Reading Level: Grade 6-7.

Annixter, Jane and Paul. Windigo. New York, Holiday House, 1963. 196p.

A suspenseful, well-written story of a young fur trapper, Andy Cameron, who finds his traps being mysteriously robbed. Andy does not want to believe in the existence of the Windigo, the evil spirit that has made hunters and trappers avoid the valley where Andy has his trap lines, but as the mystery increases, even Andy begins to wonder.

Arnold, Elliott. White Falcon. New York, Alfred A. Knopf, 1963. 246p.

The hero of this story is a white boy who is kidnapped by Indians and raised by them. His adventures unfold against the background of Lord Selkirk's arrival in the Red River Valley.

Average sentence length: 14 words.

Arthur, Ruth M. My Daughter Nicola. New York, Atheneum, 1965. 122p.

Nicola, the Swiss heroine of this story, feels that her father does not really love her because she is not a boy. To prove her worth to her father, she sets out on a dangerous mountain climbing expedition.

Moderately easy vocabulary - some words may be difficult for the reluctant reader, e.g. "desolate", "conjectured", but meaning can usually be determined from context clues.

Ashlee, Ted. Voyage into Danger. Toronto, Holt, Rinehart, and Winston, 1971. 138p.

A story of intrigue and modern day piracy in the Queen Charlotte Islands off the coast of British Columbia.

Glossary of nautical and foreign terms at end of book.

Pilot Tim O'Hara is forced at gunpoint to land in a South American republic where he and his passengers must fight for their lives against the well-armed soldiers of a hostile army.

The resourceful Desmond, therefore, manages to sidetrack Gus on to investigating some mysterious happenings connected with a series of robberies. Plenty of action and humour enliven the story.

The family befriend a lost Negro boy who arrives at the mill, which is later attacked by an American raiding party. All ends happily, however.

The titles in this division represent a selection of materials intended mostly for use with children in the primary grades. Although illustrations are a predominant feature of interest in these picture books, there are varying quantities of accompanying text, and in some cases it is possible to find an overlap with materials which are classed as fiction, particularly in this bibliography, since many fiction materials are illustrated, also in varying quantities.

It should be noted that many of the titles listed here do not contain a controlled vocabulary (in the sense of words used in them having been selected from vocabulary lists for specified grades). In this event, it is to be hoped that the suggested reading and interest levels will be useful in estimating the appropriate range for which the titles can be used.
