## ABSTRACT

The responses of the Black entering full-time freshman (B) at UTK are compared with those of the nonblack (NB) at UTK as well as those of the norm group from predominantly black colleges (PBC) on descriptive, attitudinal, and expectancy items of the annual ACE freshman survey. Black students at UTK, like the nonblack, are younger and more recent high school graduates than PBC' students. The B's also come from a more affluent background than PCB and have less financial worries; the parents of Bs are better educated than those of PCB. The degree aspirations of B and PCB were similar, although more B than PCB aimed at the medical professions and less toward business education. More B than NB or PBC anticipated satisfaction with college. The life objectives of B and PBC were similar. There was considerably more concern by NB than B or PBC that large families should be discouraged. PBC and, to a lesser degree, B had concern that the government was not encouraging desegregation. quickly enough and students from disadvantaged social backgrounds should be given preferential treatment in college admissions. A Comparison of Black Entering Full-Time Freshmen at The University of Tennessee, Knoxville with Other Groups, Fall 1973

In addition to the yearly study of entering freshmen at The University of Tennessee, Knoxville (UTK) conducted for the American Council on / Education (ACE), additional analyses were performed on the group that designated their racial background as at least partly Black/Negro/Afro-American (B). (The student was asked to mark all racial backgrounds that applied). One comparison group included those UTK students who did not consider themselves as Black (NB). Another comparison group included those students enrolled in predominantly Black colleges (PBC). The purpose of these comparisons was to assist the administration in recruiting and advising efforts for minority students.

## Results

The UTK B students, like the NB students, are younger and have more recently been graduated from high school than those found at PBC. More B students live in dorms and fewer live at home than PBC. Almost 50 percent of B stated that their current religious preference was Baptist. For ty percent of the 87 B respondents also marked a white/Caucasian background. This racial mixture was much higher for B than for PBC.

The reported parental income for B was higher than that for PBC, but around 80 percent of both groups expressed concern about financing college as opposed to slightly over 50 percent of the NB group. PBC had less support from family than B and more support for scholarships and grants. Over 30 percent of PBC stated that they were financially independent this year as opposed to less than 20 percent of B and 8 percent of NB.

Over 90 percent of the fathers of B and NB were currently employed as compared to around 75 percent of PBC.

Both parents of B were better educated, as measured by the amount of education, than the parents of PBC. The degree aspirations for B and PBC were quite similar with slightly less than 20 percent having a goal of a baccalaureate degree, over 40 percent a Master's degree, and slightly less than 20 percent an academic doctorate. One noticeable difference was the goal of a professional doctorate in the health area. Over 17 percent of B claimed this goal while less than 7 percent of PBC expressed such an expectation. The choice of health professions as a major field of study and teh career occupation of M.D. or D.D.S. supported the data in deep aspirations. Slightly more PBC than B chose education and business as probable major fields of study, while the reverse was true for engineering.

When asked what reasons were deemed very important for a long-term career choice, over 70 percent of B and PBC selected high anticipated earnings, can be helpful to others, and able to work with people. Over 70 percent of PBC chose two additional items, job openings available and intrinsic interest in the field, which were selected by 50 to 60 percent of B. Between 60 and 70 percent of B and PBC chose also the chance for steady progress and contribution to society. Rapid advancement, a respected occupation, and a chance for steady progress were more important variables to B and PBC than NB.

In addition to the work area, the students were asked which of the life objectives listed were considered essential or very important.

Over 80 percent of B and between 70 and 80 percent of PBC selected helping others in difficulty and developing a meaningful philosophy of life. Over 70 percent of PBC, but slightly less B, chose to be an authority in their field and be well-off financially. Near 50 percent of both B and PBC selected also to raise a family, be successful in

their own business, and become a community leader.

When asked about agreement with statements regarding the government, this university, etc., strong agreement was expressed (around 80 percent) by all groups regarding the facts that the government was not controlling pollution, women should receive the same salary and opportunities for advancement as men in comparable positions, and the government was not protecting the consumer. Around 70 percent of all three groups felt that the wealthy should pay a larger share of taxes than they do now, faculty promotions should be based in part on student evalutions, and a college should use the same performance standards in awarding degrees to all students even if it employes open admissions. A majority of all groups felt that a college education increases one's earning power, but the response rate was heavier by B and considerably greater by PBC. A majority of B and an even greater portion of PBC felt that the federal government was not doing enough to promote school desegregation and students from disadvantaged social backgrounds should be given preferentia treatment in college admissions. Fifty percent of PBC felt that student publications should be regulated by college officials, and open admissions should be adopted by all sublicly supported colleges. Over 70 percent of the NB thought large families should be discouraged and 50 percent of the same group agreed that there is too much concern in the courts for the rights of criminals. Little agreement by any group was found for two items with PBC being strongest (25 percent) and NB weakest: college officials have the right to regulate student behavior off campus and ban speakers on campus.

Another group of data concerned selected activities or events that the respondents felt had a good chance of occurrence. Over 60 percent

of PBC and almost 80 percent of B and NB thought they would receive a Bachelor's degree. Satisfaction with college was anticipated by over 50 percent PBC, over 60 percent NB, and over 70 percent B. Around 60 percent of all groups felt that they would find a job after graduation in the field for which they were trained.

A final analysis involved the reasons noted as very important in selecting the institution they were attending. Only one response selection involved a majority of every group. Over 50 percent of NB and PBC and over 70 percent of B selected the item stating that this college has a very good academic reputation. Special education program offerings were chosen by 48 percent of B, 32 percent of PBC, and 25 percent of NB.

Around 30 percent of B and NB as opposed to 20 percent of PBC wanted to live away from home. Financial considerations were considered more important by PBC than the others. Over 40 percent PBC were attending that institution because they were given financial assistance, while over 20 percent of B and less than 10 percent of NB noted this as being a very important reason for their choice. Over 20 percent PBC and less than 15 percent B and NB considered the tuition low enough to be a choice factor.

Black students at UTK, like the non-Black, are younger and more recent high school graduates than students at predominantly Black colleges. The B's also come from a more affluent background than PBC and, thus, have less financial corries about supporting their education. The

parents of B are better educated than those of PBC.

Summary of Comparison Groups

The degree aspirations of B and PBC were similar. However, more B than PBC were aimed toward the medical professions and less toward

business and education. UTK was selected by a considerably greater percentage of B than NB (or the distitutions for PBC) because it had a good academic reputation. Also, special education program offerings were considered more important in the selection of a college by B than by NB or PBC. More B than NB or PBC anticipated satisfaction with college.

The life objectives of B and PBC were similar. There was considerably more concern by NB than B or PBC that large families should be discouraged. PBC and, to a lesser degree, B had concern that the government was not encouraging desegregation quickly enough and students from disadvantaged social backgrounds should be given preferential treatment in concept admissions.
