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ABSTRACT

Using data from the "Federal Outlays" published by the Community Services Administration, data on federal outlays in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan counties for fiscal 1976 were analyzed. The outlays programs were divided into seven major program area categories: human resource development, housing, community and industrial development, agriculture and natural resources, defense and space, justice and law enforcement, and general functions and government administration. In addition to data previously reported in annual Presidential reports on government services to rural America, data on about 400 outlays program categories were added. For the most part, the new programs involved direct federal government operations rather than assistance to state and local governments. Several programs reflecting federal administrative and procurement expenses were also included. Of the \$385.2 billion in federal government outlays reported by the Community Services Administration for fiscal 1976, \$314.5 billion were traced to individual counties. Over 76% of these outlays were made in metropolitan counties. Since the population in metropolitan counties in 1975 comprised 72.8% of the U.S. total, per capita federal outlays were higher in metropolitan areas (\$1,555) than in nonmetropolitan areas (\$1,271). Regionally, per capita outlays were highest in the West (\$1,887) and South (\$1,599) and below average in the Northeastern (\$1,323) and North Central (\$1,192) regions. For all regions, per capita outlays were highest in declining metropolitan counties and lowest in growing nonmetropolitan counties. (AUTHOR/NQ)

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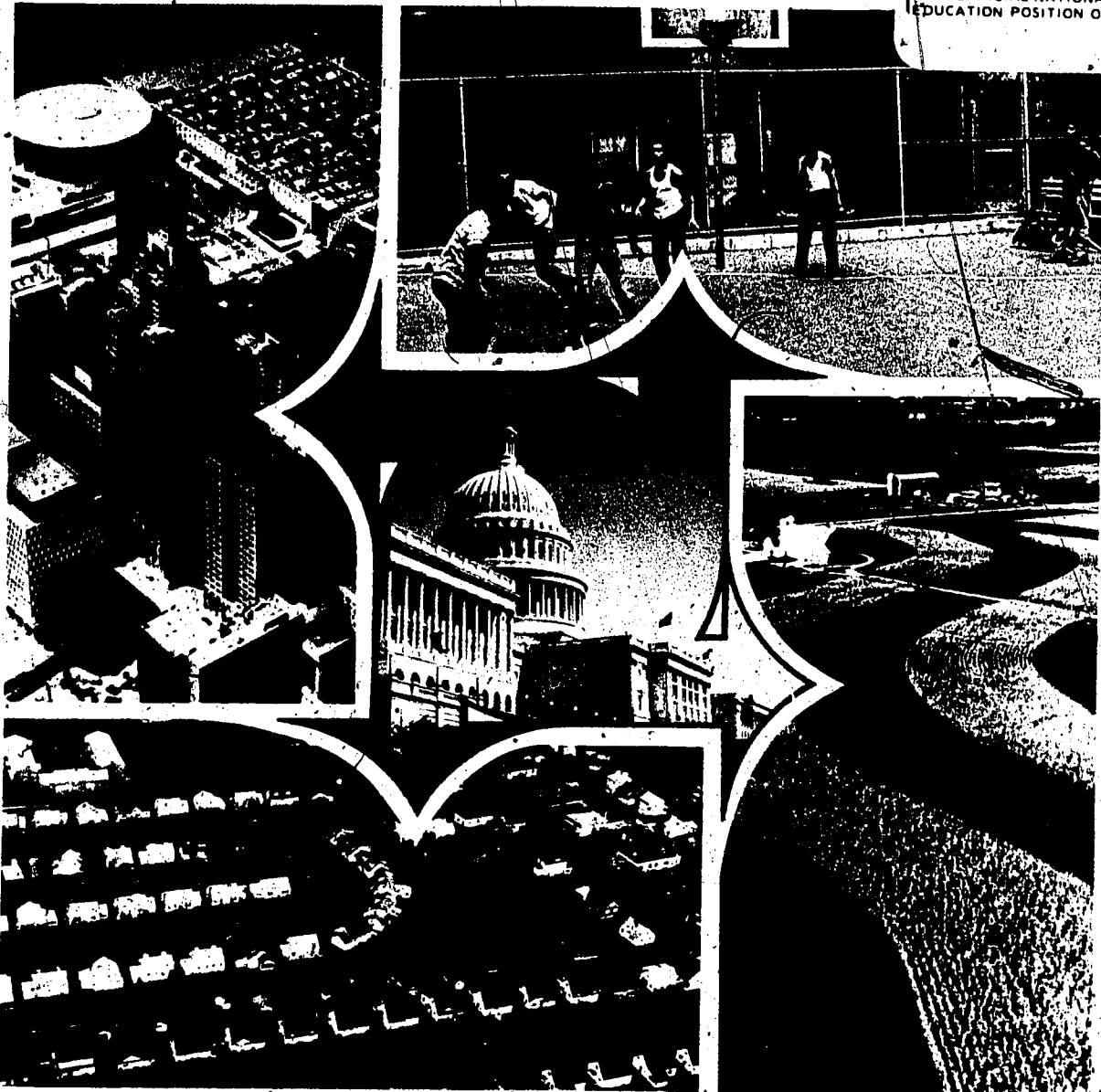
# FEDERAL OUTLAYS IN FISCAL 1976

## A Comparison of Metropolitan and Nonmetropolitan Areas

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#### ABSTRACT

Of the \$385.2 billion in Federal Government outlays reported by the Community Services Administration for fiscal 1976, \$314.5 billion can be traced to individual counties. Over 76 percent of these outlays were made in metropolitan counties. Since the population in metropolitan counties in 1975 comprised 72.8 percent of the U.S. total, per capita Federal outlays were higher in metropolitan areas (\$1,555) than in nonmetropolitan areas (\$1,271). Regionally, per capita outlays were highest in the West (\$1,887) and South (\$1,599) and below average in the Northeastern (\$1,323) and North Central (\$1,192) regions. For all regions, per capita outlays were highest in declining metropolitan counties and lowest in growing nonmetropolitan counties.

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#### PREFACE

This study analyzes data on Federal outlays in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan counties for fiscal 1976. While it is the first such report to be published by the Economics, Statistics, and Cooperatives Service, similar reports have been available for a number of years. These earlier reports, for which Fred K. Hines had primary responsibility, were issued as Presidential reports to the Congress on the availability of Government services to rural America.

The present analysis is heavily influenced by those preceding reports and follows them closely in both content and format. It includes nearly all the programs reported previously and employs a similar scheme for classifying programs according to function. Some additions and clarifications, however, have been introduced, and are discussed beginning on page 6. Other limitations of the outlays statistics which affect both this and earlier reports are discussed beginning on page 3.

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## SUMMARY

Of the total Federal outlays for nearly 700 selected Government programs during fiscal 1976, the largest share (76 percent) accrued to metropolitan counties, whose 1975 population comprised 72.8 percent of the U.S. total. Per capita Federal outlays during fiscal 1976 were therefore higher in metropolitan areas (\$1,555) than nonmetropolitan areas (\$1,271). The report examines the distribution of fiscal 1976 Federal outlays between metropolitan and nonmetropolitan counties for those 700 programs, totaling \$314.5 billion or 81.6 percent of the total outlays for that year.

The report groups Federal outlays into seven major program area categories: human resource development, housing, community and industrial development, agriculture and natural resources, defense and space, justice and law enforcement, and general functions and Government administration. In all but two program area categories--community and industrial development and agriculture and natural resources--per capita outlays in metropolitan areas exceeded outlays in nonmetropolitan areas. A total of \$239.6 billion went to metropolitan areas, while nonmetropolitan areas received \$74.9 billion.

Regionally, per capita outlays were highest in the West (\$1,887) and lowest in the North Central region (\$1,192). The Northeast received the highest level of outlays for human resource development (\$813), but only half the U.S. average for housing and one-fourth the U.S. average for agriculture and natural resources. The North Central region had less than the U.S. average in every program area category, but especially in defense and space programs and human resource development outlays. The South received the second highest level of Federal outlays (\$1,599). Per capita outlays for community and industrial development, justice and law enforcement, and general functions and Government administration were highest in the Southern States. The West received the highest level of per capita outlays for housing, agriculture and natural resources, and defense and space; in these program areas, the West almost doubled the U.S. average.

When counties were grouped by recent (1970-75) population change, per capita outlays were highest in declining metropolitan counties and lowest in growing nonmetropolitan counties. Outlays for many of the program areas were much higher on a per capita basis in declining metropolitan counties than in any other county group. Per capita outlays for housing were high in growing counties both inside and outside Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA's), but almost twice as high in the metropolitan growing counties as in nonmetropolitan growing counties.

Per capita outlays for agriculture and natural resources accrued heavily to declining nonmetropolitan counties, where they were nearly two-thirds higher than in growing nonmetropolitan counties, and three times the U.S. average. Per capita outlays for community and industrial development were high in both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan declining counties, but substantially above average in growing nonmetropolitan counties as well.



# FEDERAL OUTLAYS IN FISCAL 1976

## A Comparison of Metropolitan and Nonmetropolitan Areas

### INTRODUCTION

Government services in the United States are provided through a highly complex network of organizations. Although services are administered at three general levels--Federal, State, and local--it is at the local level that the greatest complexity occurs, with the number of independent local governments providing public services now exceeding 80,000. <sup>1/</sup> In many places, private institutions provide and finance services which are elsewhere taken care of by governments. Elementary and secondary education is a case in point, but by no means the only such instance. <sup>2/</sup>

Because of the difficulties of measuring local services, the customary approach is to examine levels of public spending in each area and to use this as evidence of the availability of governmental services. This is the approach adopted in this report, which uses statistics on outlays by the Federal Government in each of the Nation's counties or equivalent areas. It compares the distribution of Federal outlays between metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas for fiscal 1976.

A complete study of local public services would include both an inventory of local service programs and measurements of the quantity and quality of each service. Obtaining the information necessary for such a study means facing a number of

difficulties. Since there is no complete inventory of public programs even at the Federal level, <sup>3/</sup> it would be necessary to assemble one--an effort which would be very costly.

But even if adequate resources for such a task were available, there are a number of technical barriers as well. Despite recent improvements in the methods for measuring and evaluating public services, <sup>4/</sup> these techniques are still often relatively crude. While some services are provided in units which are easily measured, such as the number of homes with telephones, other concepts--such as the adequacy of recreational facilities--are not so easily defined. In still other cases, services are provided in well-defined units, but benefits spill over local boundaries and go far beyond the area where the service is provided; the Interstate Highway System is one example.

## MEASURING THE AVAILABILITY OF GOVERNMENT SERVICES

### Using Federal Outlays Data to Measure Service Availability

Federal outlays data are not a completely adequate measure of Government services. This is true first of all because spending levels result from a number of factors including not only the quantity of services provided but also their quality, local variations in their costs, and differences in their exact nature. As a result, spending levels do not accurately reflect the extent to which citizens have access to public services.

Second, data on Federal Government spending excludes programs financed by State and local governments and private organizations. State and local governments are important providers of local public services, accounting for 68 percent of direct general expenditures for nondefense domestic functions in fiscal 1976. However, data on spending by these governments are difficult to obtain. Statistics on local government spending in county areas of the United States are gathered comprehensively only once every 5 years by the Census Bureau <sup>5/</sup> Comparable statistics for State government expenditures in local areas are not available on a nationwide basis. In addition, no single data source is available which reports spending on public services by private and quasi-public organizations. As a result, the analysis of Federal expenditures provides only a partial picture of the availability of services in local areas.

It is also becoming increasingly clear that Federal policies toward local areas are not fully reflected in expenditure totals. Many policies are implemented by means of regulatory decisions which may not require significant expenditures of

funds. Thus, a complete analysis of geographic variations in policy would need to take regulatory actions and other policies such as "tax expenditures" into account. 6/

Finally, it is not altogether clear in some cases just how figures on Federal expenditures should be interpreted. Programs vary widely in the extent to which their benefits are localized; while services such as housing or community development assistance can only be enjoyed in a specific place, others, like national defense or health research, have benefits which are broadly distributed throughout the population. Even when a program's benefits can be traced to local areas such as counties, there may often be significant variations from place to place within the county which will be obscured by county wide totals.

#### Advantages of the Outlays Data

This report employs data from the Federal Outlays published by the Community Services Administration (formerly the Office of Economic Opportunity). 7/ The Federal outlays statistics have two primary advantages. First, these annual reports are relatively comprehensive. They list most Federal Government expenditures, including both direct spending and grants-in-aid, and certain nonspending programs such as loans. The data are reported for the entire United States and its territories. Second, the reports are highly detailed. Total outlays are reported for each of more than 1,300 program categories. The reports include detail for each county or equivalent area in the United States and also for cities with over 25,000 population. The Federal Outlays is the only comprehensive series of county-level data on the Federal Government's spending.

#### Limitations of the Outlays Data

Despite their value, the Federal outlays data suffer from several limitations which seriously restrict their usefulness. These relate to (1) inadequacies in the estimation methods used to obtain county-level spending data; (2) the difficulty of identifying the individual program categories listed in the outlays reports; and (3) problems of accommodating year-to-year changes in the outlays reports and in Federal programs themselves when attempting to compare Federal spending over time. 8/

### Estimation Methods

Although Federal Outlays reports spending totals in each county and larger city, over two-thirds (71.6 percent) of fiscal 1976 dollars reported at those geographic levels represent estimates rather than actual expenditure figures. In many cases, these estimates involve a pro rata of State spending totals among the State's cities and county areas. A number of pro rata techniques are used; these vary considerably in their sophistication and probable effect on research conclusions. Of those programs for which county details are estimated, more than half--with about 49 percent of total 1976 outlays--involve pro rata methods reliable enough that the data can be used with some confidence. The largest of these programs provide benefit payments to individuals; estimated county-level outlays are based on the size of the target population residing in each area. While these methods are reasonably accurate when making aggregate-level comparisons such as between metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas, any more demanding use of the figures should be made with caution.

On the other hand, a number of program categories involving nearly a quarter of total fiscal 1976 outlays are not reliably prorated to the county level. Of these programs, the most important group--with at least 72 programs and \$55 billion <sup>9/</sup> -- involves both grant and contractual spending programs for which the county-level spending is unknown and for which no estimates were made. Chief among these are the defense contracting programs; expenditures under these are usually reported at the location of the prime contractor and are not traced to the locations of subcontractors, where the contracts are ultimately fulfilled. Also important are formula grants to States, which may be recorded in the State's capital county or in its largest city and not tracked to their eventual disposition in various parts of the State.

In general, the State totals shown in the outlays reports are represented as accurate, and the estimating methods should not affect conclusions based on State-level data. Analyses based on county-level data, however, must address the data quality issue if they are to avoid errors.

### Identifying Program Categories

The more than 1,300 program categories contained in the Federal outlays reports are identified by the name of the agency which administers them and by a short descriptive title. Unfortunately, this information is often an insufficient guide to the nature of each program's activities and does not adequately distinguish between similarly titled programs.

One of the recent major improvements in the Federal outlays reports came about when many of the outlays categories were identified with the program identification numbers appearing in the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance. The catalog describes the main characteristics of over 1,000 Federal aid programs, including most Federal grants-in-aid, and can be very useful in research dealing with Federal programs. Where the outlays program categories are cross-referenced with the catalog, the work of unraveling the maze of Federal programs is eased considerably.

However, the catalog was designed to help State and local governments identify aid programs for which they are eligible and is not maintained as a comprehensive classification of Federal spending programs. As a result, the catalog omits many of

the programs listed in the outlays reports, making the use of the outlays data much more difficult.

The identification of outlays program categories is further hindered by changes in the way programs are defined from one issue of the catalog to the next, by changes in the program identification numbers, and by a lack of full coordination between the catalog and the outlays reports. As a result, the catalog is not as useful as it could be in conjunction with the Federal outlays data.

#### Using Outlays Data in Time Series Analyses

One of the chief potential benefits of annual data series such as the Federal Outlays is the ability to evaluate shifts in the patterns of spending. There are several obstacles to using the Federal outlays data for this sort of analysis, though they are by no means insurmountable. A major barrier to analyzing a specific functional area is the difficulty of identifying sets of equivalent programs at two or more points in time. Constant changes in Federal policy as new programs are created and old ones consolidated or eliminated are a major frustration in such analyses, especially if the study encompasses a period of major transition in Federal policies. The task of tracing changes in Federal policies could be considerably eased by an improved Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance.

### ORGANIZATION OF THE REPORT

#### Programs Included

Of the \$362.8 billion in outlays reported for fiscal 1976, some 81.6 percent (or \$314.5 billion) are included in this report. <sup>10/</sup> The remaining \$49.3 billion were omitted for several reasons.

First, a large number of programs involving by far the largest outlays were deleted because the data were not valid enough to support conclusions about spending in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas. Two programs--interest on the public debt (\$27.2 billion) and civil service retirement and disability benefits (\$8.3 billion)--account for the bulk of funds in this category. County-level data for these programs were estimated on a per capita basis, a method which is insufficient to support valid research conclusions. However, because of their policy importance, the omission of many smaller programs is more significant for this report. One major group of these programs involves formula grants to States for which the total amount is reported only for the capital or other large city within the State and for which the ultimate distribution between county areas is unknown. These programs are especially important since many of them provide support for local public services. Certain other programs are omitted because their county-level totals were estimated on a per capita basis or by some other unsuitable technique.

A number of other programs were also omitted because they were not considered to reflect the government-wide distribution of domestic policy efforts. In general, programs relating to the Nation's foreign policy were excluded, as were research grants and similar programs not directly related to local services. Several programs

which involve spending in only one or a few counties were also excluded, as were most programs with less than \$50,000 in 1976 outlays. The omission of these programs should not have much effect on conclusions about the distribution of Federal emphasis between areas.

The report includes one major group of programs--Department of Defense contracts (\$44.9 billion)--for which reliable county-level data are not available. Military contracts are reported to the county where the prime contractor is located, even though many of these dollars are subsequently passed on to subcontractors headquartered in other counties or even in other States. Existing evidence is mixed as to whether the ultimate distribution of these funds is more or less geographically concentrated than the prime contract awards. As a result, the effect of including these programs is not clear. However, the programs are reported here because of their importance to the total pattern of Federal spending and the health of local economies.

#### Program Area Categories

This report divides the outlays programs into seven major program area categories. Several of these program areas have been further divided into individual functions. While the data are much easier to analyze when presented in such groupings, any such categorization is necessarily somewhat arbitrary and may thus contribute to misinterpretation. From the information available about each program--in many cases no more than a cryptic title--it is often difficult to determine the nature of a program's activities. While helpful in some cases, the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance does not suffice to identify the content of all outlays programs. Even when the nature of a program's activities can be identified, the most appropriate classification for that program is not always evident. This is true especially when the program embraces two or more program areas, such as health education or medical training. In addition, some programs were forced into broad categories in order to keep the number of program classifications low. As a result, the classification scheme employed will not necessarily agree with classifications that have appeared elsewhere. The data for all individual programs used in compiling this report are shown in appendix tables 1-7.

#### Comparison With Previous Reports

This report provides data previously reported in annual Presidential reports on Government services to rural America. Because these reports are the only regular source of information about the distribution of Federal spending between metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas, comparisons between the distribution of funds in 1976 and earlier years will inevitably be attempted. While the report follows the general format of those which preceded it, a few changes need to be identified. The classification of 3,097 counties or equivalent areas into metropolitan or nonmetropolitan categories follows the identical scheme used since the fourth annual report, which reported fiscal 1972 outlays. <sup>11/</sup>

For the most part, the system of classifying programs according to function also remains the same, though some changes have been instituted. Two new program categories--"justice and law enforcement" and "general functions and Government,

administration"--have been added. With a few exceptions, these categories are composed of programs not included in previous reports. One new function--environmental protection--has been identified within the "community and industrial development" program area; it is composed partly of programs previously classified in the "community development" function and partly of programs not previously reported. The "transportation" function has been expanded from its earlier focus on highways to include programs emphasizing other modes of transportation as well. Both the "agriculture and natural resources" category and the functions into which it is divided underwent some definitional changes in order to accommodate the diverse array of programs encompassed. A limited number of programs were reclassified from one function to another where this was deemed appropriate.

The primary difference between this and former reports is in the scope of programs included. This report adds about 400 outlays program categories to the 275 contained in the previous Presidential report. <sup>12/</sup> For the most part, the new programs involve direct Federal Government operations rather than assistance to State and local governments. A number of programs reflecting Federal administrative and procurement expenses have also been included.

These alterations in content and structure reflect an attempt to keep the report current with the continuing changes in Federal policy. The additions were made in response to increasing requests for greater reporting detail and the fact that these data are not available from any other source on a metropolitan-nonmetropolitan basis. The additional details make the report a more complete statement on the public services supported by the Federal Government and respond to the growing interest in the distribution of Federal dollars and their importance as a stimulus to local economies. As a result of these changes and additions, however, this report does not correspond exactly with previous ones and care should be exercised in comparing expenditures for each function over time. In all cases, the most valid means for making such comparisons is to identify individual programs in the appendix tables and examine changes in the distribution of program funds between years.

## DISTRIBUTION OF FEDERAL OUTLAYS IN FISCAL 1976

### Metropolitan and Nonmetropolitan Distribution

The fiscal 1976 Federal outlays included in this report totaled \$314.5 billion. <sup>13/</sup> Of this total, 76.2 percent was directed to metropolitan areas (table 2). In 1975, metropolitan areas included a slightly smaller share (72.8 percent) of the total U.S. population (table 1). As a result the level of outlays per capita was higher in metropolitan areas (\$1,555) than in nonmetropolitan areas (\$1,271).

Over half the total outlays were for human resource development purposes (fig. 1). Outlays for this function were slightly higher inside Standard Metropolitan

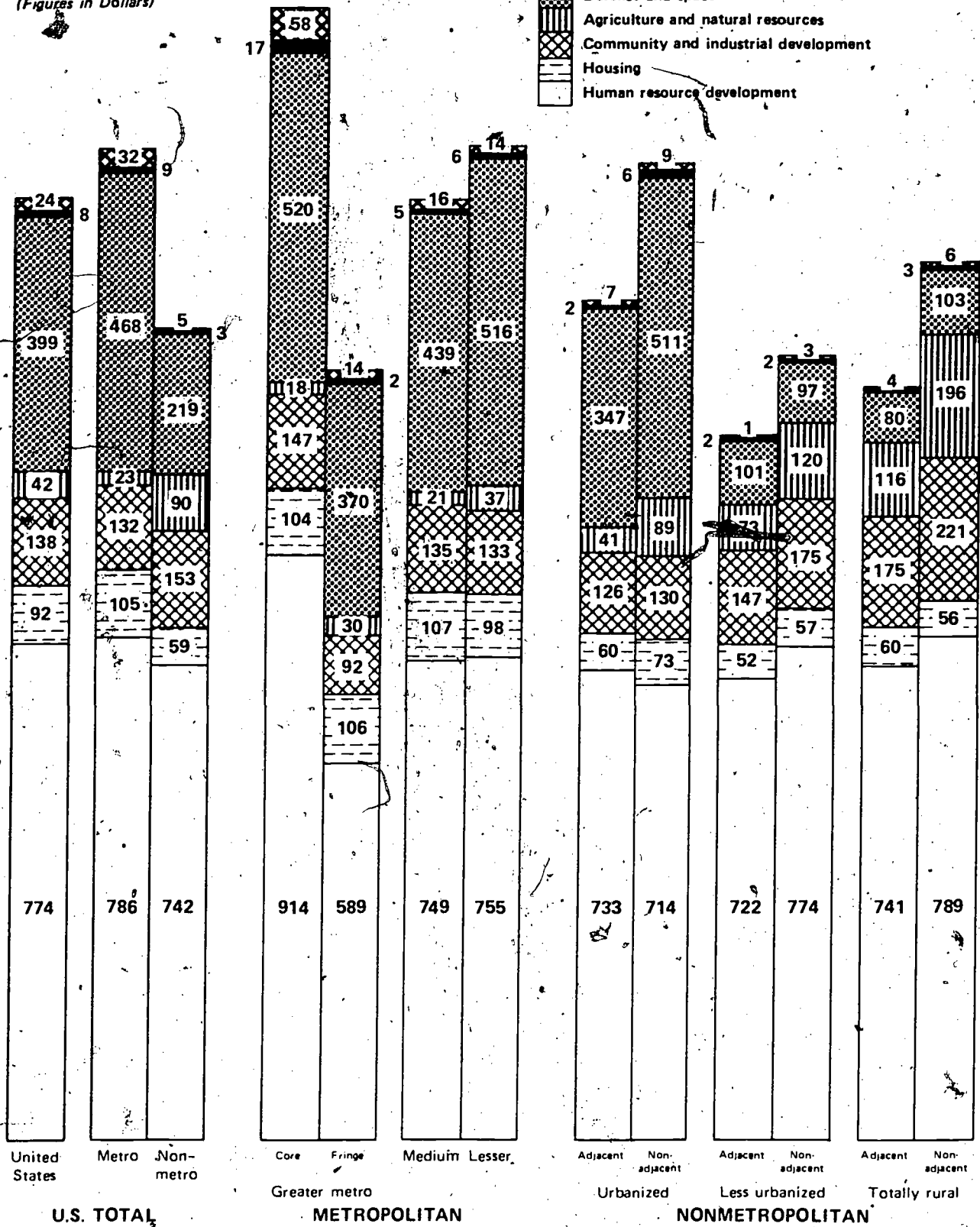
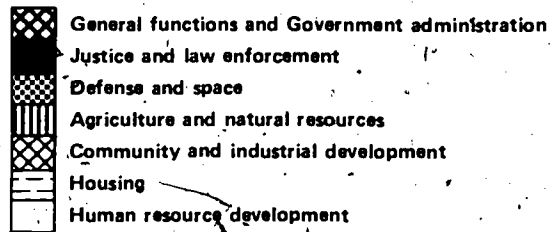

Statistical Areas (SMSA's) than outside them. <sup>14/</sup> The greatest difference occurs for manpower training and employment opportunities programs; per capita outlays in SMSA's were \$47, compared with \$21 in nonmetropolitan counties (table 3).

Defense and space outlays amounted to \$85 billion, the second highest total. These outlays were heavily directed toward metropolitan areas, which received 84.9 percent of the total. Defense and space outlays per capita were \$468 inside SMSA's, more than twice the level in nonmetropolitan areas (\$219). <sup>15/</sup>

Community and industrial development programs had outlays of \$29.4 billion in fiscal 1976, of which 69.3 percent went to metropolitan areas, slightly less than the share of total population residing in those areas. Per capita community and industrial development outlays were \$153 in nonmetropolitan areas, compared with \$132 in SMSA's. The difference was mainly due to community development programs, for which per capita outlays were \$82 in nonmetropolitan areas and \$54 in SMSA's. Per capita outlays for both environmental protection and transportation were higher in metropolitan areas than outside them.

Over 82 percent of 1976 housing outlays, which amounted to \$19.6 billion, were made in metropolitan areas. On a per capita basis, this amounted to \$105 in SMSA's, nearly double the level in nonmetropolitan areas (\$59). Substantial differences exist among the four departments with housing programs. Two of these--the Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Veterans Administration--directed approximately nine-tenths of their housing outlays to SMSA's. The U.S. Department of Agriculture, on the other hand, made 71 percent of its housing outlays in nonmetropolitan areas.

Outlays for agriculture and natural resources functions amounted to \$8.9 billion in fiscal 1976, nearly 60 percent of which went to nonmetropolitan areas. Per person, outlays for this program area were \$90 in nonmetropolitan portions of the Nation, as compared with \$23 in SMSA's.

More than 90 percent of outlays for justice and law enforcement were made in metropolitan areas. Outlays for this function were relatively small, amounting to \$1.6 billion or \$8 per capita. In metropolitan areas, outlays for justice and law enforcement were \$9 per capita; in nonmetropolitan areas they were \$3 per capita.

Outlays for general functions and Government administration <sup>16/</sup> totaled \$5.2 billion, nearly 95 percent of which were in SMSA's. Per capita outlays in metropolitan areas averaged \$32, while in nonmetropolitan counties they were \$5.

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<sup>14/</sup> An SMSA (Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area) is a county or group of contiguous counties which contain at least one city of 50,000 inhabitants or more, or twin cities with a combined population of at least 50,000. In addition, contiguous counties are included in an SMSA if according to certain criteria they are socially and economically integrated with the central city. An urbanized area consists of a central city, or cities, with a population of 50,000 inhabitants or more and surrounding closely settled territory.

Though the level of per capita outlays across all selected programs was higher in metropolitan than in nonmetropolitan areas, there were substantial variations within each area. For metropolitan areas, the highest outlays per capita were made in the core counties of the largest SMSA's, the lowest to the fringe counties surrounding these core counties. Core counties received \$576 per person more than the fringe counties, largely due to the difference in levels of outlays for human resource development and defense and space programs. Of all nonmetropolitan counties, the urbanized counties not adjacent to an SMSA had the highest per capita amounts of Federal outlay dollars. The counties that are less urbanized and adjacent to SMSA's had the least amount of Federal outlays per capita--\$378 less than the U.S. average.

#### Regional Distribution

Per capita total outlays were highest in the West (\$1,877) and South (\$1,599); they were lowest in the North Central States (\$1,192) and in the Northeast (\$1,323). For the most part, similar patterns occurred for the individual program areas as well, though some differences do exist (fig. 2). Defense and space outlays per capita were highest in the West (\$678) and South (\$463) and lowest in the North Central region (\$223). Likewise, outlays for both housing and agriculture and natural resources were higher in these two regions, though in these instances the per capita level of outlays was lowest in the Northeast. In three program areas (community and industrial development; general functions and Government administration, and justice and law enforcement), per capita outlays in the South exceeded those in the West.

There are a few exceptions to the generally higher levels of per capita outlays in the West and South. Outlays for human resource development were highest per person in the Northeast (\$813), followed by the West (\$788) and South (\$771). This result is due to higher levels of outlays in the Northeast for public assistance, social security, and rehabilitation (\$555), and for health payments and services (\$172) (table 4). Per capita outlays for education were highest in the West and South, however, and the Northeast followed the West in the level of outlays for manpower training and employment. Per capita outlays for environmental protection were highest in the Northeast (\$26) and the West (\$23).

The regional differences in per capita total outlays in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas are very close to those for the Nation as a whole. In all regions, per capita total outlays were higher in SMSA's than in nonmetropolitan areas. Both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan outlays levels were highest in the West (\$1,956 and \$1,624) and lowest in the North Central region (\$1,230 and \$1,111). The difference between the two areas was greatest in the South, where SMSA's received \$471 more per capita than nonmetropolitan areas; metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas were most nearly equal in the North Central States, where they differed by only \$119.

Likewise, the metropolitan-nonmetropolitan division of per capita outlays for individual program areas is much the same in the regions, as for the Nation as a whole. In all regions, per capita outlays for human resource development, defense and space, justice and law enforcement, and general functions and Government administration were higher in SMSA's. Conversely, per capita agriculture and natural resources outlays were higher in nonmetropolitan areas in all regions.

In two program areas, however, the pattern is mixed. Housing outlays per capita were higher in SMSA's in all regions except the Northeast, due largely to a lower level of Veterans Administration housing outlays in the metropolitan portions of the Northeast. In addition, per capita community and industrial development outlays were higher in nonmetropolitan areas throughout the Nation except in the South.

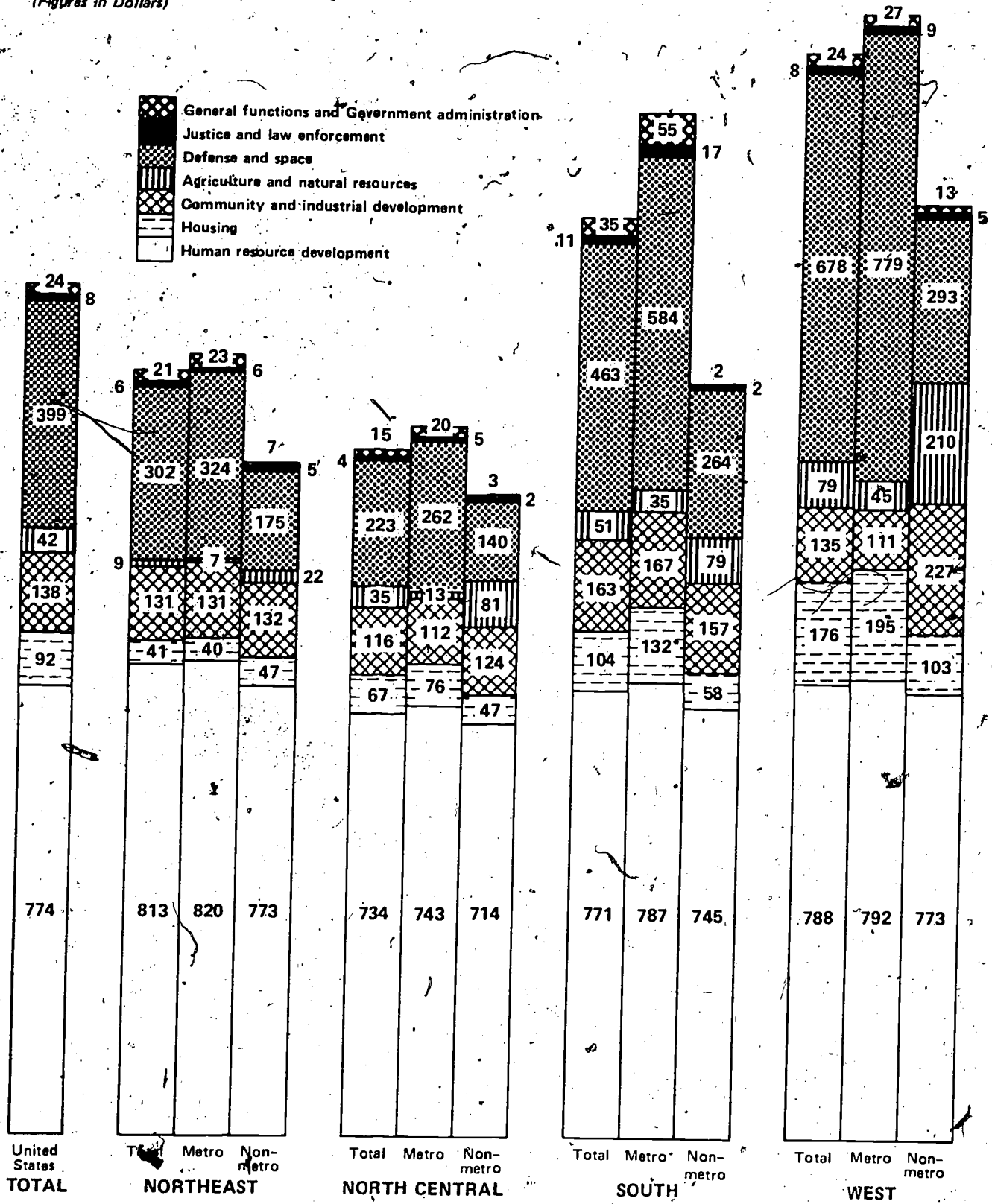

## Comparison by Program Area

### Human Resource Development

In fiscal 1976, outlays for the human resource development programs analyzed in this report totaled \$164.8 billion, or \$774 per capita. Nearly three-quarters of the outlays for this program area were made in metropolitan areas, and per capita outlays for human resource development in metropolitan areas (\$786) exceeded those in nonmetropolitan areas (\$742).

The per capita level of human resource development outlays was highest in the core counties of the Nation's largest SMSA's (\$914). Per capita outlays were somewhat less than the U.S. average in medium- and lesser-sized SMSA's, and substantially below that for the largest metropolitan areas. Fringe counties in the largest SMSA's were far below the national average in per capita outlays for this function. In general, per capita outlays were also below the national average in nonmetropolitan areas, though in less urbanized and totally rural counties not adjacent to SMSA's, the level met or exceeded that average (fig. 3).

Over two-thirds of human resource development outlays (\$112.5 billion) were for public assistance, social security, and rehabilitation programs. The level of per capita outlays for this function in nonmetropolitan areas (\$540) was slightly higher than in SMSA's (\$524), a finding which is not particularly surprising in light of the generally lower income levels in nonmetropolitan areas. Per capita outlays for this function were highest in the core counties of the largest SMSA's and in the totally rural counties.

Outlays for health payments and services amounted to \$32.8 billion, slightly less than a fifth of all human resource development outlays. On a per capita basis, metropolitan areas averaged substantially larger funding levels (\$163) than nonmetropolitan areas (\$130). The highest level of outlays was in the largest SMSA's (\$189), though the resources were distributed quite differently between the core counties (\$228) and fringe counties (\$101) of these areas. Among nonmetropolitan counties, the highest levels of per capita outlays for health programs were in the less urbanized or totally rural counties not adjacent to SMSA's.

Outlays for education in fiscal 1976 (\$11.1 billion) were distributed nearly equally between metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas when measured on a per capita basis. Within these areas, however, some significant differences occur. Among metropolitan counties, per capita education outlays were highest in core counties of large SMSA's and in the smallest SMSA's (\$57); they were lowest in the fringe counties of the largest metropolitan areas (\$36). Nonmetropolitan counties not adjacent to SMSA's had higher levels of per capita education outlays than those counties contiguous to metropolitan areas.

Outlays for the final function within the human resource development program area--manpower training and employment opportunities--amounted to \$8.5 billion in fiscal 1976, or \$40 per capita. Outlays for manpower programs were more highly concentrated in metropolitan areas than any of the other human resources functions; over 85 percent of manpower outlays were made in SMSA's. On a per capita basis, manpower outlays were more than twice as high in metropolitan counties (\$47) as in nonmetropolitan counties (\$21). All metropolitan area county groupings had relatively high per capita outlays for this function, except for fringe counties in the largest SMSA's. Nonmetropolitan counties as a whole averaged even less than this, however, and only in the most urbanized nonmetropolitan counties did the per capita levels rise above that for the fringe counties.

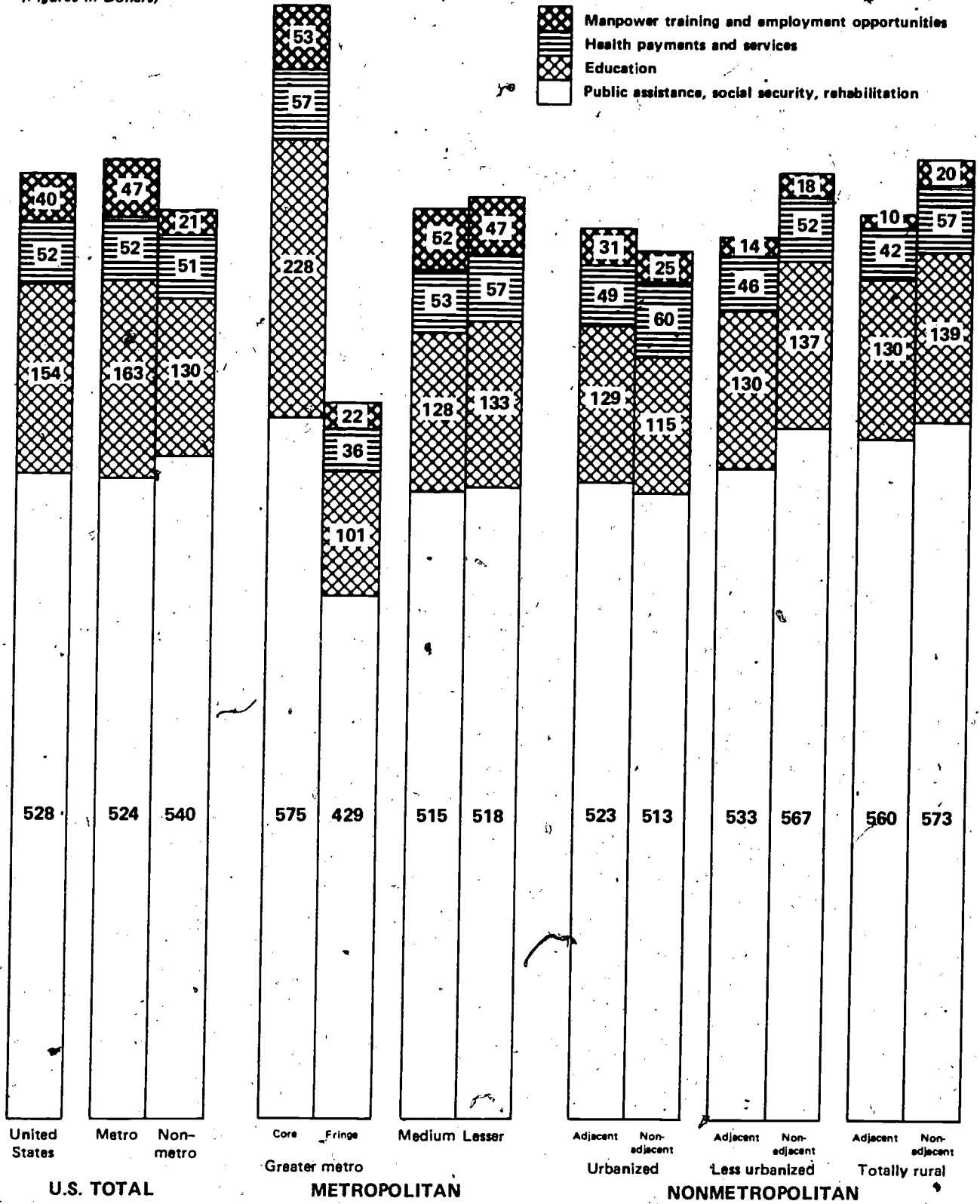

## Housing

Total outlays for housing amounted to \$19.6 billion in fiscal 1976, or \$92 per capita. Over 82 percent of total housing outlays were in metropolitan areas; per capita outlays in SMSA's (\$105) were nearly double the level in nonmetropolitan areas (\$59). Per capita housing outlays were uniformly high in both core (\$104) and fringe (\$106) counties of larger SMSA's and in the medium-sized SMSA's (\$107). In the smallest SMSA's, the level was \$98 per capita, still well above the level in nonmetropolitan counties. Except for outlays in the most urbanized nonmetropolitan counties not adjacent to an SMSA (\$73 per capita), housing outlays did not exceed \$60 per capita for any of the nonmetropolitan categories (fig. 4).

The bulk of housing outlays in fiscal 1976 were by the Veterans Administration (VA), amounting to \$49 per capita. Nearly 90 percent of Veterans Administration housing outlays were made in SMSA's, and per capita outlays in metropolitan areas (\$60) were more than three times the nonmetropolitan average (\$19). Per capita outlays were highest in the fringe counties of large SMSA's (\$68); the level of outlays was lower in the smaller SMSA's. The most urbanized nonmetropolitan counties had higher per capita VA housing outlays than any of the other nonmetropolitan categories, but the level in these areas was still well below the levels inside SMSA's. In the remaining portions of nonmetropolitan areas, the levels ranged from about one-eighth to just under a quarter of the metropolitan area average.

The second highest total was reported for the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which had outlays amounting to \$6.7 billion; over 91 percent of these outlays were in metropolitan areas, and per capita outlays in SMSA's (\$39) were nearly four times as high as those in nonmetropolitan areas (\$10). Within the metropolitan areas, the highest levels were in core counties of large SMSA's and in medium-sized SMSA's. In nonmetropolitan areas, HUD housing outlays were concentrated in the most urbanized counties, which averaged significantly more per capita than the remaining nonmetropolitan categories.

U.S. Department of Agriculture housing outlays totaled \$2.5 billion--\$12 per capita--and were concentrated in nonmetropolitan areas, where 71 percent of 1976 outlays were made. Per capita outlays for U.S. Department of Agriculture housing programs in nonmetropolitan areas (\$30) were six times as high as in SMSA's (\$5) and were highest in the totally rural and less urbanized counties, the areas receiving the least assistance under other Federal housing programs. Among the SMSA counties, per capita levels were highest in the smallest SMSA's (\$12) and lowest in central counties of the most populous metropolitan areas (\$1). Interior Department housing outlays totaled less than \$14 million, three-fourths of which went to nonmetropolitan areas.

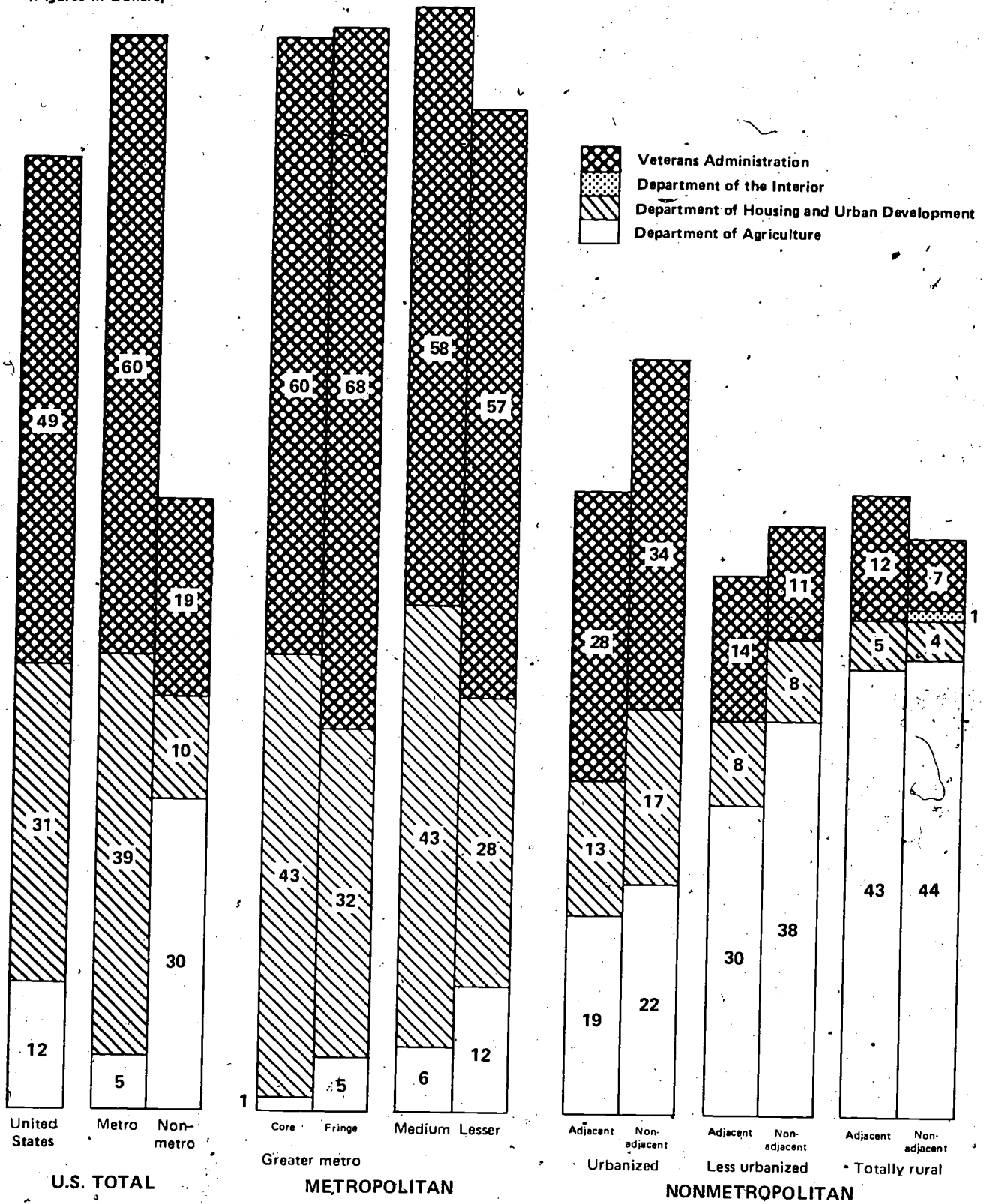
## Community and Industrial Development

Federal outlays for community and industrial development functions were nearly \$30 billion in fiscal 1976. While almost 70 percent of these outlays were in metropolitan areas, the per capita level was higher in nonmetropolitan areas (\$153) than in SMSA's (\$132). Among nonmetropolitan counties, the highest per capita level was in totally rural counties not adjacent to an SMSA (\$221). In general, per capita levels were higher in the most rural counties and in those not contiguous with metropolitan areas. Per capita outlays in metropolitan areas were highest in the core counties (\$147) and lowest in fringe counties (\$92) of large SMSA's (fig. 5).

Outlays for the community development function made up nearly 45 percent of all outlays in this program area. Some 36.7 percent of community development outlays were in nonmetropolitan areas--more than the share of the population residing in these counties; as a result, per capita outlays for this function were much higher in

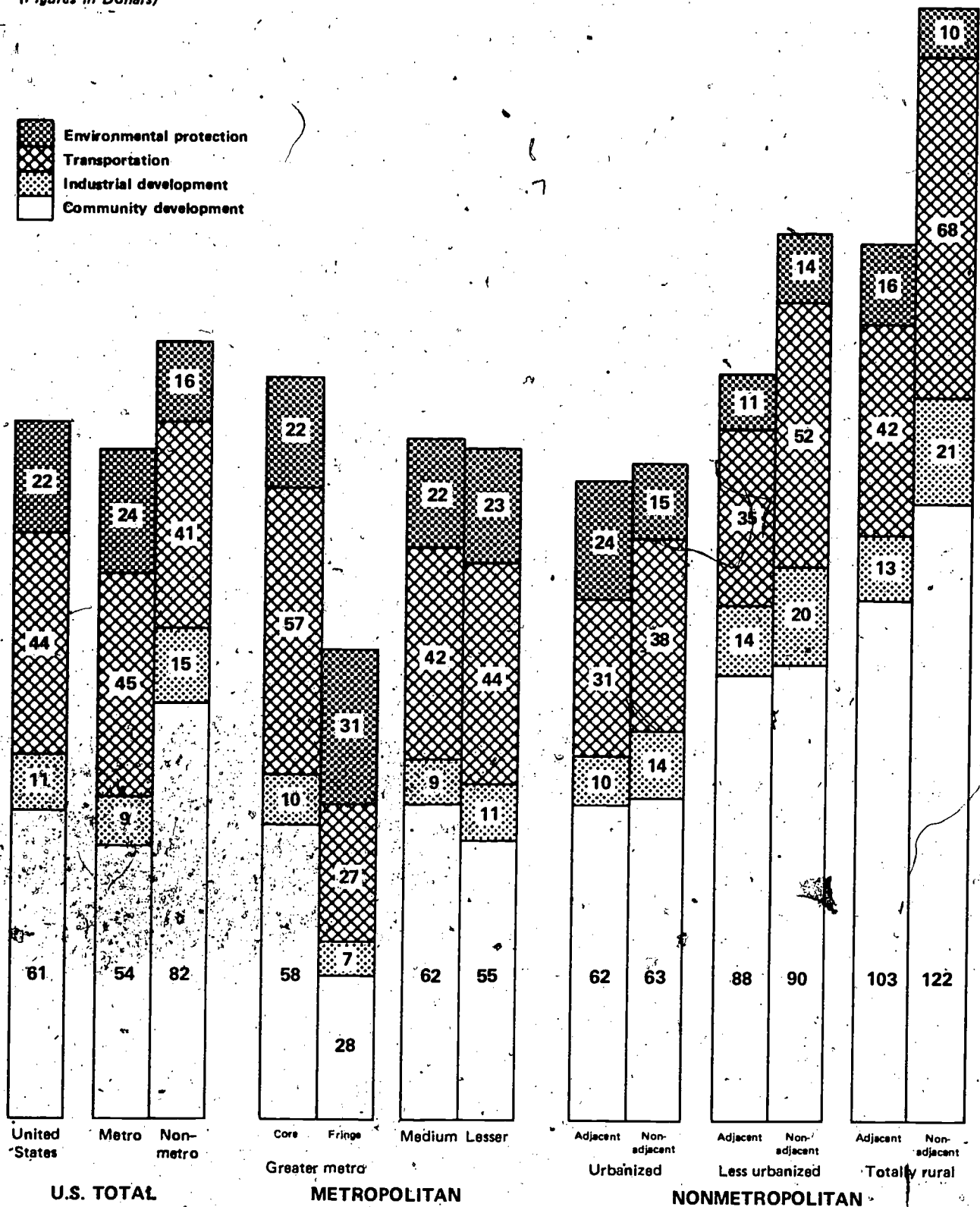
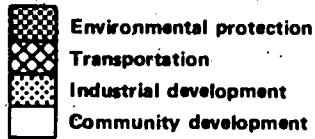

nonmetropolitan areas (\$82) than in SMSA's (\$54).<sup>17/</sup> Per capita outlays were highest in the totally rural counties, especially those nonadjacent to SMSA's (\$122). Within metropolitan areas, per capita outlays for community development were highest in medium-sized SMSA's and lowest in the fringe counties of the largest SMSA's.

Transportation outlays comprised just under a third of community and industrial development outlays, amounting to \$44 per capita. Transportation outlays were slightly higher in metropolitan areas (\$45) than outside them (\$41), but these differences are not nearly so large as those occurring within these respective areas. Within SMSA's, the largest differences were between the core counties of the most populous areas, with per capita transportation outlays of \$57, and the fringe counties of these areas, with outlays of \$27. In nonmetropolitan areas, the highest per capita transportation outlays were in totally rural counties not adjacent to SMSA's (\$68). Average outlays for this function were progressively lower in the more urbanized nonmetropolitan counties, especially those counties adjacent to SMSA's.

Outlays for environmental protection amounted to over \$4.6 billion in fiscal 1976, or \$22 per capita. On the average, per capita outlays for this function were higher in SMSA's (\$24) than in nonmetropolitan areas (\$16). Only the most urbanized nonmetropolitan counties located next to SMSA's had funding at a level equivalent with SMSA counties. Within metropolitan areas, per capita outlays were highest in the fringe counties in the largest SMSA's.

Industrial development outlays totaled \$2.3 billion in fiscal 1976. On a per capita basis, outlays for this function were higher in nonmetropolitan counties (\$15) than inside SMSA's (\$9). Per capita outlays were highest in the less urbanized and totally rural counties not adjacent to SMSA's and were lowest in the fringe portions of the Nation's most heavily populated metropolitan areas.

#### Agriculture and Natural Resources

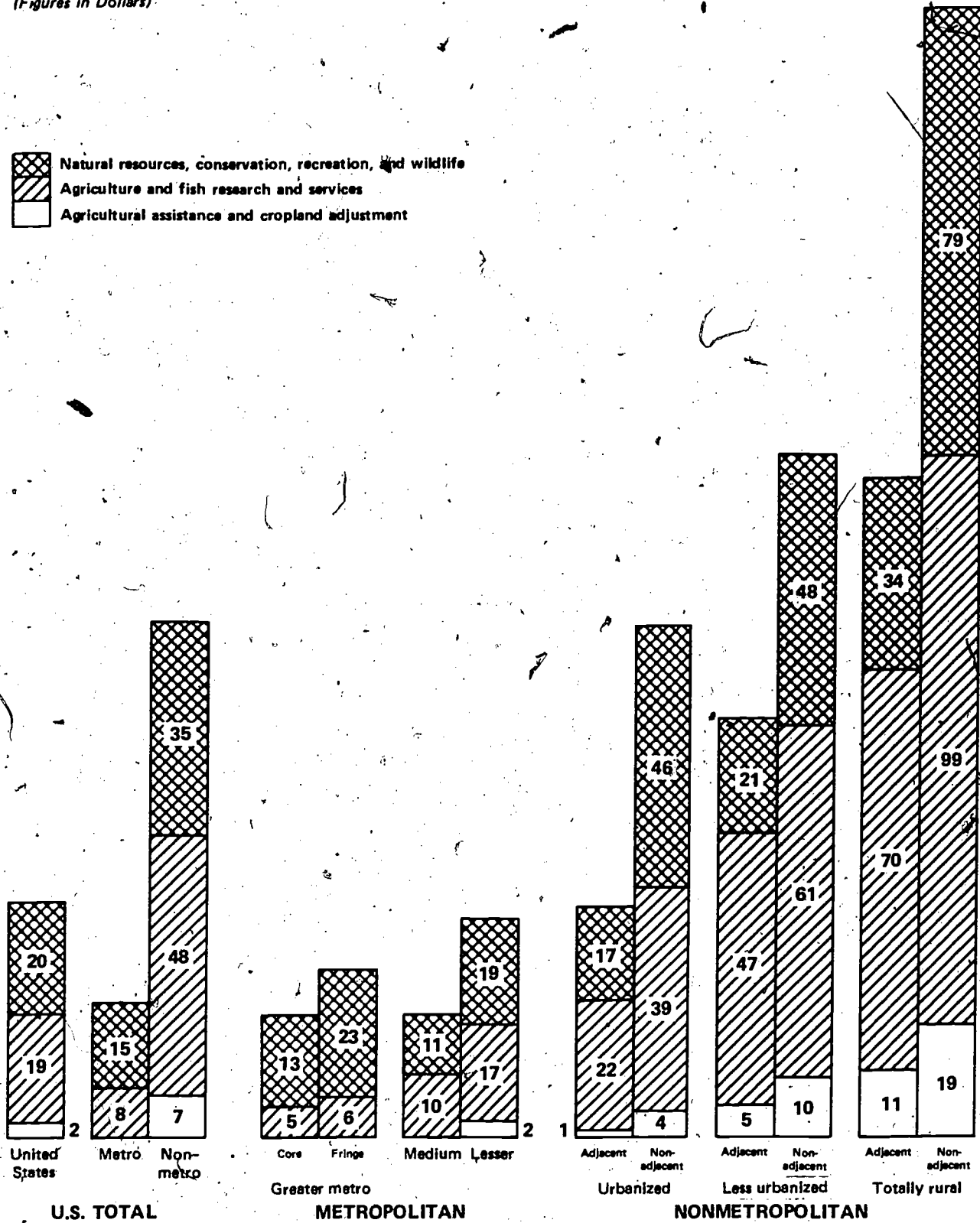
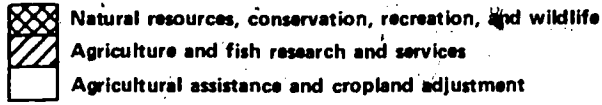
Outlays for agriculture- and natural resource-related programs included in this report totaled \$8.9 billion in fiscal 1976. Although this amounted to some \$42 per capita nationally, the average was \$90 in nonmetropolitan areas. The outlays for this program area were especially concentrated in the most rural counties and those not adjacent to SMSA's. Overall, metropolitan counties averaged only \$23 per capita, with the smallest level occurring in the central portions of the largest SMSA's (\$18) and the largest average in the least populous metropolitan areas (\$37) (fig. 6).

The largest amounts were disbursed for natural resources, conservation, recreation, and wildlife, which totaled \$4.3 billion (\$20 per capita). The per capita level of outlays for these functions was more than twice as high in nonmetropolitan areas (\$35) as in SMSA's (\$15). In general, outlays were highest in the most rural counties and those not adjacent to metropolitan areas. Fringe counties of large SMSA's (\$23) and counties in the smallest SMSA's (\$19) received the highest per capita levels among metropolitan counties.

<sup>17/</sup> On a per capita basis, direct Federal assistance in the form of grants-in-aid is distributed almost equally between metropolitan (\$33) and nonmetropolitan (\$31) areas. The higher nonmetropolitan outlays level for community development purposes results from a much higher level of Federal direct loans and guaranteed loans (\$42 compared to \$5 for SMSA's), programs which imply a far greater measure of local self-help than do grants, since the loan amounts eventually must be repaid. Over two-thirds of all Federal community development aid going to SMSA's was composed of grants, while nearly three-fifths of outlays to areas outside SMSA's involved loans and loan guarantees.

Outlays for agriculture and fish research and services programs--which totaled \$4.1 billion--were even more heavily directed toward nonmetropolitan areas, averaging \$48. The largest levels of per capita outlays occurred in the most rural counties and those not adjacent to SMSA's. Outlays per capita averaged only \$8 in metropolitan counties, with the level rising to \$17 in the smallest SMSA's.

The agricultural assistance and cropland adjustment programs reported here amounted to less than half a billion dollars in fiscal 1976, or about \$2 per capita. These outlays were mainly concentrated in the most rural counties and in those not adjacent to SMSA's. In metropolitan areas, outlays for this function exceeded half a dollar per capita only in the smallest SMSA's (\$2).

### Defense and Space

Fiscal 1976 outlays for defense and space programs amounted to \$85 billion, second only to human resource development. On a per capita basis, defense and space outlays totaled \$399. Nearly 85 percent of this total accrued to metropolitan areas, and per capita outlays for these functions were higher in SMSA's (\$468) than in nonmetropolitan areas (\$219).<sup>18/</sup> Per capita outlays were highest in the central counties of the most heavily populated SMSA's (\$520), in small SMSA's (\$516), and in the most urbanized nonmetropolitan counties not adjacent to an SMSA (\$511). The level of defense and space outlays in the more rural nonmetropolitan counties was substantially lower (fig. 7).

Defense contracts make up over half the outlays for the defense and space program area and are heavily concentrated in metropolitan counties, which averaged \$256 per capita, compared to \$93 in nonmetropolitan areas. Within SMSA's, defense contracts were heavily directed toward the core counties of large metropolitan areas (\$357). Remaining portions of the Nation's SMSA's averaged less than 60 percent of this amount. Significant differences also occur within the nonmetropolitan portions of the Nation, where the most urbanized counties averaged over \$150 per capita, while the remaining areas averaged about a third as much.

Although defense payroll outlays favored nonmetropolitan counties to a greater extent than defense contracts, per capita levels were still higher inside SMSA boundaries (\$189) than outside them (\$124). Among SMSA counties, per capita outlays were highest in small SMSA's and lowest in the core counties of the most populous ones. Among nonmetropolitan counties, defense payroll outlays were highest in the more urbanized counties; at the same time, however, there was a tendency for per capita outlays to be higher in counties not adjacent to SMSA's.

National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) outlays amounted to only \$3.6 billion, or less than 5 percent of the defense and space total. Over 97 percent of NASA outlays were in metropolitan areas, which averaged \$23 per capita, compared with \$1 in nonmetropolitan counties. Per capita NASA outlays were highest in core counties of large SMSA's (\$40) and were much lower in the remaining portions of the Nation's metropolitan areas.

### Justice and Law Enforcement

Outlays for the programs related to justice and law enforcement totaled \$1.6 billion in fiscal 1976--\$8 on a per capita basis. Over 90 percent of outlays for

(Figures in Dollars)

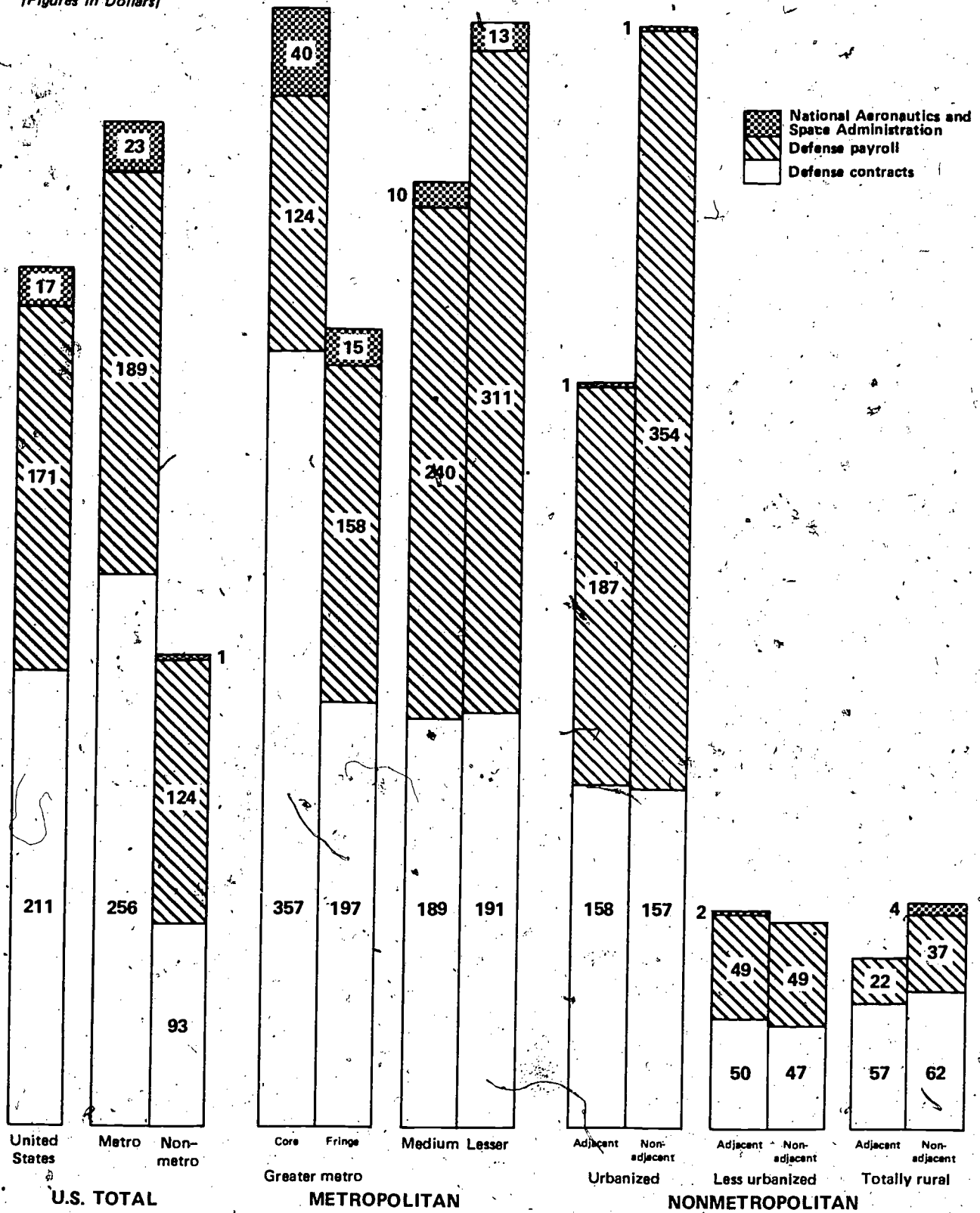

this program area were made in SMSA's, and per capita outlays in metropolitan areas (\$9) were three times as high as in nonmetropolitan areas (\$3). The highest per capita level was in the core counties of SMSA's (\$17); other metropolitan counties averaged significantly less, with the fringe portions of large SMSA's receiving an average of only \$2 per capita. Per capita outlays in nonmetropolitan areas were generally low, with the highest level occurring in the urbanized counties not adjacent to SMSA's.

#### General Functions and Government Administration

Outlays for the remaining Government functions included in this report amounted to \$5.2 billion in fiscal 1976. <sup>19/</sup> Almost 95 percent of these outlays were in metropolitan areas. Per capita outlays for these purposes were \$32 in SMSA's, compared with \$5 in nonmetropolitan areas. The per capita level of outlays was far higher in the central counties of large SMSA's (\$58) than in any other category, though the remaining metropolitan area counties had average outlays nearly triple those of nonmetropolitan areas. Per capita outlays outside SMSA's were highest in the most urbanized and most rural counties.

#### Federal Outlays in Growing and Declining Areas

During 1970-75, the Nation's population grew by 4.8 percent to over 213 million. Neither this growth nor the rate of change, however, was uniform for all areas. The majority of all U.S. counties (76 percent) were growing and of these, almost two-thirds grew by 5 percent or more. Of those counties experiencing a decline in population, only 6 percent declined by more than 10 percent. Overall, growth occurred more rapidly in nonmetropolitan areas, where the rate of change was 6.7 percent. Among nonmetropolitan counties, the fastest growth rate was in the most rural counties, followed by the most urbanized ones. Counties in the least populous SMSA's grew faster than other metropolitan counties, with the least growth occurring in the largest SMSA's, especially their central portions (table 1).

Per capita outlays in growing and declining counties are compared in table 5. In general, larger shares of per capita outlays went to declining counties in both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas (fig. 8).

Outlays per capita for human resource development tended to favor declining areas in both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas, though the levels were much further apart. This was due to the public assistance and health functions for which per capita outlays were much higher in declining metropolitan counties than in growing ones. In addition, per capita outlays for education and manpower programs were higher in growing counties than in declining portions of nonmetropolitan areas.

In both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas, per capita outlays for housing programs were larger in growing counties than in those experiencing a decline. This relationship also holds true for the three departments responsible for the largest housing programs.

Community and industrial development outlays, on the other hand, favored areas which have undergone recent population decline. The tendency for outlays to go to

<sup>19/</sup> While the programs included in this category are general in nature, often of an administrative or "overhead" character, many other administrative programs which could be identified with a particular function (such as education) have been assigned to that function. Thus, this category does not include all Federal Government administrative costs and should not be interpreted as such.

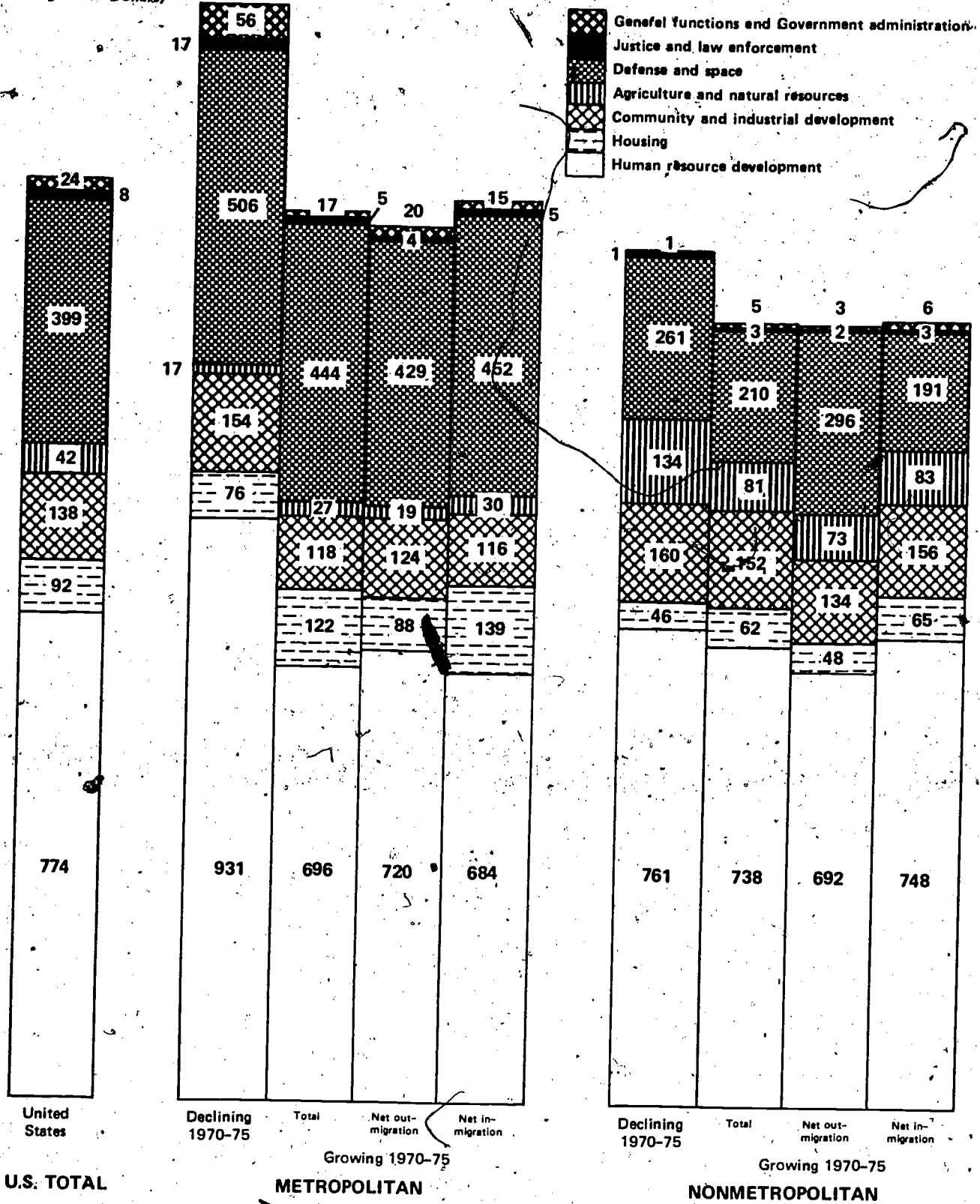

declining counties is most pronounced in SMSA's, though the per capita level of outlays in declining counties is slightly higher in nonmetropolitan areas. Only in the case of environmental protection outlays is nonmetropolitan areas do growing counties receive more per capita.

Significant differences exist between metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas in the distribution of outlays for agriculture and natural resources. In metropolitan areas, per capita outlays are higher in growing counties, both in total and for each of the functions considered. In contrast, per capita outlays in nonmetropolitan areas were highest in declining portions, except for outlays for natural resources, conservation, recreation, and wildlife, which were highest in the counties experiencing population growth since 1970.

In both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan counties, defense and space outlays were higher in declining counties by substantial margins. However, the two areas differed regarding outlays for the remaining two functions--justice and law enforcement and general functions and Government administration. In each case, per capita outlays in SMSA's greatly favored counties with declining populations, while in nonmetropolitan areas the reverse was true.
