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ABSTRACT

The Ohio Instructional Grant Program is a financial aid program designed to assist low- and middle-income students who are enrolled for full-time undergraduate study in eligible Ohio institutions of higher education. The funds are intended to supplement other financial resources including parental income as well as the student's own financial resources. The report provides a financial profile of the program, including geographic distribution of recipients; distribution of grants by type of institution, by institution; distribution of students by dependency status; distribution of recipients by family income, by class level, and by select income categories; average student profile; and a listing of other state and federal programs in use in Ohio. Financial charts and tables provided in the report deal with other variables including: recipients' county of residence, ethnicity, type of institution, level of institution, amount of awards, race, sex, age, and parental employment status. 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## OHIO INSTRUCTIONAL GRANT ACT

In accordance with the provisions of Section 3333.12 of the Ohio Revised Code enacted into law by the 108th Ohio General Assembly in 1969 and subsequent revisions made by the 109th, 110th and 111th Ohio General Assemblies in 1971, 1973, 1974 and 1975, the Ohio Board of Regents shall administer the Ohio Instructional Grant Program for undergraduate students enrolled during the academic year 1975-76. The revision enacted by the 111th Ohio General Assembly reads as follows:

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The Ohio Board of Regents shall establish and administer an instructional grant program for full-time undergraduate students in an Ohio institution of higher education which is state-assisted or which has received a certificate of authorization from the Board pursuant to Chapter 1713 of the Revised Code. The Board may adopt rules and regulations to carry out this section. The General Assembly shall support the instructional grant program by such sums and in such manner as it may provide, but the Board may also receive funds from other sources to support the program. If the amounts available for support of the program are inadequate to provide grants to all eligible students, preference in the payment of grants shall be in the following order: (1) freshmen; (2) sophomores; (3) juniors; and (4) seniors.

In order to be eligible for an instructional grant, a student shall be a resident of Ohio and shall be enrolled as a full-time student in an Ohio institution of higher education which meets the requirements of Title VI of the "Civil Rights Act of 1964." "Resident" and "full-time student" shall be defined by rules adopted by the Board. An instructional grant shall be paid to an eligible student through the college or university in which he is enrolled. Applications for such grants shall be made as prescribed by the Board of Regents and such applications may be made in conjunction with and upon the basis of information provided in conjunction with student assistance programs funded by agencies of the United States government or from financial resources of the institution of higher education. The college or university shall certify that the student applicant is enrolled as a full-time student. Instructional grants shall be provided to an eligible student only as long as he or she is enrolled and is making appropriate progress toward an associate or bachelor's degree. The grant shall cover two semesters or three quarters or the equivalent of one academic year.

Instructional grants shall be made to a student if the student is enrolled in an Ohio institution of higher education where the instructional and general fees are one thousand dollars or more for a two semester or three quarter academic year or if the student is enrolled in a technical education program of at least two years' duration sponsored by a private institution of higher education. The grant shall not exceed the total instructional and general charges of the institution. The amount of the instructional grant shall be determined in accordance with the following table:

Instructional grants shall be made to a student if the student is enrolled in an Ohio institution of higher education where the instructional and general fees are less than one thousand dollars for a two semester or three quarter academic year. The grant shall not exceed the total instructional and general charges of the institution. The amount of the instructional grant shall be determined in accordance with the following table:

"Adjusted Effective Income" as used in this section shall be defined by rule adopted by the Ohio Board of Regents, and may take into account the income of the student and of the student's parents and spouse. Family income may be verified by supplying to the Board of Regents a copy of the federal government tax return, by authorizing access to the family federal government income tax return, or by other means satisfactory to the Board.

No grant shall be made to any student in a course of study leading to a degree in theology, religion, or other field of preparation for a religious profession.

## PURPOSE OF THE PROGRAM

The Ohio Instructional Grant Program is a financial aid program designed to assist low and middle income students who are enrolled for full-time undergraduate study in eligible Ohio institutions of higher education. These grants are not intended to cover ~~all college costs nor are they intended to meet the total unmet need~~ of participating students. Ohio Instructional Grants serve as one source of student assistance and should be combined with available funds from other financial aid programs including Basic Grants, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, Work-Study, student loans and scholarships.

The major objective of the Ohio Instructional Grant Program is to assist in the elimination of the economic barrier which discourages many promising students in their plans to seek higher education. It is not the intent of the program to replace appropriate financial resources which are available to students to pay the cost of higher education, but rather to supplement these resources which include parental income as well as the student's own financial resources.

Ohio Instructional Grants are not awarded upon the basis of scholarship, as such, but upon the basis of relative financial need. Grants are awarded to the average as well as the superior student.

## INTRODUCTION

Ohio Instructional Grants were made available to students enrolled during the 1975-76 academic year as freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors. Forty-nine private colleges and universities, twelve state universities and their twenty branches, and twenty-four public two-year colleges participated in the program during the 1975-76 academic year.

### Eligibility Requirements

In order to be eligible for consideration of a grant, a student must meet the following requirements:

- (1) Be a resident of Ohio.
- (2) Be enrolled as a full-time undergraduate student in an eligible Ohio institution of higher education.
- (3) Be making appropriate progress toward an associate degree or a bachelor's degree.
- (4) Not be enrolled in a course of study leading to a degree in theology, religion, or other field of preparation for a religious profession.

### Application Procedure

An Ohio student who is enrolled or plans to be enrolled in an eligible Ohio institution of higher education on a full-time basis must apply for an instructional grant through the Student Assistance Office of the Ohio Board of Regents.

The student obtains an application packet from either the high school counselor, the financial aid office of the college or the Board of Regents.

The student and the student's parents complete the application and the income statement which is a part of the application, and submit these to the Student Assistance Office of the Ohio Board of Regents.

The Student Assistance Office then determines the amount to which the student is entitled based upon the family's adjusted effective income and the number of dependent children in the family.

The student then receives an award certificate which is submitted to the financial aid office of the college.

### Method of Payment

The student receives the Ohio Instructional Grant through the financial aid office as provided by the Student Assistance Office of the Board of Regents. The grant is applied to the instructional and general charges of the college or university.



## FINANCIAL PROFILE

### Appropriations

The 111th Ohio General Assembly appropriated \$20,000,000 to fund the program for the 1975-76 academic year. This appropriation was subsequently reduced to \$19,600,000 by the Governor. In addition, Ohio received \$847,493 under the federal State Student Incentive Grant Program. Some 1,598 students received the benefits of this program. ~~Thus, a total of \$20,447,493 was available for the 1975-76~~ academic year. In addition, \$812,628 was transferred from the 1976-77 academic year to be available if an expected shortage of funds occurred. However, the funds were not required and were subsequently transferred back to the 1976-77 appropriation. Forty-nine private colleges, twelve state universities and their branches, five two-year public community colleges, and nineteen two-year public technical colleges participated in the program during the 1975-76 academic year.

### Geographic Distribution of Grant Recipients

The figures in Table I indicate that 34.3% of all grant recipients reside in three counties--Cuyahoga, Franklin and Hamilton. Some 46.0% reside in six counties including the three counties mentioned above and Lucas, Montgomery and Summit counties.

Adding Lorain, Mahoning, Stark and Trumbull counties to the above stated total means that 54.6% of all recipients reside in ten counties. Based upon the 1970 census, 59% of the Ohio population resides in these ten counties.

With Franklin County as the north-south dividing point, 66.9% of all grant recipients reside in the 50 northern counties and 33.1% in the 38 southern counties.

Based upon the 1970 census, the total of grant recipients represents .004% of the state's population. On a county-by-county basis, the range was .002% to .008%.

### Distribution of Grants by Type of Institution

The average grant awarded to students attending private colleges was \$799 which was slightly under the average grant for such students in 1974-75. (\$802). Of all grant recipients, 22.8% or 10,725 attended private colleges. This represents a small decrease

as compared to 1974-75 and continues a pattern that has been established since 1973.

The average grant awarded to students attending public institutions was \$310 representing a slight decrease as compared to 1974-75 (\$312). Of all grant recipients, 77.2% or 36,399 attended public institutions. This represents a 15.6% increase in the number of students attending public institutions as compared to 1974-75.

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It is interesting to note that most of the students awarded grants attended college and utilized all or a portion of their grants. Some 89.13% or 47,124 of 52,867 awardees utilized their grants.

Of the state and federal funds totalling \$20,447,493 for the 1975-76 academic year, \$8,564,252 was utilized by 10,725 students attending private colleges, while \$11,309,679 was utilized by 36,399 students attending public institutions. Thus, 47,124 students utilized \$19,873,931 during the 1975-76 academic year. The average grant for all recipients was \$421. This represents a 4.3% decrease from the \$440 average grant for the 1974-75 academic year.

#### Distribution of Grant Recipients by Institution

Of those grant recipients attending private colleges, 19% are Black, 61% live in urban communities, 87% are classified as dependent students, and 71% come from double-parent families. As compared to 1974-75, this represents a 1% increase in Black students, a 1% decrease in those living in urban communities, a 4% decrease in dependent students, and a 4% decrease in those coming from double-parent families.

Of those grant recipients attending four-year public institutions and their branches, 28% are Black, 68% live in urban communities, 81% are classified as dependent students and 62% come from double-parent families. As compared to 1974-75, this represents a 2% increase in Black students, a 4% decrease in dependent students, and a 5% decrease in those coming from double-parent families.

The two-year public institutions, as in previous years, continue to reflect distinct differences in student characteristics as compared to four-year public and private institutions. Black students represent 41% of those grant recipients attending two-year public institutions and 71% live in urban communities, while 66%

are classified as dependent students and 48% come from double-parent families. As compared to 1974-75, this represents a 5% increase in Black students, a 1% increase in those living in urban communities, a 7% decrease in dependent students and an 8% decrease in those from double-parent families.

#### Distribution of Students by Dependency Status

For the first three years of the program, the number and percentage of independent students was relatively stable and represented an acceptable rate as compared to dependent students. The percentage of independent students ranged from 8.2% to 11.4% during this period. However, during the 1974-75 academic year the percentage of independent students rose to 15% and for the 1975-76 academic year, 20.4%. This is an alarming rate of increase and if it continues, a review of program criteria and standards for independent status may be required.

#### Distribution of Grant Recipients by Family Income

Of those recipients attending private colleges, 45.3% come from families with gross incomes of less than \$10,000 while of those attending four-year public institutions, 52.4% come from families with gross incomes of less than \$10,000. The two-year public institutions demonstrate significant comparison in terms of the number of low income students receiving grants. Some 67.5% of the recipients attending two-year public institutions come from families with gross incomes of less than \$10,000.

Of the total number of Black students receiving grants, 76.5% come from families with incomes of less than \$10,000.

Of all grant recipients, 53.3% or 25,103 come from families with gross incomes of less than \$10,000.

Of all grant recipients, 22.9% come from families with an adjusted effective income between \$0 and \$5,999; 14.0% come from families with an adjusted effective income between \$6,000 and \$7,999; 25.0% from families with an adjusted effective income between \$8,000 and \$10,999; and 38.0% from families with an adjusted effective income between \$11,000 and \$14,999. Thus, 53.3% of all grant recipients come from families with adjusted effective incomes of less than \$10,000.

### Distribution by Grants Awarded

Of the grant recipients for 1975-76, 11.4% of those attending private colleges received maximum grant awards of \$1,500. At the four-year public institutions, 12.1% received maximum grant awards of \$600. At the two-year public institutions, 3.9% received maximum grant awards of \$600. Overall, 10.6% received a maximum grant award.

### Black Student Profile

Of all Black student recipients, 15.8% attended private colleges, a 2.4% decrease from 1974-75; 60.1% attended four-year public institutions, a 3.7% decrease from 1974-75; and 24.1% attended two-year public institutions, a 6.1% increase over 1974-75. Black students represented 19.3% of all recipients attending private colleges, a 1.5% increase over 1974-75; 27.5% of all recipients attended four-year public institutions, a 1.6% increase over 1974-75; and 40.7% of all recipients attended two-year public institutions, a 5.1% increase over 1974-75.

Of the total Black recipients, 92.4% live in urban communities, 60.4% come from single-parent families, and 45.8% come from families with three or more dependent children. Of all Black student recipients, 76.5% come from families with adjusted effective incomes of less than \$10,000.

### Distribution of Grant Recipients by Sex

Since 1972 the percentage of male recipients in the program has steadily decreased from 49.8% to 46.1% while the percentage of female recipients has increased from 50.2% to 53.9%.

The number of male recipients has increased 18.9% (18,273 to 21,727) while the number of female recipients has increased 38.9% (18,288 to 25,397). The increase of female recipients was greatest at four-year public institutions (32.8%) and least at two-year public institutions (5.4%).

### Distribution of Grant Recipients by Age

For the past three years there has been a steady decline in the percentage of grant recipients in the age groups 21 and under, and 22 and under. In the 21 and under group there has been a decline

from 88.09% of all recipients in 1973-74 to 81.90% in 1975-76. In the 22 and under group the difference is not as great. The decline was from 91.15% in 1973-74 to 86.05% in 1975-76. Thus, the number of recipients over the age of 21 has increased from 11.91% to 18.10%. In numbers this means that the volume of the over 21 categories increased from 4,845 to 8,531, a 76.1% increase.

#### Distribution of Students by Class Level

Of the 47,124 recipients, 49.9% were freshmen, 24.0% were sophomores, 14.7% were juniors and 11.4% were seniors. Some 17.8% of all full-time undergraduate students attending eligible participating institutions received assistance from the program.

#### OIG Recipients by Select Income Categories

A comparison of the program between 1972-73 and 1974-75 demonstrates that there was a reduction of some 10,000 students in the less than \$10,000 income categories during this period, while there was an increase of nearly 16,000 students in the \$10,000 and over categories. A similar comparison was demonstrated involving Black students. There was a reduction of some 400 Black students in the less than \$10,000 income categories while there was an increase of some 2,300 Black students in the \$10,000 and over categories.

This trend has been somewhat mitigated during the 1975-76 academic year. The number of students in the less than \$10,000 income categories has increased some 2,917 students in 1975-76 as compared to 1974-75. The same is true for Black students. The number of Black students from families with incomes of less than \$10,000 has increased some 2,172 students in 1975-76 as compared to 1974-75.

#### Average Student Profile

Of all grant recipients, 77.2% attended public institutions; 53.3% came from families with gross incomes under \$10,000. The average recipient is 20 years old, white, comes from a double-parent family and lives in an urban community. In terms of sex, 53.9% are female and only in private colleges are there more male than female recipients (51.3% to 48.7%). In 67.2% of the families, one parent is working. The average grant for recipients attending public institutions was \$310, and the average grant for those attending private colleges was \$799. The average grant for all recipients was \$421.

State and Federal Programs

In addition to the Ohio Instructional Grant Program, the State of Ohio through the Ohio Student Loan Commission provides a Guaranteed Loan Program for Ohio students. Students may borrow up to \$2,500 per year from participating Ohio lending institutions.

The federal government provided four additional programs of financial assistance for Ohio students during the 1975-76 academic year--the National Direct Student Loan Program (N.D.S.L.), the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants Program (S.E.O.G.), the College Work-Study Program (C.W.S.), and the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program (B.E.O.G.).

During the 1975-76 academic year, the federal government provided the following funds for students attending Ohio institutions:

Thus, a total of \$122,105,856 in assistance was provided students attending Ohio institutions. Of this total, 16.2% came from the Ohio Instructional Grants Program and 41.6% from the Ohio Instructional Grants Program and the Ohio Student Loan Program. These totals do not include millions of dollars received by students attending Ohio institutions from categorical programs such as the veteran programs, Social Security Program, nursing grants and loans programs, and Law Enforcement Assistance Programs.

DISTRIBUTION OF RECIPIENTS BY TYPE OF INSTITUTION

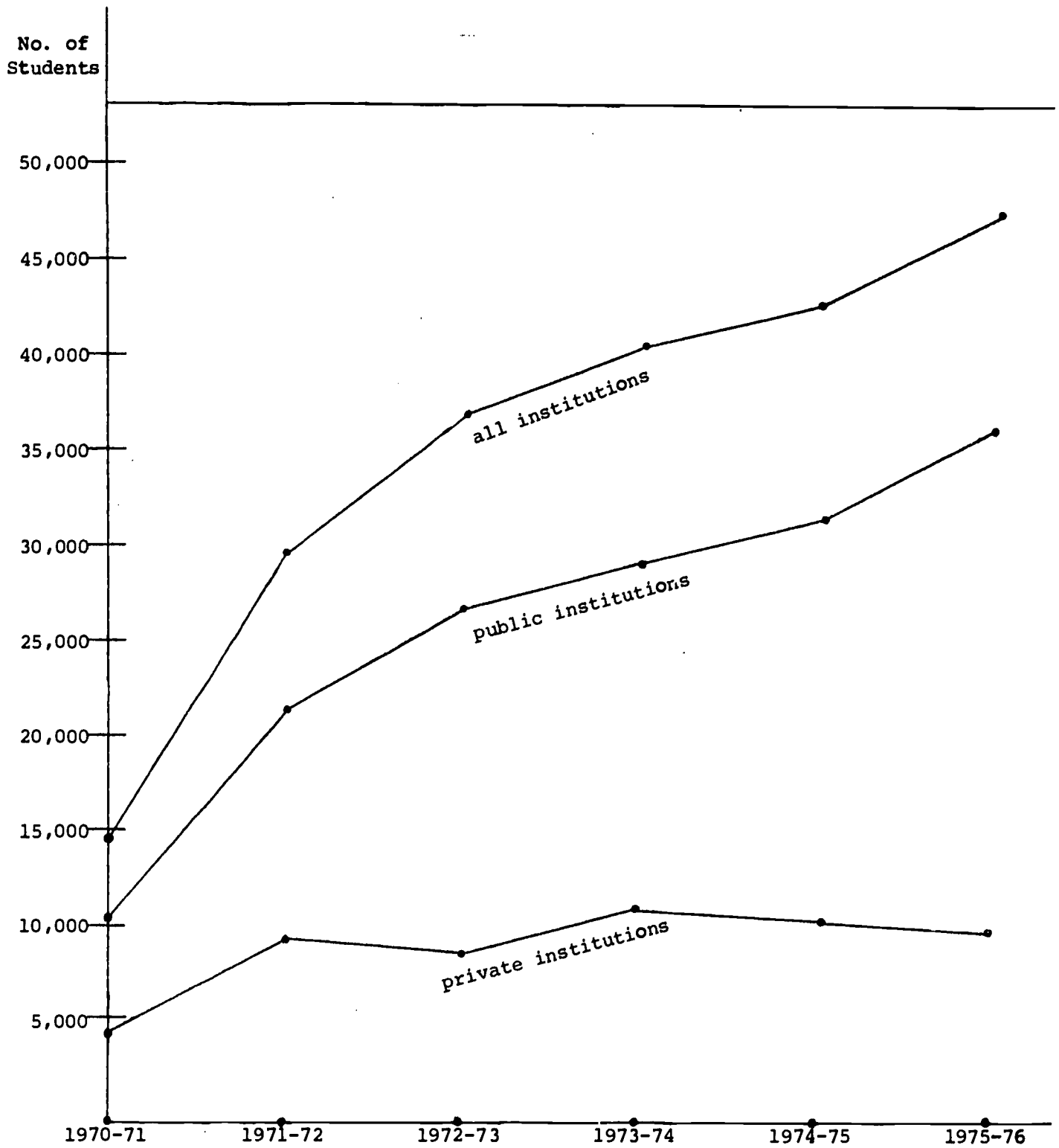

DISTRIBUTION OF STUDENTS BY DEPENDENCY STATUS

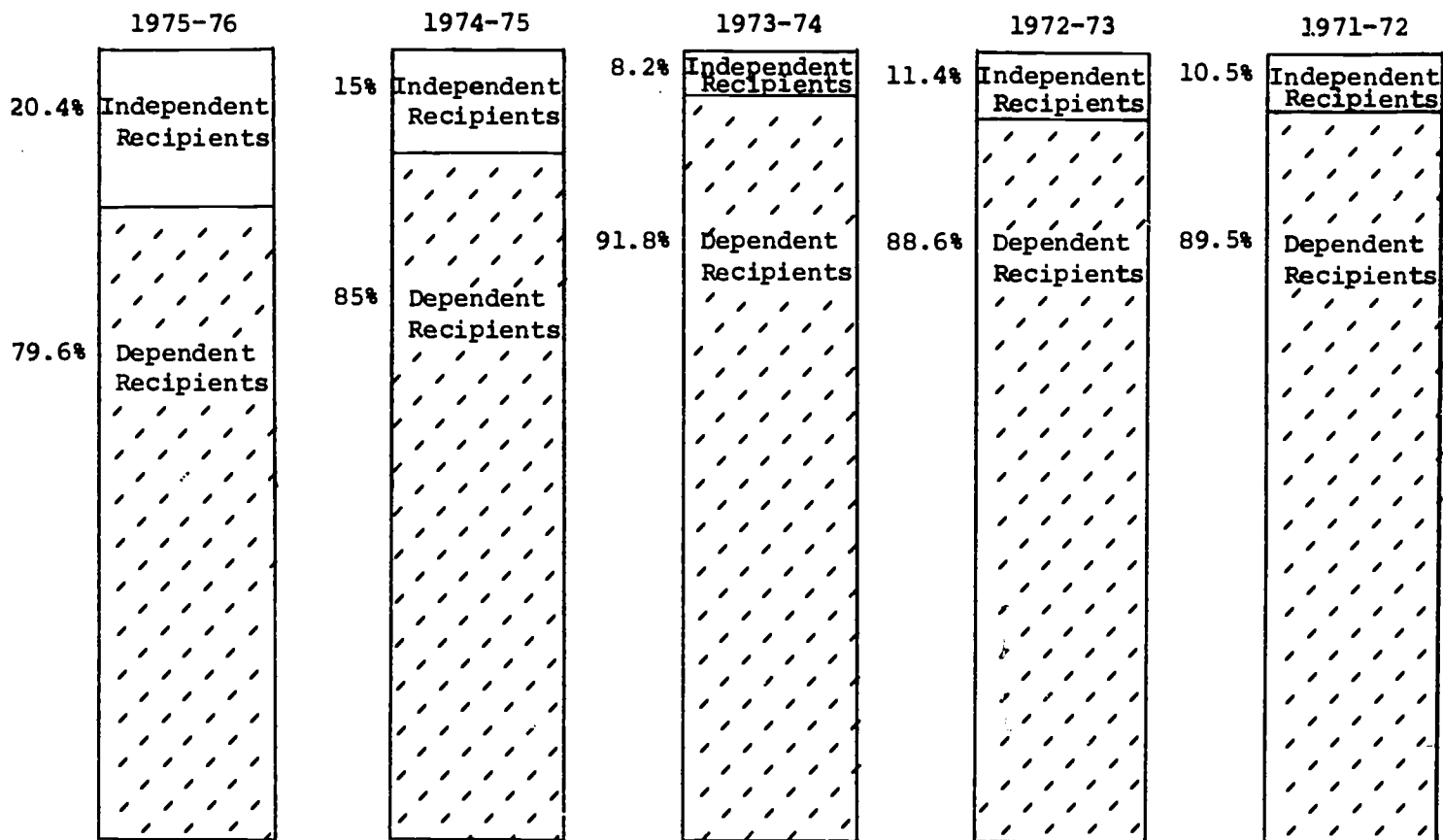

DISTRIBUTION OF GRANT RECIPIENTS BY ADJUSTED EFFECTIVE INCOME

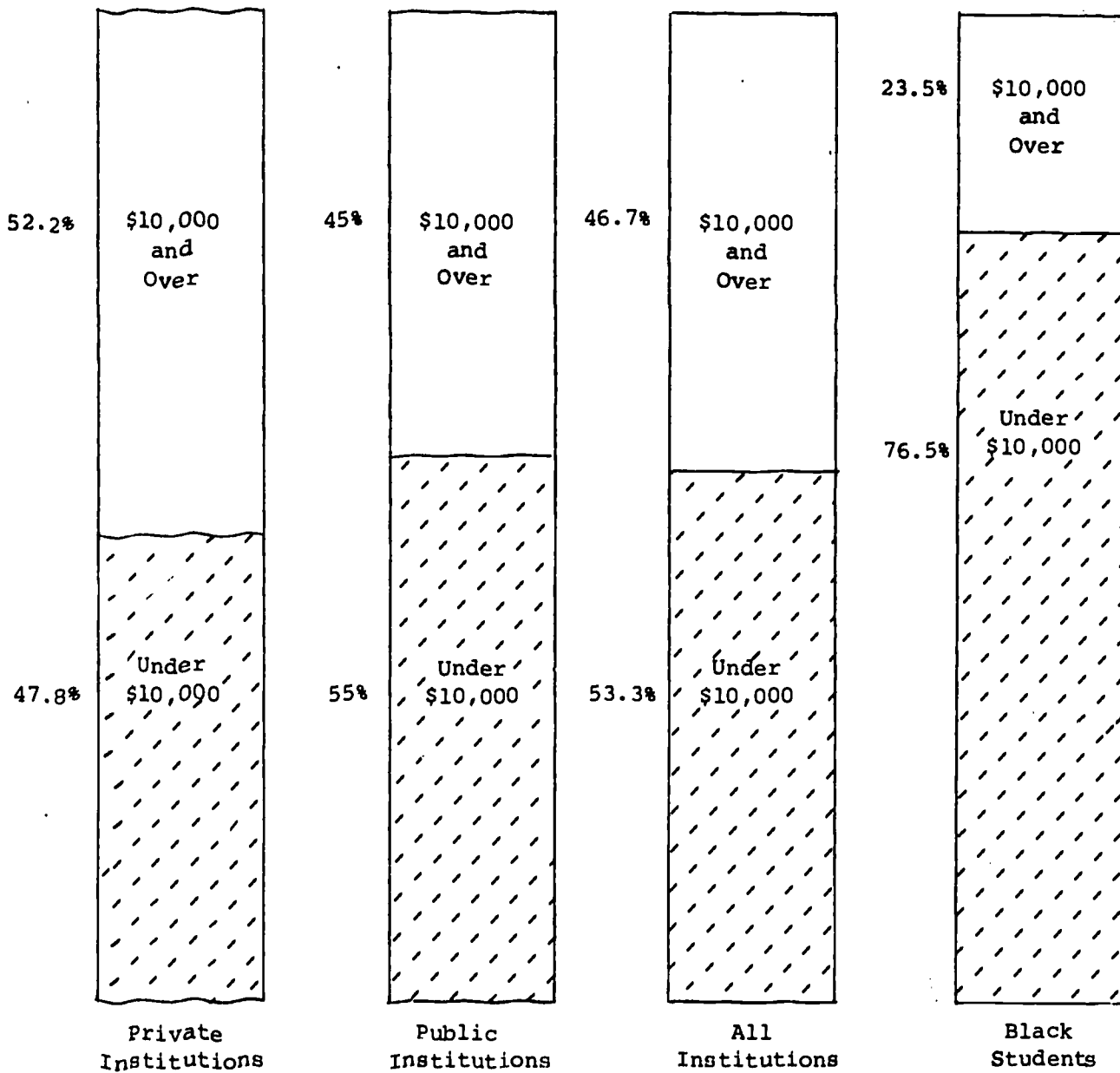

DISTRIBUTION OF GRANT RECIPIENTS BY SEX

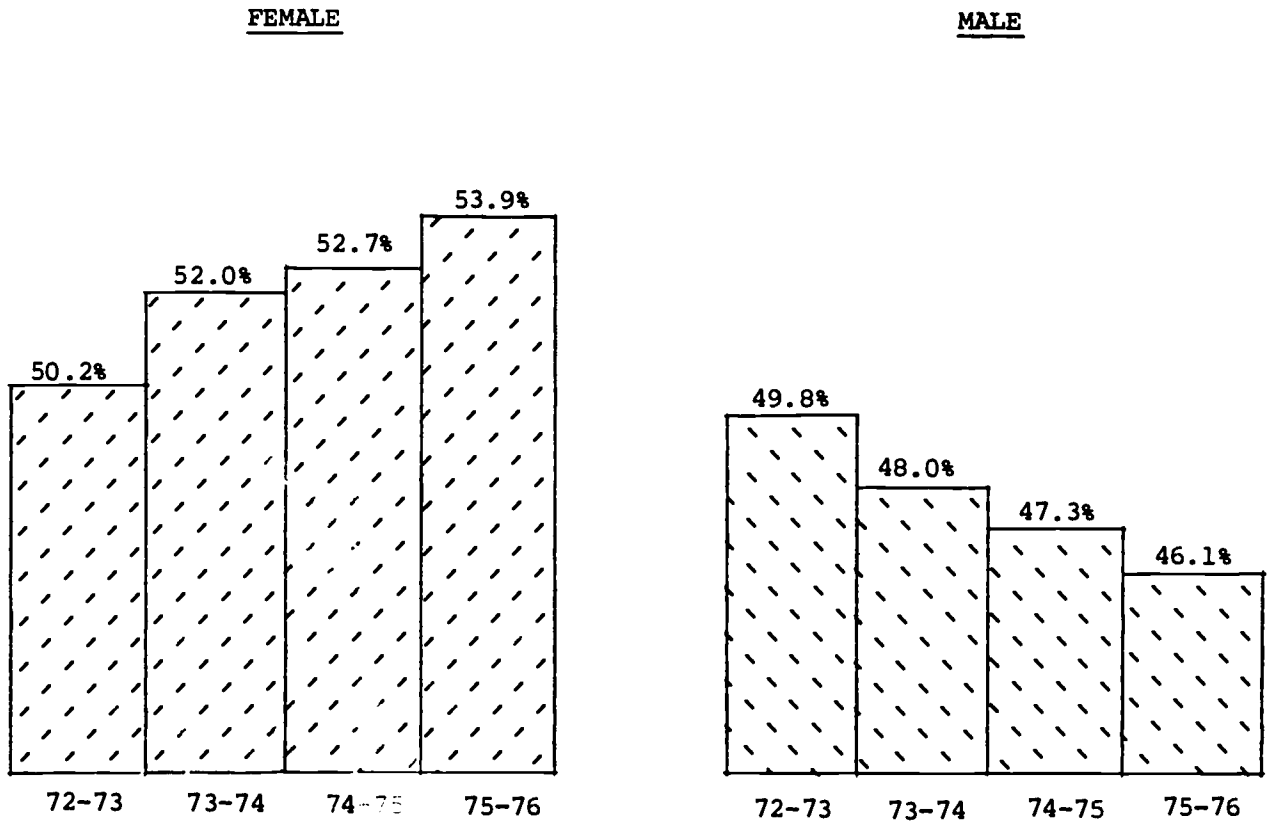
