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ABSTRACT

This short booklet is designed to be used by health educators when teaching women about breast cancer and its early detection and the procedure for breast self-examination. It includes the following: (1) A one-page teaching plan consisting of objectives, subject matter, methods (including titles of films and printed materials), target audience, and resource persons; (2) one and one-half pages briefly covering content on breast cancer; (3) suggestions for programs in screening for breast cancer for adult females in middle and upper income brackets which includes potential audience groups, display poster title, presentation topics and films, and titles of pamphlets for use as hand-out materials; (4) suggestions for programs in screening for breast cancer for adult females in the low income bracket which includes the same categories of information as in the aforementioned program for adult females in middle and upper income brackets; (5) a listing of the recommended pamphlets and poster, the name and address of their source, and the intended target audience; (6) brief description of two recommended films; (7) instructions on how to obtain resource materials; and (8) a listing of cancer's seven warning signals. LECTURE: NATURE OF THE DISEASE

Breast cancer consists of cells that multiply in an irregular and disorderly fashion. A lump formed by the body's cells is called a tumor. Not all tumors are cancerous. About 80 per cent of the tumors found in the breast are benign (non-cancerous). Malignant tumors push aside, invade and destroy normal tissues and may spread to other parts of the body, starting new growth known as metastases.

CAUSE -- Unknown

SYMPTOMS -- A lump or thickening in the breast

METHODS OF DETECTION

1. Examination by a physician as a part of periodic health check-up.
2. Breast self-examination. All women should learn the proper technique for examining her breasts each month.
3. Mammography (X-ray examination).
4. Thermography (a heat sensitive photograph).

TREATMENT

Approved treatment methods are:

1. Surgery to remove the growth.
2. Radiation (x-ray or radioactive materials) to kill cancer cells.
3. Chemical or drugs to fight the abnormal cells.
4. A combination of any of these techniques.

MOST SUSCEPTIBLE WOMEN

Women in which breast cancer most frequently occurs:

1. Middle age and over.

2. Single women.
3. Women who have not borne children.
4. Daughters or sisters of breast cancer patients.

PREVENTIVE MEASURES

Since most cancer cannot be prevented, it is important to find them early and seek treatment promptly. About 95 per cent of patients discover their condition themselves through breast self-examination. The stage at which breast cancer is detected is crucial to the outcome of the patient. If the cancer is discovered while it is still localized, the survival rate is 80-85 per cent.

CANCER'S SEVEN WARNING SIGNALS

1. Unusual bleeding or discharge
2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere
3. A sore that does not heal
4. Change in bowel or bladder habits
5. Hoarseness or cough
6. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing
7. Change in size or color of a wart or mole
