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## ABSTRACT

More than 2000 individual television programs produced by the nation's public broadcasting stations are listed in this catalog. The programs are divided among more than 270 subject headings, and they represent the general interest areas of public affairs, current issues, art, health, science, instruction, sports, and childrens shows. Programs and series are listed alphabetically by subject and by title. All title listings carry detailed information about each program. Special sections are included which list programs available on 16mm film, programs for the deaf, and programs for children. Unlisted, recently aired programs are also available upon special request. # Introduction

Over 2,000 individual programs for all age levels are now available for audio-visual use and are described in this edition of The Public Television Library's Video Program Catalogue. Produced by the nation's public television stations and major production centers, the programs are listed under more than 270 different subject headings and represent the general interest areas of Public Affairs and Current Issues, The Arts, Health and Science, How To/Instructional, Sports and Recreation, Children and Coping With The 70's.

The Public Television Library's Video Program service was established in response to continuing requests from people in a variety of fields. Educators, industry representatives, librarians and others recognized the value that programs broadcast on their local public television stations would have in serving the special interests of their organizations. This service provides an opportunity to use programs according to individual schedules and projects, as well as to expand the audience for public television programs.

It is a non-profit activity: a portion of the sales and rental funds is returned to the producing public television station to cover performance and technical rights arrangements related to the programs and to assist in future production.

A special feature of The Public Television Library's Video Program Service is the immediate offering, where possible, of current Public Broadcasting Service Programs. When you see a program on your local public television station that you would like to use, call the station or The Public Television Library to check its availability.

As a service to recognized educational institutions, a policy has been instituted by the Public Broadcasting Service which allows for the videotape recording of programs seen over individual stations at the time of broadcast and used for classroom instruction for a 7-day period. At the end of the seven days, programs must be erased. Arrangements to retain the programs beyond the 7-day deadline must be made with the program distributor. The programs in this catalogue are available on 3/4-inch "U" videotape cassette (NTSC 60Hz) standard at the costs and arrangements indicated in the current **Price Schedule**. All programs may be purchased in any reel/cartridge/cassette videotape format at the stated cost in the **Price Schedule** plus the added cost to provide the program in the requested format. Certain programs described in this catalogue are available on 16mm film from the Indiana University Audio Visual Center and other sources. See the **16mm Film Index** for details. Unless otherwise stated as part of the individual program description contained in the **Program Index**, all programs are in color with English sound track. All indicated time lengths are rounded up or down to the nearest minute.

## Terms And Conditions

Programs listed in this catalogue are provided for direct audio visual rather than VHF/UHF broadcast uses under conditions described in the **Agreement**. If any of the programs are desired for VHF/UHF broadcast, please contact PTL.

Programs are available for purchase, two-week rental and three-day rental. A duplication license may be arranged for which permits making copies of PBS/PTL programs for either a permanent or a limited period of retention. See the current **Price Schedule** and **Agreement** for more detailed information and a definition of terms. Contact PTL for required additional information as well as for special lease, discount, and other types of acquisition arrangements. Please use an official PTL **Order Form** whenever possible to obtain a program.

All listed programs are offered for use throughout the U.S., its territories, and possessions. A vast majority of the programs are also available to users outside the U.S. Contact PTL for specific information.

All listed programs are available for in-room (intra-room) television uses. Almost all programs are also available for transmission (inter-room) uses which include closed-circuit, ITFS, and CATV methods of distribution. ### Previews And Samplers

Preview material for broad subject areas as well as individual programs and series is available. Full program previews are available to those intending to purchase.

Videocassette "samplers" showing the wide range of programs and series available within specific interest areas may be rented for use as previews an unlimited number of times during a two week period. Rental fees are based on length: \$10.00 for 60-minutes and \$5.00 for 30-minutes. Each sampler is a program in its own right and provides excerpts from a representative selection of programs in the following areas:

#### Cultural

A 60-minute survey of programs in art, crafts, literature, and music, including several excellent specials for children ("Peter and the Wolf" and "Puppets and the Poet"). Among other programs represented are "Indian Arts," "Six Spectacular Hours of Folk Music" and a series of fascinating interviews conducted by theatre critic Elliot Norton.

#### Sports and Recreation

A 30-minute overview of programs on skiing, mountain-climbing, flying, tennis and other sports. A special on rodeo is included in this package.

#### How to Instructional

A 60-minute presentation of instructional programs on cooking, yoga, chess, sewing, and model railroading. Among programs represented are two series by author-gardener Thalassa Cruso and a history course taught by noted Brandeis professor Dr. Abram Sachar.

#### Public Affairs and Current Issues

A 60-minute selection of excerpts from programs covering issues such as the rights of minorities, the energy crisis, elections, the military, education, police, juvenile delinquency, prison reform, drugs, unemployment, and government. Some of the programs represented are "Arabs and Israelis," "Cities For People," "Woman," "World Hunger! Who Will Survive?" "All About Welfare" and "The End of The Ho Chi Minh Trail."

#### Health

A 30-minute preview of health care and health-related programs covering such topics as male menopause, mental retardation, unwanted pregnancy, drugs and dental care. "Drink, Drank, Drunk"—the acclaimed alcoholism special with Carol Burnett is included, along with a new series on human sexuality.



# How To Use This Catalogue

## Catalogue Arrangement

Programs and series have been listed alphabetically by subject (**Subject Index**) and by title (**Program Index**). All title listings carry detailed information about each program as well as subject headings under which the program has been catalogued. Look under each of these subject headings for related programs that may be of interest.

Special sections listing programs available on 16mm film, programs for the deaf and hearing impaired, and programs for children have been included. Descriptions of these programs may be found in the **Program Index**.

## Alphabetical Arrangement

1. Program titles beginning with numerals are entered as if the number were spelled out.  
EG: "The 93rd Congress: restoring the balance" is located under the letter "N."
2. Initial articles in a program title ("A," "An," and "The") are disregarded.  
EG: "A Bit With Knit" is located under the letter "B."
3. Program titles beginning with proper names are entered under the first letter of the first name.  
EG: "Cecil Williams—Reach out and Touch" is located under the letter "C."

4. Characters within a given program title are subject to the following priority order:

A. A space precedes a punctuation mark or letter.

EG: "Art Profile" precedes "Artists in America."

B. A punctuation mark precedes a letter.

EG: "Don't Have Time To Die" precedes "Done: The First Transcontinental Railway."

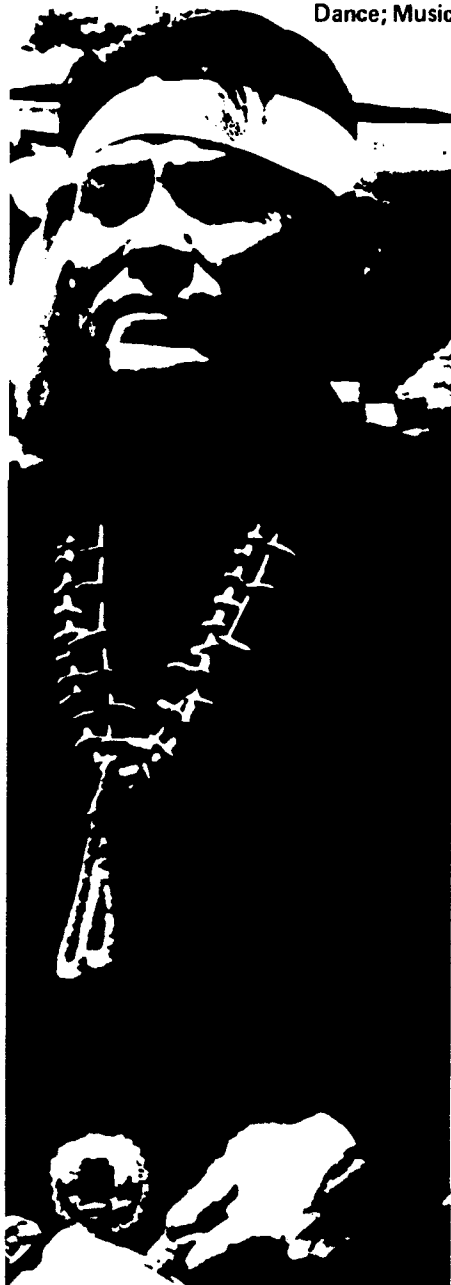

## Everyday People

A series of eight half-hour programs created to help children develop a greater understanding of and respect for human differences. Series producer and hostess is Marlene Cummings, a human relations specialist with the Madison, Wisconsin Public Schools. Her guests are children who range in age from five to eleven years. Each program begins with a "trigger" film or skit which introduces the specific differences in people to be discussed by the children. Topics include size, skin color, age, occupation, handicaps, religion and culture. Ms. Cummings approaches each area scientifically, explaining to the children what some of the reasons are for particular prejudices. Puppets are used on some of the programs to illustrate reactions to human differences, and guests drop in occasionally to further explain a particular topic. The story spans the upper river in the Cascade Mountains, the unspoiled and indescribably beautiful Green River Gorge, and the valley floor where industry has rushed in driving out agriculture, gouging out the hillsides and criss-crossing the valley floor with freeway systems. Using the Green River Valley as a prototype for other river systems, the program traces the errors, comments on the alternatives and offers a warning against compromising the productivity and agricultural resources of a river in return for industrialization and urban development.

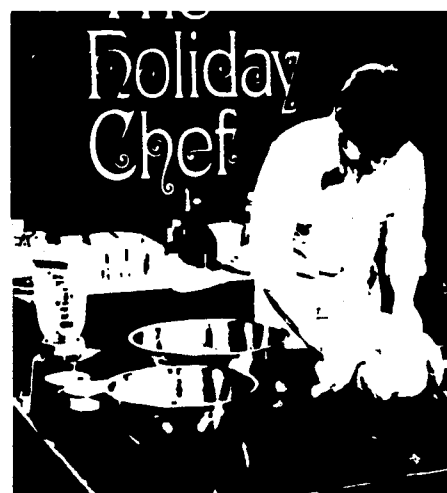

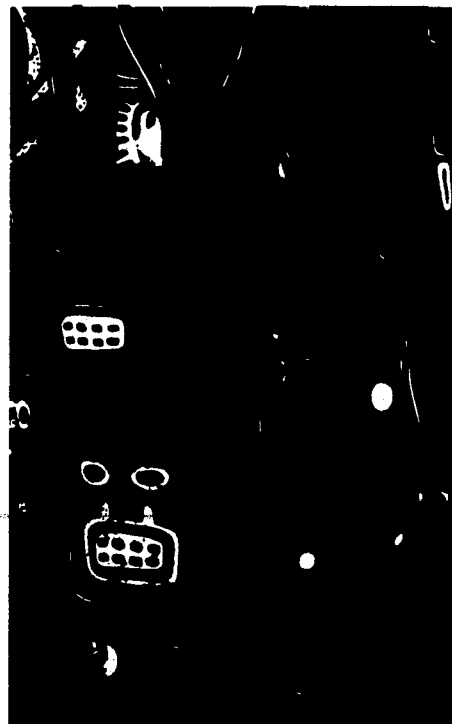

A harried mother mouse discovers, through her friendship with a caged dove, the meaning of freedom and self-realization.

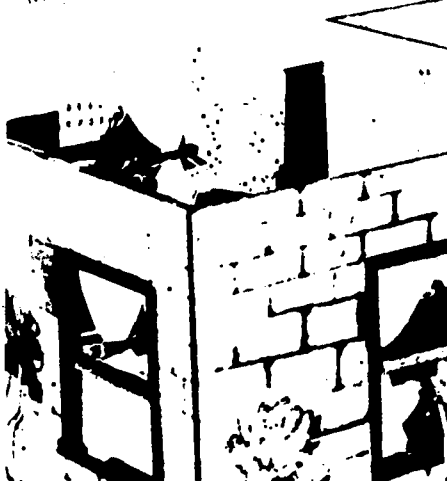

Rare film interviews throughout the program enable the viewer to see the real Robeson: during one, he appears in costume as "Othello" while he discusses the meaning of the role to a black man. Scenes from his later work in "Proud Valley" and "Song of Freedom," a film he preferred because it depicts a black man who realizes his identification with Africa, are included. 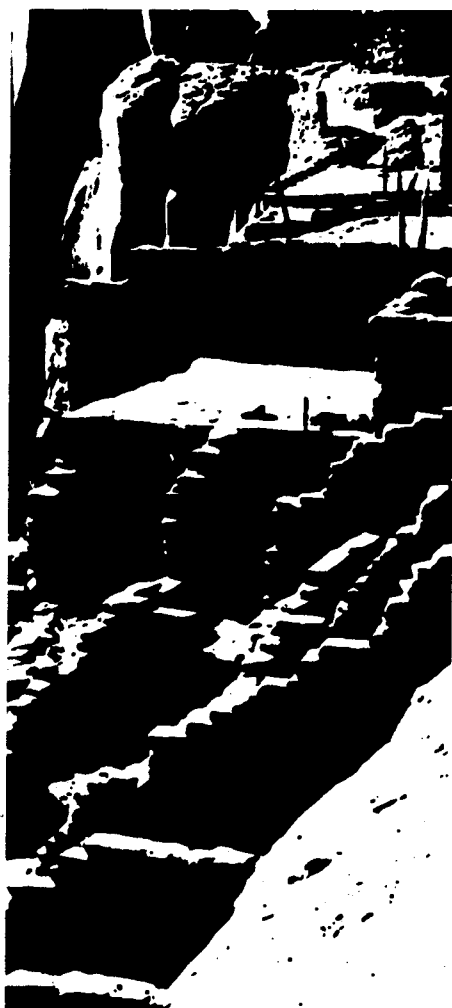

Wyn Stracke and Studs Terkel tell the story of the Chicago Stockyards and its neighborhood, "Back of the Yards." The film traces the 100-year history of the Yards and covers the people who worked there—the butchers, skimmers, and weigh-masters. The Stockyard workers interviewed on the program are descendants of the Lithuanian, Irish, Polish, and German immigrants, and later the blacks and Latins who helped turn out the millions of cattle, hogs, and sheep that were slaughtered each year. Interwoven throughout the program is a montage of historical stills and film footage that revives the Stockyards' past. Chicago folksingers Wyn Stracke and Floyd Jones, together with the Rosehip String Band, add the musical backdrop as the Stockyards moves from its turn-of-the-century infancy through the tumultuous years spanning the '20's, the Depression and the War. The chronicle ends with a post-war picture of the Yards' slow death.

This sensitive documentary examines the traits of autism—often obscured until a seemingly normal child reaches the age of two or three—and the effects of autism on the children's families. Much of the documentary was filmed at San Diego's Los Ninos Remedial Center, one of the most progressive learning centers for autistic children in the U.S.

The program provides interviews with representatives of the Big Thicket Association and the lumber company, two congressmen who have proposed bills to resolve the problem, and other interested parties.

**Turning Points: A Time To Live** 29-min.

Produced by WPBT-TV, Miami FL. 1973. This program examines the phenomenon of growing old in a youth-oriented society. The elderly—those who remain active and energetic as well as those who are alone and lonely, living in nursing homes and existing on meager Old Age Assistance—are recorded by the cameras. A former Ziegfeld girl now in her seventies leads a group of her contemporaries through their daily routine of morning calisthenics on the beach. She displays photos of a stunning young girl half a century ago but she refuses to dwell on the past. On the other side of the coin are retired people who have not adjusted so well. There are the old men who sit on park benches for seemingly endless periods of time; there is a black woman who is blind and unable to walk, dependent on Old Age Assistance. The program is narrated by actress Aline MacMahon, a member of the Lincoln Center Repertory Company.

**Turning Points: Crossroads: New Treatment For Alcoholics** 29-min.

Produced by WQLN-TV, Erie PA. 1973. This program details the origins, function and success of the Crossroads Center, an alcoholic treatment and rehabilitation agency which provides basic needs for the homeless chronic alcoholic. The opening sequence is a dramatic staging of a "pick-up": an alcoholic is found unconscious in a cold alley by Erie police who, instead of hauling him off in a paddy wagon, notify the Crossroads Center. Police Chief Sam Gemelli and Bill Downey, Crossroads' chief administrator, discuss the changes brought about by the center. The program concludes with interviews with "guests" at Crossroads; they discuss their former lives and what Crossroads has done for them.

**Turning Points: Frozen Hopes in Milwaukee** 28-min.

Produced by WMVS-TV, Milwaukee WI. 1973. This program, offering possible solutions to America's housing crisis, reports on Milwaukee's fair share housing plan. The Short Range Action Housing Plan for Southeastern Wisconsin called for the construction of 2000 low and moderate income housing units over a two year period; 1000 of these would be in the Milwaukee area. The program documents the status of the project, both before and after the federal housing subsidy freeze was announced.

**Turning Points: Here I Am** 29-min.

Produced by KBYU-TV, Provo UT. 1973. This program, a docu-drama based on the case study of a young criminal psychopath, examines new developments in psychiatric care. Barbara Boyce, a student at Brigham Young University, acts out the experiences of a young woman convicted on a robbery charge and sentenced by the courts to Utah State Hospital for rehabilitation. The program was filmed on location in the maximum security ward where an innovative program gives so-called "dangerous mental patients" the responsibility of taking care of each other. Miss Boyce—the only actress in the cast consisting of actual patients, staff and administrative personnel—spent several days living in the maximum security ward in order to get a true feeling for her subject.

**Turning Points: Incident At Cass Lake** 29-min.

Produced by KTCA-TV, St. Paul MN. 1973.

Focusing on a confrontation between Indians and whites in Cass Lake, Minnesota, this production examines the goals of several American Indian activist groups. In May 1972, armed members of the American Indian Movement (AIM) blocked access to the Chippewa Leech Lake Reservation. The Indians hoped to regain their native rights to reservation lands by closing hunting, trapping and fishing facilities to the public. Though a potentially violent situation developed as Indians confronted whites who had come to fish the reservation waters, no shots were exchanged. Eventually, the State of Minnesota decided not to appeal a court order granting unrestricted rights to the Leech Lake Chippewas. The program also reports on the activities of "Operation Image," an Indian group representing five tribes, which hopes to speak eventually for all Indians.

**Turning Points: Is There A Bike In The Mix?** 29-min.

Produced by KRMA-TV, Denver CO. 1972.

This program explores the acceptance of the bicycle as a reliable non-polluting form of transportation for millions of inner-city commuters. Using on-camera interviews, animation, location filming and conversations with motorists and cyclists, the program probes the major issues involved in substituting the two-wheeler for other kinds of transportation. Beginning with a brief history of the bicycle, the program rapidly moves to the 1960's when multi-speed gearing and lightweight construction made it a fast, functional and fun way to get from one place to another. The program examines legislation proposed in Colorado to provide funds for bikeways that might serve as a model for other cities.

This program reports on the progress of a Fort Smith, Arkansas youth center designed to improve communications between the city's youth and the local police force. Interviews with volunteer workers and members of Fort Smith's young black community document the success of the center. In October 1971, Patrolman Bradley, Patrolman Christian and Detective Tidwell, three black members of the Fort Smith Police Department, acquired an abandoned gymnasium and opened the youth center to provide recreational facilities and a gathering place for the young. Police Chief Carl W. Byer describes the town's youth problem both before and after the center was started. Chairman of the Board, Dr. Michael W. Liniomon, a local optometrist, explains the center's history and growth.

## Turning Points: Public Education . . . At Whose Expense?

Produced by Nebraska ETV Network.  
1973.

This program examines methods of public school financing in light of the 1971 California Supreme Court ruling which declared revenue raised from property taxes unconstitutional as a source of funds for public education. This declaration precipitated much discussion in states where school financing depends, as it did in California, almost solely on the property tax. In Nebraska, 78 percent of the tax funds for public schools comes from local property taxes. The program follows public hearings held by the Nebraska Unicameral Legislature's Interim Study Committee on Education. Opinions and commentary are given by a cross-section of Nebraskans—ranchers, farmers, housewives, realtors, businessmen and school administrators. Nebraska Governor J. James Exon and State Senator Jerome Warner are among those who give their views.

## Turning Points: Rescue Of A River

This program looks at one of the nation's major environmental success stories: the clean-up of Oregon's Willamette River, once one of the filthiest waterways in the Northwest. A major participant in the film is Governor Tom McCall. "Rescue" traces the industrial and agricultural growth of the rich Willamette Valley, fabled in historic monographs as "a land of milk and honey," and shows in vivid detail how man polluted the river.

Focusing on CATV projects in the Sacramento area, this program explores the system's capabilities for use in classrooms and for home shopping, and takes up the question of private versus government regulation of cable television. Among the projects discussed are the development of a two-way capability for CATV, the use of CATV in job-training programs, and the use of CATV as a source of programming for minority groups. George Cory, Mayor of San Bruno, California, appears on the program to discuss the town's municipally-owned CATV system.

This program traces the economic development of rural Winston County, Alabama. During the post World War II period, the economy of Haleyville—the county seat of Winston County and the town around which the program is centered—was based on two major industries: the Alabama Cotton Mill and the Illinois Central Railroad Shop. In the early '50's, both of these industries relocated and Haleyville's preservation depended on attracting new industry. The program documents the process of attracting new industry to the area, which resulted eventually in a 123% rise in median family income.

**Turning Points: The Next Crisis: Death In The Mines** 29-min.

Produced by WMUL-TV, Huntington WV. 1973.

This program examines the circumstances surrounding mining disasters of the past decade, and the proposals for improving mining safety. Taped in Farmington, West Virginia, the site of five major mining disasters, the program includes interviews with a widow whose husband was one of the 78 men killed in an explosion in 1968; with a retired mine foreman; and with Congressman Ken Hechler of West Virginia's 47th District. Against news clips of past coal mine disasters which have claimed 20,000 West Virginia lives in the past 75 years, Congressman Hechler explains why coal mining is the most hazardous occupation in the United States.

**Turning Points: They Laid It On The Line** 29-min.

Produced by WVIZ-TV, Cleveland OH. 1973.

This program presents people who have risked their jobs and reputations to help fight pollution. Some of the cases examined include: a jet pilot who was fired because he refused to discharge fuel in the ocean; a 15-year-old high school student who started the first re-cycling operation in Cleveland; another high school student and her fellows who successfully fought City Hall to block the construction of a mammoth shopping center; an 82-year-old man who deposited the industrial filth from his gutters on the desks of officials; and an urban planner who lost his job after opposing plans for a new jet-port.

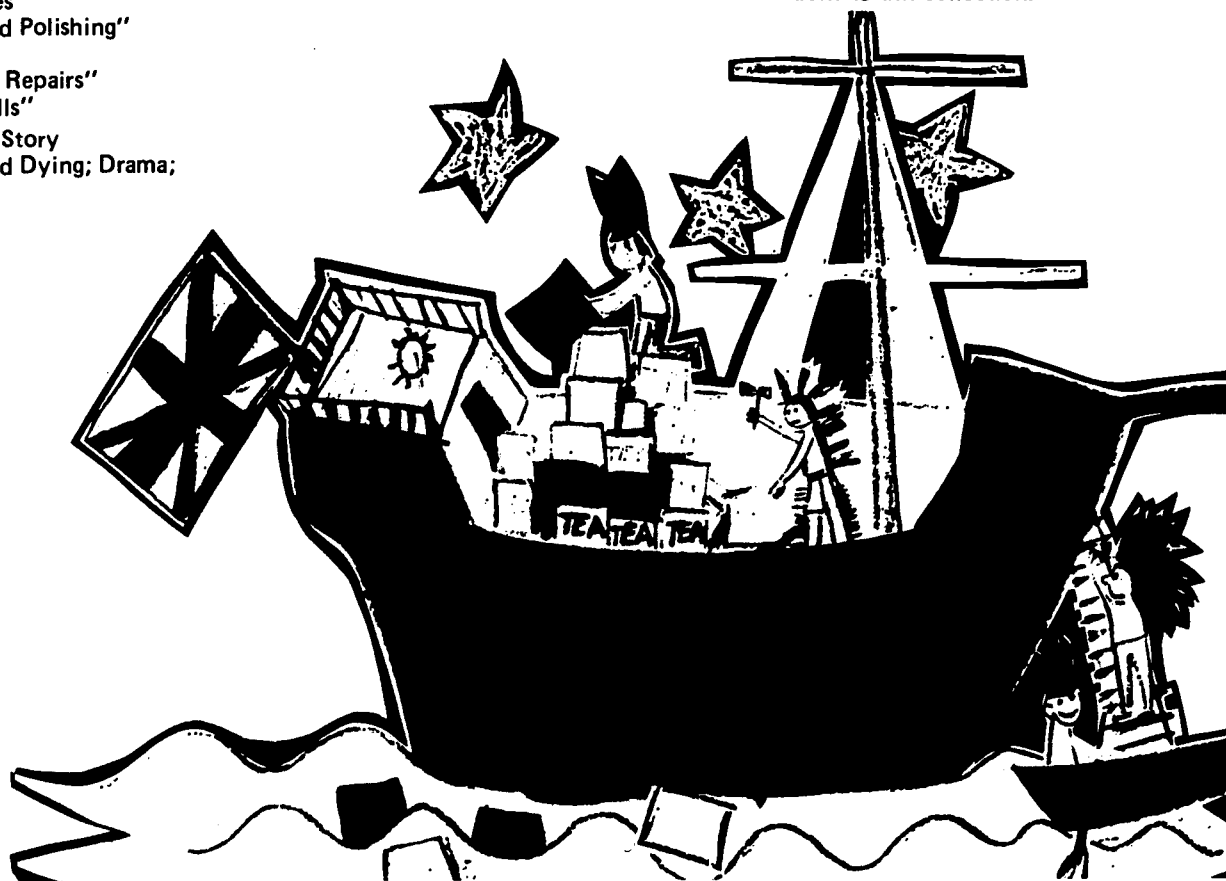

The Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) is developing a project to caption more public television programs for the deaf and hearing-impaired audience. In conjunction with the Bureau of Education for the Handicapped of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, PBS has completed an experimental stage of the project and is now in an interim period of captioning programs while seeking FCC authorization for a permanent closed captioning system which could be used by all television broadcasters. The captions that PBS is using appear on the screen only through the use of a special decoder.

At the same time, the WGBH Educational Foundation in Boston, Massachusetts is involved in an open captioning project and has provided captioned programs to PBS for broadcast purposes. The WGBH captions differ from those used at PBS in that they are open-captions and appear on the screen at all times and to all viewers.

The Public Television Library's effort to develop a collection of programs for non-broadcast (audio visual) use on 3/4-inch "U" videocassette in open-captioned form is a continuing process. Please contact PTL for information about new additions to this collection.

AGREEMENT between THE PUBLIC TELEVISION LIBRARY, a department of the Public Broadcasting Service (hereinafter called "PTL") and the Customer named on the reverse side, wherein PTL grants Customer and Customer accepts from PTL the limited license to exhibit the programs named herein in accordance with this AGREEMENT. Customer acknowledges that the program(s) may not be utilized in any other manner than as specified herein and in no event shall exhibit them before an audience where admission is charged. Customer shall not sublicense, sublease or part with the possession of any program secured by Customer hereunder. Nothing herein shall derogate from any rights of PTL or any other copyright proprietor of any program under the United States Copyright Law.

1. **ARRANGEMENTS** The following terms, definitions and conditions apply to the AGREEMENT.
  - a. **PURCHASE** The release of the specified quantity of program(s) by PTL to the Customer for use during the life of the materials. PTL will bill full purchase price (less discounts as applicable) at time of shipment.
  - b. **RENTAL** The release of the specified quantity of program(s) by PTL to the Customer for use during a specified period beginning as of the date each program is first scheduled to be used as stated on the APPLICATION FOR PROGRAM UTILIZATION. PTL will bill full rental price for the stated rental period. An additional charge will be made for additional periods of use.
  - c. **LEASE TO BUY** The release of the specified quantity of program(s) by PTL to the Customer by purchase for direct presentation utilization during the useful life of the materials. Lease-to-Buy arrangements are available for orders in excess of \$5,000 but no discounts are allowed under Lease-to-Buy arrangements. PTL will bill full price over a two year period as follows:
    - 50% at time of shipment
    - 35% one year after shipment
    - 15% two years after shipment
  - d. **LICENSE TO REDUPLICATE** The release of a specified program by PTL to the Customer with permission to the Customer to reduplicate the program for utilization during the life of the materials or a lesser period for a stated charge. This right to reduplicate will be for a three-year period of time. PTL will bill full price for the program(s) at time of shipment plus an additional charge for EACH COPY TO BE DUPLICATED. Orders should specify "reduplication" followed by the number of copies expected to be reproduced by the Customer. No duplication of copies beyond the number stated by the Customer is permitted unless prior approval is obtained from PTL. (Where duplication rights cannot be granted for the full three-year period a prorated adjustment will be made by PTL in the price for the locally duplicated copies.)
2. **UTILIZATION** The standard use of PTL programs distributed for non-broadcast use is for "in-room use". Where rights are available, PTL will authorize the transmission of certain programs over CCTV, ITFS, and CATV systems for an additional charge. The following terms apply to this AGREEMENT.
  - a. **IN-ROOM USE** Program is to be utilized in a confined environment by a limited number of viewers. "Confined environment" means a situation where the monitor(s) or screen(s) and playback unit or projector(s) and all viewers are in the same room.
  - b. **TRANSMISSION USE**
    - i. **CCTV/ITFS** For program(s) where necessary rights are available, PTL may authorize transmission via these systems for an additional charge of 15% of the acquisition price. Availability of CCTV/ITFS rights for the specific program(s) requested should be checked with PTL prior to submitting order.
    - ii. **CATV** For program(s) where necessary rights are available, PTL may authorize transmission for non-profit utilization on dedicated Public Access, Community Access, or educational CATV channels for an additional charge of 15% of the acquisition price. However, release via CATV requires that the Customer obtain written release for the specified use of the specific program(s) from the Public Television station(s) in the area served by the cable system. Availability of CATV rights for each program and information and procedures regarding the local clearances required must be obtained from PTL prior to submitting order.
3. **DISCOUNT POLICY** A discount of one free program unit (of equal length and of the purchaser's choice) or a cash discount of 5% for ten (10) or more programs purchased by means of a single purchase order. (No discount will be given on rentals, leases, or previews.) This discount applies to orders for:
  - a. ten or more programs of one series
  - b. ten or more copies of a single program
  - c. ten unrelated programs purchased in a single order. Where order is of mixed lengths, PTL will normally supply a free program unit of half-hour length.
4. **PAYMENTS** Customer shall pay to PTL at the address noted on the reverse side the following sums in the manner and at the times specified, time being of the essence for all such payments:
  - a. The price for each program as set forth in the Price Schedule; and
  - b. Any and all taxes, fees, or other like charges, billed against PTL and imposed, levied or based upon this AGREEMENT, upon the delivery, possession, exhibition, or use of any program, upon the grant or exercise of any rights hereunder, or upon the sum payable by Customer to PTL pursuant hereto; and
  - c. All other charges specified elsewhere in this AGREEMENT or in the Price Schedule in the manner set forth.Invoices are payable within ten (10) days of receipt of invoice by Customer.
5. **PRICE CHANGES** Program prices are listed separately from this AGREEMENT in the Price Schedule which is considered a part of this AGREEMENT. Prices are subject to change without notice. PTL will verify with Customer any order received indicating improper price was used.
6. **TERM** The term of this AGREEMENT with regard to each program shall commence as of the date each program is delivered to the Customer and shall continue for the term set forth herein. If Customer is renting the program(s) Customer agrees to return the program(s) to PTL on or before the date set forth as the "date to be returned by".
7. **DELIVERY** PTL will mail or ship program(s) to Customer in time normally required for program(s) to reach Customer by date requested in application and confirmed by PTL. Such program(s) shall be deemed satisfactory condition for exhibition unless Customer immediately after inspection thereof, notifies PTL to the contrary specifying the nature of the defect. PTL shall not be in breach of this AGREEMENT for failure to deliver any program(s) by requested date and shall not be liable for incidental or consequential damages.
8. **RETURN** With respect to rentals, unless otherwise instructed, Customer shall, immediately after the expiration of the rental term specified in the application, return each rented program(s) prepaid with tapes in containers provided by PTL by parcel post, insured, in the same condition as when received, reasonable wear and tear due to proper use excepted. Return shipment insurance shall be for the amount of \$150.
9. **REPLACEMENT** Customers renting program(s) hereunder shall pay to PTL the replacement cost of any tapes lost, stolen, destroyed or injured other than through normal wear and tear.
10. **DELETIONS** Customer shall exhibit each program in its entirety only. Customer shall not cut or alter any program or otherwise tamper therewith and in no event shall any program be performed or exhibited without the complete copyright notices and/or credits contained therein.
11. **WARRANTIES AND REMEDIES** PTL warrants each program to be free from defects in material and workmanship at the time of delivery. In the event of PTL's breach of such warranty Customer's exclusive remedy shall be that PTL will replace defective program provided Customer notifies PTL of said defect within 48 hours of receipt and returns defective program to PTL. The terms and conditions of this AGREEMENT apply to any program furnished as a replacement. NO OTHER WARRANTY, EXPRESSED OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING THE WARRANTY OF MERCHANTABILITY, SHALL APPLY TO ANY PROGRAM HEREUNDER.
12. **RESERVATION** Legal title to the program(s) licensed hereunder shall at all times remain in PTL and all rights therein are reserved to PTL. The term "purchase" as used herein means only the right and license to use and re-use the program(s) by the Customer without limitation as to the number of uses or re-uses, but without any change in ownership or title and otherwise subject to the terms and conditions of this AGREEMENT.
13. **DEFAULT** If Customer defaults hereunder:
  - a. PTL, in addition to other remedies may repossess any program previously delivered hereunder.
  - b. PTL may refuse to take further orders from Customer and may refuse to make further shipment of programs to Customer.
  - c. Customer agrees to pay PTL's costs and expenses of collection and/or repossession including the maximum attorney's fees permitted by law.
14. **TERMINATION** In the event that:
