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ABSTRACT

Intended to be a central source of information on where to acquire statistics on the social and economic characteristics of various racial groups, this report includes references on printed reports, computer tapes, and special calculations. The racial categories-of white, negro or black, Indian, Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, Hawatian, Korean, Aleut, Eskimo, and other are defined and described. In-Auded in the list of printed materials are the 1970 census publications and the Subject Guides to 1970 Census Population and Housing Characteristics, consisting of four comprehensive guides to tables containing racial data referenced by subject matter and geographic areas. The availability of printed reports is cited. Summary tapes) produced in six tabulated series, provide tables with data for racial categories in the population and housing tabulations at various geographic levels. Their acquisition and public use is explained. In cases where the need for racial statistics tabulated by certain subjects or geographical detail is not met by general census tabulations, special tabulations can be undertaken to meet individual needs. Details concerning special tabulation procedures are specified. Four tables and eleven figures accompany the report. (Author/AM)



There are two special features in this Data Assess Description on selected racial groups:

1 The Subject Consies to 1970 Census Population and Housing Characteristics. Four comprehensive subject under to tables continuing racial data in selected printed reports referenced by subject matter and generaphic arears). There are three gindes covering 1970 census population data, one for each of the following populations. (1) Black, (2) American Indian (including Aleat, and Tiskingot, and (3) Japanese, Climese, and Lippinos finishment and (3) Japanese. There is one made, overing 1970 census housing data for the

black population. Subject guides cover Population Volume 1. Housing Volumes I and II, and the Joint Population and Housing Census Tract Reports, series PHC(1). Information on tables with racial data in the US. Summary reports for both population and housing is included.

2 Racial Data Available on Summary Tapes A series of figures showing, by number, the summary tape tables with data for racial categories in the population and housing tabulations for the First, Second, Third, and Fifth Count Summary Tapes and listings of the subjects for which data are available in the Fourth and Sixth Counts.

These special features provide an aid to users of Census Bureau data in proporting the location of specific characteristics for particular geographic areas for a given racial group in the printed reports and summary tapes.

II. DETERMINING RACIAL CLASSIFICATIONS

Racial statistics have been collected in the census of population since the first census in 17%. Aside from the white and black groups, however, no other races were collected separately until the census of 1860, when Indian and Chinese were first enumerated as separate groups.

Historically, the determination of race in the United States censuses has mainly been made by the enumerator on the basis of observation. Beginning with the 1960 census, information on race has been obtained principally through self-enumeration. Respondents now have the opportunity to classify themselves with respect to race. The concept of race as used by the Bureau does not denote any scientific definition of biological stock.

On the 1970 census questionnaire, persons were asked to indicate their race by selecting one of the following. White, Negro or Black, Indian (American): Japanese. Chinese, Filipino, Hawaiian. Korean: Other (specify). In Alaska, Aleut and Eskimo were substituted for Hawaiian and Korean. All persons who indicated their race as American Indian were also asked to indicate their tribe. For persons of intsed parentage who were in doubt as to their classification, the race of the person's father was to be used.

Racial data were tabulated from answers to question No. 4 on color or race. (See fig. 1, facsimile of questionnaire item.) This question was one of the basic questions asked of all persons enumerated in the 1970.

- •The Indian population includes persons who indicated their race as Indian (American) as well as those persons who did not indicate a specific race category but who reported the name of an Indian tribe or had such entries as "Mexican-American Indian." or "Canadian Indian."
- The Japanese population includes persons who indicated their race as Japanese or reported entries such as Japanese-American, Nipponese, or Oriental.
- The Chinese population includes persons who indicated their race as Chinese or had such entries as Chinese-American or Mongolians.

- The Filipino population includes persons who indicated their race as Filipino and persons with a written entry such as Filipino-American.
- The Hawaiian and Korean populations include persons in all the States (excluding Alaska) and in the District of Columbia who indicated their race as Hawaiian or Korean. In Alaska, the Hawaiian and Korean populations are included in the "other" race category.
- The Aleut and Eskimo populations include persons in the State of Alaska who indicated their race as Aleut or Eskimo, In all other States persons who indicated Aleut or Eskimo were included in the "other" race category.
- The "other" race category on the questionnaire was defined to include Malayan, Polynesian, Thai, and other races not included in the specified categories hated.

III., WHERE TO FIND DATA ON SELECTED RACIAL GROUPS IN * THE PRINTED REPORTS

Data on selected racial groups are available in most of the publications from the 1970 Census of Population and Housing. Additional up-to-date statistics on the black population are published in the Current Population Reports series, primarily in the report published annually on The Social and Economic Status of the Black Population in the United States, series P-23. (See p.30 for a description of this report.)

1970 CENSUS PUBLICATIONS

Major Report Series

The printed reports from the 1970 census and the data for selected racial groups available in the reports are discussed in this section. The major report series from the 1970 census are described briefly in figure 2.

Population Reports

Volume I, Charaeteristics of the Population Data available for selected racial groups are described in detail in Subject Guide tables 1-3. Chapter A, Number of Inhabitants (series PC(1)-A), contains no racial data; Chapter B, General Population Characteristics (series PC(1)-B), presents some basic or "100-percent" population data for racial groups. Selected tables in Chapter C, General Social and Economic Characteristics (series PC(1)-C), present socioeconomic data for blacks. In Chapter D, Detailed Characteristics (series PC(1)-D),



In the 1970 census, three types of questionnaires were used and distributed on the following basis: I. Short form to 80 percent of households—contained 100-percent questions (complete count). Z. Long form to 15 percent of households contained 100-percent and 15-percent questions (sample). 3. Long form to 5 percent of households—contained 100-percent and 5-percent questions (sample).

cross-classifications of detailed social and economic characteristics are presented for blacks in most of the tables.3

Volume II. Subject Reports (PC(2) Series) Each report in this series concentrates on a particular subject. Detailed Information and cross-classifications generally are provided on a national and regional level. in some reports, data for States and SMSA's are shown. These reports, as well as the subject reports from the 1970 Census of Housing, are listed in figure 3 (p.6). Comprehensive subject guides for the subject reports are not included in this Data Access Description. However, all subject reports from the 1970 Census of Population will be indexed later in a subsequent report. The population subject reports on selected racial groups - Negro, American Indian, Japanese, Climese. and Filipino-are described below. For a brief descrip-

tion of all of the subject reports from the 1970 Census of Population and Housing, refer to Data Access Description No. 32, May 1973.

Negro Population, subject report PC(2)-1B, presents in 15 tables, detailed cross-classifications of social and economic population characteristics and selected housing characteristics for blacks.

Data are presented, for the most part, for the United States and regions, States with 250,000 or more 1. black population, urban-rural portions of these States, SMSA's with 100,000 or more black population, and cities with 50,000 or more black population.

American Indians, subject report PC(2)-1F, consisting of 18 tables, presents cross-classifications of various social, economic, and liousing characteristics for the American Indian population.

Statistics are given variously for the United States. regions. States with 10,000 or more Indian population,

selected SMSA's, identified reservations, and Indian tribes. In the introduction of the report a tribal classification list is included, based upon historic data, geographic location, and linguistic stock.

Japanese, Clánese, and Edipinos in the United States, subject report PC(2)-IG containing 49 tables, presents cross-classifications of detailed social, eco-

nome, and selected housing characteristics for the Japanese, Chinese, and Filipino populations.

These data are given for the United States, regions, States with 10,000 persons or more of the designated population group, and SMSA's and cities with 5,000 persons or more of the particular group. Social and economic statistics are also shown in this report for the



Korean and Hawanan populations for the United States States with 10,000 or more of the particular racial group, and SMSA's containing 5,000 or more of the designated group.

Housing Reports

Volume I. Housing Characteristics for States, Cities, and Counties—Data available for the black population are described in detail in Subject Guide table 4. Chapter A. General Housing Characteristics (Series HC(1)-A), includes 13 tables presenting 100-percent data on general or housing sharacteristics for those units occupied by black heads of households. Chapter B. Detailed Housing Characteristics (Series HC(1)-B), contains 17 tables which present detailed characteristics based on a sample of housing units occupied by black heads of households.

Volume II, Metropolitan Housing Characteristics, Series HC(2) Racial data available are described in Subject Guide table 4 Statistics are shown for owner- and renter objugied housing units with black head of household in tables 11 through 18, cross-classified by detailed housing and household characteristics. Reports are issued for 247 SMSA's and for the United States and regions.

Volume III, Block Statistics, Series IIC(3) These reports were published for the 236 urbanized areas defined at the time of the 1970 census and for selected areas in 42 States. For each block in the area the reports indicate the percent of the population that is black and the percent of owner- and renter-occupied units with black heads of household.

Volume IV. Components of Inventory Change-Issued for the United States and 15 selected SMSA's as Series HC(4), these reports include seven tables showing data for renter- and owner-occupied housing units with black head of household. Statistics are given on units added to or lost from the inventory since 1960, and on tenure, race, vacancy status, plumbing facilities, condition, value and gross rent for 1970 by 1960. Data are available for the United States, regions, inside and outside SMSA's, in and not in central cities, and for the 15 selected SMSA's.

Volume V, Residential Pinance—This volume ineludes a chapter presenting data on age, sex, veteran status, persons in household, and income, for the United States only, for t-unit homeowner properties with black owners. Percent distributions for property owner, and mortgage characteristics are shown by mortgage status and government insurance status. Other tables in volume V include statistics for race of principal owner, data are provided only as large-area totals. Volume VI, Plumbing Facilities and Estimates of Dilapidated Housing—In this volume, three tables provide information on plumbing facilities and estimates of dilapidated liousing for black owner- and renter-occupied liousing umts. Data are shown for the Umted States, regions, divisions, States, and SMSA's, constituent counties, and places of 50,000 or more or central cities.

Volume VII, Subject Reports—Issued as the HC(7) series, these reports, with the subject reports from the 1970 Census of Population, are listed in figure 3 (p. 6). For a brief description of all the subject reports from the 1970 census, refer to Data Access Description No. 32, May 1973.

Housing of Selected Racial Groups, subject report HC(7)-9, contains data, cross-classified by various housing and household characteristics, for units with household head of selected racial groups—American Inchans, Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, Korean, and "Other races" than white and black. The data are presented for the United States, the four regions, inside and outside SMSA's, in central cities of SMSA's, and each State and SMSA with 5,000 or more American Indians, Japanese, Chinese, Filipinos, or Koreans.

All other housing subject reports provide data on blacks except *Cooperative and Condominium Housing*, HC(7)-8.

Joint Population and Housing Reports

Census Tract Reports, Series PHC(1)—The Census Tract reports are covered in the Subject Guide tables t and 4. Data are published for 241 standard metropolitan statistical areas. In the reports, 4 of the 13 tables present characteristics for blacks in census tracts.⁴

General Demographic Trends for Metropolitan Areas, 1960 to 1970, Scries PHC(2)—Five tables in the reports, issued for States, present statistics on blacks or black and other races for the State and for SMSA's. The tables include population figures by race and age, components of population change by race, and general housing characteristics for black-occupied housing units.



^{*}Centals tracts are statistical subdivisions, most of which are within SMSA's. They do not cross county lines and are defined for all SMSA's and in other special areas. Tracts are areas with about 4,000 to 5,000 residents and are defined by a local committee subject to approval by the Census Bureau. Tracts were designed initially to be relatively homogeneous with respect to population' characteristics, economic status, and living conditions.

Employment Profiles of Selected Low-Income Areas, Series PHC(3). This series consists of 76 teports including 7 sunmary reports and 68 reports for selected low-income areas (60 in 51 cities and 7 in ritral areas and 1 in an Indian reservation). General statistics on the social and economic characteristics of the restdents of a particular low-income area are presented for the categories all races, black, white Spanish, and other white. Separate tables for all races, black, and white show more detailed data on subjects inclinding employment and intemployment, education, vocational training, availability for work, job listory, income, value or rent of housing units, and number of rooms in units. Included in the PHC(3) series is a report on the Zuni Reservation, New Mexico.

Subject Guides to 1970 Census Population and Housing Characteristics

Description of Subject Guides

The subject guides presented here show the type of data available for the Black, American Indian, Japaneso, Chinese, Filipino, Aleut, Eskimo, Korean, and Hawaiian populations, the geographic detail for which data are presented, and the specific printed report and tables in which the data are published. A list of the subject guides to 19 0 census data for the specific racial groups is as follows.

The subject guides for the black population (tables I and 4) cover in detail population volume I, housing volumes I and II, and the toint population and housing Census Tract reports. The subject guides for the American Indian, Japanese, Chinese, and Filipino populations (tables 2 and 3) cover population volume I report. The two housing volumes and the Census Tract report do not contain data for the latter four groups.

Key to Sources of the Subject Guides

This section is designed to assist users in locating the data in the reports.

Population Characteristics, Tables 1-3-Each source reference in the subject guides for the population

characteristics is shown in two parts: first the particular report and, second, the table number or numbers. For example, the source "US48,60" means tables 48 and 60 of the U.S. Summary report; "ST17" directs you to table 17 of the individual State report, and "CT1" refers to table 1 of the Census Tract report. The report designations are as follows:

- US: United States Summary, 1970 Census of Population, Volume 1, Part 1, Characteristics of the Population
- ST The individual State reports of 1970 Census of Population, Volume 1, Paris 2 to 52, Characteristics of the Population
- CT: The individual standard metropolitan statistical area reports of 1970 Census of Population and Housing Census Tracts, Parts 1 to 24 (also identified as Series PHC(1), report numbers 1 to 241).

Housing Characteristics, Table 4-The source references' in the subject guide for the housing characteristics are generally shown in three parts: The first refers to report series; and second, following the colon, the particular report; and third, following the dash, the table numbers. For example, HC(1): US-25 means table 25 of the United States Summary report of Volume 1, Ilousing Characteristics for States, Cities, and Countles; HC(11): US-B15, C15 means tables B15 and C15 of the United States Summary report of Volume 11, Metropolitan Ilousing Characteristics. The source references shown for census tracts are shown in two parts only, the same as that shown in the guide for population characteristics.

Other Related Publications

These reports are issued for both the population and housing censuses, as series PC(S1) for population and series HC(S1) for housing. Some supplementary reports also present new data, such as in the report PC(S1)-64, Native Population of Alaska, by Race: 1970, Many housing supplementary reports provide data for black head of household. CURRENT POPULATION REPORTS

In addition to findings of the census of population, conducted every 10 years, the Bureau of the Census publishes continuing and up-to-date demographic, social, and economic statistics under the general title, Current Population Reports. These reports consist of eight separate series. Four of the reports in the series—Ropulation Characteristics (P-20), Special Studies (P-23), Farin Population (P-27), and Consumer Income (P-60) contain data derived from the Current Population Survey (CPS) taken monthly by the Bureau (At this time, the CPS consists of approximately 47,000 occupied households. These households are located in 461 areas covering 923 counties and independent cities spread throughout each of the 50 States and the District of Columbia.)

The reports based on the CPS provide data on such subjects as mobility of the population, educational attainment, school enrollment, households and faunilies, marital status, fertility. American youth, age, race, income of families, individuals, households, and the low income population.

Other reports in the Current Population Reports senes provide population estimates and projections by age, race, and sex; and data on recent and expected purchases of cars, houses, and substantial household items. Re. Its of special censuses conducted by the Bureau upo, request by cities or other Jocal governments are also published in the Current Population Reports series.

Extensive statistics for blacks are presented in the Current Population Reports, Series P-23, The Social and Economic Status of the Black Population in the Unned States (the current report, No.48, is for 1973). which provides statistics describing the general social. and economic characteristics of black Americans. This annual report presents the most current statistics on and focuses on the changes which have occurred in income, employment, education, family characteristics. housing, health, fertility, voter participation, and public office holders. This report is part of the Special Studies, series P-23, and contains data from the CPS as well as data from the 1970 Census of Population and Housing, other Bureau of the Census surveys, and from other government and private agencies. Data are shown, primarily, for the United States, regions, metropolitan-nonmetropolitan areas, and inside and outside central cities, some data are presented for States and cities.

Other series presenting various statistics crossclassified by race include Population Characteristics, series P-20; Population Estimates and Projections, P-25; Farm Population, series P-27; Special Censuses, series P-28; Consumer Income, series P-60; and Consumer Buying Indicators, series P-65. Reports' in these series are issued throughout the year, and copies may be obtained from the Super-intendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402, or at any Department of Commerce district office. The current yearly subscription rate is as follows. Series P-20, P-23, P-25, P-26, P-27, P-28 (quarterly and annual summaries only), P-60 and P-65 combined, \$56.00.

IV. WHERE TO FIND DATA ON SELECTED RACIAL GROUPS ON COMPUTER TAPE

Data on selected racial groups from the 1970 Census of Population and Housing are available on the 1970 Census Summary Tapes and the Public Use Sample Tapes These computer tapes can be obtained by users at the eost of reproduction as part of the Bureau's data products program. Information on the data on selected racial groups available on computer tape is presented in this section. A summary chart including racial categories for the 1970 Census Summary Tapes (figure 4) appears on page 31.

1970 CENSUS SUMMARY TAPES

First Through Sixth Count Summary Tapes

Computer tapes containing basic data about individual persons or housing units (basic record tapes) were used to create tapes containing summary data or totals of characteristics at various geographic levels. These summary tapes were produced in six tabulation series—referred to as counts—which yielded the statistics presented in most of the printed reports. The first three series, the First, Second, and Third Counts, contain only complete-count or 100-percent data, derived from the census questions asked of all households. The Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Count Summary Tapes present tabulations which include the 20-, 15-,

Many of the tabulations contained on the summary tapes are cross-classified by race. All of the summary tape counts have tabulations of data for the black population; but for the detailed racial eategories (Indian, Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, Hawaiian, Korean and "Other race" populations) data are limited mainly to population counts in the first two summary tape series and to several basic population characteristics on the Sixth Count Summary Tapes.

First Count Summary Tapes—These tapes contain 19 tables which present racial statistics cross-tabulated by complete count or 100 percent items. Population and housing data are presented in most of these tables for the total and black populations. Total population counts are provided for white, black, Indian, and "other specified races." These tapes were the source of the PC(1)-A reports. Number of Inhabitants. The total contents of the First Count tapes are available on nucrotism.

Second Count Summary Tapes-Also derived from the 100-percent items, these tapes contain 52 tables which present racial data covering the same subjects as the First Count tapes but in greater detail. Many tables present complete-count population and housing characteristics for the total and black populations; for some tables data are shown for total, white, and black. Counts of persons by sex are shown for the White, Black, Indian, Japanese, Clunese, Filipino, Hawaiian, Korean, and "Other race" populations. These tapes were the source of the PC(1)-B reports, General Population Characteristics, HC(1)-A reports, General Housing Characteristics, and the Census Traci Reports. series PHC(1). The Second Count tapes, however, contain more data items for tracts and other selected areas than the printed reports.

Third Count Summary Tapes—Including 16 tables of data cross-classified by race, these tapes contain 100-percent population and housing data at the block level (the smallest geographic area for which the Bureau publishes statistics). Most of the tables provide data for total and black populations; population counts by sex are included for total, black, and "other race"; and occupied units by tenure are provided for total, white, and black populations. These tapes, the source of the Block Statistics reports, series HC(3), contain more data per block than are presented in the reports. They contain less data, however, than the First and Second Count Summary Tapes. Computer programs have been developed to create microfilm versions of the Third Count tapes on a customized basis.

Fourth Count Summary Tapes-Containing data based on the questions asked of a sample of the total population, these tapes are the primary source of sample data for small areas. One hundred tables on the Fourth Count population portion present data for the total, white, and black populations and many of the Fourth Count housing tables show housing characteristics for the total and black populations. Fourth Count is the source of the Social and Economic Characteristics reports. PC(1)-C. the Detailed Housing Characteristics reports, HC(1)-B, and part of the Census Tract Reports, PHC(1). Because the Fourth Count tapes contain such a large number of tables which present racial statistics, it is not feasible to include them in the section for the individual counts. However, a list of the major subjects covered in the tabulations is provided. For detailed information on the specific types of data available by race on the Fourth Count Summary Tapes, refer to Data Access Description No. 22, dated March 1971.

Fifth Count Summary Tapes, Files A and B for ZIP Code Areas-These are the only summary tapes



organized by ZIP code areas. They include 13 tables which show population or housing characteristics cross-tabulated by race. These tapes contain data based on the sample questions. Population totals are available by ZIP code areas for the White, Black, Indian, Japanese. Chinese, Filipino, and "Other race" populations. Other population and housing characteristics are given for the total, white, and black; or total and black populations.

Fifth Count Summary Tapes, File C-File C was produced as a special tabulation and is now available at the cost of reproduction. The File C tapes present the Fifth Count data for enumeration districts or block groups, census tracts, and numor civil divisions (MCD's) or census county divisions (CCD's) instead of ZIP code areas. These tapes are available on a State-by-State basis.

The data content of File C Fifth Count tabulations is available on 16mm nicrofilm and paper printouts prepared from the microfilm for counties and MCD's or CCD's. This nicrofilm product greatly expands the amount of eye-readable sample data for counties and county subdivisions.

Sixth Count Summary Tapes-The Sixth Count tapes contain data for large areas and include more detailed tabulations and cross-classifications of sample population and housing characteristics for blacks than any of the other summary tape series. In some of the tabulations, based on sample questions, detailed characteristics are available for the Indian, Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, Hawauan, Korean, and all "Other rac" populations. These tapes were the source of the PC(1)-D reports, Detailed Characteristics of the Population, and the HC(2) reports. Metropolitan Housing Characteristics. The numerous Sixth Count tables presenting racial statistics will not be listed in this Data Access Description, but a list of the major subjects for which data are shown in the tapes appears on p. 40. For detailed information concerning the specific kinds of racial data on these tapes, refer to Data Access Description No. 30, dated August 1972, covering the Sixth Count.

Racial Data Available on Summary Tapes

Additional information on the racial data available on the 1970 census summary tapes is shown in figures 5 through 10. For the First, Second, Third, and Fifth Counts, the subjects and table numbers of the summary tape tabulations which contain racial data are shown by racial categories. While the Fourth and Sixth Counts contain many tables with racial data, because of the large number of tabulations in these two counts, only itemized lists of the major subjects are shown.

PUBLIC USE SAMPLE TAPES

In spite of the considerable amount of detail in the printed reports and summary tapes as described above, there are bound to be some research questions which involve relationships among census variables which have not been prepared. There are two ways for the user to obtain tabulations tailored to his needs. First, he may arrange with the Bureau for a special tabulation on a cost-reimbursable basis. Special tabulations have the disadvantages that they are relatively expensive and may take several months to prepare. On the other hand, if the desired tabulations do not involve small areas, the user may be able to prepare his own special tabulations from public use samples of basic census records using his own computing facilities with maximum flexibility.

Public use samples include modified forms of the census records for individual households and persons, with identifying information removed, selected scientifically as a sample of the Bureau's basic records. Each public use sample contains records for 1 percent of the population or roughly 2 million individuals. Six different public use samples have been drawn from the basic records, three from the 15-percent sample and three from the 5-percent sample; one each for the following three categories: SMSA's and county groups. States, and neighborhood characteristics. The data are available for public use in the form of computer tape files consisting of records in which all information is recorded as numeric codes. There are two types of records: one for households and one for persons. Each household record is followed by a variable number of persons records, i.e., one for each of its members. No names or addresses appear in the public use sample files, and the areas of residence defined are sufficiently large to avoid disclosure of individuals. Geographic information is limited to protect confidentiality, and geographic codes identify only areas with a population of more than 250,000. More information is contained in Data Access Description No. 24, Public Use Samples of Basic Records from the 1960 and 1970 Censuses. dated May 1971. Detailed documentation of the files and their contents is available in Public Use Samples of Basic Records From the 1970 Census: Description and Technical Documentation,

Data on race are available from the public use samples. Every public use sample record indicates the race of the subject: White, Black, Indian, Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, Hawanan, Korean, and "Other"—along with the subjects age, family characteristics, income, education, occupation, and other census characteristics. The user has considerable flexibility in combining the variables of interest in a tabulation. Tabulations of 1-percent public use samples are, however, subject to greater sampling variability than corresponding tabulations from the full census 20-, 15-, or 5-percent samples.

Housing

On the Sixth Count Housing Summary Tapes, data are available for the State, SMSA, metropolitan county and nonmetropolitan county of 50,000+, city of 50,000+, and central city. Various cross-tabulations are provided for the following subjects. Most of these tabulations are further stratified by tenure (owner- and renter-occupied housing units) and race of head: Total, White, Negro, and Spanish American.* (There is, of course, no racial breakdown for the various cross-tabulations for vacant housing units.)

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ACQUISITION OF THE TAPES

Summary tapes for all but the Fifth Count ZIP to de tapes are released on a State-by-State basis. The number of reels required for a particular State varies from 1 to 23 (the latter for file A of the Fourth Count Housing tapes for California). Figure 11 (p.42) provides information on the number of tapes required per State for each of the summary tape counts. For the Public Use Sample tapes, each of the six 1/100 samples is sontained on 31-33 tapes. Each sample is subdivided geographically into a series of files usually consisting of a single tape, though a few may be as large as six or seven tapes. (For example, data for New York are on three tapes while data for Louisiana and Oklahoma are combined on one tape reel.)

Copies of the 1970 Census Summary Tapes and the Public Use Sample tapes may be purchased for \$80 per teel (the cost as of release of this Data Access Description). Several tape copying options are available (1) 7 track, \$56 bpt. BCD, (2) 7 track, 800 bpt, BCD (3) 9 track, 800 bpt, EBCDIC, and (4) 9 track, 800 bpt, ASCII.

V. SPECIAL TABULATIONS AS A SOURCE OF DATA ON SELECTED RACIAL GROUPS

In cases where the need for racial statistics tabulated by certain subjects or geographic detail is not met by the general 1970 census tabulations, special tabulations or special projects designed to meet the individual user's specifications can be undertaken on a costtermborsable basis. This involves retabulating the census basic record tapes containing records for individual persons and households to obtain crosstabulations not available from the general census tabulations or data for special geographic areas. Tabulations involving the basic computer records which contain maximum geographic and subject matter detail must be performed by consus staff members at the Bureau, and the data are tabulated only for those areas and statistical distributions whose sample size and detail would not permit the possible identification of any respondent,

Special tabulations can be furnished on tape or computer printout. Copies of special tabulations which were turnished to individual users in table form are sometimes available at a nominal fee which covers the cost of copying and appropriate overhead charges. The Bureau of the Census Catalog, Pari II, Data Files and Special Tabulations, includes descriptions of special tabulations, prepared during the Catalog issue period, which are available for purchase. (The Catalog is issued

quarterly, cumulative to the annual issue, and is available from the U.S. Government Printing Office.)

A number of special tabulations containing racial data have been produced by the Bureau for individual data users. Two examples are presented here.

Title OEO Special Tabulations,

Source 1970 Census of Population 20-percent basic records.

Subject content—Race (Total, White, Black, American Indian, Japanese, Chanese, Hawanan) cross-classified by poverty status, age groups, occupation, education, income, and housing unit characteristics.

Geographic areas covered The United States, each State, and each county.

Title - HUD Household Income Tabulation.

Source 1970 Census of Population and Housing 20-, 15-, and 5- percent samples.

Subject content—Occupied units cross-classified by tenure and race of head, household size, and household income.

Geographic areas covered. The United States, regions, divisions, each State, each SMSA, each county, and places.

For additional information concerning special tabulations, refer to Data Access Description No. 21, Census Bureau Unpublished Data and Special Services: Policy and Delineation, dated December 1970, or to the Bureau of the Census Catalog, introduction to Part II, Data Files and Special Tabulations.

Note. The information presented in special tabulations, as well as that in the summary tapes and printed reports, is subject to disclosure safeguards to insure confidentiality of census data.
