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ABSTRACT

Students at Moraine Valley Community College (MVCC) who had earned 45 credit hours or more as of spring 1976 but who did not re-enroll for the fall 1976 semester were surveyed. Questionnaires were sent to 295 nonpersisting students and were designed to collect information on student characteristics, educational goals, goal achievement, when students stopped attending. classes, employment while attending MVCC, financial aid received, the number of times students changed their study programs, present activities and future plans, reasons for not returning, evaluation of MVCC aspects, educational program outcomes and characteristics, and courses in which students did not succeed. A total of 174 nonpersisters (127 responding to the questionnaire, and 47 contacted by telephone) responded. Responses were separated according to student status (part- or full-time, occupational or transfer program participants). Nonpersisters cited personal or educational goal achievement, transfer to another college, jcb responsibilities, family responsibilities, inconvenient class schedules, lack of desired courses, and finding employment as important reasons for leaving MVCC. A majority reported dropping out of MVCC at the end of the semester. More than 50% were attending other colleges or universities, and 64% were employed. 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I. Objectives

A list of nonpersisting student names was generated from those students who were enrolled in spring 1976 and did not re-enroll for the fall 1976 semester. Graduates and students enrolled in community service and/or general education courses were excluded from the list of nonpersisters. A survey was designed to determine the characteristics and opinions of these nonpersisting students. This survey was limited to those nonpersisters who earned 45 or more credit hours as of the spring 1976 semester.

The specific objectives which guided the investigation were:

- to determine the characteristics of the 45 or more credit hours
 earned nonpersisters
- to determine the educational goals of the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisting student
- to determine whether or not the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters accomplished their goals
- to determine when the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisting students' stopped attending classes
- to determine how many hours a week 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisting students' worked while attending MVCC
- to determine the types of financial aid 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisting students' were receiving
- to determine the number of times nonpersisters changed their programs of study
- to determine nonpersisters' present activities
- · to determine nonpersisters' future activities
- · to determine nonpersisters' reasons for not returning
- · to determine the nonpersisters' evaluation of MVCC aspects
- to determine the educational program outcomes of nonpersisting students
- · to determine characteristics of nonpersisters' in various programs
- · to determine courses in which nonpersisters did not succeed.

II. Procedures

A total of 314 students who either dropped during the spring 1976 semester, or did not return for the fall 1976 semester were identified as earning 45 or more credit hours. A questionnaire, cover letter and a business reply envelope was maided to each nonpersister. Except for nonpersisting

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students who could not be located because of address changes, a second mailing was sent to the nonrespondents. Two hundred ninety-five non-persisters were located and of that number 127 or 43% responded to the questionnaire.

To establish the reliability of study results and to obtain population data on the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters a telephone survey was conducted of the nonrespondents. An abbreviated version of the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersister questionnaire was used to elicit the nonpersisters' responses to: primary reason for enrolling at MVCC, reasons for not re-enrolling at MVCC the following semester and an evaluation of six MVCC aspects. Forty-seven or 16% of the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters were contacted by telephone. A total of 174 of the 295 nonpersisters or 59% supplied MVCC with information.

The distribution of reasons for enrolling and for not re-enrolling of respondents and nonrespondents was similar. The study results can be considered characteristic of all spring 1976-fall 1976 nonpersisters who earned at least 45 credit hours.

III. Reasons for Not Returning

Table 1 displays the importance attached by 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters to various reasons for not returning to MVCC. Data breakdowns occur by student load and curriculum.

In 1976, "Transferred to another college," "Achieved personal or educational goal" and "Classes not offered at a time convenient for my personal schedule" were major reasons for not returning to MVCC as cited by full-time nonpersisters who earned at least 45 credit hours. Two of the three reasons were consistent with 1975 ratings, but were increased in rating value in 1976: "Transferred to another college" and "Achieved personal or educational goal." The third reason, "Classes not offered at a time convenient for my personal schedule" was added as an important reason for not returning to MVCC in 1976.

In order to better assess full-time nonpersisters' reasons for not returning, the responses were analyzed by major area, i.e., either transfer or occupational curriculums. Full-time transfer nonpersisters who earned at least 45 credit hours reported "Achieved personal or educational goal," "Transferred to another college" and "Desired courses not offered" as important reasons for not returning to MVCC. Full-time occupational nonpersisters rated "Achieved personal or educational goal" and "Found employment" as important reasons for not returning to MVCC.

In 1976, "Achieved personal or educational goal," "Transferred to another college," "Classes not offered at a time convenient for my personal schedule," "Desired courses not offered" and "Found employment" were important reasons for not returning to MVCC. Of the five reasons for not returning, four were consistent with 1975 ratings. "Found employment" was added as an important reason for not returning to MVCC in 1976.

When the responses were analyzed by curriculum, part-time occupational and transfer student reasons for not returning to MVCC differed. Parttime occupational nonpersisters who earned at least 45 or more credit hours reported "Achieved personal or educational goal," "Transferred to another college," "Present job responsibilities too great," "Classes not offered at a time convenient for my personal schedule," "Desired courses not offered" and "Found employment" as important reasons for not returning to MVCC in 1976. With the exception of "Found employment." the reasons for not returning to MVCC were similar to the reasons for not returning to MVCC reported in 1975. Part-time transfer nonpersisters who earned at least 45 or more credit hours reported "Achieved personal or educational goal," "Transferred to another college," "Classes not offered at a time convenient for my personal schedule" and "Desired courses not offered" as important reasons for not returning to MVCC in 1976. All of the reasons reported in 1976 for not returning to MVCC were reported as important reasons for not returning to MVCC in 1975.

"Achieved personal or educational goal" was cited by all four groups as an important reason for not returning to MVCC in 1976. "Found employment" was cited as an important reason for not returning to MVCC by occupational nonpersisters. "Transferred to another college" and "Desired courses no offered" were cited as important reasons for not returning to MVCC in 1976 by transfer students.

Chi-square tests were used to examine the relationship between age, sex, high school rank, ACT composite score, high school attended, program area and reasons for withdrawal. Significant differences between the groups were found in ten instances.

Students 25 years of age or older tended to rate "Family responsibilities interfere with Studies," "Classes not offered at a time convenient for my personal schedule," "Health or other personal reasons" and "Inadequate study techniques or habits" as important reasons for withdrawal from MVCC in 1976. Students younger than 25 years of age did not tend to list these aspects as important reasons for not returning to MVCC.

Female students tended to rank "Achieved personal or educational goal" as an important reason for withdrawal from MVCC. Achieving their educational goal was not an important reason for not returning to MVCC for male students

Students who have graduated from local parochial schools tended to list "Desired courses not offered" as an important reason for withdrawal from MVCC. Graduates of local public high schools or out-of-district high schools tended to be satisfied with course offerings.

Students with ACT composite scores in the range from 21-36 tended to list "Transferred to another college or university" as an important reason for withdrawal from MVCC. Students with ACT composite scores in the range from 1-20 tended to list "Found employment" as a reason for withdrawal.

Students enrolled in an occupational program tended to list "Found employment" as an important reason for withdrawing from MVCC. Students enrolled in a transfer program tended to list "Transferred to another college" as an important reason for not returning to MVCC.



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IV. MVCC Activities of Nonpersisters

Educational Goals

Nonpersisters earning 45 or more credit hours were asked to report what their primary educational goals were while attending MVCC; see Table 2.

Full- and part-time students who did not persist did not differ in their expressed educational goals. "Completion of an MVCC certificate or associate degree program" was cited by 59% of the full-time nonpersisters and 50% of the part-time nonpersisters.

When the data was analyzed by major curriculum 60% of the occupational nonpersisters and 52% of the transfer nonpersisters had an educational goal of "Completion of an MVCC degree or certificate." Forty-three percent of the transfer nonpersisters cited "Completion of deficiencies in order to transfer to a senior college" as a primary educational goal.

Sixty-nine percent of the nonpersisters attained their educational goal and therefore had no reason to re-enroll for courses. When goal attainment was analyzed by curriculum, 73% of the transfer students and 56% of the occupational students accomplished their goals.

While at MVCC, 73% of the part-time students who were nonpersisters reported accomplishing their educational goals. Sixty-seven percent of the full-time students who did not persist accomplished their educational goal.

More than eight of every ten students whose goal was "To complete deficiencies in order to transfer to a senior college" accomplished their goal. Half of the students whose educational goal was "To learn a new skill" completed their objective. One of every four students whose educational goal was "To improve and upgrade my skills" accomplished their goal.

Withdrawal from Classes

Most 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters, 95%, reported dropping from their MVCC classes after the end of the semester; see Table 3.

Ninety-five percent of the full-time nonpersisters and 85% of the parttime nonpersisters completed the semester and did not re-enroll at MVCC. When the data was analyzed by curriculum, 88% of the occupational program nonpersisters and 92% of the transfer program nonpersisters did not return to MVCC after they completed the semester.

Number of Hours Employed While Attending MVCC

Of the 174 students who responded to the nonpersister questionnaira, 109 or 62% reported that they were employed while attending MVCC; see Table 4.

Twenty-several percent of the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters were working 40 or more hours a week while attending MVCC. Forty percent were working a minimum of 30 hours a week.

Seventy-six percent of the part-time nonpersisters were working while attending MVCC and 48% of the full-time students were working while attending MVCC.

Financial Aid

Seventy-two percent of the students who responded to the survey reported. that they received no financial aid. Thirteen percent of the respondents, were receiving scholarships, three percent made loans and thirteen percent were receiving aid form the weteran's administration. See Table 5 for the percentages of students receiving financial aid.

Three of the 23 students who needed financial aid in order to attend college made loans.

A chi-square was used to determine if there were any differences in reasons for not returning to MVCC by 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters who did and did not receive financial aid. Those students receiving financial aid tended to list. "Family responsibilities interfere with studies" as an important reason for withdrawal from MVCC.

Program Changes

Of the 119 students who responded to a question on program change, 13% stated that they never declared a program of study, 60% claimed that

they never changed their program of study, 24% claimed that they changed their program of study once and 3% changed their program of study two or more times; see Table 6..

Twenty-seven percent of the students enrolled in a transfer curriculum changed their program of study at least once. Thirty-two percent of the students enrolled in an occupational program changed their program of study at least once.

V. Present Activities and Future Plans

Present Educational Activity

Fifty-six percent of the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters are attending another college or university. Thirty-six percent are not now attending school; see Table 7.

Three of every five nonpersisters are involved in some type of educational activity. Transfer nonpersisters tend to enroll in another college or university. Occupational nonpersisters tend not to enroll for further education or training.

Present Employment Status.

Sixty-four percent of the nonpersisters are presently employed. Of the students that are working, 20% are working in a field for which they were training and 31% were working in a field related to their MVCC training. Forty-nine percent are working in fields not related to their MVCC training; see Table 8.

Thirty-seven percent of the part-time students and 27% of the full-time students were employed in fields related to their MVCC studies. These figures are similar to last year's figures.

When analyzed by curriculum, 54% of the occupational nonpersisters and 20% of the transfer nonpersisters were working in a job related to their MVCC studies.

Future Educational Plans

Three percent of the 45 or more credit hours earned non-persisters do not plan to return to school. Fourteen percent plan to earn an MVCC associate degree; see Table 9.

Eighty-three percent of the transfer nonpersisters plan to complete at least an associate degree. Twenty-one percent of the occupational and 13% of the transfer nonpersisters intend to complete an MVCC associate degree program.

VI. Evaluation of MVCC Aspects


Figure 1 displays the 1975 and 1976 full-time nonpersister mean responses to various MVCC aspects.

Atthough there are variations in the average rating of MVCC aspects, results of the 1976 full-time nonpersister evaluations show that, in general, MVCC still maintains a Good rating.

In 1976, the range of ratings for various MVCC aspects was from 1.9 to 3.3. "Veteran Services" received the rating value of 3.1, Good-Excellent. "College Food Services" received a rating value of 1.9, Fair.

Comparisons of 1975 ratings and 1976 ratings are available for 16 MVCC aspects. Ten ratings for MVCC aspects were lower in value, three ratings for MVCC aspects were higher in value and three ratings for MVCC aspects retained the same value from 1975 to 1976. The ratings were identical in 1975 and 1976 for "Clubs and Organizations," "Course Content" and "Faculty Quality." The ratings were higher in value in 1976 than in 1975 for "Special Cultural Events," "Variety of Course Offerings" and "Study Skills Center." The ratings were lower in value in 1976 for "Educational Planning by Crossroads Staff," "Personal Counseling by . Counselors," "Career Exploration by Counselors," "Recreational Activities," "Financial Aid Services," "Job Placement Services," "Scheduling of Classes," "Faculty-Staff Availability," "Learning Lab" and "Library Services."

Rigure 2 displays the 1975 and 1976 part-time nonpersister mean responses to various MVCC aspects.

Although there are variations in the average rating of MVCC aspects, results of the 1976 part-time nonpersister evaluation show, in general, MVCC-still maintains a Good rating.

In 1976, the range of ratings for various MVCC aspects was from 1.9 to 3.5. "Veteran Services" received a rating value of 3.5, Good-Excellent. "Clubs and Organizations" and "College Food Services" received rating values of 1.9, Fair.

For the 16 MVCC aspects where ratings are available for 1975 and 1976, seven ratings were lower in value in 1976, two ratings were the same in value and seven ratings were higher in value in 1976. The ratings were identical in 1975 and 1976 for "Job Placement Services" and "Library Services." The ratings were higher in 1976 than in 1975 for "Educational Planning by Crossroads Staff," "Personal Counseling by Counselors," "Variety of Course Offerings," "Course Content," "Faculty Quality," "Faculty-Staff Availability" and "Study Skills Center." The ratings were lower in value in 1976 for "Career Exploration by Counselors," "Clubs and Organizations," "Recreational Activities," "Special Curral Events," "Financial Aid Services," "Scheduling of Classes" and "Learning Laboratory."

Comparing full- and part-time nonpersister evaluation of MVCC aspects indicated that there was total agreement on the rating values for "Personal Counseling by Counselors," "Faculty-Staff Availability." "Business/Accounting Office Services," "Bookstore Services," "College Food Services" and "Safety and Security Services."


In general, part-time nonpersisters gave higher rating values to MVCC aspects than full-time nonpersisters.

Table 10 displays the 1975 and 1976 ratings of MVCC aspects by student load and curriculum.

The ratings for full-time occupational nonpersisters ranged from Fair to Good-Excellent. "Faculty Quality;" "Faculty-Staff Availability" and "Veteran Services" were rated Good-Excellent. "Bookstore Services" and "College Food Services" were rated Fair.

For the 16 MVCC aspects where ratings are available for 1975 and 1976, two ratings for MVCC aspects were lower in value in 1976, three ratings for MVCC aspects were higher in value in 1976 and 11 ratings for MVCC aspects were identical for 1975 and 1976. The ratings were higher in value in 1976 for "Faculty Quality" and "Faculty-Staff Availability." The ratings were lower in value in 1976 for "Personal Counseling by Counselors," "Job Placement Services" and "Library Services." The ratings for "Educational Planning by Crossroads Staff," "Career Exploration by Counselors," "Clubs and Organizations," "Recreational Activities," "Special Cultural Events," "Financial Aid Services," "Scheduling of Classes," "Variety of Course Offerings," "Course Content," "Learning Laboratory" and "Study Skills Center" were the same for both 1975 and 1976.

The ratings for full-time transfer nonpersisters ranged from Fair to Good-Excellent. "Veteran Services" was rated Good-Excellent. "Career Exploration by Counselors," "Career Conferences," "Preventive Health Information Seminars," "Bookstore Services" and "College Food Services" were rated Fair.

For the 16 MVCC aspects where comparisons are possible between 1975 and 1976, four ratings for MVCC aspects were lower in value in 1976, seven ratings for MVCC aspects were higher in value in 1976 and five ratings retained their 1975 value in 1976. The ratings were higher in 1976 for "Clubs and Organizations," "Variety of Course Offerings," "Course Content" and "Study Skills Center." "Personal Counseling by Counselors," "Career Exploration by Counselors," "Recreational Activities," "Scheduling of Classes," "Faculty-Staff Availability," "Learning Laboratory" and "Library Services" had lower ratings in 1976 than they did in 1975. The 1975 and 1976 ratings were identical for "Educational Planning by Crossroads Staff," "Special Gultural Events," "Financial Aid Services," "Job Placement Services" and "Faculty Quality."

Part-time occupational nonpersister ratings ranged from Poor-Fair to Good-Excellent. "Variety of Course Offerings," "Course Content," "Library Services," "Study Skills Center" and "Veteran Services" received Good-Excellent ratings. "Clubs and Organizations" received a Poor-Fair rating.

From 1975 to 1976 the rating values of five MVCC aspects were higher in value, four MVCC aspects had lower values and seven MVCC aspects retained their rating value. Higher rating values occurred for "Personal Counseling by Counselors," "Job Placement Services," "Variety of Course Offerings," "Course Content" and "Study Skills Center." Lower rating values were obtained by "Clubs and Organizations," "Recreational Activities," "Special Cultural Events" and "Scheduling of Classes." Rating values were retained from 1975 to 1976 for "Educational Planning by Crossroads Staff," "Career Exploration by Counselors," "Financial Aid Services," "Faculty Quality," "Faculty-Staff Availability," "Learning Laboratory" and "Library Services."

The ratings for part-time transfer nonpersisters ranged from Fair to Good-Excellent. "Study Skills Center" and "Veteran Services" were rated Good-Excellent. "Clubs and Organizations," "Career Conferences," "Bookstore Services" and "College Food Services" were rated Fair.

The 1976 ratings for nine MVCC aspects were the same in 1976 as they were in 1975, six ratings of MVCC aspects were lower in value in 1976 and one MVCC aspect had a higher rating value in 1976 than in 1975. The rating value for "Career Exploration by Counselors" was higher in 1976 than in 1975. "Educational Planning by Crossroads Staff," "Personal Counseling by Counselors," "Recreational Activities," "Variety of Course Offerings," "Course Content," "Faculty Quality," "Faculty-Staff Availability," "Library Services" and "Study Skills Center" retained their 1975 ratings in 1976. The rating values for "Clubs and Organizations," "Special Cultural Events," "Financial Aid Services," "Job Placement Services," "Scheduling of Classes" and "Library Services" were lower in value in 1976 than in 1975.



The full-time transfer nonpersisters rated MVCC aspects lower than full-time occupational, part-time transfer and part-time occupational students. The part-time occupational nonpersisters tended to rate MVCC aspects higher than the other three groups.

"Special Cultural Events," "Registration Process," "Learning Laboratory, "Veteran Services," "Business/Accounting Office," "Bookstore Services," "College Food Services" and "Safety and Security Services" were rated identically by all four groups.

VII. Educational Program Outcomes

Nonpersisters were asked if their MVCC training aided them in relation to their job. Table 11 displays the number and type of responses to educational outcomes.

In general, the greatest asset for nonpersisters was increased understanding of skills required for the job. MVCC training contributed least to nonpersister promotion or salary increases. These findings are similar to the statements made by 1975 nonpersisters.

The pattern of student load indicates that 81% of the students enrolled both full- and part-time during their tenure at MVCC, while 10% were enrolled only full-time and 9% were enrolled only on a part-time basis. More often than not, the enrollment periods were continuous.

Most students completed approximately half of the courses required for their major program. On the average, students attempted 10 credit hours more than they earned.

Classes in which 45 or more credit hours earned students were enrolled were analyzed to determine whether or not the students were successful. Classes where at least 10 nonpersisters did not earn credit is presented in Table 12.

IX. Summary of Results

Reasons for Not Returning

- 1. Forty-five or more credit hours earned nonpersisters gave "Achieved personal or educational goal," "Transferred to another college," "Present job responsibilities too great," "Family, responsibilities interfere with studies," "Classes not offered at a time convenient for my personal schedule," "Desired courses not offered" and "Found employment" as important reasons for withdrawing from MVCC.
- 2. Full-time and part-time nonpersister reasons for withdrawal from MVCC were the same with the exception of "Found employment" and "Desired courses not offered" which were additional reasons for withdrawal as cited by part-time students.
- 3. Occupational and transfer nonpersister reasons for withdrawing from MVCC were identical with the exception of "Present job responsibilities too great" and "Found employment" which were additional reasons for withdrawal from MVCC as cited by occupational students.
- 4. Students 25 years of age or older tended to rate "Family responsibilities interfere with studies," "Classes not offered at a time convenient for my personal schedule," "Health or other personal reasons" and "Inadequate study techniques or habits" as important reasons for withdrawal from MVCC in 1976.
- Female students tended to rank "Achieved personal or educational goal" as an important reason for withdrawal from MVCC.



- 6. Students who graduated from local parochial schools tended to list "Desired courses not offered" as an important reason for withdrawal from MVCC.
- 7. Students with ACT composite scores in the range 21-36 tended to list "Transferred to another college or university" as an important reason for withdrawal from MVCC. This reason was also cited by students enrolled in transfer programs.
- 8. Students with ACT composite scores on the range 1-20 tended to list "Found employment" as an important reason for withdrawing from MYCC. This reason was also cited by students enrolled in occupational programs.

B. Educational Goals

- 1. "Completion of an MVCC certificate or associate degree program" was cited as the primary educational goal of 59% of the full-time students and 50% of the part-time students.
- 2. The primary educational goal of occupational students was "To complete an MVCC certificate or associate degree program."

 The primary educational goal of transfer students was "To complete deficiencies in order to transfer to a senior college" or "To complete an MVCC certificate or associate degree program."
- 3. Sixty-nine percent of the students who did not return to MVCC attained their educational goal.
- 4. Seventy-three percent of the transfer students and 56% of the occupational students accomplished their goals.
- 5. More than eight of every ten'students whose goal was "To complete deficiencies in order to transfer to a senior college" accomplished their goal.
- 6. Half of the students whose educational goal was "To learn a new skill" completed their objective.
- 7. One of every four students whose educational goal was "To improve and upgrade my skills" accomplished their goal.

C. Withdrawal from Classes

1. A majority of 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters reported dropping from their MVCC classes after the end of the semester.

D. Number of Hours Employed While Attending MVCC

 More than six of every ten nonpersisters who earned at least 45 credit hours were employed while attending MVCC.



- 2. Twenty-seven percent of the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters were working 40 or more hours a week while attending MVCC.
- 3. Two of every five nonpersisters were working a minimum of 30 hours a week while attending MVCC.

E. Financial Aid

- 1. Almost three of every ten nonpersisters were receiving financial aid.
- 2. Students receiving financial aid tended to list "Family responsibilities interfere with studies" as an important reason for withdrawal from MVCC.

F. Program Changes

- 1. Almost three of every ten students changed their program of study at least once.
- 2. Thirteen percent of the students stated that they never declared a program of study.

G. Present Educational Activity

- 1. More than half of the 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters are now attending another college or university.
- 2. Thirty-six percent of the nonpersisters are not currently enrolled in an educational institution.
- 3. Occupational nonpersisters tend not to enroll for further education or training.

H. Present Employment Status

- 1. Sixty-four percent of the nonpersisters are presently employed.
- 2. More than half of the occupational nonpersisters are working in a field related to their MVCC training.

I. Future Educational Plans

- 1. Twenty-one percent of the occupational nonpersisters and 13% of the transfer nonpersisters plan to complete an MVCC associate degree program.
- More than one of every ten nonpersisters plan to take courses to improve their job skills.
- 3. More than one of every ten nonpersisters plan to take courses for their personal enrichment.



. Evaluation of MVCC Aspects

- 1. MVCC's overall rating was Good in 1976.
- 2. Full-time occupational nonpersisters rated "Faculty Quality,"
 "Faculty-Staff Availability" and "Veteran Services" as GoodExcellent. "Bookstore Services" and "College Food Services"
 were rated Fair.
- 3. Part-time occupational nonpersisters rated "Variety of Course Offerings," "Course Content," "Library Services," "Study Skills Center" and "Veteran Services" as Good-Excellent. "Clubs and Organizations" was rated Poor-Fair.
- 4.7 Full-time transfer nonpersisters rated "Veteran Services"
 Good-Excellent. "Career Exploration by Counselors," "Career
 Conferences," "Preventive Health Information Seminars,"
 "Bookstore Services" and "College Food Services" were rated
 Fair.
- 5. Part-time transfer nonpersisters rated "Library Services" and "Veteran Services" Good-Excellent. "Clubs and Organizations," "Career Conferences," "Bookstore Services" and "College Food Services" were rated Fair.

K. Educational Program Outcomes

- 1. In general, the greatest-asset for nonpersisters was increased understanding of skills required for their jobs.
- 2. MVCC contributed least to promotion or salary increases.

L. Transcript Analysis

- 1. Initial enrollment periods for 45 or more credit hours earned nonpersisters were two or three years before their withdrawal from MVCC.
- More than eight of every ten students enrolled both full- and part-time during their tenure at MVCC.
- 3. More often than not, the enrollment periods were continuous.
- 4. Most students completed approximately half of the courses required for their major program.
- On the average, students attempted 10 credit hours more than they earned.
- 6. At least 10 nonpersisting students did not earn credit in 30 courses.
- 7. Math courses enrolled 223 nonpersisting students who did not earn credit, followed by 168 students in business courses, 109 students in communication courses and 70 students in humanities courses.



X. Additional Comments

The following selection of unedited comments were made by spring 1976 through fall 1976 nonpersisters who earned at least 45% credit hours. These statements were chosen to demonstrate the range of comments.

- I transferred to Northern and found that I had been misdirected in my educational planning. It seems like MVCC stresses getting general education out of way before entering a university. This is generally what I did and found myself far behind other students who had attended since freshmen. They are much more advanced than I. Had I had more courses in my major I could have decided earlier if this is really what I wanted to do. I am now a junior with limited funds and it would be impractical to change my major. Also MVCC should be more up-to-date on university requirements. Although the universities accept the package deal, there are still requirements that students have to fulfill but the transfer student is unaware of.
- · I left MVCC the summer of 1973. I transferred to a senior college where I received my B.S. degree. Graduated in 1975. I will begin a Cytotechnology Program in Michael Reese Hospital this January. I feel MVCC is a good school, it prepared me well for my senior college. I attended MVCC recently one semester and found the teachers to be late too many times.
- · I very much appreciated the training I received in the Child Care Program at MVCC. The quality of education was excellent and the teaching staff was superb.
- · Library services need longer hours on Saturday and Sunday.
- · There is one category you forgot. How does one know what salary to ask when fully trained? I got no help from anyone out there concerning this.
- Regarding: Poor-Financial Aid Services--I felt not enough information was given when I started. Poor-Job Placement Services--Job Guide Books not up to date. Poor-Scheduling of Classes--Had to take many evening classes for career program. Fair-Variety of Course Offerings--Getting better, but slowly. Good and Bad-Faculty Quality. Hard to find-Faculty-Staff Availability. Good-Learning Laboratory, Library Services and Study Skills Center--Was not aware of all the services available when I started. It would of helped. Poor-Bookstore Services--Too crowded, only certain amount of books taken back, so I'm stuck with books. Fair-Safety and Security Services--No way of getting in touch with in evenings.
- · Your counselors are not the most informed people. After repeatingly trying to find help in planning my classes, I found one that was "pretty" sure of the exact classes, I needed for an Associate's degree. He/she was wrong, I have no degree. I hope these answers will help you in future planning.



- Attending MVCC was a good learning experience for me, overall. One aspect I did find disturbing was the lack of concern and involvement of the part-time faculty embers. I had classes with several part-time teachers and each time that particular class proved to be dissatisfactory. However, the main reason I quit attending was pensonal. I must say that I felt a closeness with my classmates and teachers because of the small size of MVCC that I probably would not have experienced in a larger institution.
- I am highly satisfied with MVCC and especially the faculty. I did poorly in high school but was really turned on to learning and studies by MVCC faculty.
- MVCG should give a battery of tests to pinpoint type of career prospective for newly enrolled students or require/new students to have an in-depth interview with a counselor or advisor.
- · Too many same type classes offered the same semester and not offered again the following semester: This makes it difficult to make a good workable schedule.
- MVCC has improved a great deal since my initial enrollment. I recommend it highly and feel that it is one of the best community colleges in the area.
- I am tremendously thankful for the wonderful teachers—all of them. They made learning a job! I'm in my 40's and MVCC has helped so in my still "growing up" process. Both my husband and I attended MVCC. We both loved MVCC. Our son went there-he is now studying in Austria. Our daughter is still a student there and I will probably come back for more courses!
- · I enjoyed MVCC the 2 years I was there. I'm now at ISU and I'm very happy. I went to MVCC first, it helped a lot.
