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ABSTRACT

The Illinois public community college Faculty and Administrative Salary Survey presents information on full-time faculty mean salaries from fall 1973 through fall 1977, teaching and non-teaching personnel actual 1977-78 contractual salaries by school district, and mean salaries per yearly course semester hour, weekly class contact hour, academic month, and percent increase for continuing personnel. Survey items also include part-time rates, overload rates, and total fiscal year (twelve-month) salaries. The full-time faculty academic year (nine months) contractual salary mean average was \$16,822, a 4% rise over the previous year. Overall, colleges paid 6% increases to continuing faculty; these increases were well below standard cost-of-living rises. State salary schedule averages ranged from \$11,193 to \$22,043 for masters degree holders and \$13,805 to \$23,168 for doctorate holders, with minimum to maximum experience respectively. Part-time and overload rates averaged \$283 and \$362 per semester hour respectively. Administrator salaries averaged from \$23,033 for chief community education officers to \$38,305 for district chief executives. Twenty-eight data tables also cover: institutional salary policies, teaching and non-teaching faculty members, sick leave and retirement policies, faculty organizations, and disability coverage. PREFACE

The Faculty and Administrative Salary Survey for 1977-78 was designed to collect information about faculty and administrative salaries for use by the state agencies in justifying the budget request and by colleges in the salary determinations for next year. This is the sixth consecutive year for this report on faculty and administrative salaries in the public community colleges of Illinois.

This year's survey included new items on part-time salary rates, overload rates, and total fiscal year twelve month (W-2 type) faculty salaries. These new items were added to make the survey more useful for the community colleges. A survey of fringe benefit policies which have implications for the State University Retirement System were also included. Results of this survey are contained in this report. A copy of the survey instrument is included in Appendix B of this document.

Every effort was made to obtain the most essential salary data and to ensure that each community college reported reliable data on a comparable basis with all other colleges. Due to the great variety of salary policies within the community colleges of Illinois, some of the items asked could not be completed by all colleges while estimates of comparable data had to be provided in some cases.

The faculty salaries shown in this report are generally academic year (usually 9 month) salaries paid to full-time teachers. The administrative salaries are for the fiscal year (twelve months). Hence, care must be used when attempting comparisons. The report also utilizes mean (average) salary which is the arithmetic averages of all full-time faculty salaries at each college and median salary which is the middle salary (an equal number of salaries both lower and higher than this salary) at each college. The median salary is the most appropriate measure of central tendencies for salary data because it is not affected by a few extremely low or extremely high salaries.

The ICCB staff appreciates the cooperation of the personnel in the community colleges in completing the salary survey promptly and accurately. Acknowledgement is also given to the ICCB Research Advisory Council and the Council of Presidents for their assistance in revising the survey instrument. We hope the information in this survey report will serve the needs of each of you.

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HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 1977-78 FACULTY AND ADMINISTRATIVE SALARY SURVEY
IN THE PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES OF ILLINOIS.

1. The state average of the mean academic year (usually 9 months) contractual salaries actually paid by the community colleges to full-time faculty was 16,822 during 1977-78, an increase of \$785 (4.9%) from the previous year. The state average percent salary increase that colleges reported their continuing faculty members receiving was 6.0%. These increases are well below the increases in the cost of living. While the average faculty salaries in community colleges have increased by 23.8% since 1973-74, the consumer price index has increased by 34% during the same period. (See Pages 6 and 7.)
2. The state averages of the academic year (usually 9 months) salary schedule salaries paid to full-time teaching faculty in the public community colleges are as follows: (See Pages 16 and 17.)
 - a. Masters Degree, no additional graduates course work, and no experience (beginning level base salary) \$ 11,193
 - b. Masters Degree, maximum additional graduate course work, and 5 years experience \$ 15,884
 - c. Masters Degree, maximum additional graduate course work, and maximum experience \$ 22,043
3. The state total twelve month fiscal year (W-2 type) faculty salary for FY1977 was \$18,447 in the community colleges of Illinois. This salary was \$1,625 higher than the average academic year (nine-month) salary. (See Pages 8 and 9.)
4. Part-time faculty salary rates ranged from \$177 to \$593 per course semester hour and averages \$238 during the fall 1977 term. The average overload rate for full-time faculty per course semester hour was \$362. (See Pages 10 and 11.)
5. An analysis of faculty salaries for three common measures of faculty output in the public community colleges of Illinois revealed the following state average salaries per unit: (See Pages 14 and 15 for details.)
 - a. Salary cost per annual course semester credit hour \$ 564
 - b. Salary cost per course contact hour \$ 531
 - c. Salary cost per month \$ 1890
6. The number of part-time teaching faculty increased by 1,405 (15.0%) from a year ago to 10,803 (68% of the total) while the number of full-time teaching faculty increased by only 74 (1.5%) to 4,984 (32% of the total) for the fall 1977 term. (See Pages 22 and 23.)
7. State average salaries paid for administrative positions in the public community colleges of Illinois in 1977-78 changed from -1.6% to +4.8% from a year earlier among the various administrative positions. The state average salaries for each of the following positions are shown below: (See Pages 32 through 34.)

INTRODUCTION

The Illinois Public Community College Faculty and Administrative Salary Survey for 1977-78 has been revised to include new items about part-time faculty salary rates, overload faculty salary rates, total fiscal year (W-2 type) faculty salaries, and salaries for some additional key administrators. It is hoped that these additional new items will make this year's survey even more useful for the community colleges, state agencies, and to all persons that have a need for this salary data.

Every attempt was made to ensure that the data presented were reported on a comparable basis by each college. However, due to the great diversity among the community colleges in their administrative structures and their salary policies, it is very difficult to make comparisons on the basis of any salary figure by itself. For example, although the academic year base salary would seem to be a very comparable type of figure, the length of an academic year varies among the colleges by as much as a month. Other items which must be taken into account when making comparisons among colleges are the ratio of part-time to full-time faculty, the age and experience of the staff, and fringe benefits. Several different types of salaries are shown in this document and an analysis of all of these is essential when making comparisons. For example, when comparing the faculty salaries of two colleges that do not have similar faculties in terms of experience or number of steps on the salary schedule (a new college compared to an established one) the average salary of the present faculty would be inappropriate; however, the salary schedule salaries would be more comparable in this case.

In this report, we have attempted to explain and analyze the data presented in each table. Additional analysis may be desired on an individual need basis. For example, a community college may want to compare itself with five other community colleges that it considers to be in the same category with itself. This type of comparison is probably the most meaningful for local use; however, it is not feasible at the state level because there is little agreement on the various categories of colleges to be used and no agreement about which colleges fit into each category.

The 1977-78 Faculty and Administrative Salary Survey included the participation of all thirty-nine public community college districts and all fifty-one colleges in Illinois. The data includes analyses by college for the actual numbers of faculty employed, the faculty salary data, the administrative salary data, and an analyses of institutional policies which relate to salaries.

This year's salary survey can be compared with similar ICCB salary surveys conducted and published in prior years for an analysis of salary trends in Illinois public community colleges. Table 1 on page three shows the mean academic year salaries paid to full-time teaching faculty in Illinois public community colleges for each community college since Fall 1973. The table shows that the mean faculty salaries in the community colleges increased from \$13,594 in the Fall 1973 to \$16,822 for the Fall of 1977. The salary increase of 4.9% in 1977 was larger than the 4.2% reported in 1976; however, it was still below the cost of living increase for 1977.

The average salaries paid to full-time teaching faculty are affected by several factors other than the salary schedule. For example, the replacement of experienced faculty members with ones who have little experience can reduce the mean salary for a given college although the salary schedule might be increased. The salary survey report shows the salary schedule salaries as well as the actual salaries for each community college. The reader must be cautious that he or she uses the most appropriate salary information.

The figure below shows the change in the state average full-time teaching salaries of faculty in Illinois public community college in percent from a base year of 1973 compared to a change in the consumer price index using the same base year of 1973. This figure shows that although the average faculty salaries have increased by 23.8% since 1973-74, the Consumer Price Index has increased 34.0% during the same period. Hence, the increase in faculty salaries in the community colleges of Illinois has not kept pace with the increase in the cost of living during the past four years.




Figure 1. Comparison of Increase of Average Faculty Salaries in Illinois Public Community Colleges With The Consumer Price Index Since 1973.

SUMMARY OF 1977-78 SALARY DATA

Table 2 on the opposite page shows a summary of selected faculty and administrative salaries in Illinois public community colleges for 1977-78. The range of salaries, the state average salary, and the percent change from 1976-77 are shown in this table. The data for each college are shown later in this report. The academic year (9 Mo.) contractual salaries are ones which the colleges contract with the faculty while the salary schedule salaries are ones which are shown on the colleges salary schedule. The state average actual contractual base salaries increased by 4.9% from a year earlier.

The state average base salary schedule salaries increased by 4.9% to \$11,193 while the state average salary for a teacher with a masters degree, maximum hours, and five years experience increased by 5.8% to \$15,884.

The administrative salaries shown are for an entire year (twelve months) and represent the average of all the salaries reported by all the public community colleges in Illinois. The annual percent increase in the state average salaries of these positions ranged from -1.6% to 4.8%.

This year an analysis of part-time faculty salary rates as well as total (12 Mo.) fiscal year (W-2 type) faculty salaries was added to the salary survey. Hence, although no comparison with previous years is possible on these salaries, the state average rates are shown in Table 2.

Part-time faculty salaries are paid on many different basis by the various community colleges. For example, some colleges pay a flat dollar amount per course, while other colleges pay a rate per hour or per class contact hour. In this survey all these various methods of payment were converted to an average rate per semester course credit hour to obtain comparable data for reporting purposes.

The fiscal year (W-2 type) faculty salaries include the total salary paid to a faculty member for an entire year. This includes overloads for extra courses or for teaching a summer session as well as any additional payment for special assignments. This salary is similar to the salary reported on the W-2 form except that it is for a fiscal year instead of a calendar year. Since this faculty salary data is for a full twelve month period, it is comparable to the administrative salary data.

ACTUAL 1977-78 ACADEMIC YEAR CONTRACTUAL SALARIES PAID TO FULL-TIME TEACHING FACULTY

Table 4 on the next page shows the lowest, mean, median, and highest academic year contractual salaries paid to full-time teaching faculty at each community college in Illinois. Academic year contractual base salaries were utilized in this table to obtain as much comparability as possible among the colleges.

The lowest salaries represent the lowest base salary actually paid to a full-time teaching faculty at each of the community college districts and are different from salary schedule salaries which are reported in Tables 14 and 16 of this report. The low salaries ranged from \$6,300 to \$15,583 at the various colleges.

The high salaries represent the highest salary actually paid to a full-time teaching faculty for an academic year (9 months) at each of the colleges. The mean (average) salaries represent the arithmetic average of all full-time teaching faculty salaries at each college district. The median salary is the one which is in the middle of the range (an equal number of salaries both lower and higher than this salary) at each college. The median salary is the most appropriate measure of central tendencies for salary data because it is not affected by extremely low or extremely high salaries. The median faculty salary for all districts was \$17,206.

Table 3 below shows a summary of the state average and ranges by the various categories.

Table 6 on the next page shows the median and mean salaries paid to teaching and non-teaching faculty in each community college in Illinois for the entire fiscal year 1977 and includes all overloads and compensation for extra assignments. The non-teaching faculty includes counselors, curriculum specialists, and other professionals employed by colleges that are classified as faculty by the college in addition to the instructional faculty. These salaries are W-2 type salaries in that they include all salaries paid to the faculty during a given year. However, the data is obtained for a fiscal year starting July 1, 1976 to June 30, 1977 rather than for a calendar year as is the case with W-2 form salaries. The salaries shown on this page do represent total earnings of faculty and enable a comparison between academic year salaries and total salaries earned by faculty members.

The state average for total mean salaries paid to teaching faculty of \$18,447 for 12 months is \$1,625 more than the state average academic year (9 month) salaries paid to full-time teaching faculty. An analysis of total faculty salaries is important because some community colleges make an extra effort to insure that the full-time faculty have first chance at overload classes and extra assignments prior to hiring part-time faculty.

Table 5 below shows a summary of the W-2 type faculty salaries for fiscal year 1977.

PART-TIME FACULTY SALARY RATES

Table 8 on the next page shows the average part-time faculty salary rates per course semester credit hour by each community college. The first column shows the part-time faculty rate. This would be the rate paid to a part-time teacher to teach a night class at an extension center, for example. The second column shows the overload rate for the academic year. This rate represents the amount paid to a full-time faculty for teaching courses above the full-time load. Often this is compensation for teaching an extra night class or for teaching an additional class in the daytime. The third column shows the extra rate for full-time faculty for the summer term. These rates represent the amount received by faculty members for teaching a class during the summer term. It is important to point out that the community colleges have many different basis for determining part-time faculty rates as well as overload rates. For example, some colleges pay flat rate per course or a flat rate per term while other colleges base their rates on contact hours or credit hours. In addition, many of the colleges overload rates for full-time faculty are based on a percentage of that faculty member's actual salary. Hence, although table 8 on the next page shows the rates per course semester credit hour, this is not the basis for many of the rates shown, but is simply a method of reporting so that comparable data can be obtained for each college. It must be realized, however, that much of the data reported had to be averaged and estimated for each college. It must be pointed out that this is the first year for collecting this data in the salary survey and, hence, may be subject to some misinterpretations.

Table 7 below shows a summary of the part-time faculty and overload salary rates in Illinois public community colleges during FY1978.

SALARIES PAID TO NON-TEACHING FACULTY

Table 10 shows the lowest, mean, median, and highest academic year contractual salaries paid to full-time teaching and non-teaching faculty at each community college in Illinois. The non-teaching faculty includes counselors, curriculum specialists, and other professionals employed by the colleges that are classified as faculty by the college in addition to the instructional (teaching) faculty members.

The lowest salaries represent the lowest base salary actually paid to a full-time non-teaching faculty member at each of the community colleges and are different from salary schedule salaries which are reported in Tables 14 and 16 of this report. The high salaries represent the highest salary actually paid to a full-time non-teaching faculty member for an academic year (9 months) at each of the colleges. The mean (average) salaries represent the arithmetic average of all full-time non-teaching faculty salaries at each college district. The median salary is the one which is in the middle of the range (an equal number of salaries both lower and higher than this salary) at each college. The state average of the mean non-teaching faculty salaries at the 39 college districts was \$17,329, while the state average for the 51 college campuses was \$17,745. These average salaries paid to non-teaching faculty are slightly higher than the average salaries paid to teaching faculty. Actual salaries paid to teaching faculty are shown in Table 4 on page 7.

Table 9 below shows a summary of the salaries paid non-teaching faculty in Illinois public community colleges.

Table 12 on the opposite page shows the mean salaries for each community college by course semester credit hour, course contact hour, and academic month. This analysis was obtained by dividing the annual course semester hours, twice the weekly class contact hours, and length of an academic year in months into the mean salary paid to full-time teaching faculty. This analysis shows the mean salaries paid by each of the community colleges for a comparable unit.

The state average mean salary per course semester hour was \$564 but this salary ranged from \$400 to \$812 at the various community colleges. The state average salary per weekly class contact hour was \$531 while the state average mean salary for full-time teaching faculty per academic month was \$1,890.

The percent salary increase for continuing faculty members was designed to show the percent salary increase without the distortion created by the hiring of new faculty members and the retiring of faculty members with long tenure. The colleges were asked to report the percent salary increase for those faculty employed both last year and this year. The percent salary increases reported ranged from +1.5% to +11.7% and averaged +6.0% at the thirty-nine community college districts.

Table 11 below shows a summary of the analysis of mean salaries per course semester hour, weekly class contact hour, and academic month.

Table 14 shows the 1977-78 salaries of the full-time teaching faculty with a Masters Degree at each community college in Illinois. The number of steps required on the schedule to achieve this salary is also shown. Since several colleges do not use the masters degree as a basis for determining position on a salary schedule, alternative but comparable ranges from their salary schedules based on faculty rank (beginning instructors column) were utilized. These salaries are based on the salary schedules at the colleges and not on the actual salaries paid. Hence, this data is more appropriate for comparative purposes because it is not distorted by the years of experience of the faculty.

The range of salaries for each category at the thirty-nine community college districts as well as the mean salary for each category are shown in Table 13 below.

Table 16 attempts to show the lowest salary, highest salary, and number of steps in the doctorate degree column of the 1977-78 salary schedule at each public community college in Illinois. For colleges that use rank as the basis for their salary schedule, the professor column was utilized. A few colleges do not require the doctorate degree for faculty to attain the highest salary while others do not have a column which is equivalent to the doctorate level.

A summary of the range of salaries and state average salaries for full-time faculty with doctorate degrees in the community colleges of Illinois are shown in table 15 below.

INSTITUTIONAL POLICIES RELATED TO FACULTY SALARIES AND
FACULTY CONTRACTS AT ILLINOIS PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Table 18 on the next page shows the institutional policies at each public community college in Illinois which are related to faculty salaries and faculty contracts. These policies often have a considerable impact on the salaries presented elsewhere in this report. For example, the average weekly class contact hours per full-time instructional faculty has a bearing on the number of faculty that an institution must have to meet its needs. The length of a full-time academic year contract also has a bearing on academic year salary for full-time faculty.

Of the thirty-nine community colleges in Illinois, eleven have professional rank, although not all of these use rank as a criteria for salary determinations. Twenty-eight of the thirty-nine districts have faculty tenure, while eleven community colleges do not have faculty tenure. Twenty public community college districts in Illinois have master contracts with the faculty.

In addition to the class contact hours, office hours, and academic advising hours, faculty members spend much time in grading papers, preparing class presentation, working on curriculum development, and serving on college committees. Hence, although the state average number of required hours for the faculty is 28 per week, most faculty members spend over 40 hours per week on their full-time assignment.

NUMBER OF INSTRUCTIONAL (TEACHING) FACULTY

Table 20 on the opposite page shows the number of teaching faculty members in each of the public community colleges of Illinois distributed by full-time and part-time and by sex. The total number of teaching faculty reported this year was 15,787 which is 1479 more than the 14,308 reported a year ago, which is an increase of over 10%. Almost all of this increase was in part-time faculty members, however. The number of full-time faculty members increased by only 74 from a year ago.

A full-time equivalent (FTE) faculty is locally defined by each college but in each case represents an expected full-time teaching load at that institution. Usually, the definition is based on a combination of course credit hours taught and classroom contact hours. The institutional definitions are shown in Table 18 on page 21. The total number of FTE faculty reported in the state during 1977-78 was 8,060.

Table 19 below shows a summary of the Fall 1977 instructional (teaching) faculty.

Table 22 shows the number of non-teaching faculty members in each of the public community colleges of Illinois distributed by full-time and part-time employment and by sex. Non-teaching faculty includes counselors, curriculum coordinators, learning resource specialists and other professionals who are classified by the college as faculty (not as administrators) but who do not teach in the classroom. Full-time non-teaching faculty are ones that have a regular full-time contract. The total number of full-time and part-time non-teaching faculty members in the community colleges of Illinois during 1977-78 was 576 which is 17 less than the 593 non-teaching faculty reported during 1976-77.

A summary of the distribution of the Fall 1977 non-teaching faculty in Illinois public community colleges is shown in Table 21 below.

FACULTY ORGANIZATIONS IN ILLINOIS PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Table 24 on the next page shows the faculty organizations that exist at each of the public community colleges of Illinois and the faculty organization or committee that is the recognized negotiating body for the faculty by the local board of trustees. The faculty organization recognized as the negotiating body for the faculty at most community colleges is the American Federation of Teachers (AFT). The board of trustees of fifteen community colleges do not recognize any faculty organization or committee as the official negotiating body for the faculty.

A summary of the involvement of each organization in the community college of Illinois is shown in Table 23 below. Three districts reported no faculty organization at their colleges, while fifteen community colleges did not recognize any faculty organization or committee as the official negotiating body for the faculty.

SICK LEAVE POLICIES AT ILLINOIS
PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Table 25 on the following page presents the policies dealing with sick leave at the public community colleges in Illinois that is of concern to the State Universities Retirement System. It shows the number of sick days which would be accumulated after ten, twenty, and forty years of employment at each community college. The number of sick days range from a low of 90 to a high of 200 after ten years, from 100 to 300 after twenty years, and from 100 to 600 after forty years of employment. Sick leave is either measured in calendar or work days. Only one community college district measures sick leave by calendar days and six college districts pay for a portion of unused sick leave. The percent of unused sick leave which is subject to cash reimbursement at retirement at the four community college districts that paid for unused sick leave and reported the percentage for which they paid ranges from a low of 12% to a high of 40%. The payment for unused sick leave is made either in a lump sum at retirement or spread over a period of several months. It should be noted that the majority of colleges' sick leave policies remained constant from those reported during 1976-77. Only those colleges having changes from the previous year submitted new sick leave policies.

DISABILITY COVERAGE AND RETIREMENT
POLICIES AT ILLINOIS PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Table 26 on the opposite page shows the disability coverage and retirement policies at each of the public community colleges in Illinois which are in addition to the disability coverage provided by the State Universities Retirement System. Of the thirty-nine community college districts, nineteen provide disability insurance coverage to their employees while twenty colleges do not. Four college districts give separation pay, retirement pay, vacation pay or other compensation in addition to the normal contract salary when a faculty member retires from the college. The majority of the college districts (35) do not give any compensation in addition to the normal contract salary. For those districts that give compensation, most pay it in a lump sum at retirement. In only one district was the amount paid over a period of time. It should be noted that the majority of colleges' disability coverage and retirement policies remained unchanged from those reported in 1976-77. Only those colleges having changes from the previous year submitted new disability coverage and retirement policies.

SALARIES PAID TO TOP ADMINISTRATORS IN ILLINOIS PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES DURING 1977-78

Table 28 shows the full twelve month salaries paid to the top administrators in each of the public community colleges in Illinois during 1977-78. The chief executive officer of the district is either a Chancellor or a president and has overall administrative responsibilities for the college district. The chief campus administrator reports directly to the chief executive officer of the district and has overall administrative responsibility for the college campus. Examples of chief campus administrators are the presidents at multi-campus institutions or executive vice-president for internal affairs at single campus colleges. Due to the various administrative organizations which exist at the colleges, often a particular position does not exist. Care must be taken to analyze the entire administrative structure before making comparisons between similar positions at two different colleges. In addition to the title and salary, the administrative level of each position was obtained which provides additional data about the position.

A summary of the salaries paid to top administrators in Illinois public community colleges during 1977-78 appears in Table 27 below.

HIGHLIGHTS OF CHANGES IN THE PROPOSED FACULTY AND

As a result of the various suggestions that we have received from community college presidents, Research Advisory Council members and other persons interested in improving the faculty and administrative salary survey, and as a result of review and compromise, the following revisions in the survey instrument for 1977-78 are being implemented.

1. A fiscal year W-2 type salary for faculty members was added to the instrument. In the past, our survey instrument for faculty members showed academic year (9 months) base salary only. This new item will show total 12 month salaries of faculty members including overloads, summer term and compensation for extra assignments. See Item 8 on the salary survey.

2. An item was included to obtain information on part-time faculty salary rates. This item obtains information on both part-time faculty salaries and salaries paid to full-time faculty for teaching overloads. In addition, a conversion to a rate per course credit hour is obtained. See Item 9 on salary survey.

3. Two additional positions were added to the administrative salary survey. These two positions are director of data processing or equivalent and director of research and planning or equivalent. In addition the number of years in the position of administrators is being obtained. See Item 10 on the salary survey.

4. Excluded from this year's survey are the following items which were included in last year's salary survey.

- a. Information about who represents the board of trustees in faculty salary determinations,
- b. The items dealing with fringe benefits in the community colleges which are of concern to the State University Retirement System is being requested only if changes occurred since last year.

5. The survey instrument was prepared on two pages without reductions so that it would be typewriter ready.

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
