ABSTRACT

As a part of the annual Supply and Demand Survey conducted by the Pesearch Committee of the California Educational Placement Association (C.E.P.A.), 104 public community colleges in California were asked to report on their hiring of full-time faculty and staff during the 1975-76 academic year. Survey responses came from 101 institutions. A total of 1,481 full-time faculty and staff were reported hired, of whom 188 (12.7 percent) were returning from leaves of absence or sabbatical, 289 (19.5 percent) were former substitutes, 954 (64.4 percent) were new to the district, and 50 (3.4) percent) were new positions gained through special funding. Data were collected as to specific field vacancies filled. A short narrative section compares the C.E.P.A. data with that of previous years of California Community and Junior College Association reports on staffing patterns. Trends noted include an upward trend in the expansion of student services, as reflected in an increase from 69 to 154 full-time counselors hired, and a heavy influx of new instructors in health services, vocational, and business subject fields. Within the academic subject fields, social science, and English showed the greatest increase over the previous year. The survey instrument is appended, and data are organized into two tables. PART ONE

FULL-TIME FACULTY AND STAFF HIRED BY ONE-HUNDRED PUBLIC CALIPORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGES FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 1975-1976

As a fart of the annual Supply and Demand Survey conducted by the Pesearch Committee of the California Educational Placement Association for 1975-76, one-hundred and four public community colleges in California were asked to complete a single page chart. (See Enclosure 1) By February, 1976, one -hundred and one colleges had supplied the requested data. The three who did not respond are all large colleges with enrollments over 6,000 but are located in declining full-time student city areas where few new full-time staff and faculty are being hired.

The colleges reported that a total of 1,481 full-time faculty and staff were hired to perform certificated duties during the 1975-76 academic year. In order to make the study comparable with the reports from the public school districts K-12 grades in California, data on administrators was not requested. However, additional data was requested on librarians, health services programs staff, and those certificated personnel teaching in the field of education, especially in early childhood education and special education.

This total of 1,481 is consistent with the data and trends reported in the eighth annual survey by the California Community and Junior College Association which examined the staffing patterns in 102 public and 6 private community colleges for the academic year 1974-75, dated January 7, 1975.

The CCJCA data indicated 1,103 new full-time staff and faculty were employed by the colleges, an increase over the 732 reported for the year before. The pressure of increased enrollments in suburbia, expanding vocational-technical programs, increased student personnel services and the retirement of older staff and faculty probably are primarily responisble for this continued increase in new staff and faculty.

The CEPA study added a new dimension to the CCJCA studies by counting the number of vacancies filled by instructors returning from leaves of absence or sabbatical. These totaled 188 or 12.7% of the 1,481. This is a much lower number than reported in Part II for K-12 school districts.

The CEPA study next counted the number of vacancies filled by former substitutes or from the ranks of part-time instructors. These totaled 289, or 19.5% of the 1,481 new staff and faculty employed by the lOl community colleges. Unlike the K-12 school districts, few substitutes are employed by the community colleges, but many part-time instructors are utilized in the system. Next the CEPA study counted the vacancies filled by instructors who were new to the district. This totaled 954 or 64.4% of the 1,481 new staff and faculty employed for the academic year 1975-76. This dispels to some extent the popular contention that most position vacancies are filled by "in-house" candidates. Finally, the CEPA study

counted the total number of new positions gained through special funding, local, state, federal or foundation monies. There were fifty of these positions filled for 3.4% of the 1,481 total. Roughly half of these positions were in the counseling centers of the reporting colleges.

Data was collected from the 101 public community colleges in the CEPA report as to specific field vacancies filled. These are shown in Table 1 attached. High lights of this data are as follows:

In comparing the CEPA data with that of previous years of CCJCA rep rts on staffing patterns, it becomes evident that the number of new counselors employed full-time has increased from 69 in 1974-75 to 154 in 1975-76. This continues an upward trend in the expansion of student services at California community colleges. Even the 69 of 1974-75 is more than double the 31 new counselors hired in 1973-74. New health services instructors dropped from first place in 1974-75 (126) to sixth place (94) for 1975-76. Para-professional, vocational and industrial arts instructors maintained their position as the second most numerous subject field area to be filled by new instructors, but the total numbers decreased from 194 in 1974-75 to 144 in 1975-76. Business education instructors increased from 90 to 139 in 1975-76. Thus, the heavier influx of new instructors in health services, vocational and business subject fields points to the continued decand by students in California community colleges for the pragmatic fields of study which can lead to jobs in business, industry and the para-professional areas for the students.

The twenty subject fields designated by the teaching credential regulations as academic fields employed a total of 567 new instructors against 294 for 1974-75. Taking into consideration the total increase in all fields of 378 new instructors, the 273 increase in hiring of new instructors in the academic subject fields

is a 14% increase in this CEPA report over the CCJCA report of 1974-75. Within the academic subject fields, social science and English showed the greatest increase over the previous year.

All of the above data and analysis reflects the continued increase in students at California community colleges in spite of the state budgeting limitation (the 5% cap). More students mean more instructors. Growth continues to be most evident in the San Diego, Orange and Santa Clara counties.
