ABSTRACT

This refugee alert bulletin provides information relevant to Indochinese refugees in the United States. General news of the Indochinese Clearinghouse is provided, along with a partial list of the addresses and phone numbers of refugee assistance centers. Also listed are Vietnamese language publications, mostly journals and newspapers, available for public distribution. The bulletin discusses: (1) the project organized by the Office of Education to evaluate and reconstitute academic credentials of Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees and to enable postsecondary institutions to make decisions concerning the admission and placement of refugees; (2) the Test of English as a Foreign Language offered by the Educational Testing Service; details for eligibility are provided; (3) Vietnamese language radio broadcasts, with times and stations listed; (4) a directory of Vietnamese scholars which is in preparation; and (5) a set of survival videotapes to help refugees adjust to American life. A complete list of the refugee education guides is also provided. The eight series cover preschool education, general information, educational administration, elementary education, intermediate and secondary education, bilingual and bicultural education, personnel resources, and the alert bulletins. This issue of the bulletin concludes with a map and figures documenting refugee resettlement in the United States and, for questions concerning refugee resettlement, the addresses and phone numbers of the ten HEW regional offices. ### INDOCHINESE CLEARINGHOUSE TO CONTINUE THROUGH AUGUST

The National Indochinese Clearinghouse will continue, for the remainder of the school year, to collect, analyze, adapt and disseminate information relevant to the education of Vietnamese, Cambodian and Black Tai refugees. This information will be disseminated in the form of Indochinese Refugee Education Guides and Refugee Alert Bulletins. During July and August the Clearinghouse staff will prepare a Guide for Refugee Education for the School Year 1976-77 which will incorporate the best of the curriculum guides and text materials developed during the current year.

Some changes in the functioning of the Clearinghouse have taken place. WE WILL NO LONGER SERVICE INDIVIDUAL SPONSORS AND VOLUNTEERS OR PERSONNEL FROM LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCIES. The Bilingual Resource Centers listed on the following page will provide services to LEAs, volunteers and sponsors. The Clearinghouse, in turn, will service the Bilingual Resource Centers, State Educational Agency personnel, federal government personnel and national voluntary agency personnel.

Each of the Bilingual Resource Centers will accept collect phone calls, and we will continue our hotline operation (800-336-3040) through June 30, 1976.

### REFUGEE ASSISTANCE CENTERS

A great number of private or semi-private, non-profit organizations have been established recently to respond to the needs of the Indochinese refugees, to help ease the hardship of resettlement, to serve as a linkage between these new immigrants and their American friends. Some provide a wide range of services; others are small with few staff, but still help the Vietnamese in the area. The Alert Bulletin will carry news of the establishment of new centers as such information becomes available.

#### EVALUATION OF CREDENTIALS

The Office of Education has established a project to provide for evaluating or reconstituting the academic credentials of Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees in order to assist postsecondary institutions in making decisions concerning the admission and placement of the refugees. The following procedures will be observed in operating the program:

1. The refugee presents his or her academic credentials (or a request for re-creation of credentials) to the postsecondary institution;

2. The institution transmits a request for evaluation or re-creation of documents to: Mr. George La Due, Director, Evaluation Project (NPVCDE), California State University, Long Beach, Long Beach, California 90840.
3. The Evaluation Project transmits the translation of the documents results to the requesting institution.

This project will provide services through calendar year 1976.

#### ENGLISH LANGUAGE TESTING

The Educational Testing Service (ETS) of Princeton, N.J., with support from the Office of Education, will administer the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) free of charge to Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees. These tests will be administered as a regular part of the ETS nationwide testing program; that is, at colleges and universities and at the national administration sites according to their customary schedules, through December, 1976.

To be eligible for this program, a refugee must qualify under the Refugee Assistance and Migration Act of 1975; that is, must fulfill the following requirements:

- be a Vietnamese or Cambodian refugee, identified as such by the statement "Indefinite Refugee VICAM" on his or her Form I-94 (INS Arrival-Departure Record)
- demonstrate genuine interest in attending a college or university. The refugee must be either admitted to or applying for admission to a particular institution.
- be a Vietnamese or Cambodian refugee student who has not previously taken the TOEFL under the auspices of this project.

A student can take the TOEFL free of charge only at the request of the Admissions Office of the institution he or she is attending or hopes to attend. The process is initiated by the following steps:

1. The refugee requests the test of the admissions office of the post-secondary institution.
2. The admissions office submits a request form to ETS for a Fee Voucher Card. Mailing address: TOEFL, Box 889, Princeton, New Jersey 08540.
3. ETS then forwards the Fee Voucher Card, with name and identification number of the refugee, to the requesting institution. Accompanying this Card will be necessary materials for student preparation of the TOEFL.

"SURVIVAL" VIDEOTAPES FOR REFUGEES

The Center for Applied Linguistics, in conjunction with the Interagency Task Force for Indochinese Refugees, is producing a series of videotapes. The series, entitled "I Want to Know...", is designed to provide the refugee with useful and substantial information on life in America.

The format of the videotapes, with each hour-long tape devoted to a single subject, is a three-cornered bilingual discussion panel consisting of 1) a Vietnamese refugee asking his or her own questions about various aspects of the subject under discussion; 2) an American expert on the subject; 3) a Vietnamese bilingual-bicultural moderator to serve as a linguistic as well as cross-cultural interpreter.

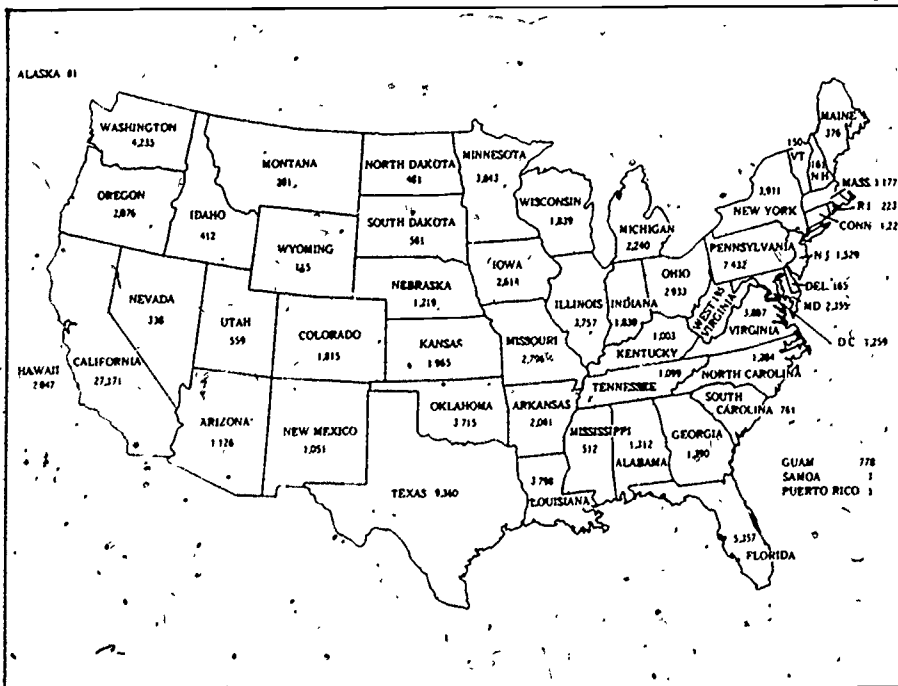

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT

All of the refugees who arrived in the United States last spring have now been resettled in American communities. The map below shows the number of Indochina refugees living in each state. Of the total number, approximately 40% live in four states (California, Texas, Pennsylvania, Florida) and the Washington, D.C. Metropolitan Area.

The reception center at Fort Chaffee, Arkansas, the last to remain open of the four reception centers, was closed on December 20, 1975. The Interagency Task Force for Refugee Resettlement was also disbanded in December, 1975, and its functions assumed by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) Refugee Task Force. HEW will continue the publication of New Life (Đời Sống Mới) as a monthly newsletter, and also continue to operate the tri-lingual nationwide hotline that was set up to take calls from refugees with problems requiring immediate attention.
