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## ABSTRACT

Since 1958 the American Council on Education has condensed data related to higher education into useful figures and tables that emphasize trends and relationships. This issue includes data on higher education institutions by such variables as control, level of offering, size of enrollment, and type of calendar and region; faculty and staff classified by characteristics such as sex, full- or part-time, highest degree held, salaries, and tenure; student charges; student support; student characteristics; and foreign students and study abroad. 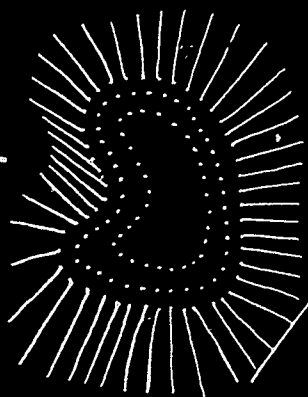

OF PREVIOUS FACT BOOK MAILINGS

- addition of a table that shows proportions of women on faculties, by rank (p. 75.143),
- addition of data on students that received assistance from 5 major federal aid programs in 1974-75 (p. 75.169),
- addition of a table that presents trend data on entering freshmen from 1966 through 1974 (pp. 75.178, 179).

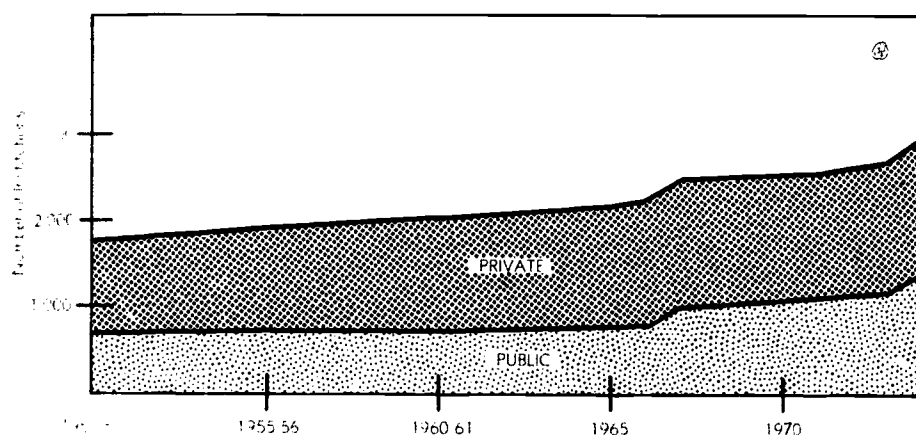

Prior to 1967-68, an institution was listed in the *Education Directory, Part 3* if it: (1) offered at least a 2-year program of college-level studies in residence; (2) submitted the necessary information for a listing; and (3) met certain accreditation criteria. The latter required that an institution either (a) be accredited or approved by a nationally recognized accrediting agency, by a state department of education, or by a state university; or (b) have its credits accepted as if coming from an accredited institution by new lower than three accredited institutions.

The 1967 list included in addition, those institutions that attained a preaccredited status with designated nationally recognized accrediting agencies.

The 1968 list included all institutions applying for a listing.

Directories published subsequent to 1968 use the 1967 criteria.

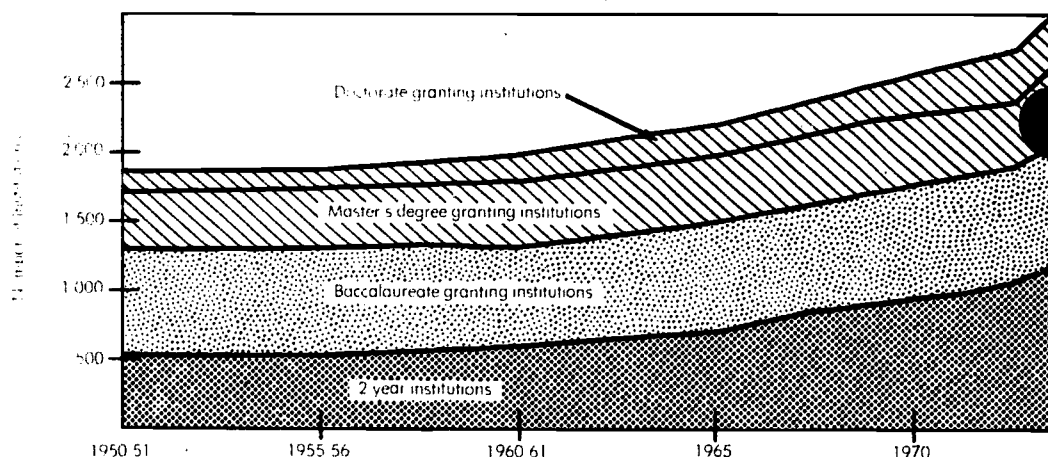
b. Caution must be used in making year-to-year comparisons. Part of the yearly increase may be due to how branch campuses are tallied. For example, in the 1973-74 directory, the University of Alaska was counted as one institution although it was composed of five 2-year units and one 4-year unit in addition to the main campus. In the 1974-75 directory, the seven units are counted separately.

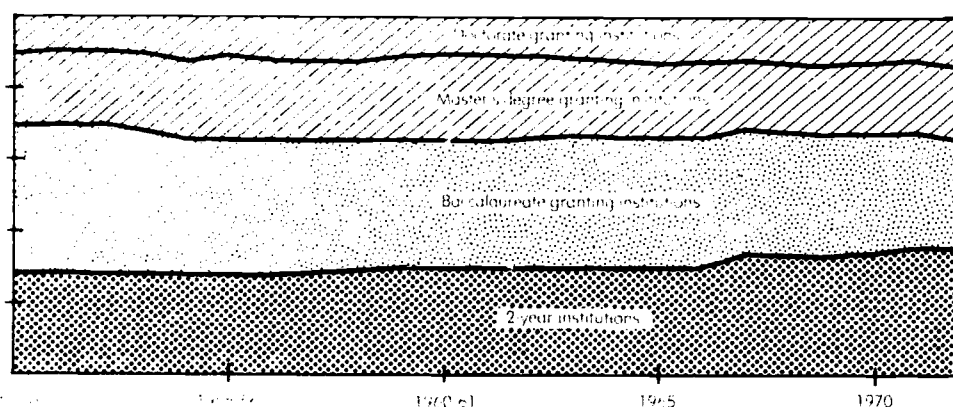

1950-1974



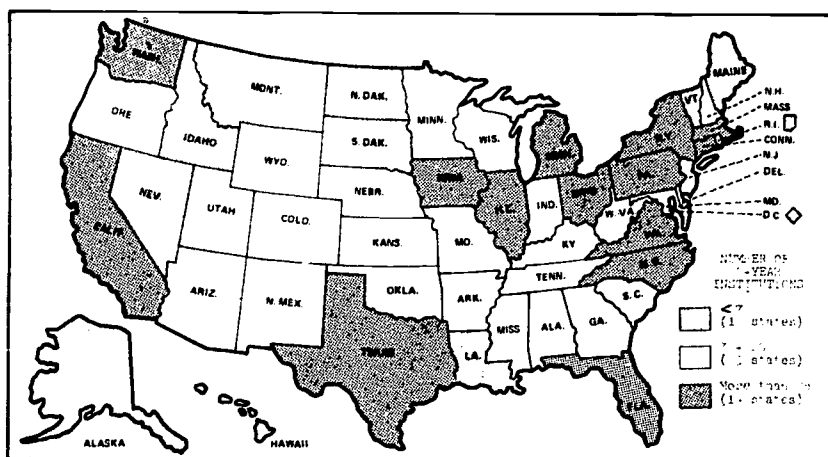

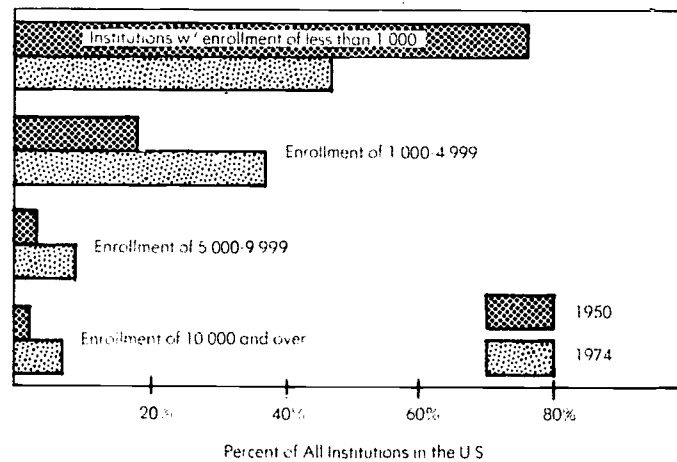

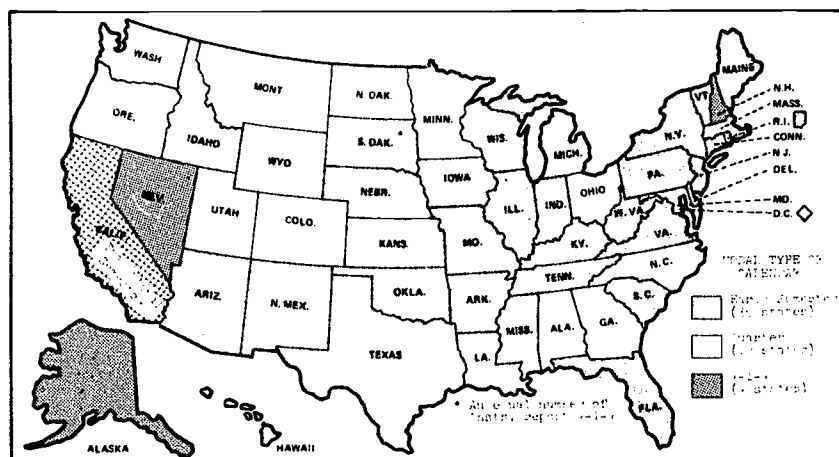

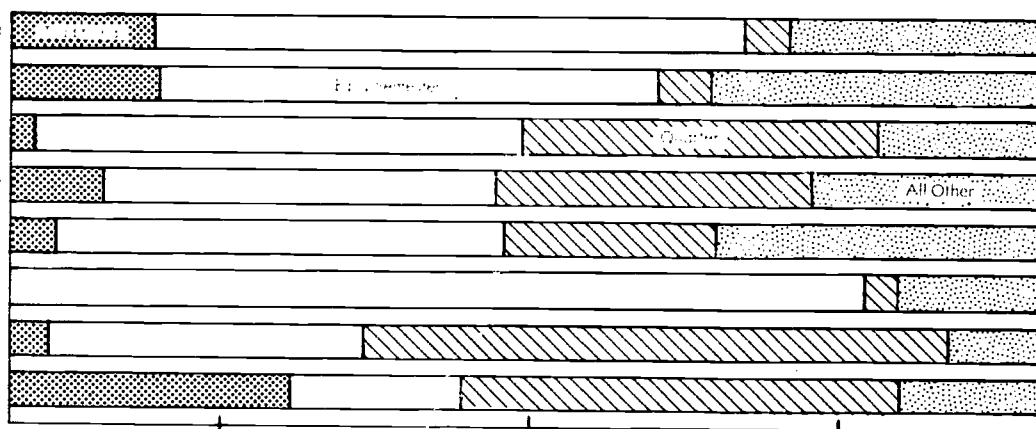

The month of January is used for the 4-week session, called by several names: interterm, interim, winter-session, etc.

5. Other: Any other type of calendar. The 4-1-4 title means 4 months, 1 month, 4 months. 4-1-4 also means 4 courses, 1 course, 4 courses. The unit credit is used for credits. A full load is 4 courses. In the interim only 1 course is studied.

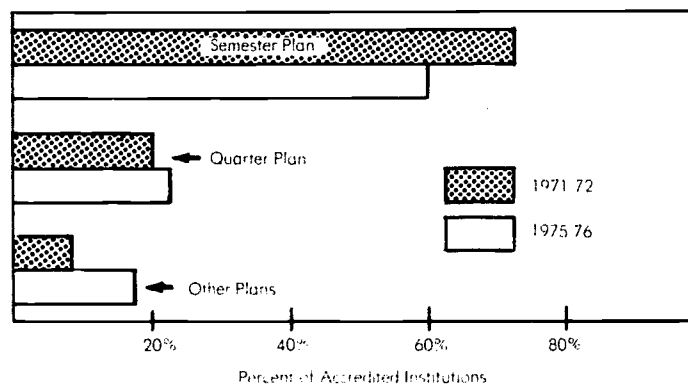

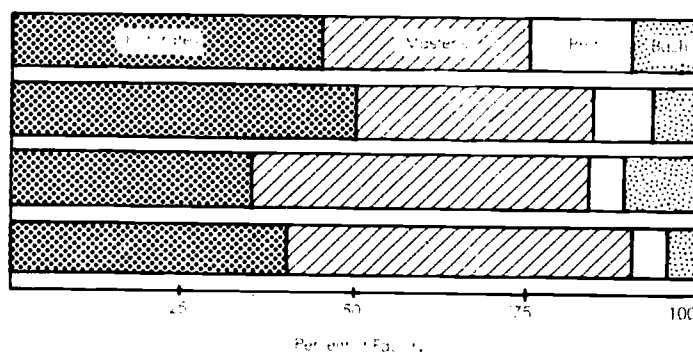

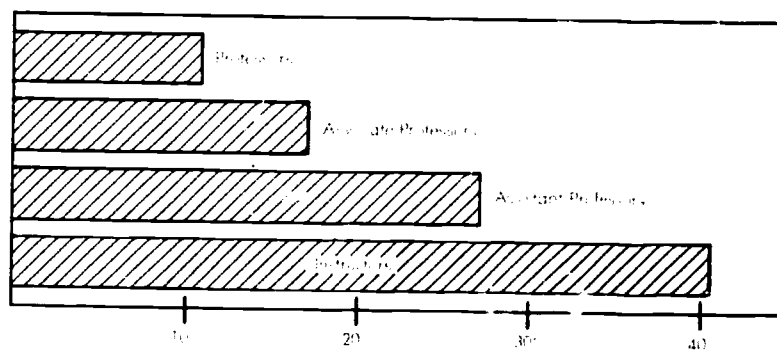

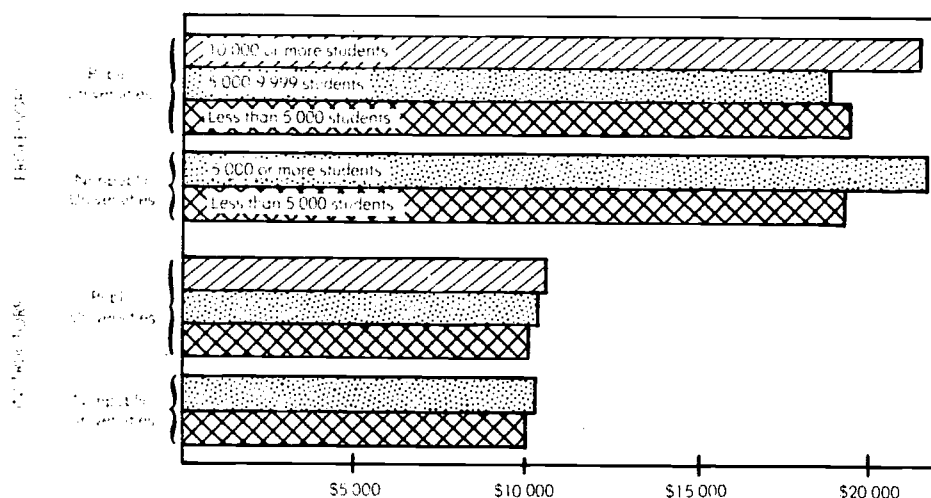

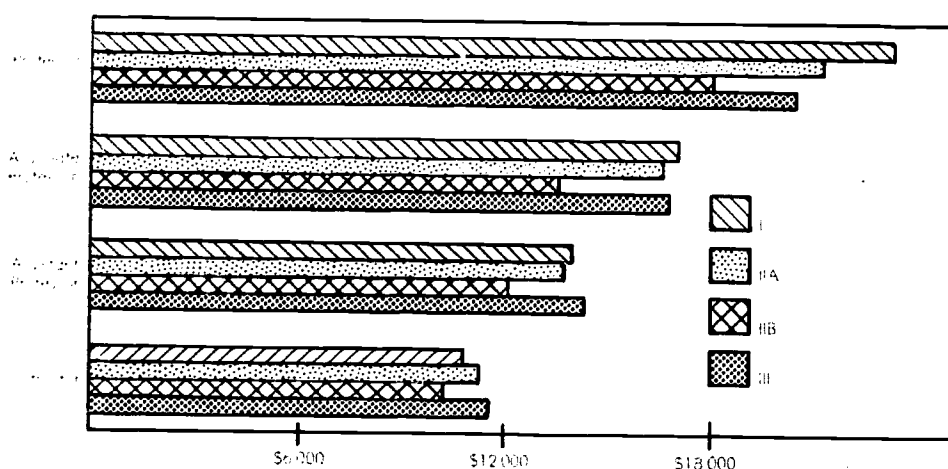

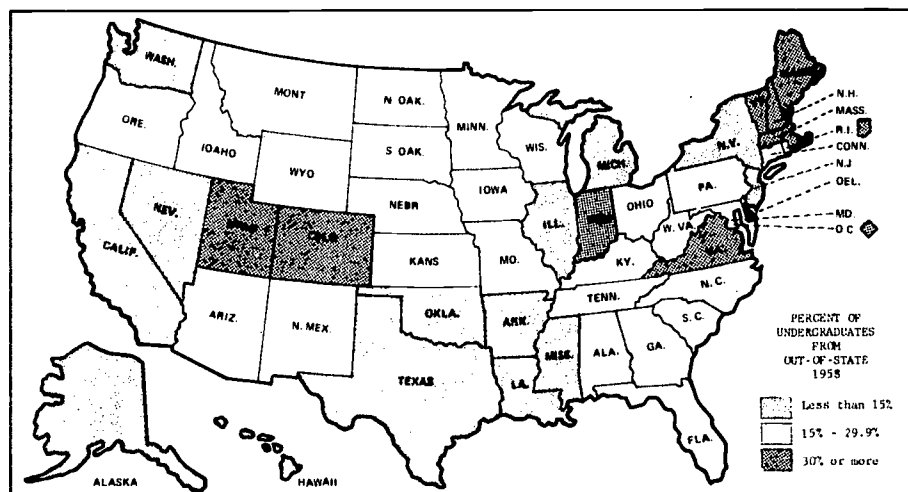

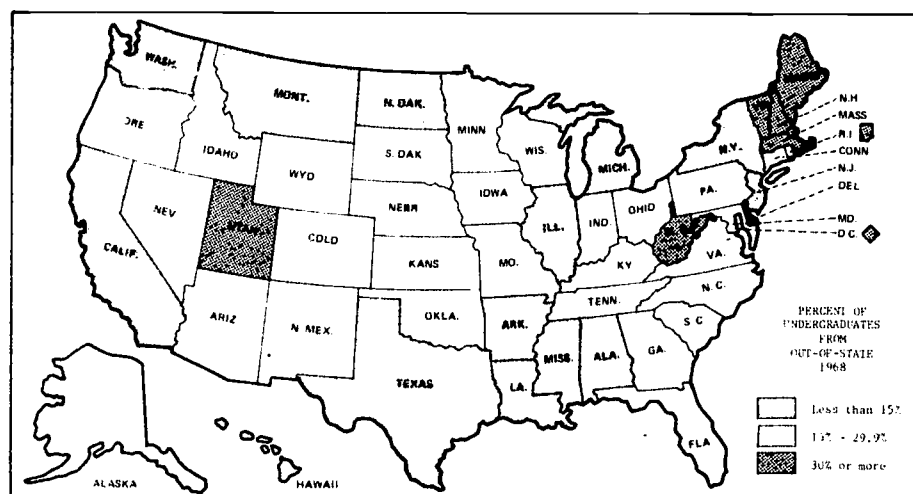

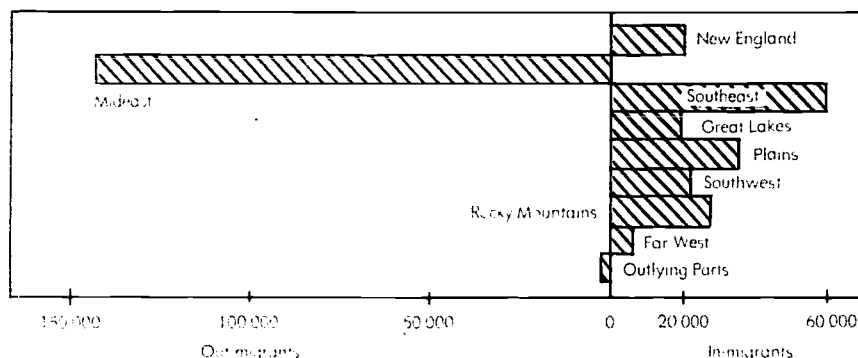

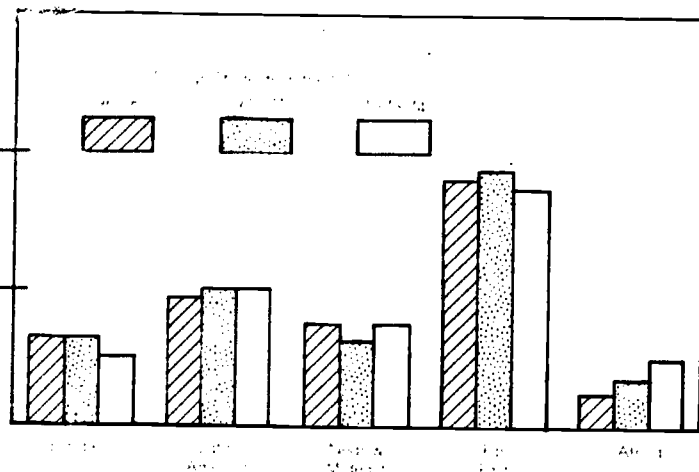

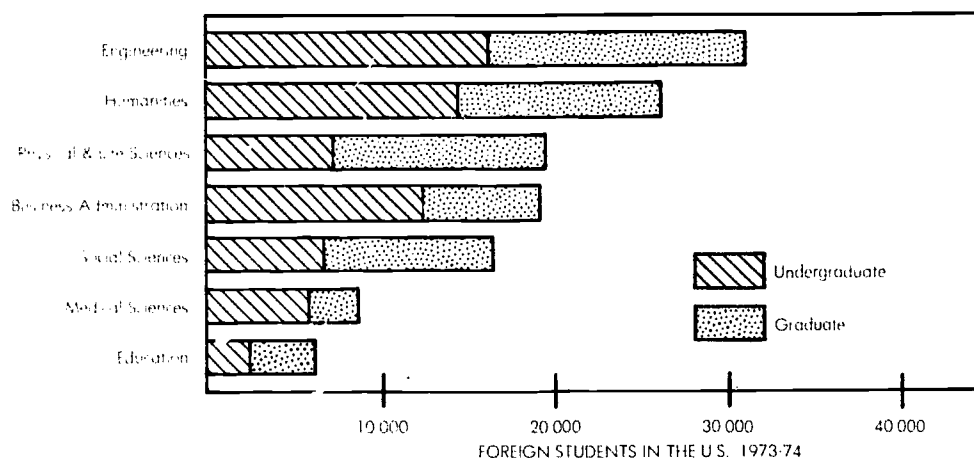

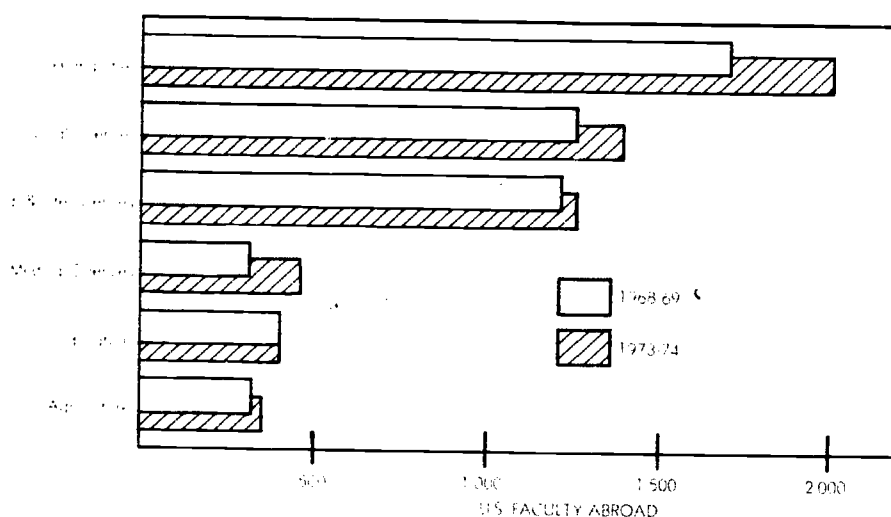
