ABSTPACT

Descriptive information is given for 80 organizations. The organizations are concerned with world studies ranging from global population concerns to specific cultural societies. They represent global issues concerning education and teaching, international education, population and fcod, war and peace, religion, economics, and ocean education. Others promote understanding of more specific world elements such as Eastern arts and cultures of Africa, Asia, and the Mid East. For a few organizations, only title, address, and purpose are given. Most entries also include (1) telephone number: (2) lists of materials such as journals; libraries, classes, and programs; (3) costs and possible uses of materials; and (4) comments relating to availability and level of sophistication of specific materials. Purpose

The Academy is a non-profit organization concerned with promoting the "... synoptic (over-all) approach to the study of world affairs. The world is seen as a whole and each individual as one part of the continuum of mankind." The Academy is also concerned with problems of communication and views of probable and desirable futures.

## Materials

- 1) Classes -- are offered in foreign languages, English-As-A-Second-Language, Alternative Routes to World Government, Cross-Cultural Encounters, World-view Perspective, and Toward Century 21 (ascourse of possible futures in the year 2000). Credit is offered by arrangement with some of the area's universities and the course, Worldview Perspective, has been offered as an extension course at neighboring institutions, including the University, of California at Berkeley. Many are evening classes. Teaching methods used are not of the standard variety. The Academy attempts to get as much diversity as possible in its programs by encouraging small classes, involving high school students and adults including retired persons asparticipants.
- 2) A one page newsletter, Worldview/San Francisco, is published at unknown intervals which provides news of Academy activities.
- 3) The Academy has holdings of information compiled by its director and available to students and members on its worldview philosophy and related subjects.
- 4) The ongoing "World Ombudsman" program, an independent study, research, and training program under faculty direction is also available.

Vary. \$50 to \$300 for courses, averaging to about \$150. Some scholarships are available.

Possible Uses

The Academy would be of direct interest primarily to people within the San Francisco Bay area in California. It has had experience in dealing with widely divergent groups of people and topics and emphasizes community programs and inter-cultural and foreign affairs.

The magazine is pitched to average or above average high school students.

Note
The Institute is by far the most active organization in African Area Studies and its materials should be seriously considered by anyone teaching a course dealing with Africa. Africa Report is highly recommended as being very useful to students and Thformative on many aspects of Africa in a generalist fashion. The School Services Division will answer specific questions and one should feel free to consult with them as they have a great deal to offer on Africa.

#### Purpose

From the materials reviewed, the Centre seems interested in promoting and siding English teacher's efforts in U.S. and European relations.

## Materials

- The World and the School is a magazine published 3 times a year for \$5.50. Each issue contains several articles on a single topic, e.g. Crime and Punishment, Europe and America, The Media, the international economic situation, etc. School teachers then comment on the articles and how to use them. A resume of the news of the period covered by the issue is also inserted. Other articles on international affairs and the teaching of them are included as well. The magazine is oriented toward British teachers and its terminology and slant may strike the reader somewhat askance. The latter is provocative on occasion. The magazine's articles would be suitable for above average high school students as well as teachers. Its differences from the standard product would make it best suited to the more sophisticated student.
- World Survey, a monthly publication in which each issue is devoted to a single country or issue of international importance. More wideranging than 1) above, this publication includes one or more articles on the subject with a bibliography and a one-page summary of the worlds events. Again the articles are for the above average high schooler and are written from a European point of view. Cost is \$5.00 per year.
- Crisis Papers are a series of occasional papers dealing with specific topics (e.g. "China and the U.N.," "Bangla Desn: War as an Instrument of Policy," "Community Violence the Challenge of the Urban Guerilla," etc.) In each, newspaper commentaries are printed with a summarizing statement or introduction. Some of these topics are of marginal concern to U.S. schools, for example \$29, "Northern Ireland: The White Paper," and newspaper commentary points of view are not as clearly different as in other areas. Others, notably \$19, "Bangla Desh: War as an Instrument of Policy," among those reviewed, have much stronger divergence in the commentaries and points of view. As of late 1973 some 32 of these Papers were published. Many of them are still available and deal exclusively with international events. Some are available in French and German as well as English. The cost of 7 consecutive issues is \$4.50 airmail and of single copies is \$.75 airmail. A guide for suggested use is also available."
- 4) Reports of seminars on teaching international studies in British secondary schools are also available. They are, as of late 1972, National Stereotypes -- An Educational Challenge, \$.60, Interdisciplinary Studies



in Secondary Schools, \$1.00, Teaching About the American Impact on Europe, Learning About International Institutions in Secondary Schools, Teaching About Collective Security and Conflict, and Television and World Affairs Teaching in Schools. Each contains papers and summaries of discussion presented at the seminar. Several titles were available for review and each contained factual articles rather than methods. National Stereotypes was particularly interesting due to several articles on stereotypes of Americans held by Europeans.

5) Correspondents World Wide, a loose leaf commentary on world affairs periodically updated and with statistical annexes is available for \$35.00 a year. It was unavailable for review.

#### Note

The greatest value of these materials is that they are not American, and as such present a different view of the world than the one we are used to. This is systematically exploited by using differing accounts and opinions of events in the Crisis Papers series. The World and the School and to a lesser extent World Survey exhibit differences as well. Unfortunately, the National Stereotypes report contained pieces of papers rather than the papers themselves, but even so, the stereotypes of Americans and American youth held by students in Europe would be an excellent place to start a discussion of views of other cultures and stereotyping in general. Considering that European culture is lumped with American culture as "Western," the differences could help expose the large differences in viewpoints held even by culturally related peoples.
