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ABSTRACT

This booklet presents 1975-76 statistics on a variety of school operations for American and Canadian private schools that belong to the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS), based on data from questionnaires completed by 517 schools. Also included are NAIS membership figures for 1976-77. A series of tables summarizes statistical data on gift support of NAIS member schools, fund-raising costs, sources of financial aid, minority group students and teachers, school financial operations, student enrollments for 1972-73 through 1976-77, and enrollment trends for 1971-72 through 1976-77. 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I. GIFT SUPPORT

Tables 1 and 2 report the results of the comprehensive survey of support received by the schools in 1975-76. This year we received information on gift support from 517 schools, or 68.8 percent of the membership.

Table 1 provides a breakdown of total giving to each type of school by source of gift. Because 14 of the 517 schools reporting were unable to identify specific sources, they are not included here. As a percent of total gift support, the breakdown of sources is: Alumni, 24.5; Parents, 21.7; Foundations, 18.4; Grandparents and Friends & Others, 22.1; Bequests and Deferred Gifts, 10.8; and Corporate, 2.5. Because most schools include gifts from trustees under other source headings (Alumni, Parents, etc.), we requested information on trust

tee giving as a separate item this year. Trustee gifts represent 11.9 percent of total annual gifts received, 18.0 percent of total capital gifts received, and 15.6 percent of total gifts received, and 15.6 percent of total gift support. This year for the first time we asked for the number of gifts for both annual and capital giving. The average gift for 469 schools in annual giving is \$138, and for 338 schools in capital giving the average gift is \$1,446. Combining the two categories, the average gift to 469 schools is \$2.6.

Table 2, which includes all 517 schools reporting, shows total amounts of annual and capital gift support for each type of school, for a grand total of \$123,387,000.

Again this year we asked schools to indicate the percent of alumni and parents solicited who contributed to their annual fund. The results are shown in Table 3. The columns headed "No." list the number of schools responding. The "Average" columns

give the average percent for <u>all</u> schools of each type. "Highest" and "Lowest," on the other hand, show only the highest and lowest percent reported by <u>individual</u> schools of each type.

II. FUND-RAISING COSTS

This section of the report presents the results of a study of the costs of fund raising that was initially undertaken last year at the request of the NAIS Development Committee.

Table 4 (page 4) shows the average cost for each type of school of conducting annual giving programs in 1975-76. This cost is expressed as a percentage of the total dollar

amount of gifts received. Percentages were derived by dividing the total fund-raising expense for all reporting schools of each type by the total annual giving in those schools. Thus, in the case of girls' day schools, fund-raising costs averaged 17.5 percent of total annual giving for the 44 schools reporting. The overall cost for the 517 schools reporting was 18.1 percent.

Table 5 presents a percentage breakdown of six categories of fund-raising expense for both annual and capital campaigns and for the two combined ("Total"). Because this portion of the study was limited to schools that were involved in a special capital campaign as well as annual giving during 1975-76, the number of

schools included is relatively small.
Schools were asked to report costs for each of the six expense categories; average percentages were calculated by dividing these costs by total fund-raising expenses for each type of school.

III. FINANCIAL AID

Table 6 shows the percentage of financial aid income derived from tuition, endowment funds, or gifts. Included under "Gifts" is income received from other sources, such as special scholarship fund-raising activities

or projects. Also shown are the number of schools reporting that 100 percent of income for financial aid was derived from only one of the three sources.

IV. MINORITY STUDENTS AND TEACHERS

This is the second year that information on minority students and teachers has been included in the annual statistics. We caution readers not to make generalizations based on these figures because a different survey format was used prior to 1974-75 and the groups

surveyed have expanded. The following observations are drawn from earlier data as well as from the figures shown here.

1. Minority student enrollment continued to grow, but at a slower rate--an 18.6 per-



cent increase in 1974-75, and a 6.3 percent increase in 1975-76.

- 2. Substantial increases were recorded for Spanish-surname and Oriental students-up 15.5 percent in 1974-75, and 18.9 percent in 1975-76.
- 3. Black student enrollment increased by 1 percent in 1975-76, but blacks continue to be the largest of the groups surveyed.
- 4. As a percent of <u>all</u> students, minority enrollment increased 0.2 in 1975-76 (from 6.6 in 1974-75 to 6.8 in 1975-76).
- 5. Declines in minority enrollment were recorded for some of the groups surveyed in

- several types of schools and regions, but the declines were offset by increases in other areas, so that total figures continued to show increases.
- 6. Employment of black and Spanish-surname teachers remained unchanged. Decreases by group, type of school, and region were offset by corresponding increases, so that the total for both groups remained unchanged.
- 7. Substantial increases were recorded for Oriental teachers between the three years 1973-74 and 1975-76: 79.4, 29.2, and 10.0 percent, respectively.
- 8. Spanish-surname teachers are the largest of the groups surveyed.

V. FINANCIAL OPERATIONS

Table 12 presents overall results of 1975-76 financial operations. Of the schools reporting, 3.6 percent broke even, 36.7 percent had an excess of income over expense of less than 5 percent, and 18.6 percent had an excess of income over expense of more than 5 percent.

This means that 58.9 percent operated in the black, while 41.1 percent operated in the red. Of the latter, 24.9 percent reported expenses exceeding income by less than 5 percent and 16.2 percent by more than 5 percent.

Tables 12-A, 13-B, and 13-C (pages 10-12) give information on expenditures, revenues, and ratios of personnel in reporting schools. To facilitate comparisons, data are reported by type of school on a per student and percentage of budget basis. Figures are presented according to the account classifications

described in the 1969 edition of the NAIS manual Accounting for Independent Schools, pp. 35-38 and 45-54.

All figures are averages for those schools reporting in each category. Net position for a category is the difference between total



average income and total average expense. The fact that the net position for a particular category is red or black does not mean that all, or even a majority, of the schools in that category operate with a budget of the same color.

Five hundred and thirty-one schools furnished data to produce these comparisons, a gratifying response to a difficult array of questions. We thank them for their efforts.

The following explanatory notes are numbered to correspond with lines in Tables I3-A, 13-B, and 13-C. Where entries are typed in italics in the tables, they are elements of the various "Total" categories that follow them. For example, in Table 13-A, under the column headed "K-12 Day," italic line 7, "Faculty Salaries" (\$1,004) + italic line 8, "Other Instruction" (\$80) equal line 9, "Total Instruction" (\$1,084).

- 1. School Type. For the purposes of these breakdowns, day schools are defined as schools enrolling over 95 percent day students, and boarding schools as those enrolling over 95 percent boarding students. Dayboarding schools are those that enroll between 51 and 95 percent day students, with the balance boarding. For boarding-day the reverse is true.
- 4. Student-Faculty Ratio: number of students per full-time equivalent (FTE) faculty member.
- 5. Faculty-Administrator Ratio: number of FTE faculty per FTE administrator.

Expense

- 7. Faculty Salaries: cash salaries of faculty members teaching in the regular instruction program. Salaries of administrators who also teach are included to the extent of their teaching assignment. Faculty benefits and payroll taxes (line 17) are included in "Total Institution" (line 20).
- 8. Other Instruction: departmental supplies and equipment, quest speakers, chapel, library, and athletics.
- 10. <u>Student Support</u>: residence halls, food service, health service, student guidance and counseling, store, and snack bar.
- 11. Student Activities: newspaper, dramatics, band, orchestra, entertainment, clubs,

and other similar activities not reported as "Other Instruction" (line 8).

- 12. Administrator Salaries: cash salaries of executive administrative personnel. Salaries of administrators who also teach are apportioned between this account and "Faculty Salaries" (line 7). Administrative benefits and payroll taxes are included in "Total Institution" (line 20).
- 13. <u>Staff/Clerical Salaries</u>: cash salaries of administrative personnel in secretarial and/or clerical positions.
- 15. Other Administration: supplies, expenditures, and equipment related to the governing board and offices of school head, dean, admissions, business, registrar, alumni, fund raising, and development.
- 17. Benefits and Payroll Taxes: those paid by the school to faculty, administrators, and support-service and maintenance personnel. Contributions by these personnel toward such benefits are not included.
- 18. <u>Information/Communication</u>: advertising, subscriptions, promotional expenses, etc.
- 19. <u>Insurance/Other:</u> professional fees, convocation and commencement, equipment rentuls, interest, and miscellaneous.
- 21. Plant Salaries: cash salaries and wages paid to maintenance personnel. Benefits and payroll taxes are included under that heading (see note on line 17, above).
- 22. Plant Supplies: expenses of energy, etc., and equipment.
- 24. Student Aid: financial aid to faculty children as well as nonfaculty children.
- 25. <u>Transfers/Other</u>: transfers to other funds and miscellaneous "other" expenses.

Income

27. Tuition and Fees: gross income from charges for tuition, room, and board in boarding schools, lunch in day schools, and other standard fees, for all students enrolled, whether they actually pay the full amount or not; that is, the value of scholarships or other forms of financial aid are not reducted. All student financial aid is entered as an expense (see note on line 24, above).

- 28. Student Support: income from health service, store, snack bar, student transportation, and other.
- 29. Endowment: unrestricted and restricted income and transfers of capital and income from trusts held by others.
- *30. Gift: unrestricted and restricted income that is applied during the fiscal year.
- 31. Public Aid: funds from state and federal agencies, etc.
- 32. <u>Net Summer</u>: income from summer school, camps, conferences, grants, or services.

33. Other: miscellaneous income not classifiable under lines 27-32.

Special studies of comparative operations are available to NAIS member schools at a modest charge. These include operations reports of (a) similar types of schools by state or region; (b) reports of individually selected schools (five or more), regardless of location; or (c) reports of similar types of schools with different levels of budget balance, as described in Table 12 (page 7). The following table breaks the figures of the above five-year summary down in two ways: (a) by boarding and day schools, and (b) by girls', boys', and coeducational schools. Figures in parentheses show the percentage of each type of school and its enrollment. Changes in these percentages from 1972-73 to 1976-77 reveal the shifts that have occurred, both in numbers of schools and in enrollment, from boarding to day, and from girls' and boys' to coeducational schools.

The change in the total of NAIS member

schools from year to year is the result of schools dropping out of membership, new schools joining, and mergers of two or more schools to form a single institution. Mergers have been of particular significance in this five-year period, especially the early part. Over these five years, 72 active member schools have joined to form 36 single institutions. Had these mergers not taken place, the active membership total as of September 1, 1976, would have been 802 instead of 766.
