ABSTRACT

To assess the informational and recreational reading needs of the inmates in Texas prison units, surveys were conducted at one male and one female correctional facility. Prison populations were identified by age, race, and educational level. Subjects for the preference study were asked questions regarding: (1) reading background; (2) book preferences; (3) newspapers and magazines; (4) television and radio; (5) music; and (6) other background information. The survey results are presented in tabular summaries. The appendixes contain copies of survey questionnaires. (EMH)

## Matching the Library and the Inmate

### DETERMINING INMATE INTERESTS IN ORDER TO BETTER REFINE LIBRARY SERVICES

Traditionally, selection of library materials and program planning for the incarcerated has been done, not through the eyes and experience of inmates, but by free world librarians, teachers and correctional personnel. Since inmates have informational and recreational reading needs that arise from their isolation, it is important to identify their interests. In this way, prison librarians can better determine the materials to select and purchase, the programs and services to continue or initiate, and the kind of educational consultive work to be done with the school staff.

In discussions with the Director of Library Services for Texas Department of Corrections, it was decided to give a general interest survey to ascertain the specific interests and reading desires of some Texas inmates. It was felt that this was the most efficient way to upgrade library service in the Texas prison Units. This report deals with a survey which focused on prisoners in one men's institution and one women's institution.

Before beginning the survey analysis, two basic facts must be established: One, no subjective speculations or interpretations of data will be made on the part of the researcher. This report deals with the statistical results (reported by sex and race) of the interest surveys. Secondly, it must be emphasized that the results of this interest study are not purported to be applicable to all inmates in Texas or in other States. The men's Unit, Ferguson, is one for first offenders, ages 17-21. It will be necessary to give similar interest or reading surveys to a random sample on each of the Texas prison units in order to determine the interests peculiar to each population. The results for the men's institution only may be applied successfully to similar groups according to age, race and educational level. The results of the women's study can be applied to more varied groups because the Goree Unit is the only women's unit in the state of Texas at present, and as such has a diverse, conglomerant population of all ages and offenses.

The Survey: The survey as given to the inmates was compiled using published and unpublished examples of other surveys and from a TDC Library survey, which had not been given to the inmates.

One attribute of giving a survey, reading or general interest, is that the researcher can readily locate bad wording in questions, new categories which should be added or questions which should be deleted. If a question is answered incorrectly by a large percentage of the respondents, inadequacies can be identified, either in wording or content. Also, write-ins and comments can help to determine new areas which should be included in future surveys. This researcher has attempted to point out flaws discovered in administering this survey, and suggest possible changes.

The Sample: The idea for the interest study was initiated during a nine week period when several Sam Houston State University graduate library science majors were conducting group book discussions with inmates on the Ferguson and Goree Units. The original reading project was an experimental study conducted through the Research Department of TDC to determine whether group book discussions help effect attitude changes. Therefore, for statistical purposes the initial sample was random, controlling for ability to read and expiration of sentence (not to be released prior to the end of the program, June, 1975). Meetings were held for these statistically random groups in which the program was explained, and afterwards inmates were asked to volunteer for the discussion program. It was unfortunate that men under 20 and Black women were reluctant to volunteer, because at the time the larger control group was randomly selected for the testing, it was impossible to balance the disproportionate groupings that had resulted with the first volunteer groups. Below is a statistical comparison of the inmates surveyed (sample) and the total inmates in each institution (population).

During the nine weeks of the reading sessions, the sample of Chicanos diminished in size; therefore the interest study can only be analyzed for Whites and Blacks. Most Chicanos were either transferred to other prison units, or did not show up on the day of the test. One Chicana even escaped during the nine week period! For the final week only five Chicanos

took the test. The researcher and the Director of the Library felt that it would be unfair to report any findings based on this low number. It will be necessary to retest another random sample at another date in order to determine the general interests of Chicanos.

Admittedly, the samples were small in actual numbers. 5% of the men's institution, and 11% of the women's institution were given the survey. The main defense in the size of the male sample is that almost all the inmates in the institution are between the ages of 17 and 21, and the sample is statistically comparable to the overall population in race. (refer to above table) Also, the offense most often cited in each institution is statistically similar: males - robbery - population 31.7%; sample 36.8%. Females - dangerous drugs - population 25.4%; sample 33.3%.

It appears important at this point to bring out differences in the manner in which the various groups responded to the survey. As a total group, the men were much more responsive than were the women. The male respondents left very few questions blank; on ranking questions, they ranked more of the categories; they added comments and explanations to answers; and in the "other" categories, they almost always wrote in additional choices or preferences. On the other hand, the women not only left questions blank, but unfortunately on many of the ranking questions, they only indicated their first choices. With the "other" categories, they seldom wrote in additional preferences.

As already explained, part of the sample on both units consisted of groups which were meeting weekly for reading and discussions. These groups, male and female, with which rapport had been established, answered the survey more conscientiously by following directions more closely and writing in fewer caustic remarks than did the larger control groups.

Question Analysis: The survey questions are presented in the following pages. They are grouped according to general categories of information, and not necessarily according to the order of appearance on the survey. The grouped categories are:

- Reading Background Information
- Books
- Newspapers and Magazines
- Television and Radio
- Music
- Other Background Information

Some questions are explained, some analyzed, and in some cases, the chart diagram stands without interpretation. The results are divided by race (excluding Chicanos) and sex.

READING BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This question was intended to have some built-in reliability for question 1 on the survey, "Why do you go to the library?" (see below). For all groups except White women, the results appear reliable.

Males: White men cited their predominant reason for reading is for enjoyment, 93%, with the second reason being to get their minds off their problems, 64%. In question 1, pleasure reading and relaxation were the reasons ranked first for going to the library. Black men indicated by 93% that they read for information, with the next highest percentages falling under enjoyment and to get their minds off their problems. In question one, 43% ranked research their primary reason for going to the library. And, pleasure reading (43%) was in second place. Females: The White women's responses are pretty well distributed, with reading for information receiving the most responses (70%) and for enjoyment the next (60%). But in question 1, they ranked pleasure reading as their first reason for attending the library. With the Black women the reliability factor seems to reappear, for 67% indicated that they read for enjoyment, and the same percentage ranked pleasure reading first in question 1 as to why they go to the library.

None of the women indicated that they do not go to the library, while 14% of the White men and 7% of the Black men do not go. Pleasure reading is the primary reason most groups cite for going to the library.

**\*\*Often when people are learning to read or trying to improve their reading, they have problems of various kinds. What kinds of problems do you run into? (Question 10)**

Vocabulary was by far the reason most listed by women and men. White M, 43%; Black M, 43%; White F, 10%; Black F, 47%. The men cited more difficulties in reading than did the women. Many of the women did not answer the question, while very few of the men left the question blank. Most males either indicated a problem or they wrote in "none." Some other specific problems listed were: not enough time to read, tired eyes, lack of good books, keeping mind on the subject, falling to sleep, noise, and understanding the subject content.

**\*\*How many books do you average reading? \_\_\_ per week \_\_\_ per month \_\_\_ per year (Question 20)**

This question and the results must be disregarded because of the high proportion of incorrect, and sometimes absurd, answers. It apparently was not clear that the respondent was to answer only one blank, (which ever applied to his or her reading habits.) The question was answered incorrectly by 50% of the White males; 64%, Black males; 40%, White females; and 40%, Black females. These figures seem justification to either reword the question or delete it from future surveys.

The above chart indicates not only the preferred types of material (by total responses), but also the percentage favoring each type. Some inmates starred more than one favorite type of reading material, while others did not star any. Males: 86% of the Whites like to read paperback books, and 71% named them as the favorite reading material. 79% of the Blacks prefer to read paperbacks, but magazines appeared as their favorite reading material, by 36%. Females: Paperbacks and magazines received an equal number of responses from the white women, 90% each. The indications for favorites were well distributed, with paperbacks receiving the most at 40%. With the Black women, magazines received the most responses, 53%. Again, the starred categories were well distributed, but hardback books are slightly favored (33%).

\*\*Is there any book you would like to read that the library doesn't have? (Question 21)

Inmates were told before the testing began that this question would be treated as a specific request. 60% of the men turned in requests, and 33% of the women. The inmates' requests were forwarded to the Library Director so that processing could be done immediately.

\*\*Do you know how to request a specific book from the Unit Library? (Question 22)

The main flaw with this inquiry is that not all the inmates ranked all the categories -- but, that should have been made mandatory in the instructions for the question. Males: Fiction, by 50%, is the first choice of White men, with western life taking second place, 43%. Other than 36% who ranked travel as their fourth choice of reading material, the answers were very dispersed. The "other" category included: Occult, sex books, and science fiction. (As an interesting aside, one science fiction buff wrote on his survey, "To be a science fiction writer, you have to build a new world, a new society and a new people.") Fiction is also the first choice of Black men, but not by as great a percentage, 29%. The other rankings were more scattered than for the White males. Females: White women also prefer fiction, 40%, with biography second, 30%.

The rankings of the Black women are slightly more grouped than those for other inmates. Fiction was preferred by 33% as first choice and 27% as second choice. 27% also placed poetry in first place. Members of both groups of women inmates added art to the "other" category.

Because the rankings are so very scattered for the most part and because all choices were not ranked, it may be helpful to present the results of this question in another manner: by the percentage of total responses to each kind of book. In this way, it can be seen how many of the respondees used each kind of book in their considerations.

This discussion will place more emphasis on the total percentage of responses to each type of character, rather than on the indicated favorites, because many inmates, male and female, did not star a favorite, and some starred all of their responses. Males: All groups appear to like to read about beautiful or handsome people, with White males having the highest percentage of responses, 71%, and Black females the lowest. The same percentage of White men (71%) also indicated a preference for bewitched characters. Someone from the street (57%), one who becomes rich (50%), and one who is sophisticated or cool (50%), also are pre-

ferences of this group. As stated, Black males also prefer to read about beautiful or handsome characters, (50%). The sophisticated or cool character also received 50% of the responses. Those two categories placing second for Black males were bewitched, and someone from the street, both 43%. Females: White women prefer, only by 10%, to read about people who become rich, 70% total responses. Three categories received 60% each of the responses: beautiful or handsome, mentally superior, sophisticated or cool. The preferences of the Black women, at 40% each, are someone from the street and someone who is sophisticated or cool. The bewitched category is second at 33%, and beautiful or handsome, third, at 27%.

As seen in the analysis on preference of type of reading material (Question 6), all groups of inmates indicated preferences for magazines; therefore the results of this question become very important since the Windham libraries do not at present furnish a wide variety of magazine titles on the Units.

The wording of the question was inconsistent; either all choices should have been specific magazine titles or they should have all been subject areas. For future surveys this flaw should be corrected.

Several racial differences in the preference of magazines occur: Black magazines such as Ebony - White M, 0%; Black M, 93%; White F, 20%; Black F, 93%. Preferences for Reader's Digest produced wide racial differences - White M, 57%; Black M, 29%; White F, 70%; Black F, 13%. Other differences that appear are more pronounced by sex; these are evident with women's magazines, men's magazines, movie and television, and love and romance.

All groups except the Black women listed other magazine titles they liked: Males: Rolling Stone, Hit Parade, Science Fiction Analog, Street Chopper, Easy Rider, Circus, Creem, Guitar Player, Jet, Players, Sepia, Black Stars and western types. Females: National Geographic, Holiday, Saturday Review, Fortune, Viva, Harper's, People and National Lampoon.

The similarities and differences of the inmate groups in choices for TV programs can be observed easily in the above chart.

Because of the vast number of different television programs, this was a difficult question to formulate; finally it was decided to borrow a television-oriented inquiry from another interest survey. It still has not been decided whether the answer choices should be uniform by title or type, or if the mixed question (as given in this survey) is an adequate one.

Since inmates in three of the four groups wrote in "organ," it would seem that the term should be added to the list of musical instruments in future surveys.

This question elicited the most responses from all groups for most inmates marked multiple ways in which they pass their time. Reading a book or magazine during free time is a preference for all groups, with

three groups giving it the highest percentage of responses. White M, 64%; Black M, 57%; Black F, 67%. White women, who slightly favor watching TV, 70%, gave reading a close second at 60%. Since several women, both Black and White, wrote in crochet, knit, etc. in the "other" category, an activity such as "Crafts and hobbies" should be added to future surveys. Also, a few of the men added activities such as "leatherwork." Interestingly, one man commented that his favorite past time is "observing people."

The following three questions are classified as rapport building, and will not be analyzed in this research report. Although the Windham School District Librarians felt they possibly could use some selected information from the results, the main purpose for the questions was to show interest in the inmates as individuals. Because the nature of the questions is to help develop rapport, it is suggested by the researcher that this section of questions be arranged earlier in the questionnaire, possibly as the first or second section.

\*\*What kind of work have you done in the free world? (Question 13)

\*\*What kind of work are you doing at TDC now? (Question 14)

\*\*What is the last grade you completed in school? (Question 15)

What age were you when you left school?

What reasons did you have for leaving school? (You may have had more than one reason.)

(for a complete list of reasons, refer to questionnaire, Attachment 1)

The first part of Question 15, concerning last grade completed in school, is useful in selection of library materials, but the Research Department of TDC can obtain accurate information from the data banks on the inmates. Again, the question, especially the last part dealing with reasons for leaving school, was aimed at showing personal interest in the inmates. Most answer choices are loaded with emotion or convenient excuses, but many of the inmates, both men and women, wrote in their own reasons for leaving school. For example, "just got tired," "got in trouble with the law," "Got married," "acid head, couldn't handle school."

Several games were listed in the "other" category, some of which can be included in future surveys: archery, backgammon, foosball, dice (listed by 20%, total inmates), and chess. Since field sports (baseball, football, etc.) were not included in the answer choices, several inmates listed them, also.

It seems that the compilers of the survey were negligent in the wording of this question, because the items listed were not a good representation of all types of game activities. The question needs to be reworded for future surveys.

The following questions deal with background information concerning library usage. As stated earlier, one of the things a researcher learns in administering an interest survey is how to refine the survey, by adding or deleting categories or by rewording questions. In most instances with the next series of questions, certain information was sought, but due to non-specific wording of the questions, the possibility is recognized that the results may not be valid percentages in terms of what the survey compilers were seeking. Perhaps the questions could have been worded differently, or left out altogether. Also, it is possible that the questions should have occupied different positions in the survey.

The information desired was whether these people regularly used the public library. Perhaps the information could have been gained more accurately if a time element had been included in the question, i.e. once a week, once a month, etc.

The information desired by the Windham Librarians for the planning and scheduling of orientation classes, was whether the inmates had ever received formal instruction in the use of a library. It is felt that the question was not specific enough in the type of instruction the individual has previously had.

This question appears to be specific enough, and therefore the results valid. But, the confusing fact remains that during the discussion sessions after the survey, many inmates complained that they could not find books in the libraries.

It is unfortunate that the wording in the first part of this question was "any kind of library." While the compilers of the survey were thinking of organized libraries housed as separate units in the school, some inmates may have interpreted a library quite differently: During discussion one inmate commented on his school library, "I used the library alot. My history teacher had a couple of shelves of books in his room and we used them for papers and book reports."

In the last part of the question, "Did you use it often?", the term "often" should have been defined with a time element, as with the use of the public library.

## SUMMATION

The work of formulating, giving and analyzing this survey has been an invaluable experience in terms of discovering pertinent, useful information about inmate interests. As a result of gaining this knowledge, library services can be greatly upgraded and expanded on the Ferguson and Goree Units. Also, through the inmate responses, a good deal was gained in understanding the strengths and weaknesses of the present survey. For future use, it is recommended that the questionnaire be refined and the order of some questions changed as suggested in this report.

It is further recommended that the Texas Department of Corrections/Windham School District Librarians administer an interest survey to a random sample of Chicanos on Ferguson and Goree Units. In addition, it will be valuable to survey interests in the other prison units in order to better refine library services in all areas of selecting and programming.
