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#### ABSTRACT

The material in the publication is intended to acquaint users with the occupational composition of the various nonmanufacturing industries in the State of Indiana. It is directed particularly to those who are concerned with designing academic and vocational education programs in order to supply workers to fill the needs of industry and to anticipate replacement demand. Data for the five industry gorups--(1) mining; (2) construction; (3) transportation, communication, electrical, gas, and sanitary services: (4) finance, insurance, and real estate; and (5) hotels, tourists courts, motels, and private lodging -- are presented in tables which show the number currently employed and the percent each occupation or occupational group comprises of the total employment in an industry group. Information was obtained by surveying a sample of employers in each industry group using survey forms specifically designed for the industry. A short section explaining the methodology is included. In Indiana the Occupational Employment Statistics program is conducted by the Indiana Employment Security Division in co-operation with the Bureau of Labor Statistics and Manpower Administration of the U.S. Department of Labor.

This is the first publication of nonmanufacturing data from this survey. Also available are a series of monographs of various manufacturing industries from the survey in this sector. Data from the wholesale and retail trade survey will be published in 1975.

#### OCCUPATIONAL EMPLOYMENT IN SELECTED NONMANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES

The material in this publication is intended to acquaint users with the occupational composition of the various nonmanufacturing industries in the State ACA It is directed particularly to those who are concerned with designing academic and vocational education programs to supply workers to fill the needs of industry.

The number and the occupational mix of the currently employed represent employers filled demand for workers under the circumstances prevailing at the time of the survey.

Separations from the labor force, due to retirement, death, or withdrawal from the labor force, average about four per cent a year for all occupations; some are much higher. 1/ Workers are also occupationally and geographically mobile. When they move from one occupation, or one area to another, replacement demand is created. Therefore, it is apparent that study of current occupational structure is necessary in order to anticipate replacement demand. In addition to replacement demand, industry growth and changes in occupational structure create demand. As the cycle of these surveys continues, we hope to be able to pinpoint changes in occupational structure and identify emerging and declining occupations.

The tables which follow are by industry group and show the number currently employed and the per cent each occupation or occupational group comprises
of the total employment in an industry group. The information was obtained
by survey of a sample of employers in each industry group using survey
forms specifically designed for the industry. The range of possible error
due to the sampling process is shown for each occupation. For instance,
If employment of 210 and a range of 180 - 240 is shown for an occupation,
the range indicates the difference from the 210 figure which may have
resulted from the use of sample rather than from data from all employers.

The percentage of the occupation, or occupational group, is also presented for each industry so that occupations of numerical significance can be easily identified.

Not all industries were included in this "nonmanufacturing" survey. Specifically excluded were wholesale and retail trade, federal regulated industries, education services, agriculture, private households and government. The wholesale and retail trade has been surveyed separately and publication of this data will be forthcoming shortly.

Data for some industries surveyed could not be published because of insufficient response to the survey. As the surveys are repeated, it is hoped that more industries will respond and more data can be published.

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## OCCUPATIONAL EMPLOYMENT IN INDIANA'S BITUMINOUS COAL & LIGNITE MINING INDUSTRY - SIC 12

Establishments primarily engaged in producing bituminous coal or lignite.

An estimated 2990 employees work in the bituminous coal and lignite mining industries in Indiana. This constitutes 45 per cent of all mining industries employment in the State, as of June 1973. There are 49 establishments in this industry in Indiana. Over the past decade, employment in this sector of the State's economy has decreased 12.9 per cent, as compared to a 21.3 per cent decline for all mining industries for the same period.

Establishments primarily engaged in mining or quarrying, developing mines, or exploring for nonmetallic minerals, except fuels.

An estimated 3280 employees work in the mining and quarrying of nonmetallic minerals, except fuels, industry. This constitutes 46.8 per cent of all mining industries employment in the State as of April 1973. Two hundred fourteen establishments account for the employment in mining and quarrying of nonmetallic minerals, except fuels. Over the past decade employment in this sector of the State economy has decreased 4.7 per cent, as compared to a 21.3 per cent decline for all mining industries for the same period.

Nine hundred forty-nine establishments account for the employment in the nonbuilding contract construction industry.

Seventy-five establishments account for the employment in taxicabs. Over the past decade employment in this sector of the State economy has decreased 25.0 per cent, as compared to a 30.9 per cent increase for all transportation, communications, utilities and sanitary services industries for the same period.

One hundred twenty-two establishments account for the employment in radio broadcasting and television. Over the past decade employment in this sector of the State economy has increased 52.9 per cent, as compared to a 30.9 per cent increase for all transportation, communications, utilities, and sanitary services industries for the same period.

#### METHODO LOGY

This survey was conducted in accordance with procedures developed by the Manpower Administration, the Bureau of Labor Statistics, and the states participating in the Occupational Employment Statistics program since its inception.

#### The Survey

This survey covered the nonmanufacturing employers in the State. Criteria used for selecting the sample, making the estimates, and the final publication are included in the OCCUPATIONAL EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS SURVEY OPERATIONS MANUAL, 1st Edition.

In Indiana 5,920 units were selected from a total of 17,182 establishments covered by this survey and represented 34.5 per cent of the total. These establishments had 192,294 workers, or 67.7 per cent of the 284,020 workers in these nonmanufacturing industries in the State.

#### Questionnaire Design

Questionnaires were designed for each of 73 different industry groups or subgroups to include occupations appropriate to the industry. Usable responses were received from 3,917 establishments, 66.2 per cent of those in the sample, and represented 124,235 persons employed, 64.6 per cent of the employment in the sample.

#### Accuracy of Survey Responses

The completed questionnaires were reviewed for reported employment, staffing patterns, and occupations listed. Where discrepancies were noted, respondents were contacted to clarify the differences.

#### Occupational Employment Estimating Procedures

The responses were grouped into seven employment sizes for each of the three-digit industries in the survey. Each size group within an industry was reviewed to determine if the responses represented a statistically sufficient percentage of the total. In some instances it was necessary to combine size groups within an industry to insure sufficient response. These size groups were then blown up to the total of that size group of the industry in the State.



#### Accuracy of Occupational Employment Data

Because of such factors as inadequate sampling, small number of responses, changes in employment, some industries were determined to have insufficient occupational data for publication. For those industries for which sufficient data were collected, the possibility of error in the estimates exist because of the use of a sample rather than surveying all establishments. Thus, the range of accuracy means that the chances are two out of three (a 64 per cent confidence level) that results of a total survey of all establishments would produce estimates that would not differ more than those shown in the ranges.

To emphasize that these are employment estimates, the figures have been rounded. Due to rounding, the per cent of the employment in occupations of the industry may not always total 100 per cent.
