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ABSTRACT

This paper summarizes the results of a 35 item survey administered to 2,346 Los Angeles City College (LACC) day and evening students, 48% of whom responded. Among the findings were: (1) transfar to a four-year college was ranked as the most important reason for attending LACC by a plurality (42%) of the day students, while acquiring or improving basic job skills was ranked first by evening 'students; (2) five of six respondents claimed to have decided on a major course of study; (3) respondents ranked being more knowledgeable, earning more money, and improving creative abilities as the most important personal benefits they expected to gain from attending LACC; (4) little interest was shown in extra-curricular activities; (5) two-thirds of the day students worked an average of 13 hours per-week while 92% of the evening students worked an average of 36 hours per week; (6) median family income for both groups was about \$9,000, while the median personal income of evening students was \$9,000 and that of day students \$2,100: (7) two-thirds of both groups aspired to a baccalaureate or higher degree; and (8) day students averaged 4.7 days per week on campus and evening students averaged 2.7 days per week. Tabular data reflecting frequency of responses for each survey item, broken down by day/evening student status constitute the bulk of this report. (JDS)

PURPOSE OF THE STUDY

In order to obtain some information about students in the Los Angeles Community College District, the District Office of Research and Analysis, in conjunction with the District Research Committee (consisting of the research directors or equivalent at the nine colleges) developed a questionnaire and requested the college to administer it to a sample of students. It is anticipated that a district report will be available shortly. The purpose of this study is to summarize the responses of LACC students. PROCEDURE OF THE STUDY

2,400 questionnaires were received from the District Office with the request that they be administered to a random sample of the LACC student body. It was decided to ask a sample of instructors to distribute the questionnaire in their classrooms and return the completed instrument to the Research Office. Questionnaires were then forwarded to the District Office, where they were keypunched and analyzed through the District computer, using the Statistical Package for Social Sciences (SPSS), now available on the computer. Printouts of LACC and District-wide respondents were then furnished to the LACC Research Office. Data from these printouts furnish the information on which this report is based.

FINDINGS

Preliminary investigations indicated that using every third class (in order in the schedule of classes) meeting at 9:00 a.m. Wednesdays and every sixth class meeting at 7:00 p.m. Tuesdays, should provide 2,300 "randomly selected" students to whom the questionnaires could be administered.

FINDINGS (continued)

Accordingly, instructors of these classes were asked to participate (letter of invitation attached). Numbers of questionnaires sent to in' structors were estimated from Active Class Enrollment printouts furnished by the Office of Instruction.

To meet timelines requests by the District Office, invitations and questionnaires were distributed to faculty on October 21, 1976 with a request that all materials be returned by October 29. Following is a sum-

The table below lists the questions asked of the LACC students and shows the number responding together with percents indicating each response to the questions. Figures are given separately for day and evening students.*

* The printout indicates responses for students who checked that they took day classes only, evening classes only, both day and evening classes, and a grand total. Since response from evening classes was low, it was felt that combined figures would be somewhat biased. For this reason, figures are included only for those taking day classes and those taking evening classes only.

CONCLUS IONS

This study summarizes results of a survey administered to LACC students in October, 1976. Distributions of respondents' sex, age, and ethnic background indicates that the sample is representative of the entire student body (day and evening separately). Following are some highlights of the responses:

- (1) Most important reason for attending college was indicated as "transferring to a four-year college" by a plurality of day students (42%), while "acquiring or improving basic job skills" was ranked first by evening students (36%), Both groups indicated the most important reasons for choosing LACC to be (in order) "close to home," "no tuition," and "academic reputation of college."
- (2) Five out of six students (both day and evening) claim to have decided on a major course of study.
- (3) Day and evening students agree that the most important personal benefits they expect to gain from attendance at LACC to be (in order) "be more knowledgeable," "earn more money," and improve creative abilities."
- (4) Little interest is shown by either group in extra-curricular activities, with athletics heading the list for both. Most popular sports activity is tennis.
- (5) Half of the day students, three quarters of evening students drive their own cars to campus. One third of the day students, but only one tenth of the evening students ride the bus.
- (6) Two thirds of the day students work, averaging 13 hours per week; 92% of evening students work, averaging 36 hours per week.

CONCLUSIONS (continued)

- (7) Median family income for both groups is indicated at about \$9,000. For personal income however, the evening students' median remains at \$9,000, while the day students drops to \$2,100.
- (8) Two thirds of both groups indicate their academic g^{oal} to be a bachelor's degree or higher.
- (9) Day students average 4.7 days a week on campus, 4.3 hours per day, evening students 2.7 days a week, 3.3 hours day.
