ABSTRACT.

The Maryland State Board for Higher Education publishes this annual report to disseminate information on admission's requirements, tuition and fees, program offerings, and financial aid available to Maryland citizens seeking educational opportunities beyond high school. It provides a description of state and federal financial aid programs, the State Board's policies for student transfer, and profiles of expenses, admissions, and financial aids at Maryland institutions of higher education. 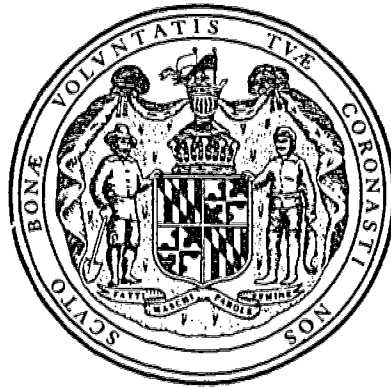

INTRODUCTION

In cooperation with Maryland's public and private postsecondary educational institutions, the Maryland State Board for Higher Education utilizes this publication to annually disseminate information on admissions requirements, tuition and required fees, program offerings, and student financial assistance available to Maryland's citizens seeking educational opportunities beyond high school.

The publication reveals that Maryland's high school graduates have a wide variety of program opportunities available to them in the State's postsecondary educational institutions. The Maryland State Board for Higher Education encourages high school counselors and college administrators to share this publication with students so they may be aware of these opportunities.

The Board makes this publication available to any student, faculty member or administrator upon request. Copies of the publication have been forwarded to: College administrators, pupil services personnel and high school counselors in the State of Maryland.

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I. DESCRIPTION OF FINANCIAL AIDS

I. State Programs

MARYLAND STATE SCHOLARSHIPS

The General Assembly of the State of Maryland has enacted legislation creating several programs of scholarships and grants to help those citizens of the State who need financial assistance in order to secure for themselves the benefits of a college education, on both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

GENERAL STATE SCHOLARSHIPS

Eligibility:

Any Maryland high school senior, or graduate of prior years, is eligible to compete for a General State Scholarship. A candidate already attending college who has completed at least one academic year and who is in good academic standing may be awarded a General State scholarship without having to take the qualifying examination.

Number of Scholarships

No fixed number of awards is provided. Each legislative district is allocated a percentage of the total General Scholarship funds based on the number of Delegates it sends to the Maryland General Assembly.

How Awarded:

Awards are made by the State Scholarship Board based upon the student's scores on the College Entrance Examination Board Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and demonstrated financial need. Scores earned on the American College Testing (ACT) examination are acceptable for students who have not taken the SAT and who must take the ACT for college admission.

Value of Award:

Each scholarship unit has a value of \$100. Units may not be divided. No recipient may be granted more than 15 units (\$1,500.) or less than 2 units (\$200.) per year. The stipend may be applied to the costs of tuition, mandatory fees, and/or room and board.

Eligible Institutions:

Eligible institutions are those degree-granting institutions of higher education within the State of Maryland whose curriculums are approved by the State Board for Higher Education.

Conditions of Award:

Each scholarship recipient is required to:

1. Be a legal resident of the legislative district from which he expects to receive a scholarship award.
2. Have a definite financial need.
3. Be accepted for admission as a full-time student (minimum 12 semester hours) in one of the eligible institutions.

Application:

A student who wishes to be considered for a General State scholarship must file an application card AND a Parents' Confidential Statement (PCS) with Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey 08540 NO LATER than December 1, of the year prior to award. Detailed instructions on how to apply are on the application forms. The required forms may be obtained from any high school or college in the State, or from the State Scholarship Board.

SENATORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Description:

Each State Senator has an annual quota of scholarship units which may be awarded to residents of his Senatorial district or subdistrict. Recipients of Senatorial Scholarships may place them with any one of the eligible institutions.

Eligibility:

Any Maryland high school senior, or graduate of prior years, is eligible to compete for a Senatorial scholarship. A candidate already attending college who has completed at least one academic year in good standing may be awarded a scholarship without having to take the qualifying examination.

How Awarded:

Senatorial Scholarships are awarded on the basis of a student's financial need. Scholarship appointments are made by the appointing authority for the Senatorial district or subdistrict in which the applicant resides. Applicants may not be considered if all application procedures have not been followed.

Value of Award:

Each scholarship unit has a value of \$100. Units may not be divided. No recipient may be granted more than 15 units (\$1,500.) or less than 2 units (\$200.) per year. The stipend may be used for tuition, mandatory fees, and/or room and board.

Eligible Institutions:

Eligible institutions are those degree-granting institutions of higher education within this State whose curriculums are approved by the State Board for Higher Education.

Conditions of Award:

Each scholarship recipient is required to:

1. Be a legal resident of the legislative district from which he seeks an award.
2. Be accepted for admission to the regular undergraduate program of the institution at which the award is to be used.

Application:

A student who wishes to be considered for a Senatorial scholarship must file an application card AND a Parents' Confidential Statement (PCS) with Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey 08540. IN ADDITION, a Senatorial scholarship candidate must file a "special" Senatorial application with his State Senator. Detailed instructions on how to apply are on the application forms. The required forms may be obtained from any high school or college in the State, or from the State Scholarship Board.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES SCHOLARSHIPS

Each member of the House of Delegates may appoint during his term of office two (2) students from his district, selected on any basis, who shall be educated free of charge for tuition and mandatory fees at the University of Maryland, any Maryland State college, St. Mary's College of Maryland, or any public community college within the State. Grants used at the private colleges within the State shall not exceed \$750 per semester. The Delegate scholarships may be divided at the discretion of the Delegate into equal two-year scholarships and four students may be appointed to two-year scholarships, or one student may be given a four-year award and two additional students may receive two-year scholarships. These scholarships may also be used on a part-time basis (minimum 6 semester hours). Application should be made directly to the State Delegate.

WAR ORPHANS GRANTS

Description:

The War Orphans awards were established by the Maryland General Assembly to provide a certain measure of financial aid to those children who lost one or both parents during and after World War II in military service, or whose parent is a totally and permanently disabled veteran. The statute was amended in 1973 to include children of certain service personnel classified as M.I.A. or as a P.O.W.

Eligibility:

Any child between the ages of 16 and 23 whose parent was a legal resident of the State of Maryland prior to entering the Armed Forces and whose parent was killed in action or who died or was totally and permanently disabled as a result of such service after December 7, 1941, is eligible to apply for this aid. In addition, the child of any person in the Armed Forces who was declared by the Department of Defense to be a P.O.W. or M.I.A. as a result of armed conflict in Southeast Asia on or after January 1, 1960, who at the time he was declared to be a P.O.W. or M.I.A. was a resident of Maryland is eligible. Only children born prior to or during the time the person was a P.O.W. or M.I.A. are eligible for a grant. These awards are not based on competitive examinations. The awards are made by the State Scholarship Board upon proper legal certification of eligibility.

Value of Award:

The State will pay up to \$500 per year to the approved institution selected by the student.

Eligible Institutions:

Any school approved by the Maryland State Scholarship Board which offers

post-high school education or training is an eligible institution. Eligible schools may be either in-State or out-of-State institutions.

Application. for such aid should be made through the State Scholarship Board.

"OTHER RACE" GRANT PROGRAM IN THE STATE'S COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

The Other Race Grant Program provides assistance to qualified students to enable them to attend one of the participating State Colleges and Universities where their race is in the minority. Participating institutions are Bowle State College, Coppin State College, Frostburg State College, Salisbury State College, St. Mary's College of Maryland, Towson State University, Morgan State University, and the University of Baltimore.

Eligibility:

Financial aid officers at the participating colleges are responsible for determining which undergraduate students are eligible and the amount of the grant, based on the students' financial needs.

Only United States citizens who are legal residents of the State of Maryland are eligible to receive a grant.

Terms and Conditions:

There are no repayments. If matching funds are used from Federal or other student assistance programs, the student is obligated to abide by the rules of that program.

The student will be guaranteed an annual amount (two semesters); however, the grant will be administered on a semester basis.

Grant continuance for the succeeding semester is subject to the student's ability to maintain "good standing". A student is in "good standing" when he is eligible to continue in attendance at the College in which he is enrolled, in accordance with the College's standards and practices.

Once that student has been awarded a grant, he is eligible to re-apply for a grant continuance for the succeeding year.

VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION GRANTS

The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation sponsors eligible handicapped individuals to post-high school training and specific college training when indicated. For more information contact the local Maryland Rehabilitation office.

REIMBURSEMENT OF FIREMEN

Description:

Firemen, rescue squadmen, volunteer firemen and volunteer rescue squadmen are entitled to be reimbursed by the State Scholarship Board for tuition costs of programs of study in "fire service technology" or related courses.

Eligibility:

Applicants must be actively employed as a fireman or rescue squadman in an organized fire department or rescue squad in the State, or be engaged as a volunteer fireman or volunteer rescue squadman in an organized volunteer fire department or volunteer rescue squad in the State.

How Awarded:

Reimbursement may be made one year after the successful completion of each year of study upon application to the State Scholarship Board.

Value of Award:

Reimbursement will be made to cover the full cost of tuition for programs of study which are credited toward the requirements of a college degree in "fire service technology."

Eligible Institutions:

Eligible institutions are those degree-granting institutions of higher education and junior colleges within the State of Maryland whose curriculums are approved by the State Board for Higher Education.

Application:

Application for reimbursement should be made through the State Scholarship Board.

CHILDREN OF DECEASED FIREMEN, LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS, RESCUE SQUAD MEMBERS, AND MARYLAND NATIONAL GUARDSMEN

Any child between the ages of 16 and 23 whose parent was a fireman, professional or volunteer, a law enforcement officer, a member of a rescue squad, or a member of the Maryland National Guard of the State or any of its legislative districts, killed in line of duty may apply for one of these scholarships.

How Awarded:

These awards are not based on competitive examinations. The awards are made by the State Scholarship Board upon proper certification of eligibility and upon demonstrated financial need.

Value of Award:

These scholarships have a maximum value of seven hundred dollars (\$700.) per year and may be applied toward the cost of tuition, matriculation fees, room and board, books and supplies.

Eligible Institutions:

Eligible institutions are those degree-granting institutions of higher education within the State of Maryland whose curriculums are approved by the State Board for Higher Education.

Application for such aid should be made through the State Scholarship Board.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR TEACHERS OF THE DEAF

Eligibility:

Eligibility is limited to those persons who (1) are senior undergraduate students or candidates for a Master's Degree in the area of education of persons with impaired hearing, including the deaf, (2) are recommended by the training center after consultation with the Maryland State Department of Education, and (3) have the requisite financial need.

Number of Scholarships:

Thirty scholarships are awarded each year, 15 scholarships for teachers in the School for the Deaf and 15 scholarships for teachers in the Public Schools or State approved Non-public schools.

How Awarded:

Scholarships are awarded by the State Scholarship Board on the basis of the candidate's application and financial need.

Value of Award:

Each scholarship is in an amount equal to the annual costs of tuition at the training center.

Eligible Institutions:

Any accredited college or university in this State having a program approved by the Maryland State Board for Higher Education for the training of teachers of persons with impaired hearing, including the deaf.

Application should be made through the State Scholarship Board.

MEDICAL SCHOLARSHIPS

The State of Maryland has authorized a number of scholarships to the School of Medicine of the University of Maryland for the courses of study leading to the degree of Doctor of Medicine.

Eligibility:

These scholarships may be awarded only to persons who:

1. Have been residents of Maryland for at least five years preceding the date of award.
2. Have received or will receive in the year of award a bachelor's degree from an accredited college.
3. Have been admitted to the School of Medicine of the University of Maryland.
4. Have definite financial need.
5. Give bond that they will engage in the general practice of medicine for three (3) years in an area of need in this State. The area of need shall be determined by the State Department of Health in consultation with the Medical and Chirurgical Faculty of Maryland.

Number of Scholarships:

Ten scholarships are awarded each year by the State Scholarship Board.

Value of Award:

Each scholarship has a value of \$1,500 per year and may be held for four years.

Application:

Application for a Medical scholarship should be made through the State Scholarship Board or the University of Maryland School of Medicine.

PROFESSIONAL SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS

Description:

Proceeds from a fee for special motor vehicle license plates are to be used for scholarships in the professional schools of medicine, dentistry, law, nursing, and pharmacy.

Eligibility:

Any student who has been a resident of this State for one year preceding the date of award and who has been admitted as a full-time student to one of the specified professional schools may apply for a scholarship.

Number of Scholarships:

The number of awards will be determined by the amount of money paid into a special fund for the use of these scholarships.

How Awarded:

Awards are made by the State Scholarship Board on the basis of the demonstrated financial need of the applicant.

Value of Award:

Each scholarship has a value of \$200. - \$1,000. per year towards tuition only. The money is paid to the eligible institution.

Duration of Award:

Contingent upon the amount of money paid into the special fund, one year scholarship renewals may be granted. However, no scholarship recipient may hold an award for more than four academic years.

Eligible Institutions:

Eligible institutions are those degree-granting institutions of higher education in this State which have established schools in the specified professional areas.

Application:

Applications for Professional Scholarships may be obtained from the Professional School or the State Scholarship Board.

UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND FELLOWSHIPS

The General Assembly of Maryland has created a number of Fellowships for postgraduate work in the Graduate School of the University of Maryland at College Park.

Eligibility:

Each fellowship recipient is required to:

1. Be a graduate of an accredited four-year college.
2. Be recommended for graduate study by the president of his college.
3. Execute an agreement that he will teach in a public institution of higher learning in the State of Maryland for a minimum of three(3) years following graduation.

Number of Scholarships:

Twelve (12) fellowships are awarded each year.

How Awarded:

Awards are made by the Fellowship Committee of the University of Maryland.

Value of Award:

Each award carries a maximum stipend of \$2,500 per year and may be held for three years.

Application:

Application should be made to the Fellowship Committee at the University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland, 20742.

FAMILY PRACTICE RESIDENCY AWARDS

The State of Maryland has authorized the State Scholarship Board to award 20 annual Residencies in Family Practice to be distributed among the hospitals in Maryland which offer accredited Family Practice Residency programs.

Eligibility:

These grants may be awarded to persons who:

1. Are graduates of and holding a medical degree from an approved medical school
2. Have been accepted into an approved Family Practice Residency program in Maryland
3. Furnish a surety bond to the State of Maryland that they will engage in the family practice of medicine for three years in an area of need within this State.

Value of Award:

Each grant is in the amount of \$15,000 per year and may be held for not more than three years.

Application should be made through the State Scholarship Board.

VETERAN'S GRANTS

Description and Eligibility:

All Vietnam veterans who are Maryland residents and who were domiciled in Maryland immediately prior to induction into the armed forces and who were declared by the United States Department of Defense to be prisoners of war as a result of United States participation in armed conflict in Southeast Asia on or after January 1, 1960, shall be entitled to attend, full or part-time, free of charge for tuition and mandatory fees the University of Maryland, St. Mary's College of Maryland, any State college, or any community college within the State.

Conditions of Award:

Once appointed to receive the scholarship, the recipient may hold the award subject to the following conditions:

1. The recipient must have been accepted for admission to the regular undergraduate program in one of the eligible institutions.
2. All full-time students must be enrolled for a minimum of twelve (12) semester hours and may receive the award for not more than four years.
3. All part-time students must be enrolled for a minimum of six (6) semester hours and may receive the award for not more than eight years.

Application should be made through the State Scholarship Board.

2. Federal Programs

The passage of the 1972 Higher Education Bill substantially changed most federally sponsored aid programs. While many interpretations and guidelines are still pending in the Commissioner of Education's office, the most up-to-date information has been included in the following synopsis of federal aid programs. Guidance Counselors should contact financial aid offices for the most current guidelines.

BASIC EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANTS

Undergraduate students attending an institution of higher education, including nursing schools and preparatory schools, are eligible for a Basic Grant of \$1,400, a year minus the amount of expected family contribution. These grants are made for four years, but, in a case where a curriculum requires five years attendance, the time limit is extended for one year. Eligibility for award includes part-time and three quarter students as well as full-time students.

The amount of the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant may not exceed 50% of the actual cost of attending an institution that year and may not exceed the total cost minus the expected family contribution.

To apply for a Basic Grant, an "Application for Determination of Basic Grant Eligibility" must be obtained, completed, and mailed to P. O. Box 84, Washington, D.C. 20044. Within a month, the student will be notified of his eligibility index, which is calculated on the basis of a formula applied consistently to all applicants. He then submits the notification to the school of his choice which calculates the amount of his Basic Grant.

Application forms may be obtained from high school guidance counselors and student financial aid officers at institutions of post-secondary education or by writing to Basic Grants, Bureau of Postsecondary Education, Office of Education, Washington, D.C.

SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANTS

Known as EOG under the 1965 law, these Supplemental grants are awarded to institutions of higher education to enable qualified undergraduate students to attend college. The student must have been accepted for enrollment as an undergraduate or already a student in good standing, showing evidence of academic or creative promise and capability of maintaining good standing, have exceptional financial need, and would not otherwise be financially able to attend college.

Amount of the grant is \$1,500. per year or one-half the sum of the total of the student's financial aid provided to such a student by the institution, whichever amount is less. Minimum grant is \$200. No student may receive more than \$4,000. in supplemental grants over a four-year period.

STATE STUDENT INCENTIVE GRANTS

These are incentive grants to states in order to assist them in making grants to students of financial need at institutions of higher education. The federal government

pays for 50% of each state's allotment which is based on the number of students in attendance at institutions of higher education in the State. Grants to full-time students may not exceed \$1,500. per academic year. Students must demonstrate substantial financial need, based on criteria established by the state and approved by the Commissioner of Education.

NURSING SCHOLARSHIPS

Federal scholarships are available to students enrolled in a nursing program and having financial need. Grants are awarded to each institution. Full-time or part-time students with exceptional financial need are eligible. Maximum for any student is \$2,000. per year.

NATIONAL DIRECT STUDENT LOANS

Under the Higher Education Act of 1972, the National Direct Student Loans replaces the National Defense Student Loans.

Funds are made available to institutions of higher education for the purpose of making low interest loans to students who need financial aid to continue their education. The institution must contribute at least one-tenth of the Federal contribution, agree to collect the principles and interest on the loans charges for like payments.

The aggregate of the loan for a student who has completed two years of a program leading to a bachelor's degree but has not yet completed work for a bachelor's degree is \$5,000. For those not completing two years, the amount is \$2,500.

The student must demonstrate financial need, capable of maintaining good standing, has been accepted or is already a student at an institution of higher education, carrying at least one-half of the normal academic work load as determined by the institution.

Interest on the loan is 3% per year. Average payments on installments over a ten-year, nine month period, beginning nine months after the date on which the borrower ceases to pursue one-half the normal course of study at an institution of higher education. Interest on the loan will not accrue as long as he is at least a half-time student or after graduation is a member of the armed services, Peace Corps or Vista volunteer.

Forgiveness of loans is provided on a graduated scale for employment in Project Head-Start, teaching disadvantaged students, and military service in areas of hostility upon graduation from the institution.

NURSING STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM

Long term, low interest loans are provided for full-time or half-time students at institutions offering baccalaureate or associate degrees in nursing or to the equivalent of such a degree or to a graduate in nursing. Up to \$2,500. per academic year may be borrowed by a student who is a citizen and demonstrates financial need in order to pursue their course of study.

Periodic installments for repayment are arranged over a ten-year period. Repayment period begins nine months after the student ceases to pursue full-time or half-time study. Interest rates are at 3% per year.

Cancellation at the rate of 15% for the first three years and 20% for the fourth and fifth year is available for those who enter into the field of full-time professional nursing. A total of 85% of the loan might be cancelled.

ALLIED HEALTH PROFESSION LOANS

Loans are available for the training or re-training of allied health profession personnel. Loans up to \$1,500. a year with a maximum of \$6,000. are available to full-time and part-time students.

Repayment must begin one year after the student graduates over a ten-year period. Interest on the loan is 3% per year.

Cancellation of the loan for those employed in allied health profession is available up to 50% at 10% a year per year full-time employment.

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

Any unmarried child, who is a full-time student between 18 and 22 years of age, and whose parent(s) are retired, deceased or disabled, is eligible for Social Security benefits. Last year 400,000 students were paid benefits of \$355,000,000.

For applications, write to local Social Security office.

HIGHER EDUCATION LOAN CORPORATION PROGRAM

The Maryland Higher Education Loan Corporation makes loans (referred to in this document as GUARANTEED LOANS) available to all students attending or planning to attend an approved institution of higher learning. Assisted by the Financial Aid Officer at the institution where he plans to attend, the student completes the application form for a loan. The school certifies the student's status at the institution as well as furnishing other criteria needed to the lending agency to award the loan. These forms may be obtained from either the institution, the local bank which participates in the program, or the Maryland Higher Education Loan Corporation at its offices, 2100 Guilford Avenue, Baltimore, Maryland 21218. A fee of 1/2 of 1% per year on the amount of the loan for the term of the loan is paid in advance. The lender will calculate the amount of fee for the student.

Undergraduates pursuing higher education or vocational school courses may borrow up to \$1,500. per year; graduate studies may borrow up to \$2,000. per year. Total loans made to any student may not exceed \$7,500.

Repayment begins the first day of the tenth month after the student leaves the school.

Under this plan, no notes may bear more than 7% simple interest for Federally subsidized loans. This is less than customary bank rates for installment loans. Interest starts when the loan is made and accumulates while the student remains in school. No collateral is necessary and parents need not assume financial liability for the student's loan.

VETERAN'S BENEFITS

Any child of a parent or parents, retired, deceased, or disabled, who served in the Armed Forces is eligible for Veterans Benefits. Please contact your local Veteran's Administration office for further information.

LAW ENFORCEMENT EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Loans of up to \$1,800 a year are available to full-time students who are enrolled in programs directly related to law enforcement. Loans are repayable to the Department of Justice, Federal Government, and may be cancelled at the rate of 25% per year up to 100% for each year of employment in law enforcement after college studies.

II. MARYLAND STATE BOARD FOR HIGHER EDUCATION
STUDENT TRANSFER POLICIES

PREAMBLE

The initial overarching objective of this committee has been to relate in operational ways the undergraduate programs offered in the public sector of higher education in Maryland including the Community Colleges, the State Colleges, and the campuses of the University.

The intended principal benefactor is the student who is best served by current information about programs and protected by firm arrangements among the public segments of higher education in Maryland which permit him to plan a total degree from the outset. With successful academic performance, he or she can make uninterrupted progress even though transfer is involved. The measure of the plan is maximum transferability of college level credits. Essentially, the transfer and native students are to be governed by the same academic rules and regulations. It is recognized that the guidance data essential to the implementation of transfer arrangements go well beyond the scope of the present report.

In a complementary way the State's interests are served by having its higher education resources used optimally by reducing the time taken to complete a degree through the avoidance of repeated class experiences.

The institutional interests are protected also by the systematic approach; they are relieved of the uncertainties of unplanned articulation without becoming production line enterprises.

The dynamics of higher education preclude once-and-for-all time curriculums and perpetual grading and retention systems as cases in point. However, within the general structure of this plan there is opportunity for continual updating of the details.

In more specific ways the Committee has proceeded (1) to recommend specific areas of agreement among the public Community Colleges, the State Colleges, and the State University pertaining to facilitating the transfer of students within the segments of public higher education in the State; (2) to provide for a continuous evaluation and review of programs, policies, procedures, and relationships affecting transfer of students; and (3) to recommend such revisions as are needed to promote the academic success and general well-being of the transfer student.

POLICIES

1. Public four-year colleges and the campuses of the University of Maryland shall require attainment of an overall "C" average by Maryland resident transfer students as defined by the sending institutions as one standard for admission. If the student has two or more institutions, the overall "C" (2.0) will be computed on grades received in courses earned at all institutions attended, unless the student presents an Associate in Arts Degree.

- (a) Efforts shall be intensified among the sending institutions to counsel students on the basis of their likelihood of success in various programs and at various institutions based on shared information. (See par. 1(b) and par. 9).
 - (b) Procedures for reporting the progress of students who transfer within the State shall be regularized as one means of improving the counseling of prospective transfer students. In addition, each public institution of higher education shall establish a position of student transfer to assist in accomplishing the policies and procedures outlined in this plan.
2. Admissions requirements and curriculum prerequisites shall be stated explicitly.
 - (a) Course and semester hour requirements which students must meet in order to transfer with upper division standing shall be clearly stated.
 - (b) The establishment of articulated programs is required in professional and specialized curricula.
 - (c) Students shall be strongly encouraged to complete the requirements for the award of an Associate in Arts Degree or to complete successfully 56 semester hours of credit before transfer.
3. Information about transfer students who are capable of honors work or independent study shall be transmitted to the receiving institution.
4. Transfer students from newly established public colleges which are functioning with the approval of the State Department of Education shall be admitted on the same basis as applicants from regionally accredited colleges.
5.
 - (a) Students from Maryland Community Colleges who have been awarded the Associate in Arts degree or who have successfully completed 56 semester hours of credit, in either case in college and university-parallel courses (see par. 6), and who attained an overall "C" (2.0) average, shall be eligible for transfer. Normally they will transfer without loss of credits and with junior standing provided they have met the requirements and prerequisites established by the receiving institution within the major. Parenthetically, junior standing does not assure graduation within a two-year period of full-time study by a native student or by a transfer student.
 - (b) The Associate in Arts degree shall serve as the equivalent of the lower division general education requirements at the receiving institution where the total number of credits required in the general education program in the sending institution is equal to or more than that required in the receiving institution and where the credits are distributed among the arts and sciences disciplines.
 - (c) The determination of the major program requirements for a baccalaureate degree, including courses in the major taken in the lower division, shall be the responsibility of the institution awarding the degree.
6. Credit earned at any public institution shall be transferable to any other public

institution as long as that credit was designated specifically for a college or university-parallel program, and providing its acceptance is consistent with the policies of the receiving institution governing native students following the same program. Transfer of credits from terminal (career) programs shall be evaluated by the receiving institution on a course by course basis. Credits applied towards a specific major and minor shall be determined by the receiving institution in these cases.

7. Credit earned in or transferred from a community college shall be normally limited to approximately half the baccalaureate degree program requirement and to the first two years of the undergraduate educational experience.
8. Transfer students shall be given the option of satisfying graduation requirements which were in effect at the receiving institution at the time they enrolled as freshmen at the sending institution, subject to conditions or qualifications which apply to native students.
9. Institutions shall notify each other as soon as possible of impending curriculum changes which may affect transferring students. When a change made by one institution necessitates some type of change at another institution, sufficient lead time shall be provided to effect the change with minimum disruption. The exchange of data concerning such academic matters as grading systems, student profiles, grading profiles, etc., is required.
10. Community college students shall be encouraged to choose as early as possible the institution and program into which they expect to transfer.
11. Innovative programs in all institutions are encouraged. Proposed programs which would have system-wide implications or which would affect student transfers to more than one institution must be reported to the Maryland State Board for Higher Education.
12. The Maryland State Board for Higher Education Articulation Committee shall continue to review and evaluate current articulation policies and shall set additional policies as needed. In addition, the State Board will publish a brochure annually listing the prerequisites within the major and professional programs of all public four-year colleges and universities in the State.
13. In the event a transfer student believes he or she has not been accorded the consideration presented in this policy statement, he shall have the opportunity to have the situation explained or reconciled.

Initially, differences of interpretation regarding the award of transfer credit shall be resolved between the student and the institution to which he is transferring. If a difference remains unresolved, the student shall present his evaluation of the situation to the institution from which he is transferring. Representatives from the two institutions shall then have the opportunity to resolve the differences.

The sending Institution has the right to present an unresolved case to the Committee on Articulation by addressing the Maryland State Board for Higher Education. The Committee on Articulation shall, through an appointed subcommittee, receive reference documentation, opinions, and interpretations in written form from the sending and receiving institution and from the student. Subcommittee deliberations will be confined to this written documentation. The full committee shall act on the subcommittee recommendation.

Copies of the committee recommendation shall be forwarded to the institutions through the Maryland State Board for Higher Education. The State Board shall then be advised of the institutional action within a ten-day period.

14. The State of Maryland should support four-year institutions so that all students in an articulated transfer program who are awarded an Associate-in-Arts degree from a public community college shall be admitted with full junior standing to a public four-year institution, unless either the number of students desiring admission exceeds the number that can be accommodated in a particular professional or specialized program or certain circumstances exist which require a limitation being placed on the size of junior programs. In such instances, admission will be based on criteria developed by the receiving institution to select the best qualified students.

Other Requirements for Freshmen Applicants

In general, the College Park campus requires freshman applicants to earn a high school diploma prior to their first registration at the university (see "Special Situations" below for exceptions to this requirement).

The SAT examination is required of all freshmen applicants. Test results must be submitted *directly* to the College Park campus by the Educational Testing Service

SPECIAL SITUATIONS

1. High School Equivalence Examination. Maryland residents who are at least 17 years of age and have not received a high school diploma can be considered for admission by presenting the high school General Education Equivalency certificate. In order to be admitted the applicant must present an average score of 50 with no score below 40 on any of the five parts of the test or a minimum score of 45 on each of the five parts of the test.
2. Veterans and Mature Adults. Maryland residents who have had military experience or have been out of school for more than two years may find that our published admissions standards are not applicable. We urge applicants in these categories to contact an Admissions Counselor to discuss their educational plans.
3. Concurrent Enrollment. High school seniors who have earned a minimum 3.00 (B) average in academic subjects during grades ten and eleven may enroll on the College Park campus for

New Undergraduates

The University of Maryland is a publicly supported land grant institution dedicated primarily to the educational needs of Maryland residents. Within its responsibilities as a State facility, the University attracts a cosmopolitan student body. Each year a small number of promising men and women from other states and jurisdictions are offered admission. Fifty states and ninety foreign nations are represented in the undergraduate population.

I. FRESHMEN - MARYLAND RESIDENTS

In order to be admitted, freshman applicants who are Maryland residents must meet ONE of the following THREE criteria for admission:

- A. Have a "C" average in academic subjects in the 10th and 11th grades and rank in the top half of the high school graduating class.

OR

- B. Present a satisfactory combination of academic grade point average and total SAT examination results. For self-determination of eligibility, students are urged to consult the chart printed in "Looking at Maryland."

OR

- C. Present a satisfactory combination of academic grade point average and high school class rank. For self-determination of eligibility students are urged to consult the chart presented in "Looking at Maryland."

Use of Mid-Year Grades

The University will reserve a decision on the applications of Maryland residents who do not meet the criteria outlined above until mid-year grades are available for the senior year in high school. The College Park campus is unable to utilize the final high school marks in rendering decisions for applicants who are applying for admission directly from high school.

If mid-year grades for the senior year in high school are

two courses or seven credits. The permission of the high school is required and students must live within commuting distance. Fees are assessed on a per-credit hour basis.

4. Summer Enrollment. High school students with minimum 3.00 (B) averages may enroll for courses during the summer preceding their junior or senior year. They must file a regular application and transcripts. Fees are assessed on a per-credit hour basis.
5. Early Admission. See below.

II. TRANSFER STUDENT ADMISSION

UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS TRANSFERRING FROM OUTSIDE THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

A student who has attended any institution of higher learning following graduation from high school and attempted nine or more credits must be considered for admission as a transfer student.

The University will use the average stated on the transcript by the sending institution. In cases where there is more than one previous institution, the averages at all institutions attended will be cumulative. A cumulative average is used to determine admissibility but does not transfer. Only credits transfer.

Where the number of students desiring admission exceeds the number that can be accommodated in a particular profession or specialized program, admission will be based on criteria developed by the University to select the best qualified students.

General Statement

Students who were eligible for admission as high school seniors and who are in good academic and disciplinary standing at their previous institutions are eligible to be considered for transfer. Maryland residents must have a "C" average in all previous college-level work to be admitted. Non-resident transfers are considered on the basis of competitive criteria.

Those Not Admissible as High School Seniors

Maryland residents who are not admissible as high school seniors must complete at least 28 semester hours with a "C" average at another institution.

Transfer Students From Maryland Public Community Colleges

Maryland residents who attend Maryland public community colleges will be admitted after they have received the Associate of Arts degree or completed 56 semester hours with a "C" average. Exceptions to the 56 hour rule will be made for students attempting to transfer into a program which is not available at the student's community college in a full two-year program. In order to be admitted to the College Park campus as an exception to the two-year rule, the applicant must obtain a letter from the transfer advisor at the community college recommending that the University waive the two-year requirement in his/her case because of problems with obtaining sufficient major program courses.

School of Architecture

Admission to the School of Architecture in the Division of Arts and Humanities is competitive with selection based on the transfer student's or freshman applicant's previous academic achievement.

All Architecture applicants must file an application by March 1 to be assured of consideration. Because of severe space limitations, an early application is strongly encouraged.

Applications for the School of Architecture are accepted for the fall semester only. Transfer applications for the School of Architecture are not evaluated until the early summer.

THE OUT-OF-STATE APPLICANT

The University is very pleased to consider applications from students who are not residents of the State of Maryland. Because the primary obligation of the University of Maryland is to Maryland residents, however, the number of out-of-state students who can be admitted is limited. The typical out-of-state freshman or transfer applicant presents better than average credentials in terms of his high school or previous college work.
