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ABSTRACT

The primary objective of Project PRICE (Programming Retarded in Career Education) was to develop a methodology by which school systems could educate school personnel, communities, and families to provide more relevant career education instruction and supportive services to educable retarded students. The document presents an annotated bibliographies identifying resources and instructional materials that can assist teachers or counselors in helping retarded students acquire the 22 PRICE competencies. Materials are organized according to competencies in three areas: (1) daily living skills (nine competencies), (2) personal-social skills (seven competencies), and (3) occupational guidance and preparation (six competencies). For each competency, materials are listed according to elementary, junior high, and senior high age levels. Each listing contains a brief descriptive annotation which includes, when available, suggested uses, populations, and reading or grade levels. Cost information and publisher or supplier are also provided. A list of professional books and resources which can be utilized by teachers includes educational materials in the following areas: general career education, career education for the educable mentally retarded, career education for the handicapped, relevant journals, retrieval sources, career exploration, and work sample packages. P R E F A C E

Project PRICE (Programming Retarded In Career Education) is a three-year project funded by the U.S.O.E.'s Bureau of Education for the Handicapped. Presently, the project is in the second year and developing and field-testing an in-service training model/program and materials with six mid-western public school systems. The primary objective of Project PRICE is to develop a methodology by which school systems can educate school personnel, communities, and families to provide more relevant career education instruction and supportive services to educable retarded students.

Working papers such as this are being used as training materials for the in-service training workshops being conducted at each of the six cooperating school districts. Because we are desirous of sharing our efforts with other interested schools, agencies, state departments, universities, and others, we have made a restricted number of copies available to these organizations. The requests for PRICE working papers have been numerous and over 500 copies have been distributed to over 300 organizations in the United States and Canada. We regret having to charge most agencies for the cost of printing and mailing but our budget does not include sufficient funds for this purpose. We are pleased, however, that there has been so much interest in our project and that these publications are being used to improve curriculum offerings for retarded and other handicapped students and adults.

This working paper is the second publication we have written listing materials and resources that can be used in helping retarded students acquire the 22 PRICE competencies. It has been compiled by two first-year doctoral students in the Department of Counseling and Personnel Services, Mike Malever and George Matyas. Both individuals have had considerable practical background in mental retardation and the career development field. The working paper also includes a list of publications which may be valuable in developing career education services for retarded and other handicapped citizens. This publication does not replicate what was presented in the previous paper of this nature, *Working Paper #2*.

The list of materials and resources, as in *Working Paper #2*, does not represent the entire array of available literature for teaching/counseling each competency. We are finding, however, that there is a relatively large quantity of resource material available which will assist school personnel in teaching the PRICE competencies.

We hope this publication will be of assistance to those concerned and involved in career education program development. While our focus is the educable retarded student, PRICE publications and the in-service workshop design appear to be applicable for a wide variety of student types.

INTRODUCTION

This bibliography is intended to update and supplement Project PRICE's Working Paper #2, *Career Education Materials for Educable Retarded Students*. It is for use by teachers and counselors who may require instructional materials or resources in addition to those presented in Working Paper #2. These materials are provided to insure that educable retarded students acquire those competencies most essential for satisfactory community adjustment. Those competencies organized in three domains are:

Daily Living Skills

1. Managing Family Finances
2. Caring and Repairing Home Furnishing and Equipment
3. Taking Care of One's Personal Needs
4. Raising Children and Family Living
5. Buying, Planning, and Preparing Food
6. Selecting, Buying, and Making Clothing
7. Engaging in Civic Activities
8. Utilizing Recreation and Leisure Time
9. Getting Around the Community (Mobility)

Personal-Social Skills

10. Attaining a Sufficient Understanding of One's Own Self (Self-Awareness and Appraisal)
11. Obtaining a Positive Self-Confidence, Self-Concept
12. Desiring and Achieving Socially Responsive Behavior
13. Choosing, Developing, and Maintaining Appropriate Interpersonal Relationships
14. Achieving Independent Functioning

Further elaboration of these competencies is available in Project PRICE Working Papers #1 and #4.

This bibliography does not focus upon materials related to instruction of academic skills, although we recognize these skills are often prerequisite to the acquisition of the 22 PRICE competencies. Rather, this bibliography is directed toward assisting teachers in identifying instructional materials which should assist in the educable retarded student's career development.

Sources of commercially and publically available materials have been surveyed to select materials and resources related to each of the 22 PRICE competencies. For each competency the materials are listed according to elementary, junior high, and senior high age levels. These age levels are only suggestive since many of the materials would be appropriate for a broader age range of students. In some cases certain materials are listed more than once when they are felt appropriate for more than one age level or competency.

For each material listed a brief annotation is provided which includes, when available, suggested uses, populations, and reading or grade level. For the most part, these annotations were derived from the publisher's or supplier's information. It should be noted that the annotations are descriptive and not evaluative. An asterisk is placed by each item specifically intended for use with educable retarded students.

Cost information is included when available. The publisher or supplier is listed to the right of each material. A complete list of publishers and suppliers with their addresses is included in the back of this bibliography.

Finally, a listing of professional books and resources for use by the teacher follows the listing of instructional materials. These include general career education materials, EMR career education materials, handicapped career education materials, relevant journals, career and work evaluation packages, and information retrieval sources. Publishing information is included with the resource and may not be available in the list of publishers for the competency materials.

Verhoven, P.J. & Vinton, P.A. *Career education for leisure occupations: Curriculum guidelines for recreation, hospitality, and tourism*. Lexington, KY: Curriculum in Recreation and Parks, University of Kentucky, 1972.

The guidelines suggested in this publication have been designed to assist educators in developing career education programs based on local needs and resources. While specific focus of the guidelines is on the leisure occupations, the basic approaches presented are applicable to all career areas. In the broad sense, these guidelines are addressed to any educator who has a curricular responsibility. Specifically, they are geared to State Department Specialists, District School Superintendents, District Curriculum Coordinators, Principals, and School Curriculum Coordinators.

An introduction to career education: A policy paper of the U.S. Office of Education. Washington: U.S. Government Printing Office, 1975.

This booklet represents the U.S. Office of Education's first comprehensive conceptual statement on career education. Initially prepared in February, 1974, draft copies have been reviewed by career education leaders at the local, state, and national levels. An extremely high

degree of consensus was found when comments regarding the draft document were studied. This booklet describes the Office of Education's interpretation of the HEW policy on career education. Its content is also consistent with the provisions of Section 406 of the Education Amendments of 1974, which provides the first official congressional endorsement of career education.

Career planning program, grades 8-11. Boston: Houghton-Mifflin, 1974.

Student centered assessment instrument used for career guidance. Developed and nationally normed by the American College Testing Program. Measures abilities, interests, and career-related experiences. Reports results in a student profile which can be related to the world of work. Designed to foster students' awareness of the relationship between their own experiences and the world of work.

Curriculum materials for vocational-technical-career education. New Brunswick, NJ: New Jersey Vocational-Technical Laboratory, Rutgers University, 1975. Suggests curriculum materials for the following areas: food and nutrition, running the home, what makes us human, safety, clothing, the world we live in, the automobile, and can we survive pollution.

Homemaking in the elementary schools. New Brunswick: New Jersey Vocational-Technical Curriculum Laboratory, Rutgers University, 1974.

A reference book for planning and conducting homemaking programs in the elementary schools. Includes basic understandings, some suggested experiences, integration possibilities, and some suggested resources.

Career Education: EMR

Brolin, D. *Vocational preparation of retarded citizens.* Columbus, OH: Charles E. Merrill Publishing Co., 1976.

Introductory chapters are on The Nature of Mental Retardation, Development of a Work Personality, Vocational Adjustment, Vocational Services for Retarded Citizens. Part II focuses on vocational counseling, evaluation, training, placement, and follow-up techniques. Part III presents a model secondary program, a postsecondary program, and finish with a chapter on program evaluation.

Cegelka, W.J. *Review of work-study programs for the M.R.* Arlington, TX: National Association for Retarded Citizens, 1974.

Review of the development of work-study programs between educational, vocational rehabilitation, and other community agencies. Several specific programs are reviewed in detail. Suggestions for development of work-study programs are included.

Clark, G.M. *Habilitation personnel training project.* Lawrence: Department of Education, the University of Kansas, 1974.

Examination of considerations for implementing habilitation programs for special needs students in the public schools. Discusses: competencies for special educators, factors in planning and resources, and optimizing habilitation services in the public schools.

Creamer, J.J. & Gilmore, J.T. *Design for competence based education in special education.* Syracuse, NY: Division of Special Education and Rehabilitation, Syracuse University, 1974.

Report from a conference which examined "Competence Based Teacher Education and the Preparation of Special Educators." Discusses a model presently being used for competency-based training of special education teachers.

Deno, E.M. (Ed.) *Instructional alternatives for exceptional children*. Reston, VA: The Council for Exceptional Children, 1974.

Twenty-five contributors who have developed training models explore alternatives to segregated special education services. Each considers ways in which the interface between regular and special education services can be improved. Looks at special education, at learning problems approach to teacher education, implementing a consulting teacher program in a local school district.

National Association for Retarded Citizens. *Guidelines for helping local units initiate and strengthen community recreation programs for the retarded*. Arlington, TX: National Association for Retarded Citizens, 1974.

Discusses objectives of recreation programs for the retarded and provides step-by-step instructions for formulating and carrying out a program.

National Association for Retarded Citizens. *This isn't kindness...it's good business*. Arlington, TX: National Association for Retarded Citizens, 1974.

Lists strong points that most mentally retarded men and women show on the job. Also has a list of the types of jobs which mentally retarded persons can successfully perform.

President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped. *About jobs and mentally retarded people*. Arlington, TX: National Association for Retarded Citizens, 1974.

Deals with preparation, evaluation, vocational rehabilitation, job hunting, and employers as each applies to mentally retarded persons. Also has a list of state contacts.

Proceedings of the conference on research needs related to career education for the handicapped. Washington, DC: U.S. Office of Education, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, 1975.

Toward competency: A guide for individualized instruction. Salem, OR: Special Education Section, State Department of Education, 1974.

Project concerned with developing a systematic approach to individualized instruction. Using this approach: (1) need of the student is determined; (2) instructional goals are defined and behaviorally stated; (3) instruction is related to student's attainment of goals; (4) effectiveness of instruction determined by measuring student's behavior on specified competencies; and (5) record kept of student achievement. Covers six curriculum areas: (1) basic skills, (2) personal and social awareness, (3) living in the environment, (4) career education, (5) human ecology, and (6) leisure time activities.

Career Education: Handicapped

Hewett, F.M. & Forness, S.R. *Education of exceptional children*. Boston: Allyn & Bacon, 1974.

This book is a distinct departure from traditional introductory texts to the field of special education. The usual chapters on various handicaps are not present in traditional form. However, the nine traditional categories of exceptionality are utilized in a unique effort at synthesis under the single label "learner." It is possible that this book will serve as a catalyst for change and a facilitator of continuing movement.

Lake, T.P. (Ed.) *Career education: Exemplary programs for the handicapped*. Reston, VA: Council for Exceptional Children, 1974.

Six different model secondary school programs are described. Except for one program, specifically designed for deaf students, all the models are noncategorical programs. One of the best features of the book is the chapter on "Recommendations for Replication." This chapter provides names and addresses of people to contact for further information and a list of materials each program has available.

Mann, P.H. (Ed.) *Mainstream special education--issues and perspectives in urban centers*. Reston, VA: Council for Exceptional Children, 1974.

Proceedings of the University of Miami Conference on Special Education in the Great Cities, sponsored by the Bureau of Education for the Handicapped. Timely discussion of what special educators can do working with regular educators to provide optimum services for handicapped children in urban areas. Conference participants share successful programs pertaining to training, sharing of responsibilities, and identification of current technology and proven management systems.

Meyen, E.L., Vergason, G.A., & Whelan, R.J. (Eds.) *Alternatives for teaching exceptional children*. Denver: Love Publishing Co., 1975.

A collection of ways from *Focus on Exceptional Children*. This book deals with methods and techniques for instruction of exceptional children in the regular and special classrooms.

Meyen, E.L., Vergason, G.A., & Whelan, R.J. (Eds.) *Strategies for teaching exceptional children*. Denver: Love Publishing Co., 1972.

This book includes instructional models, practices, and evaluation. These essays from *Focus on Exceptional Children* can be used for teacher education courses and seminars. Also for administrators working with children who have learning difficulties.
