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ABSTRACT This study examines the responses of the 1,474 students who withdraw from Los Angeles City College during the spring semesters of 1973, 1974, and 1975, and who completed the exit questionnaire. In spring 1975, 65 percent of the withdrawees were of non-Caucasian background, and 46 percent were male. About 40 percent of the males, and 20 percent of the females were in their first semester; and about 15 percent of the males, and 25 percent of the females were in their fourth semester or later. About 48 percent of the withdrawees had not been employed during the spring 1975 semester. Only about 26 percent were employed full-time. About 40 percent of the spring 1975 withdrawees indicated that they planned to transfer to a four-year college; 25 percent said they did not intend to transfer; and 33 percent were not sure. These proportions have been about the same for the last four years. Corresponding figures for the entire student body were 69 percent, 11 percent, and 19 percent respectively. About 97 percent of the withdrawees felt that they were adequately served by the college, and about half expected to return. The most often stated reason for withdrawal was going to work full-time, followed by personal problems. Data are organized into tables, and the withdrawal questionnaire is appended.

PURPOSE OF THE STUDY

To identify reasons for students' withdrawing from college before the end of a semester and to compare certain characteristics of withdrawing students (e.g., sex, ethnic background, age, employment) with those of the entire student body.

PROCEDURE OF THE STUDY

Students (day) withdrawing from the college are required to obtain the signature of a counselor before official withdrawal is granted. This exit interview permits the counselor to make sure the student understands the effects of his withdrawal and procedures for returning to the college at a later date. A prepared form (copy appended) is completed by the student as part of this exit interview. Analysis of these completed instruments constitutes the procedure for this study.

FINDINGS

354 students completed withdrawal forms during the Spring 1975 semester, compared with 499 for Spring 1974, and 621 for Spring 1973.

Table 1 shows the distribution of these students according to sex and ethnic background. Tables 1a and 1b permit comparison of these distributions for the respective years and with the total college student body.

FINDINGS (continued)

Tables 2 through 8a summarize responses to questions asked on the exit interview form, subanalyzed by sex and ethnic background, and compared (where information is available) with the entire student body. In Tables 8, 8a, and 9a information was included about withdrawees during the Spring 1972 semester (from Research Study #73-10).

Table 9 presents in rank order, for the total and each subgroup, the stated reasons for withdrawal for Spring 1975. Table 9a presents a comparison of the rank orders for Spring 1975, 1974, and 1973.

Figures indicating most recent available statistics for all day students are taken from Research Studies #72-5, 73-1, 73-10, 70-7, and 75-9.

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

This study examines the responses of the 1,474 students who withdrew during the Spring 1975, Spring 1974, and Spring 1973 semesters and who completed the exit questionnaire.

- (1) In comparing sex and ethnic background of the withdrawees with the total day student population for Spring 1975, 65% of the withdrawees were of non-Caucasian background, about the same as that found in the student body, and 46% of the withdrawees were male, compared with a student body which is about 48% male.
- (2) In the Spring 1975, of the males who withdrew, slightly more than 40% were in their 1st semester while about 15% were in their 4th semester or later. Of the females who withdrew during the same period, about 20% were in their 1st semester while about 25% were in their 4th semester or later.
- (3) About 48% of the withdrawees had not been employed during the Spring 1975 semester. Only approximately 26% were employed full-time.
- (4) About 40% of the withdrawees in the Spring 1975 semester indicated that they planned to transfer to a four year college, with one-fourth saying they did not intend to transfer and one-third not sure. These proportions have been about the same for the last four years. Corresponding figures for the entire student body were 69%, 11%, and 19% respectively in 1972 which are consistent with a report "Through the Open Door, A Study of Patterns and Performance in California's Community Colleges" prepared by the California Postsecondary Education Commission, December 1975. This suggests that these withdrawees were generally not as certain about their future educational plans as other students.
- (5) About 97% of the withdrawees felt that they were adequately or better served by the college with more than half of these rating the service excellent. About half of the withdrawees indicated that they expected to return to the college.

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS (continued)

- (6) For all the last four years, the most often stated reason for withdrawal was going to work full-time, followed by a personal problem. Conflicting hours with a job was the third most often stated reason for withdrawal in 1975 and 1974. Poor grades has never ranked higher than 10th from the top (out of 13) in the last four years and in 1975 was 12th (out of 13).
- (7) Analysis by ethnic background showed some differences. "Insufficient funds," was generally stated less often (in terms of percents) by Orientals than by other ethnic groups while "going to another school," was stated more often (in terms of percents) as a reason for withdrawal by Orientals than by the other ethnic groups. Conflicting job hours, personal problems, and insufficient funds were stated reasons for withdrawal by Blacks relatively more often than by the other ethnic groups.
- (8) Analysis by sex showed some differences. In 1972 and 1973, more males stated (in percents) "going to work full-time," as a reason for withdrawal than females, but in 1974 and 1975 the differences (in percents) were not appreciable. For the past four years "personal problems," has been a stated reason for withdrawal by females more often than by males (in terms of percents) while for "insufficient funds" and "conflicting hours with job," the opposite is true.
