 This finds Bear son & daughter deciding what they want to be - a common experience of childhood. Roles are non-stereotyped.

 Defiant, imaginative, creative to the end, the unnamed heroine does her thing. Humorous illustrations.

 Celebrating the differences in mothers from shape-to-likes-to-occupations. Humorous illustrations. Outstanding in its human role portrayal.

64. Horvath, Betty Not enough Indians Watts 1971 3.95

65. Howard, Moses The Ostrich chase Holt 1974 5.95

66. Kingman, Lee Georgina and the Dragon Houghton 1972 3.95
 About a young girl who liberates herself, and her adventures in that process.

70. Levi Jr., Sonia Rita, the weekend rat Atheneum 1971 4.50
 Cynthia, tomboy president of the Boys' Club and Brownie-to-be, earns the right to have Rita the Rat as her pet by proving herself responsible and learning through her mistakes. The dialog and family setting are realistic - father yelling, mother-on-the-verge, brother pestering - as is Cynthia's determination to meet the challenge.

72. Levy, Elizabeth Something queer is going on: a mystery Delacorte 1973 4.95
- The disappearance of Fletcher, a sedentary basset hound, leads 2 girls on a search. Creative illustrations.

73. Lexau, Joan Emily and the Klunky Baby Dial 1972 4.58LB
- Emily's parents are separated. Her mother is working on the taxes and needing quiet, sends her children out to play. How Emily runs away with the baby, decides mother really does love her, and returns forms the theme of this one parent story. Excellent illustrations.

74. Little, Jean Kate Harper 1971 3.79LB
- A "thinking" book in which Kate explores her heritage and personality in an effort to find out who and what she is. One of the few children's books to deal with religious heritage and mixed marriages. Strong emphasis on personal development.

75. Lively, Penelope The house in Norham Gardens Dutton 1974 6.50
- The ambiance of former inhabitants and their treasures, particularly the primitive totem shield wro ten from New Guinea, some 70 years before, exert disturbing power over Clare.

76. McHargue, Georgess Stoneflight Viking 1975 6.95
- Combination of realism and fantasy. The way children feel, especially adolescents, when adults ignore them, treat them sometimes as children and sometimes as adults, and do not share family problems with them, is well portrayed.

77. Madden, Betsy The All-American Coeds Criterion 1971 4.25
- Basketball, a girls' team instead of boys. The high school girls' basketball team is outstanding and the girls would like to play the boys' team...fills a void and the basketball scenes ring true and are exciting.

- Matta, Sharon Sidewalk story Viking 1971 3.77
- Lilla Matta sasses, says "phooey," is a "natural," and true friend. She's the only one who cares when Tanya and her family are "put out" of their apartment ...and she does something about it. Realistic and pleasing, with perceptive black and white paintings of the inner city.

- A realistic and moving story dealing with divorce and its affects on a young girl...illustrations greatly enhance the text.

- Alice, hurt and angry over Claire's devotion to her new pet, decides to teach her a lesson...a story about best friends.
