#### AESTRACT

In 1976 the annual growth rate of interlibrary load and network referrals within the Northeastern Ohio Library Association (NOLA) increased by 14%. In addition \$18,000 from project grants has allowed NCLA to add 1,196 volumes to local collections. The annual report cites statistics and includes local library reports to demonstrate the growth of the network. (AP)

REPORT COVERAGE: This report covers the FY 76 ending December 31. Copies will be distributed to State Library of Ohio, the 29 contracting public library, 16 affiliate member libraries, key personnel at the Resource Library and library trustees of participating public libraries.\*

Network Growth

As NOLA enters its fifth year, a backward look reveals extraordinary utilization of an information network designed to deliver service to local library users efficiently, effectively and conveniently.

Requests referred to NOLA's Resource Library, The Public Library of Youngstown and Mahoning County (YPL), increased from 8,880 in FY 75 to 10,109 in FY 76. Although the number of referrals continues to grow, a leveling off pattern is discernible in the graphs and tables that follow.



## NETWORK REFERRALS TO RESOURCE LIBRARY AND INTERLIBRARY LOANS MADE



When comparisons are made, using like quarters, we find that the 248% annual average growth for 1974, by 1976 had leveled off to 14%. The stabilizing very high plateau of use appears to indicate a general understanding and appreciation by NOLA libraries of the impact networking can have in meeting local user needs.

User Impact

NOLA has been a tremendous help. Many people are moving into our rural area to get into farming and have found the NOLA a valuable source of information on well digging, network insect control and farm animal care.

When our library opened, our collection was small. Without the collection development grants and the network backstopping our library would have been virtually a shell.


Fill Rate

Approximately 68% of requests referred to the Youngstown Public Library in 1976 were filled from that library's own collection, 1% were partially filled, 24% were referred to Teletype Wire Exchange Interlibrary Loan network (TWXIL), other NOLA libraries or other agencies, and 7% were unanswered.

Those requests not filled and not referred include information or titles not available at YPL and not referred at user's direction; available at YPL, in use, reserve not desired; and inappropriate requests according to the network guidelines.


Collection Development

Realizing that basic collection inadequacies often prevent NOLA libraries from providing information of a frequently requested nature from local resources, a program objective since 1972 has been to strengthen local collections. In 1976, \$18,000 in NOLA direct project ( ants permitted the addition of 1,196 volumes to local collections.

Late in the year, the Areawide Book sharing Grants Program channeled an additional \$25,675 to NOLA libraries for collection development. This special program, designed to strengthen areawide weaknesses, should add another 1,712 volumes.

The following graph shows the impact of NOLA collection development grants on local libraries. Total grants since 1972 have been ampared to 1975 annual local expenditures for library materials.

#### 8 mm Film Program

Certain library materials, such as films, can be provided with greater cost effectivenss through a cooperative program than by individual libraries.

Before 1976, few NOLA libraries provided films for users. The NOLA program made 720 eight mm films available to users of 24 participating libraries through a rotating circuit. Each month, each library received a package of approximately 30 films. During the year these were used for 126 library sponsored programs viewed by 3,985 people. Loans made directly to users numbered 8,058. Libraries reported films were used for scout programs, birthday parties, Sunday school programs and family viewing.\*

Both loans and library sponsored programs far exceeded expectations for this NOLA component.

## Public Relations

The NOLA public relations program during 1976 was coordinated by Larry Rees of the Warren Public Library. Efforts to increase community and individual awareness of the usefulness, importance and relevance of library resources and services centered on various printed items:

Placemats promoting libraries as information places distributed to restaurants areawide

Greeting cards distributed to children to be given to adults describing the child's pleasure in using the library and inviting the adult to "get a card" so they can go to the library together.

Oversized leaf identifical on bookmarks of Ohio trees distributed in time for fall foliage displays

Printed leaflets describing NOLA"s services

"Welcome to the Library" browhures

Other PR activities included:

6 news releases

Recorded PSA's offered to libraries willing to contact local radio stations (only one taker)

15 PR "Ideas Folders" prepared and distributed upon request

11 slide talk programs presented by the Project Director
(mostly to library trustee groups)

In addition, the project director appeared on two radio shows, one TV program and addressed several community and professional groups.

## Continuing Education

Staff development continues to be an important concern. Attendance at five continuing education programs in 1976 totalled 243. In November, certificates were presented to 15 library staff people in recognition of 500 workshop hours (total) completed in NOLA programs.

This concern for self-renewal and improvement in order to serve the continually changing library needs of people speaks well of those who staff the NOLA libraries. Their dedication to not only doing a job, but doing it well is what makes the difference.

#### Multitype Development

Cooperation and coordination among libraries of all types is a key to mobilizing library resources for the benefit of all users.

Academic and school libraries affiliated with NOLA, have doubled in the past year from 6 to 12. These libraries shared in various NOLA sponsored activities such as support in book selection, discount purchase plans, staff development and improved communication with libraries of all types.

#### Youngstown State University

In 1976, Maag Library of Youngstown State University (YSU) was called upon to provide photocopies from technical journals unavailable at YPL. Copies provided numbered 259.

A feasibility study completed in August indicated that 15% of all NOLA requests unfillable at YPL may be fillable from the YSU collection, even when allowance is made for the primary user group (university students). As a result of this study, search\* and delivery procedures were developed in November. On December 1 YSU began serving as a NOLA resource library of second resort.

The willingness of the YSU library to share, makes possible a fuller utilization of a major information resource of NE Ohio by library users areawide.

#### Beyond Libraries

In keeping with the prevailing spirit, NOLA extended a cooperative hand during the year to several community agencies. Among them were:

Information was provided, users needing homebound service identified, bibliographies shared and programs publicized. In addition, consultation was given to the newly named director of an Indiana ALSA (like Ohio's ALSO) who needed help in getting a federated library system started. Somewhere she had heard about NOLA and thought we could help! We tried.

Ultimate Beneficiary Throughout 1976. as NOLA has strived to meet stated objectives, there has been a constant awareness of efficiency and cost effectiveness. Attention has been given to identifying existing strengths and using them as building blocks; the encouraging commitment of NOLA librarians has provided the binding mortar. The result is a developing system which provides access to more sophisticated and diversified information and library materials, close to home, for the ultimate beneficiary—the library user.
