

ABSTRACT

In the fall of 1976, total current use of residence hall facilities was reported to be 61,440, a decrease of less than one percent compared to fall 1975. Of this, 99.6 percent was for resident student use. The average number of students per resident assistant has remained constant for three years. Revenue producing uses of halls for purposes other than resident student occupancy were reduced from a bedcount of 1,351 in fall 1974 to 800 in fall 1975, and to 624 in fall 1976. The trend corresponds with the State University's guidelines, which give first priority to the housing needs of students. Percent utilization of net revenue producing adjusted capacity increased from 99.7 percent in fall 1974 to 102.0 percent in fall 1975, and was reported at 99.4 percent in fall 1976. At some institutions students were still crowded as their numbers exceeded facilities (notably the agricultural and technical colleges at 113.4 percent). (Author/MSE)

PREFACE

This report of Utilization of Residence Hall Facilities consists of data collected in the third annual survey of Fall 1976, as well as summary data from Fall 1974 through Fall 1976. Detailed tables for Fall 1974 and Fall 1975 are published in an earlier report from this office (see Publications List page 25). Details regarding the residence hall program are crucial in the planning and budgeting functions of each institution. While the survey was specifically designed to meet the data requirements of the State University Central Administration Offices of Finance and Business and Academic Services, requests for these data have subsequently come from many sectors both inside and outside of the State University.

The study includes all State-operated institutions which have residence hall facilities. Any residence hall facilities available at locally sponsored Community Colleges under the program of the State University of New York are financed in a different manner and are not included in the study.

A study of this complexity could not have been completed without the full cooperation of the institutional respondents, other Central Staff Offices, and the professional, statistical and typing staff of the Central Staff Office of Institutional Research.

INTRODUCTION

The methodology and definitions used in this study have been developed to be consistent with the University Guidelines for Utilization of Residence Hall Facilities and the State University of New York Policies and Procedures Manual. Definitions of the basic concepts used in this report are provided beginning on page xi.

The four tables of data for Fall 1976 may be described as follows:

Table 5 presents summary data which describe the original capacity of the residence hall facilities, the reductions to this original capacity, net available space and actual utilization.

Table 6 provides more detailed data concerning the types of utilization of net available space depicted in Table 5. Resident student utilization as well as other types of utilization are arrayed in categories, as described in the column headings.

Table 7 focuses on resident student utilization summarized . on Table 6. Data are arrayed by institution, type of accommodation and rate paid by the students.

Table 8 arrays data regarding the number of resident students, the number of resident assistant bed rental waivers used, the number of resident assistants and the ratio of resident students to resident assistants by institution.

The summary tables depict important segments of these data concerning utilization of residence hall facilities from Fall 1974 through Fall 1976. Trends in data reported to Central Office during the three years of this study are shown in four separate tables covering total utilization (headcount), percent utilization, non-revenue assignments (bedcount) and the ratio of students to Resident Assistants. The definitions over the three year period are consistent with those described beginning on page xi.



SUMMARY OF DATA

In the Fall of 1976, total current utilization of residence hall facilities (headcount) was reported to be 61,440, a decrease of less than one percent compared to Fall 1975 (see Tables 1 and 5). Of this utilization, 61,168 or 99.6 percent was for resident student utilization. The average number of students per resident assistant has remained constant for the past three years (see Tables 4 and 8).

Revenue producing uses of residence halls for purposes other than resident student occupancy were reduced from a bedcount of 1,351 in Fall 1974 to 800 in Fall 1975 and were further reduced to 624 in Fall 1976. This trend corresponds with the State University's Guidelines which give first priority for utilization of residence halls to the housing needs of students.

Percent utilization of net revenue producing adjusted design capacity increased from 99.7 percent in Fall 1974 to 102.0 percent in Fall 1975 and was reported at 99.4 percent in Fall 1976 (see Tables 2 and 5). While this figure dropped slightly below 100 percent in Fall 1976, at some State University institutions students were still crowded as their numbers exceeded designed facilities available for student use. Notably, the Agricultural and Technical Colleges show net utilization (headcount) of +1,187 or 113.4 percent of net revenue producing adjusted design capacity.



DEFINITIONS

Residential Capacity Descriptors

- BEDCOUNT--a unit of measure used to describe the capacity of the facility for residential purposes.
- ORIGINAL DESIGN CAPACITY—the original residential capacity of the facility (expressed as BEDCOUNT*) as determined by architectural plans.
- ADDITIONS TO ORIGINAL DESIGN CAPACITY--permanent conversions of on-campus facilities which increase their residential capacity (expressed as BEDCOUNT).
- NON-REVENUE ASSIGNMENTS--residential capacity (expressed as BEDCOUNT) exempted from revenue production for special uses such as for RESIDENT ASSISTANTS. These assignments are subject to annual review by Central Administration.
- NET REVENUE PRODUCING ADJUSTED DESIGN CAPACITY—the capacity of the facility expressed as BEDCOUNT, available for revenue producing uses. (ORIGINAL DESIGN CAPACITY, less NON-REVENUE ASSIGNMENTS, plus ADDITIONS TO ORIGINAL DESIGN.)

Actual Occupancy/Use Descriptors

- HEADCOUNT—a measure of use which is the number of students or other persons occupying the facilities for residential purposes; or if the use of a facility is not residential (e.g. office space), then its use as expressed in terms of HEADCOUNT is the number of students displaced by the use of the facility for other purposes.
- RESIDENT STUDENT OCCUPANCY—the HEADCOUNT of enrolled students and their spouses who reside in residence hall facilities. (This excludes RESIDENT ASSISTANTS.)
- RESIDENT ASSISTANTS—students assigned to and residing in residence hall facilities for the purpose of peer counseling and betterment of the quality of life within the residence hall complex. The BEDCOUNT of facilities dedicated for RESIDENT ASSISTANT occupancy is exempted wholly or in part from revenue production.
- OTHER USES--uses of residence hall facilities for non-residential purposes such as office space or classrooms, or for residential use by students from other colleges or special non-student residential occupancy.

DEFINITIONS (Continued)

Utilization Indices

CURRENT UTILIZATION—the total actual utilization (expressed as HEADCOUNT) of an occupied facility's available revenue producing capacity. This is the sum of total RESIDENT STUDENT OCCUPANCY and total OTHER USES.

NET UTILIZATION---the CURRENT UTILIZATION less NET REVENUE PRODUCING ADJUSTED DESIGN CAPACITY. This figure is negative (-) if the facility is under-utilized and positive (+) if the facility is overutilized.
