FOREWORD

The fields of health, physical education, and recreation, not unlike other disciplines, are currently in the midst of an information explosion. Much of this information is stored in centers or systems that are concerned with cataloging, retrieving, and disseminating the information. For many reasons, the various data bases in HPER are scattered widely in locations across the United States.

This directory is an attempt to help HPER professionals locate and gain access to the information systems that store materials in their areas of interest. In addition to information about U.S.-based information centers, the directory lists many of the Canadian systems. Also included is some coverage of the International Association for Sport Information.

Publication of this directory is only a beginning in the effort to acquaint the profession with the wealth of information available in HPER. On the recommendations of Dr. Michael Sherman and Dr. Wayne Van Huss, the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation has established a Task Force on Information Systems for the Alliance. This task force will have two major missions:

1. To prepare a state-of-the-art report about information systems for HPER
2. To develop specific plans and recommendations for a comprehensive national HPER information program.

This directory should not be viewed as a comprehensive listing of all information systems involved in subject areas relevant to the HPER professional community. It is the hope of the ERIC Clearinghouse on Teacher Education, however, that most of the significant automated retrieval systems have been included. Since the information scene is changing almost daily, it is quite possible that information systems or centers that should be included have been omitted. The Clearinghouse welcomes information from readers about additional automated retrieval systems, so that this information can be shared with the AAHPER task force.

The Clearinghouse expresses its deep appreciation to Dr. Wayne Van Huss, Dr. Michael Sherman, and Dr. Gilles Chiasson for the help they provided in the development of this publication.

The Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) is a nationwide information system of the National Institute of Education, whose basic objective is to provide ideas and information on significant current documents in education, and to publicize the availability of such documents. Through a network of specialized clearinghouses, ERIC gathers, evaluates, abstracts, and indexes these materials, and processes them into a central computerized data system. The scope of the ERIC Clearinghouse on Teacher Education is the preparation and continuing development of education personnel, as well as selected aspects of health education, physical education, and recreation education.

DESCRIPTION

Dialog Information Retrieval Service is the largest on-line information system with over 12 million available references. Dialog data bases cover a wide range of subject areas in science, technology, engineering, social sciences, and business/economics. All the data bases are regularly updated to include the most recent information.

SERVICES

Computer search charges are based on the time the user's terminal is connected to the computer, prorated to the nearest hundredth of an hour. There also is a small charge for each citation printed and mailed to the user. Rates vary, depending on the data base used. For more information on Dialog, contact Lockheed Information Systems.

DESCRIPTION

The National Library of Medicine is the world's largest research library in a single scientific and professional field. The Library collects materials exhaustively in some 40 biomedical areas and, to a lesser degree, in such related subjects as general chemistry, physics, zoology, botany, psychology, and instrumentation. The holdings include about one and a half million books, journals, technical reports, documents, theses, pamphlets, microfilms, and pictorial and audiovisual materials. More than 70 languages are represented in the collection. Housed in the Library is one of the nation's largest medical history collections, with contents dating from the 11th to the mid-19th century.

The NLM collection may be used by health professionals and health science students. Books and journals may be consulted in the reading room or, if not available from the user's local medical library, the material may be requested on interlibrary loan.

SERVICES

Computer Searches

Searches may be limited to certain age groups, experimental animals, languages, years of publication, journals, or specific authors, since all of these elements are searchable. Citations may be printed on-line at the user's terminal or off-line and mailed to the user from the computer center. Users may select a print format varying from a complete record of the citation, including subject headings and abstracts, to a brief identification of the author(s), title, and source, sufficient to enable a librarian to find the original article. Cost of the NLM on-line data bases is \$15 for each hour of computer connect time between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. (Eastern Time) and \$8 an hour for each page of off-line printout.

Printed Material

1. Recurring Bibliographies. NLM periodically produces lists of citations to journal articles in specialized biomedical fields. Most of these "Recurring Bibliographies" are printed and distributed by nonprofit professional organizations and other government agencies with whom the Library cooperates.
2. Publications. NLM produces a number of publications which are sold by the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office.

DESCRIPTION

The Microform Publications project is conducted by the College of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, University of Oregon, as a nonprofit service to the professions involved. The emphasis is placed upon unpublished research materials which have national significance, particularly doctoral dissertations and master's theses, as well as scholarly books and journals now out of print.

SERVICES

1. Microfiche. All titles are available for purchase on microfiche. The price of the first fiche is \$1.75. The price for each additional fiche is 25¢.
2. Indexes. Supplements are published each April and September.

DESCRIPTION

IRUC is a project of the AAHPER Unit on the Handicapped. The Center collects and distributes information, materials, and research findings on programs in physical education, recreation, sports, aquatics, camping, outdoor education, and related activity areas for individuals with handicapping conditions.

SERVICES

1. Updates. These current resource listings (published monthly, September to May) include short summaries of articles, books, speeches, research, unpublished materials, audiovisual items, child use devices, and information about periodicals.
2. Newsletters. IRUC Briefings contains features, news articles, and information about programs, activities, methods, resources, and related items designed for use in programs involving impaired, disabled, and handicapped participants; no cost. Challenge deals with various aspects of physical education and recreation for mentally retarded persons; no cost.
3. Guides and Bibliographies. On topics of general interest; costs vary. A complete list of available publications may be obtained from IRUC.
4. Listings and Labels. Mailing lists of organizations, agencies, resource people, and ongoing programs available in cheshire or gum labels or as listings at \$30 per thousand. Copies of fliers, brochures, catalogs, or other materials to be sent must be approved before authorization is given for sale of these lists. Arrangements can also be made for distribution of materials to the complete or segments of AAHPER/IRUC mailing lists. Contact IRUC for additional information and procedures for ordering.
5. Reprints. Xerographic copies of hard to find, previously published but out of print items; unpublished materials such as curriculum guides, program descriptions, conference proceedings, research, reports, selected journal articles; and selected abstracts of professional, audiovisual, and child-use materials. A flat fee of 10¢ per page is charged for this service; first class postage or United Parcel Service charges must be added to processing fees when fast delivery is desired once materials leave the IRUC office. New listings are published periodically in IRUC Briefings.
6. Library. IRUC maintains a library of published and unpublished materials in the fields of physical education and recreation for handicapped persons. Hours are 8:15--4:30, Monday through Friday. No materials may be removed from the library, but xerographic facilities are available.

DESCRIPTION

Information materials available from the NCALI are designed to satisfy the different needs of the many people concerned about alcohol problems, including the scientific and professional community as well as the general public. They cover a wide range of topics, from alcohol and highway safety to physiology of alcohol, psychological studies, and occupational alcoholism programs.

SERVICES

Computer Searches

NCALI will conduct searches, whether of a personal, technical, or research nature, on any aspect of alcoholism at no charge.

Printed Material

1. Free Services

- a. Publications on everything from a basic question and answer pamphlet to a report to Congress summarizing the current scientific knowledge on alcohol and alcoholism
- b. Directories of treatment centers

DESCRIPTION

The National Clearinghouse for Mental Health Information was established to provide a central information resource on the many complex factors involved in mental illness and mental health. The computer data base is world-wide and includes journals, special published reports, and documents from 40 different countries, written in 21 different languages. Routine scanning was extended to the Asian literature in 1972, and in 1973 the information base was enriched through input of multimedia materials.

As of May 1975, there were over 205,000 abstracts on-line in the system. More than 10,000 scientific inquiries are processed yearly, an active publication program is maintained, and the NCMHI provides technical consultation on the development and use of information services.

SERVICES

Computer Searches

Mental health professionals may request from the Clearinghouse a computer printout of citations and abstracts on a specific topic. This is a free service offered to the professional community in the interest of speeding the research process, fostering innovation in practice, and stimulating information exchange.

In requesting a computer search, be as precise as you can in defining the nature of your interest in the given subject. Give points or areas not to be included as well as identify what you want to use the information for. In response to the request you may expect to receive one or a combination of the following:

- a computer printout of literature citations and abstracts
- publications
- referrals to organizations or individuals that can give more computer information pertinent to the request.

DESCRIPTION

The Clearinghouse collects, reviews, abstracts, indexes, and disseminates information on smoking and health. The collection of documents in the smoking and health data base is approximately 23,000 items, with about 1,500 new accessions added each year.

SERVICES

Computer Search and Retrieval

Since 1970 data elements of all documents entered into the Smoking and Health collection have been stored in a computerized data base for search and retrieval. Printouts on specific topics can be requested from the Technical Information Center of the Bureau of Health Education, Center for Disease Control. Users are urged to submit requests for searches on the search request form designed for this purpose. Forms can be obtained from the TIC or in each issue of the Smoking and Health Bulletin.

Inquiry and Reference Service

The Technical Information Center welcomes telephone and written inquiries relating to smoking and its effects on health. All requests will be handled routinely on a first come first served basis unless otherwise specified by the requesting individual. Telephone calls should be directed to the following number: (404) 633-3311, ext. 3235 or via FTS 236-3235. The Bureau cannot accept collect calls.

Photocopy Service

Photocopies of articles in the Clearinghouse holdings can be supplied only after the local resources of the requesting party have been exhausted. All photocopy requests are subject to service staff limitations. No item over 25 pages will be copied. The Clearinghouse will loan original documents only in cases of special need. In such cases the requesting party assumes all responsibility for the replacement of any document lost in shipment to and from them.

Publications

The Clearinghouse also has produced a number of publications. Individuals or institutions wishing to receive publications of the Clearinghouse should write or call the Bureau of Health Education and request the list of publications available or the specific publication needed. All single copies of publications and services provided are free.

Leisure Information Service (LIS) is concerned primarily with providing research, consultation, and publications in the areas of recreation and leisure services; leisure, career, and special education; and special populations, for example, the handicapped and the elderly.

SERVICES

LIS publishes a biweekly newsletter, Fund Development and Technical Assistance Report, and now has available a Federal Resource File, offering information on where and how to get federal funding for a variety of programs. The Bureau of Outdoor Recreation's Technical Assistance Clearinghouse file, maintained in the agency's Washington, D.C., office, includes a bank of technical materials such as federal, state, and local laws; technical publications; and indexing of the location of resources pertaining to high-interest subjects in the parks and recreation field. These materials serve both as the basis for technical assistance publications and for providing answers to requests for technical assistance.

SERVICES

Individuals wishing to use the Clearinghouse should request information by subject, giving specific details of their needs. A central index is searched to identify applicable technical materials, program sources, and available publications. The requester of technical assistance is then provided copies of available Bureau publications; a list of abstracts or other materials identified as applicable together with addresses where these materials may be obtained; and suggestions of government or private sources of data and expertise on the particular problem.

WLRA offers these services globally through cooperation with other international associations, regional associations, and national organizations in more than 100 countries.

SERVICES

1. WLRA Bulletin. WLRA publishes a bimonthly bulletin for its members and affiliates.
2. Information Retrieval System. WLRA has established an international commission of experts to explore ways to establish an information exchange network linking major centers of leisure and recreation documentation.

DESCRIPTION

The Leisure Studies Data Bank is a library of computerized numeric data concerning the leisure behavior of various populations. The Bank makes it possible for neophyte and sophisticated researchers to conduct secondary statistical analyses upon large scale samples.

The original data have been collected by various Federal or Provincial Departments or Ministries or have been collected by private research organizations under public contract. Thus all the raw data in The Data Bank are in the public domain.

SERVICES

Since each Data Bank transaction is based upon individualized research needs, the general procedure followed is to explore these individual requirements and develop a contract for this purpose through the Waterloo Research Institute. Standard contract charges are based upon services required--computer programming, computer use, statistical analyses, statistical interpretation, clerical assistance, and the like. The Data Bank is a nonprofit unit of the University of Waterloo, and all external charges are on a cost-recovery basis.

DESCRIPTION

Leisure has been of increasing importance in the 20th century. During recent years, an increasing number of social scientists have focused their attention upon a variety of leisure phenomena. In recognition of this growing scholarly interest, SIRLS provides centralized, continuously updated access to the literature in this field.

The system consists of over 100,000 bibliographic citations collected since 1963 on the subjects of sociology and social psychology as applied to leisure and sport. The citations include journal articles, theses, dissertations, unpublished studies, papers presented at conferences; bibliographies, and books. Many of these documents are available at SIRLS. Input to the system is international; thus while the majority of documents are in English, 20 percent are in French, German, Italian, Russian, and other languages.

SERVICES

1. Computer searches. Requestors can get standard files on certain sub-areas of sport and leisure which reflect common areas of research or can create a new file suited to their own or her particular need.
2. Document Duplication. The user can obtain a microfiche or photocopy of most documents that appear on the computer printout.
3. Loan of Documents and Files to Reading Room. All documents and files held by SIRLS are available to be loaned in the SIRLS reading room during regular open hours.

DESCRIPTION

The Sport Information Resource Centre was founded by the Coaching Association of Canada in August 1976. It immediately set about building an important collection of material on sport. In addition, many documents are gathered on recreation and physical activity in general.

SERVICES

1. INDEXING JOURNAL

SIRC receives approximately 750 periodicals. Each issue received is scanned for technical material, and at the end of each month this material is collected and the citations are indexed under subject categories and published in Sport Articles, SIRC's monthly indexing journal. This journal is available on a subscription basis (Canada: \$2.00, other countries: \$6.00).

2. COMPUTER SEARCHES

As of November 1976, 12,000 citations are accessible on-line through the SIRC system. These citations are now provided about equally among periodical articles, books, and theses. As the data bank grows, it is likely that the higher proportion of documents will be periodical articles.

Access to the SIRC data bank is now open to anyone desiring to use it. The Centre is experimenting with the following fee structure: each search costs \$5.00, which includes the first 100 citations printed. If the search yields more than 100 citations, 10¢ a citation is charged for each citation after the first hundred.

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR SPORT INFORMATION

The International Association for Sport Information (IASI), an organization under the auspices of UNESCO's International Council for Sport and Physical Education (ICSPE), originated at the Rome Olympics in 1960. The principal mission of IASI is to coordinate international efforts to document and disseminate sport information. At present, Rob Timmer of The Netherlands Sport Federation in The Hague serves as general secretary of IASI.

During the past year, under the direction of Rob Timmer IASI surveyed sport information and documentation centers around the world. The information received has been compiled in a publication entitled, "Sports Information in the World." A copy of this publication can be obtained by paying FL. 20 (roughly equivalent to \$8.00 U.S.--to postal account 3260289 in the name of the International Association for Sports Information (IASI - ICSPE), Postbox 1718, The Hague.
